This Workshop will be of interest to you if you are a lecturer in the agricultural sciences and employ problem-based learning approaches in your teaching.

Background

Staff in higher education institutions are under increasing pressure to become more efficient, but at the same time, more innovative in their course delivery. One effective way is to adopt a student centred approach to learning based around the investigation of case studies. The use of web-based resources is not only an effective means of sharing development effort and expertise, but will also expose students to an international learning environment. Success depends upon addressing both pedagogic and technical issues, and also the use of language.

The WebCase Project (www.webcase-online.info) is investigating the design, development and delivery of web-based case studies by producing a suite of agricultural science case studies and piloting them in teaching environments across Europe. The project has developed a template for easy uploading of case study material to the Web, and has studied the support required by both staff and students. This Workshop will provide a forum to share both the results of the project and the experience of others in using web-based resources in their teaching.

This Workshop aims to:

- ◆ share the new WebCase on-line Case Studies, see www.webcase-online.info
- ◆ discuss their design, development and delivery in the learning environment
- ◆ demonstrate the template developed for easy up-loading of Case Studies to the Web
- ◆ discuss approaches to supporting learning through the use of Web-based resources

The expected outcomes include commitment by delegates to:

- ◆ share in the development of new Web-based educational resources for student centred learning, and
- ◆ collaborate in developing a European dimension to their students' learning

The WebCase Project is being carried with the support of the European Community in the framework of the SOCRATES programme MINERVA project, and in association with the SOCRATES Thematic Network AFANet.
