Using the Fish Menu

Click on the <u>desktop</u> and the **Fish!** main menu will appear. Select an item from the menu to perform the specified action.

If you have checked "Double Click for Menu" from the <u>Preferences Dialog</u>, then you'll have to double-click on the desktop to bring up the **Fish!** menu.

The items in the **Fish!** Menu are:

Edit Fish Brings up the <u>Fish Editor</u>.

Preferences Brings up the <u>Preferences Dialog</u>

Screen Saver Brings up the Screen Saver Dialog

About Displays scintillating information about **Fish!**

Switch To Brings up the Windows Task List.

Exit Removes **Fish!** from your system. (You can run FISH.EXE to restart it).

Fish Editor

Use the Fish Editor to customize existing <u>fish species</u> or create your own. See <u>Creating New Fish</u> and <u>Editing Fish</u> for hints on how to get started.

The Fish Editor Window

The fish editor window contains various items used to edit a fish. The largest feature is the **edit area** which shows an enlarged version of the current frame; it is used for drawing and editing the fish graphic. The **color palette** to the right of the edit area is used to select the current drawing color. The upper right corner of the window contains the **fish preview** area which shows how the fish will appear when animated on the screen. Finally, the lower right corner shows the two fish frames. Use this **frame selector** to pick which frame appears in the edit area.

File Menu

New Creates a new, blank fish species.

Open Opens an existing fish species from the file you specify.

Save Saves the current species to its file.

Save As Saves the current species to the file you specify.

Exit Exits the Fish Editor.

Edit Menu

The Edit Menu contains commands which affect the current selection. The Selection tool from the Tools menu is used to change the current selection. If you have not made an explicit selection, the whole frame is automatically used.

Undo Reverses the action of the most recent edit operation.

Cut Copies the current selection to the Clipboard and then clears the contents of the current selection.

Copy Copies the current selection to the Clipboard.

Paste Replaces the current selection with the contents of the clipboard. This can be used to copy on fish frame to the other, move a portion of the frame to a new location, or shrink or stretch a portion of the fish. Pasting with a single pixel selected will paste in the contents of the clipboard, without stretching or shrinking, with the upper left corner at the selected pixel.

Clear Clears the contents of the current selection.

Flip Horizontal Reverses the contents of the current selection from left to right.

Flip Vertical Reverses the contents of the current selection from top to bottom.

Tools Menu

Draw Turns the mouse into a pencil. Use this to draw in the current color.

Select Turns the mouse into a selection tool (a crosshair). Use this to select an area of the fish for the various Edit menu operations.

Fill Turns the mouse into a fill tool (a gas pump). To fill a shape with the current color, click in the shape's interior with the fill tool.

Options Menu

Motion... Brings up the Fish Motion Dialog.

Enabled Indicates whether the current fish species is enabled. A fish species is enabled if there is a checkmark on the left side of the menu item. Fish species which are not enabled will not be used to create fish. This makes it possible to temporarily hide a fish species from the tank without deleting or moving the fish species file. See Creating a Fish Tank.

Rare Indicates how frequently the current fish species will appear. A fish species with a checkmark by this menu item will be shown much less frequently than other species. See <u>Creating a Fish Tank</u>.

Fish Motion Dialog

Use the Fish Motion dialog to determine how your fish moves. Fish may move horizontally, vertically or diagonally. Horizontal fish may move to the left, to the right or both. Further, they may be constrained to stay near the top of the screen, near the bottom of the screen, or in the middle of the screen. Vertical fish can move up, down or both and can be constrained the left, right or middle portion of the screen. Diagonal fish may wiggle up the screen or squirm down.

Preferences Dialog

Number O' Fish

Set the number of fish to be displayed on your monitor. You should have enough fish that you can enjoy their presence, but remember that too many fish crowded into a small tank can slow their motion and create stress for the fish.

Desktop Fish!

Check this box if you want fish to swim on the <u>desktop</u>. This makes it possible to enjoy **Fish!** while your are working with your Windows applications.

Screen Saver Fish!

Check this box to enable the Screen Saver function of **Fish!** Bring up the <u>Screen Saver Dialog</u> from the Fish Menu to customize the screen saver.

Double Click for Menu

If you check this box, the <u>Fish Menu</u> will come up when you <u>double click</u> on the <u>desktop</u>. If this item is not checked, a single click on the desktop will cause the Fish Menu to appear.

Background

You can set the color of the screen-saving aquarium to Black, White or Desktop. Black is the best color for preserving your monitor since the phosphors are turned off when showing black. White is also good because all of the phosphors are turned on at the same intensity to show white. Finally, you can have your desktop pattern fill the screen behind the fish. If you are concerned about your desktop pattern becoming burned into your screen, you can change it periodically. This also keeps your fish (and you) from becoming bored with their environment.

Fish Directory...

When **Fish!** is stocking your computer aquarium, it looks for fish species in the directory you specify. By putting different kinds of fish species in different directories you can change the appearance of your aquarium simply by changing where **Fish!** looks. To change the directory **Fish!** uses, click on the "Fish Directory..." button and use the handy browser to pick your new fish directory.

Note that whenever you open a fish file in the editor, the fish directory is automatically changed to the directory containing that file. **Fish!** will restock your aquarium when you exit the editor.

Using the Screen Saver

Fish! can act as a Screen Saver to help prolong the life of your computer's monitor. Objects which are displayed on the screen for long periods of time can become "burned into" the phosphors in the monitor, leaving a faint image behind. To help prevent this, **Fish!** can replace the image on the screen with a constantly changing aquatic display when you leave your machine unattended.

To use the screen saver function of **Fish!**, bring up the <u>Preferences Dialog</u> dialog from the <u>Fish Menu</u>. Check the box "Screen Saver". (To disable the screen saver, uncheck this box.)

Setting Screen Saver Options

To set various screen saver options, such as delay time and password, choose "<u>Screen Saver</u>" from the <u>Fish Menu</u>.

Screen Saver Dialog

Sleep Now

Fish! will activate the screen saver immediately when you move your mouse into the "Sleep Now" corner. The screen saver will stay up until you move the mouse out of that corner. You can change the "Sleep Now" corner by clicking in the corner you want in the "Sleep Now" mini-screen of the Screen Saver dialog.

Sleep Never

Fish! will refrain from activating the screen saver when you move the mouse into the "Sleep Never" corner. The screen saver will not come up as long as your mouse is in that corner. You can change the "Sleep Never" corner by clicking in the corner you want in the "Sleep Never" mini-screen of the Screen Saver dialog.

Sleep After...

You can set the amount of time **Fish!** will let your machine set idle before turning on the screen saver. If the screen saver seems to kick in every time you pause working, you may start to feel pressured. Since **Fish!** is supposed to help you relax while working, increase the *Sleep After* time if this happens. If the screen saver doesn't save your screen between tasks, you may want to decrease the *Sleep After* time.

Password

To prevent others from using your computer when you are away from your desk, enter a password. Once the screen saver kicks in, you will have to type in your password to get out of screen saver mode.

If you have specified a password, your machine will appear to get stuck in screen saver mode. To return to Windows, simply type in your password. No dialog will appear; if you make a mistake, simply start over. Once you have typed in the correct word or phrase, **Fish!** will exit screen saver mode and return control to you.

If you forget your password, you can reboot your machine to regain conrol and enter a new password in the Screen Saver dialog before the screen saver locks your machine again.

To disable the password protection feature, delete the text in the Password field of the Screen Saver dialog.

Creating New Fish

To create a new fish, bring up the <u>Fish Menu</u> and choose "Edit Fish...". The Fish Editor will then appear. You are now ready to use the drawing tools from the Tools menu to create a new fish. When you are done, choose "Save" from the file menu.

If you already have a fish showing in the editor, choose "New" from the "File" menu to begin a new fish.

Some Fishy Hints...

You probably want to first draw a rough outline of your fish. You will see what you have drawn flash in the **fish preview** area in the upper right corner of the editor window. Since the second frame of you fish is initially blank, your fish will appear to blink in and out of existence. To get rid of the blinking, select "Copy" from the "Edit" menu, select the second (currently blank) frame in the lower right hand portion of the editor window and then select "Paste" from the "Edit" menu.

You will probably want to refine your initial sketch and give your fish life by making its fins, eyes, mouth or other bodily parts move. To do this, you may want to finish the first frame, then copy it to the second frame and alter it slightly. Alternatively, you may want to work on the two frames together. The former method works well for fish that move only slightly and the latter method works well for fish which change dramatically between the two frames.

As with any work you do on a computer, be sure to save your fish often. If your computer loses power, you will lose any work you have done since the last time you saved your fish. The first time you choose "Save" from the "File" menu, you will be asked to specify a directory and file name for your fish file.

You may want to edit your fish in several sessions; see the <u>Editing Fish</u> topic for instructions on how to edit an existing fish. See also the <u>Fish Editor</u>.topic for detailed infomation on using the Fish Editor commands.

Editing Fish

To edit an existing fish, bring up the <u>Fish Menu</u> and choose "Edit Fish...". The <u>Fish Editor</u> will then appear. From the "File" menu choose "Open...". You can then enter the path to the directory containing the fish file you wish to edit. Once the correct directory is selected, the fish files in that directory can be previewed by selecting each fish's file name. Once the fish file you wish to edit has been selected, press the "Open" button.

The fish you selected will now appear in the editor. The first frame of the animated fish will appear in the magnified **edit area**. Both graphic frames appear in the **frame selector** in the lower right corner of the window. To change to the other frame of the animation, click on it in the frame selector. The newly selected frame will then appear in the magnified edit area. The **fish preview**, in the upper right corner of the window, shows both fish frames drawn alternately to show what the fish will look like when animated on the desktop.

You can edit the graphic in the frame you selected by picking a color from the color palette and drawing in the magnified edit area with the mouse. Drawing with "Clear" from the color palette will cause the desktop pattern or color to show through that portion on the graphic frame. A "New" fish starts out being completely Clear.

The "Tools" menu lets you select from 3 tools: the "Draw" tool (a pencil), the "Select" tool (a crosshair), or the "Fill" tool (a gas pump). The drawing tool lets you draw in the selected color. The select tools lets you copy and paste portions of the fish graphic. The fill tool lets you fill in enclosed areas with the color you choose.

Once you are satisfied with your fish, choose "Save" from the "File" menu. If you don't want to change the fish file you originally opened, choose "Save As..." from the "File" menu and supply a new name or directory location for your altered fish. If you created a "New" fish you will be asked to supply a name and directory for your new fish file when you choose "Save" or "Save As..."

To reverse all or part of your fish, use the "Select" tool to pick the area you want to reverse, then choose "Flip Horizontally" or "Flip Vertically". If you have the "Draw" or "Fill" tools selected, the Flip commands will flip the entire fish.

More Fish Options...

The "Options" menu lets you customize how, when and where your fish appers. Select "Motion" to bring up the <u>Motion Dialog</u> which lets you change the way your fish moves. If your fish has a checkmark next to the "Enabled" menu item, it can be used when **Fish!** is stocking your aquarium. If the fish species is enabled, checking the "Rare" menu item will make it appear less frequently than other fish species in that directory. (Selecting a checkmark menu item will add or remove the check.)

See the Fish Editor topic for more information about the commands available from the Fish Editor.

Creating A Fish Tank

A Fish Tank is a collection of fish species files, "*.FSH" files, in a DOS directory. The current fish directory is set in the <u>Preferences Dialog</u>.

When **Fish!** fills your desktop aquarium, it selects fish from the species in the current fish directory. Whenever a fish swims off of the screen, it is replaced with a new fish chosen at random. Only fish which are "Enabled" will be used. Fish which are "Rare" will be chosen much less frequently than others in the same directory. You can set these attributes in the <u>Fish Editor</u>.

If it seems that a particular fish never appears, it might not be "Enabled" or it might be "Rare". Also, there may be too many fish in the current directory for all of the fish to appear regularly. In that case, disable some of the fish or move some of the fish files out of that directory.

As you create and acquire new fish species files, you will probably want to group them into different directories. To create a new directory, use either the Windows File Manager or DOS commands. You can then move fish files into that directory, again with either the File Manager or DOS commands. See the Windows help or your DOS manual for more infomation.

Fish Species

A fish species specifies the graphic images to be used when displaying the fish, and also motion characteristics which determine how and where fish of that species move. Each fish consists of two images which are drawn alternately to give a two-frame animation which can be used to create a swimming motion. Fish species are stored in .FSH files.

Desktop

The area of your computer screen behind all of your application windows. If you have an application maximized, then the desktop is hidden.

Double Click

To click twice quickly in the same spot. The Windows Control Panel lets you set adjust what "quickly" means.
