Minimal Premises

- The present has a systematic advantage in most contests for human consideration

Urgent

- To demand immediate (present) attention
 - Too much urgent stuff decreases the role of history in human decision making.
 - Turing machine: Uses lots of history
 - DFA: has no history

Constraint

- Anything that imposes a limitation
 - Dereference NULL pointer
 - Distance from computer to Fridge
 - Any means of synchronization between modules or agents....

Etiquette

- A self-imposed constraint
 - Being courteous
 - Permits us to be liberated from both natural constraints and Urgency thru personal choice.
 - Leaves us subject to the choices of others

Cell Phone Etiquette (conclusion)

- Convenient inventions like cell phones free us from previously natural constraints
- With new freedom, we are likely to be able to behave in new and exciting ways.
- This liberation on behavior will **BOTHER** people who have to share an hour-long train ride with you.

Cell Phone Etiquette (conclusion)

- Shared domain:
 - Querying and changing records in a database
 - process threads sharing main memory elements
 - 150 people crammed into public transit having to listen to each other's cellphone conversations

Need a system of restraint to help them work together and avoid constant conflict.

Cell Phone Etiquette (conclusion)

- By limiting behavior by choice we are making other people's world a function of our own liberation and quality
- Its generally better not to make other people regret your liberty
- When in public, always show your neighbor that your liberty is exercised with respect to their ears.
