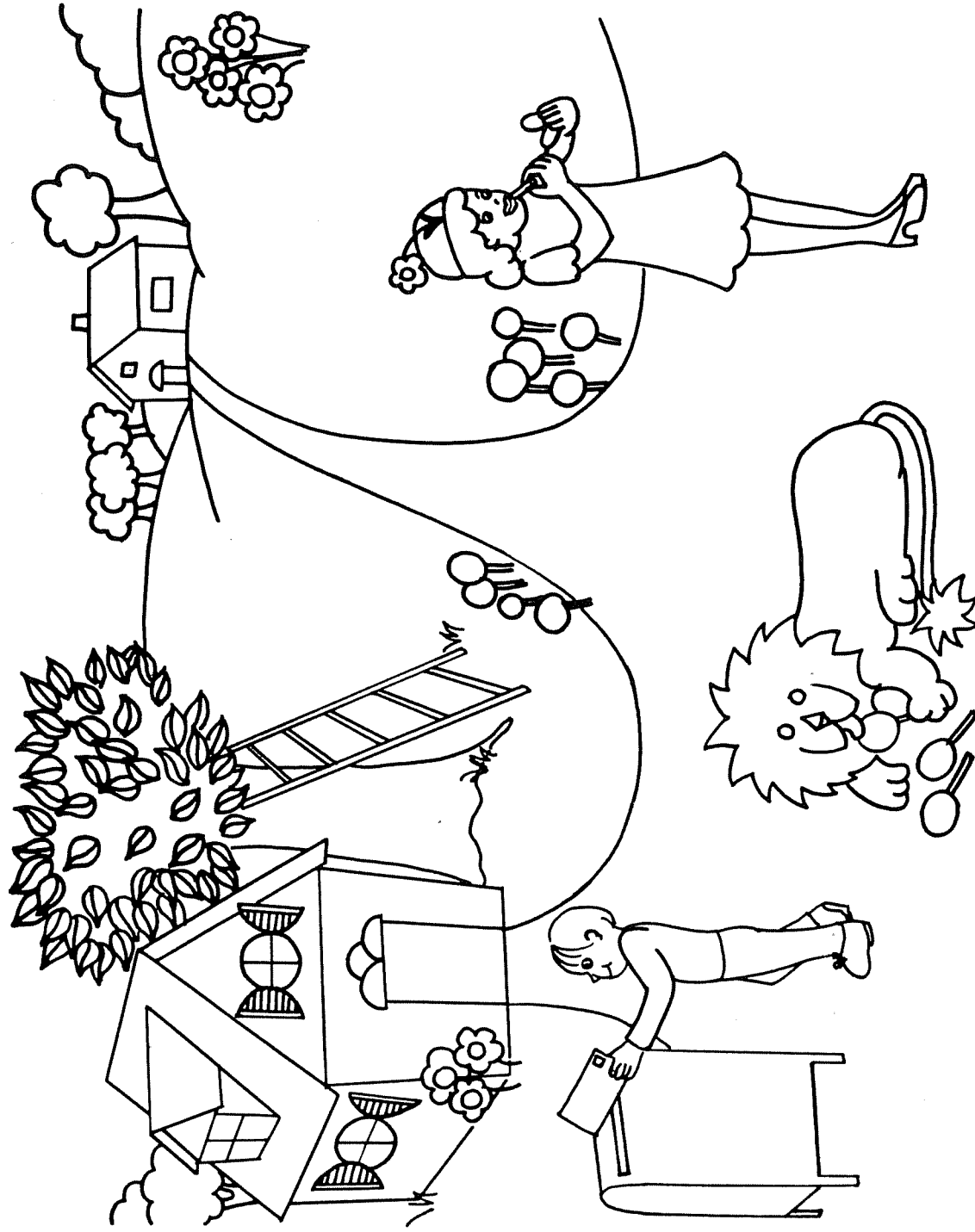
This section of ALPHA TIME lessons was chock full of listening to stories, talking about people's problems, and reading pictures.

In addition to teaching the class the sounds that they make for words, the Letter People help the children discuss other subjects. For instance, Mr. L talked about love and how people can show they love each other . . . by helping, by being kind, and by sharing.

Mr. D talked about making decisions and how important it is to think before deciding. Mr. G talked about giving gifts.

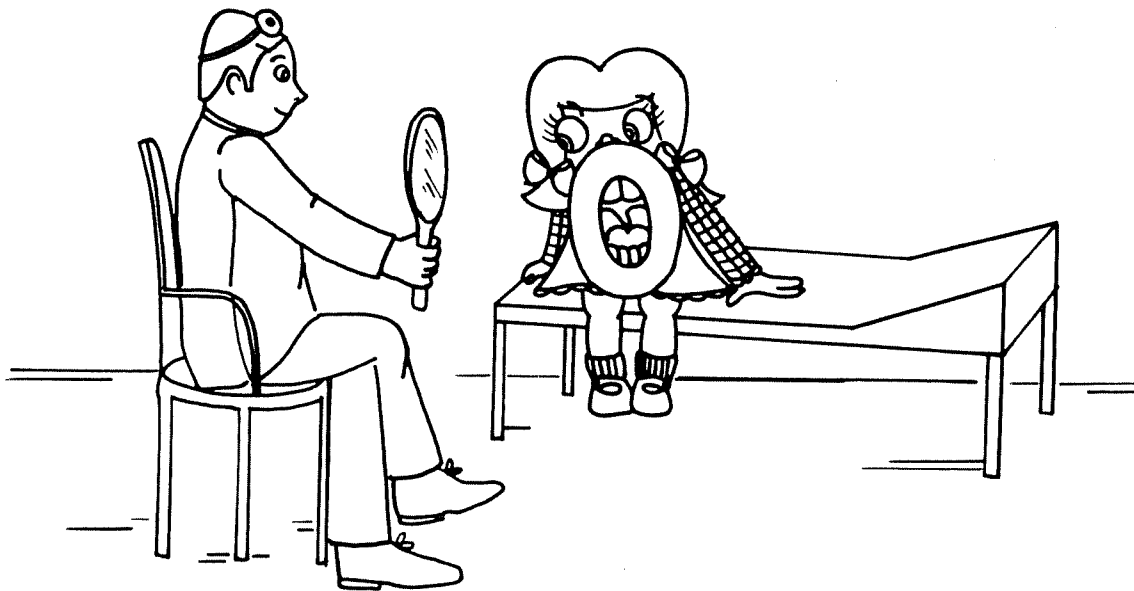
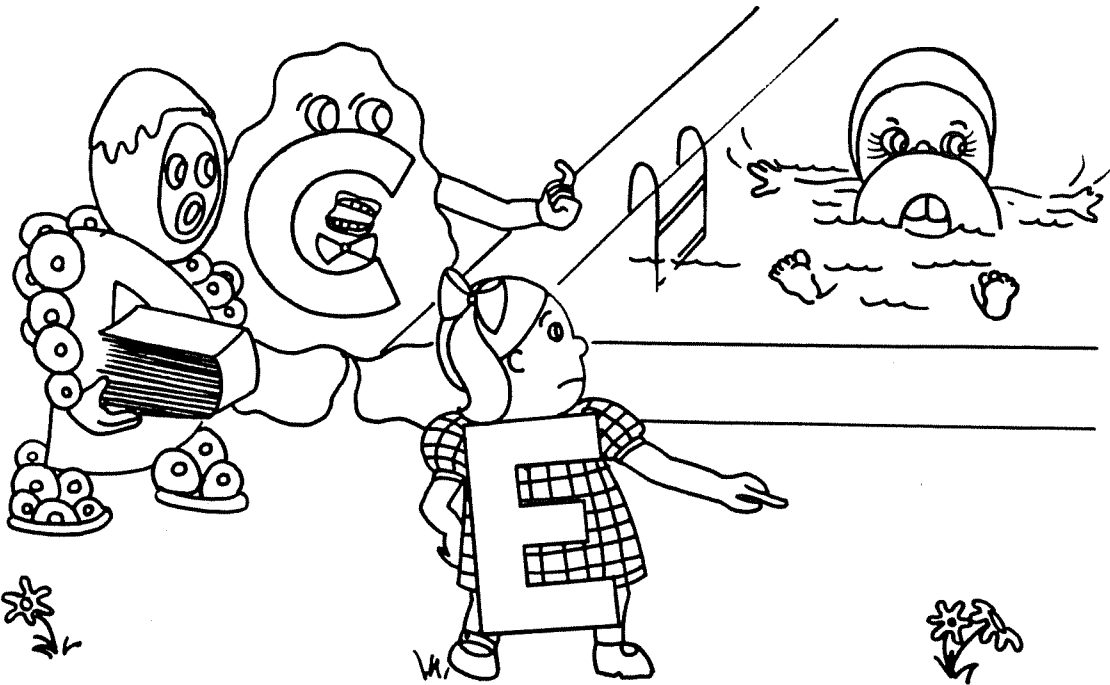
Miss I's sound from Incredible Inventor can be heard in the middle of a word as well as in the beginning of words.

Most important: the children feel increasingly more confident about expressing their opinions and about thinking independently. We hope this is carried over to home.

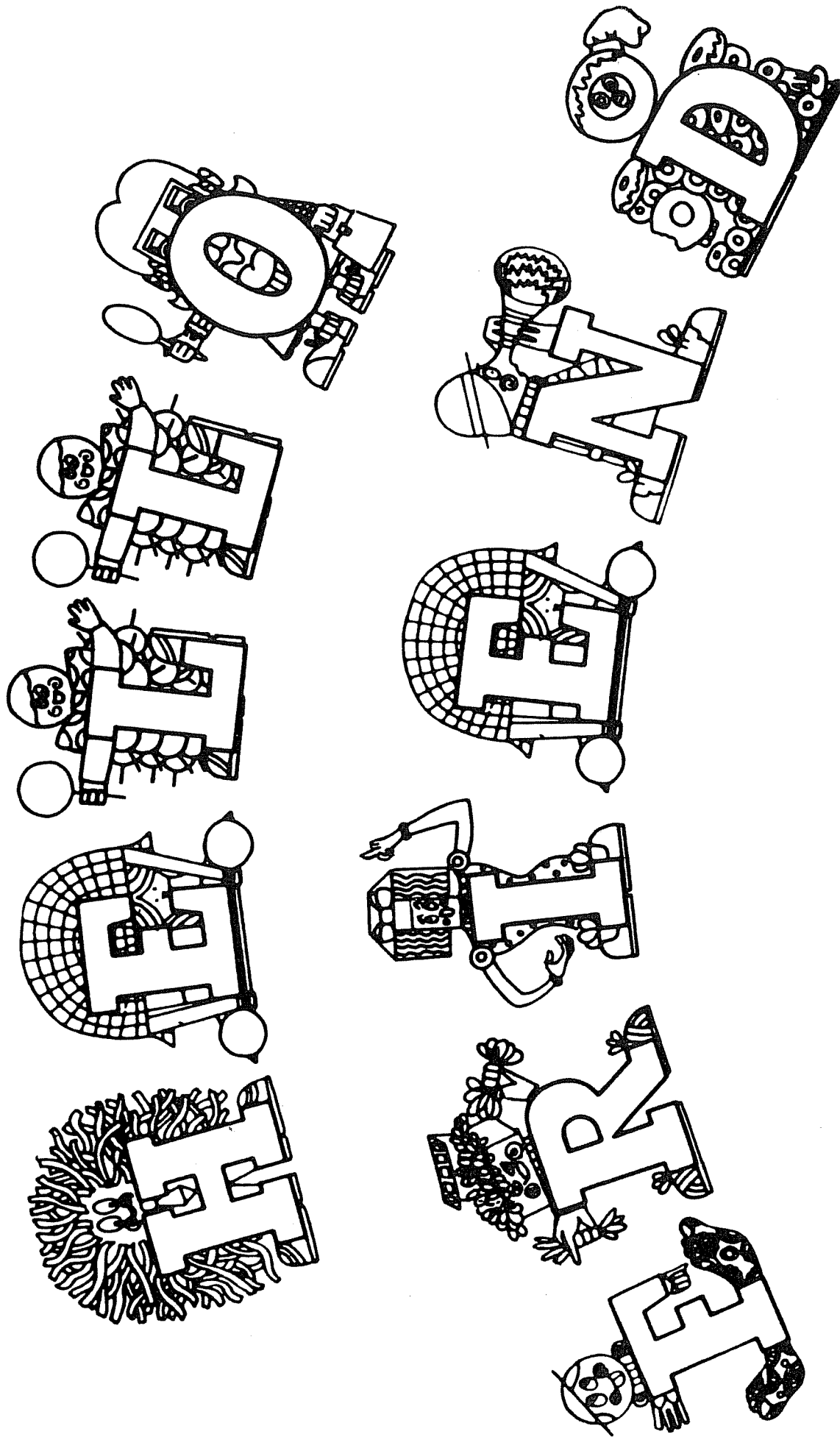

Dear Parents:

We have three new class members: Mr. R . . . Mr. J . . . and Miss U!

Mr. R (Ripping Rubberbands) is a rascal who used to shoot rubberbands at people. The rubberbands objected, and the children talked about using rubberbands constructively. Mr. R also learned that he should play with the other Letter People instead of trying to fight.

Mr. R wanted to have more words, and so he put **re** in front of words (prefixes) which means to do it again. (When he puts **re** in front of **build**, the new word - **rebuild** means to build again.) Let your child put **re** in front of other words, then tell you what they mean.

Mr. J and his Jumbled Junk gave the children their own books. The story tells how Mr. J had to arrange the jewelry in his store so that things that belonged together were on the same tray (sorting and classifying). Once again, the children were given additional experiences in logical thinking.

Perhaps your child would like to arrange his or her drawers like Mr. J did, so that things may easily be found.

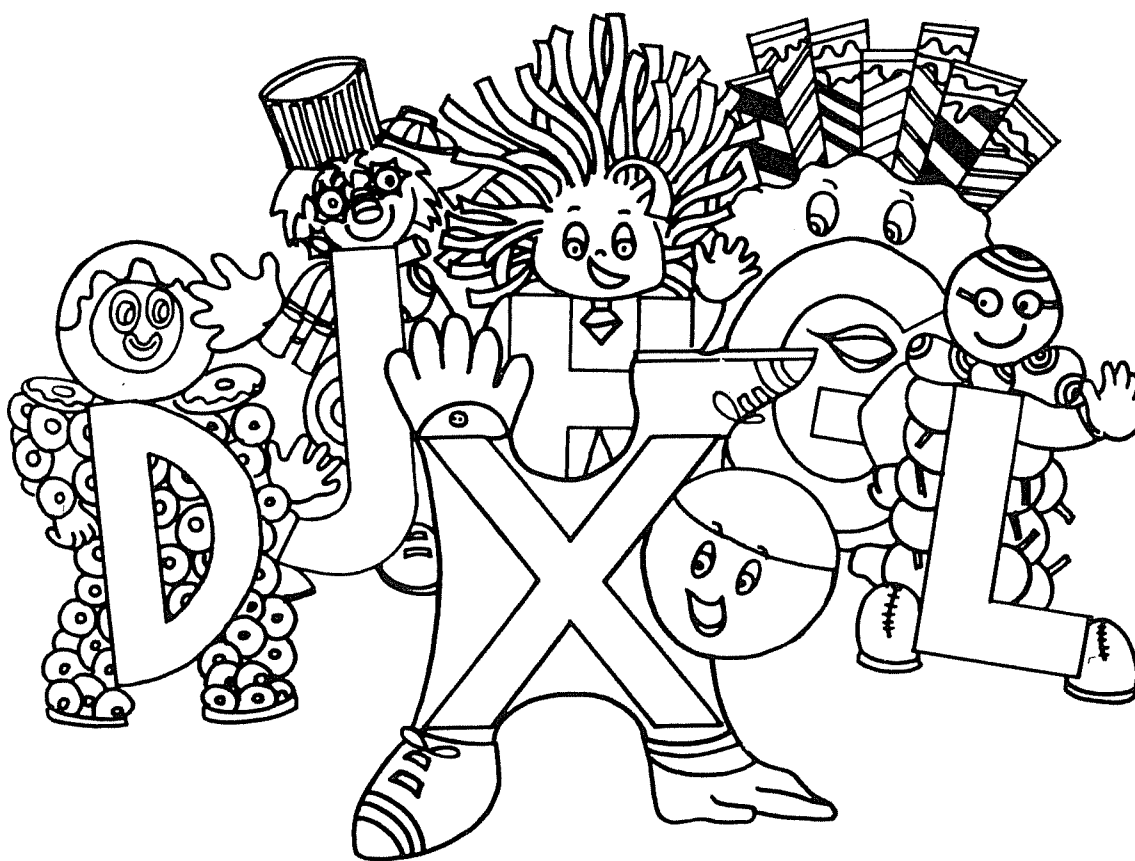
Ask your child to tell you what happened when Miss U arrived. Miss U talked about friendship. She explained that a person often can be friendly with several people at the same time.

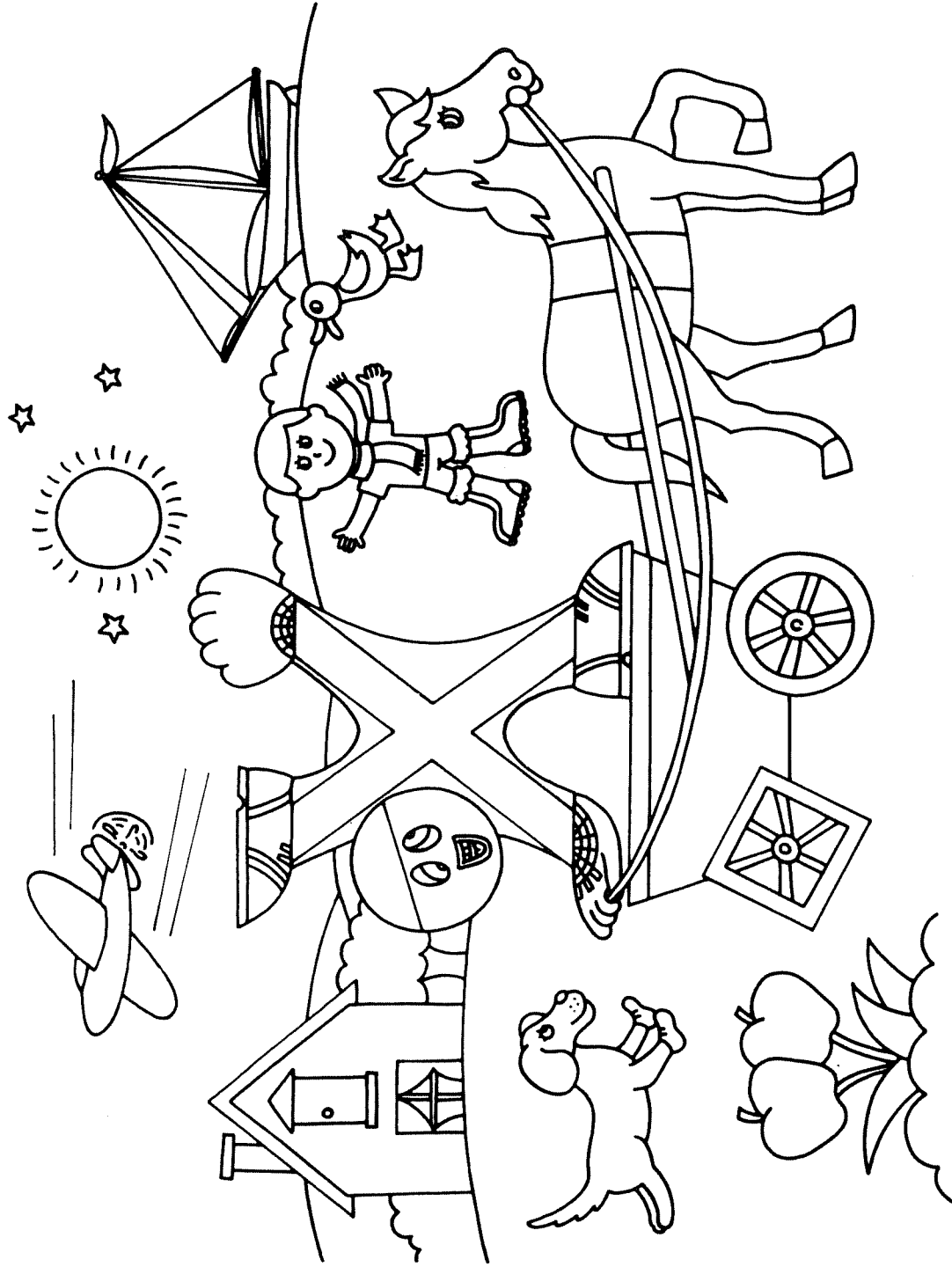

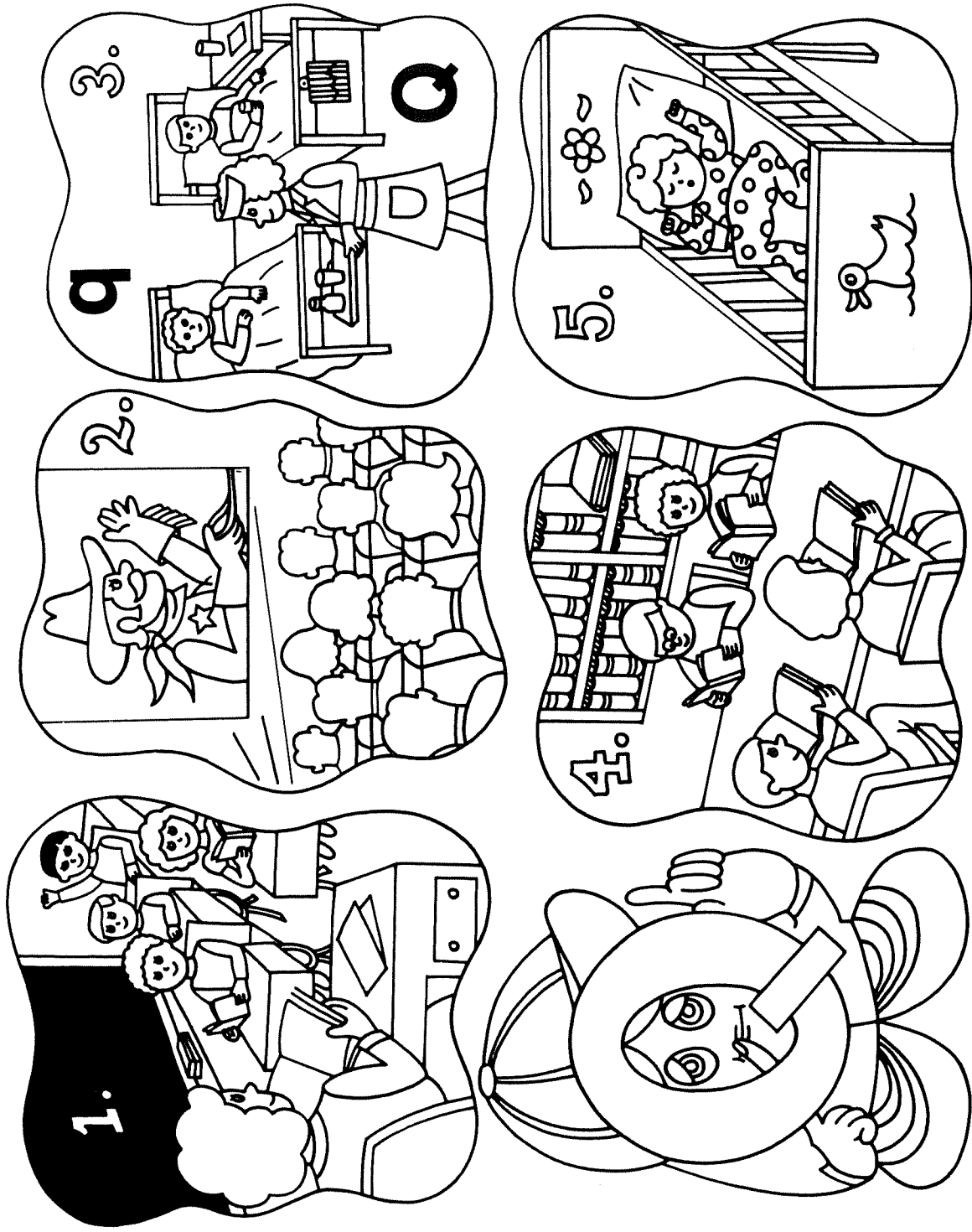

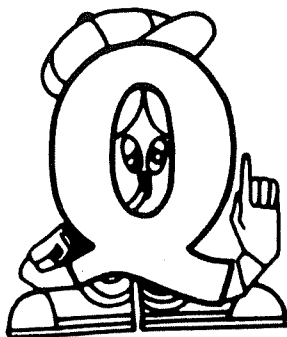
With the coming of Mr. X and Mr. Q, all the letters of the alphabet are now present and accounted for!
