Staz Software -- www.stazsoftware.com

Cookie Cutter was written using FutureBASIC II and Program Generator, published by Staz Software. If you want to learn to program on the Mac, or you're looking for an intelligent and productive programming environment, I highly recommend FutureBASIC.

FutureBASIC is much easier to learn than most other languages, but is extremely powerful, with full toolbox access (you can write everything from applications to extensions and CDEFs). The documentation is top-notch, and the folks at Staz Software are incredibly helpful and dedicated. There's also lots of free source code, third-party add-ons, and some third-party books available. Program Generator (which ships as part of FutureBASIC II) is an excellent tool which allows you to build interfaces for your applications, provides a framework with built-in handling of standard Mac interface operations, handles AppleEvents, provides a huge selection of useful functions, and generally makes your programming more productive. (No, I don't work for Staz Software -- I'm just a very satisfied customer).

Fonthead Design -- www.fonthead.com

The cool font used in Cookie Cutter's about box is called 'Tycho', and is by Fonthead Design. Fonthead make really nice innovative fonts at an excellent price (I'm talking around \$1 each!). Take a look at their web site for the full info, previews of each font, and online ordering.
