

PREFACE

Crime in the United States has undergone many changes over the years. It has grown from the small booklet that was first published in 1930 to the large publication it is today. Through the years more tables have been added, and data collection has been expanded. Many law enforcement agencies have been involved in the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program's changes. As the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) has been developed in recent years, agencies across the country are changing the way they collect and report crime data, and state-level UCR programs are adopting NIBRS.

This year the FBI UCR has experienced a different kind of change. The Program is in the process of moving from its traditional residence in Washington, D.C., to its new home in Clarksburg, West Virginia. The undertaking is enormous. It involves moving a Program that has been in place for over 60 years and all that it comprises—computers, equipment, files, furniture, publications, libraries, and most of all people.

Most important is how this change affects longtime contributors to and users of the UCR Program. Hopefully, it does not and it will not affect them at all. It has been the desire of the UCR staff that while the program is experiencing an internal change, externally the change should be transparent. Contributors are still collecting and reporting data. They are still getting the assistance they need from the Program's components. Information is still being disseminated to the Program's users. In other words, in spite of the change, the Program is conducting business as usual, which speaks to the importance placed on the entire data collecting and reporting process. It speaks to the worth of the Program and the value of all contributing agencies. And it speaks to the dedication of all of the men and women who make this publication possible.

Thus while change is constantly with us, what remains unchanged is a commitment to those people and their programs that assist in reducing crime.

CRIME FACTORS

Each year when *Crime in the United States* is published, many entities—news media, tourism agencies, and other groups with an interest in crime in our Nation—compile rankings of cities and counties based on their Crime Index figures. These simplistic and/or incomplete analyses often create misleading perceptions which adversely affect cities and counties, along with their residents. Assessing criminality and law enforcement's response from jurisdiction to jurisdiction must encompass many elements, some of which, while having significant impact, are not readily measurable nor applicable pervasively among all locales. Geographic and demographic factors specific to each jurisdiction must be considered and applied if crime assessment is to approach completeness and accuracy. There are several sources of information which may assist the responsible researcher. The U.S. Bureau of the Census data, for example, can be utilized to better understand the makeup of a locale's population. The transience of the population, its racial and ethnic makeup, its composition by age and gender, education levels, and prevalent family structures are all key factors in assessing and better understanding the crime issue.

Local chambers of commerce, planning offices, or similar entities provide information regarding the economic and cultural makeup of cities and counties. Understanding a jurisdiction's industrial/economic base, its dependence upon neighboring jurisdictions, its transportation system, its economic dependence on nonresidents (such as tourists and convention attendees), its proximity to military installations, etc., all help in better gauging and interpreting the crime known to and reported by law enforcement.

The strength (personnel and other resources) and the aggressiveness of a jurisdiction's law enforcement agency are also key factors. While information pertaining to the number of sworn and civilian law enforcement employees can be found in this publication, assessment of the law enforcement emphases is, of course, much more difficult. For example, one city may report more crime than a comparable one, not because there is more crime, but rather because its law enforcement agency through proactive efforts identifies more offenses. Attitudes of the citizens toward crime and their crime reporting practices, especially concerning more minor offenses, have an impact on the volume of crimes known to police.

It is incumbent upon all data users to become as well educated as possible about how to categorize and quantify the nature and extent of crime in the United States and in any of the over 16,000 jurisdictions represented by law enforcement contributors to this Program. Valid assessments are only possible with careful study and analysis of the various unique conditions affecting each local law enforcement jurisdiction.

Historically, the causes and origins of crime have been the subjects of investigation by varied disciplines. Some factors which are known to affect the volume and type of crime occurring from place to place are:

- Population density and degree of urbanization.
- Variations in composition of the population, particularly youth concentration.
- Stability of population with respect to residents' mobility, commuting patterns, and transient factors.
- Modes of transportation and highway system.
- Economic conditions, including median income, poverty level, and job availability.
- Cultural factors and educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Family conditions with respect to divorce and family cohesiveness.
- Climate.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational).
- Citizens' attitudes toward crime.
- Crime reporting practices of the citizenry.

The Uniform Crime Reports give a nationwide view of crime based on statistics contributed by state and local law enforcement agencies. Population size is the only correlate of crime utilized in this publication. While the other factors listed above are of equal concern, no attempt is made to relate them to the data presented. *The reader is, therefore, cautioned against comparing statistical data of individual reporting units from cities, counties, metropolitan areas, states, or colleges and universities solely on the basis of their population coverage or student enrollment.*

Data users are cautioned against comparisons of crime trends presented in this report and those estimated by the National Crime Victimization Survey (NCVS), administered by the Bureau of Justice Statistics. Because of differences in methodology and crime coverage, the two programs examine the Nation's crime problem from somewhat different perspectives, and their results are not strictly comparable. The definitional and procedural differences can account for many of the apparent discrepancies in results from the two programs.

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SECTION I

Summary of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program is a nationwide, cooperative statistical effort of over 16,000 city, county, and state law enforcement agencies voluntarily reporting data on crimes brought to their attention. During 1995, law enforcement agencies active in the Program represented nearly 251 million United States inhabitants or 95 percent of the total population as established by the Bureau of the Census. The coverage amounted to 97 percent of the United States population in Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), 90 percent of the population in cities outside metropolitan areas, and 88 percent of the rural population.

Since 1930, the FBI has administered the Program and issued periodic assessments of the nature and type of crime in the Nation. While the Program's primary objective is to generate a reliable set of criminal statistics for use in law enforcement administration, operation, and management, its data have over the years become one of the country's leading social indicators. The American public looks to Uniform Crime Reports for information on fluctuations in the level of crime, while criminologists, sociologists, legislators, municipal planners, the press, and other students of criminal justice use the statistics for varied research and planning purposes.

Historical Background

Recognizing a need for national crime statistics, the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) formed the Committee on Uniform Crime Records in the 1920s to develop a system of uniform police statistics. Establishing offenses known to law enforcement as the appropriate measure, the Committee evaluated various crimes on the basis of their seriousness, frequency of occurrence, pervasiveness in all geographic areas of the country, and likelihood of being reported to law enforcement. After studying state criminal codes and making an evaluation of the recordkeeping practices in use, the Committee in 1929 completed a plan for crime reporting which became the foundation of the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program.

Seven offenses were chosen to serve as an Index for gauging fluctuations in the overall volume and rate of crime. Known collectively as the Crime Index, these offenses included the violent crimes of murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault and the property crimes of burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. By congressional mandate, arson was added as the eighth Index offense in 1979.

During the early planning of the Program, it was recognized that the differences among criminal codes precluded a mere aggregation of state statistics to arrive at a national total.

Further, because of the variances in punishment for the same offenses in different state codes, no distinction between felony and misdemeanor crimes was possible. To avoid these problems and provide nationwide uniformity in crime reporting, standardized offense definitions by which law enforcement agencies were to submit data, without regard for local statutes, were formulated. The definitions used by the Program are set forth in Appendix II of this publication.

In January 1930, 400 cities collectively representing 20 million inhabitants in 43 states began participating in the UCR Program. Congress enacted Title 28, Section 534, of the United States Code authorizing the Attorney General to gather crime information that same year. The Attorney General, in turn, designated the FBI to serve as the national clearinghouse for the data collected. Since that time, data based on uniform classifications and procedures for reporting have been obtained from the Nation's law enforcement agencies.

Advisory Groups

Providing vital links between local law enforcement and the FBI in the conduct of the UCR Program are the Criminal Justice Information Systems Committees of the IACP and the National Sheriffs' Association. The IACP, as it has since the Program began, represents the thousands of police departments nationwide. The NSA encourages sheriffs throughout the country to participate fully in the Program. Both committees serve in advisory capacities concerning the UCR Program's operation.

To function in an advisory capacity concerning UCR policy and provide suggestions on UCR data usage, a Data Providers' Advisory Policy Board (APB) was established in August 1988. The Board operated until 1993 when a new Board to address all FBI criminal justice information services was approved. The Board functions in an advisory capacity concerning UCR policy and on data collection and use. The UCR Subcommittee of the Board ensures continuing emphasis on UCR-related issues.

The Association of State Uniform Crime Reporting Programs and committees on UCR within individual state law enforcement associations are also active in promoting interest in the UCR Program. These organizations foster widespread and more intelligent use of uniform crime statistics and lend assistance to contributors when the needs arise.

Redesign of UCR

While throughout the years the UCR Program remained virtually unchanged in terms of the data collected and

disseminated, a broad utility had evolved for UCR by the 1980s. Recognizing the need for improved statistics, law enforcement called for a thorough evaluative study that would modernize the UCR Program. The FBI fully concurred with the need for an updated Program and lent its complete support, formulating a comprehensive three-phase redesign effort. The Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), the Department of Justice agency responsible for funding criminal justice information projects, agreed to underwrite the first two phases. Conducted by an independent contractor, these phases were structured to determine what, if any, changes should be made to the current Program. The third phase would involve implementation of the changes identified. Abt Associates Inc. of Cambridge, Massachusetts, overseen by the FBI, BJS, and a Steering Committee comprised of prestigious individuals representing a myriad of disciplines, commenced the first phase in 1982.

During the first phase, the historical evolution of the UCR Program was examined. All aspects of the Program, including the objectives and intended user audience, data items, reporting mechanisms, quality control, publications and user services, and relationships with other criminal justice data systems, were studied.

Early in 1984, a conference on the future of UCR, held in Elkridge, Maryland, launched the second phase of the study, which would examine potential futures for UCR and conclude with a set of recommended changes. Attendees at this conference reviewed work conducted during the first phase and discussed the potential changes that should be considered during phase two.

Findings from the evaluation's first phase and input on alternatives for the future were also major topics of discussion at the seventh National UCR Conference in July 1984. Overlapping phases one and two was a survey of law enforcement agencies.

Phase two ended in early 1985 with the production of a draft "Blueprint for the Future of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program." The study's Steering Committee reviewed the draft report at a March 1985, meeting and made various recommendations for revision. The Committee members, however, endorsed the report's concepts.

In April 1985, the phase two recommendations were presented at the eighth National UCR Conference. While various considerations for the final report were set forth, the overall concept for the revised Program was unanimously approved. The joint IACP/NSA Committee on UCR also issued a resolution endorsing the Blueprint.

The final report, the "Blueprint for the Future of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program," was released in the summer of 1985. It specifically outlined recommendations for an expanded, improved UCR Program to meet informational needs into the next century. There were three recommended areas of enhancement to the UCR Program. First, reporting of offenses and arrests would be made by means of an incident-based system. Second, collection of data would be accomplished on two levels. Agencies in level one would report important details about those offenses comprising the current Crime Index, their victims, and arrestees. Law enforcement agencies covering

populations of over 100,000 and a sampling of smaller agencies would be included in level two, which would collect expanded detail on all significant offenses. The third proposal involved introducing a quality assurance program.

To begin implementation, the FBI awarded a contract to develop new offense definitions and data elements for the redesigned system. The work involved: (a) revision of the definitions of certain Index offenses; (b) identification of additional significant offenses to be reported; (c) refining definitions for both; and (d) development of data elements (incident details) for all UCR offenses in order to fulfill the requirements of incident-based reporting versus the current summary reporting.

Concurrent with the preparation of the data elements, the FBI studied the various state systems to select an experimental site for implementation of the redesigned Program. In view of its long-standing incident-based Program and well-established staff dedicated solely to UCR, the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division (SLED) was chosen. The SLED agreed to adapt its existing system to meet the requirements of the redesigned Program and collect data on both offenses and arrests relating to the newly defined offenses.

To assist SLED with the pilot project, offense definitions and data elements developed under the private contract were put at the staff's disposal. Also, FBI automated data processing personnel developed "Automated Data Capture Specifications" for use in adapting the state's data processing procedures to incorporate the revised system. The BJS supplied funding to facilitate software revisions needed at the state level. Testing of the new Program was completed in late 1987.

Following the completion of the pilot project conducted by SLED, the FBI produced a draft set of guidelines for an enhanced UCR Program. Law enforcement executives from around the country were then invited to a conference in Orange Beach, Alabama, where the guidelines were presented for final review.

During the conference, three overall endorsements were passed without dissent. First, that there be established a new, incident-based national crime reporting system; second, that the FBI manage this Program; and third, that an Advisory Policy Board composed of law enforcement executives be formed to assist in the direction and implementation of the new Program.

Information about the redesigned UCR Program, called the National Incident-Based Reporting System, or NIBRS, is contained in four documents produced subsequent to the Orange Beach Conference. Volume 1, *Data Collection Guidelines*, contains a system overview and descriptions of the offenses, offense codes, reports, data elements, and data values used in the system. Volume 2, *Data Submission Specifications*, is for the use of state and local systems personnel who are responsible for preparing magnetic tapes/floppy disks/etc., for submission to the FBI. Volume 3, *Approaches to Implementing an Incident-Based Reporting (IBR) System*, is for use by computer programmers, analysts, etc., responsible for developing a state or local IBR system which will meet NIBRS' reporting requirements. Volume 4, *Error Message Manual*, contains designations of mandatory and optional data elements, data element edits, and error messages.

A NIBRS edition of the *UCR Handbook* has been produced to assist law enforcement agency data contributors implementing NIBRS within their departments. This document is geared toward familiarizing local and state law enforcement personnel with the definitions, policies, and procedures of NIBRS. It does not contain the technical coding and data transmission requirements presented in Volumes 1 through 4.

NIBRS will collect data on each single incident and arrest within 22 crime categories. For each offense known to police within these categories, incident, victim, property, offender, and arrestee information will be gathered when available. The goal of the redesign is to modernize crime information by collecting data presently maintained in law enforcement records; the enhanced UCR Program is, therefore, a by-product of current records systems. The integrity of UCR's long-running statistical series will, of course, be maintained.

It became apparent during the development of the prototype system that the level one and level two reporting proposed in the "Blueprint" may not be the most practical approach. Many state and local law enforcement administrators indicated that the collection of data on all pertinent offenses could be handled with more ease than could the extraction of selected ones. While "Limited" participation, equivalent to the "Blueprint's" level one, will remain an option, it appears that most reporting jurisdictions, upon implementation, will go immediately to "Full" participation, meeting all NIBRS data submission requirements.

Implementing NIBRS will be at a pace commensurate with the resources, abilities, and limitations of the contributing law enforcement agencies. The FBI was able to accept NIBRS data as of January 1989, and 10 state-level UCR Programs (Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Massachusetts, Michigan, North Dakota, South Carolina, Utah, Vermont, and Virginia) are now supplying data in the NIBRS format. An additional 22 state agencies, 3 local law enforcement agencies in states not having state-level programs, and 3 federal agencies (the Departments of Commerce and Defense-Air Force and the FBI) have submitted test tapes or disks containing the expanded data. Eleven other state

agencies, agencies in the District of Columbia and Guam, and other federal agencies are in various stages of planning and development.

Recent Developments

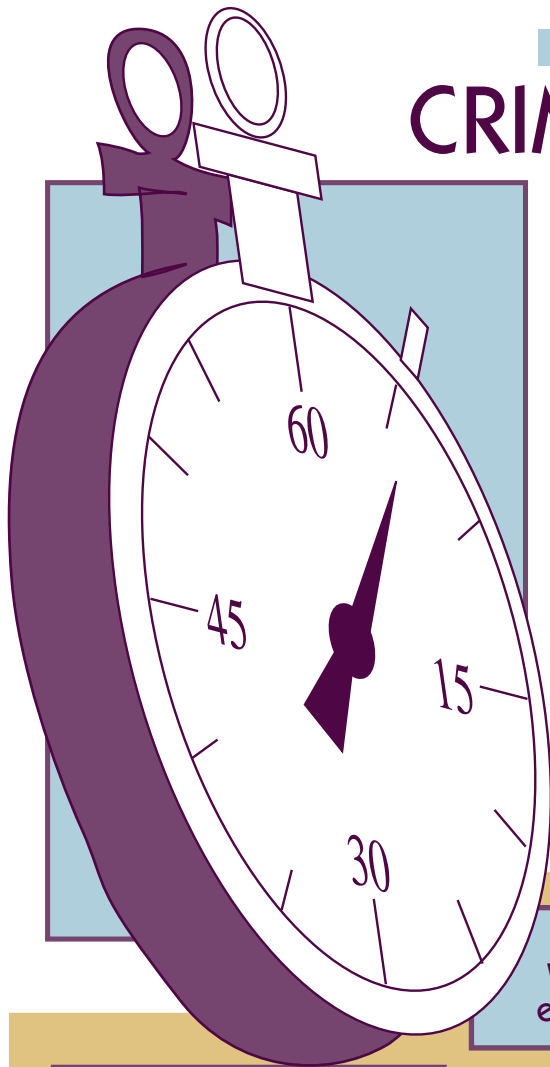
HATE CRIME STATISTICS — To comply with The Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 (Crime Act), Public Law 103-322, enacted September 13, 1994, the UCR Program, beginning January 1, 1997, will add to its hate crime data collection crimes motivated by bias against persons with disabilities. In the Hate Crime Statistics Act of 1990, the types of bias to be reported were limited to those based on "race, religion, sexual orientation, or ethnicity." The Crime Act amended the earlier legislation to include disabilities as a factor to be considered in bias-motivated crimes. In UCR, disability bias is defined as: A preformed negative opinion of or attitude toward a group of persons based on their physical or mental impairments/challenges, whether such disability is temporary or permanent, congenital, or acquired by heredity, accident, injury, advanced age, or illness.

UCR RELOCATION—The UCR Program has undergone many changes over the past 60 plus years, but perhaps the most dramatic change is the one it is experiencing this year. The Program is in the final stages of moving from its traditional residence in Washington, D.C., to its new home in Clarksburg, West Virginia. This enormous undertaking involves moving computers, equipment, files, furniture, publications, and libraries—many years' accumulation of resources. The Crime Clock should be viewed with care. Being the most aggregate representation of UCR data, it is designed to convey the annual reported crime experience by showing the relative frequency of occurrence of the Index Offenses. This mode of display should not be taken to imply a regularity in the commission of the Part I Offenses; rather, it represents the annual ratio of crime to fixed time intervals.

SECTION II

Crime Index Offenses Reported

CRIME INDEX TOTAL

DEFINITION

The Crime Index is composed of selected offenses used to gauge fluctuations in the overall volume and rate of crime reported to law enforcement. The offenses included are the violent crimes of murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault and the property crimes of burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson.

The Crime Index total, 13.9 million offenses in 1995, was the lowest serious crime count since 1987. The 1-percent decline in the total, 1995 versus 1994, was the fourth consecutive annual decline. Among the Nation's cities collectively, the Index decreased 2 percent, with the greatest decrease, 6 percent, reported in cities having a million or more inhabitants. Similar to the national experience, the suburban counties recorded a 1-percent decrease, but rural county law enforcement agencies registered a 4-percent rise.

Five- and 10-year percent changes showed the 1995 national total was 7 percent lower than the 1991 level but 5 percent higher than the 1986 total.

Geographically, the largest volume of Crime Index offenses was reported in the most populous Southern States, which accounted for 38 percent of the total. Following were the Western States with 25 percent, the Midwestern States with 21 percent, and the Northeastern States with 16 percent. All regions except the west showed Crime Index decreases during 1995 as compared to 1994 figures. (See Tables 3 and 4.)

As in previous years, Crime Index offenses occurred most frequently in August and least often in February.

Regionally, the Crime Index rates ranged from 6,083 in the West to 4,180 in the Northeast. Two-year percent changes (1995 versus 1994) showed rate declines in all regions. (See Table 4.)

Nature

The Crime Index is composed of violent and property crime categories, and in 1995, 13 percent of the Index offenses reported to law enforcement were violent crimes and 87 percent, property crimes. Larceny-theft was the offense with the highest volume, while murder accounted for the fewest offenses. (See Chart 2.3.)

Property estimated in value at \$15.6 billion was stolen in connection with all Crime Index offenses, with the greatest losses due to thefts of motor vehicles; jewelry and precious metals; and televisions, radios, stereos, etc. Law enforcement agencies nationwide recorded a 35-percent recovery rate for dollar losses in connection with stolen property. The highest recovery percentages were for stolen motor vehicles, consumable goods, clothing and furs, livestock, and firearms. (See Table 24.)

Law Enforcement Response

Law enforcement agencies nationwide recorded a 21-percent clearance rate for the collective Crime Index offenses in 1995 and made an estimated 2.9 million arrests for Index crimes. Crimes can be cleared by arrest or by exceptional means when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes the placing of formal charges against the offender. The arrest of one person may clear several crimes, or several persons may be arrested in connection with the clearance of one offense.

The Index clearance rate has remained relatively stable throughout the past 10-year period. As in 1995, the clearance rates in both 1991 and 1986 were 21 percent.

The number of persons arrested for Index crimes decreased 1 percent in 1995 when compared to 1994. Juvenile arrests for Index crimes decreased 2 percent, while those of adults showed virtually no change. By gender, arrests of males decreased 2 percent, but arrests of females increased 2 percent for the 2-year period. (See Tables 36 and 37.)

Between 1994 and 1995, the number of persons arrested for the individual offenses composing the Index decreased for murder and motor vehicle theft, 6 percent; forcible rape, 5 percent; burglary, 4 percent; arson, 3 percent; and robbery, 2 percent. The number of larceny-theft arrests showed virtually no change, while those for aggravated assault increased 1 percent during the same 2-year period.

As in previous years, larceny-theft arrests accounted for the highest volume of Crime Index arrests at 1.5 million. (See Table 29.)

Rate

Crime rates relate the incidence of crime to population. In 1995, there were an estimated 5,278 Crime Index offenses for each 100,000 in United States population, the lowest rate since 1985. The Crime Index rate was highest in the Nation's metropolitan areas and lowest in the rural counties. (See Tables 1 and 2.) The national 1995 Crime Index rate fell 2 percent from the 1994 rate, 11 percent from the 1991 level, and 4 percent from the 1986 rate.

PERCENT CHANGE FROM 1991

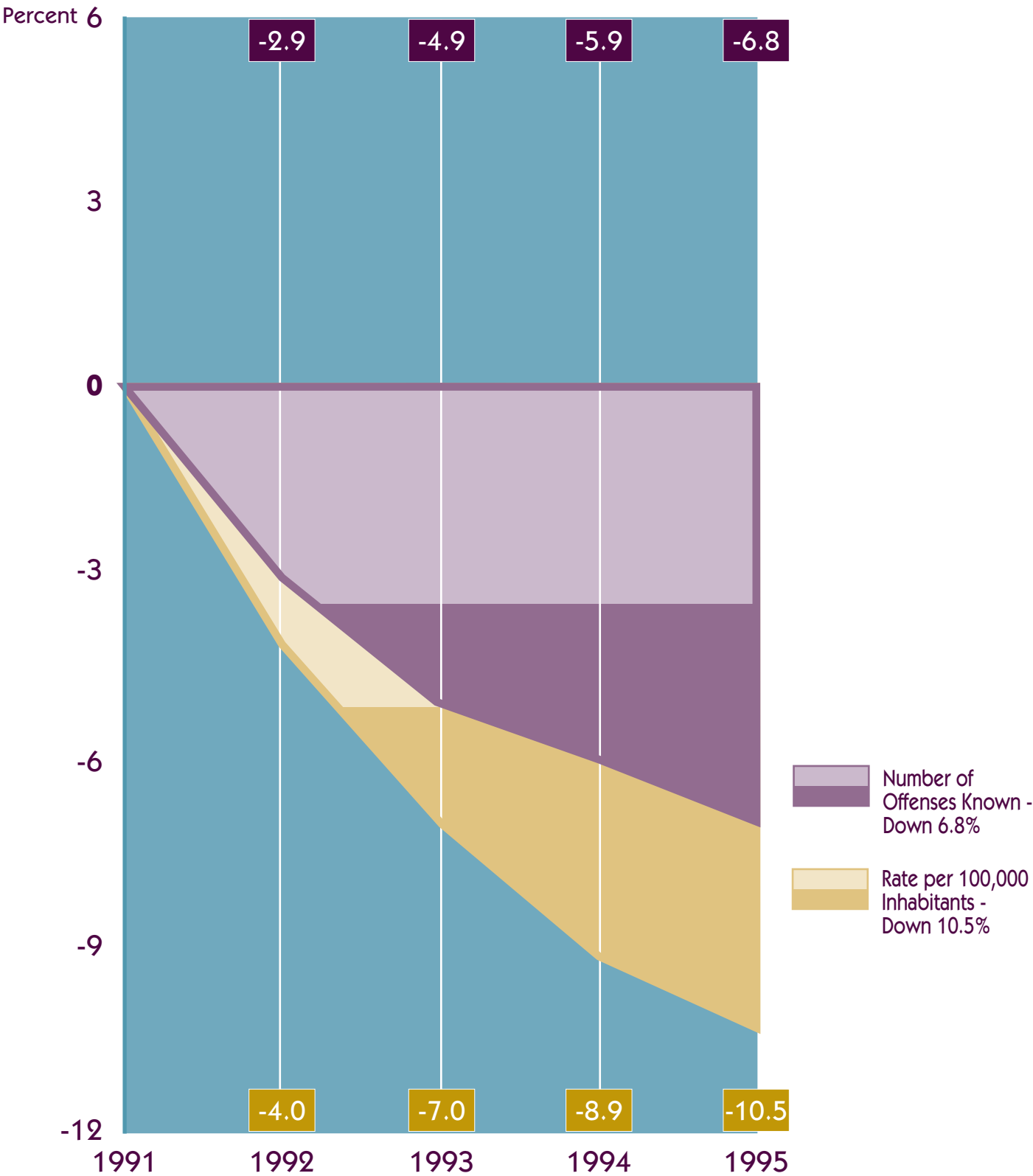

Percent Distribution

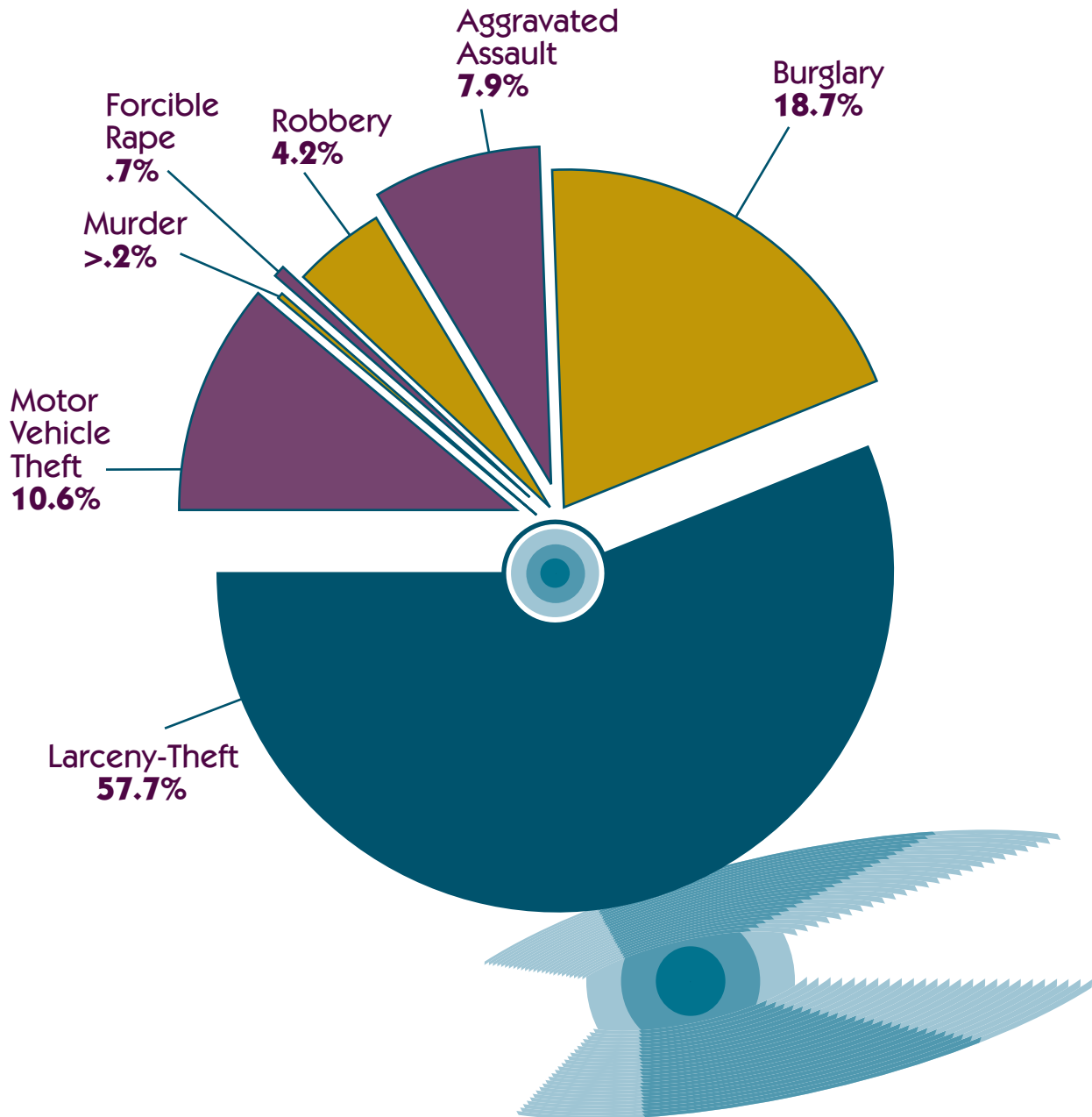
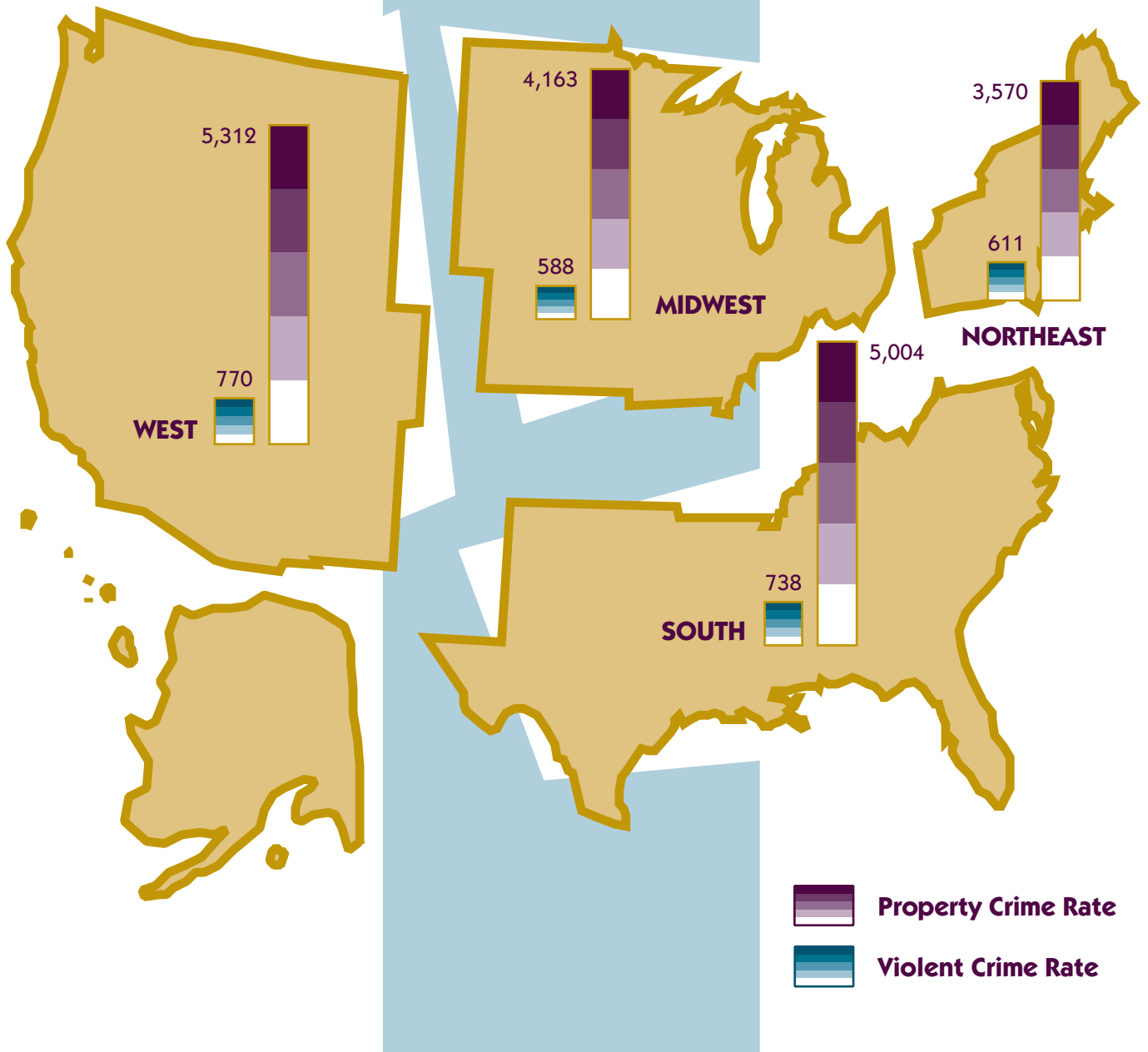

DEFINITION

Violent crime is composed of four offenses: murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. All violent crimes involve force or threat of force.

The number of violent crimes reported to law enforcement during 1995 was estimated at 1.8 million offenses, showing a decrease of 3 percent from 1994. The 1995 estimated total was 6 percent below the 1991 level, but 21 percent above that of 1986. From 1994 to 1995, the Nation's cities collectively recorded a 5-percent decrease in violent crime, and the suburban counties experienced a 2-percent drop. An increase of 4 percent was reported in the rural counties.

Regionally, the South, the most populous region, accounted for 38 percent of all violent crimes reported to law enforcement in 1995. Lesser volumes of 25 percent for the West, 20 percent for the Midwest, and 17 percent for the Northeast were recorded. All four regions experienced decreases in the number of violent crimes reported from 1994 to 1995. The Northeast registered an 8-percent decline; the West, 3 percent; the South, 2 percent; and the Midwest, 1 percent. (See Table 4.)

Violent crimes occurred most frequently in August. The lowest total was experienced in the month of February.

Rate

A violent crime rate of 685 per 100,000 inhabitants was registered nationally in 1995, the lowest rate since 1989. Two- and 5-year trends showed the 1995 rate was 4 percent lower than in 1994 and 10 percent below the 1991 rate. It was, however, 11 percent above the 1986 figure. The Nation's metropolitan areas collectively registered 774 offenses per 100,000 population, the highest violent crime rate. The rate in cities outside metropolitan areas was 483, and for rural counties, it was 234.

Geographically, the violent crime rates ranged from 770 per 100,000 inhabitants of the Western States to 588 per 100,000 inhabitants of the Midwestern States. All regions registered rate declines: the Northeast, 8 percent; the West, 4 percent; the South, 3 percent; and the Midwest, 2 percent. (See Table 4.)

Nature

Aggravated assaults accounted for 61 percent of the violent crimes reported to law enforcement during 1995. Robberies comprised 32 percent; forcible rapes, 5 percent; and murders, 1 percent.

While data concerning weapons used in connection with forcible rape are not collected, firearms were the weapons used in 30 percent of all murders, robberies, and aggravated assaults, collectively, in 1995. Knives or cutting instruments were used in 15 percent; other dangerous weapons in 24 percent; and personal weapons (hands, fists, feet, etc.) in 31 percent. The proportion of violent crimes committed with firearms has remained relatively constant in recent years. During the past 5 years, the proportions ranged from 31 percent in 1991 to 30 percent in 1995. Historically, the 1990s have become the decade most prone to firearm use for violent crime. (Refer to Section V, Weapons Used in Violent Crime.)

Law Enforcement Response

The overall violent crime clearance rate was 45 percent in 1995. Among the violent offenses, the 1995 clearance rates ranged from 65 percent for murder to 25 percent for robbery. Over half of all forcible rapes and aggravated assaults were cleared.

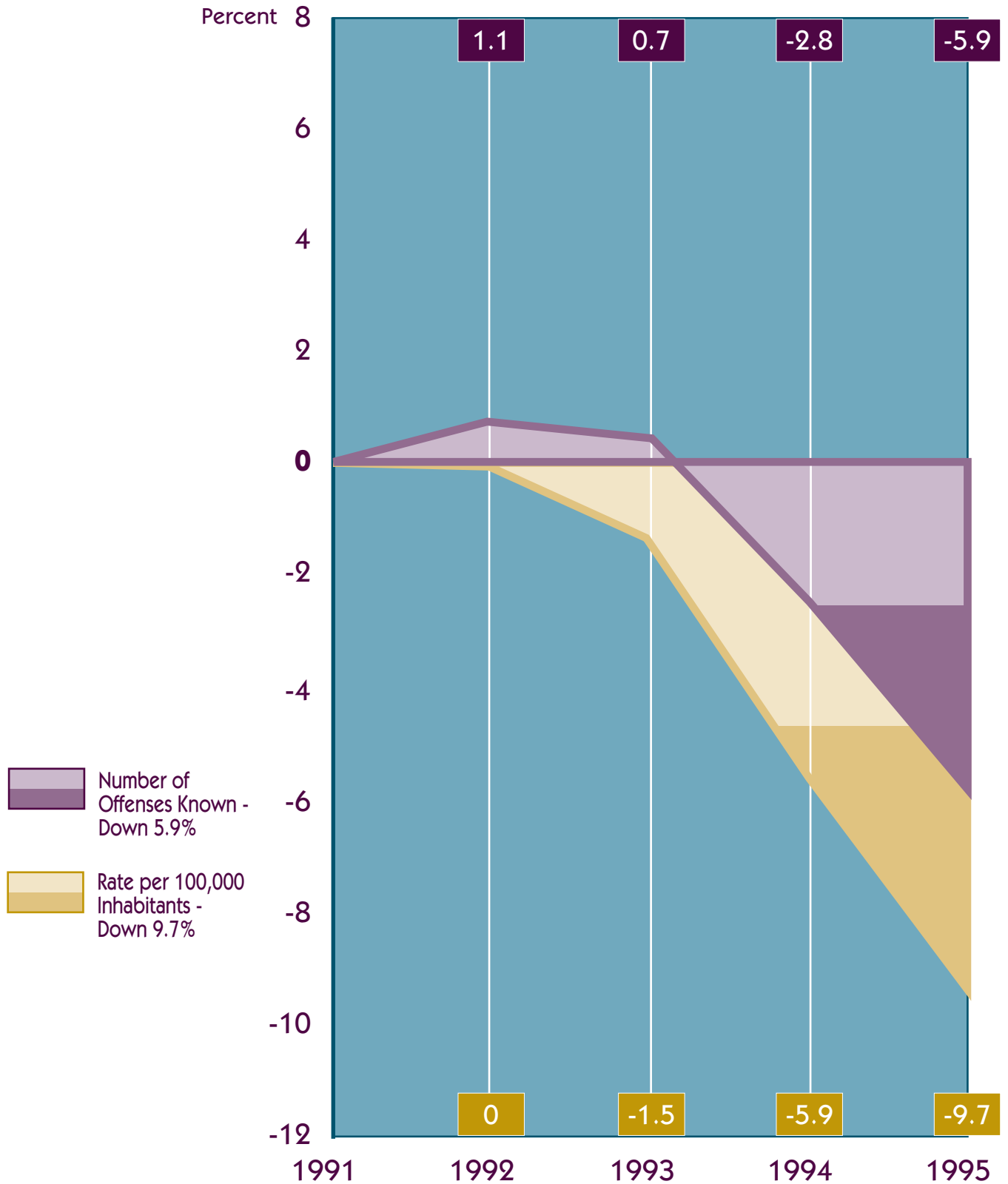
There were an estimated 796,250 persons arrested for violent crimes in 1995. Violent crime arrests accounted for 5 percent of the arrests for all offenses and 27 percent of those for Index crimes. Males made up 85 percent of all violent crime arrestees; whites, 54 percent; and adults, 81 percent. (See Tables 38, 42, and 43.)

The total number of arrests for violent crimes showed virtually no change from 1994 to 1995. Juvenile arrests (under age 18) decreased 3 percent, while adult arrests increased 1 percent. Overall violent crime arrests declined 1 percent in the Nation's cities, while a 3-percent rise was recorded in suburban counties. Like the Nation, the rural counties showed virtually no change from 1994 to 1995. (See Section IV, Persons Arrested.)

MURDER AND NONNEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER

DEFINITION

Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, as defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, is the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another.

The classification of this offense, as for all other Crime Index offenses, is based solely on police investigation as opposed to the determination of a court, medical examiner, coroner, jury, or other judicial body. Not included in the count for this offense classification are deaths caused by negligence, suicide, or accident; justifiable homicides; and attempts to murder or assaults to murder, which are scored as aggravated assaults.

The number of persons murdered in 1995 was estimated at 21,597, down 7 percent from the 1994 count and 13 percent below the 1991 total. The 1995 total was, however, 5 percent above the 1986 level. (See Table 1.)

The murder volumes decreased 9 percent in suburban counties and 8 percent in the Nation's cities in 1995 from the 1994 level. The greatest decrease—14 percent—was registered in cities with populations of 50,000 to 99,999. In the rural counties, murder increased 2 percent for the 2-year period.

When viewing the four regions of the Nation, the Southern States, the most populous region, accounted for 42 percent of the murders. The Western States reported 24 percent; the Midwestern States, 20 percent; and the Northeastern States, 15 percent. All the regions showed declines in the number of murders reported from 1994 to 1995. The greatest drop was in the Northeast, 13 percent. Decreases in the remaining regions were 8 percent in the Midwest, 7 percent in the South, and 3 percent in the West. (See Tables 3 and 4.)

Monthly figures showed that the greatest number of murders occurred in the month of August in 1995, while the fewest occurred in February. (See Table 2.3.)

Rate

Down 9 percent from 1994, the national murder rate in 1995 was 8 per 100,000 inhabitants, the lowest rate since 1985. Five- and 10-year trends showed the 1995 rate was 16 percent lower than in 1991 and 5 percent below the 1986 rate.

On a regional basis, the South averaged 10 murders for every 100,000 people; the West, 9 per 100,000; the Midwest, 7 per 100,000; and the Northeast, 6 per 100,000. Compared to 1994, murder rates in 1995 declined in all of the four geographic regions, with the Northeast experiencing the greatest change, a

decrease of 13 percent, and the West, the smallest, a 4-percent drop. (See Table 4.)

The Nation's metropolitan areas reported a 1995 murder rate of 9 victims per 100,000 inhabitants. In the rural counties and in cities outside metropolitan areas, the rate was 5 per 100,000.

Nature

Supplemental data were provided by contributing agencies for 20,043 of the estimated 21,597 murders in 1995. Submitted monthly, the data consist of the age, sex, and race of both victims and offenders; the types of weapons used; the relationships of victims to the offenders; and the circumstances surrounding the murders.

Based on this information, 77 percent of the murder victims in 1995 were males; and 88 percent were persons 18 years of age or older. Forty-five percent were aged 20 through 34. Considering victims for whom race was known, 49 percent were black, 48 percent were white, and the remainder were persons of other races.

Supplemental data were also reported for 22,434 murder offenders in 1995. Of those for whom sex and age were reported, 91 percent of the offenders were males, and 85 percent were persons 18 years of age or older. Sixty-eight percent were aged 17 through 34. Of offenders for whom race was known, 53 percent were black, 45 percent were white, and the remainder were persons of other races.

Murder is most frequently intraracial among victims and offenders. In 1995, data based on incidents involving one victim and one offender showed that 94 percent of the black murder victims were slain by black offenders, and 84 percent of the white murder victims were killed by white offenders. Likewise, males were most often slain by males (89 percent in single victim/single offender situations). These same data showed, however, that 9 of every 10 female victims were murdered by males.

PERCENT CHANGE FROM 1991

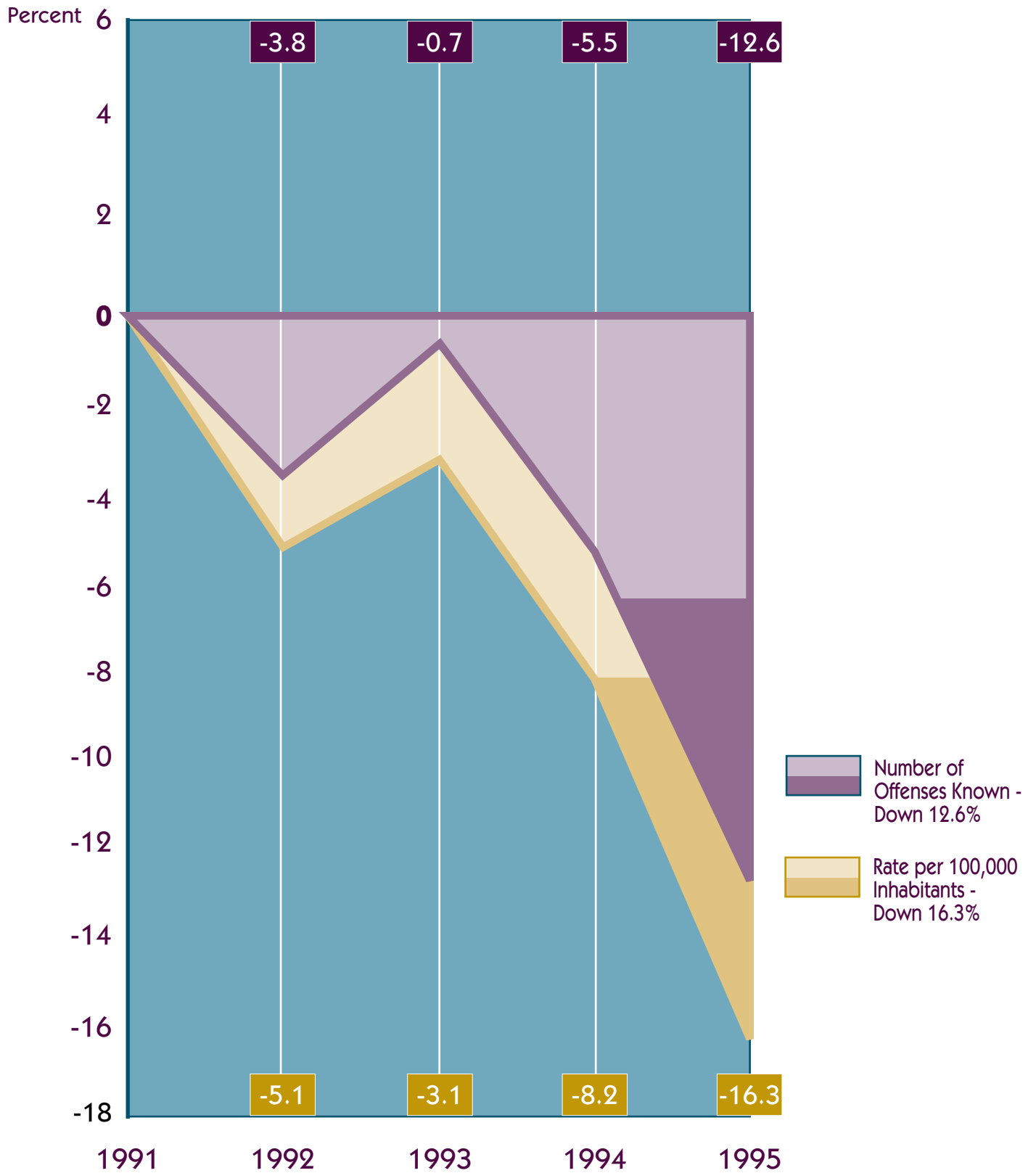

As in previous years, firearms were the weapons used in approximately 7 of every 10 murders committed in the Nation. Of those murders for which weapons were reported, 59 percent were by handguns, 5 percent by shotguns, and 3 percent by rifles. Other or unknown types of firearms accounted for another 5 percent of the total murders. Among the remaining weapons, knives or cutting instruments were employed in 13 percent of the murders; personal weapons (hands, fists, feet, etc.) in 6 percent; blunt objects (clubs, hammers, etc.) in 5 percent; and other dangerous weapons, such as poison, explosives, etc., in the remainder. (See Table 2.13.) A state-by-state breakdown of weapons used in connection with murder is shown in Table 20.

Historical statistics on relationships of victims to offenders showed that the majority of murder victims knew their killers. During the 1990s, however, the relationship percentages have changed; in 1995, 15 percent of victims were killed by strangers, and 39 percent of victims were killed by persons whose relationships were unknown, for a collective total of 55 percent. Less than half of murder victims in 1995 were related to or acquainted with their assailants, 11 and 34 percent, respectively. Among all female murder victims in 1995, 26 percent

were slain by husbands or boyfriends. Three percent of the male victims were killed by wives or girlfriends.

Considering circumstances, arguments resulted in 28 percent of the murders during the year. Eighteen percent occurred as a result of felonious activities such as robbery, arson, etc., while another 1 percent were suspected to have been the result of some felonious activity. Six percent were juvenile gang killings, which were up 38 percent in volume over the past 5 years. Table 2.14 shows murder circumstances for the same timeframe.

Law Enforcement Response

The 1995 clearance rate for murder, 65 percent for law enforcement agencies nationwide, is higher than for any other Crime Index offense. Eighty percent of murders in rural counties, 66 percent of those in suburban counties, and 63 percent in the Nation's cities were cleared. Among the city population groups, those with populations under 25,000 reported the most successful clearance rate, 81 percent. (See Table 25.)

Regionally, the highest murder clearance rates were registered in the South and the Midwest, each with 70 percent. Following were the Northeastern States with 59 percent and the Western States with 58 percent.

The proportion of juvenile involvement, as measured by clearances, was lower for murder than for any other Index crime. Persons under 18 years of age accounted for 9 percent of the willful killings cleared by law enforcement nationally in 1995. Only persons in this young age group also accounted for 9 percent of clearances in the Nation's cities and suburban counties. They accounted for 7 percent of the rural county clearances.

Law enforcement agencies made an estimated 21,230 arrests for murder in 1995. Fifty-six percent of the arrestees in 1995 were under 25 years of age, with the 18- to 24-year age group accounting for 41 percent of the total. (See Table 38.)

Ninety-one percent of those arrested for murder in 1995 were males and 9 percent, females. Blacks comprised 54 percent of the total; whites, 43 percent; and the remainder, other races.

The 1995 murder arrest total was 6 percent lower than the 1994 count. During the 2-year period, arrests of adults decreased 4 percent and those of juveniles dropped 14 percent. Arrests of females for murder were down 11 percent, and those of males, down 6 percent.

Long-term trends indicate the 1995 murder arrest total was 15 percent below the 1991 level but 8 percent higher than the 1986 figure.

Justifiable Homicide

Certain willful killings are classified as justifiable or excusable, based on law enforcement investigation. In Uniform

Crime Reporting, justifiable homicide is defined as and limited to the killing of a felon by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty, or the killing by a private citizen of a felon during the commission of a felony. These offenses are tabulated independently and are not included in the murder counts.

In 1995, the total number of justifiable homicides decreased 20 percent. The justifiable homicide total was 651 in 1995 and 815 in 1994. Compared to the 1991 count of 698, the 1995 total was down 7 percent. Of justifiable homicides in 1995, 383 involved law enforcement officers and 268 were by private citizens. Data on weapons showed that handguns were the weapons used most often in justifiable homicides. (See Tables 2.16 and 2.17.)

FORCIBLE RAPE

DEFINITION

Forcible rape, as defined in the Program, is the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Assaults or attempts to commit rape by force or threat of force are also included; however, statutory rape (without force) and other sex offenses are excluded.

The 97,464 forcible rapes reported to law enforcement agencies across the Nation during 1995 represented the lowest total since 1989. The 1995 count was 5 percent lower than in 1994, 9 percent below the 1991 level, but 7 percent higher than the 1986 volume.

Geographically, 39 percent of the forcible rape total in 1995 was accounted for by the most populous Southern States, 25 percent by the Midwestern States, 23 percent by the Western States, and 13 percent by the Northeastern States. Two-year trends showed that forcible rapes declined in all regions. The Northeast and Midwest each registered decreases of 6 percent; the South, 5 percent; and the West, 2 percent. (See Tables 3 and 4.)

Monthly totals show the lowest rape volume occurred in December, while the most forcible rapes were reported during August. (See Table 2.18.)

Rate

By Uniform Crime Reporting definition, the victims of forcible rape are always female, and in 1995, an estimated 72 of every 100,000 females in the country were reported rape victims. The 1995 female forcible rape rate was 6 percent lower than the 1994 rate and 13 percent lower than the 1991 rate.

The highest rate in 1995 was recorded in the Nation's metropolitan areas where it was 76 victims per 100,000 females. In cities outside metropolitan areas, the rate was 73 per 100,000 females, and in rural counties, it was 49 per 100,000 females. Although metropolitan areas record the highest rape rates, they have shown the only rate decline over the past 10 years (1986–1995), 10 percent. During this same time, the rate increased in cities outside metropolitan areas by 70 percent and in rural counties by 40 percent.

Geographically, in 1995, the highest female rape rate was in the Southern States, which recorded 80 victims per 100,000 females. The Midwestern States followed closely with a rate

of 78; the Western States registered 75; and the Northeastern States, 49. For the 2-year period, 1994 and 1995, the changes in the forcible rape rates ranged from a decline of 7 percent in the Midwest to a 4-percent decrease in the West.

Over the last 10 years, regional increases in the female forcible rape rate were 13 percent in the Midwest and 1 percent in the South. Forcible rape rate decreases were reported in the Northeast and West, 11 and 13 percent, respectively, for the same timeframe.

Nature

Rapes by force constitute the greatest percentage of total forcible rapes, 87 percent of the 1995 incidents. The remainder were attempts or assaults to commit forcible rape. The number of rapes by force decreased 5 percent in 1995 from the 1994 volume, and attempts to rape decreased 6 percent.

As for all other Crime Index offenses, complaints of forcible rape made to law enforcement agencies are sometimes found to be false or baseless. In such cases, law enforcement agencies “unfound” the offenses and exclude them from crime counts. The “unfounded” rate, or percentage of complaints determined through investigation to be false, is higher for forcible rape than for any other Index crime. In 1995, 8 percent of forcible rape complaints were “unfounded,” while the average for all Index crimes was 2 percent.

Law Enforcement Response

In 1995, over half of the forcible rapes reported to law enforcement nationwide and in cities were cleared by arrest or exceptional means. Rural and suburban county law enforcement clearance rates, each at 52 percent, were slightly higher than the cities' rate, 51 percent. (See Table 25.)

Geographically, forcible rape clearance rates in 1995 were 46 percent in the West, 49 percent in the Midwest, 50 percent in the Northeast, and 56 percent in the South. (See Table 26.)

Of the total clearances for forcible rape in the country as a whole, 15 percent involved only persons under 18 years of age. The percentage of juvenile involvement varied by community type, ranging from 13 percent in the Nation's cities to 22 percent in suburban counties. (See Table 28.)

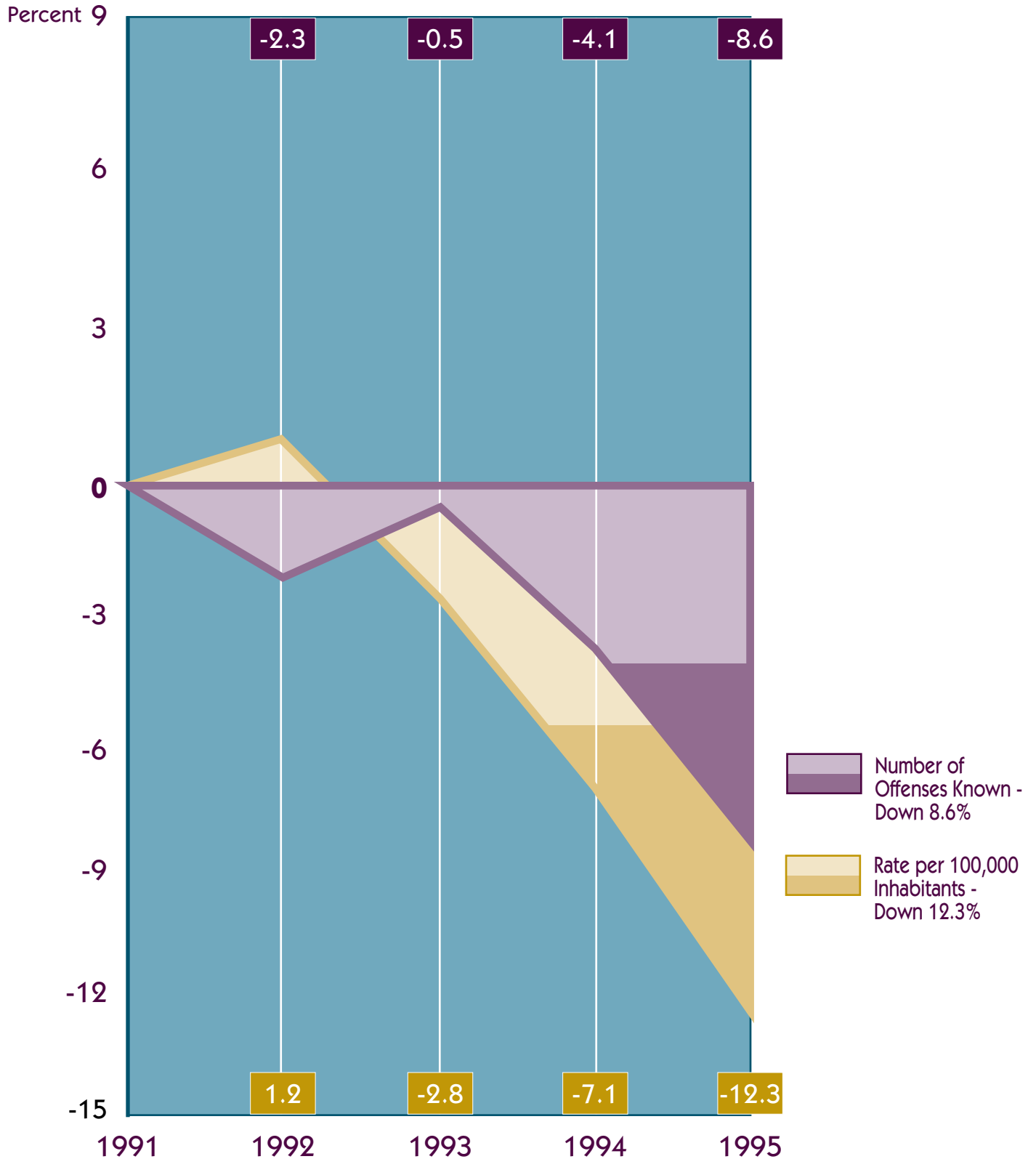
Law enforcement agencies nationwide made an estimated 34,650 arrests for forcible rape in 1995. Of the forcible rape arrestees, about 4 of every 10 were under age 25. Over half of those arrested were white. (See Tables 29, 41, and 43.)

The number of arrests for forcible rape declined 5 percent nationwide from 1994 to 1995. Arrests fell 4 percent in the Nation's cities, 6 percent in the suburban counties, and 14 percent in the rural counties. (See Tables 36, 44, 50, and 56.)

ROBBERY

DEFINITION

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

The 1995 estimated robbery total, 580,545, was the lowest since 1989. Nationally, the 1995 robbery volume was down 6 percent from the 1994 total. In the Nation's cities, robberies decreased 7 percent. The largest decline—12 percent—was experienced in cities with a million or more inhabitants. During the same period, the robbery volume dropped 3 percent in the suburban counties but increased 1 percent in the rural counties. (See Table 12.)

Regionally, the Southern States, the most populous region, accounted for 34 percent of all reported robberies. The Western States followed with 24 percent, the Northeastern States with 23 percent, and the Midwestern States with 19 percent. (See Table 3.) Two-year trends show the number of robberies in 1995 was down in all regions as compared to 1994. The declines ranged from 11 percent in the Northeast to 3 percent in the South.

Chart 2.8 depicts the national trend in the robbery volume, as well as the robbery rate, for the years 1991–1995. In 1995, the number of robbery offenses was 16 percent lower than in 1991 but 7 percent higher than in 1986.

Monthly volume figures for 1995 show robberies occurred most frequently in October and least often in February.

Rate

The national robbery rate in 1995 was 221 per 100,000 people, 7 percent lower than in 1994. In metropolitan areas, the 1995 rate was 268; in cities outside metropolitan areas, it

was 72; and in the rural areas, it was 17. With 768 robberies per 100,000 inhabitants, the highest rate was recorded in cities with populations 1 million and over. (See Table 16.)

Robbery rates per 100,000 inhabitants declined in all regions from 1994 to 1995. The rates of 260 in the Northeast and 242 in the West were down 11 and 6 percent, respectively. The South's rate of 212 was 4 percent lower; and the Midwest's rate of 182 was down 9 percent. (See Table 4.)

Nature

Losses estimated at \$507 million were attributed to robberies during 1995. The value of property stolen averaged \$873 per robbery, up from \$801 in 1994. Average dollar losses in 1995 ranged from \$400 taken during robberies of convenience stores to \$4,015 per bank robbery. (See Table 23.) The impact of this violent crime on its victims cannot be measured in terms of monetary loss alone. While the object of a robbery is to obtain money or property, the crime always involves force or threat of force, and many victims suffer serious personal injury.

Robberies on streets or highways accounted for more than half (54 percent) of the offenses in this category during 1995. Robberies of commercial and financial establishments accounted for 21 percent, and those occurring at residences, 11 percent. The remainder were miscellaneous types. All robbery types declined in 1995 as compared to 1994 totals. The decreases ranged from 10 percent for convenience store robberies to 4 percent for those of gas or service stations. (See Table 23.)

PERCENT CHANGE FROM 1991

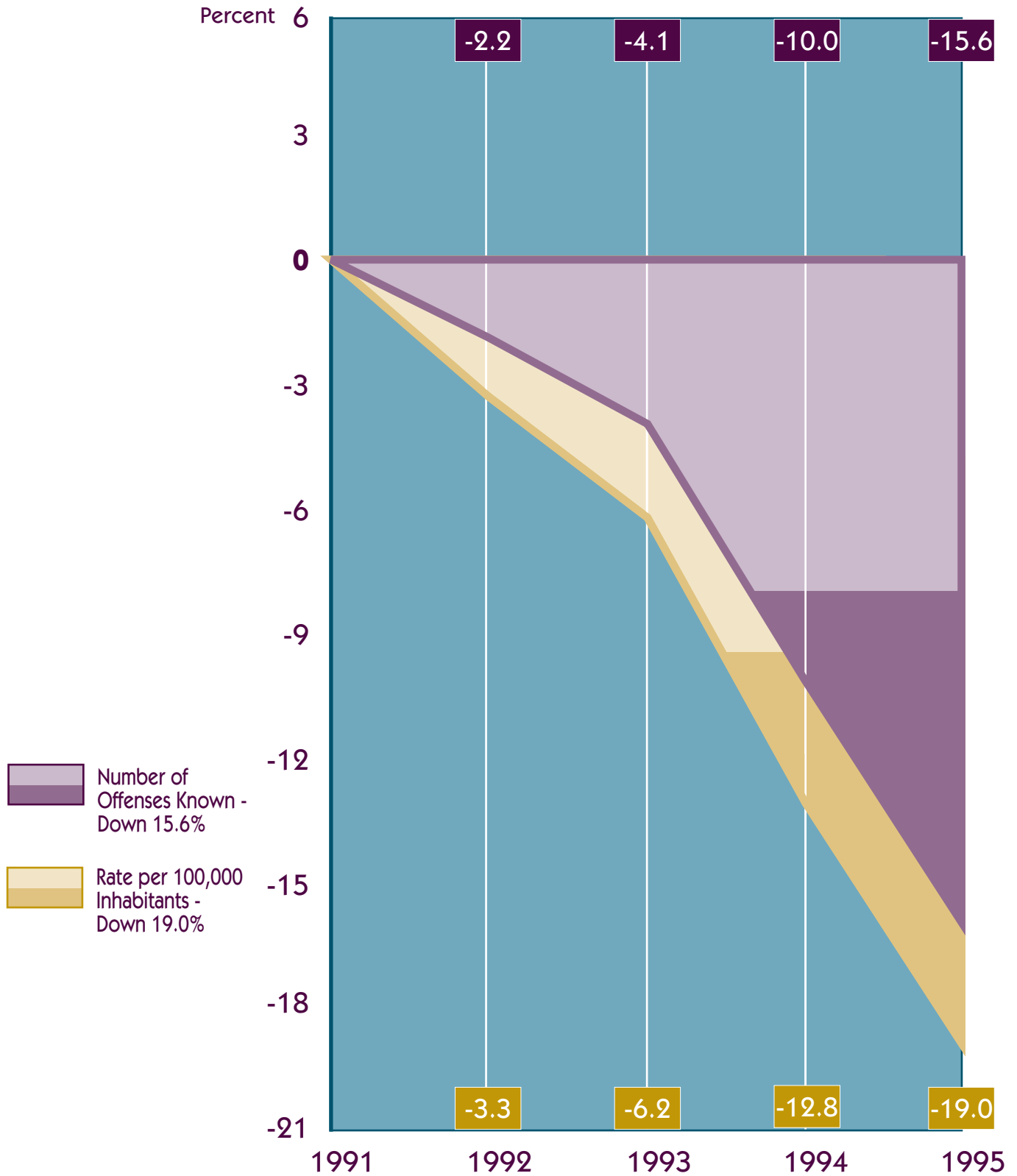

Firearms were the weapons used in 41 percent of robberies in 1995. Strong-armed tactics were used in another 41 percent, knives or cutting instruments in 9 percent, and other dangerous weapons in the remainder. A comparison of 1994 and 1995 robbery totals by weapon showed those by strong-arm tactics decreased 3 percent; those by firearms were down 8 percent; those by knives or cutting instruments declined 10 percent; and those by other dangerous weapons dropped 12 percent. A state-by-state breakdown of weapons used in robberies in 1995 is shown in Table 21.

Law Enforcement Response

The 1995 robbery clearance rate was 25 percent nationally. The highest robbery clearance rate—40 percent—was registered by rural county law enforcement agencies. In suburban counties, the rate was 28 percent, and in the Nation's cities, it was 24 percent. (See Table 25.) Regional robbery clearance percentages ranged from 21 percent in the Northeast to 27 percent in the South. (See Table 26.)

Persons under the age of 18, exclusively, were the offenders in 20 percent of all 1995 robbery clearances. This age group accounted for 22 percent of the suburban county clearances, 20 percent of those in the Nation's cities, and 14 percent of those by rural county agencies. (See Table 28.)

Two percent fewer persons were arrested for robbery in 1995 than in 1994. For the 2-year period, arrests of adults for robbery also declined 2 percent, and those of juveniles decreased 1 percent. The number of robbery arrests dropped 3 percent in the Nation's cities but increased 11 percent in the rural counties and 1 percent in suburban counties.

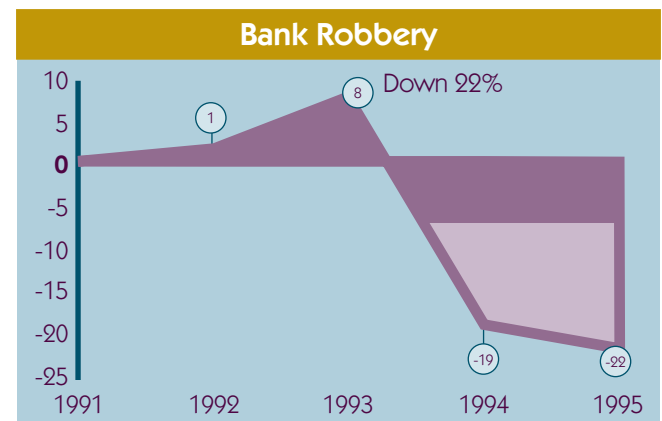
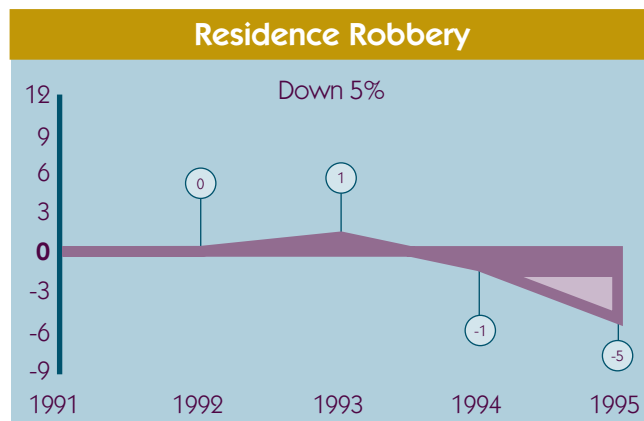
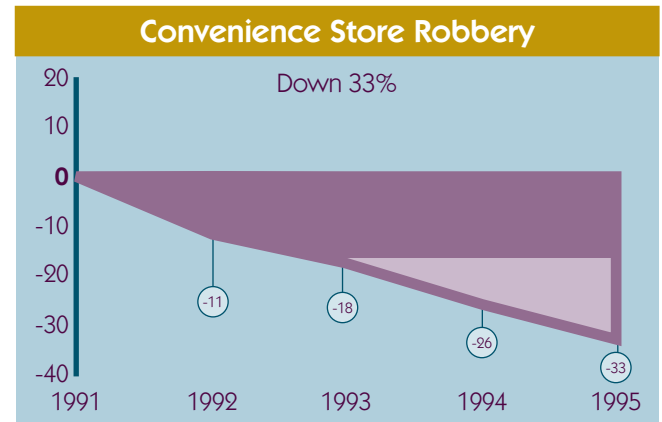
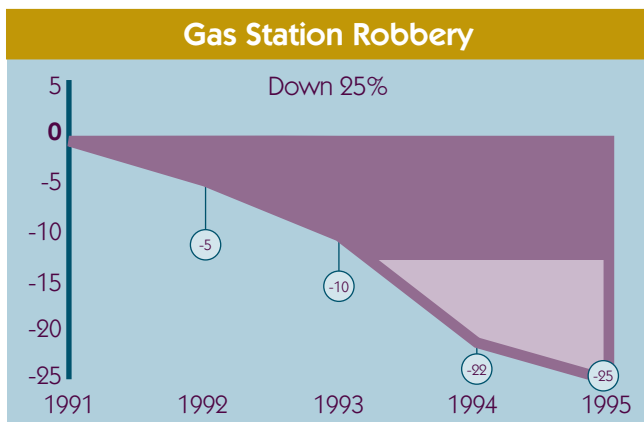
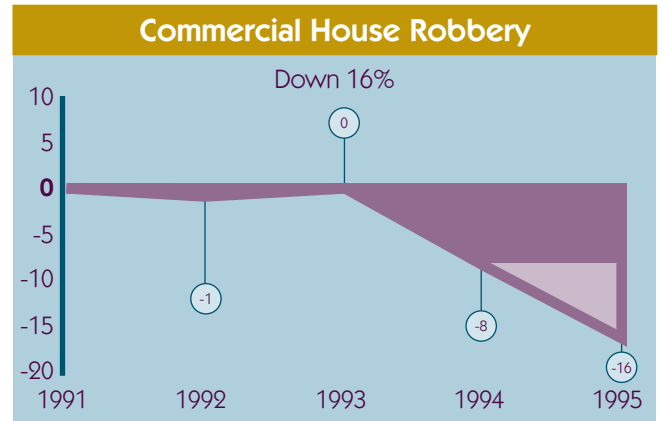
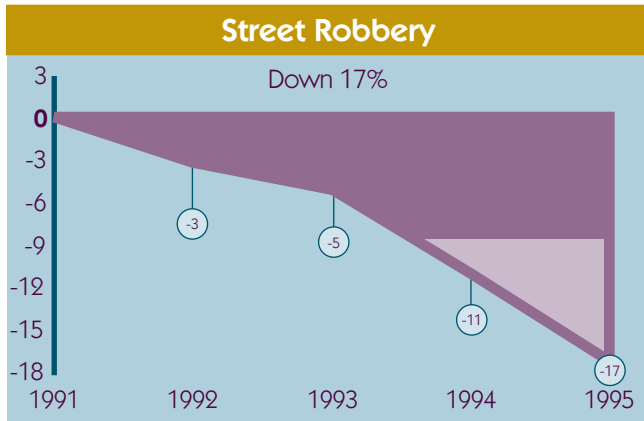
Considering the 5-year period, 1991–1995, total arrests and arrests of males for robbery were each down 7 percent, while arrests of females were up 3 percent. For the same timespan, arrests of persons 18 years of age and older decreased 15 percent, but juvenile arrests rose 18 percent.

Sixty-four percent of all robbery arrestees in 1995 were under 25 years of age, and 91 percent were males. Fifty-nine percent of those arrested were black, 39 percent were white, and the remainder were of other races.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

DEFINITION

Aggravated assault is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.

For the second consecutive year, aggravated assaults declined 1 percent to a total of 1,099,179 offenses in 1995. Aggravated assaults in 1995 accounted for 61 percent of the violent crimes.

Geographic distribution figures show that 40 percent of the aggravated assault volume was accounted for by the most populous Southern Region. Following were the Western Region with 25 percent, the Midwestern Region with 20 percent, and the Northeastern Region with 15 percent. Among the regions, only the Midwest registered an increase in the number of reported aggravated assaults. (See Table 4.)

The 1995 monthly figures show that the greatest number of aggravated assaults was recorded during July, while the lowest volume occurred during February.

The Nation's cities collectively experienced a decrease of 3 percent in the aggravated assault volume from 1994 to 1995. Among city population groupings, both cities with populations over a million and cities with populations from 250,000 to 499,999 recorded 5-percent declines. The number of aggravated assaults decreased 1 percent in suburban counties but increased 6 percent in the rural counties during the same 2-year period. (See Table 12.)

Five- and 10-year trends for the country as a whole showed aggravated assaults 1 percent higher than in 1991 and 32 percent above the 1986 experience. (See Table 1.)

Rate

There were 418 reported victims of aggravated assault for every 100,000 people nationwide in 1995, the lowest rate since 1989. The rate was 2 percent lower than in 1994 and 3 percent below the 1991 rate. The 1995 rate was, however, 21 percent above the 1986 rate.

Higher than the national average, the rate in metropolitan areas was 459 per 100,000 in 1995. Cities outside metropolitan areas experienced a rate of 369, and rural counties, a rate of 187.

Regionally, the aggravated assault rate was 319 per 100,000 people in the Northeast, 359 in the Midwest, 474 in the South, and 481 in the West. Compared to 1994 rates, 1995 aggravated assault rates were down in all regions except the Midwest, which registered a 3-percent increase. (See Table 4.)

Nature

Thirty-three percent of the aggravated assaults in 1995 were committed with blunt objects or other dangerous weapons. Of the remaining weapon categories, personal weapons such as hands, fists, and feet were used in 26 percent of the assaults; firearms in 23 percent; and knives or cutting instruments in the remainder.

Three of the four categories of weapons decreased in use during 1995, with personal weapons (hands, fists, feet, etc.) showing the only increase, less than 1 percent. Those aggravated assaults involving firearms decreased 9 percent; assaults with knives or cutting instruments, 2 percent; and those with blunt objects or other dangerous weapons, 1 percent.

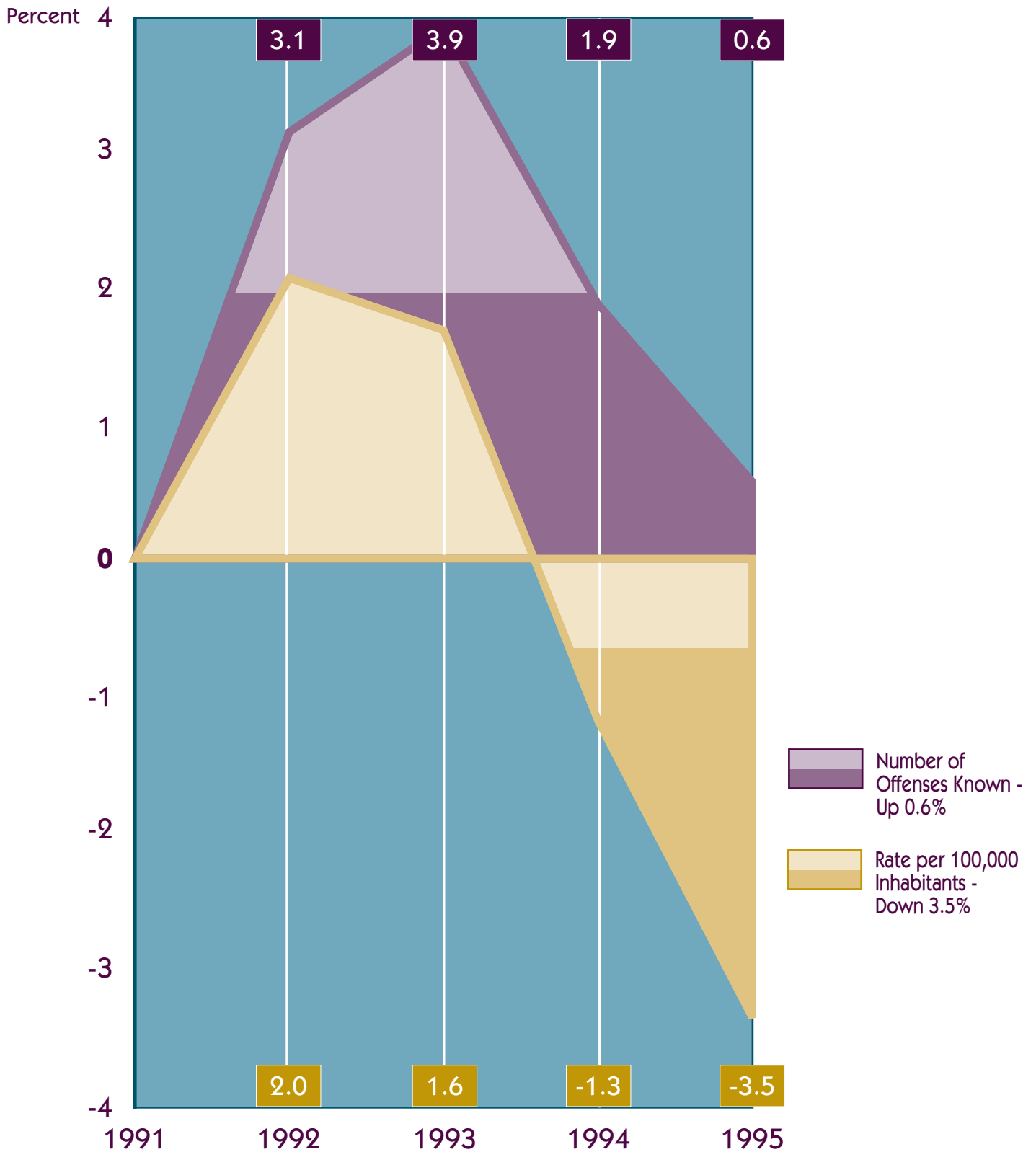

Law Enforcement Response

Law enforcement agencies nationwide recorded a 56-percent aggravated assault clearance rate during 1995. The cities collectively reported 54 percent cleared, while the suburban and rural county law enforcement agencies cleared 60 and 64 percent, respectively. Among the city groupings, those with populations under 10,000 recorded the highest assault clearance rate, 66 percent. (See Table 25.)

Regional clearance percentages for aggravated assault were 58 percent in the West, 57 percent in the South, 53 percent in the Midwest, and 51 percent in the Northeast.

Thirteen percent of the clearances reported nationally and in cities involved only persons under age 18. Persons in this age

group were identified as the assailants in 14 percent of the clearances in the suburban counties and 10 percent of those in the rural counties.

Seven of every 10 violent crime arrests were for aggravated assault in 1995. Of the over 437,000 arrestees, whites comprised 60 percent; blacks, 38 percent; and all other races, the remainder. Eighty-two percent of the arrestees were males, and 85 percent, adults.

Total aggravated assault arrests were up 1 percent in 1995 from the 1994 total. During this 2-year period, the number of adult arrests increased 2 percent, while arrests of persons under age 18 decreased 3 percent. A comparison of 1991 and 1995 figures showed increases of 8 percent for both total arrests and those of adults. Juvenile aggravated assault arrests increased 11 percent.

PROPERTY CRIME TOTAL

DEFINITION

Property crime includes the offenses of burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The object of the theft-type offenses is the taking of money or property, but there is no force or threat of force against the victims. Arson is included since it involves the destruction of property; its victims may be subjected to force.

Estimated at 12.1 million offenses, property crime declined 1 percent in 1995 to its lowest total since 1987. Five- and 10-year trends show the 1995 volume was 7 percent lower than the 1991 level but was 3 percent higher than in 1986.

During 1995, 38 percent of all property crimes were recorded in the Southern States. Following were the Western States with 25 percent, the Midwestern States with 21 percent, and the Northeastern States with 15 percent.

A comparison of 1994 and 1995 regional property crime volumes showed declines of 3 percent in the Northeast and 1 percent in the Midwest. The volume of property crime increased 1 percent in the West and showed virtually no change in the South. (See Table 4.)

The Nation's cities collectively recorded a 1-percent property crime decrease, with the greatest drop (6 percent) in cities with populations of a million or more. The suburban counties also experienced a 1-percent decline, while rural county law enforcement agencies recorded an increase of 4 percent. (See Table 12.)

As in previous years, 1995 monthly figures show more property crime occurred in August, while the lowest total was recorded in February.

Rate

In 1995, there were an estimated 4,593 property crimes for every 100,000 United States inhabitants. The 1995 property crime rate was 1 percent lower than the 1994 rate and 11 percent under the 1991 rate.

Geographically, 1995 property crime rates decreased in all regions from the previous year. The rate of 3,570 per 100,000 in the Northeast showed the largest decline, 3 percent. The rate

of 5,004 in the South represented a 2-percent decrease; and the rates of 5,312 in the West and 4,163 in the Midwest were each down 1 percent.

Property crime rates for 1995 were 4,986 in metropolitan areas, 4,833 in cities outside metropolitan areas, and 1,850 in rural counties. By population group, the highest rate—8,241—was recorded in cities with populations from 250,000 to 499,999. (See Tables 2 and 16.)

Nature

The total dollar value of property stolen in connection with property crimes in 1995 was estimated at \$15.1 billion. The average loss per offense in 1995 was \$1,251 up slightly compared to \$1,248 in 1994.

Larceny-theft accounted for 66 percent of all property crime in 1995. Burglary accounted for 22 percent and motor vehicle theft for 12 percent. Based on information from 11,887 law enforcement agencies who provided detailed arson data, more than 80,000 arson offenses were reported in 1995. The average dollar loss of property damaged due to reported arsons was \$11,151.

Law Enforcement Response

Property crimes generally have lower clearance rates than violent crimes, and in 1995, the overall property crime clearance rate was 18 percent, as compared to 45 percent for violent crime. Geographically, the Midwest's and South's 1995 property crime clearance rates equaled the Nation's, 18 percent. Rates of 17 percent were recorded in both the Northeast and West. (See Table 26.)

Twenty-five percent of the property crimes cleared by law enforcement nationwide and in cities in 1995 involved only young people under age 18. The juvenile percentage was 26 percent in suburban counties and 22 percent in rural counties. (See Table 28.)

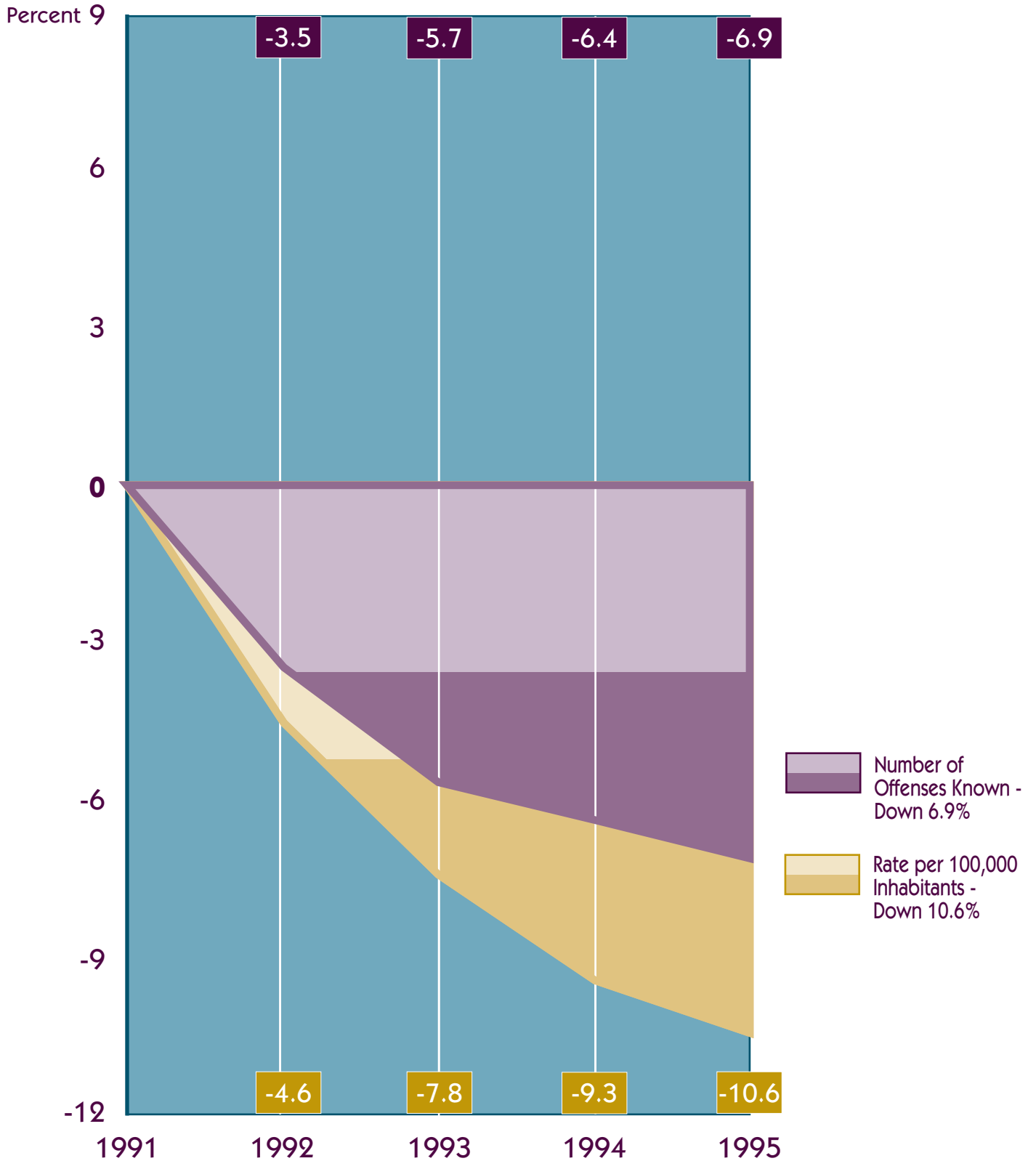
The estimated 2,128,600 persons arrested for property crimes in 1995 accounted for 14 percent of all arrestees. Property crime arrests in 1995 were 1 percent below the 1994 level, 8 percent lower than the 1991 total, but 2 percent above the 1986 experience. Compared to 1994 totals, arrests of juveniles and adults for property crimes declined 2 and 1 percent, respectively, nationwide. (See Tables 32, 34, and 36.)

In 1995, 73 percent of all property crime arrestees were males, 65 percent of the total were white, and 65 percent were over the age of 18.

BURGLARY

DEFINITION

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program defines burglary as the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify an offense as burglary. Burglary in this Program is categorized into three subclassifications: forcible entry, unlawful entry where no force is used, and attempted forcible entry.

The estimated 2.6 million burglaries in the United States during 1995 represented the lowest total in the past two decades. Distribution figures for the regions showed that the highest burglary volume in 1995 (40 percent) occurred in the most populous Southern States. The Western States followed with 25 percent, the Midwestern States with 20 percent, and the Northeastern States with 15 percent. (See Table 3.)

The greatest number of burglaries was recorded during August of 1995, while the lowest count was in February.

Overall, the burglary volume dropped 4 percent in 1995 from the 1994 total. Among the Nation's cities, decreases were registered in all groupings; the largest decrease was in cities with populations of 1 million and over which showed a 9-percent decline. The suburban counties also showed a decrease, 5 percent; however, an increase of 2 percent was reported for the rural counties. (See Table 12.)

All four regions of the United States reported decreases in burglary volumes during 1995 as compared to the 1994 figures. The Northeastern States experienced a 6-percent decline; the Southern States, a 5-percent decrease; the Midwestern States, a 4-percent decline; and the Western States, a 3-percent drop. (See Table 4.)

Longer term national trends show burglary down 18 percent from the 1991 level and down 20 percent from the 1986 volume.

Rate

Lower than in any other year of the past two decades, the burglary rate was 988 per 100,000 inhabitants nationwide in 1995. The rate was 5 percent lower than in 1994, down 21 percent from the 1991 level, and 27 percent below the 1986 rate. In 1995, for every 100,000 in population, the rate was 1,048 in the metropolitan areas, 924 in the cities outside metropolitan areas, and 634 in the rural counties.

Regionally, the burglary rate was 1,137 in the Southern States, 1,111 in the Western States, 841 in the Midwestern States, and 758 in the Northeastern States. A comparison of 1994 and 1995 rates showed decreases of 6 percent in both the Northeast and the South, 5 percent in the Midwest, and 4 percent in the West. (See Table 4.)

Nature

Two of every 3 burglaries in 1995 were residential in nature. Sixty-seven percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 25 percent were unlawful entries (without force), and the remainder were forcible entry attempts. Offenses for which time of occurrence was reported showed that 52 percent of burglaries happened during daytime hours and 48 percent at night. More residential burglaries (59 percent) occurred during the daytime, while 61 percent of nonresidential burglaries occurred during nighttime hours.

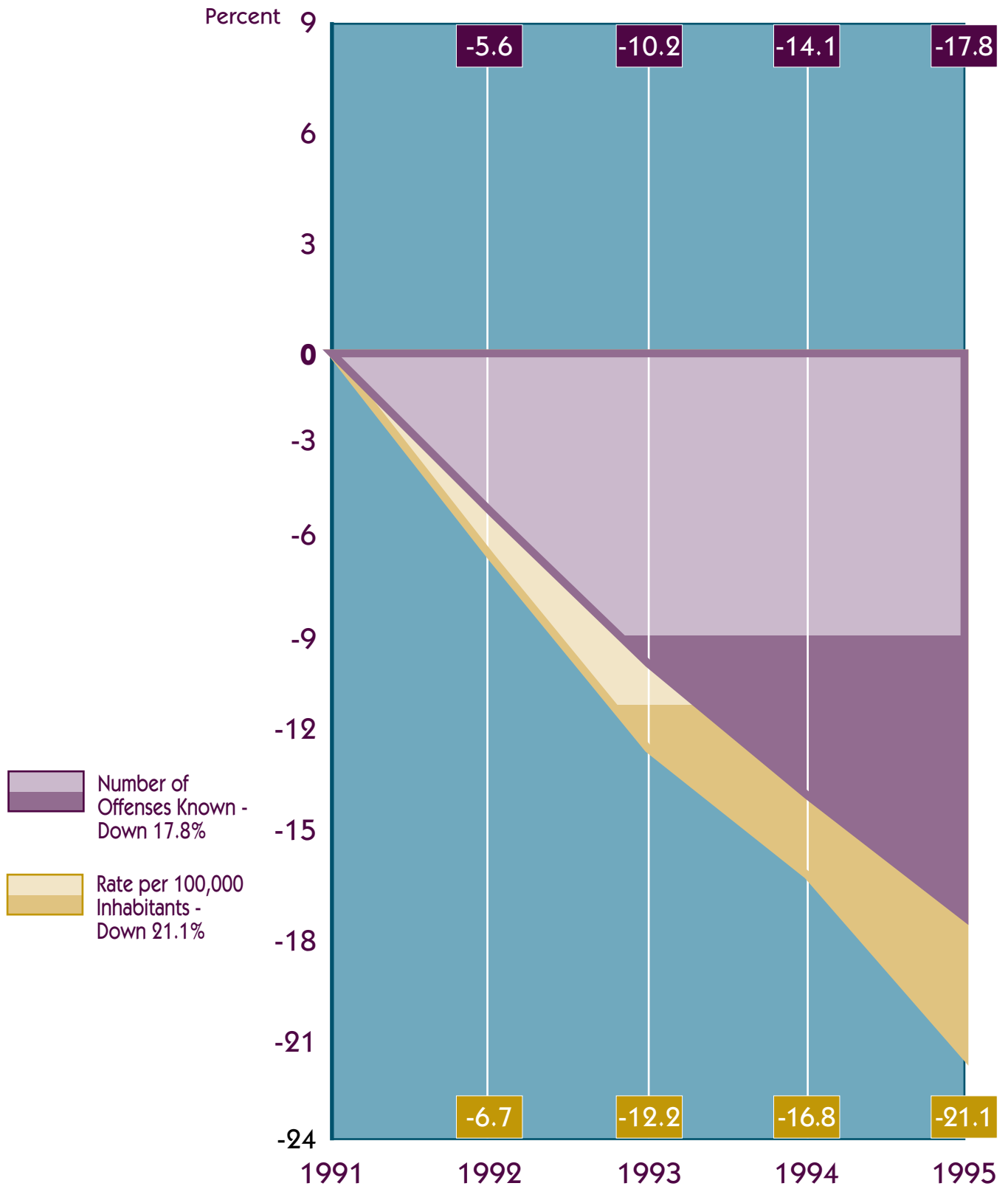
The value of property stolen in burglaries was estimated at \$3.3 billion in 1995, and the average dollar loss per burglary was \$1,259. The average loss for residential offenses was \$1,211 and for nonresidential offenses, \$1,257. Compared to 1994 losses, the 1995 average loss for both residential and nonresidential property decreased.

Both residential and nonresidential burglary volumes also showed declines from 1994 to 1995, 4 and 5 percent, respectively. (See Table 23.)

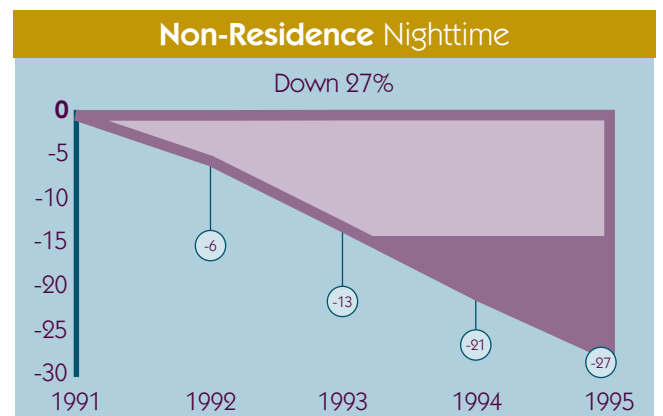
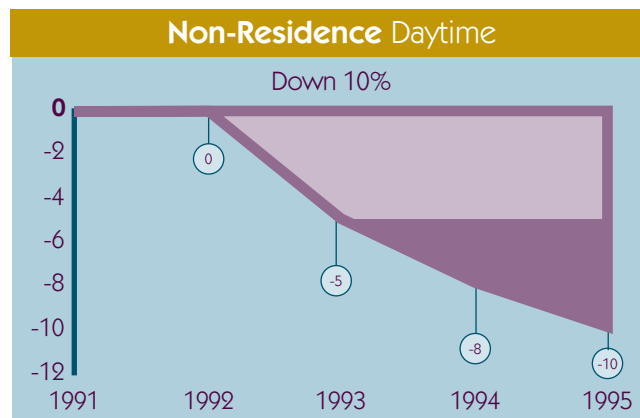
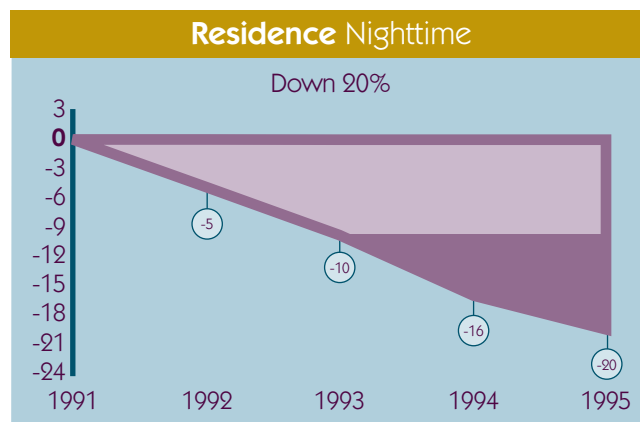
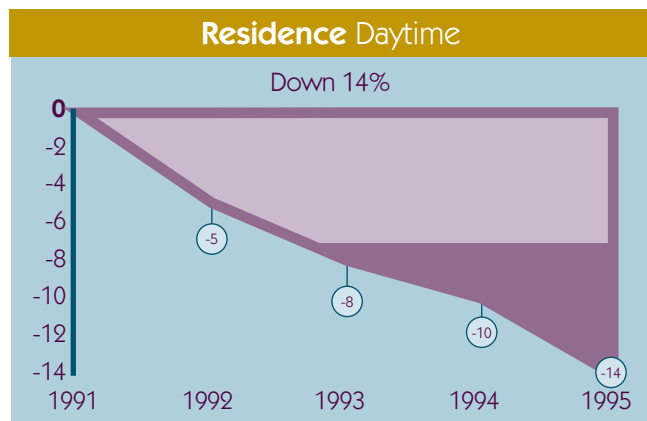
PERCENT CHANGE FROM 1991

Law Enforcement Response

Nationwide in 1995, a 13-percent clearance rate was recorded for burglaries brought to the attention of law enforcement agencies across the country. Geographically, in the South, the clearance rate was 15 percent; in both the Northeast and Midwest, it was 13 percent; and in the West, it was 12 percent. (See Table 26.)

Rural county law enforcement agencies cleared 16 percent of the burglaries in their jurisdictions. Agencies in suburban counties cleared 15 percent, and those in cities, 13 percent. (See Table 25.)

Adults were involved in 79 percent of all burglary offenses cleared; the remaining 21 percent involved only young people under 18 years of age. Persons under age 18 accounted for 21 percent of the burglary clearances in cities, 22 percent of those in rural counties, and 24 percent of those in suburban counties. The highest degree of juvenile involvement was recorded in

the Nation's smallest cities (under 10,000 in population) where young persons under 18 years of age accounted for 26 percent of the clearances. (See Table 28.)

In the UCR Program, several persons may be arrested in connection with the clearance of one crime, or the arrest of one individual may clear numerous offenses. The latter is often true in cases of burglary, for which an estimated 386,500 arrests were made in 1995.

Arrest trends between 1994 and 1995 show total burglary arrests were down 4 percent. Arrests of adults were down 3 percent, and those of persons under 18 years of age decreased 6 percent. For the same 2-year time period, total burglary arrest trends showed decreases of 5 percent in cities; 3 percent in rural counties; and 2 percent in suburban counties.

Eighty-nine percent of the burglary arrestees during 1995 were males, and 62 percent of the total were under 25 years of age. Among all burglary arrestees, whites accounted for 67 percent, blacks for 31 percent, and other races for the remainder.

LARCENY—THEFT

DEFINITION

Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., in which no use of force, violence, or fraud occurs. In the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, this crime category does not include embezzlement, “con” games, forgery, and worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft is also excluded from this category inasmuch as it is a separate Crime Index offense.

Larceny-theft, estimated at 8 million offenses during 1995, comprised 58 percent of the Crime Index total and 66 percent of the property crimes. Similar to the experience in previous years, larceny-thefts were recorded most often during August and least frequently in February.

Viewed geographically, the Southern States, the most populous region, recorded 38 percent of the larceny-theft total. The Western States recorded 25 percent; the Midwestern States, 22 percent; and the Northeastern States, 15 percent. (See Table 3.)

The 1995 volume of larceny-thefts nationwide was 2 percent higher than the 1994 total. By community type, increases of 1 percent were recorded both in cities collectively and suburban counties, and a 6-percent rise was experienced in the rural counties.

Larceny volumes increased in all four geographic regions. The increases were 3 percent in the West and 1 percent in the Midwest, Northeast, and South.

Long-term national trends indicate larceny was up 10 percent when compared to the 1986 total but was 2 percent below the 1991 level. (See Table 1.)

Rate

The 1995 larceny-theft rate was 3,045 per 100,000 U.S. inhabitants. Two-, 5-, and 10-year trends showed the rate was 1 percent higher than the rates in 1994 and 1986 but 6 percent below the 1991 rate. The 1995 rate was 3,278 per 100,000 inhabitants of metropolitan areas; 3,669 per 100,000 population in cities outside metropolitan areas; and 1,091 per 100,000 people in the rural counties. (See Tables 1 and 2.)

By region, the 1995 larceny-theft rate per 100,000 people in the West was up 2 percent, and the Northeast's rate rose 1 percent. Showing virtually no change from 1994 were the rates in

the Midwest and the South. (See Table 4.) The regional rates ranged from 2,296 per 100,000 people in the Northeast to 3,435 per 100,000 population in the West.

Nature

During 1995, the average value of property stolen due to larceny-theft was \$535, up from \$505 in 1994. When the average value was applied to the estimated number of larceny-thefts, the loss to victims nationally was nearly \$4.3 billion for the year. This estimated dollar loss is considered conservative since many offenses in the larceny category, particularly if the value of the stolen goods is small, never come to law enforcement attention. Losses under \$50 and those over \$200 jointly accounted for 77 percent of the thefts reported to law enforcement. The remainder involved losses ranging from \$50 to \$200.

Losses of goods and property reported stolen as a result of pocket-picking averaged \$350; purse-snatching, \$279; and shoplifting, \$108. Thefts from buildings resulted in an average loss of \$891; from motor vehicles, \$531; and from coin-operated machines, \$283. The average value loss due to thefts of motor vehicle accessories was \$329 and for thefts of bicycles, \$286. (See Table 23.)

Thefts of motor vehicle parts, accessories, and contents made up the largest portion of reported larcenies—36 percent. Also contributing to the high volume of thefts were shoplifting, accounting for 15 percent; thefts from buildings, 13 percent; and bicycle thefts, 6 percent. The remainder was distributed among pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from coin-operated machines, and all other types of larceny-thefts. Table 2.28 presents the distribution of larceny-theft by type and geographic region.

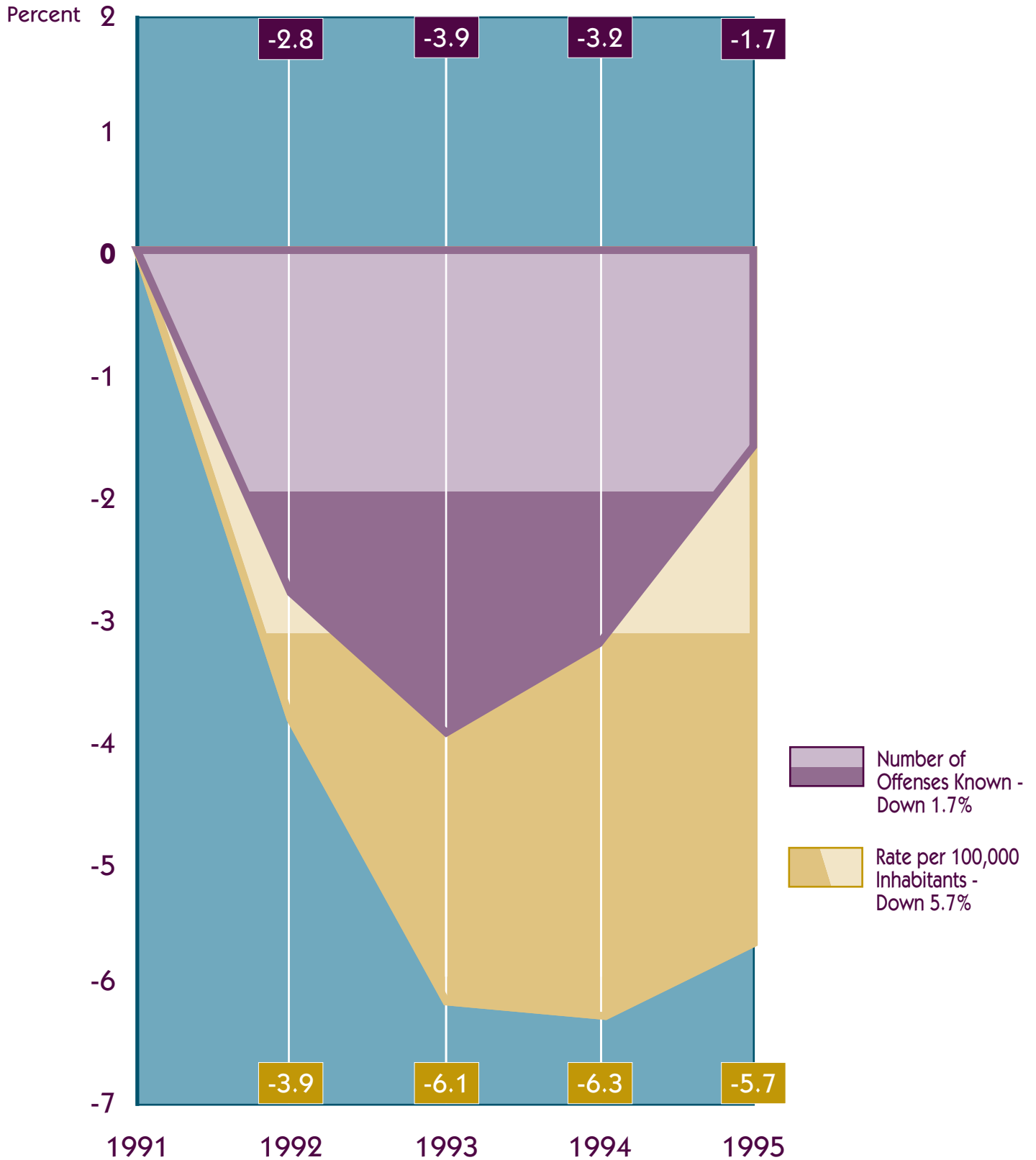

Law Enforcement Response

A 20-percent larceny-theft clearance rate was recorded nationally and in cities during 1995. The highest rate, 25 percent, was reported by law enforcement agencies in cities from 10,000 to 24,999 in population. Suburban and rural counties each recorded an 18-percent clearance rate.

Three of the four geographic regions recorded 20-percent larceny-theft clearance rates in 1995. A 19-percent clearance rate was reported in the West. (See Table 26.)

Twenty-six percent of the larceny-theft clearances nationally and in cities involved only offenders under 18 years of age. Twenty-seven percent of those in suburban counties and 21 percent of those in rural counties were accounted for by persons in this age group.

Between 1994 and 1995, the total number of persons arrested for larceny-theft, as well as arrests of males and those of adults, showed virtually no change. During this same period, arrests

of females and of juveniles (persons under 18 years of age) each increased 1 percent.

For the 5-year period, 1991–1995, total larceny-theft arrests declined 5 percent. Male and female arrests also decreased, 7 and 1 percent, respectively. During the same timespan, arrests of adults dropped 10 percent, while arrests of persons under the age of 18 were up 6 percent.

Larceny-theft not only comprised the largest portion of Crime Index offenses reported to law enforcement, but this offense also accounted for 52 percent of the arrests for Index crimes and 72 percent of those for property crimes in 1995. Forty-six percent of the larceny arrests were of persons under 21 years of age, and 33 percent of the arrestees were under 18. Females, who were arrested for this offense more often than for any other in 1995, comprised 33 percent of all larceny-theft arrestees.

Whites accounted for 65 percent of the total larceny-theft arrestees, blacks for 32 percent, and all other races for the remainder.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

DEFINITION

Defined as the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle, this offense category includes the stealing of automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, motorscooters, snowmobiles, etc. The definition excludes the taking of a motor vehicle for temporary use by those persons having lawful access.

The nearly 1.5 million thefts of motor vehicles occurring in the United States during 1995 represented the lowest total since 1989. The regional distribution of thefts in 1995 showed 33 percent of the volume was in the Southern States, 30 percent in the Western States, 19 percent in the Midwestern States, and 18 percent in the Northeastern States. (See Table 3.)

The 1995 monthly figures show that the greatest numbers of motor vehicle thefts were recorded during the months of August and October, while the lowest count was in February.

Motor vehicle thefts declined 4 percent nationally from 1994 to 1995. The Nation's cities collectively experienced a 6-percent decline, but among city population groupings, the changes ranged from a 12-percent decline in cities with populations of 1 million or more to a 4-percent increase in those with populations under 10,000. During the same 2-year period, a 2-percent decrease in the volume of motor vehicle thefts occurred in the suburban counties, while rural counties registered an increase of 8 percent.

Geographically, decreases in motor vehicle thefts were recorded in the Northeast, 14 percent, and in the West, 3 percent. Both the South and Midwest regions showed decreases of 1 percent. (See Table 4.)

The accompanying chart shows that the volume of motor vehicle thefts in 1995 declined 11 percent from the 1991 volume.

Rate

The 1995 national motor vehicle theft rate—560 per 100,000 people—was 5 percent lower than in 1994 and 15 percent below the 1991 rate. The 1995 rate was 10 percent above the 1986 rate.

For every 100,000 inhabitants living in metropolitan areas, there were 660 motor vehicle thefts reported in 1995. The rate in cities outside metropolitan areas was 240 and in rural counties, 125. As in previous years, the highest rates were in the Nation's most heavily populated municipalities, indicating that this offense is primarily a large-city problem. For every 100,000 inhabitants in cities with populations over 250,000, the 1995 motor vehicle theft rate was 1,310. The Nation's smallest cities, those with fewer than 10,000 inhabitants, recorded a rate of 261 per 100,000.

Declining among all regions in comparison to 1994, motor vehicle theft rates ranged from 766 per 100,000 people in the Western States to 451 in the Midwestern States. The Southern States' rate was 530, and the Northeastern States' rate was 516. The Northeast reported the greatest rate decrease, 14 percent. The West reported a decrease of 4 percent; the South, a decrease of 3 percent; and the Midwest, a decrease of 2 percent.

An estimated average of 1 of every 139 registered motor vehicles was stolen nationwide during 1995. Regionally, this rate was greatest in the West where 1 of every 100 motor vehicles registered was stolen. The other three regions reported lesser rates—1 per 190 in the Midwest, 1 per 148 in the South, and 1 per 132 in the Northeast.

Nature

The estimated value of motor vehicles stolen nationwide in 1995 was nearly \$7.6 billion. At the time of theft, the average value per vehicle was \$5,129. The recovery percentage for the value of vehicles stolen was higher than for any other property type. Relating the value of vehicles stolen to the value of those recovered resulted in a 62-percent recovery rate for 1995. (See Tables 23 and 24.)

Seventy-eight percent of all motor vehicles reported stolen during the year were automobiles, 16 percent were trucks or buses, and the remainder were other types.

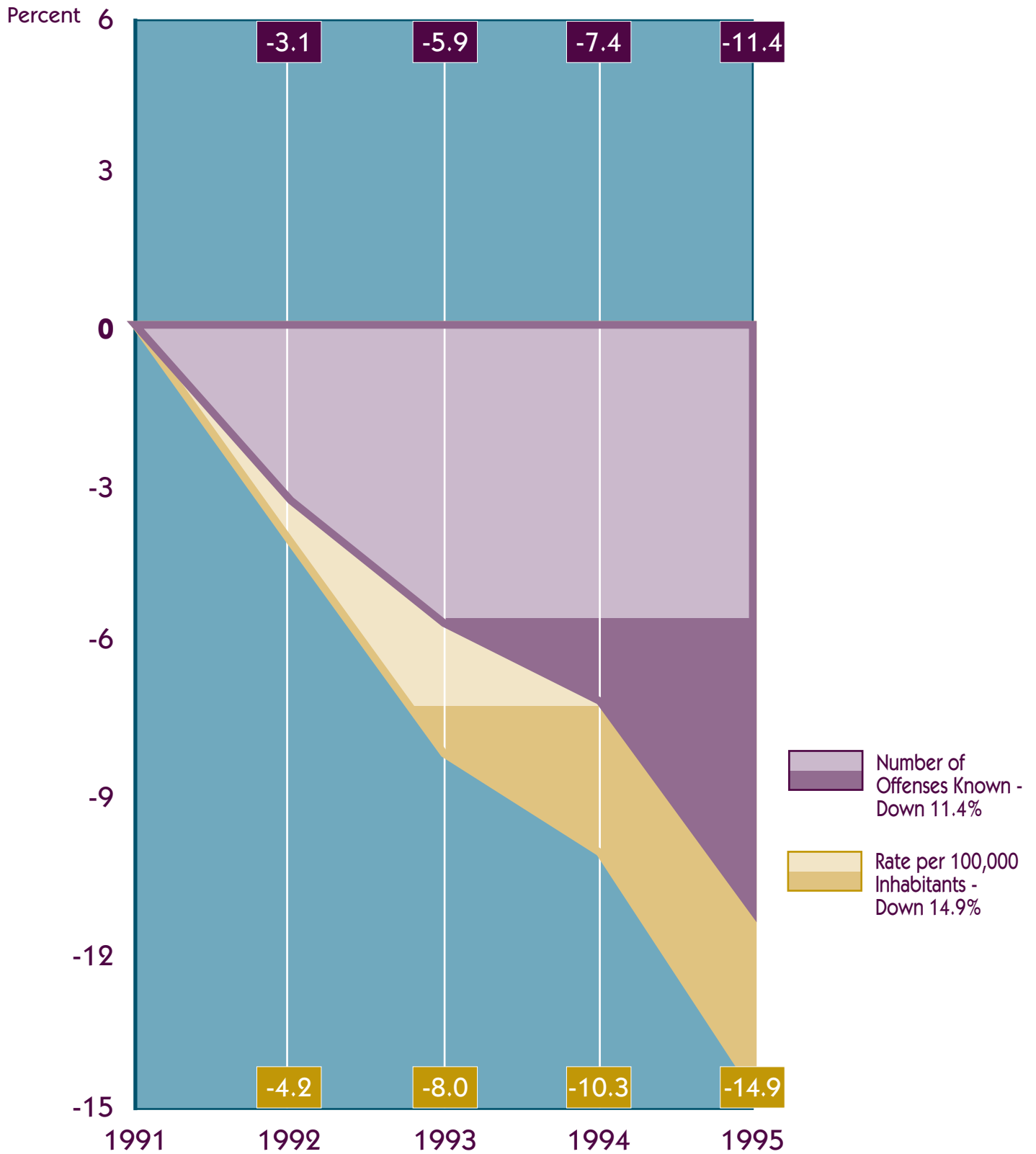

Law Enforcement Response

Law enforcement agencies nationwide recorded a 14-percent motor vehicle theft clearance rate for 1995. Those in cities cleared 13 percent; those in suburban counties cleared 16 percent; and rural county agencies cleared 32 percent.

Regional clearance percentages for motor vehicle theft were 17 percent in both the Southern and Midwestern States, 12 percent in the Western States, and 10 percent in the Northeastern States.

Persons in the under-18 age group accounted for 24 percent of the motor vehicle thefts cleared both nationally and in cities. They were responsible for 22 percent of the clearances in both suburban and rural counties.

During 1995, law enforcement agencies nationwide made an estimated 191,900 arrests for motor vehicle theft. Males ac-

counted for 87 percent of those arrested. Fifty-nine percent of the arrestees were white, 38 percent were black, and the remainder were of other races.

A large proportion of motor vehicle theft arrestees was accounted for by the younger segment of the population. In 1995, 58 percent of all persons arrested for this offense were under 21 years of age, and those under 18 comprised 42 percent of the total. Between 1994 and 1995, arrests of persons under age 18 were down 9 percent. Arrests of juvenile males decreased 10 percent, and those of young females decreased 5 percent.

Total motor vehicle theft arrests in 1995 were down 6 percent from the 1994 level and 13 percent lower than in 1991. Compared to the 1986 level, however, the arrest total increased 18 percent.

ARSON

DEFINITION

Arson is defined by the Uniform Crime Reporting Program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

A total of 94,926 arson offenses was reported by 12,261 law enforcement agencies across the country; these agencies furnished from 1 to 12 months of reports during 1995. Among these reporting agencies, 11,887 provided the detailed information—type of structure, estimated monetary value of the property damaged, etc.—from which the tables on the accompanying pages were tabulated. Further information regarding arson offenses and trends is presented in Tables 12 through 15 and arson clearances in Tables 25 through 28. Since only 8,940 agencies, covering 72 percent of the United States population, submitted reports for all 12 months of the year, the data user should be aware that, while conservative indicators, the figures do not represent the Nation's total arson experience.

The number of arson offenses reported nationally decreased 4 percent in 1995 from the 1994 total. While arson dropped 5 percent in the Nation's cities collectively, changes among the population groupings ranged from a 16-percent decrease in cities with populations over one million to a 3-percent increase in those with populations under 10,000. The suburban counties registered a decline of 3 percent, while an increase of 7 percent was experienced in the rural counties. (See Table 12.)

Geographically, arson decreased 10 percent in the Midwest and 5 percent in the Northeast and West. The South showed a 1-percent increase.

By property type nationally, decreases were shown in the number of arsons of mobile property, 5 percent; structures, 3 percent; and all other property, 2 percent. (See Table 15.)

Caution is recommended when viewing arson trend information. The percent change figures may have been influenced by improved arson reporting procedures. It is expected that year-to-year statistical comparability will improve as collection continues.

Rate

Since population coverage for arson data is lower than for the other Crime Index offenses, arson rates per 100,000 inhabitants are tabulated independently. Based only on figures from law enforcement agencies supplying 12 months of statistics for all Index crimes, including arson, the 1995 rates are shown in Table 2.31.

The rates ranged from 95 per 100,000 inhabitants in cities with populations 250,000 to 499,999 to 21 per 100,000 rural county inhabitants. The suburban counties and all cities collectively recorded rates of 31 and 53 per 100,000 inhabitants, respectively. Overall, the 1995 national arson rate was 45 per 100,000 population.

Regionally, the highest arson rate was registered in the Northeastern States with 52 offenses per 100,000 population. Following were the Western States with a rate of 50 per 100,000, the Midwestern States with 43 per 100,000, and the Southern States with 40 per 100,000.

Nature

As in previous years, structures were the most frequent targets of arsonists in 1995 and comprised 53 percent of the reported incidents. Twenty-six percent of the arsons were directed at mobile property (motor vehicles, trailers, etc.), while other types of property (crops, timber, etc.) accounted for 22 percent.

Residential property was involved in 60 percent of the structural arsons during the year, with 43 percent of such offenses directed at single-family dwellings. Twenty percent of all targeted structural property was either uninhabited or abandoned at the time the arson occurred.

Motor vehicles comprised 94 percent of all mobile property at which arsons were directed.

The monetary value of property damaged due to reported arsons averaged \$11,151 per incident in 1995. The overall average for all types of structures was \$17,704. Mobile properties averaged \$4,561 per incident, and other targets averaged \$3,042.

Law Enforcement Response

The 1995 arson clearance rate was 16 percent nationwide and 15 percent in cities. Rural county law enforcement agencies cleared 22 percent; and those in suburban counties, 18 percent. Agencies in cities with fewer than 10,000 inhabitants showed the highest rate, clearing 25 percent of the arson offenses brought to their attention. (See Table 25.)

Regionally, the Southern States recorded a clearance rate of 20 percent; the Midwestern States, 16 percent; the Western States, 15 percent; and the Northeastern States, 11 percent.

Forty-seven percent of all 1995 arson clearances involved only young people under age 18, a higher percentage of juvenile involvement than for any other Index crime. Persons in this age group accounted for 45 percent of structural arson clearances, 28 percent of the clearances for arsons of mobile property, and 62 percent of those of all other property. Juveniles

were the offenders in 50 percent of the city, 44 percent of the suburban county, and 28 percent of the rural county arson clearances.

The accompanying tables show clearance data for only those 11, 887 law enforcement agencies which were able to furnish breakdowns by type for the structural and mobile classifications. As can be seen, the highest clearance rate (33 percent) was recorded for arsons of community/public structures, while the lowest rate (8 percent) was registered for motor vehicles.

An estimated 20,000 arrests for arson were made during 1995. Fifty-two percent of the arrestees were under 18 years of age and 68 percent were under 25. Males comprised 84 percent of all arson arrestees. Seventy-four percent of those arrested were white, 24 percent were black, and the remainder were of other races.

Trends for 1995 versus 1994 show arson arrests down 3 percent nationally and 2 percent in cities. Suburban counties recorded the largest decrease, 8 percent. Virtually no change occurred in the rural counties.

Nationwide, arrests of juveniles for arson were down 8 percent, while adult arrests showed a 3-percent increase from

1994 to 1995. During the same period, male arrests decreased 4 percent but female arrests rose 5 percent. The 1995 arson arrest total for all ages was 6 percent higher than in 1991 and 7 percent above the 1986 level.

Crime Index Tabulations

This Section's tabular portions present data on crime in the United States as a whole; geographic divisions; individual states; Metropolitan Statistical Areas; cities, towns, and counties; and college and university campuses. Also furnished in the following tables are national averages for the value of property stolen in connection with Crime Index offenses; further breakdowns by type for the robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and arson classifications; information on the types of weapons used; and data on the type and value of property stolen and recovered.

Although the total number of crimes occurring throughout the Nation is unknown, information on those reported to law enforcement gives a reliable indication of criminal activity. In reviewing the tables in this report, it must be remembered, however, that many factors can cause the volume and type of crime to vary from place to place. Even though population, one of these factors, is used in computing crime rates, all communities are affected to some degree by seasonal or transient populations. Since counts of current, permanent population are used in their construction, crime rates do not account for short-term population variables, such as an influx of day workers, tourists, shoppers, etc. A further discussion of various factors contributing to the amount of crime in a given area is shown on page iv of this publication.

National data can serve as a guide for the law enforcement administrator in analyzing the local crime count, as well as the performance of the jurisdiction's law enforcement agency. The analysis, however, should not end with a comparison based on data presented in this publication. It is only through an

appraisal of local conditions that a true assessment of the community crime problem or the effectiveness of the law enforcement operation is possible.

National estimates of the volume and rate per 100,000 inhabitants for all Crime Index offenses covering the past two decades are set forth in Table 1, "Index of Crime, United States, 1976-1995."

Table 2, "Index of Crime, United States, 1995," shows current year estimates for MSAs, rural counties, and cities and towns outside metropolitan areas. See Appendix III for the definitions of these community types.

Provided in Table 3, "Index of Crime, Regional Offense and Population Distribution, 1995," are data showing the geographical distribution of estimated Index crimes and population. When utilizing figures presented on a regional basis in this publication, the reader is cautioned to consider each region's proportion of the total United States population. For example, although the Southern States accounted for the largest volume of Crime Index offenses in 1995, they also represented the greatest regional population.

Note

The collection of statistics on arson as a Crime Index offense began in 1979. However, 1995 annual figures are not available for inclusion in tables presenting statistics for the total United States. Arson totals reported by individual law enforcement agencies are displayed in Tables 8 through 11. Two-year arson trends are shown in Tables 12 through 15.

SECTION III

Crime Index Offenses Cleared

For UCR purposes, law enforcement agencies clear or solve an offense when at least one person is arrested, charged with the commission of the offense, and turned over to the court for prosecution. Clearances recorded in 1995 may be for offenses which occurred in prior years. Several crimes may be cleared by the arrest of one person, while the arrest of many persons may clear only one offense. Law enforcement agencies may clear a crime by exceptional means when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes the placing of formal charges against the offender. Examples of circumstances allowing such clearances are the death of the offender (suicide, justifiably killed by police or private citizen, etc.); the victim's refusal to cooperate with prosecution after the offender has been identified; or the denial of extradition because the offender committed another crime and is being prosecuted in a different jurisdiction. In all exceptional clearance cases, law enforcement must have identified the offender, have enough evidence to support arrest, and know the offender's location.

Law enforcement agencies nationwide recorded a 21-percent Crime Index clearance rate for 1995. Collectively, 45 percent of violent crimes were cleared. Among the violent offenses, the rates were 65 percent for murder, 51 percent for forcible rape, 25 percent for robbery, and 56 percent for aggravated assault. Clearances for crimes against persons (murder, forcible rape, and aggravated assault) are generally higher as these offenses are often given more intensive investigative efforts and the victims and/or witnesses can frequently identify the perpetrators.

The overall property crime clearance rate was 18 percent. Thirteen percent of the burglaries, 20 percent of the larceny-thefts, 14 percent of motor vehicle thefts, and 16 percent of arsons were cleared during the year.

When considering the Modified Crime Index total which includes arson, the overall clearance rate remained the same, 21 percent.

Geographically, the highest total Crime Index clearance rate was registered in the Southern States, with 22 percent. The Midwestern and Western States each recorded 21-percent clearance rates, and the Northeastern States registered a 20-percent clearance rate. For violent crime, the highest clearance rate, 48 percent, was also recorded in the South. In the West,

the rate was 47 percent; in the Midwest, 44 percent; and in the Northeast, 38 percent. Property crime clearance rates were 18 percent in the South and Midwest and 17 percent in the Northeast and West.

By community type, city law enforcement agencies and those in suburban counties showed clearances for 21 percent of the Crime Index offenses brought to their attention. Rural county agencies cleared 23 percent. Among the city population groups, those with 10,000 to 24,999 inhabitants registered the highest total Crime Index and property crime clearance rates, 26 percent and 23 percent, respectively. The highest violent crime clearance rate—61 percent—was recorded in cities with populations under 10,000 and in the rural counties. (See Table 25.)

Clearances Involving Only Persons under 18 Years of Age

Involvement of juveniles in crime can be measured by the number of crimes in which they have been identified as the offenders. Even though no physical arrest may have been made, a clearance by arrest is recorded when an offender under 18 years of age is cited to appear in juvenile court or before other juvenile authorities. Since the juvenile clearance percentages shown in this publication indicate only those offenses where no adults were involved, they should be considered a slight underestimation of juvenile involvement in crime. Juveniles (persons under 18 years of age) account for 26 percent of the United States population, according to 1995 Bureau of the Census estimates.

Twenty-two percent of the Crime Index offenses cleared by law enforcement during 1995 involved only young people under age 18. Persons in this age group accounted for 14 percent of the violent crime clearances and 25 percent of those for property crimes. Murder showed the lowest percentage of juvenile involvement (9 percent), while the highest percentage was shown for arson (47 percent).

Geographically, the Midwestern States recorded the largest percentage of Crime Index offense involvement by the under 18 age group—26 percent. Juveniles alone were the offenders in 22 percent of the clearances in the Western States, 21 percent of those in the Southern States, and 20 percent of those in the Northeastern States.

CRIMES CLEARED by ARREST 1995

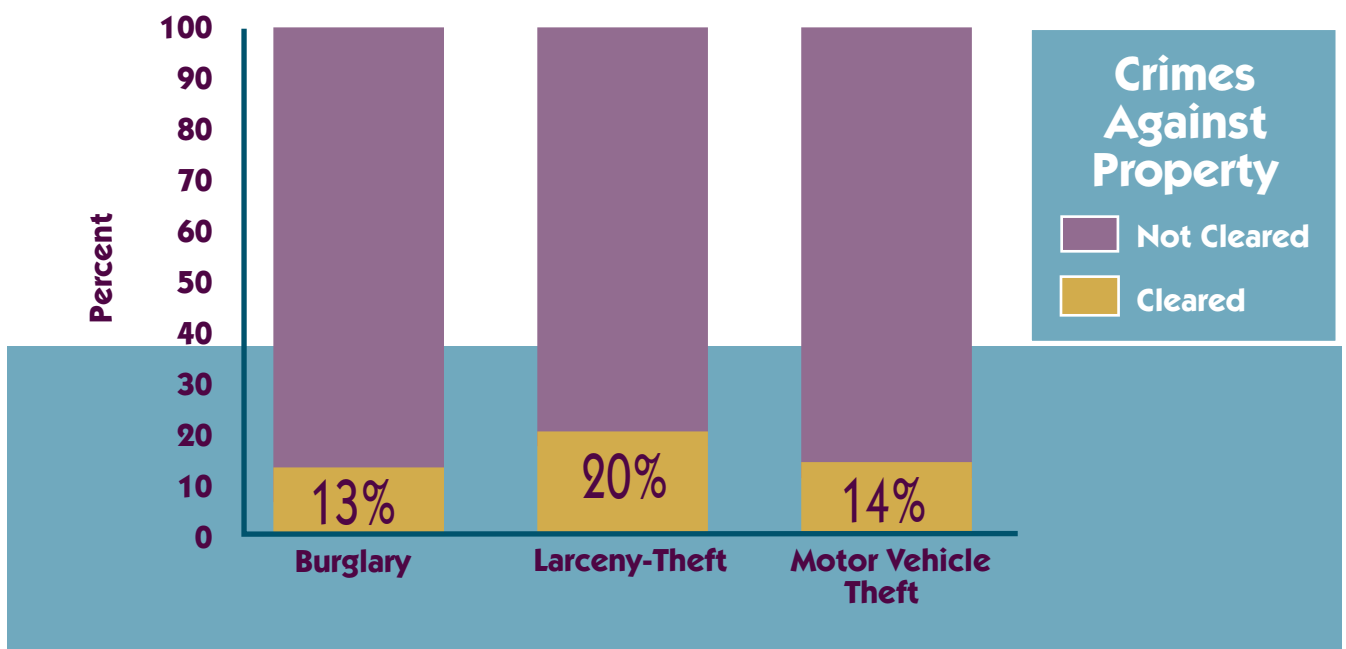
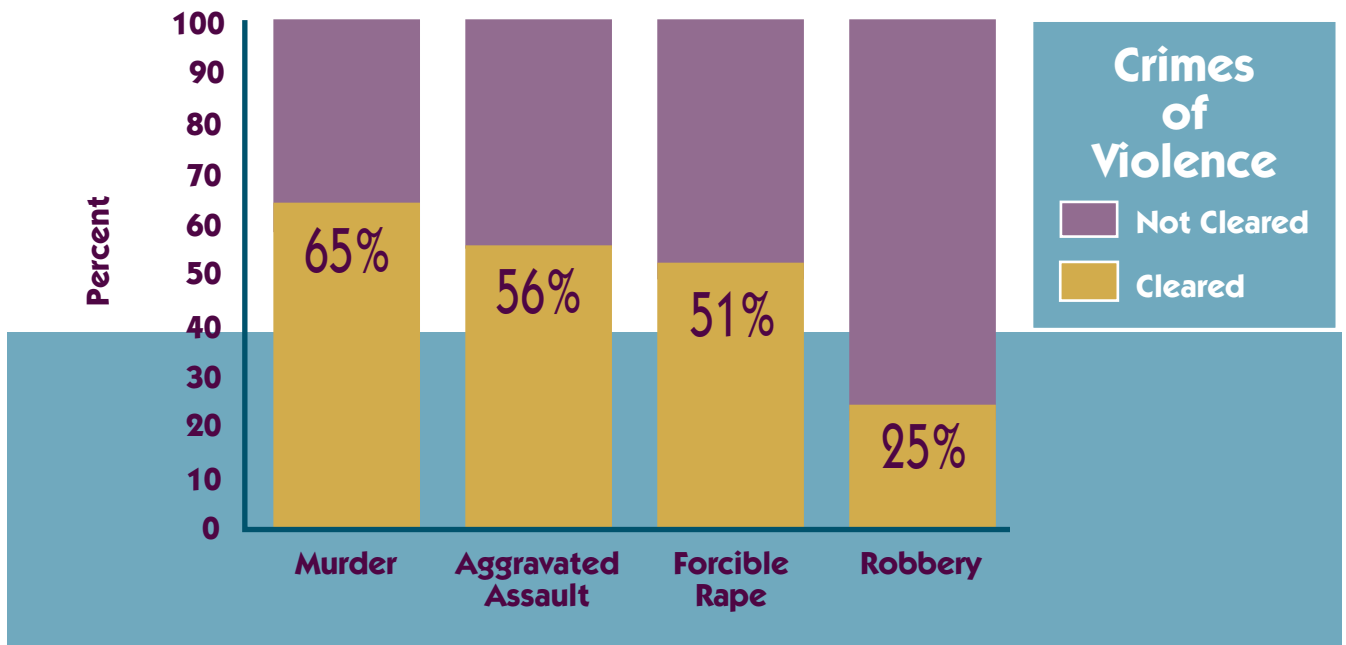

SECTION IV

Persons Arrested

Primarily a gauge of law enforcement's response to crime, arrest counts also provide definitive data concerning the age, sex, and race of perpetrators. Arrest practices, policies, and enforcement emphases vary from place to place and even within a community from time to time as, for example, during a local police campaign against residential burglary. While the practices for certain unlawful conduct such as drunkenness, disorderly conduct, vagrancy, and related violations may differ among agencies, those for robbery, burglary, and other serious crime arrests are more likely to be uniform and consistent throughout all jurisdictions. The Program's procedures require that an arrest be counted on each separate occasion a person is taken into custody, notified, or cited. Annual arrest figures do not measure the number of individuals arrested since one person may be arrested several times during the year for the same or different offenses.

Nationwide, law enforcement agencies made an estimated 15.1 million arrests in 1995 for all criminal infractions except traffic violations. The highest arrest counts among the specific crime categories were for larceny-theft and drug abuse violations, 1.5 million each. Driving under the influence accounted for 1.4 million arrests, and simple assault arrests numbered 1.3 million. (See Table 29.)

When the overall arrest volume was related to the total U.S. population, the rate was 5,807 arrests per 100,000 inhabitants. Among the city population groupings, those with more than 250,000 inhabitants recorded the highest rate, 7,783, while those with populations from 25,000 to 49,999 recorded the lowest rate, 5,355. (See Table 31.) For suburban county agencies overall, the arrest rate was 4,255, and for rural county law enforcement, it was 4,357 per 100,000 inhabitants. Regionally, the arrest rates per 100,000 population ranged from 5,626 in the West to 5,918 in the South. (See Tables 30 and 31.)

Because of reporting problems at the state levels, only limited arrest statistics were provided from Delaware and Pennsylvania, and no arrest data were available for New Hampshire. Due to NIBRS conversion efforts, arrest data were not received from contributing law enforcement agencies in Illinois, Kansas, and Montana. Therefore, tables showing the age, sex, or race of persons arrested contain limited or no data for these states. Arrest totals were estimated, however, for inclusion in Table 29, "Total Estimated Arrests, United States, 1995."

Arrest Trends

The number of arrests for all offenses excluding traffic violations increased 1 percent in 1995 as compared to the 1994

volume. Virtually no change was reported for violent crime arrests, while arrests for Crime Index offenses and those for property crimes decreased 1 percent.

During the same time period, juvenile and adult arrests for all offenses increased 1 percent. Violent crime arrests increased 1 percent for adults and decreased 3 percent for juveniles. For the 2-year period, property crime arrests declined 1 percent for adults and 2 percent for juveniles. (See Table 36.)

Two-year arrest trends showed a 1-percent increase in overall arrests for cities and 3-percent increases in arrests for suburban and rural counties. (See Tables 44, 50, and 56.)

The comparison of 1991 and 1995 data shows total arrests were up 5 percent. Juvenile arrests increased 20 percent, and adult arrests rose 2 percent for the same timeframe. (See Table 34.) Total Crime Index arrests declined 5 percent, and property crime arrests dropped 8 percent. Violent crime arrests increased 2 percent during the period.

For the decade 1986-1995, increases were recorded for total arrests, 17 percent; Crime Index offenses, 10 percent; violent crimes, 37 percent; and property crimes, 2 percent.

The 1995 drug abuse violation arrest total was 7 percent above the 1994 level, 41 percent higher than in 1991, and 65 percent higher than in 1986. The following table shows the types of drugs involved in violations resulting in arrests during 1995 by geographic region.

Age

Six percent of all persons arrested nationally in 1995 were under the age of 15; 18 percent were under 18; 31 percent were under 21; and 44 percent were under 25. Persons in the under-25 age group accounted for 46 percent of arrests in the cities, 41 percent in the suburban counties, and 39 percent in the rural counties.

Age distribution figures for persons arrested for Crime Index offenses showed 30 percent were under the age of 18; 44 percent, under 21; and 55 percent, under 25. The under-25 age group was also responsible for 46 percent of the violent crime arrests and 58 percent of property crime arrests in 1995.

Larceny-theft was the offense resulting in the most arrests of persons under age 18, while adults were most often arrested for driving under the influence. (See Table 38.)

Sex

Eighty percent of the persons arrested in the Nation during 1995 were males. (See Table 42.) They accounted for 76 percent of Index crime arrests, 85 percent of those for violent crimes, and 73 percent of the property crime arrests. Men were

most often arrested for drug abuse violations and driving under the influence, which jointly accounted for 20 percent of all male arrests.

As in past years, larceny-theft was the crime for which females were most often arrested. This single offense accounted for 73 percent of arrests of women for Index crimes and 17 percent of all female arrests. Fifty-five percent of all female larceny-theft arrestees were under 25 years of age.

Two-year trends showed a 1-percent increase in the number of male arrests from 1994 to 1995, and a 4-percent rise in female arrests for the same period. (See Table 37.) Arrests of males rose 3 percent, and those of females were up 14 percent for the 5-year period from 1991 to 1995.

Race

Race distribution figures for the total number of arrests in the United States during 1995 showed 67 percent of the arrestees were white, 31 percent were black, and the remainder were of other races. (See Table 43.) Whites accounted for 62 percent of the Index crime arrests, 54 percent of the arrests for violent crimes, and 65 percent of those for property crimes.

Section V

Weapons Used in Violent Crime

The surge in the level of violent crime in the Nation over the past decade corresponded with a significant rise in firearm usage by the criminal population. The main focus of this study is to examine this dynamic nationally and regionally and to discuss trends for other types of weapons used in violent crimes. The data in this report are based on Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) weapon information collected for the offenses of murder, robbery, and aggravated assault. These crimes constitute 95 percent of all violent crimes. Weapon data are not collected for forcible rape. The weapon categories are (1) firearms, (2) knives or cutting instruments, (3) other dangerous weapons, and (4) personal weapons (hands, fists, feet, etc.)

National Experience

During 1994, based on crimes reported to law enforcement agencies, there were 544,880 offenses in the United States in which victims were murdered, robbed, or assaulted with firearms. In other words, nearly 1 out of 3 (31%) murder, robbery, and aggravated assault offenses collectively involved firearms as the weapons used. Further, Table 5.1 shows that from 1985 to 1994 violent crimes committed with firearms increased by a much wider margin than those committed with other weapons. During this 10-year time period, firearm-related offenses were chiefly responsible for the overall 42-percent increase in murders, robberies, and aggravated assaults. When addressing the trends for the remaining weapon types, the increases did not exceed those for the firearm category. In contrast to crimes of violence nationwide, property crime (which is not weapon-oriented) increased only 9 percent during the period 1985 to 1994.

Weapon statistics have been collected since the mid-1970s by the UCR Program for each violent crime offense with the exception of forcible rape. Chart 5.1 shows that considering weapon types, the 1990s have become the decade most prone to firearm use in history for the violent crimes studied. The trends for firearm use in murders, robberies, and aggravated assaults were remarkably similar in pattern. After remaining stable or declining during the period 1980–1985, firearm-related violent crimes followed a distinctive upward trend with the number of firearm-related aggravated assaults showing the greatest increase—76 percent—in 1994 as compared to the 1985 level. (Table 5.1.)

Recently, the Bureau of Justice Statistics, Department of Justice, released a study concluding that of the victims of non-fatal violent crimes who faced an assailant armed with a firearm, 17 percent were injured in some manner (pistol-whipped, shot, etc.). Three percent of those confronted with a firearm suffered gunshot wounds. When applying this statistic to the 1994 UCR figure of 528,575 firearm-related robbery and

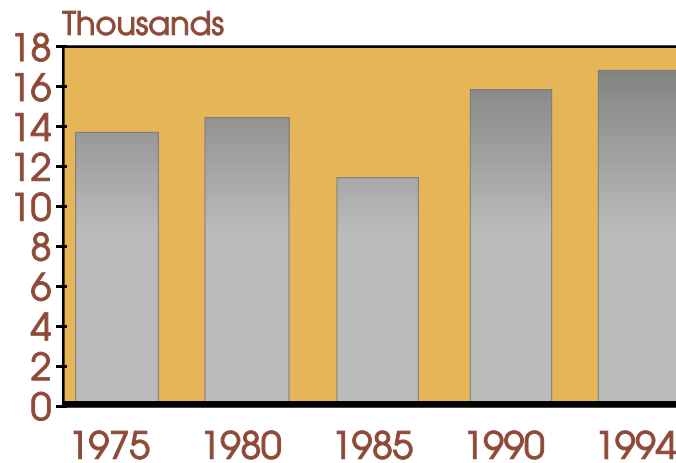
aggravated assault offenses, an estimated 15,857 offenses involved victims who suffered gunshot wounds. Moreover, when including firearm-related murders during 1994, there were an estimated 32,162 offenses where victims were shot (see Table 5.2). It should be noted that the aforementioned figures do not include criminals who have been shot during the commission of a crime.

Firearm-related violent crimes that result in injury or death are having a substantial impact on the Nation's public health system. A recent study by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, United States Department of Health and Human Services, indicated that 92 percent of patients who required hospitalization due to firearm-related injuries survived. Since firearm-related violent crime is the fastest increasing category, the number of hospital admissions due to these crimes may adversely affect the cost of health care since most of these victims are taken to trauma centers. The American Hospital Association reported in 1994 that approximately 23 percent of the Nation's 6,650 hospitals have trauma centers, up from 11 percent in 1991.

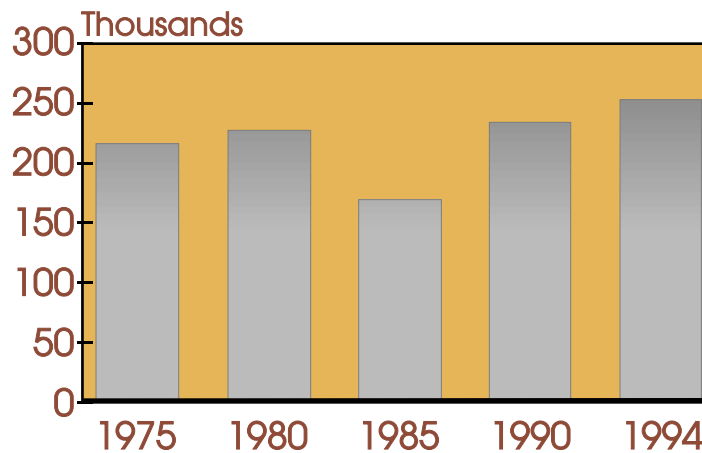
The advent of trauma centers in nearly all major urban areas may have influenced the recent decline in the Nation's

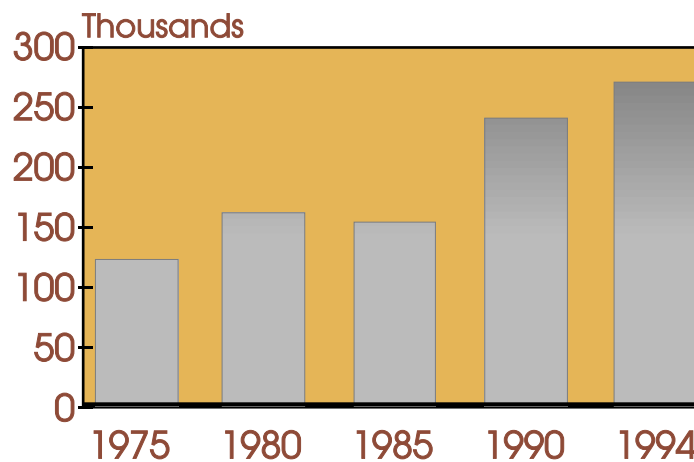
Number of Murders by Firearm, United States, 1975 - 1994

homicide rate. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported that of people hospitalized with gunshot wounds, 9 out of 10 survived, as earlier mentioned. This may, in part, account for the recent significant decline in the number of homicides nationwide. Ostensibly, this is an area of criminal justice research that needs further examination.

Accompanying the unprecedented level of firearm usage in the violent crimes studied is the dramatic increase in the number of juveniles arrested for weapon violations. Specifically, estimates for the years 1985 and 1994 show juvenile arrests for this crime increased 113 percent nationwide. As shown in Table 5.3, substantial increases in arrests for weapon violations were experienced by all racial groups over the 10-year timespan. The overall increase for total weapon violation arrests was 43 percent, with adult arrests for this category increasing 30 percent for the 10-year period under consideration. It should also be noted that total juvenile violent crime arrests in 1994 rose considerably—80 percent—as compared to the 1985 total.

Regional Experience

An escalation in the violent crime volume was experienced by every region in the Nation over the past decade, 1985 to 1994. As with the national experience, the upward trend in violent crime for each region was fueled by significant increases

in firearm-related murders, robberies, and aggravated assaults, as shown in Table 5.4. The Midwestern and Western Regions experienced exceedingly large increases for murders and aggravated assaults committed with firearms. When considering the trends for weapon types other than firearms (e.g., knives, clubs, hands, fists, etc.), there were no across-the-board increases as was experienced in the firearm category.

The South, the most populous region in the Nation, had a disproportionately high percentage of firearm-related murders and aggravated assaults during 1994. More specifically, while the South constituted 35 percent of the United States population in 1994, it accounted for 43 percent of murders and 44 percent of aggravated assaults that were firearm-related (see Chart 5.2). In contrast to the Southern Region, the Northeast recorded a disproportionately low number of firearm-related murders and aggravated assaults, 15 percent and 10 percent, respectively. This region accounted for 20 percent of the Nation's population in 1994. The regional percent distribution for firearm-related robberies mirrored the Nation's population distribution percentages.

The Western and Midwestern Regions experienced the most consistency in their proportions of firearm-related murders, robberies, and aggravated assaults in 1994, as delineated in Chart 5.2. The percentage of the total was roughly the same for each crime category.

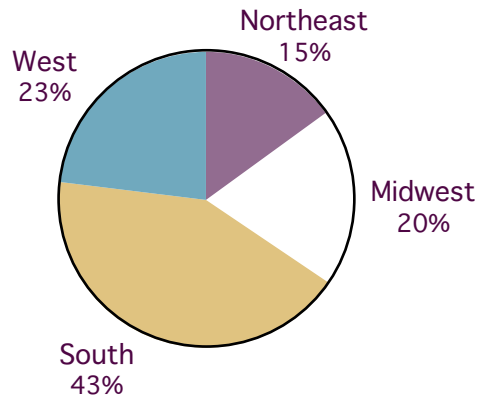

United States, 1994 over 1985**

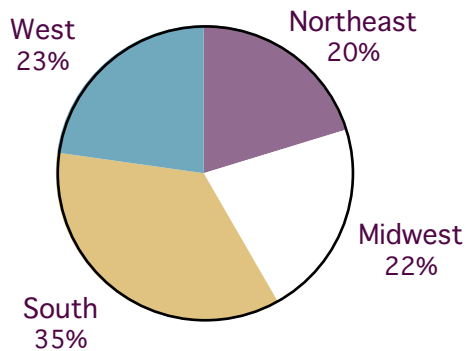

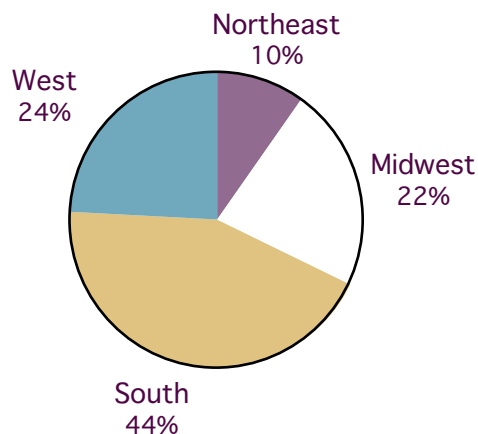
Distribution of Firearm Murders by Region, United States, 1994

SECTION VI

Law Enforcement Personnel

The Nation's law enforcement community employed an average of 2.4 full-time officers for every 1,000 inhabitants as of October 31, 1995. Including full-time civilians, the overall law enforcement employee rate was 3.3 per 1,000 inhabitants according to 13,052 city, county, and state police agencies reporting in 1995. These agencies collectively employed 586,756 officers and 226,780 civilians, giving law enforcement service to over 245 million U.S. inhabitants. A listing of reported full-time law enforcement officers and civilian employees by state is shown in Table 77.

Varying demographic and other characteristics greatly affect the requirements for law enforcement service from one locale to another. The needs of a community having a highly mobile or seasonal population, for example, may be very different from those of a city whose population is relatively stable. Similarly, a small community situated between two large cities may require a greater number of law enforcement personnel than a community of the same size which has no urban centers nearby.

The functions of law enforcement are also significantly diverse throughout the Nation. In certain areas, sheriffs' responsibilities are limited almost exclusively to civil functions and/or the administration of the county jail facilities. Likewise, the responsibilities of state police and highway patrol agencies vary from one jurisdiction to another.

In view of these differing responsibilities and service requirements, care should be used when attempting any comparison of law enforcement employee rates. The rates presented in the following tables represent national averages; they should be viewed as guides or indicators, not as recommended or desirable police strengths. Adequate personnel for a specific locale can be determined only after careful study and analysis of the various conditions affecting service requirements in that jurisdiction.

Nationwide, cities collectively reported an average of 3.0 law enforcement employees per 1,000 inhabitants in 1995. The highest average among the city population groupings, 3.9 employees per 1,000 population, was recorded in cities with over 250,000 inhabitants. Rural and suburban county law enforcement agencies averaged full-time law enforcement employee rates of 4.4 and 3.8 per 1,000 population, respectively. (See Table 74.)

Regionally, the law enforcement employee rate was 3.3 in the Northeast and in the South, 2.7 in the Midwest, and 2.5 in the West. (See Table 70.)

Sworn Personnel

Rates based solely on sworn law enforcement personnel (excluding civilians) showed the national average for all cities was 2.3 officers per 1,000 inhabitants. By city population grouping, the rates ranged from 1.8 for cities with populations of 25,000 to 99,999 to 3.1 in cities with 250,000 or more inhabitants. Suburban county law enforcement agencies averaged 2.4 officers per 1,000 population, while agencies in rural counties averaged 2.8. (See Table 71.)

Geographically, the highest rate of officers to population was recorded in the Northeastern States where there were 2.7 officers per 1,000 inhabitants. Following were the Southern States with 2.6, the Midwestern States with 2.2, and the Western States with 1.8.

Males comprised 90 percent of all sworn employees both nationally and in cities. Ninety-three percent of those in rural counties and 88 percent in suburban counties were males.

Civilian Employees

Civilians made up 28 percent of the total United States law enforcement employee force in 1995. They represented 22 percent of the police employees in cities, 36 percent in rural counties, and 38 percent of the suburban county law enforcement strength. Sixty-two percent of all civilian employees were females.

Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted

Seventy-four law enforcement officers were feloniously slain in the line of duty during 1995, 3 fewer than in 1994. Accidents occurring while performing official duties claimed the lives of an additional 53 officers in 1995. The 1995 total for officers accidentally killed was 9 lower than the 1994 total of 62.

Extensive data on line-of-duty deaths and assaults on city, county, state, and federal officers can be found in the Uniform Crime Reporting publication, *Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted*.

SECTION VII

APPENDIX I

Methodology

The information compiled by UCR contributors is forwarded to the FBI either directly from local law enforcement agencies or through state-level UCR Programs in 44 states and the District of Columbia. Agencies submitting directly to the FBI are provided continuing guidance and support on an individual basis.

State-level UCR Programs are very effective intermediaries between local contributors and the FBI. Many of the Programs have mandatory reporting requirements and collect data beyond the national UCR scope to address crime problems germane to their particular locales. In most cases, these agencies are also able to provide more direct and frequent service to participating law enforcement agencies, to make information more readily available for use at the state level, and to contribute to more streamlined operations at the national level.

With the development of a state UCR Program, the FBI ceases direct collection of data from individual law enforcement agencies within the state. Instead, information from local agencies is forwarded to the national Program through the state data collection agency.

The conditions under which these systems are developed ensure consistency and comparability in the data submitted to the national Program, as well as provide for regular and timely reporting of national crime data. These conditions are: (1) The state Program must conform to national Uniform Crime Reports' standards, definitions, and information requirements. The states are not, of course, prohibited from collecting other statistical data beyond the national requirements. (2) The state criminal justice agency must have a proven, effective, state-wide Program and have instituted acceptable quality control procedures. (3) Coverage within the state by a state agency must be, at least, equal to that attained by the national Uniform Crime Reports. (4) The state agency must have adequate field staff assigned to conduct audits and to assist contributing agencies in record practices and crime reporting procedures. (5) The state agency must furnish to the FBI all of the detailed data regularly collected by the FBI in the form of duplicate returns, computer printouts, and/or magnetic tapes. (6) The state agency must have the proven capability (tested over a period of time) to supply all the statistical data required in time to meet national Uniform Crime Reports' publication deadlines.

To fulfill its responsibilities in connection with the UCR Program, the FBI continues to edit and review individual agency

reports for both completeness and quality; has direct contact with individual contributors within the state when necessary in connection with crime reporting matters, coordinating such contact with the state agency; and upon request, conducts training programs within the state on law enforcement records and crime reporting procedures. Should circumstances develop whereby the state agency does not comply with the aforementioned requirements, the national Program may reinstitute a direct collection of Uniform Crime Reports from law enforcement agencies within the state.

Reporting Procedures

Based on records of all reports of crime received from victims, officers who discover infractions, or other sources, law enforcement agencies across the country tabulate the number of Crime Index or Part I offenses brought to their attention each month. Specifically, the crimes reported to the FBI are murder and nonnegligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson.

Whenever complaints of crime are determined through investigation to be unfounded or false, they are eliminated from an agency's count. The number of "actual offenses known" is reported to the FBI regardless of whether anyone is arrested for the crime, stolen property is recovered, or prosecution is undertaken.

Another integral part of the monthly submission is the total number of actual Crime Index offenses cleared. Crimes are "cleared" in one of two ways: (1) at least one person is arrested, charged, and turned over to the court for prosecution; or (2) by exceptional means when some element beyond law enforcement control precludes the arrest of an offender. Law enforcement agencies also report the number of Index crime clearances which involve only offenders under the age of 18; the value of property stolen and recovered in connection with the offenses; and detailed information pertaining to criminal homicide and arson.

In addition to its primary collection of Crime Index (Part I) offenses, the UCR Program solicits monthly data on persons arrested for all crimes except traffic violations. The age, sex, and race of arrestees are reported by crime category, both Part

I and Part II. Part II offenses include all crimes not classified as Part I.

Various data on law enforcement officers killed or assaulted are collected on a monthly basis. The number of full-time sworn and civilian personnel are reported as of October 31 each year.

Editing Procedures

Each report submitted to the UCR Program is thoroughly examined for arithmetical accuracy and for deviations which may indicate errors. To identify any unusual fluctuations in an agency's crime count, monthly reports are compared with previous submissions of the agency and with those for similar agencies. Large variations in crime levels may indicate modified records procedures, incomplete reporting, or changes in the jurisdiction's geopolitical structure.

Data reliability is a high priority of the Program and noted deviations or arithmetical adjustments are brought to the attention of the state UCR Program or the submitting agency through correspondence. A standard procedure of the FBI is to study the monthly reports and to evaluate periodic trends prepared for individual reporting units. Any significant increase or decrease is made the subject of a special inquiry. When it is found that changes in crime reporting procedures or annexations are influencing the level of crime, the figures for specific crime categories, or if necessary, totals are excluded from trend tabulations.

To assist contributors in complying with UCR standards, the national Program provides training seminars and instructional materials in crime reporting procedures. Throughout the country, liaison with state Programs and law enforcement personnel is maintained, and training sessions are held to explain the purpose of the Program, the rules of uniform classification and scoring, and the methods of assembling the information for reporting. When an individual agency has specific problems in compiling its crime statistics and remedial efforts are unsuccessful, FBI Headquarters' personnel may visit the contributor to aid in resolving the difficulties.

The *Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook*, which details procedures for classifying and scoring offenses, is supplied to all contributors as the basic resource document for preparing reports. Since a good records system is essential for accurate crime reporting, the FBI also furnishes the *Manual of Law Enforcement Records*.

To enhance communication among Program participants, letters to UCR contributors and State UCR Program "Bulletins" are utilized. They address Program policy, as well as present information and instructional material, and are produced as needed.

The final responsibility for data submissions rests with the individual contributing law enforcement agency. Although the Program makes every effort through its editing procedures, training practices, and correspondence to assure the validity of the data it receives, the statistics' accuracy depends primarily on the adherence of each contributor to the established standards of reporting. Deviations from these established standards which cannot be resolved by the national UCR Program may be brought to the attention of the Criminal Justice Information

Systems Committees of the International Association of Chiefs of Police and the National Sheriffs' Association.

NIBRS Conversion

Several states provided their UCR data in the expanded NIBRS format. For presentation in this book, NIBRS data were converted to the historical summary UCR formats. The NIBRS data base was constructed to allow for such conversion so that UCR's long-running time series could continue.

Offense Estimation

Tables 1 through 5 and 7 of this publication contain statistics for the entire United States. Because not all law enforcement agencies provide data for complete reporting periods, estimated crime counts are included in these presentations. Offense estimation occurs within each of three areas: Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), cities outside MSAs, and rural counties. Using the known crime experiences of similar areas within a state, the estimates are computed by assigning the same proportional crime volumes to nonreporting agencies. The size of agency; type of jurisdiction, e.g., police department versus sheriff's office; and geographic location are considered in the estimation process.

Because of efforts to convert to the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS), in recent years, it has become necessary to estimate totals for some states. Also, the inability of some state UCR Programs to provide forcible rape figures in accordance with UCR guidelines and other problems at the state-levels have required unique estimation procedures. A summary of state- and offense-specific estimation procedures are outlined below:

1985 through 1995—The Illinois (1985–1995), Michigan, and Minnesota (1993 only) state UCR Programs were unable to provide forcible rape figures in accordance with UCR guidelines. The rape totals were estimated using national rates per 100,000 inhabitants within the eight population groups and assigning the forcible rape volumes proportionally to each state.

1988 and 1991—Reporting problems at the state levels resulted in no usable data for Florida and Kentucky for 1988. In 1991, Iowa NIBRS conversion required estimation during the transition. State totals were estimated during these years by updating previous valid annual totals for individual jurisdictions, subdivided by population group. Percent changes for each offense within each population group of the geographic divisions in which the states reside were applied to the previous valid annual totals. The state totals were compiled from the sums of the population group estimates.

1993—NIBRS conversion efforts resulted in estimation for Kansas and Illinois. Kansas totals were estimated by updating previous valid annual totals for individual jurisdictions, subdivided by population group. Percent changes for each offense within each population group of the West North Central Division were applied to the previous valid annual totals. The state totals were compiled from the sums of the population group estimates.

Since valid annual totals were available for approximately 60 Illinois agencies, those counts were maintained. The counts

for the remaining jurisdictions were replaced with the most recent valid annual totals or were generated using standard estimation procedures. The results of all sources were then combined to arrive at the 1993 state total for Illinois.

1994—State totals for Kansas and Illinois, both undergoing NIBRS conversion, were generated using only the valid crime rates for the geographic division in which the state resides. Within each population group, each state's offense totals were estimated based on the rate per 100,000 inhabitants within the remainder of the division. Montana state totals were estimated by the same method as were Kansas state totals in 1993.

1995—The Kansas state-level UCR Program was able to provide valid 1994 state totals which were then updated using 1995 crime trends for the West North Central Division. Concerning Illinois, valid Crime Index counts were available for most of the largest cities. For other agencies, the only available counts were generated without application of the UCR Hierarchy Rule. (The Hierarchy Rule requires that only the most serious offense in a multiple-offense criminal incident is counted.) To arrive at a state estimate comparable to the rest of the Nation, the total supplied by the Illinois State Program (which was inflated because of the nonapplication of the Hierarchy Rule) was reduced by the proportion of multiple offenses reported within single incidents in the available NIBRS data. Valid totals for the large cities were excluded from the reduction process. Montana state estimates were computed by updating the previous valid annual totals using the 1994 versus 1995 percent changes for the Mountain States.

Crime Trends

Showing fluctuations from year to year, trend statistics offer the data user an added perspective from which to study crime. Percent change tabulations in this publication are computed only for reporting units which have provided comparable data for the periods under consideration. Exclusions from trend computations are made when figures from a reporting agency are not received for comparable timeframes or when it is ascertained that unusual fluctuations are due to such variables as improved records procedures, annexations, etc.

Care should be exercised in any direct comparison between data in this publication and those in prior issues of *Crime in the United States*. For example, upon receiving 1995 aggravated assault figures for the state of Kentucky, it was determined the 1994 aggravated assault figures previously submitted were not valid; therefore, the Kentucky aggravated assault figures are not included in Tables 12 through 15 of this edition. Also, 1994 estimates for Delaware, Kansas, and Kentucky were updated in certain offense categories. These updates are in the national trends.

Table Methodology

Although most law enforcement agencies submit crime reports to the UCR Program, data are sometimes not received for complete annual periods. To be included in this publication's Tables 8 through 11, showing specific jurisdictional statistics, figures for all 12 months of the current year must have been received at the FBI prior to established publication deadlines. Other tabular presentations are aggregated on varied levels of submission. Unless consisting of estimates for the total population of the United States, each table in this publication shows the number of agencies reporting and the extent of population coverage.

Designed to assist the reader, this appendix explains the construction of many of this book's tabular presentations. The following key refers to the columnar headings used throughout the appendix.

- Key: A) Column 1 shows the table numbers. Included are Tables 1 through 69, *Crime in the United States—1995*.
- B) Column 2 indicates the level of submission necessary for an agency's statistics to be included in a table.
- C) Column 3 explains how each table was constructed. Data adjustments, if any, are discussed along with various definitions of data aggregation.
- D) Column 4 contains general comments regarding the potential use and misuse of the statistics presented.

APPENDIX II

Offenses in Uniform Crime Reporting

Offenses in Uniform Crime Reporting are divided into two groupings, Part I and Part II. Information on the volume of Part I offenses known to law enforcement, those cleared by arrest or exceptional means, and the number of persons arrested is reported monthly. Only arrest data are reported for Part II offenses.

The Part I offenses are:

Criminal homicide.—a. Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter: the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are excluded. Justifiable homicides are limited to: (1) the killing of a felon by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty; and (2) the killing of a felon, during the commission of a felony, by a private citizen. b. Manslaughter by negligence: the killing of another person through gross negligence. Traffic fatalities are excluded. While manslaughter by negligence is a Part I crime, it is not included in the Crime Index.

Forcible rape.—The carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. Included are rapes by force and attempts or assaults to rape. Statutory offenses (no force used—victim under age of consent) are excluded.

Robbery.—The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated assault.—An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Simple assaults are excluded.

Burglary-breaking or entering.—The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Attempted forcible entry is included.

Larceny-theft (except motor vehicle theft).—The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles or automobile accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or the stealing of any property or article which is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, “con” games, forgery, worthless checks, etc., are excluded.

Motor vehicle theft.—The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is self-propelled and runs on the surface and not on rails. Specifically excluded from this category are motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment.

Arson.—Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

The Part II offenses are:

Other assaults (simple).—Assaults and attempted assaults where no weapon is used and which do not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

Forgery and counterfeiting.—Making, altering, uttering, or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false in the semblance of that which is true. Attempts are included.

Fraud.—Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Included are confidence games and bad checks, except forgeries and counterfeiting.

Embezzlement.—Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one’s care, custody, or control.

Stolen property; buying, receiving, possessing.—Buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, including attempts.

Vandalism.—Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

Weapons; carrying, possessing, etc.—All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers. Included are attempts.

Prostitution and commercialized vice.—Sex offenses of a commercialized nature, such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring, or transporting women for immoral purposes. Attempts are included.

Sex offenses (except forcible rape, prostitution, and commercialized vice).—Statutory rape and offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Attempts are included.

Drug abuse violations.—State and/or local offenses relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, and manufacturing of narcotic drugs. The following drug categories are specified: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics—manufactured narcotics that can cause true addiction (demerol, methadone); and dangerous nonnarcotic drugs (barbiturates, benzedrine).

Gambling.—Promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

Offenses against the family and children.—Nonsupport, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.

Driving under the influence.—Driving or operating any vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

Liquor laws.—State and/or local liquor law violations, except “drunkenness” and “driving under the influence.” Federal violations are excluded.

Drunkenness.—Offenses relating to drunkenness or intoxication. Excluded is “driving under the influence.”

Disorderly conduct.—Breach of the peace.

Vagrancy.—Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

All other offenses.—All violations of state and/or local laws, except those listed above and traffic offenses.

Suspicion.—No specific offense; suspect released without formal charges being placed.

Curfew and loitering laws (persons under age 18).—

Offenses relating to violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such laws exist.

Runaways (persons under age 18).—Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under provisions of local statutes.

APPENDIX III

Uniform Crime Reporting Area Definitions

The presentation of statistics by reporting area facilitates analyzing local crime counts in conjunction with those for areas of similar geographical location or population size. Geographically, the United States is divisible by regions, divisions, and states. Further breakdowns rely on population figures and proximity to metropolitan areas. As a general rule, sheriffs, county police, and state police report crimes committed within the limits of counties but outside cities, while local police report crimes committed within the city limits.

Community Types

UCR data are often presented in aggregations representing three types of communities:

1. Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs)—Each MSA includes a central city of at least 50,000 people or an urbanized area of at least 50,000. The county containing the central city and other contiguous counties having strong economic and social ties to the central city and county are also included. Counties in an MSA are designated “suburban” for UCR purposes. An MSA may cross state lines. The MSA concept facilitates the analysis and presentation of uniform statistical data on metropolitan areas by establishing reporting units which represent major population centers. Due to changes in the geographic composition of MSAs, no year-to-year comparisons of data for those areas should be attempted.

New England MSAs are comprised of cities and towns instead of counties. In this publication’s tabular presentations, New England cities and towns are assigned to the proper MSAs. Some counties, however, have both suburban and rural portions. Data for state police and sheriffs in those jurisdictions are included in statistics for the rural areas.

MSAs made up approximately 81 percent of the total U.S. population in 1995. Some presentations in this book refer to “suburban area.” A suburban area includes cities with less than 50,000 inhabitants in addition to counties (unincorporated areas) within the MSA. The central cities are, of course, excluded. The concept of suburban area is especially important because of the particular crime conditions which exist in the communities surrounding the Nation’s largest cities.

2. Cities Outside MSAs—Cities outside MSAs are mostly incorporated. They comprised 8 percent of the 1995 population of the United States.

3. Rural Counties Outside MSAs—Rural counties are comprised of mostly unincorporated areas. Law enforcement agencies in rural counties cover areas that are not under the jurisdiction of city police departments. Rural county law enforcement agencies served 11 percent of the national population in 1995.

The major source of UCR data is the individual law enforcement agency. The number of agencies which are

included in each population group will vary slightly from year to year due to population growth, geopolitical consolidation, municipal incorporation, etc. Population figures for individual jurisdictions are estimated by the UCR Program in noncensus years. In this year's publication, the state and national populations used are 1995 Bureau of the Census provisional estimates. Population figures for individual jurisdictions were updated by applying 1995 state growth rates to 1994 city and county estimates. The estimate of United States population showed a 1-percent increase from 1994 to 1995.

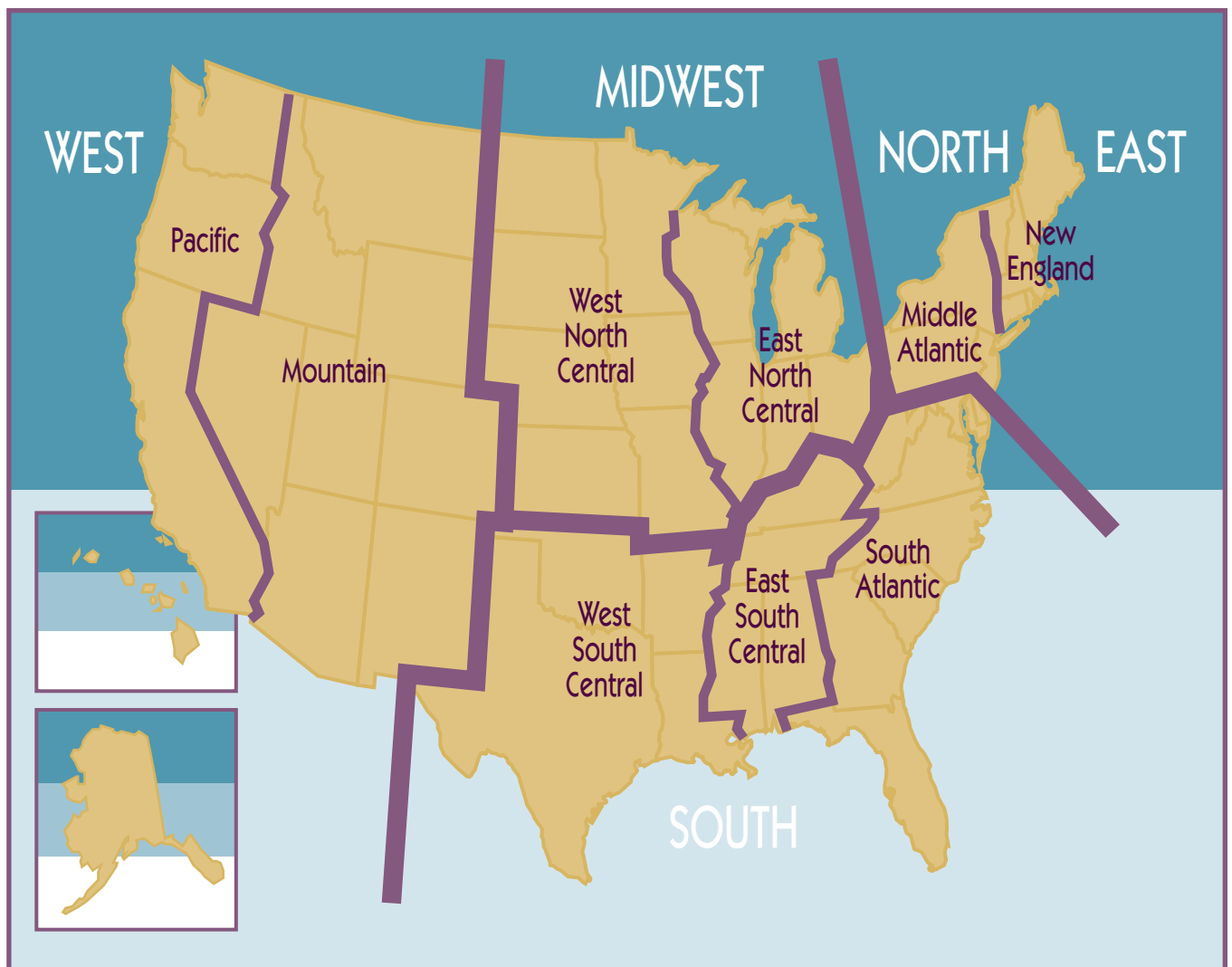

APPENDIX IV

The Nation's Two Crime Measures

The U.S. Department of Justice administers two statistical programs to measure the magnitude, nature, and impact of crime in the Nation: the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program and the National Crime Victimization Survey (NCVS). Each of these programs produces valuable information about aspects of the Nation's crime problem. Because the UCR and NCVS programs are conducted for different purposes, use different methods, and focus on somewhat different aspects of crime, the information they produce together provides a more comprehensive panorama of the Nation's crime problem than either could produce alone.

Uniform Crime Reports

The FBI's UCR Program, which began in 1929, collects information on the following crimes reported to law enforcement authorities: homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. Arrests are reported for 21 additional crime categories.

The UCR data are compiled from monthly law enforcement reports or individual crime incident records transmitted directly to the FBI or to centralized state agencies that then report to the FBI. Each report submitted to the UCR Program is examined thoroughly for reasonableness, accuracy, and deviations that may indicate errors. Large variations in crime levels may indicate modified records procedures, incomplete reporting, or changes in a jurisdiction's boundaries. To identify any unusual fluctuations in an agency's crime counts, monthly reports are compared with previous submissions of the agency and with those for similar agencies.

In 1995, law enforcement agencies active in the UCR Program represented approximately 251 million United States inhabitants—95 percent of the U.S. population.

The UCR Program provides crime counts for the Nation as a whole, as well as for regions, states, counties, cities, and towns. This permits studies among neighboring jurisdictions and among those with similar populations and other common characteristics.

UCR findings for each calendar year are published in a preliminary release in the spring, followed by a detailed annual report, *Crime in the United States*, issued in the following calendar year. In addition to crime counts and trends, this report includes data on crimes cleared, persons arrested (age, sex, and race), law enforcement personnel (including the number of sworn officers killed or assaulted), and the characteristics of homicides (including age, sex, and race of victims and offenders, victim-offender relationships, weapons used, and circumstances surrounding the homicides). Other special reports are also available from the UCR Program.

Following a 5-year redesign effort, the UCR Program is currently being converted to the more comprehensive and detailed National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). NIBRS will provide detailed information about each criminal incident in 22 broad categories of offenses.

National Crime Victimization Survey

The Bureau of Justice Statistics' NCVS, which began in 1973, provides a detailed picture of crime incidents, victims, and trends. After a substantial period of research, in 1993 the survey completed an intensive methodological redesign. The redesign was undertaken to improve the questions used to uncover crime, update the survey methods, and broaden the scope of crimes measured. The redesigned survey collects detailed information on the frequency and nature of the crimes of rape, sexual assault, personal robbery, aggravated and simple assault, household burglary, theft, and motor vehicle theft. It does not measure homicide or commercial crimes (such as burglaries of stores).

U.S. Census Bureau personnel interview all household members at least 12 years old in a nationally representative sample of approximately 49,000 households (about 101,000 persons). Households stay in the sample for 3 years and are interviewed at 6-month intervals. New households rotate into the sample on an ongoing basis.

The NCVS collects information on crimes suffered by individuals and households, whether or not those crimes were reported to law enforcement. It estimates the proportion of each crime type reported to law enforcement, and it summarizes the reasons that victims give for reporting or not reporting.

The survey provides information about victims (age, sex, race, ethnicity, marital status, income, and educational level), offenders (sex, race, approximate age, and victim-offender relationship), and the crimes (time and place of occurrence, use of weapons, nature of injury, and economic consequences). Questions also cover the experiences of victims with the criminal justice system, self-protective measures used by victims, and possible substance abuse by offenders. Supplements are added periodically to the survey to obtain detailed information on topics like school crime.

The first data from the redesigned NCVS were published in a BJS bulletin in June 1995. BJS publication of NCVS data includes *Criminal Victimization in the United States*, an annual report that covers the broad range of detailed information collected by the NCVS. BJS publishes detailed reports on topics such as crime against women, urban crime, and gun use in crime. The NCVS data files are archived at the National Archive

of Criminal Justice Data at the University of Michigan to enable researchers to perform independent analysis.

Comparing UCR and NCVS

Because the NCVS was designed to complement the UCR Program, the two programs share many similarities. As much as their different collection methods permit, the two measure the same subset of serious crimes, defined alike. Both programs cover rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft, and motor vehicle theft. Rape, robbery, theft, and motor vehicle theft are defined virtually identically by both the UCR and NCVS. (While rape is defined analogously, the UCR Crime Index measures the crime against women only, and the NCVS measures it against both sexes.)

There are also significant differences between the two programs. First, the two programs were created to serve different purposes. The UCR Program's primary objective is to provide a reliable set of criminal justice statistics for law enforcement administration, operation, and management. The NCVS was established to provide previously unavailable information about crime (including crime not reported to police), victims, and offenders.

Second, the two programs measure an overlapping but nonidentical set of crimes. The NCVS includes crimes both reported and not reported to law enforcement. The NCVS excludes, but the UCR includes, homicide, arson, commercial crimes, and crimes against children under age 12. The UCR captures crimes reported to law enforcement, but it excludes sexual assaults and simple assaults from the Crime Index.

Third, because of methodology, the NCVS and UCR definitions of some crimes differ. For example, the UCR defines burglary as the unlawful entry or attempted entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. The NCVS, not wanting to ask victims to ascertain offender motives, defines burglary as the entry or attempted entry of a residence by a person who had no right to be there.

Fourth, for property crimes (burglary, theft, and motor vehicle theft), the two programs calculate crime rates using different bases. The UCR rates for these crimes are per-capita (number of crimes per 100,000 persons), whereas the NCVS rates for these crimes are per-household (number of crimes per 1,000 households). Because the number of households may not grow at the same rate each year as the total population, trend data for rates of property crimes measured by the two programs may not be comparable.

In addition, some differences in the data from the two programs may result from sampling variation in the NCVS and

from estimating for nonresponse in the UCR. The NCVS estimates are derived from interviewing a sample and are therefore subject to a margin of error. Rigorous statistical methods are used to calculate confidence intervals around all survey estimates. Trend data in NCVS reports are described as genuine only if there is at least a 90 percent certainty that the measured changes are not the result of sampling variation. The UCR data are based on the actual counts of offenses reported by law enforcement jurisdictions. In some circumstances, UCR data are estimated for nonparticipating jurisdictions or those reporting partial data.

Each program has unique strengths. The UCR provides a measure of the number of crimes reported to law enforcement agencies throughout the country. The UCR's Supplementary Homicide Reports provide the most reliable, timely data on the extent and nature of homicides in the Nation. The NCVS is the primary source of information on the characteristics of criminal victimization and on the number and types of crimes not reported to law enforcement authorities.

By understanding the strengths and limitations of each program, it is possible to use the UCR and NCVS to achieve a greater understanding of crime trends and the nature of crime in the United States. For example, changes in police procedures, shifting attitudes towards crime and police, and other societal changes can affect the extent to which people report and law enforcement agencies record crime. NCVS and UCR data can be used in concert to explore why trends in reported and police-recorded crime may differ.

Apparent discrepancies between statistics from the two programs can usually be accounted for by their definitional and procedural differences or resolved by comparing NCVS sampling variations (confidence intervals) of those crimes said to have been reported to police with UCR statistics.

For most types of crimes measured by both the UCR and NCVS, analysts familiar with the programs can exclude from analysis those aspects of crime not common to both. Resulting long-term trend lines can be brought into close concordance. The impact of such adjustments is most striking for robbery, burglary, and motor vehicle theft, whose definitions most closely coincide.

With robbery, annual victimization rates based only on NCVS robberies reported to the police are possible. It is also possible to remove from analysis UCR robberies of commercial establishments such as gas stations, convenience stores, and banks. When the resulting NCVS police reported robbery rates are compared to UCR non-commercial robbery rates, the results reveal closely corresponding long-term trends.
