

- Phased out in US by 2001




Autism Rates



RECOGNIZED CASES OF AUTISM IN U.S.

Cases of diagnosed autism spectrum disorders have increased dramatically. But it is not clear how much of this is because of improved diagnosis and expanded classifications of autism versus an actual increase in the disorder. Today, scientists estimate that 1 in 150 children has an autism spectrum disorder.

MMR Effects



- ∇accination rates:
 - ≪ <80% in London
 </p>
 - 70% in Ireland
- **Q** Outbreak
 - 110 infants in critical condition
 - 3 died of preventable decease

Herd Immunity



- Cannot be vaccinated:
 - Too young
- Recline vaccinations:
 - Religious grounds
 - Realth/safety reasons

Eradication



- Representation of the Eradicated:
 - Smallpox
- Scheduled for eradication:
 - R Polio
 - Measles
 - Rubella

Ethics



- Revery vaccination carries a small risk
- Should some be allowed to avoid it?
- "If the vaccines work, who am I putting at risk?"
- Reffects on autism research
