#EEOO4 - KAYAKING AND SIX SNEAKY SALAMANDERS (Army Corps of Engineers)

Tuesday, June 19 from 9:30am - 3pm • Age: 8 and up Spend time in kayaks on the water with trained kayak instructors Brenda Hadrich and Paula Garrett. Beginning kayak students will learn basic skills and safety for beginning kayaking. Intermediate kayak students will build off beginning kayak skills and safety previously learned. A scavenger hunt on the water and more fun and games will take place while kayaking and learning.

Minnesota is home to 6 different species of salamanders and we are lucky enough to boast all of them in Aitkin County! However, chances are good that you have never seen any of them. Students will be given the opportunity to learn about salamanders and the habitats they depend on for survival in an up close and personal program that



is designed to increase awareness of these somewhat elusive critters and the wetlands that they need to survive.

#EE005 - WOODS, WETLANDS & WILDLIFE AND ARCHERY PROGRAMS

(Long Lake Conservation Center)

Wednesday, June 20 from 9:30 - 3pm • Ages: 8 and up

Did you know that a forest is more than just trees! Let's spend the morning with Aitkin County Forestry Department discovering woods and wildlife and their different habitats. Students will find their way in the forest. They will learn if cutting trees is good or bad for the environment. This hands-on day will take students to places that will put them in touch with nature while learning how to protect our environment and the

animal habitats. The afternoon will be spent learning the proper mechanics of archery, field basics, history of archery and learning about the different types of bows. This will be a hands-on session. Equipment will be provided. Please wear tennis or hiking shoes/boots, long pants and shirt; we will be in the woods. Bug spray would be useful!

#EEOO6 - LET'S GO FISHING AND AN ORGANIC FARM OUTING (Lake Minnewawa & Prairie River Farm)

Thursday, June 21 from 9:30 - 3pm • Ages: 8 and up

Explore the underwater habitat, learn about water stewardship, increase your fishing skills while learning how to cast a line, bait a hook and identify various species of fish. Fishing for pan fish on Lake Minnewawa with local anglers is a "favorite" for kids. Spend the afternoon visiting a local organic farm. Learn the ins and outs of organic farming. The Prairie River Farm is a small, local family farm that grows organic vegetables, raises chickens on pasture for meat and eggs. It will be a fun afternoon mingling with the chickens and taking a walk through the peaceful garden; maybe even collect an egg or two. Expect to see bumblebees, birds and butterflies flitting around as we get a feel for organic farming.

#EEOO7 - SNAPPING TURTLE ECOLOGY (Army Corp of Engineers)

Monday, June 25 from 9:30am - 3pm • Age: 8 and up
Students will gain knowledge of snapping turtle ecology and reproduction
physiology via slide show, local field trip and incubation of turtle eggs. Scientific
data will be collected by the students to include day/date/time/location of
nest; nest site soil temperature and weather conditions, egg viability, mass and
diameter; and incubation temperature of eggs. Students will go home with a
turtle egg for incubation.

#EEOO8 - BIRDS AND MAMMALS (School/Rice Lake National Wildlife Refuge)

Tuesday, June 26 from 9:30am - 3pm • Age 8 and up

Students will spend the day talking about the life of a bird and mammals. This day will include many hands on activities studying bird specimens and frozen mammal skins. The study of teeth, claws, coloration, body size/shape and how they are re-lated to the type of lifestyle they have. Students will be listening to bird songs and calls and learning about things like "where does a bird sleep?" why do they sing?" and "why / when / how do they migrate?". Students will dissect some owl pellets and finish the day as they travel to the refuge to do some bird watching. Students may bring their own binoculars or we will provide them.

#EE009 -BEAR NECESSITIES PROGRAM AND FISHING THE RICE RIVER

(Rice Lake National Wildlife Refuge)

Wednesday, June 27 from 9:30am - 3pm • Age: 8 and up

Students will be encouraged to think like a bear and "look for food to survive." What role do weather, fire, man, and other bears mean to a young bear trying to survive on its own? Through interactive games and role playing the students will gain a better understanding of what is meant by the terms: sufficient habitat, limiting factors, and carrying capacity. Students will then have an opportunity to provide examples of limiting factors that affect the carrying capacity for other native MN wildlife. More fun will be had when everyone is given the opportunity to catch fish in the Rice River. Fishing rods, bait, tackle will be provided and experienced anglers will offer assistance.

#EE010 - LET'S GO FISHING ON BIG SANDY LAKE & BOATING 101

(Army Corp of Engineers)

Thursday, June 28 from 9:30 - 3pm • Age: 8 and up

Are you interested in fishing for one of Minnesota's many game fish on Big Sandy Lake? Explore the underwater habitat, learn about water stewardship, increase your fishing skills while learning how to cast a line, bait a hook and identify various species of fish. Students get hands on experience with the rules of boating and water safety from Army Corps of Engineers Park Rangers in this interactive program. After onshore instruction from Rangers students are given



the chance to drive small electric powered boats to practice the safe boating techniques that they just learned. Students will also be able to recognize the indicators of a drowning victim and understand the importance of wearing a life jacket. This interactive program encourages fun and safety on the water!

Monday, July 9 • Ages 8 - 12 years old • Max: 15 students • (Duluth, MN) \$10 fee

Learn how the zoo takes care of its animals. Participate in hands-on activities to learn how the zookeepers make
diets and veterinarians care for sick animals. Meet the barn animals and watch a special animal enrichment! Why is
it important to preserve our natural environment we live in? Spend time on the shores of lake superior taking in all
the natural beauty and wonder that surrounds us.

#EE012 - KAYAKING AND MINNESOTA FOREST INVADERS (Army Corp of Engineers)

Tuesday, July 10 from 9:30am - 3pm • Age: 8 and up

Spend time in kayaks on the water with trained kayak instructors Brenda Hadrich and Paula Garrett. Beginning kayak students will learn basic skills and safety for beginning kayaking. Intermediate kayak students will build off beginning kayak skills and safety previously learned. A scavenger hunt on the water and more fun and games will take place while kayaking and learning. Borers and moths and worms, oh my! Students will learn hands on about some of the invasive species that are threatening our forests such as the Emerald Ash Borer. Army Corps of Engineers Park Rangers will lead activities that will help students identify forest pests and will teach management practices that students can implement in their lives to stop the spread of these destructive species. Fun take home crafts will serve as a reminder to burn firewood where you buy it and help prevent the spread.

#EE013 - FIELD TRIP TO THE FOREST HISTORY CENTER (Grand Rapids)

Wednesday, July 11 • Ages: 8 and up • \$10 fee

Students will tour the Forest History Center exhibits and take a tour of a logging camp and the River Wanigan. From there the field trip will take students to the 100' fire tower (climbing is an option) and patrolman's cabin. By now students will be hungry so plan for a picnic lunch! The afternoon will be filled with more exciting adventures like GEO TRAC: forestry discovery lumberjack math course. Participants will use per-programmed GPS units to guide them to geocache sites strategically located along our trails. When they arrive at the sites they will be challenged to do a "forestry task" such as determine the height of a tree, measure the diameter, scale a log pile, determine the age of a tree, etc. This is a fun filled day at the FHC.

#EE014 - SNORKELING, HIKING, POND STUDY AND DIGITAL BRIDGE TO NATURE PROGRAM (Savanna Portage State Park)

Thursday, July 12 from 9:30am - 3pm ◆ Age: 8 and up

Come discover what critters live in Loon Lake! Students will have time to wade
in the lake and catch those critters for

a pond study. Staff will give students an opportunity to look under small microscopes at creatures and returning them to their watery home when finished. For more exploration the morning will include a "Digital Bridge to Nature" inspired photography program. Students will explore nature through the lens of a camera.

During the afternoon hours students will spend time in the water snorkeling...peeking at lake creatures that share the waters when swimming. A hike around the lake wandering through the forest habitat identifying forest, prairies and wetlands is a must!

#EE015 - MILLE LACS MUSEUM AND NATURALIST PROGRAM AT KATHIO STATE PARK (Garrison, MN)

Monday, July 16 • Age: 8 and up • \$10 fee

There is so much to see and do at Mille Lacs Museum and Kathio State Park. Students will spend time touring the Four-Season's Room, going on a scavenger hunt, learning Native American games and making a Dream Catcher. From there we will travel to Kathio State Park and spend the afternoon with the naturalist as kids learn to "love the earth"!

#EE016 - NATURE'S RECYCLING PROGRAM AND FISHING THE RICE RIVER

(Rice Lake National Wildlife Refuge)

Tuesday, July 17 from 9:30am - 3pm • Age: 8 and up

Students will gain an understanding of how nature recycles nutrients, both plant and animal, by way of fire, decomposition, or consumption. They will learn what forces are at work to turn a large dead tree into nutrient rich soil; why all dirt is not created equal, why dirt comes in different colors, and why different kinds of dirt means different kinds of plants growing there. They will also learn how long man made materials remain in the environment when not properly disposed of and end up as litter. Fishing in the Rice River will complete the day's program. Experienced anglers will provide assistance. Fishing rods, bait, and tackle will also be provided for the participants.

9:00am - Level 6: Swimming and skill proficiency; refines the strokes so participants swim them with ease, efficiency, power and smoothness over greater distances.

10:00am - Level 5: Stroke Refinement: provides further coordination and refinement of strokes.

11:00am - Level 4: Stroke Improvement: develops confidence in the skills learned and improves other aquatic skills.

12:00pm - Level 3: Stroke development; builds on the skills in Level 2 through additional guided practice in deeper waters.

1:00pm - Lunch

2:00 - Level 2: Fundamental Aquatic Skills; builds on the skills learned in Level 1 and gives participants success with fundamental skills such as floating and basic locomotion.
