### \*\* Time Warner Plans Online News \*\*

An interactive news-on-demand service enabling users to choose and control the content, length and order of their news programming is in the works by Time Warner Inc. Time Warner said this week the service will be first offered late next year to customers at Time Warner's Orlando, Fla., interactive services experiment, the Full Service Network.

Reports say the new service is to use the resources of the company's Time Inc. publishing unit and New York 1 News, its 24-hour New York City cable news service. It will be run by Walter Isaacson, currently Time Magazine's assistant managing editor, who will become editor of new media for Time Inc. and president of News-On-Demand; and Paul Sagan, who will become senior vice president of Time Warner Cable Programming Inc.

The new service will include local, world and national news, business and finance, sports, reviews, health news and weather.

### \*\* Intel Hopes to Set Video Conferencing Standard \*\*

An Intel Corp. executive said this week that the firm hopes its new Indeo technology will set the standard for PC-based video conferencing.

Richard Pierce, marketing manager for Indeo, told attendees at the Piper Jaffray conference in New York that the purpose of Indeo is to develop an open systems architecture in the newly emerging PC-based video conferencing market.

"We care about desktop video publishing because it is something that will truly drive growth in PCs," Pierce said. "Our strategy is to drive the standards," in what is a nascent industry of PC-based video conferencing.

### \*\* Matsushita Sends 30,000 Game Machines to U.S. Each Month \*\*

Matsushita Electric Industrial Co. says it has been exporting its \$700 Real Multimedia Game Machine, using 3DO Co.'s technology, at a monthly rate of some 30,000 units since its debut last month.

Reports say the firm plans to put the machine on the Japanese and European markets next spring.

The machine is equipped with a 32-bit RISC (reduced instruction command set) chip. Besides games, it also can run multimedia software such as educational software and photo compact discs on a television screen.

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**\*\* Logitech to Market 'Eraser Head' Pointing Device \*\***

Logitech Inc. says it has signed a letter of intent with Interlink Electronics of Camarillo, Calif., to distribute new pointing sticks based on Force Sensing Resistor (FSR) technology. The agreement will allow Logitech to exclusively market compact pointing devices with roughly the same diameter as a pencil eraser, residing on or near a computer keyboard.

Similar to the device found on the IBM ThinkPad keyboard, Logitech notes that pointing sticks based on FSR provide an extremely convenient, highly accessible and cost effective means of pointing.

Logitech says it intends to market FSR pointing sticks to keyboard manufacturers and notebook and desktop system manufacturers.

**\*\* IBM Being Sued by Woman Engineer \*\***

IBM has been sued by one of its engineers who says her bosses forced her to have sex with a Pentagon official so IBM could get millions of dollars in government funding.

Veronica Gunther, 35 years old, alleges superiors threatened to fire her in 1991 and 1992 unless she maintained a sexual relationship with Gary Denman, director of the Pentagon's ARPA (Advanced Research Projects Agency).

Reports say the named defendants in the state court suit, which seeks unspecified damages, were IBM and two of Gunther's managers, Ray Blonn and Nancy Green.

IBM spokesman Scott Brooks said the company doesn't comment on pending litigation and ARPA spokeswoman Jan Walker also declined to comment.

**\*\* Windows Shipments Pass 40 Million Mark \*\***

Microsoft Corp. reports that shipments of its Windows operating system has passed the 40 million unit mark.

The Redmond, Wash.-based software publisher claims that Windows has been responsible for the founding of more than 500 new companies and for the direct creation of more than 17,300 jobs outside of Microsoft. It notes that Microsoft Windows has been responsible for the creation of at least \$280 million in annual revenues for new small companies and for more than \$1.3 billion in incremental revenue for existing small companies.

Microsoft reports that more than 16,000 software companies throughout the U.S. now develop Windows-based software. These companies expect their revenues to increase by 35 percent next year, and they expect Windows based products to account for at least half of their total revenues, says Microsoft.

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**\*\* Dell Offers Pentium PC \*\***

Dell Computer Corp. says its new Pentium-based Dimension XPS P60 computer will start at \$2,999, including a super VGA color monitor. The company said it will start shipping it later this month, with availability in Canada by Dec. 1. Dell also says it now offers factory installation of IBM's OS/2.1 operating system on its PCs.

**\*\* Apple's IBM-Compatible Unit Unveiled at Comdex \*\***

Apple Computer Inc. has used the world platform of the Comdex trade show in Las Vegas to unveil its new IBM-compatible Macintosh computer.

Reports say the Macintosh Quadra 6100, DOS Compatible version, includes both a Motorola Corp. 68LC040 microprocessor to handle Mac programs and an Intel Corp. 486SX chip to run Microsoft Corp.'s IBM-compatible Windows and DOS software.

Vice President Ian Diery of Apple's personal computer division said the system will be marketed to home office users and small businesses, adding, "We don't want compatibility to be an issue for our customers. By developing its most compatible personal computer, Apple intends to provide its users with all of the advantages of the Macintosh platform while protecting their investment in DOS and Windows-based software."

Apple said it will charge less than \$500 over the price of its low end Quadra 610 for the new machine, meaning it will probably retail for under \$2,000. It also said it will sell a DOS Compatibility Card to upgrade the Quadra 610 and Centris 610 for less than \$500.

Officials with Apple did not say how soon it will begin selling the new machine.

**\*\* Megahertz Reaches Apple Deal \*\***

Megahertz Corp. has reached a long-term agreement with Apple Computer Inc. to market a Megahertz-produced PCMCIA modem with XJACK for use with the Newton MessagePad.

The credit-card size modem slides into the Newton's PCMCIA slot and consumes very little power. Megahertz says Apple will begin shipping the Newton Fax Modem Card with XJACK later this month through its authorized Newton distribution channels.

**\*\* Power PC Newsletter Debuts \*\***

Macworld Communications Inc. has announced the launch of Power PC World, a newsletter dedicated to Power PC computing.

The San Francisco-based company says the monthly standalone newsletter is dedicated to providing IS managers and volume buyers of Macintosh

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products detailed, up-to-date information, advice and guidance on Power PC technology and the transition to RISC-based computing. Power PC is a new computer platform based on the Power PC microprocessor jointly developed by Apple Computer, IBM and Motorola.

"The Power PC microprocessor family offers the next big leap in performance and will provide the basis for the popularization of exciting new technologies and applications," said Adrian Mello, editor of Power PC World, and editor-in-chief of Macworld magazine. "The transition to Power PC is Apple's most important challenge since the introduction of the Macintosh, 10 years ago."

The premiere issue's topics include: "Power PC -- The Future of the Macintosh," "Navigating the Power PC Upgrade Path" and "Power PC Development Tools."

**\*\* Apple Computers Will Never Again be Priced Above Market \*\***

Apple Computer Inc. chief executive officer Michael Spindler said the firm will never again price its products above the market, although it will maintain its role as a technology innovator.

Spindler said Apple will accelerate delivery of products across many computing platforms, including Microsoft Corp.'s Windows operating software.

But he said the key to Apple's strategy was to "aggressively" price computers and software.

"We will not as an industry leader price technology too high -- ever again," said Spindler.

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**» Compton's claim over multimedia «**

LAS VEGAS, NEVADA, U.S.A., 1993 NOV 17 (NB) -- Does anyone own multimedia? Compton's New Media, a wholly owned subsidiary of Tribune Publishing, claims it does and it has the patent to prove it.

According to the company, anyone selling information in a multimedia format will need to pay license fees to Compton's no matter what the device used to distribute multimedia. Company officials say interactive television services like those announced by Time Warner and GTE, graphical on-line services such as America Online and Prodigy, and compact disc read-only memory (CD-ROM) title developers will all be obligated to pay or face legal action.

The US Patent Number is 5,241,671 titled: "Multimedia Search System Using A Plurality Of Entry Path Means Which Indicate Inter-relatedness Of Information." The patent was issued on August 31, 1993, and describes the technology as: "A database search system that retrieves multimedia

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information in a flexible, user friendly system. The search system uses a multimedia database consisting of text, picture, audio, and animated data. That database is searched through multiple graphical and textual entry paths."

Compton's was purchased by Tribune around the time the patent was issued. When asked why wait so long to make the patent announcement, Norm Bastine, executive vice president and general manager of Compton's said the company wanted to complete the sale first.

Tribune Publishing describes itself as an information and entertainment company with six daily newspapers, seven television, and six radio stations, as well as offering syndicated information and programming to a variety of print, electronic, and broadcast media.

The announcement has angered a variety of multimedia developers, some of whom claim they developed the same technology before Compton's development of its multimedia encyclopedia, on which the patent is based. Brower Murphy of The Library Corporation in Inwood, West Virginia, claims he was using similar technology in 1984.

Bastine says Compton's should be compensated for its "pioneering work" which it submitted for patent in the mid- 1980's and was granted patent pending status in 1989.

Four ways were enumerated for the licensing: one percent of the net profits, rising to three percent for those who do not comply by June 30, 1994; a strategic licensing agreement; distribution of multimedia information which it will buy for resale at a 65 percent discount; or purchase of a Compton's tool set for title development with accompanying run-time fees for distribution.

This program converts the ImageFX storage buffer to Hewlett Packard 'GROBS.' GROBs (Graphic Objects) are the memory storage format for the HP48 series calculators. An image, once in this form, can be downloaded onto a HP48 calculator, and displayed at will on the LCD screen. This allows one to create diagrams, graphics, or just view

your favorite \*.gif (1 plane only) on any HP48 calculator.

Both uuIn and uuOut are very rapid uuencode/decoders. They beat anything currently available on aminet by a good margin, especially on decoding.

The usual set of features are supported, along with automatic file splitting for the encoder and automatic non-data lines stripping for the decoder (things like e-mail or net-news headers, personal comments, etc).

---

Both programs are pure so that they may be made resident.

A uuencoding utility is used to prepare binary files for transmission over text-only channels like e-mail and net-news. Each triplet of bytes is replaced by four ASCII characters, producing a file that looks like a lot of uppercase and punctuation garbage. A uudecoder can then decode this ASCII into the original binary file. Check out the \*.binary.\* newsgroups for examples of uuencoded files.

#### INSTALLATION

Drag the program drawer from the floppy to a hard drive partition. To get automatic startup, drag the special project icon to your WBStartup drawer and manually edit the icon tooltype with the correct AmigaDOS path to find the program. Under AmigaDOS 1.x, you add `aline` to your startup-sequence and add `req.library` to your LIBS: directory.

#### GENERAL INTERFACE

Time Tracker is a multiple window program that can open on the Workbench or on a custom screen. When run, it pops up its calendar window, or you can set it to start iconified with or without a digital style clock. It uses the AmigaDOS 2.x 3D-style buttons for its calendar days and other uses.

Unfortunately the program has the Topaz font hard-coded into its interface. I'd prefer it to use either my default screen font or my default system font (Times 11, Courier 13) for its text. When Time Tracker is opened on the Workbench screen, its title bar and menus are in my default screen font (Times 11). When opened on its own custom screen, it uses my system default font (Courier 13) for its screen title and window title bars and menu texts. The gadgets' texts always remain in topaz.font. I would prefer this to be consistent, and preferably user-configurable. The program would look more professional if the Day buttons matched my Workbench font or used a prettier font like Helvetica.

Time Tracker is unaware of public screens (AmigaDOS 2.0 and up). Other programs cannot easily open on the Time Tracker screen, and the Time Tracker windows cannot open on a named public screen. These are general faults of programs written for AmigaDOS 1.x. Perhaps a newer version of Time Tracker will be enhanced for later versions of AmigaDOS.

One slightly quirky thing about the interface is that some of the windows are available by way of button gadgets at the bottom of the calendar window, and some through menu items in the calendar's 'other' menu. I think they should be available by both methods. The Icon button at the bottom is also redundant since it performs the same thing as the window's close gadget does. While there is a button gadget for help in the calendar window, the program does not respond to the keyboard 'help' key. Also the help gadget only puts a text help on top of the calendar display. I'd like it to pop up a separate window with

---



AmigaGuide help.

The menu layout does not follow the Amiga User Interface Style Guide. The menus do have many shortcut keys, using an unusual combination of both upper and lower-case shortcut keys. Unfortunately, the shortcut keys are not always consistent between the various windows of the program, sometimes leading to confusion for this user.

#### CALENDAR AND APPOINTMENT REMINDER

From the calendar window, you can click on a Day button to pop up that day's schedule window and add an event. Once you add an event to the calendar, the button for that date gets a highlight added to the right side of its button. A small horizontal line appears relative to the time of the appointment, with earlier events being towards the top and later ones toward the bottom of this highlighted section.

With the pre-marked Alarm times for non-repeating events you can add events for times on the hour or half hour between 8:00am and 5:30pm. You can enter any time you wish; but if your schedule is quite different, you may wish that the preset times listed would either go 24-hours or be user configurable.

Below the preset times is a subsection for writing notes about the day. A short note can be added to a given date's button on the calendar window by typing an exclamation point before the alarm text. The alarm text will be spoken, if you have the appropriate speak-handler software installed from AmigaDOS 1.3 or 2.04, or it will use the standard AmigaDOS "display beep" function. I would prefer to have the addition of using multiple sampled sounds instead of one display-beep. Alarms can also launch AmigaDOS programs if you precede the command with a "^" character. The programs do not inherit Workbench's search path. They can only find C: and "Current\_Dir". You could work around the display beep limitation by using an outboard AmigaDOS program which can play a sample. You must specify the commands full path such as "SYS:mybin/play8svx".

ARexx is not supported by the alarm, nor the rest of the program.

Adding repeating events is handled one of two ways. The first way is for 'every month on this day' type of events which you add by way of a requester, and a user-defined abbreviation of up to four characters appears on the calendar day. The second way uses an editor window where you type 'first Sunday of every month' or similar verbose descriptions. This allows for such things as 'every Wednesday' or 'odd Thursday'. Unfortunately, you can't enter 'the Wednesday after the third Sunday'. I'd need this for one of my user group meetings. I was also unable to enter 'last weekday of every month: Pay day!'. I'd like to see more flexibility here.

It would be a welcome addition if you could choose images to appear on the day button for a given event, such as a dollar symbol for paying someone or a telephone for reminders to call someone. This would probably require a less cluttered view such as a 'view by week' instead of the current monthly format.

---

The 'Tickler' button gives you a preview of the next seven days' events. The Monthly summary gives a listing of all the month's entered events. Both of these are editor windows and you can delete all the lines that you feel are unimportant. I think the event editor should have a line option so you can exclude events from the monthly summary at the time you enter them. I plan to use the monthly summary for work related reports. You can print either of these out. You can only have one or the other open at a time as they use the same window. I'd like to have two separate windows instead.

#### TO DO LIST MANAGER

The To Do List manager opens up with a blank text editor window. You can select from one of three lists. To enter an item, you simply click and start typing. To show that you have finished an item, you press Shift and click on the left mouse button with the cursor on the line you wish to check off. It then displays a copyright symbol in front of the line. I think this interface, while usable, is not intuitive. A 2 column arrangement with the first column having some sort of GUI selection for, say, a check mark and other visual queues for such things as priority (How important is this To Do item?) would make this much more appealing to use.

After an item is completed, you can have the program transfer that information to the Calendar's Day Note's subsection. This is useful for preparing a monthly report. I think that at least one of the To Do lists should be configured to do this transfer automatically. The others should have it as an option. I would like this subsection of Time Tracker to have more than 3 lists. I'd like to be able to name such lists things like 'Work', 'Home', 'User Group', 'Amiga', etc. Of course you can currently just add such headings as Text to the current 3 lists.

There is an option to print To Do lists, and the manual suggests you precede your items with the "[" characters so you have something to check off. I think this should be added automatically and save time.

#### ADDRESS BOOK

The Address Book features 2 lists -- Business and Personal. I'd like to have more lists such as: Family, CoWorkers, BBSes, Clients, and Suppliers. There is a listview gadget on the left side of the window for finding your entered items. To enter an item you click on the 'New' button and start filling in the various string gadgets. There are 2 phone number entry gadgets. One is for phone and one is for FAX. I could use more phone entry gadgets for things like home phone as well as business phone numbers, or multiple extensions at a place of business to try to reach someone.

There is a gadget to have your modem dial the number in the string gadget. There are the standard fields for street address, city, state, Zip Code, country, and additional notes. I'd also like to have multiple addresses per entry. For business use, this could be address

---

for billing, and address for shipping. For personal use, this could be home address and work address. There are options to print from here, but I haven't had time to evaluate that -- yet.

#### CALL NOTES AND NOTEPAD

The Notepad is a basic text editor. By default, it opens the last opened file, usually 'Call Notes'. I think that since there is a menu item for editing 'Call Notes', The Notepad should have its own default file, so the user doesn't have to select 'New file' or 'Open File...' every time they start the Notepad. Unfortunately, you can only have one of these editor windows open at a time.

The editor has some quick menu shortcuts for things like Enter Date, Enter Time, Enter Calculator Answer, etc. It does not support drag-select, nor does it use the standard AmigaDOS Clipboard, so I can't copy text from TurboText to the NotePad, nor copy an address to a letter I'm writing in Final Copy.

While there is word wrap, there are no options for using non-default fonts or any styles such as bold or italic. There is a separate 'Call Notes' editor which you can access from the phone book, by way of a gadget next to the phone number. I think the 'edit call notes' should not run the Notepad; instead, it should call this a editor with the timer turned off and an option to turn it on if appropriate. This would keep the call notes separated from the Notepad, which is how they belong in my opinion. This separate Call Notes editor automatically time stamps your entry and starts a timer to let you know how long you've been on the phone. This is good for keeping track of what you talked about on the phone. It has the same basic feature set of the Notepad with the addition of the 2D analog clock style timer on the left side of the editor window. A prettier LCD type of display, or a 3D-style clock, would enhance its appearance. A settable alarm for how long you want to talk would also make a welcome addition.

#### CALCULATOR AND PUZZLE

The calculator is a separate window with 2.x style buttons and a visible paper tape to let you see your previous calculations. It responds to the numeric keypad just like the standard Workbench calculator. Its main additional features are memories, square root, and percentage functions. While you can paste to other Time Tracker editors, this calculator does not support the Amiga clipboard and thus external programs.

The included puzzle is a separate window with 3D-style buttons, each containing a number from 1 through 15 which are shuffled. The object is to put the numbers back into appropriate order by clicking on the piece you wish to move to the empty spot in the puzzle. Just something to waste time while you are waiting for someone to answer the phone.

#### DOCUMENTATION

---

The program comes with 74 page manual + 1 page addendum for AmigaDOS 2.x and above users, explaining the WBStartup installation. The manual's binding cuts off some of the printed text so that it can be difficult to read. The print quality of the text and graphics is also of poor quality, also hindering its ease of use. Once you get past that, the manual reads well and provides a useful reference for the program. It starts out with a tutorial, for those in a hurry. The manual then provides supplemental information and examples to help you to use the program well.

#### LIKES AND DISLIKES

I like the basic functionality of the program and the 3D-style gadgets.

I dislike the hard coded topaz.font, and think the program could sell better if were written for AmigaDOS 2.x and above and used prettier fonts. I almost declined to purchase the program when I saw the screen shots on the box.

I'd like to see some more features added:

- support of the AmigaDOS clipboard.
- ability to send and receive ARexx commands.
- support of AmigaDOS 2.x public screens.
- ability to resize the calendar, address book, and puzzle windows.
- alternate views for calendar (by month, by week, by year).
- additional visual cues for events in the calendar.
- user configurability of the default times listed in the event editor.
- more and user titled To Do lists, with their own separate windows.
- a more intuitive To Do List interface, with additional items like priorities.
- more fields in the address book.
- ability to print out in fonts other than the printer defaults.
- a font sensitive interface.

#### COMPARISON TO OTHER SIMILAR PRODUCTS

I had previously purchased versions of Who!What!When!Where! and Nag Plus, only to find their AmigaDOS 1.3 style interfaces reduced my desire to use them. Time Tracker does have an AmigaDOS 2.x style to match my Workbench. I don't have enough experience with these or the various shareware packages to make any detailed comments here. The shareware packages I have taken a cursory glance at either had similar misfeatures or a less attractive interface, in my opinion.

#### BUGS

I didn't find any bugs.

---

## VENDOR SUPPORT

The registration card had a stamp on it, suggesting the company wishes to keep track of their customers. The technical support phone number is listed as being available only on Wednesdays 9am-4pm Mountain Time.

## CONCLUSIONS

Overall, I have mixed reactions to this program. It has much of the functionality I require and will use. I think the program could be greatly enhanced to be both more functional and attractive. I'm glad I have something to use today. I'd like something better to use tomorrow. I think the author should consider a rewrite with AmigaDOS 2.04 as a minimal platform, using more up to date things like clipboard support, ARexx support, AmigaGuide help, an Installer script, and a font sensitive interface. The program is quite useful, but could be even more so, with further development.

## 1.20 Windows 4.0 'Chicago' News

The next major release of Windows will bear little visual resemblance to Windows 3.1. Windows 4.0, code named "Chicago," entered pre-beta testing in September, with shipment of an experimental version to more than one hundred testers.

The user interface is based on version 2.0 of Microsoft's OLE (Object linking and embedding) technology, and resembles the Macintosh desktop more than it does Windows 3.1. In addition, it behaves very much like the OS.2 Workplace shell.

Instead of Windows discrete File Manager, there's a Macintosh-style desktop with folders and icons. Some folders are analogous to Windows 3.1 File Manager groups. Other folders, like Windows 3.1 File Manager folders, represent disk directories. Still other folders and icons represent a new level of abstraction.. All networking, for instance, is accessed through a world-globe icon that opens to a folder full of network icons. Double clicking on one of the network icons opens up a folder showing servers. Double-clicking on a server icon opens a folder of shared resources, and so on.

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DOS is gone completely; underneath the new user interface beats a completely new, 32-bit multitasking, multithreaded heart. The Chicago kernel demands substantially less overhead than it's distant cousin Windows NT, and executes easily in just 8mb of RAM. Opinion varies on the probably RAM requirements for a shipping version. Some say as little as 4mb, but others wonder what may be left out to achieve such a lean package.

Virtually all DOS and 16-bit Windows programs run from Chicago; It's possible to execute Windows 3.1 itself from a Chicago command-line prompt, and Chicago runs most Windows NT Programs.

Still, Chicago is not NT Lite. Clearly, it's feature set bespeaks a nearly ideal network client (and standalone desktop) operating system. Chicago has many of OS/2's advantages, yet preserves commonality with its ancestors. It doesn't make programmers -- or users -- choose between Windows and an incompatible 32-bit model. Yet it has 32-bit performance like Windows NT, and might actually share drivers with NT. It's disk performance is so strong that we suspect Chicago is using some of NT's impressive virtual memory disk caching technology as well. It's capable of offering all this without requiring outrageous amounts of RAM in a desktop system. It provides outstanding DOS and Windows application compatibility while providing true pre-emptive multitasking and multithreading.

The precise packaging MS will pursue with Chicago isn't clear as we go to press. The pre-beta version now in limited distribution includes Windows for Workgroups-style peer-to-peer resource sharing. Whether it will be included with the Basic Chicago product was unclear at press time.

The pre-release version of Chicago is remarkably polished (some say it's more stable than the late betas of Windows NT were), leading to speculation that MS might be aiming for an early 1994 release. But at MS's ODBC developers conference, VP Mike Maples reiterated MS's intent to ship Chicago in the Summer of 1994.

It looks like I have considerably more to write about this week than I did last. So I'll get right to it.

First off, I'd like to announce that I have upgraded my system. I've now got an A3000/25 with 2 chip/8 fast megs and a 1950 monitor. Bad part? In upgrading, I had to sell off my 286 bridgeboard, so any IBM work I do is solely on PC-Task (and let me tell you, I won't be doing much...) But next week I will have my preliminary benchmark reports, and if any of the people interested in doing marks on even faster systems would return my mail, I'll send them up my benchmark package.

General alert:

As if we've never heard Commodore rumors before...but now, since they've released their quarter report, the alarms are going off again. I believe I've suggested a good course of action for them, and from what Jim Drew at UU has told me, it was being followed (not because I suggested it, but...) I had proposed an Amiga/emulation bundle long ago, and I was told that there was going to be a 4000/Emplant bundle coming up. I haven't heard any more news on it, but I hope it's coming. Good thing, too, because if you read last week's Amiga Report, you would have seen the report of an upcoming Mac Centris system which comes built-in ready to run cross-platform (Mac System and DOS/Windows) software...the report seemed to imply that the three would not run simultaneously, at best in a "wait-state", activated by hotkeys. What better time would it be for Commodore to turn around and announce a TRIPLE platform system, capable of Mac System 7.x, Windows 3.x, and Workbench 3.x? Shut Apple up, get them off their high horse, and present a major threat to EVERYONE in the industry.

My congratulations go out to ALL emulation manufacturers throughout the years. They have, in the vast majority, made their emulators into very good

investments for an Amiga owner. Now it is time for emulation to become more. It must become the reason to buy an Amiga. Not to wait for a Centris "DOS Compatible" system, not to wait for a PowerPC computer (I find it VERY, VERY interesting that Apple would release a cross-platform system with PowerPC allegedly so close. Maybe it's not nearly as useful as we've been lead to believe?), to buy an Amiga TODAY. NOW, dammit.

While I currently am a backer of Emplant and anxiously await my evaluation board, it seems that ReadySoft is about to step back into the picture and release A-Max IV. This has been confusing me for about a month, as the rumors have flown...since I don't remember a III ever existing. At any rate, here's what ReadySoft purports:

Runs Apple System 7.0, 7.1, 32-bit QuickDraw, QuickTime, AppleScript and other Apple system software, with your Mac 128K ROMs.  
-Stop right here. 128k ROMs, eh? ReadySoft must have done some SERIOUS patching in order to make 128k ROMs act like 256k ROMs.

Supports Mac color applications running on multiple display devices forming a virtual Mac desktop. Display devices can be several Amiga ECS or AGA autoscroll (any size) screens (up to 256 color), and displays on third-party video cards such as the Picasso II, Retina, EGS and others, up to 24-bits per pixel. Multiple displays are configured with the Mac "Monitors" control panel which allows the displays' relative position and number of colors to be set.

Addresses up to 2Gb of RAM, with a 32-bit clean memory manager that allows Mac application memory to be dynamically allocated from AmigaDOS as programs are launched from the Finder. A memory management unit (MMU) is no longer necessary to address 32-bit RAM.

Multitasks with AmigaDOS and Amiga applications, and uses standard Amiga System 2.1 or 3.x device drivers to control hard drives on any controller, floppies, serial and parallel ports (including ports on third party devices). There are no longer any A-Max hard disk drivers required nor any limit on the number of partitions or the number of controllers to be accessed.

Many, many thanks goes to Bob Caron for making the mailing list available in the past...through his help we were able to reach a larger audience, and now I wish to thank Portal Communications for letting us use their facilities to distribute Amiga Report. We would have lost the abilities to distribute Amiga Report to over 300 sites without their help!

This week we also have the "Great Amiga Report Questionnaire". If you all could please take just a little bit of your time and answer these question, and then send it back to me it would be fantastic. Basically we want to find out a little bit about you...the Amiga User. What do you have, what are you using the Amiga for, what would you like to see. We'll have the results of the survey and put it in our last issue of Amiga Report for this year.

On other fronts....

I talked to Supra Corporation the other day, and asked them a few questions on what we might be seeing from them in the near future.

My first question was about the V.Fast (Vee Dot Fast) standard, and if they were planning on adding this to their line of modems.

The answer was yes ....but.... since the commitee that is setting up the standard is not quite finished, it will still be a while...we will not probably see it until the fall of 1994 or later. But Supra is planning on creating a modem using an interim standard. It which should work and act much like the final V.Fast will. The expect to have this out somewhere in the spring or late summer.

Will there be voice compatabilities for the Amiga using a Supra?  
Well ...he said "YES". They have brought this out for the MacIntosh already, and he said that they will have it and it will be available in conjunction with the MS-DOS version or shortly thereafter. He wasn't able to give a specific time frame.

The last question I had was about the possibility for an internal 14.4 baud modem. The answer on that was a pretty big "No". He stated that on the internal 2400 baud modems (the 2400zi and 2400zi plus), they sold poorly. So poorly in fact that they sold more HD controllers and hard drives than they ever did the internal 2400 ...by a huge margin. He said that the only way they might even concider creating an internal 14.4 is if CBM changed their outlook on how to market

the Amiga and help create a larger user base.

Kinda sad, but I can't blame them.

Did any of you read Mike Royko's (Chicago Tribune) article on the internet...well, he gave an account of what it's like for a newcomer. From his accounts, it sounds like his host was Delphi...although I can't be sure here, but I would bet on it :)

Anyways, he talks about his introduction to the Internet as only he can describe ...the strange things he comes across, like World-Wide-Web, Gopher, Archie, and Veronica. Which sounds kinda like Bill Murray meeting the comics in Charlotte's web (Huh!??). He kind of understood and talked about the things we all see on our first encounter ...and the challenge we all face to overcome the first Internet hurdle. It may all be new to us, but I have a feeling that soon our children will be learning about all of this in school. Good!
