QuicKeys Automates the Work Environment at the

They depend on Mac™ OS computers running pagination software made by Digital Technology International™ (or DTI).

Streamling Production

Michael has been using QuicKeys® for many years as a powerful, flexible tool to automate most of the work he

routinely performs on his Macintosh systems. When he came on board at the *Daily News*, he immediately saw a chance to streamline the paper's operations even further by implementing QuicKeys on every Mac desktop. QuicKeys performs routine multi-step operations on-the-fly in any application, without the need for cumbersome programming or complex manual script writing. What's more, its automation capabilities can readily be shared between multiple users.

"The first improvement that I recommended concerning the DTI editorial pagination system was to purchase QuicKeys. QuicKeys cut down the amount of repetitive steps that editors have to perform every day in order to paginate their sections. For starters, I made a QuicKeys sequence that created the daily folios and plans. This sequence alone saved over a thousand steps (mouse clicks, menu entries, dialog boxes, etc.). Today, I come into work and launch the sequence. I grab a cup of coffee and when I return to my desk, it's done. I've just saved thirty minutes. And that's just one of the sequences we use every day to make our lives easier."

Real-World Automation Power

Michael then was able to construct QuicKeys sequences that automated many of the mundane tasks performed by the editors on a daily basis, like mounting and dismounting ad and photo servers, creating headlines of various type sizes, setting tracking folders, and much, much more.

Launching a QuicKeys sequence is as easy as assigning the sequence to a hotkey, like command-d, or assigning the sequence to a customizable floating button bar that resides on-screen. Michael chose the latter, creating button bars applicable to each set of required functions. He was then able to give the QuicKeys button sets to each editor. With nothing more than a few minutes of training, editors were able to use QuicKeys and save themselves thousands of steps every day.
