"I just felt like someone was in this country to be stewards trying to pacify me," Pitts said. "And believe me, this has nothing to do with 99 percent of the people in my congregation.

"For me, for the NAACP, for the timing of these allegations is New Hope Baptist Church ... this is not an issue of immigration. It doesn't matter where you stand on immigration. This is not a political issue.

"This is about human dignity and human value. It's about respect and worth. It's about those who have the privileges we have

over those who don't have those privileges," Pitts said.

"You can't legislate someone's heart." Pitts said, "But how can someone serve their entire constituency when they have, at the very minimum, devalued a portion of that constituency?"
