Most PostScript errors contain an "Error" component and an "Offending Command" component (OC). The following suggestions are based on common values for these components.

1. Error "Undefined". If OC is "md" the print job was created on a Macintosh without the proper header. If OC is unreadable or garbage text, there is a corrupted graphic in the document or a data transmission error. If OC is a printer feature command such as "setduplexmode", the job is targeted for the wrong printer (using the wrong PPD file).
2. Error "limitcheck" or "VMError": a data object is too complex; there are too many downloaded fonts; or the printer has insufficient RAM.
3. Error "IOError": data transmission problem; usually incorrect baud or parity settings on the output port, or line noise.
4. Error "rangecheck" and OC "setpageparams": print job requested paper or film size larger than printer can provide.
5. Error "dictfull": report problem to Windows NT Product Support.
