

## **What Is Wiz?**

Wiz is a Microsoft Windows application, which extracts, tests, and displays files archived in ZIP archive format, as well as creating archives in the same format. Wiz can show you the difference(s) between archives, either graphically in WizDiff, or by high-lighting the differences in the archive entries. Wiz can also find archives, find files in archives based on a pattern you provide, as well as decode many of the popular e-mail ASCII encoding schemes.

The unzip logic of Wiz is based on Info-ZIP's product unzip, which has been ported to a number of platforms. Likewise, the zip logic is based on Info-ZIP's product zip.

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## **The Wiz Main Menu**

The Wiz main menu has the following options:

File Create/Update/Open archives. Delete archives. Set the Unzip directory. Launch Explorer, and WizDiff.

Edit Toggle using an external editor when displaying RTF files instead of Wiz's internal editor.

Archives Select/deselect files in archive. Select files in an archive by pattern. Delete/update entries in an archive. Extract/display/test archive entries. Get complete, verbose, archive information. Show an archive comment. Grep (find a particular phrase in a file) current archive contents. Find the differences between archives, and display the differences between archives.

Search Search archives for files of a particular pattern. Scan for archives. Rescan for archives. Search (Grep) all archives in a subdirectory for a pattern in a files contained in an archive.

Options Sets the options for Wiz.

Window Clear the message/scan/search windows. Select the MDI windows in the Wiz editor.

## **File Menu Create Archive**

This menu item allows you to create an archive, either a .zip file or a self-extracting archive. Using this option you may also add files to an existing archive, or freshen files already in the archive.

Explanations for each section of the create archive dialog box are below:

- Directories - This is where you choose the directories (folders) you will add files to the archive from.
- Drives - This is where you select the drive you wish to add files from.
- Set Ref/Deselect Ref - Normally the Wiz includes the complete path name for each file put into an archive. By selecting a reference directory, the paths for all files added to the archive are always done in reference to the reference directory.

For example: If you have selected directory c:\MyDirectory as the reference directory, and you add MyFile.txt files from each of the following directories c:\MyDirectory, c:\MyDirectory\MySubDirectory, and c:\MyOtherDirectory to an archive, you will find in your archive the following files:

MyFile.txt

MySubDirectory\MyFile.txt

\MyOtherDirectory\MyFile.txt

Note that the drive letters are never saved.

- Select All/Deselect All - Select/Deselect all files in the list box below.
- File Name - Type in the file pattern of the files you wish to see appear in the list box below, then press enter. Only files matching the pattern will appear in the list box. You may now select as many of the files as you wish, then press >>Add>> to include them in the archive.
- Recurse/Include Pattern - File pattern to search for when the Recurse or Include buttons are pressed.
- Options - Lets you set temporarily set the zip options for creating/updating an archive. Note that by pressing this button, you will also have access to the unzip/general and sound options. Any changes to these other options will have the same effect as if you had selected them from the main options menu item, in other words, those options will be remembered.
- Recurse - This causes Wiz to search for files matching the pattern put in the Recurse/Include Pattern box, not only in the current directory, but also in the sub-directories below that directory.
- Include - This causes Wiz to search for files matching the pattern put in the Recurse/Include Pattern box, only in the current directory. This is actually an alternative to putting the same pattern in the File Name box, pressing enter, Selecting All, then selecting >>Add>>.
- >>Add>> - Pressing this button causes all files selected in the file selection box to be transferred to the collection list box for adding to the archive when the OK button is pushed.
- <<Delete<< - Pressing this button causes all files selected in the collection list box to be deleted from the collection list box. This particular files will be now not be added to the archive.
- OK - If files have been placed into the collection list box, then pressing this button will cause the archive to be created. If nothing is in the collection list box, pressing this button has the same effect as pressing the cancel button.

- Cancel - Pressing this button cancels creating/updating the archive.

**File Menu Open Archive**

This menu item allows to you open an existing archive, either a .zip file, a self-extracting archive archive. Once the archive is open, you may extract, test, or display files in the archive, as well as view any archive comments.

### **File Menu Unzip Archive To**

This menu item allows you to determine what directory archives are to use to unzip files in. The title bar of the Wiz shows you at all times what the target unzip directory is.

**File Menu Delete Archive**

This menu item allows you to delete the current archive. You will be asked to confirm that you want to delete the archive before actually doing so.

**File Menu Explorer**

This menu item allows you to launch Microsoft's Explorer. If, for some reason, Explorer is not present on your system, this menu item will not be available.

**File Menu WizDiff**

This menu item allows you to launch WizDiff. If, for some reason, WizDiff is not present on your system, this menu item will not be available.

WizDiff is based on WinDiff, an example program from Microsoft.

WizDiff by itself can display the differences between two files, or between two directories. In conjunction with Wiz, it can also display the differences between two archives.

**File Menu Exit**

This menu item allows you to exit the Wiz. Any files that are open in the Wiz editor will not be saved. If you have launched WizDiff through the Wiz, then will also be closed by the Wiz.

## **Wiz Edit Menu**

Use external editor for RTF files.

The editor being used for the Wiz does not have the capability to interpret all rich text formatting commands. When rich text format (RTF) files have formatting that the Wiz editor does not understand, it simply discards them, unfortunately without warning. If you have RTF files that have such things as footers, you must use an external word processor to display them completely.

Selecting the “Use external editor for RTF files” option enables you to use whatever word processor is associated with the RTF file type to look at these files.

**Archives Menu Select All Files**

Selects all files in the current archive.

**Archives Menu Deselect All Files**

De-selects all files in the current archive.

### **Archives Menu Select Files by Pattern**

This menu item allows you to select (or deselect) files in the current archive by pattern. You are not limited to one pattern, but may continue (de-) selecting until you have achieved the desired result.

### **Archives Menu Delete Entries in Archive**

This menu item allows you to remove the selected entries in the current archive. You will be asked to confirm this deletion before it takes effect.

### **Archives Menu Update Entries in Archive**

This menu item allows you to update the selected (highlighted) entries in the current archive.

### **Archives Menu Extract**

This menu item extracts all selected files in the current archive to the directory shown on the title bar of Wiz.

### **Archives Menu Display**

This menu item will display the selected files in the current archive. If a file cannot be displayed by Wiz for some reason, it will attempt to open the file using the application that is associated with that particular file extension. If the file is an executable, then Wiz will execute it. If the file is another archive, then it will be shown as an additional archive.

This process may result in temporary files in the Windows temp directory. These files will be deleted when the Wiz terminates.

## **Archives Menu Test**

This menu item will test the selected files in the current archive to insure they are not corrupted.

## Archive Menu Complete Archive Information

This menu item will give you information of the following type for each selected entry in the archive:

There is no file comment.

### **Archive Menu Show Zip Comment**

This menu item will display a zip file comment if there is one present. If a comment is not present, this menu item will be disabled.

### **Archive Menu Grep Archive Contents**

This menu item allows you to search in files of a given pattern in the current archive for a particular pattern of characters. If the pattern is found in a particular file, that file will be highlighted.

### **Archive Menu Find Differences Between Archives**

This menu item allows you to compare two archives to find any differences between them. Any files that differ between the two archives will be highlighted. The two archive windows being compared will be tiled vertically, all other open archive windows will be minimized.

### **Archive Menu Display Archive Differences**

This menu item uses WizDiff to display the difference between two archives.

WizDiff is derived from sample source code provided by Microsoft Corporation.

There will be temporary directories created off the directory Wiz is located in. These directories will be removed upon exiting Wiz.

**Search Menu Search Archives**

Search archives in a given directory for files of a particular pattern. Optionally, you may search archives in subdirectories below the given directory.

### **Search Menu Scan For Archives**

Find all archives (either .zip or self-extracting archives) in a given directory. Optionally, you may search for archives in subdirectories below the starting directory.

### **Search Menu Search (Grep) Archives for Pattern**

Search all archives in a given directory for files of a particular pattern (i.e., \*.c etc) – Look in each of those files for the given pattern. If the pattern is found, list the file and archive in the Search in Archives tab.

## Unzip Options

### File Extraction Section:

This section determines when to overwrite a file when extracting from an archive.

- Always Overwrite - Always overwrites the file without any notification to the user.
- Prompt to Overwrite - Always prompt the user to overwrite the file.
- Only when newer - Only prompt the user when the existing file is newer than the archived file.

### Listbox Section:

- Extracts - A double mouse click, with one or more files selected in an archive list box, will extract the selected files to the extraction directory. Use the shift and control keys to control multiple selections.
- Displays - A double mouse click, with one or more files selected in an archive list box, will display the selected files in the Wiz editor. Use the shift and control keys to control multiple selections.
- Tests - A double mouse click, with one or more files selected in an archive list box, will test the selected files, and display the results in the messages window. Use the shift and control keys to control multiple selections.

### General Section:

- Recreate Directories - If this option is checked, Wiz will create any directories required to retain the entire path of an archived file.
- Convert LF -> CR/LF - Some text files, particularly those created (or modified) on UNIX systems, do not have a CR/LF at the end of each line. In the DOS and Windows world it is much more normal to find a CR/LF in those types of files. Although in the vast majority of cases, this has little or no effect, in a very few it may. To get around this potential problem, you have the capability to automatically convert LFs to CR/LFs.

**This is an extremely dangerous option, and should never be used with any file other than a plain text file, or you may very well corrupt the file to the point of being unusable.**

- Space -> To Underscore - When a file has spaces in its file name, selecting this option will automatically convert those spaces to underscores. On 32 bit systems such as Windows 95 and Windows NT, there is not much need for this option.
- Restore ACLs - An access-control list (ACL) contains information that controls access to a file or controls auditing of attempts to access a file. This information may be stored in a zip archive, and if so, the ACLs may be restored if you are using Windows NT. If you are running on NT and don't understand what the implications of using this are, don't do it.
- Use privileges - This is related to the restoration of ACLs. As with that option, if you don't understand what this means, don't use it. In actual practice, to be able to use this option, you would probably have to have administrator's rights. An administrator should understand what is happening here.
- Recurse on searches - If this option is selected, whenever Wiz searches for archives, it will not only search in the directory (folder) that you designate, it will also search in any sub-directories (folders) of the originally designated folder. This can result in significantly longer searches, depending on the number of files in those sub-directories.

For example, if you have this option selected, and you designate the root directory of your 'C' drive (C:\) as the

starting directory, Wiz will examine every archive and every executable on your entire 'C' drive. Depending on the number of files on your 'C' drive, this could take a significant amount of time.

- Scan for archives when loading - Automatically give the user the option to look for archives and put them in the Scan for Archives list box every time Wiz is loaded.

**Directories Section:**

- Remember Unzip To Dir - Always save the last unzip to (unzip target) directory.
- Remember Unzip From Dir - Always save the last directory an archive was opened in.
- Remember Zip To Dir - Always save the last directory an archive was created in. This directory will be displayed on the Wiz main title bar.
- Unzip To Zip Dir - Extract files to the same directory the zip archive is in.

## Zip Options

- Freshen changed files - Update an archive entry only if the file in the archive is older than the file on disk. If this option is checked, you do not need to have selected files to add to the archive, and in fact if you do attempt to add files to the archive, they will be ignored.
- Update changed files - This is virtually identical to freshening changed files above, with the exception that you must add files to the archive, or nothing will be done to the archive.
- Include system/hidden files - Include any system or hidden files that match the file patterns in the archive.
- Force MSDOS file names - When placing files in the archive, force using the old 8.3 file naming convention.
- Move file into archive - After successfully moving the file into an archive, delete the file.
- Zip file time to latest file - Change the file time of the zip archive to the time of the latest file in the archive.
- Convert LF -> CR/LF - Some text files, particularly those created (or modified) on UNIX systems, do not have a CR/LF at the end of each line. In the DOS and Windows world it is much more normal to find a CR/LF in those types of files. Although in the vast majority of cases, this has little or no effect, in a very few it may. To get around this potential problem, you have the capability to automatically convert LFs to CR/LFs.

**This is an extremely dangerous option, and should never be used with any file other than a plain text file, or you may very well corrupt the file to the point of being unusable.**

- Convert CR/LF -> LF - Some text files, particularly those created (or modified) on UNIX systems, do not have a CR/LF at the end of each line. To get around this potential problem, you have the capability to automatically convert CR/LFs to LFs.

- Add comment - Add a comment to the archive file.
- Include files before date - Include in the archive only those files whose file dates are prior to the given date.
- Exclude files after date - Do not put in the archive any files whose file date is later than the given date.
- Save ACLs - An access-control list (ACL) contains information that controls access to a file or controls auditing of attempts to access a file. This information may be stored in a zip archive, and if so, the ACLs may be restored if you are using Windows NT. If you are running on NT and don't understand what the implications of using this are, don't do it.
- Exclude extra attributes - Do not preserve any extra file attributes associated with the files. You will probably never need this option.
- No directory entries - Do not save directory entries. The default is to put directory entries into the zip archive in order to store their attributes.
- Ignore directory names - Do not save the full path and file name into the archive, but rather just save the file name.
- Include volume label - Include the volume label of the disk drive in the archive. There is rarely any need for this option.

- Verbose Operation - Much more wordy messages.
- Quiet Operation - Very little information in messages.
- Make 32 bit Self-Extracting Archive - Create a 32 bit self-extracting archive. This will add approximately 100K to the size of your archive and will run only on 32 bit Windows. This will preserve long file names upon extraction.
- Make DOS Self-Extracting Archive - Create a 16 bit self-extracting archive. This will add approximately 42K to the size of your archive and should run on any machine capable of executing DOS programs. Extraction of long files from an archive will result in the names being converted to the older DOS style 8.3 format.
- Adjust entries for SFX - Adjust the offsets of entries in an archive for the self extracting prefix.
- Repair archive - Try to fix an archive.
- Repair archive (desperate) - Try to fix an archive even harder.
- Compression - Select the compression level you want. 0 = no compression; 6 = default; and 9 = maximum compression.

## **Sound Options**

- No Sound - No sounds are to be used while extracting files.
- Beep afterward - Beep on the computer's internal speaker after extracting a file.
- Play Sound During - Not enabled unless your system has a sound card. Play a sound file while extracting files from an archive.
- Play Sound Afterward - Not enabled unless your system has a sound card. Play a sound file after extracting files from an archive.
- Sound name or file - Not enabled unless your system has a sound card. The name of the sound file to play.
- Play - Not enabled unless your system has a sound card. Test the sound of the sound file you have selected.
- Browse - Not enabled unless your system has a sound card. Look for sound files (\*.wav)

## **Wiz Editor**

The Wiz Editor is shown below. It is very similar in operation to Microsoft Windows's Notepad or WordPad, with the exception that it has a multiple document interface (MDI) that neither Notepad or WordPad have.

In addition to its Notepad and WordPad capabilities, the Wiz editor can also be used to display text and rich text format files contained within archives. Once these files are in the editor, they may be saved to disk, modified etc., just as you would in any editor. However, you may not automatically insert these files back into the archive.

The Wiz Editor is derived from sample source code provided by Microsoft Corporation.
