Installation and Configuration:

Please read the 'README.TXT' file; then run the program file, AWAVE.EXE.

Choose **Program...** from the **Options** menu.

Select the **AudioPlayer** tab. Under **Primary dev:**, select the digital audio device to be used when saving to the **AUDIOPLAYER** virtual export format as well as in **Audio Player** mode (whenever this primary device is busy playing something else, **Awave** will automatically search for, and use, any secondary device(s) you may have installed).

See **Auditioning** for details on setting up and using the auditioning feature in the **Auditioning** tab.

Loading and inspecting a file:

Press the right mouse button, select **Open new file** and select a file using the standard dialog box.

Awave will try to recognize the correct **import format** of a file even though it may have no or even an incorrect extension.

A treeview list with a Bank->Instrument->Waveform hierarchy will be constructed from the file loaded and shown. A special 'folder' with a list of all waveforms contained in the loaded file may sometimes also be appended at the bottom of the list (depending on if **Awave** decides it makes any sense to have such a folder).

Select an instrument or a waveform from the list by clicking on it with the mouse.

You may now be able to play it on your midi keyboard (or computer keyboard if you have enabled the virtual keyboard feature), provided that you have a supported wavetable synth and have setup auditioning properly. You can quickly turn on and off the auditioning feature by toggling the **Auditioning** checkmark on the **Options** menu. See **Auditioning** for details.

If you do not have one of the supported wavetable synths, but you do have an audio card capable of digital audio, press the right mouse button and choose the **Play audio...** menu item to play the sound.

Editing and saving:

To edit the name of an item, do a 'slow double click' on the name or press F2 and edit the name as in a standard text edit control (same as when editing filenames in the Windows 95 shell). Note also that a 'fast double click' executes the default action of the right mouse button menu.

For all other parameters, select **Properties** in the right mouse button menu to bring up the currently selected items property sheet. Try this for all the various item types (banks, instruments, waveforms) and explore all the tabs! You will find, among other things, a visual loop point editor, a waveform display, and an instrument keymap editor. To get help on anything, select the **?** button (Win95 only) and press the question cursor on the control in question. Note! When auditioning is enabled, click the **Apply** button to download (and hear!) the changes.

To save an item, press the right mouse button and select **Save as...**

A standard dialog box will appear and prompt you for the file name to save to.
Choose your export format in the **Save as type:** box.
Enter a filename (no extension needed) and press OK.

Note! Many of the export formats only support saving Waveforms and not Banks or Instruments.

Note! To achieve the highest quality instruments for your wavetable synth, you'll probably want to use an instrument editor to manually improve the output from **Awave** by editing amplitude envelopes and other synthesizer specific parameters.

When opening files, *Awave* tries to determine the file type, not only by looking at the filename extension, but also by looking inside the file. Thus, even if it has an incorrect or no extension, it can, for file types marked with *****, be correctly identified. For formats that are not possible to detect in this way you will have to pay attention to using correct file extensions. If a file is not of a recognized format, it is treated as raw audio data and the waveform properties Advanced tab pops up querying the user for additional info.

If a file can't be determined to be one of the, by this program, supported file types, then the waveform properties box will appear. Select the Advanced tab and supply information on the file's data type.

If *Awave* can't handle a certain file (because it's fragmented on the disk), you can extract the individual instrument files to .INS or .EFE files with a utility called EPSDISK (not included with *Awave*). INS files are the same as an EFE files except the latter may also contain EPS sequenced songs, bank info or such, instead of an instrument. Multilayered instruments will have each layer shown as a separate instrument (all have the same name though).

The software synthesizer module for the MWave DSP uses the MWSYNTH.INI file to construct multisampled instruments from usual .WAV files. When exporting to the MWS format, *Awave* outputs a bunch of .WAV files as well as a .MWS text file containing an instrument extract that can be manually pasted into the MWSYNTH.INI file.

The Yamaha 16-bit SY-series wave sample files are really named *.W??*. There's also *.T??* (All Data Files, often contains waves and are much more common than *.W??*; but aren't supported at the moment), *.J??* (Patch parameters?) and *.K??* (Sequenced songs). See also the [12bit format](#).

.WFB, .WFP, .WFD: Turtle Beach WaveFront synthesizers / WavePatch files (PC)

WaveFront based synthesizers are currently the Maui, Tropez, Rio and Monterey.

.WFB files contains a whole Midi Bank, .WFP a single Program and .WFD a complete drum set.

Instruments using ROM samples, of course, cant be converted.

If the files doesnt use embedded waveforms, but external .WAV files instead, you must have the .WAV files in either the exact path they where when the .WF? file was created, or, in the same directory as the WF? file.

Currently ***Awave*** only saves files with embedded waveforms.

Note! TB Rio users should only save .WFP files as the .WFB exported by this program are Maui style and may not be loadable on the Rio.

Note! When saving to .WFB bank files, waveforms not contained in an instrument will not be saved.

'Clipboard' virtual export format: Copy the audio data to the Windows clipboard.

The data will be copied as a RIFF WaveFile, the standard clipboard audio format.

Features:

Same as for .WAV files.

'MidiSDSDump' virtual export format: Transfer waveforms over Midi using SDS.

Pops up a dialog box before transferring each waveform in the selected item using the Midi sample Dump Standard protocol. You must choose destination midi output device, midi channel, and sample slot in the dialog box.

'AudioPlayer' virtual export format: Plays the sound on a digital (waveform) audio playback device.

If you have a basic soundcard capable of playing digital audio, you can use this 'export' format to play the sounds contained in a waveform, instrument or bank.

Set the output device to be used for playback in the Options->Properties dialog. If you have more than one digital audio card installed in your system, choose the most capable one; some cards can only playback at a few fixed sample rates (wich can cause waves to be played at a too high or too low pitch) while better cards can play at any rate.

The Audio Player:

If you start *Awave* with **-AP** as the first option on the command line and follows this with one or more filenames, the Audio Player mode will be entered. You can also launch the Audio Player at any time from the normal main window of the program with the **Play audio** command..

In this mode *Awave* acts as a digital audio player that can play all the import formats supported by *Awave*.

Files will be consecutively loaded and all the sounds contained within them played before the program terminates. You must press the >>Next>> button to advance from one waveform to the next, closing the Audio Player after the last one (to immediately close it, skipping any remaining wavforms, click the standard close window button |X|). The play/stop button should be obvious. The off, wf, sp radio buttons determines the operational mode for the scope (off/hold, waveform oscilloscope, frequency spectrum analyzer).

The following command line switches are allowed, and must preceed the file names.:

- AP** Specifies that the AudioPlayer mode shall be entered.
- ONCE** Plays every item once and then closes the AudioPlayer
- DELETE** Delete the input file(s) from disk after the AudioPlayer is closed.

With the Audio Player option, you can use *Awave* for example as a helper app to your favourite Web-browser!

The output device is the same as for the 'AudioPlayer' virtual export format.

Example: AWAVE -AP -ONCE QUADRA.AU POPCORN.MOD

Note! Some playback devices only support a few fixed playback rates. If then the waveform is sampled at any other rate, *Awave* tries to pick the closest supported rate, but it may still sound very out of tune. This a limitation of the audio card.

Note! Some buggy audio drivers report that they can playback at any playback rate, when, in fact, they can not. If this is the case, and youre having severe troubles with the AudioPlayer, try dechecking the Device can handle arbitrary playback rates box.



Using Auditioning:

If you have a:

- Gravis Ultrasound, or a
- Turtle Beach Maui or Tropez), or a
- Creative Labs SoundBlaster AWE32,

you can use the auditioning feature of *Awave* to directly hear and play instruments and waveforms by just selecting them in the main treeview list.

To enable auditioning, go to the Options->Program->Auditioning tab. Just click the Enable checkbox and choose appropriate MIDI-Input and WaveSynth devices. If you don't have a midi-in device select

the **<none>** midi input device. If you check the **Enable virtual keyboard** box, you can use the computer keyboard as a midi keyboard as well. Click **OK** and everything should be go.

Awave should handle downloading instruments to the Advanced Gravis UltraSound Classic/Max/Ace soundcards without any problems.

Note however, that the GUS cant handle individual 16bit waveforms larger than 256KB and a total of 1MB in an instrument (for a card with a full 1MB of memory)

Awave should handle downloading instruments to the TB Maui or Tropez soundcards. If you have any other WaveFront based card you can save .WFP files and load them with WavePatch instead.

Note! ***Awave*** will remove any custom instruments that you may previously have loaded into wavetable RAM.

Awave should handle downloading instruments to the SB AWE32 family of soundcards without any problems.

Note! You will need the very latest drivers with 32bit application as well as .SF2 bank file support in order to be able to use auditioning with the AWE32 (these drivers were only available in beta version when this was written). Also make sure that the AWEMAN32.DLL file is correctly installed in your windows directory.

Note! If you run out of memory on the card when trying to load an instrument, try removing any other user banks you may have previously loaded to card memory (by using the standard AWE32 control panel).

If you can't get midithru to work (in order to use the audition feature), check:

- Have you connected your midi in device properly?
- Are any other program using the input device?
- If you can't hear a specific instrument but it normally works, look at the instrument property sheets keymap tab and see if there really are any waveforms assigned to the midi keys you are trying to play on.
- Do you really have a supported card?

When saving stereo waveforms to formats only supporting mono data, you can here specify how the conversion should be handled.

Converts stereo data to mono data by calculating the arithmetic average of the channels.

Converts stereo data to mono data by using the left channel only.

Converts stereo data to mono data by using the right channel only.

PAP:

Check to enable auditioning.

Auditioning works by routing midi messages from a keyboard or other midi-in device to a wavetable synth, combined with automatic creation and loading of instruments and samples to the same wavetable synth.

Select the wavetable synth you want to use for the auditioning feature.

Currently the Advanced Gravis UltraSound / MAX / ACE, the Turtle Beach Maui / Tropez and the Creative Labs SoundBlaster AWE 32 are supported.

Select the midi input device you want to use for the auditioning feature.

Data from this device will be routed to your selected wavetable synth, and automatically translated to use the correct bank, program and channel.

Selecting the Dummy Device will let you use any on-screen virtual midi keyboard program if you do not have a midi keyboard. If you do, set it to output to channel 1 and program 1 on your wavetable synth.

AWE32 users must also set bank no 127 (consult your sound card manual on how to change user bank).

Check to enable the virtual keyboard.

When enabled you can play on your computer keyboard instead of (or as a complement to) an external midi keyboard.

PPP:

Select the digital audio playback device you wish to use for the .AudioPlayer export format as well as for the ***Awave*** Audio Player.

Check this box if your audio playback card can handle non-standard playback rates. If the AudioPlayer screws up, try unchecking this box.

The AudioPlayer has a built in oscilloscope.

Select the scale of the Y-axis.

Selects that the scale of the Y-axis should be logarithmic..

Selects that the scale of the Y-axis should be linear.

Selects the refresh rate. Higher numbers gives smoother look but taxes the CPU more.
If your computer is up to the task, set it to the monitor refresh rate (usually about 70Hz) or else set it to half or even a forth of it.

WGP:

Panning.

This specifies the positioning of the waveform in the stereo field.

Range: 0..127, 0 = far left, 127 = far right.

SourceBitsPerSample : ExpandedToBitsPerSample, NoOfWavesamples, Signformat, Channelformat

Relative volume setting.

Range is 0..127. (min. .. max.)

Root key.

This is the midi-key number at which the waveform is played back at its original sampling frequency.

Range is -99..99 cents.

WFP:

Controls the position (offset) of the part of the waveform that is displayed.

Check to enable sampled release.

This means that the waveform loops while the key is pressed down, but stops looping and plays to the end of the sample (remember there may be sample data past the loop end point) when it is released. When this is not checked, it loops until the amplitude envelope has faded it out upon key release.

Check to enable reverse looping.

This makes the loop go backwards instead of forwards.

Check to enable looping.

When looping is on, the waveform is looped between the loop start and loop end points, as long as the midi key is pressed.

Check to enable bi-directional looping.

Bi-directional looping means the loop direction alternates between forwards and backwards.

WAP:

Check if signed wavesamples.

Check if stereo wavesamples.

Check to perform a byte swap when reading 16bit data.

Check if 8 bit linear PCM wavesamples.

Check if 16 bit linear PCM wavesamples.

Check if μ -Law format wavesamples.

Check if A-Law format wavesamples.

File is some other type of data, compression and/or packing scheme.

Enter the size of the file header (the number of Bytes preceding the actual sample data)..

Enter waveform size (number of Bytes of sample data).

The value is automatically truncated if it extends beyond the file length.

If all data, after the (optional) file header, is sample data, then you need not change this.

Note that 16bit data is 2 Bytes/Sample/Channel.

Fixed the SB AWE32 auditioning to work with the new Win95 drivers. The AWE32 auditioning now

uses the new .SF2 file format so in fact these latest, .SF2 compatible, drivers are now required (for auditioning with the AWE32). Note! They had only been released in beta (although public beta) versions at the time this was written.

Changed the loop editor to a nice 'dual layer' view.

Added an 'Audio Processor wizard' connected to the 'Process' button in the waveform properties box's waveform tab. Only 16->8bit, 8->16bit, mono->stereo and stereo->mono conversion algorithms are available for the moment.

Changed the name from 2PAT into the more appropriate *Awave*. All registered users of 2PAT are, of course, also registered to *Awave*.

Waveforms are now cached in memory. This eats memory but is necessary for some of the new as well

as for future editing functions. It also makes auditioning more responsive.

A visual loop point editor page has been added to the waveform property sheet.

A waveform display page has been added to the waveform property sheet (true RMS display, plus peak indication)

Auditioning feedback is now available when editing stuff in the property sheets (i.e. if you have one of the supported wavetable synthesizers). Just hit the Apply button to download the changes to the synth.

The really stupid couldn't register app class bug fixed (occured on many Win32s systems).

Now writes converted stuff to disk first when you actually saves or auditions anything, instead of doing everything in one sweep when opening a file, as was done in previous versions. This change has made possible a number of the enhancements below.

Tree list view with nodes and leaves for bank file, instrument and wavesample levels. You can now save stuff from any of the 'levels' (Note only a few of the export formats support all levels). There's also Property sheets for the items of the various levels. Most stuff is editable!

You no longer have to decide on export format before you load a file. Just select from a list in the Save dialog.

Auditioning now works regardless of what youre going to export to.

SoundBlaster AWE32 auditioning support added.

A virtual '.DAC' export format added. Saving to this format will simply play the item on a digital audio output device. So users that doesn't have a GUS, Maui or AWE32 can now play sounds as well, provided you have some sort of basic audio card. An 'Audio Player' item in the right mouse button menu acts as a shortcut for saving to this format.

Audio Player mode and -AP command line switch added. Lets 2PAT be used as a multiformat digital

audio player. Great as a helper app for your favourite Web-browser.

A virtual '.CLIP' export format added. Saving to this format will simply copy a wavesample to the Windows clipboard.

.IFF export format added.

.SBK export format added as well as improved import support..

Reads RAW signed data files; assumed 8bit, 11khz.

KRZ files now get their loop point. Now also supports split files (KR1 + KR2). No longer throws out samples if the instrument is too big but rather lets you do it yourself in the patch editor of your choice.

Correctly reads 16bit WAV files now.

Correctly reads ULT's with 16bit samples now.

Looped samples with the end loop point at or near the sample end now get the sample at the loop start point duplicated at the loop end point + 1, in order to keep the GUS interpolation happy (can cause clicks otherwise).

The envelopes now corresponds to the ones Patchmaker use for looped and unlooped waves, except that looped samples have a quite long decay but not at all as long as the long decay setting in Patchmaker.
