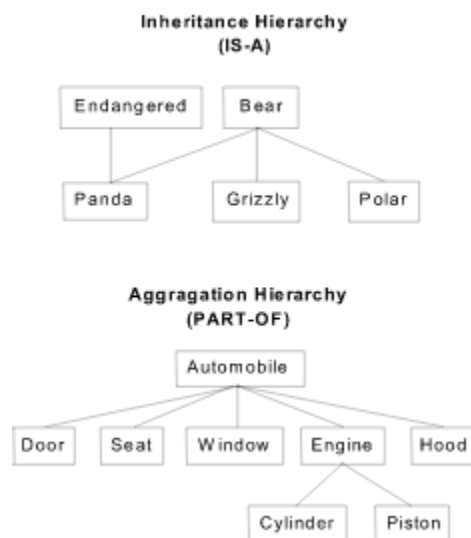
In an object model, there are classes and relationships among these classes. There are two hierarchical relationships among classes, namely, the inheritance (superclass / subclass) relationship and the aggregation (whole / part) relationship. **Classes / Aggregations** window allow a user to define classes and the hierarchical relationships among them.

1. Enter new class:

A new class is first entered into the **Class Name** text field at the top center, along with its description entered into the **Description** multi-line text field at the center, and then the New Class command in the Edit menu is selected. The entered class appears as a new item in the **Classes / Aggregations** class list at the bottom center. You can also enter the description of a class before you select the New Class command.

2. Define class hierarchies:

The inheritance relationship (IS-A relationship) and aggregation relationship (PART-OF relationship) are defined in this window. A user first double-click an item in the **Classes / Aggregations** class list at the bottom center to select a class as the active class to be displayed in the **Object Name** text field, and then click on a radio item in the **Defining Hierarchy** group box at the upper left corner to select the type of hierarchical relationship you want to define. Now you can single-click on an item in the **Classes / Aggregations** class list at the bottom center, and then select the Define Hierarchy command in the Edit menu. The selected class now appears as a new item in one of the class hierarchy lists (i.e., **Superclasses**, **Subclasses**, **Parent Aggregations**, or **Child Classes** list) depending on the current selection in the **Defining Hierarchy** group box.



3. Commit changes in class description and/or class hierarchies:
After a new class is entered into the **Classes /Aggregations** class list, you can double-click the item to select it as the active class to be displayed in the **Class Name** text field. Then you can change the description of this class in the **Description** text field, or change the hierarchical relationships of it by inserting or deleting classes from the lists of hierarchical relationships. Once you are done with modifying it, you can select the Commit Changes command in the Edit menu.
4. Delete a class from one of the class lists:
You can delete a class already in the **Classes /Aggregations** class list, or any of the class hierarchies lists. First, you click on the item in a list that you want to delete, and then select the Delete command in the Edit menu.
** Please note that if you are deleting a class in the **Classes /Aggregations** class list, all the attendant information (e.g., class hierarchies, objects) will be removed as well. Any reference to this class is also removed from other document windows.

Description

A class has attributes that characterize it, and operations that get/set the attributes. Each attribute also has the facets of data type, domain (i.e., possible values), default values, multiplicity (i.e., single- or multi-valued). **Class Definitions** document window allow a user to define the attributes and operations of a class, and the attribute facets.

1. To select an active class:
Select an item from the **Class Name** drop-down list at the top.
2. To enter attributes:
In the **Attribute Name / Description** grid contro near the top, select a cell to receive keyboard input by clicking the mouse button or using the TAB key and/or the up/down arrow keys on your keyboard. You can enter the attribute name and its description in the cells. If you have more than 5 attributes for a class, you can use the New Attribute command in the Edit menu to get a new row of cells.
3. To enter attribute facets:
The **Attribute Facets** group box in the middle of the document window allow user to enter attribute facets of the active attribute (i.e., the cell with the flashing keyboard cursor). The group box contains four facets controls:
 - the **Data Type** drop-down combo box: You can enter a new data type or select one already in the drop-down list.
 - the **Domain** drop-down combo box: You can enter a new attribute domain (i.e., possible values) or select on previously entered in the drop-down list.
 - the **Default Value** drop-down combo box: You can enter a new default value for the attribute or select one value from the drop-down list.
 - the **Multiplicity** radio buttons: You can define the attribute to be single-valued or multiple-valued.
4. To enter operations:
In the **Operation Name / Description** grid contro at the bottom, select a cell to receive keyboard input by clicking the mouse button or using the TAB key and/or the up/down arrow keys on your keyboard. You can enter the operation name and its description in the cells. If you have more than 5 operations for a class, you can use the New Operation command in the Edit menu to get a new row of cells.
5. To commit changes:
If you made changes to the attributes, operations, and attribute facets of an active class, you can commit these changes by selecting the Commit Changes command in the Edit menu.
6. Delete attributes or operations from the Attribute/ Operation grid controls:
You can delete attributes or operations already in the **Attribute Name / Description** or **Operation Name / Description Classes** grid control by first selecting the rows containing them and then using the Delete command in the Edit menu.

In addition to the hierarchical relationships in the **Classes /Aggregations** document window, there are dynamic and other non-hierarchical relationships among classes. A relationship of this kind may have a source class/operation and a destination class/operation. **Class Relations** document window allow a user to define this type of relationships.

1. Enter new relationship:
A new relationship is first entered into the **Relation Name** text field at the upper left corner of this document window, along with its description entered into the **Description** multi-line text field below, and then the [New Relation](#) command in the [Edit menu](#) is selected. The entered relation appears as a new item in the **Relations** list at the bottom left. You can also enter the description of a relation before you select the command.
2. Commit changes in the description and source/destination class and operation of a relation:
After a new class is entered into the **Relations** list, you can double-click the item to select it as the active relation to be displayed in the **Relation Name** text field. Then you can change the description of this relation in the **Description** text field, or change the source/destination class and operation. Once you are done with modifying it, you can select the [Commit Changes](#) command in the [Edit menu](#).
3. Delete a relation:
You can delete a relation already in the **Relations** list. First, you click on the item in the list that you want to delete, and then select the [Delete](#) command in the [Edit menu](#).
** Please note that if you are deleting a relation in the **Relations** list, all the attendant information (e.g., source class and operation, destination class and operation, and object links of this relation) will be removed as well. Any reference to this relation is also removed from the **Object Links** document window.

Description

Each class defined in the **Classes / Aggregations** document window has its object instances. The instance of an aggregation class is called an aggregate in our definition. Objects/aggregates of a class/aggregation are defined in the **Objects / Aggregates** document window. Objects and aggregates also have Whole/Part links (i.e., instances of a relationship) among them. The Whole/Part links are also defined in this document window.

1. Enter new object/aggregate:

A new object/aggregate is first entered into the **Object Name** text field at the upper left corner of this document window, along with its class selected from the **Class Name** drop-down list at the top right. Then the [New Object](#) command in the [Edit menu](#) is selected. The entered object/aggregate appears as a new item in the **Objects/Aggregates** list at the bottom left.

2. Define the Whole/Part link of an object/aggregate:

The Whole/Part link of an object/aggregate is defined in this window. A user first double-click an item in the **Objects / Aggregates** list at the bottom left to select an object as the active object to be displayed in the **Object Name** text field. Now you can single-click on an item in the **Objects / Aggregates** list to select it, and then select the [Define Child](#) command in the [Edit menu](#). The selected object now appears as a new item in the **Child Objects** list at the bottom right.

3. Commit changes in the class of an object and its Whole/Part relationship:

After a new object is entered into the **Objects/Aggregates** list, you can double-click the item to select it as the active object to be displayed in the **Object Name** text field. Then you can change the class of this object in the **Class Name** drop-down list, or change the Whole/Part link by selecting a new parent aggregate from the **Parent Aggregate** drop-down list. Once you are done with modifying it, you can select the [Commit Changes](#) command in the [Edit menu](#).

4. Delete an object:

You can delete an object already in the **Objects/Aggregates** list. First, you click on the item in the list that you want to delete, and then select the [Delete](#) command in the [Edit menu](#).

** Please note that if you are deleting an object in the **Objects/Aggregates** list, all the attendant information (e.g., class name, parent aggregate, and child objects) will be removed as well. Any reference to this object is also removed from the **Classes/ Aggregations** document window and the **Object Links** document window.

A link is an instance of a relationship. In addition to the Whole/Part link in the **Objects/Aggregates** document window, there are dynamic and other non-hierarchical links among objects. A link of this kind may have a source object and a destination object. **Object/Links** document window allow a user to define this type of links.

1. Enter new link:
A new link is first entered into the **Link Name** text field at the upper left corner of this document window, along with its relation selected from the **Relation Name** drop-down list at the top right, and then the New Link command in the Edit menu is selected. The entered link appears as a new item in the **Links** list at the bottom left.
2. Commit changes in the relation of a link and its source/destination object:
After a new link is entered into the **Links** list, you can double-click the item to select it as the active link to be displayed in the **Link Name** text field. Then you can change the relation in the **Relation Name** drop-down list, or change the source/destination object. Once you are done with modifying it, you can select the Commit Changes command in the Edit menu.
3. Delete a link:
You can delete a link already in the **Links** list. First, you click on the item in the list that you want to delete, and then select the Delete command in the Edit menu.
** Please note that if you are deleting a link in the **Links** list, all the attendant information (e.g., relation name, source and destination object) will be removed as well. Any reference to this link is also removed from the **Class Relations** document window.

File Open dialog box

The following options allow you to specify which file to open:

File Name

Type or select the filename you want to open. This box lists files with the extension you select in the List Files of Type box.

List Files of Type

Select the type of file you want to open:

Select the drive in which MindFrame stores the file that you want to open.

Directories

Select the directory in which MindFrame stores the file that you want to open.

Network...

Choose this button to connect to a network location, assigning it a new drive letter.

Close command (File menu)

Use this command to close all windows containing the active document. MindFrame suggests that you save changes to your document before you close it. If you close a document without saving, you lose all changes made since the last time you saved it. Before closing an untitled document, MindFrame displays the Save As dialog box and suggests that you name and save the document.


You can also close a document by using the Close icon on the document's window, as shown below:



Save command (File menu)

Use this command to save the active document to its current name and directory. When you save a document for the first time, MindFrame displays the Save As dialog box so you can name your document. If you want to change the name and directory of an existing document before you save it, choose the Save As command.

Save As command (File menu)

Use this command to save and name the active document. MindFrame displays the Save As dialog box so you can name your document.

To save a document with its existing name and directory, use the Save command.

File Save As dialog box

The following options allow you to specify the name and location of the file you're about to save:

File Name

Type a new filename to save a document with a different name. A filename can contain up to eight characters and an extension of up to three characters. MindFrame adds the extension you specify in the Save File As Type box.

Drives

Select the drive in which you want to store the document.

Directories

Select the directory in which you want to store the document.

Network...

Choose this button to connect to a network location, assigning it a new drive letter.

<< Add other File Save As dialog box options depending on which ones your application chooses via the OFN_ flags of the OPENFILENAME structure used by the CFileDialog. >>

1, 2, 3, 4 command (File menu)

Use the numbers and filenames listed at the bottom of the File menu to open the last four documents you closed. Choose the number that corresponds with the document you want to open.

Exit command (File menu)

Use this command to end your MindFrame session. You can also use the Close command on the application Control menu. MindFrame prompts you to save documents with unsaved changes.

The toolbar is displayed across the top of the application window, below the menu bar. The toolbar provides quick mouse access to many tools used in MindFrame,

To hide or display the Toolbar, choose Toolbar from the View menu (ALT, V, T).

Status Bar command (View menu)

Use this command to display and hide the Status Bar, which describes the action to be executed by the selected menu item or depressed toolbar button, and keyboard latch state. A check mark appears next to the menu item when the Status Bar is displayed.

Status Bar



The status bar is displayed at the bottom of the MindFrame window. To display or hide the status bar, use the Status Bar command in the View menu.

The left area of the status bar describes actions of menu items as you use the arrow keys to navigate through menus. This area similarly shows messages that describe the actions of toolbar buttons as you depress them, before releasing them. If after viewing the description of the toolbar button command you wish not to execute the command, then release the mouse button while the pointer is off the toolbar button.

The right areas of the status bar indicate which of the following keys are latched down:

Indicator	Description
CAP	The Caps Lock key is latched down.
NUM	The Num Lock key is latched down.
SCRL	The Scroll Lock key is latched down.

New command (Window menu)

Use this command to open a new window with the same contents as the active window. You can open multiple document windows to display different parts or views of a document at the same time. If you change the contents in one window, all other windows containing the same document reflect those changes. When you open a new window, it becomes the active window and is displayed on top of all other open windows.

Cascade command (Window menu)

Use this command to arrange multiple opened windows in an overlapped fashion.

Tile command (Window menu)

Use this command to arrange multiple opened windows in a non-overlapped fashion.

Tile Horizontal command (Window menu)

Use this command to vertically arrange multiple opened windows in a non-overlapped fashion.

Tile Vertical command (Window menu)

Use this command to arrange multiple opened windows side by side.

Window Arrange Icons Command

Use this command to arrange the icons for minimized windows at the bottom of the main window. If there is an open document window at the bottom of the main window, then some or all of the icons may not be visible because they will be underneath this document window.

1, 2, ... command (Window menu)

MindFrame displays a list of currently open document windows at the bottom of the Window menu. A check mark appears in front of the document name of the active window. Choose a document from this list to make its window active.

Index command (Help menu)

Use this command to display the opening screen of Help. From the opening screen, you can jump to step-by-step instructions for using MindFrame and various types of reference information.

Once you open Help, you can click the Contents button whenever you want to return to the opening screen.

Using Help command (Help menu)

Use this command for instructions about using Help.

About command (Help menu)

Use this command to display the copyright notice and version number of your copy of MindFrame.

Context Help command



Use the Context Help command to obtain help on some portion of MindFrame. When you choose the Toolbar's Context Help button, the mouse pointer will change to an arrow and question mark. Then click somewhere in the MindFrame window, such as another Toolbar button. The Help topic will be shown for the item you clicked.

Title Bar

Scroll bars

Mouse: Click the maximize icon  on the title bar; or double-click the title bar.

Keys: CTRL+F10 enlarges a document window.

Next Window command (document Control menu)

Use this command to switch to the next open document window. MindFrame determines which window is next according to the order in which you opened the windows.

Shortcut

Keys: CTRL+F6

Previous Window command (document Control menu)

Use this command to switch to the previous open document window. MindFrame determines which window is previous according to the order in which you opened the windows.

Shortcut

Keys: SHIFT+CTRL+F6

Close command (Control menus)

Use this command to close the active window or dialog box.

Double-clicking a Control-menu box is the same as choosing the Close command.



Note: If you have multiple windows open for a single document, the Close command on the document Control menu closes only one window at a time. You can close all windows at once with the Close command on the File menu.

Printer

This is the active printer and printer connection. Choose the Setup option to change the printer and printer connection.

All Prints the entire document.

Selection Prints the currently selected text.

Pages Prints the range of pages you specify in the From and To boxes.

Select the quality of the printing. Generally, lower quality printing takes less time to produce.

Take a larger look at the printed page.

Return from print preview to the editing window.

Print Setup command (File menu)

Use this command to select a printer and a printer connection. This command presents a Print Setup dialog box, where you specify the printer and its connection.

Print Setup dialog box

The following options allow you to select the destination printer and its connection.

Printer

Select the printer you want to use. Choose the Default Printer; or choose the Specific Printer option and select one of the current installed printers shown in the box. You install printers and configure ports using the Windows Control Panel.

Orientation

Choose Portrait or Landscape.

Paper Size

Select the size of paper that the document is to be printed on.

Paper Source

Some printers offer multiple trays for different paper sources. Specify the tray here.

Options

Displays a dialog box where you can make additional choices about printing, specific to the type of printer you have selected.

Network...

Choose this button to connect to a network location, assigning it a new drive letter.

Automatic Inserts new data as soon as it is available.

Manual Inserts new data only when you ask for it by choosing the Update Now button.

Locked

Prevents updates to a selected link. If you lock a link, the Update Now option is unavailable.

Open Source

Opens the source of a selected link -- for example, choosing the Open Source button opens up a linked chart in Microsoft Excel if you have a Microsoft Excel chart linked to your document.

Update Now

Updates all links selected in the Links box, and then closes the dialog box.

Cancel Link

Breaks links for all selected links between data and the document, and then closes the Links dialog box.

Change Link

Displays a dialog box so you can change the selected link to receive data from another application, file, or item.

Object verb (Edit menu)

Use this command to open the application in which the selected object was created and display the object so you can edit it. This command is available only when you have selected an existing object in your document. When you finish editing and close the application window, <<YourApp>> incorporates the changes into your document. This menu name changes depending on the object you select.

Conduct User Analysis

The purpose of user analysis is to come up with the characteristics of target user groups, similar to what a market researcher would do to identify target markets. Therefore the purpose is really two fold:

- 1) to identify critical characteristics, and
- 2) to segment users into groups based on these characteristics.

A brief description of intended users in a preliminary requirements specification will get us started on the task of user analysis. Through interviewing users, we can gather important information for further analysis. Once we have sufficient information about target users, we take the following steps to conduct the activity of user analysis:

1. Identify Analysis Factors Critical to Application

Examine the user information to identify the factors critical to the application. Common analysis factors are computer skill level, application-domain skill level, usage pattern, user roles, and cultural differences.

2. Discover Other Factors Critical to Application

There are many other possible factors that may turn out to be critical to an application. Try finding additional factors that are critical to your application.

3. Estimate Distribution of Users of Each Application-Critical Factor

Find the user distribution of all possible user groups for each of the application-critical factors. A careful user survey should provide us with such information.

4. Rank Distribution to Identify Major User Groups

If the previous step reveals fairly concentrated distribution of user groups, we can skip this step. However, if the target user groups are loosely spread and fragmented, we need to analyze the distribution further. The distribution ranking is significant for individual analysis factors, as well as for the combination of analysis factors. The probability of a user having a combination of characteristics is the product of individual distributions, a higher probability would reveal it as a major user group.

Construct Task Model

Task model records a sequence of events that a user would have to go through to perform certain task. It is part of our human behavior as we were created in the image of God. In everyone's mind, all kinds of learned knowledge are represented hierarchically. Knowledge are either spatial or temporal, that can be represented with object model or task model respectively. Therefore, task modeling is simply to decompose a user task hierarchically into finer steps of events that a user would have to go through. The GOMS (Goals, Operators, Methods, Selection Rules) task model is a well-known approach among computer-human interface researchers. Although there are four components in a GOMS model, the underlying concept is still the hierarchical representation of event sequences.

Because the inherent design of the MindFrame application follows the simple and yet elegant design of our brain, a GOMS task model can be constructed with this application with ease.

If we use the example of user interface development, we would have a simple task model as follows:

Develop User Interface Application

1. Analysis Activities
 - 1.1 Conduct User Analysis
 - 1.2 Construct Task Model
 - 1.3 Construct Object Model
2. Design Activities
 - 2.1 Perform System-Level Design
 - 2.2 Perform User Interface Metaphor Design
 - 2.3 Perform Object-Oriented Graphical User interface Design
 - 2.4 Perform Contextual Graphical User Interface Design
3. Implementation Activities
 - 3.1 Implement GUI prototypes
 - 3.2 Implement GUI software
 - 3.3 Integrate GUI with application functional core

From the top-level task of "Develop User Interface Application", we hierarchically decomposed it into three finer steps, and each in turn is decomposed further. In MindFrame application, the finer steps of a decomposition are represented as children classes of an aggregation (i.e. representing the higher-level step that contains them).

Construct Object Model

Object model is not only useful in software development. It really is how human knowledge is represented in our brain. The hierarchical structure of an inheritance hierarchy or an aggregation hierarchy, and the relationships among the classes are the foundation of human knowledge representation and how our brain functions.

The instances of a class is called an object, and the instance of a relationship is called a link.

A class also encapsulates the attributes and operations pertaining to a class. Each attribute also has facets of possible values, data type, etc.

Perform System-Level Design

The object model constructed may contain large number of classes, relationships, and their attributes, operations. All these elements of an object model must be accessible to the user through the graphical user interface. The graphical user interface must orderly presents these information to the user. The system-level design prioritizes and groups these object model information, so they can be orderly presented. Prioritizing and grouping also considers human cognitive capacity, that we can only pay attention to one thing at a time, and we have limited short-term memory in our mind to hold information for further processing.

Construct Metaphor Models

Essential to the learning process of a human is the use of metaphors (i.e., analogies) and examples. Metaphors help users comprehending new knowledge through their known knowledge. An object model is a form of knowledge representation. To help users learn to use an application, we devise metaphors to ease their learning process. Metaphor model maps to object model with their objects and relationships. Read the book: "Object-Oriented GUI Application Development" for detailed explanation. Construct Models of Life Forms

The first chapter of the book of Genesis recorded how our Lord God created the heavens and earth, 'Thus the heavens and the earth were completed in all their vast array' (Genesis 2:1).

Various forms of lives were created on the third, the fifth, and the sixth day of creation:

1. Vegetation was created on the third day (Genesis 1:11-13):

11 Then God said, "Let the land produce vegetation: seed-bearing plants and trees on the land that bear fruit with seed in it, according to their various kinds." And it was so.

12 The land produced vegetation: plants bearing seed according to their kinds and trees bearing fruit with seed in it according to their kinds. And God saw that it was good.

13 And there was evening, and there was morning-- the third day.

2. Life forms in the water and winged bird were created on the fifth day (Gen 1:20-23)

20 And God said, "Let the water teem with living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the expanse of the sky."

21 So God created the great creatures of the sea and every living and moving thing with which the water teems, according to their kinds, and every winged bird according to its kind. And God saw that it was good.

22 God blessed them and said, "Be fruitful and increase in number and fill the water in the seas, and let the birds increase on the earth."

23 And there was evening, and there was morning-- the fifth day.

3. Land animals and creatures were created on the sixth day (Genesis 1:24-25):

24 And God said, "Let the land produce living creatures according to their kinds: livestock, creatures that move along the ground, and wild animals, each according to its kind." And it was so.

25 God made the wild animals according to their kinds, the livestock according to their kinds, and all the creatures that move along the ground according to their kinds. And God saw that it was good.

4. Man and woman were also created on the sixth day (Genesis 1:26:31)

26 Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, in our likeness, and let them rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air, over the livestock, over all the earth, and over all the creatures that move along the ground."

27 So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them.

28 God blessed them and said to them, "Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air and over every living creature that moves on the ground."

29 Then God said, "I give you every seed-bearing plant on the face of the whole earth and every tree that has fruit with seed in it. They will be yours for food.

30 And to all the beasts of the earth and all the birds of the air and all the creatures that move on the ground-- everything that has the breath of life in it-- I give every green plant for food." And it was so.

31 God saw all that he had made, and it was very good. And there was evening, and there was morning-- the sixth day.

Although life forms were created "according to their kinds" (see Genesis 1:11, 12, 21, 24, 25), the only exception was the creation of man and woman. So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them' (Genesis 1:27). Man were also blessed and entrusted to rule over other living creatures. God blessed them and said to them, "Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air and over every living creature that moves on the ground" (Genesis 1:28).

MindFrame can be used to construct models of life forms that reveal the hierarchical order and close connections among the created life forms. From the amazing DNA molecule and the vital and intricate

cells to the multitudes of plant and animals, life on earth is truly a wonder that bear witness for our Lord God the creator and sustainer of heavens and earth and everything in it (Psalm 24:1).

Although the Holy Bible was written by closed to 40 co-authors in a duration span over 1500 years (from ~1440 B.C. to ~100 A.D.) and the Old Testament (39 books, ~27) was written in Hebrew while the New Testament (27 books, 10 co-authors) was written in Greek, the entire Bible is extremely consistent. This amazing consistency allows us to study the bible with a concordance of the Bible, which is an alphabetical index of all the words in the Bible showing every contextual occurrence of a word. The meaning of a Bible scripture may be understood by referencing other verses throughout the Bible containing the same key words. A typical reader of the Bible may study a scripture, and then use a Bible concordance to locate several other verses containing the same key words in order to make clear of the meaning of the entire scripture. There are several difficulties with this manual process:

This involves lots of flipping back and forth between the Bible and a Bible concordance.

The existing books of concordance have been prepared with a single key word. For some key words, it is time-consuming to search through a long list of entries to identify the relevant verses.

In view of these problems, it would benefit many Bible readers by developing a software that would make it even more joyful to read the Scriptures. Several requirements are necessary for such an application:

A user can use one window to read through the Bible and select one or more key words in a verse to bring up a window with a list of their occurrences (i.e. a concordance of multiple key words).

A user can select one or more entries in a list of key word occurrences to bring up window(s) containing the relevant Bible verses.

To improve upon the manual process, we want to provide the additional features to allow users to quickly locate the verses of the counterpart of a type/anti-type (i.e. prefiguration, foreshadowing) or a prophecy/fulfillment.

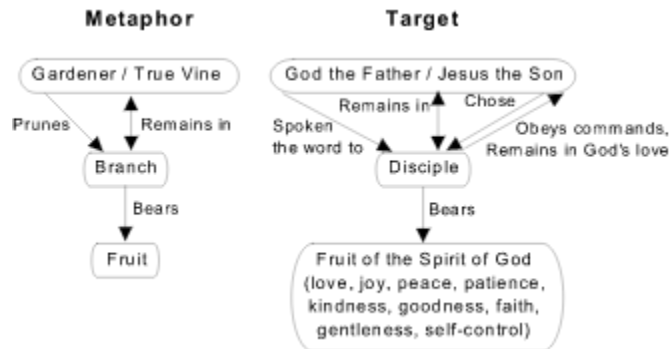
System-Level Design Samples

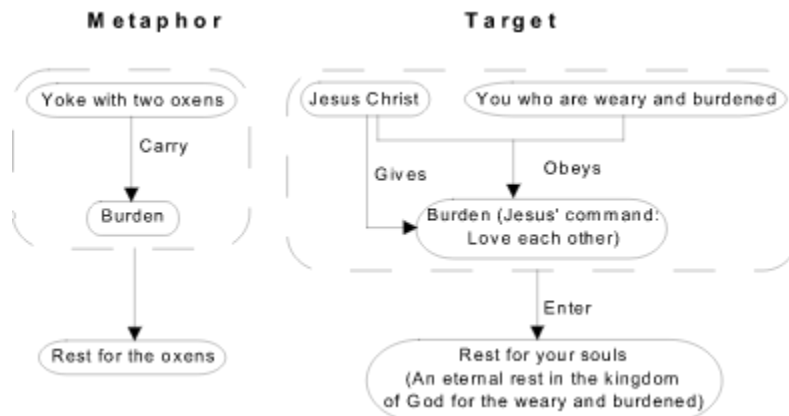

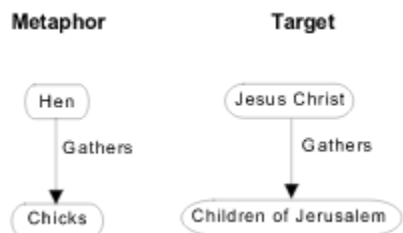

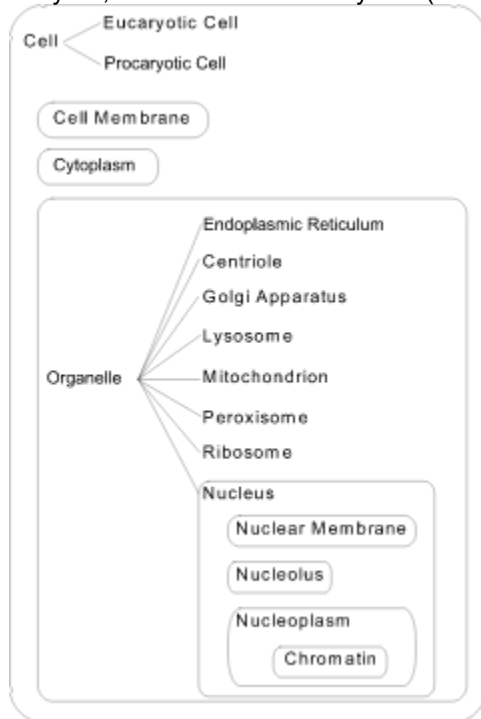

Life-Form Modeling Samples

Lifeform modeling samples are found under the directory **samples\lifeform** in this distribution.

The file **cell.frm** contains a model of living cells. Cells make up all living creatures, including microbes, plants, animals, and humans. For example, a human life begins as a single cell a fertilized egg that grows into a new born baby with 2 trillion cells in nine months and multiplies to 100 trillion cells when the growing stops in human body. Cells carry out all functions of living creatures with specialized cell structures for specific functions. Inside a cell, there are organelles that produce energy (mitochondrion), synthesize proteins from amino acids (ribosome), manufacture other organelles (Golgi apparatus and endoplasmic reticula). Cell nucleus controls the functions of these interacting organelles and cell division process (mitosis). Each organelle has its amazing organization, for example, in mitochondrion, sugars are broken down to produce energy through a sequence of 50 reactions, each with the help of a specific enzyme, a miniature assembly line (5 microns long in a human cell).



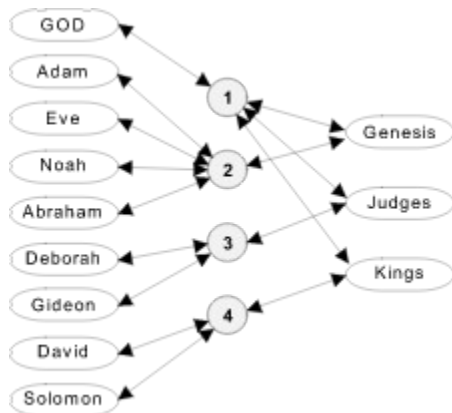
Neural Modeling Samples

Neural modeling samples are found under the directory **samples\neural** in this distribution.

The file **connect.frm** contains a neural model with a connectionist model called parallel distributed processing (PDP) developed by Jay McClelland and David Rumelhart (see *Parallel Distributed Processing: Explorations in microstructure of cognition*, Vol. 1, 2, MIT Press, 1986). This model can be used to model the representation of human knowledge by neural cells.

The Holy Bible is the epic of human knowledge. Although the Holy Bible was written by closed to 40 co-authors in a duration span over 1500 years (from ~1440 B.C. to ~100 A.D.) and the Old Testament (39 books, ~27) was written in Hebrew while the New Testament (27 books, 10 co-authors) was written in Greek, the entire Bible is extremely consistent.

In this example, we represented a tiny sample of the knowledge of the characters in the Holy Bible and in which book each appeared. In the drawing below there are two kinds of neural cells, mutually excitatory cells in white background and mutually inhibitory cells in gray background. By exciting one of the mutually excitatory cells, the knowledge related to it can be retrieved. For example, if the cell "Genesis" is excited, it will excite the mutually inhibitory cell (1) and (2), which in turn will excite the mutually excitatory cells "GOD", "Adam", "Eve", "Noah", and "Abraham". The knowledge of all the characters appeared in the book of Genesis is thus retrieved.



Ecological Modeling Samples

Ecological modeling samples are found under the directory **samples\ecology** in this distribution.

1. The file **water.frm** contains a model of the global hydrological cycle. It demonstrates the cycle of water moving in the creation. Water is the most precious resource provided by God, it sustains lives, cleanses our body, nourishes plants, cleans the environment, and many other purposes, "as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return to it without watering the earth and making it bud and flourish, so that it yields seed for the sower and bread for the eater" (Isaiah 55:10).
2. The file **foodchan.frm** contains a model of a food chain. It demonstrate the delicate balance between the predator and the prey in the creation that forms a hierarchy. At the top of this hierarchy is the "Top Carnivore" flesh eating animals tha preying on other Carivores. At the bottom of the hierarchy is the "Plant". As it was written in the Scriptures, "As the Lord God made all kinds of trees grow out of the groundtrees that were pleasing to the eye and good for food..." (Genesis 2:9); "Do you hunt the prey for the lioness and satisfy the hunger of the lions when they crouch in their dens or lie in wait in a thicket? Who provides food for the raven when its young cry out to God and wander about for lack of food?" (Job 38:39-41); "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good. ... and who gives food to every creature. His love endures forever" (Psalm 136:25); "Praise the Lord. ... He provided food for the cattle and for the young ravens when they call" (Psalm 147:9).
3. The file **carbon.frm** contains a model of the global carbon cycle. As one of the major global biogeochemical cycles and the key element of life on earth, the carbon cycle is very complex. It involves all life forms on earth as well as the inorganic carbon reservoirs and the links between them. The most apparent mutually beneficial part of the global carbon cycle is between plants and animals. As plants produces carbohydrates and oxygen in the process of photosynthesis using carbon dioxide and water as raw material, animals release carbon dioxide to the air through respiration. Carbon is also major fuel for mankind in the form of coal and petroleum. Global carbon cycle is also related to the global water cycle and the food chain. This sample can be expanded to show interaction with other global biogeochemical cycles. One can find many elements of the global carbon cycle in the scripture, "He cut down cedars, or perhaps took a cypress or oak. He let it grow among the trees of the forest, or planted a pine, and the rain made it grow. It is man's fuel for burning; some of it he takes and warms himself, he kindles a fire and bakes bread..." (Isaiah 44:14-15).
4. The file **nitrogen.frm** contains a model of the global nitrogen cycle. Nitrogen is the most common element in the atmosphere. The air we breathe is 78% nitrogen and 21% oxygen, leaving only 1% to be shared by other gases. It is one the elements that is necessary in the formation of protein, and a major element of plant fertilizer. Nitrogen cycle is helped by various bacteria carrying specific enzymes to carry out specific functions in the nitrogen cycle and to maintain its balance. Nitrogen cycle is also a critical process that treats the wastes of lives on earth. As the global carbon cycle, the global nitrogen cycle is also linked with the global water cycle and food chain.

Universe Modeling Samples

Universe modeling samples are found under the directory **samples\universe** in this distribution.

1. The file **galaxies.frm** contains a model of the stars and galaxies in the universe. The stars and galaxies are enormous in their expanse and energy. They demonstrate the enormous power of God the creator and sustainer. Despite their enormous dimensions, the stars and galaxies are well organized into elegant order. Galaxies contains a few hundred billion stars. Galaxies in turn are organized into clusters of galaxies. Clusters of galaxies form superclusters. Superclusters have been found to form "great walls" of elongated curving strings in the space. The universe is thought to be organized into a series of walls of galaxies, roughly 300 million light years apart, separated by voids. Many scriptures declared the mighty power of our Lord God, such as this one from the book of Isaiah, "To whom will you compare me? Or who is my equal?" says the Holy One. Lift your eyes and look to the heavens: Who created all these? He who brings out the starry host one by one, and calls them each by name. Because of his great power and mighty strength, not one of them is missing (Isaiah 40:25-26).
2. The file **particle.frm** contains a model of the fundamental particles being studied by particle physicists. Currently there have been found three classes of fundamental particles: quarks, leptons, and bosons (gauge particles). Quarks make up hadrons, such as protons, neutrons, and mesons. Leptons include electrons, electron neutrinos, muons, tau particles, etc. Bosons are the carriers of the four basic interactions (i.e., gravitational, electromagnetic, strong, and weak interactions). There have been found photons (carriers of electromagnetic interaction), gluons (carriers of strong interaction), and W, Z particles (carriers of weak interaction).

Bible Studying Samples

We have provided many samples that covers the following categories of bible studying:

Metaphors are widely found in the Bible in which familiar figures are used to speak of other less familiar concept. Metaphor modeling samples are found under the directory **samples\metaphor** in this distribution.

Types are frequently found in the Old Testament which prefigure things to come in the New Testament, where one finds anti-types, the counterpart of types. Types/anti-types samples are found under the directory **samples\types** in this distribution.

Messianic Prophecies are widely found in the books of the Old Testament that foretold the coming of a Messiah as the one and only Savior of the world, and later fulfilled in the New Testament in the ministry of the Lord Jesus Christ, who is the God manifested in the flesh. Messianic prophecies samples are found under the directory **samples\messiah** in this distribution.

End-Time Prophecies are found in both the Old and the New Testaments that foretold the return of our Lord Jesus Christ to judge the world, to destroy heavens and earth, to create new heavens and a new earth, and to reveal the glory of the Holy City, the new Jerusalem. End-time prophecies samples are found under the directory **samples\end-time** in this distribution.

Jesus' Parables are short tales that uses earthly things as analogy to convey spiritual meaning to the hearer. To understand a parable, you should pay attention to important features, and yet not make all details mean something. Jesus' parables samples are found under the directory **samples\parable** in this distribution.

Bible Types/Anti-Types Samples

Types/anti-types samples are found under the directory **samples\types** in this distribution.

1. The file **baptism.frm** contains an example of a type/anti-type. In this example, the type is the Israelites crossed the Red Sea, and the anti-type is a believer receives water baptism.
2. The file **passover.frm** contains another example of a type/anti-type. In this example, the type is the blood of Passover lamb saved the Israelites, and the anti-type is the redemption of sins of the world by the blood of Jesus Christ.

Messianic Prophecies Samples

Messianic prophecies samples are found under the directory **samples\messiah** in this distribution.

1. The file **SonOfGod.frm** contains an example of a Messianic prophecy. In this example, in the book of Isaiah in the Old Testament, it was prophesied that the Son of God is to be given to the world, who Himself is the Mighty God and our everlasting Father (Isaiah 9:6-7). This prophecy was fulfilled about 700 hundred years later, when Jesus Christ was born and later preached the Gospel of Kingdom of God and gave us a new command: Love each other. There are many scriptures in the Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John) recorded Jesus' ministry, where it was recorded that Jesus is Son of God (Matthew 3:16-17), Jesus is Himself God the Father (John 10:30).
2. The file **crucify.frm** contains an example of another Messianic prophecy. In this example, the crucifixion of the Messiah that saves the world was prophesied in the book of Isaiah (Isaiah 53:5-6). This prophecy was fulfilled when Jesus Christ died on the cross for the sins of the world, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness the eternal life (1 Peter 2:24).

End-Time Prophecies Samples

End-time prophecies samples are found under the directory **samples\end-time** in this distribution.

1. The file **unknown.frm** contains an example of an end-time prophecy. In this example, Jesus Christ told his disciples about the signs of the end of the age (Matthew 24). Jesus emphasized that the day and hour is not known to anyone, not even the angels in heaven, but God the Father alone (Matthew 24:36). This prophecy is very important for us living in the end times when many false prophets claim to know the exact date and time of the end of the world, while the Scriptures told us clearly that only God knows it.
2. The file **judgment.frm** contains an example of another end-time prophecy. In this example, it is prophesied and recorded in many scriptures that the dead and the living will be judged by God (Jesus Christ) when Jesus Christ returns.
3. The file **newearth.frm** contains an example of a prophecy about the destruction of the current heavens and earth, and the creation of new heavens and a new earth, and a new Jerusalem. There are a number of scriptures in the Bible prophesying about this event.

Jesus' Parables Samples

Jesus' parables samples are found under the directory **samples\parable** in this distribution.

1. The file **sower.frm** contains the example of the parable of the sower. In this example, Jesus used the parable of a sower and the outcome of seeds he scattered to indicate how Jesus preached the Gospel of God's kingdom and the outcome of people who heard it. It can be generally applied to what happens to anyone who hears the Gospel from an evangelist.
2. The file **10virgin.frm** contains the example of the parable of the ten virgins. In this example, Jesus used the parable of ten virgins to encourage the believers to stay fervent and be prepared at all times for the return of Jesus Christ, then they can enter the kingdom of God to have eternal life.

The True Jesus Church

By the will of God and the work of the Holy Spirit, the True Jesus Church was founded during 1917 by three believers from other Protestant denominations in Peking, China. The commission of the True Jesus Church is to restore the true church of the apostolic times for the end-time period. The true church is built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone. In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord (Ephesians 2:20-21). God also testified to the commission of the True Jesus Church by signs, wonders and various miracles, and gifts of the Holy Spirit distributed according to his will (Mark 16:20; Acts 14:3; Hebrews 2:4).

The General Assembly of the True Jesus Church was established during 1926 in Nanking, China. The True Jesus Church started to spread through the world. In a 1947 statistics, there were around 1,000 churches and 100,000 believers of the True Jesus Church in China alone. After communist took over China during 1949, the General Assembly moved to Taiwan, and the True Church continued to grow throughout the world. The International Assembly of the True Jesus Church was established in 1967 and later moved to the United States to carry out further the challenging mission of world evangelism.

According to a 1992 statistics, the True Jesus Church has established over 500 churches and prayer houses throughout the world in more than 20 countries in five continents, with over 75,000 believers. These numbers did not include the churches in China. Although the believers in China had been severely persecuted under the communist rule over the past forty years. Many of the Chinese believers and servants of our Lord were martyred. But miraculously, by the Spirit of the Lord Almighty, the True Jesus Church continued to grow in China to more than 200,000 believers according to a recent estimate.

The Name of God - Jesus

Many think that Jesus is not the name of God. Some believe 'Elohim' is the name of God, whereas the others 'Jehovah' (Yahweh in Hebrew text). But, they are only titles. Elohim has the technical meaning of leaders with authority; governors or rulers or diviners (1 Samuel 28:13). Most often it had been used to refer to pagan or false gods (Judges 8:33). Whenever, the Bible says the chosen people of God relied on the name of the Lord Jehovah or Yahweh for salvation, it means they called upon the title denoting God for deliverance. Jehovah means 'I am what I am' the Self-existing One. It was also a title used in the OT to distinguish God from other gods (Isaiah 42:8). Such a distinction was necessary because, in many occasions, the ignorance and naivety of Israelites and their contact with pagans led them to adopt paganistic practices and titles, which is called syncretism. And that mixed up their pure faith with heathen beliefs. In the book of Hosea, for example, the people of Israel addressed Baal 'Master'. So, it was essential to call Yahweh by another title, 'husband' in this case, to distinguish the Lord God from Baal (Hosea 2:16).

If the above two or other titles are names, then God would have many names. The people of God in the OT would not have to, from generation to generation, inquire after the name of God (Genesis 32:9,29; Judges 13:18; Proverbs 30:4). In this light, all the titles denoting God cannot be reckoned as the names of God.

"I appeared to Abraham, to Isaac and to Jacob as God Almighty, but by my name the Lord I did not make myself known to them" (Exodus 6:3). God had no intention to make His Name known in the OT. Even when prophet Isaiah was moved by the Holy Spirit of the Lord to explain God's name, he could only describe it but not say it out (Isaiah 9:6-7). To the Hebrew, the name of a person summarizes his/her complete nature and character. To know God's name is to know Him in totality, and to call on His name is to appeal to Him by His character, personality, and attributes, each of them merely told a part of His nature.

However, in the NT, God reveals His name, which is Jesus to man. It also fulfills the prophecy: "Therefore my people shall know my name" (Isaiah 52:6; cf. Psalms 22:22; Hebrew 2:12). His name is the culmination of all the titles of God that reveals the complete nature of God. "And the Lord will become King over all the earth; on that day the Lord will be one and His name one" (Zechariah 14:9).

Jesus being God Himself in the flesh and in Him was the fullness of the Godhead bodily (John 17:6, 11, 26; Colossians 1:19; 2:9). He exhibited the complete nature of God when He was on earth. In His prayer, Jesus was revealing the mystery that His name and His Father's name was the same (John 17:6, 11, 26). The full character of God is unveiling through the works Jesus and His disciples performed in His own name. Examples included healing (Acts 3:1-10), exorcising (Acts 19:13-17) and forgiving sins (Acts 22:16).

Besides, John says explicitly that by believing in the name of Jesus, we may know that we have eternal life (1 John 5:13) and is the commandment (1 John 3:23). These prove that Jesus is the name of God, the Father (Isaiah 35:4-6; cf. Luke 7:19-22) the only name given amongst us by which we must be saved (Acts 4:12).

The Holy Spirit and You

1. Who is the Holy Spirit?

The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of God, and also the spirit of Christ (Romans 8:9).

2. Why is it so important to receive the Holy Spirit?

When we received the Holy Spirit, the Spirit Himself testifies that we have become the children of God. God sets His seal of ownership on His children as a pledge guaranteeing the heavenly inheritance to those who have received the Holy Spirit (Romans 8:6; 2 Corinthians 1:21-22; Ephesians 1:13-14).

3. Is there any relationship between receiving the Holy Spirit and Salvation?

Yes. The Holy Spirit is not only a gift, but also indispensable for salvation. The Bible clearly states that unless we are born of water and the Spirit, we cannot enter the Kingdom of God (John 3:5).

4. Can we claim by virtue of belief, baptism, good works or fervent service to the Lord, we have already received the Holy Spirit?

No. The scriptures are clear in how we can tell we have received the Holy Spirit (Acts 19:1-2; 8:15-16; 10:2, 22, 33; 1:4-5;; Titus 3:5).

5. What is the evidence of receiving the Holy Spirit?

The immediate evidence of receiving the Holy Spirit is speaking in tongues (Acts 2:4; 10:46; 19:6).

6. What is the meaning of speaking in tongues?

Speaking in tongues means that we are speaking to God and not to man, and when we pray in the Holy Spirit, we utter mysterious words, or sounds which are usually not understood by men. Speaking in tongues, or spiritual tongues, is not a worldly language (1 Corinthians 14:2, 10-16).

7. Who can receive the Holy Spirit?

Our Father in heaven gives the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him (Luke 11:13).

8. How do we know that we will definitely receive the Holy Spirit?

It is the promise of God. He will give His Spirit to everyone who asks. He says: "I will pour out my Spirit on all people, I will put my Spirit in you" (Joel 2:28-29; Ezekiel 36:27; Luke 11:11-13).

9. How do we receive the Holy Spirit?

We must believe and follow the Gospel of Salvation and repent, receive water baptism in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins. It is essential that we pray for the Holy Spirit earnestly and persistently (Ephesians 1:13; Acts 5:32; 2:38; 19:2-7; 8:14-17; 1:14; Luke 11:5-13).

When praying for the Holy Spirit, we should begin by saying, "In the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ I pray. Hallelujah, O Lord, please bestow your Holy Spirit on me." We must also pray with importunity (John 14:26; Luke 11:8, 13). After having received the Holy Spirit we must do God's will and rely on His power to bear spiritual fruit to glorify Him (Galatians 5:22-23; Ephesians 4:20-24).

The Holy Spirit is vital to our salvation. It is for our own benefit to know more about the Holy Spirit. Please come to a [True Jesus Church](#) near you to study the scriptures and pray for the Holy Spirit for your eternal salvation.

Basic Beliefs of the True Jesus Church

1. God was manifested in the flesh as the Lord Jesus Christ. He died on the cross for the remission of sins and was resurrected on the third day, then He ascended into Heaven. Jesus is the one and only Savior of the world, the Creator of heavens and earth, and the only true God. (1 Timothy 3:16; 1 Corinthians 15:3-4; Luke 2:8-11; Philippians 2:6-8; Acts 4:12)
2. The Holy Bible, consisting of the Old and New Testaments, is given by inspiration of God and is the sole foundation of truth and the standard of faith for the believers. (2 Timothy 3:16; 2 Peter 1:21; Galations 1:6-9)
3. True Jesus Church is the true church, established by Jesus Christ through the Holy Spirit of the end-time ("Latter Rain") for the purpose of restoring the true church of the apostolic times. (Joel 2:23; Amos 9:11)
4. Water baptism is the sacrament for the remission of sins and for regeneration. It must be performed in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ. The baptist must be one who has been baptized of water and of the Holy Spirit. The baptized, with the head bowed, must be completely immersed in living water. (Matthew 3:16; Acts 2:38; John 20:21-23, 19:30; Romans 8:16)
5. Receiving the Holy Spirit, which is evidenced by speaking in tongues, is the guarantee for the inheritance until the possession of the kingdom of Heaven. (Ephesians 1:13-14; Acts 10:44-47; Romans 8:16)
6. The sacrament of foot-washing enables one to have a part in the Lord Jesus Christ. It also serves as a constant reminder that one should have love, holiness, humility, service, and forgiveness. Every person who has received water baptism must have the feet washed once in the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ. Mutual foot-washing may be practiced when necessary. (John 13:1-17)
7. The Holy Communion is the sacrament in remembrance of the death of the Lord Jesus Christ. It enables the believers to partake of the flesh and blood of the Lord, and to be in communion with Him so that they can have eternal life and be raised on the Last Day. This sacrament should be held often. Only one unleavened bread and grape juice shall be used. (1 Corinthians 11:26, 10:17; John 6:53-56; Mark 14:24-25)
8. The Sabbath, the seventh day of the week (Saturday), is a holy day blessed and sanctified by God. It is to be observed under grace for the commemoration of God's creation and redemption, and with the hope of eternal rest in the Kingdom of God. (Genesis 2:2-3; Exodus 20:8-11; Hebrews 4:9-11)
9. Salvation is given by the grace of God to believers through their faith in Jesus Christ. The believer must rely on the Holy Spirit to pursue holiness, to honor God and to love mankind. (Ephesians 2:8; Hebrews 12:14; Ecclesiastes 12:13; Matthew 22:37-39)
10. The second coming of the Lord Jesus Christ will take place on the Last Day when He descends from heaven to judge the world. The righteous will receive eternal life and the wicked will be condemned. (Acts 1:11; 2 Corinthians 5:10; Matthew 25:31-34; 1 Thessalonians 4:16-17)

Are You in the True Church?

The New Testament defines church as the mystical body of Christ of which He is the head (Ephesians 1:22-23), and a holy temple for the habitation of God through the Spirit (Ephesians 2:21-22). The true Church, established on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:1-42), is "one flesh" with Christ (Ephesians 5:30-32). As the Church is the body of Jesus Christ, all the members have become one body by the baptism of the water (Galatians 3:27-29). It is in Jesus Christ and of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:13).

The unique nature of the true Church as the one body of Christ is attested to by the Scriptures: "There is one body and one Spirit..." (Ephesians 4:4; 1 Corinthians 10:17)

"For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body Jews or Greeks, slaves or free and all were made to drink of one Spirit" (1 Corinthians 12:12-13)

"The Church is his body..." (Ephesians 1:23)

"Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake for the sake of his body, that is, the Church" (Colossians 1:24)

From these verses it is clear that the Church is the body of Christ. As there is only one body of Christ, there is only one true Church which has "one faith, one baptism, one Spirit" with one Father and Jesus Christ as the Lord.

Thus, everyone must make sure of his salvation by finding the True Church. What are the requisites of the True Church?

1. The Holy Spirit

The Church (*ecclesia* in Greek) is an assembly "called out" of the world by God, gathering to worship as server Him. In this community of faith, God's presence is evidenced by the Holy Spirit. Therefore the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of God, or the Spirit of Christ in a church (Ephesians 1:23) proves that God is with her (1 John 3:24) and that she belongs to Christ (Romans 8:9). Through the Holy Spirit the Church has the power to retain and forgive sins (John 20:21-23; Matthew 16:19). Without having the Holy Spirit the Church is only a social community established according to human ideas.

2. The Miracles and Wonders

A second requisite for a True Church is the presence of miracles and wonders. These signs further testify the presence of God (Mark 16:17-18; John 3:1-2; 1 Corinthians 12:9; Luke 10:19) and confirm the Truth (Mark 16:20; Acts 14:3; Hebrews 2:3-4).

3. The Complete Doctrine of Salvation

A church that claims to have the power to perform miracles and wonders is not necessarily a true church, because Satan, the evil spirit can also perform miracles and wonders (2 Thessalonians 2:9; Matthew 24:24). The third requisite of the True Church is the complete Gospel. The True Church must preach the message of salvation completely according to the Holy Bible, for without doing so she can never lead men to the Kingdom of God (Matthew 15:14; 23:15)

Before 1983, I was a healthy young man. I could do anything I wanted, and no one could tell me what to do, not even God! In spite of my sinful attitude and arrogant nature, God still loved me. There were two events that were unfolding in 1983 that brought me to God, and were the first of many blessings I have received from Him. The first experience was in the summer of 1983 when I first met the woman who would later become my wife. She was visiting America from Taiwan. She was only planning to stay for one month; therefore, I believe that the way we met could only have been arranged by God. We got along so well that on February 4, 1984, we were married.

The second event occurred also in the summer of 1983. I started to feel ill and went to see my doctor. I was given a complete examination, as well as numerous tests, yet my doctor could not find the problem. Eight days after my wedding, I was admitted to the hospital. A whole new series of tests was done for about a week. It was finally determined that I had lupus, a chronic auto-immune disease my immune system turned against my own body. The symptoms of lupus are many: inflammation of the joints, constant fatigue, loss of appetite, insomnia, abnormal blood pressure, nausea, arthritis, a butterfly rash over the face and body, tenderness and swelling of the joints, and visual hypersensitivity to the sun. In addition to having lupus, I suffered a mild stroke. Furthermore, my newly wed wife from Taiwan knew very little English. When I did not know what to do, I prayed to God for help. I went to several churches in the San Diego area. Although my physical condition remained the same, I was nevertheless drawing closer to God.

At the end of May 1988, my wife and I took a trip to Taiwan to visit my mother-in-law, who was suffering from end-stage diabetes. While there, for the first time I observed the Sabbath worship in the True Jesus Church, where my wife has been a member since childhood. I was surprised to hear them pray in spiritual tongues. However, as I watched them I saw that they were very sincere. When I knelt down, I prayed hard and felt very warm and tranquil.

I perceived that the True Jesus Church was different from other church. After returning from Taiwan we were pleased to find the True Jesus Church in Garden Grove, California. It was such a long drive from San Diego that we had to stop and rest at the house of our uncle, Deacon Yang, on the way home. In early October 1989, on a Sabbath afternoon, we stopped as usual at Deacon Yang's house for fellowship and prayer. Praise the Lord! I received the Holy Spirit. I perspired heavily and started to speak in tongues, uttering things I could not understand. Hallelujah! I was filled with the joy of the Spirit.

On December 29, a spiritual convocation was held in the Garden Grove church. During the concluding prayer, I had a vision. First, I saw Jesus on the cross with his head bowed down. I then saw blood running down from both his hands and his feet. Next, I saw myself being prepared for baptism. I was completely immersed in the water. Then, looking up through the water to the sky, I saw a huge hand coming down towards me. When it touched me, I started to sweat profusely.

This was the first time I knew that I was going to be cured of my lupus. On December 31 of 1989, I was baptized. Praise God! After the baptism, I felt as if a thousand pounds had been lifted off my shoulders. I was able to put away my protective sunglasses. My face was not even burnt by the sun. How wonderful!

On January 1, 1990, God's blessings poured upon me again. It was a cold and stormy night, yet I felt as if I were burning up inside, and had to get out of bed and kneel down to pray. I saw another vision: a huge hand came down through the storm and reached me. I heard a voice saying, "Do not be afraid, I want to

show you something." I felt someone take hold of my hand, lift my soul into the sky, and break through what seemed to be the very highest cloud. It felt so peaceful and tranquil, far more than mere words could possibly describe. I was in heaven. I saw that everything was shining and paved with soft gold. I wanted very much to stay, but Jesus told me, "No. It is not time yet." Then, Jesus brought me back to the world and started to heal me. I first felt Him working inside my head, healing the effects of my stroke. Then I felt His hand move down onto my chest, take hold of my heart, and turn it completely around. He proceeded to do likewise to all my other internal organs. In the meantime, Jesus was telling me prepare for His ministry and help establish the True Jesus Church in San Diego. Praise the Lord, I was totally healed. Since then, my doctor has examined me, amazed that I had been healed so completely.

May all the glory and praise be unto Him. Amen.

The Lord will call upon me, and I will answer Him

I was first diagnosed with cancer in August 1990. Since then, my doctors have tried to control the disease with surgery, chemotherapy and radiation. However, they are, at this time, concerned that the disease is what they term as 'rapidly advancing', and are encouraging me to try a higher dose of chemo drugs. If I can picture a drowning man clinging to the last straw, then it would appear to me that the doctors' recommendations would seem viable. For the past few months, I have been wrestling within myself, and I have this week come to the conclusion that it is only our Almighty God who can help me. And, it is with this plea for mercy from a compassionate God that I am standing here before you today.

You see, my father, two younger sisters and a few relatives have died of this terrible disease within a short period of their doctors' diagnosis. I have often wondered if, I, too, will perish in the same way. I have also heard that, if I die in these end time, it would only be a short while, before Jesus comes and my family would join me anyway. I have thought about the logic of this assumption, and wondered if, perhaps, I could look at it a little differently.

Psalm 91 verses 14, 15, and 16 often bring me hope and comfort.

14 "Because he loves me," says the LORD, "I will rescue him; I will protect him, for he acknowledges my name.

15 He will call upon me, and I will answer him; I will be with him in trouble, I will deliver him and honor him.

16 With long life will I satisfy him and show him my salvation."

These verses transport me back to my high school days when I read the Bible for the first time and understood it to be the words of God. It was not until over thirty six years later that I got baptized, but as I look back, I can see how our Lord Jesus brought me to the true church. And while I have been ill over the past three years, there is no doubt in my mind that God has given me His protection all the way.

Earlier on, I brought up the fact about us living in 'these end times', and by the grace of God, He has made Himself known to me so that I can work out my salvation. I know also that in our church, we believe that God has commissioned us to preach the gospel to all nations until the Second Coming of Jesus Christ. In Matthew 9:37 Jesus said to His disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few." If this verse means anything to me; if these words were spoken from the mouth of our Lord, then I certainly have not yet fulfilled my role in these end times.

It is not enough that by the grace of God, I have a chance to get to know Him. It is not enough that by the grace of God, I have the love of my family and of the brothers and sisters of the church. It is not enough that by the grace of God, I have enjoyed His protection throughout my illness. It is not enough, because I have yet to boldly share the faith that we proclaim in our church that we have received divine revelation of the Truth, that we are endowed with the Holy Spirit, and confirmed by signs and miracles.

At this time, my family and I can relate to the Israelites as they stood at the edge of the Red Sea and watched in terror at the advancing armies of Pharaoh. We can also understand how they must have thought it impossible, when Moses told them that they needed only to be still, because the Lord would fight for them. Yet, it is written in the Bible that God opened a way for them to cross the Red Sea safely, and in Exodus 14:31 it says, "And when the Israelites saw the great power the Lord displayed against the Egyptians, the people feared the Lord and put their trust in Him." In this way, God once again gained glory for Himself.

In this testimony, I recollect my youthful days. Many of us in the congregation are here for the National Youth Theological Seminar. I cannot recapture my youth, but I want you to know that there is no greater

blessing than to be given the opportunity to serve the Lord in this way. I encourage you to continue in your efforts to seek the Truth, because there is no amount of worldly wisdom, wealth or health that can keep the soul at peace with God.

And while I may not be able to recapture my youth, I end this testimony with a plea for mercy from the only Living God so that I can reciprocate His ultimate sacrifice for me and for all mankind by being a good witness for Him. I cannot do this alone. I need all the help you can give me. I am not worthy to compare myself with Moses, yet I need the kind of help that Moses received from Aaron and Hur to win this spiritual battle. I need your continued prayers so that I can be a good Christian soldier, and know that our Lord Jesus did not die in vain for me.

(Brother Larry A. Estrada gave this testimony to a group of youth in August 1993. He was later received into the arms of our Lord in December 1993 after suffering from cancer for three years. During those three years of illness, with strength from our Lord, he was a constant inspiration to other church members. In times of trial and suffering, he rejoiced in our Lord always. A few days before his departure, he suddenly woke up from sleep and cried out, "Lord! Here I am!" He died in peace without pain in the presence of his family. We pray to our Lord to comfort his wife and two children and to provide for them in the coming years.)

God's Power is Made Perfect in Weakness

Hallelujah, we would like to present our testimony in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

But He said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness. "Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weakness, so that Christ's power may rest on me. (2 Corinthians 12:9)

I grew up in a Christian family, my parents are church members of other Christian denomination in Taiwan. My wife had also received baptism more than 10 years ago in other denomination. When we were church members of various denominations, we had never heard of any testimonies of visions, dreams, and miracles. Above all, we had very little knowledge regarding the Holy Spirit, let alone experiencing them. This changed after we were lead to this church by the grace of God, we started to have visions and dreams of our Lord Jesus Christ. At first, we thought these to be the grace of God edifying us. We thought these to be very personal experiences, and not something we should talk about. Later on, a pastor told us that we should share our experiences with others to bear witness for our Lord Jesus Christ, to encourage truth seekers in their search of God, and to strengthen the faith of others, and to have fellowship with our brothers and sisters.

The following is our testimony:

In the summer of 1992, my wife signed up a swimming lesson for our son (who is 8 years old now). She met a sister of this church. This sister invited her to come to a Spiritual Convocation. Although we have been church members of another denomination for several years, we had been constantly seeking a church that is truly guided by God. That's how we started being truth-seekers of the True Jesus Church. The first time I came to this church, I was surprised how the church members prayed. Following the suggestion of a church brother, I studied the Book of Acts, especially chapter 2, and come to better understanding of the Holy Spirit and the gift of tongues. As we come to Sabbath services weekly, we found the sermons to be always faithful to the Scriptures from both the Old and the New testaments. God also opened our minds, so we were able to truly understand the words of God. Amazingly, each week, the sermon always included something we were eager to know more about. We felt the omniscient God knows exactly what our needs are.

In December of 1992, we planned to go skiing in Lake Tahoe area, but the weather was awful (heavy snow in the mountains and raining on the way to the ski resort). We prayed to our Lord for better weather so we can make the trip. The weather did turn sunny as we embarked on our trip. It was sunny for all four days while we skied. It started raining again until after we came back from the ski trip. One day during our ski trip, I was on a lift chair which carries skiers to a higher altitude. I looked around the beautiful scenery and was overwhelmed by the remarkable creation of God. Later that day I had a bad fall on the slope, although I tried but couldn't get back on my feet. It hurt so much I felt my legs were going to break. There was no one around to help me, I prayed to God for help, and miraculously I was right back on my feet again without any pain in my legs. I couldn't figure out how I got up until I heard a similar testimony several months later, then I realized it was our Lord Almighty who lifted me up.

After we came home from the ski trip, I had a dream one night. In the dream, the Lord Jesus Christ put me floating in the air. I felt I was undergoing a thorough physical examination. Then He put a small object in my body to cure my internal hemorrhage that I had for a couple of years. In the same dream, I was kneeling down and prayed in a tongue. Afterward I was put into a place with gold objects orbiting in the sky. As I woke up, I had the urge to pray and to say Hallelujah repeatedly. I also had strong desire to study the Scriptures to learn more about the words of God.

Afterward, we experienced even more grace of God. When we learned that a Spiritual Convocation was going to be held in late May of 1993 at the True Jesus Church in San Jose, California, we decided the

whole family would receive the water baptism then. One night in early May, my wife had a dream. In the dream, she was praying in a tongue at home and I walked over to her and asked her "How come you have received the Holy Spirit, and I haven't?" She turned her head and ask our Lord Jesus Christ who was beside her, "Yea, How come I have received the Holy Spirit but not he?" Jesus said gently, "Don't worry, he will receive the Holy Spirit after the water baptism." She continued to pray until she woke up from the dream. We knew it was the promise of God and will be fulfilled. We kept on studying the Bible and praying everyday. One day before our water baptism, pastor Lo and a brother came to visit us. As we started to pray, my wife had the vision of our Lord Jesus Christ standing before her, she couldn't help and let out all her sufferings throughout the years to God. The Lord Jesus gently petted her head three times and said, "Child, I know, I know..." That's how she received the Holy Spirit, it was exactly the same scene as in her dream earlier. On the 7th day from the day my wife received the Holy Spirit, we were praying in the morning at home. My wife had the vision of the Glory of God floating before her eyes to my side and then heard me started praying in a tongue. Praise the Lord for His blessing, that my wife and I are in one heart under our Lord Jesus Christ and pray together everyday.

Andrew is our first born son, since he was 4, he started having chronic nose-bleeding because of allergy. His nose-bleeding problem can occur at any moment, even when he is asleep. It got worse over the years. In the spring of 1993, it became worse because of the high pollen-count in the air in the Bay Area. It was very painful for him when he was at school, his nose is always stuffed, his eyes are red, and his face swollen. It was hard for him to fall asleep at night, because he felt like being choked to death. He would be fussy all night and crying a lot. We have tried all kinds of medicine, and there was no cure for him. One night, until 2 in the morning, he finally went to sleep, my wife and I couldn't sleep and started worrying about Andrew's coming years. We felt sad and knelt down to pray to our Lord Jesus Christ. We prayed to God to take care of our son and cure his illness. Afterward we went back to sleep, that night I had a dream, in the dream our Lord Jesus Christ was holding Andrew passionately in his arms. When I told my wife about it in the morning, we felt Andrew was going to be cured of his severe chronic allergy. In a couple of days, his nose started to clear and breathed normally. God listened to our prayers and had mercy on us and our son.

On December 25, 1993, the whole family attended the Spiritual Convocation at the San Jose church. During the afternoon prayer session, Andrew had a vision while he was praying, he saw our Lord Jesus dressed in shiny white garment and His head was bright and glorious. Lord Jesus walked among church members and laid His hand on several people, including Andrew. When Andrew saw our Lord leaving, he quietly said, "Pass me not, Lord!" And our Lord Jesus gently replied, "I am here.", then a dove flew out and landed on Andrew's shoulder. Andrew received the Holy Spirit and started praying in a tongue, he was in tears but felt very peaceful and sinless. The next morning, Andrew prayed with my wife and I together, he had the vision of our Lord Jesus again, he saw our Lord came before him and looked at him while he was praying. Andrew was moved to tears. When Jesus left, a dove flew to Andrew with a glorious star on the head and grabbing a gold and shiny gift box on the feet. The dove dropped the gift box in front of Andrew, and landed on his shoulder again while Andrew continued to pray. The dove flew away when the praying stopped. When Andrew told me his vision the previous night, I didn't know what it all meant. But when he told me about the second vision, praise our Lord for opening my mind, that I realized Andrew had received the gift of the Holy Spirit. Our Lord had mercy on our family and blessed us greatly with His abundant grace. Helen and I had always worried about Andrew and prayed for him a lot and asked our Lord's guidance to bring him up as a child of God. Our Lord answered our prayer with the greatest gift of all, and gave Andrew His Holy Spirit.

Thanks be to our Lord Jesus Christ whose abundant love and grace have given us many edifying experiences. Even when we were still sinners, God lead us and poured out his grace on us abundantly. Bible Studying

The MindFrame Windows Application is also useful in several areas of Holy Bible studies. The original text of this ".hlp" file is available as a PostScript file (biblnote.ps) included in the release archive. You can get a better hardcopy from this separate PostScript file, because it preserves the better formatting of the original document.

The Holy Bible, consisting of the Old and New Testaments, is given by inspiration of God and is the sole foundation of truth and the standard of faith for the believers. (2 Timothy 3:16; 2 Peter 1:21; Galatians 1:6-9). Although the Holy Bible was written by closed to 40 co-authors in a duration span over 1500 years (from ~1440 B.C. to ~100 A.D.) and the Old Testament (39 books, ~27) was written in Hebrew while the New Testament (27 books, 10 co-authors) was written in Greek, the entire Bible is extremely consistent.

There are large selection of English versions of the Holy Bible that can be found in Christian book stores or distributors throughout the United States (e.g. Christian Book Distributors at 508-977-5000). The most popular ones are:

The New International Version (NIV): It is a completely new translation of the Holy Bible directly from the best available Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek texts. The language is more contemporary comparing with other versions.

The New Revised Standard Version (NRSV): This recently released version is also well known and more scholarly than others.

The New King James Version (NKJV): A newly revised version of the King James Version (KJV), which was the oldest English translation of the Holy Bible still in use today that appeared in 1611 under the patronage of James I. Because of its early inception, the English language used is quite different from contemporary English.

The New American Standard Version (NAS): Published in 1971, this is a newly revised version of the American Standard Version published in 1901.

Using MindFrame application to study the following categories of Bible knowledge will help you gaining deeper insight of the words of God. However, the best way to understand the words of God is to read the the Bible under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, who comes from God to guide us into all truth (John 16:13). As the Lord Jesus promised, "If anyone loves, he will obey my teaching. My Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him. ... But the counselor, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said to you." (John 14:23, 26).

Metaphors are widely found in the Bible in which familiar figures are used to speak of other less familiar concept.

Types are frequently found in the Old Testament which prefigure things to come in the New Testament, where one finds anti-types, the counterpart of types.

Messianic Prophecies are widely found in the books of the Old Testament that foretold the coming of a Messiah as the one and only Savior of the world, and later fulfilled in the New Testament in the ministry of the Lord Jesus Christ, who is the God manifested in the flesh.

End-Time Prophecies are found in both the Old and the New Testaments that foretold the return of our Lord Jesus Christ to judge the world, to destroy heavens and earth, to create new heavens and a new earth, and to reveal the glory of the Holy City, the new Jerusalem.

Jesus' Parables are short tales that uses earthly things as analogy to convey spiritual meaning to the hearer. To understand a parable, you should pay attention to mportant features, and yet not make all details mean something.

Metaphors

Metaphors are widely found in the Bible where familiar figures are used to speak of other less familiar concepts. Both the familiar and the unfamiliar concepts can be represented as object models with classes and relationships among them. To understand a metaphor, in the mind of a hearer, the object model of the familiar concept is mapped to the unfamiliar one. There are countless metaphors found in the Bible, we only provide a small sample as examples, in the hope of helping you get started on your exploration. You can find the following examples as working samples distributed with the release archive. A number of additional metaphors used by the Lord Jesus Christ are also listed at the end. You can use them to practice using the MindFrame as a bible-studying tool.

Yoke and Burden

Types and Anti-types

There are several meanings associated with the the Greek word *tupos* used in the New Testament, such as figure, pattern, example, ensample, etc. In the bible, the Old Testament contains many "types". A type is a representation of something to come, an event in the Old Testament that foreshadows another in the New Testament. The counterpart of a type is an "anti-type" in the New Testament. Therefore an "anti-type" is foreshadowed by or identified with an earlier symbol or type in the Old Testament.

There are many other similar verses pointed out by the apostles in their epistles to the churches (e.g. Romans, Hebrews, etc.). The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be in you. (John 14:15-17)

(Jesus taken up into heaven...) After his suffering, he showed himself to these men and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God. On one occasion, while he was eating

with them, he gave them, he gave them this command: "Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about. For John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." ⁶So when they met together, they asked Jesus, "Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?" ⁷Jesus said to them: "It is not for you to know the times or dates the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." After He said this, He was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid him from their sight. (Acts 1:3-9)

(The Holy Spirit comes at Pentecost...) ¹When the Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. ²Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. ³They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. ⁴All of them were filled with Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them. (Acts 2)

End-Time Prophecies

There are many prophecies deal with the end of the world and the new order to be established by our Lord God. These prophecies are found in both the Old and the New Testaments which foretold the sequence of events to come at the second coming of our Lord Jesus Christ to raise the chosen, to judge the world, to destroy the heavens and earth, to create new heavens and a new earth, and to reveal the glory of the Holy City, the new Jerusalem. We list a few for your reference.

Signs of the end of the age: In the Gospels according to Matthew and Mark, the Lord Jesus Christ answered His disciples' question of the sign of His return and the end of age. In apostle Paul's epistle to Timothy, Paul also wrote about Godlessness in the last days.

The day and hour unknown: When Jesus answered the question of His return and the end of age, He also stressed that no one knows about the day or hour, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Other verses in the New Testament also prophesied that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night.

The great tribulation: In the book of Revelation in the New Testament, the last book of the Bible, apostle John recorded the revelation of Jesus Christ. Among the many end-time prophecies recorded in the book of Revelation, it is revealed that a great tribulation will come prior to the return of Jesus Christ.

The day of the Lord: Many verses in the New Testament prophesied that Jesus Christ will return at the end of the world to raise His chosen people to eternal life. (1 Th. 4:13)

The dead and the living are judged: In the book of Revelation, it also recorded how people will be judged according to what they had done. Other verses in the Bible also prophesied about the judgment day. (Psalm 22; Romans 14:9,

New heavens and a new earth: Many verses in the Bible also prophesied the destruction of the existing

heavens and earth, and the creation of new heavens and a new earth, the home of righteousness. (Psalm 69;

New Jerusalem: In the book of Revelation and other verses in the Bible, it is prophesied that God will live with men in the Holy City, the new Jerusalem.

Signs of the End of the Age

1. He will confirm a covenant with many for one `seven.` In the middle of the `seven` he will put an end to sacrifice and offering. And on a wing of the temple he will set up an abomination that causes desolation, until the end that is decreed is poured out on him.(Daniel 9:27)
2. His armed forces will rise up to desecrate the temple fortress and will abolish the daily sacrifice. Then they will set up the abomination that causes desolation. (Daniel 11:31)

The Dead and the Living are Judged

Yes, to your amazement he will show him even greater things than these. ²¹For just as the Father raises the dead and gives life to whom he is pleased to give it. ²²Moreover, the Father judges no one, but has entrusted all judgment to the Son, ²³that all may honor the Son just as they honor the Father. He who does not honor the Son does not honor the Father, who sent him. ²⁴I tell you the truth, whoever hears my word and believes him who sent me has eternal life and will not be condemned; he has crossed over from death to life. ²⁵I tell you the truth, a time is coming and has now come when the dead will hear the voice of the Son of God and those who hear will live. ²⁶For as the Father has life in himself, so he has granted the Son to have life in himself. ²⁷And he has given him authority to judge because he is the Son of Man. ²⁸Do not be amazed at this, for a time is coming when all who are in their graves will hear his voice ²⁹and come out—those who have done good will rise to live, and those who have done evil will rise to be condemned. ³⁰By myself I can do nothing; I judge only as I hear, and my judgment is just, for I seek not to please myself but him who sent me. 6. ¹Therefore, since Christ suffered in his body, arm yourselves also with the same attitude, because he who has suffered in his body is done with sin. ²As a result, he does not live the rest of his earthly life for evil human desires, but rather for the will of God. ³For you have spent enough time in the past doing what pagans choose to do—living in debauchery, lust, drunkenness, orgies, carousing and detestable idolatry. ⁴They think it strange that you do not plunge with them into the same flood of dissipation, and they heap abuse on you. ⁵But they will have to give account to him who is ready to judge the living and the dead. ⁶For this is the reason the gospel was preached even to those who are now dead, so that they might be judged according to men in regard to the body, but live according to God in regard to the spirit. (1 Peter 4:1-6)

On the gates were written the names of the twelve tribes of Israel. ¹³There were three gates on the east, three on the north, three on the south and three on the west. ¹⁴The wall of the city had twelve foundations, and on them were the names of the twelve apostles of the Lamb. ...
²²I did not see a temple in the city, because the Lord God Almighty and the Lamb are its temple. ²³The city does not need the sun or the moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and the Lamb is its lamp. ²⁴The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their splendor into it.. ²⁵On no day will its gates ever be shut, for there will be no night there. ²⁶The glory and honor of the nations will be brought into it. ²⁷Nothing impure will ever enter it, nor will anyone who does what is shameful or deceitful, but only those whose names are written in the Lamb's book of life. (Revelation 21)

Parables Told by Jesus Christ in the Gospels

During the ministry of the Lord Jesus Christ, He told many short tales that uses earthly things as analogy to convey spiritual meaning to the hearer. Most of these parables dealt with the essential preaching of Jesus Christ, the Kingdom of God (No. 2-8, 13-17, 19-22) the love of God (No. 9-11), and loving each other as Jesus Christ first loved us (1 John 4:19) (No. 13, 18, 23). While explaining the parable of the sower, Jesus said to His disciples, "The knowledge of the secrets of the kingdom of God has been given to you, but to others I speak in parables, so that, "though seeing, they may not see; though hearing, they may not understand." Therefore, to understand a parable, we must study under what circumstances a parable was told and how the Lord Jesus explained it. Also one must not ignore important features in a parable, yet not make all details mean something.

The Parables of the Sower

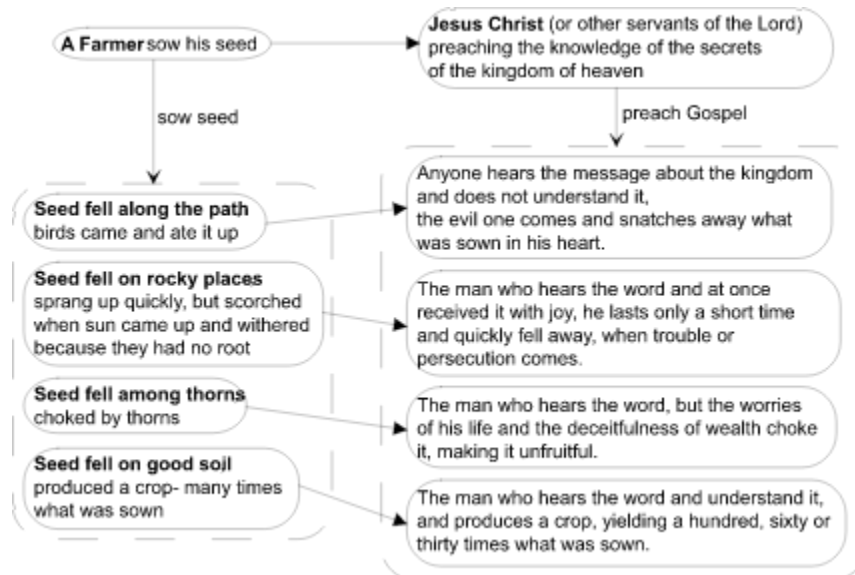
(Matthew 13:3-9; 18-23; Mark 4:3-8; 14-20; Luke 8:5-8, 11-15)

3Jesus said, "A farmer went out to sow his seed. 4As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. 5Some fell on rocky places, where it did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly, because the soil was shallow. 6But when the sun came up, the plants were scorched, and they withered because they had no root. 7Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up and choked the plants. 8Still other seed fell on good soil, where it produced a crop a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown. 9He who has ears, let him hear." (Matthew 13:3-9)

18Jesus said, "Listen then to what the parable of the sower means: 19When anyone hears the message about the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what was sown in his heart. This is the seed sown along the path. 20The one who received the seed that fell on rocky places is the man who hears the word and at once receives it with joy. 21But since he has no root, he lasts only a short time. When trouble or persecution comes because of the word, he quickly falls away. 22The one who received the seed that fell among the thorns is the man who hears the word, but the worries of this life and the deceitfulness of wealth choke it, making it unfruitful. 23But the one who received the seed that fell on good soil is the man who hears the word and understands it. He produces a crop, yielding a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown." (Matthew 13:18-23)

Explanation:

The parable was recorded in verse 3 to 9, and the explanation Jesus gave to his disciples was recorded in verse 18-23. As depicted in the drawing, there is a direct correspondence between the characters in the parable and the ones in its spiritual meaning. The relationships among the characters also correspond with each other.



The Parables of the Lost Sheep

(Matthew 18:12-13; 10-11,14; Luke 15:4-7)

*10*Jesus said, "See that you do not look down on one of these little ones. For I tell you that their angels in heaven always see the face of my Father in heaven. *11*The Son of Man came to save what was lost.

*12*What do you think? If a man owns a hundred sheep, and one of them wanders away, will he not leave the ninety-nine on the hills and go to look for the one that wandered off? *13*And if he finds it, I tell you the truth, he is happier about that one sheep than about the ninety-nine that did not wander off. *14*In the same way, your Father in heaven is not willing that any of these little ones should be lost." (Matthew 18:10-14)

Explanation:

The body of the parable is recorded in verse 12 and 13, and it can be understood with verse 10, 11 and 14. This parable is also recorded in Luke 15:4-7 under different circumstances, but its spiritual meaning is the same, that our Lord does not let any children to be lost (or any sinner not turn back in repentance).

This parable shows the love of our Heavenly Father towards us, the sinners and the lost sheep of the world.

The Parables of the Unmerciful Servant

(Matthew 18:21-35)

21Then Peter came to Jesus and asked, "Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brothers when he sins against me? Up to seven times?"

22Jesus answered, "I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times.

23Therefore, the kingdom of heaven is like a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. 24As he began the settlement, a man who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him. 25Since he was not able to pay, the master ordered that he and his wife and his children and all that he had be sold to repay the debt.

26The servant fell on his knees before him. 'Be patient with me,' he begged, 'and I will pay back everything.' 27The servant's master took pity on him, canceled the debt and let him go.

28But when that servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii. He grabbed him and began to choke him. 'Pay back what you owe me!' He demanded.

29His fellow servant fell to his knees and begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back.'

30But he refused. Instead, he went off and had the man thrown into prison until he could pay the debt.

31When the other servants saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed and went and told their master everything that had happened.

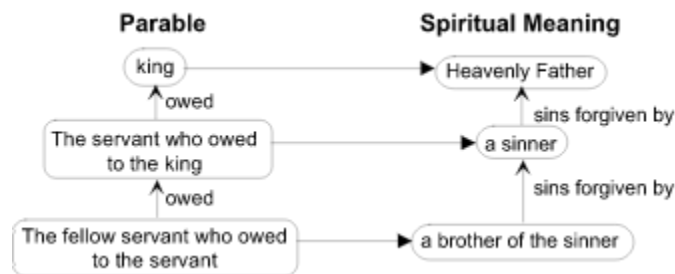
32Then the master called the servant in. 'You wicked servant,' he said, 'I canceled all that debt of yours because you begged me to. 33Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?'

34In anger his master turned him over to the jailers to be tortured, until he should pay back all he owed.

35This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother from your heart." (Matthew 18:21-35)

Explanation:

This parable shows how we should forgive the sins of others as God had forgave our sins, and love others as God had loved us. It can also be understood with a verse in the Lord's prayer (Matthew 6:9-13)"Forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors". The drawing depicts the characters as well as their relationships in the parable and in its spiritual meaning.



The Parables of the Good Samaritan

(Luke 10:25-37)

25On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?"

26"What is written in the Law?" he replied. "How do you read it?"

27He answered: "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'"

28"You answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live."

29But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?"

30In reply Jesus answered: "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he fell into the hands of robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. 31A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. 32So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. 33But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. 34He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, took him to an inn and took care of him. 35The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'

36Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?"

37The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him."

Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise." (Luke 10:25-37)

Explanation:

The parable was recorded in verse 30 to 36. To understand this parable, read the circumstance recorded in verse 25 to 29. The main character in the parable is the good Samaritan, from Samaria a nation hostile to the Jews, helped a stranger in need. Similarly, we should love others as ourselves without considering their nationality, race, wealth, etc. We should follow the new command Jesus gave us, "Love each other as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:12-13).

The Parables of the Rich Fool

(Luke 12:16-20, 21-34)

13Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the inheritance with me."

14Jesus replied, "Man, who appointed me a judge or an arbiter between you?" 15Then he said to them, "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions."

16And he told them this parable: "The ground of a certain rich man produced a good crop. 17He thought to himself, 'What shall I do? I have no place to store my crops.'

18Then he said, 'This is what I'll do. I will tear down my barns and build bigger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. 19And I'll say to myself, "You have plenty of good things laid up for many years. Take life easy; eat, drink and be merry."

20But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life will be demanded from you. Then who will get what you have prepared for yourself?'

21This is how it will be with anyone who stores up things for himself but is not rich toward God."

22Then Jesus said to his disciples: "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat; or about your body, what you will wear. 23Life is more than food, and body more than clothes. 24Consider the ravens: They do not sow or reap, they have no storeroom or barn; yet God feeds them. And how much more valuable you are than birds! 25Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life? 26Since you cannot do this very little thing, why do you worry about the rest?

27Consider how the lilies grow. They do not labor or spin. Yet I tell you, not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these. 28If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today, and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, how much more will he clothe you. O you of little faith! 29And do not set your heart on what you will eat or drink; do not worry about it. 30For the pagan world runs after all such things, and your Father knows that you need them. 31But seek his kingdom, and these things will be given to you as well.

32Do not be afraid, little flock, for your Father has been pleased to give you the kingdom. 33Sell your possessions and give to the poor. Provide purses for yourselves that will not wear out, a treasure in heaven that will not be exhausted, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. 34For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. (Luke 12:13-34)

Explanation:

The body of the parable is from verse 16 to 20, and the other verses record the circumstances and the explanation Jesus gave to His disciples. The spiritual meaning is that we should not pursue after the worldly riches, rather we should sell our possessions and give to the poor in order to store up treasure in the Kingdom of heaven.

The Parables of the Ten Virgins

(Matthew 25:1-12; 13)

1 Jesus said, "At that time the kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom. 2 Five of them were foolish and five were wise. 3 The foolish ones took their lamps but did not take any oil with them. 4 The wise, however, took oil in jars along with their lamps. 5 The bridegroom was a long time in coming, and they all became drowsy and fell asleep.

6 At midnight the cry rang out: "Here's the bridegroom! Come out to meet him!"

7 Then all the virgins woke up and trimmed their lamps. 8 The foolish ones said to the wise, "Give us some of your oil; our lamps are going out."

9 "No," they replied, "there may not be enough for both us and you. Instead, go to those who sell oil and buy some for yourselves."

10 But while they were on their way to buy the oil, the bridegroom arrived. The virgins who were ready went in with him to the wedding banquet. And the door was shut.

11 Later the others also came. "Sir! Sir!" they said. "Open the door for us!"

12 But he replied, "I tell you the truth, I don't know you."

13 Therefore keep watch, because you do not know the day or the hour. (Matthew 25:1-13)

Explanation:

This parable was part of Jesus' answer to his disciples' question about the signs of His return and the end of age. This parable followed Jesus' revelation that since the end of age will come on a unknown day and hour, the servants of the Lord (the believers) should keep watch and remain faithful. It deals with the kingdom of heaven and how one should be constantly prepared to welcome its arrival, just as did the five wise virgins (i.e., bridesmaids, representing the believers who have been purified from their sins through the blood of Jesus Christ) that are allowed into the wedding banquet. The wedding banquet can be understood with a verse in the book of Revelation, "blessed are those who are invited to the wedding supper of the Lamb!" (Revelation 19:9). On the day of the return of Jesus Christ, the elect will be raised to eternal life in the kingdom of God, which is symbolically revealed as the wedding banquet of the Lamb (the Lord Jesus Christ) with the bride (i.e. the true church Ephesians 5:32), and those who are invited (the virgins) are the people raised to eternal life.

The Parables of the Talents

(Matthew 25:14-28; 29-30)

14Jesus said, "Again, it will be like a man going on a journey, who called his servants and entrusted his property to them. 15To one he gave five talents of money, to another two talents, and to another one talent, each according to his ability. Then he went on his journey. 16The man who had received the five talents went at once and put his money to work and gained five more. 17So also, the one with the two talents gained two more. 18But the man who had received the one talent went off, dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money.

19After a long time the master of those servants returned and settled accounts with them. 20The man who had received the five talents brought the other five. 'Master,' he said, 'you entrusted me with five talents. See, I have gained five more.'

21His master replied, 'Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!'

22The man with the two talents also came. 'Master,' he said, 'you entrusted me with two talents; see, I have gained two more.'

23His master replied, 'Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!'

24Then the man who had received the one talent came. 'Master,' he said, 'I knew that you are a hard man, harvesting where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered seed. 25So I was afraid and went out and hid your talent in the ground. See, here is what belongs to you.'

26His master replied, 'You wicked, lazy servant! So you knew that I harvest where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered seed? 27Well then, you should have put my money on deposit with the bankers, so that when I returned I would have received it back with interest.'

28'Take the talent from him and give it to the one who has the ten talents. 29For everyone who has will be given more, and he will have an abundance. Whoever does not have, even what he has will be taken from him. 30And throw that worthless servant outside, into the darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.' (Matthew 25:14-30)

Explanation:

This parable follows the parable of the ten virgins in the answer Jesus gave to disciples about the signs of the end of ages. It teaches us that as believers, even we don't know the date and hour of the end of age, we should keep watch and be prepared for the return of our Lord Jesus Christ. The believers with more talentsspiritual gifts (e.g., message of wisdom, faith, healing, and prophecy) should offer more service to the church (see 1 Corinthians 12:1-11) and their reward will be great.

The Parables of the Sheep and the Goats

(Matthew 25:31-46)

31Jesus said, "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, he will sit on his throne in heavenly glory. 32All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate the people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. 33He will put the sheep on his right and the goats on his left.

34Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come you who are blessed by my Father; take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world. 35For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, 36I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.

37Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? 38When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? 39When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?'

40The King will reply, 'I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me.'

41Then he will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you who are cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. 42For I was hungry and you gave me nothing to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, 43I was a stranger and you did not invite me in, I needed clothes and you did not clothe me, I was sick and in prison and you did not look after me.'

44They also will answer, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or needing clothes or sick or in prison, and did not help you?'

45He will reply, 'I tell you the truth, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me.'

46Then they will go away to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life." (Matthew 25:31-46)

Explanation:

This parable follows the parable of the talents in the answer Jesus gave to disciples about the signs of the end of ages. The spiritual meaning deals with the final judgment of the living and the dead, and should be understood as such. The sheep are ones to be allowed into the kingdom of heaven, and the goats are the ones to be rejected.

The Parables of the Narrow Door

(Luke 13:22-30)

22Then Jesus went through the towns and villages, teaching as he made his way to Jerusalem.

23Someone asked him, "Lord, are only a few people going to be saved?"

He said to them, 24"Make every effort to enter through the narrow door, because many, I tell you, will try to enter and will not be able to. 25Once the owner of the house gets up and closes the door, you will stand outside knocking and pleading, 'Sir, open the door for us.'

But he will answer, 'I don't know you or where you come from.'

26Then you will say, 'We ate and drank with you, and taught in our streets.'

27But he will reply, 'I don't know you or where you come from. Away from me, all you evildoers!'

28There will be weeping there, and gnashing of teeth, when you see Abraham, Isaac and Jacob and all the prophets in the kingdom of God, but you yourselves thrown out. 29People will come from east and west and north and south, and will take their places at the feast in the kingdom of God. 30Indeed there are those who are last who will be first, and first who will be last." (Luke 13:22-30)

Explanation:

This parable deals with the kingdom of God (i.e., kingdom of heaven). This parable should be understood with verses in the Gospel according to Matthew 7:13-14:

"Jesus said, 'Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it'".
