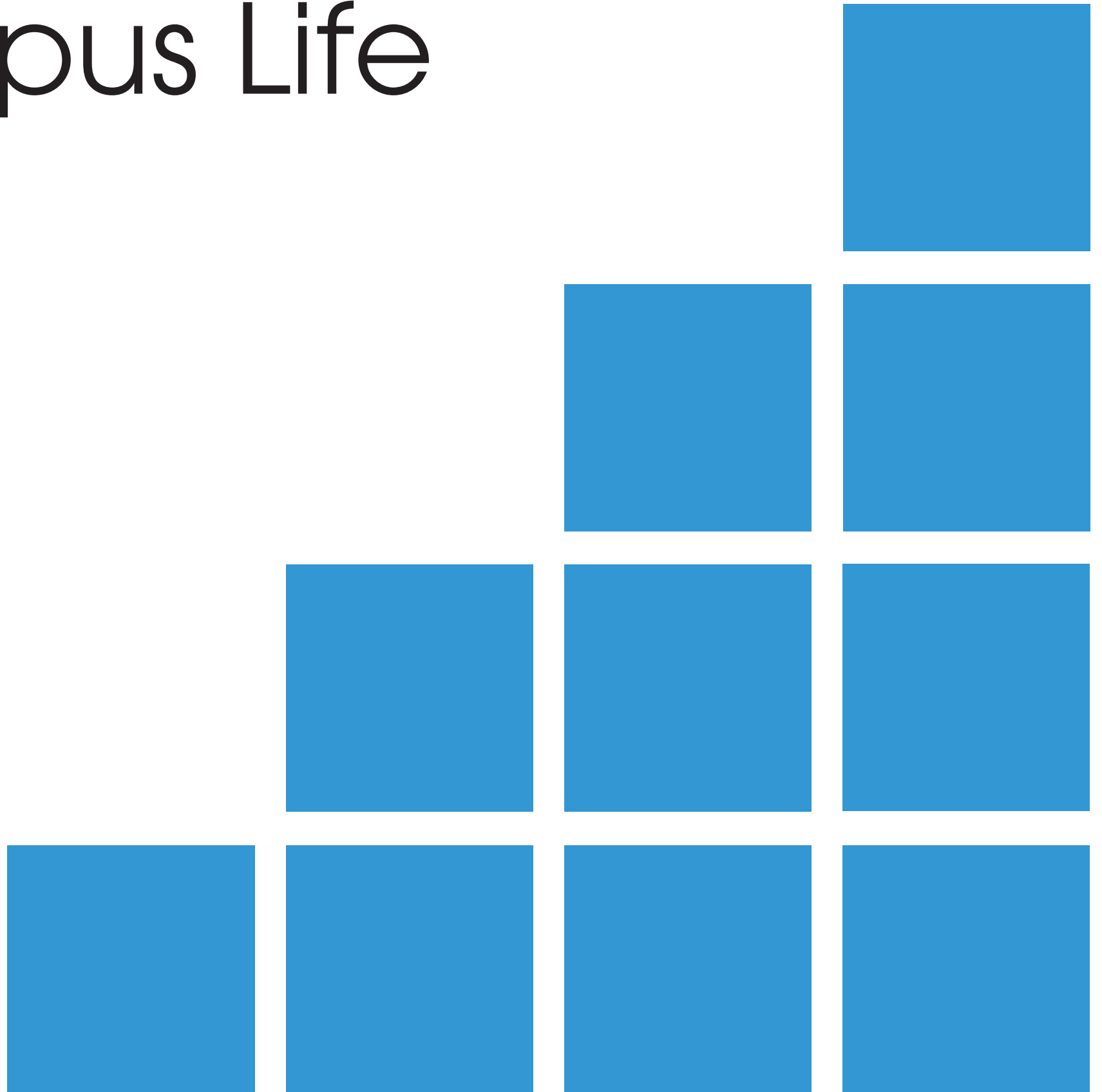

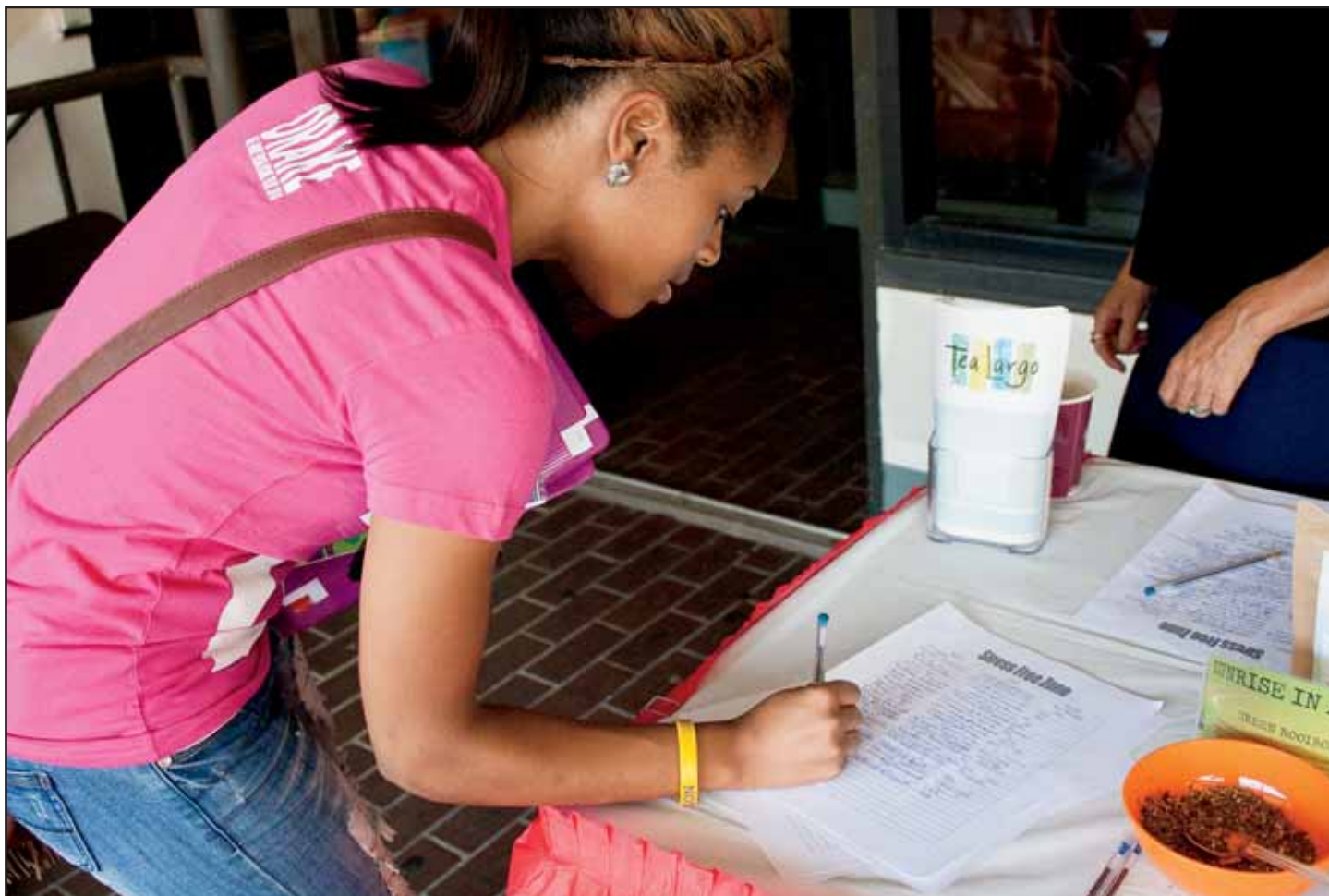
SAGA: Health & Wellness

Training for the Fight

ROTC cadets train in and outside of the classroom to prepare for the real world

Military science students don't go to school just learn and regurgitate facts. They train long, hard hours to keep their bodies as efficient as their equipment and they study hard to keep their minds sharp in the event they have to make a split second decision. The ROTC department holds several annual events to bring the students together and increase the sense of camaraderie. In October the cadets competed in the 2010 Ranger Challenge in Fort Benning, Ga. This competition was designed to mimic the ranger competition held by the U.S. Army; this competition seeks to distinguish the best Ranger in the US Armed Forces. Over two days, the cadets spent 18 hours each day competing in 10 grueling events that included a 10 kilometer foot march, a grenade assault course and a stress shoot where cadets had to shoot accurately in stressful situations. Even with the deck stacked against them as they competed against schools that were bigger and better financed, the 11 cadets who participated placed 2nd in their tier and 4th overall against 45 other schools.

The Turkey Trot that occurs every November takes place around Lake Hollingsworth involved students running a 5K trot and collecting canned foods to raise money for the Moccasin Battalion t-shirts and for their end of the year formal dinner. In the spring, the ROTC students also held a golf tournament in the Cleveland Heights Municipal Golf Course to raise money for the 2LT Charles R. Rubado scholarship fund. Through classes and field training, the FSC ROTC classes prepares the cadets for the hardships they will face once deployed and gives them the skills to survive while protecting their country.

James Helm, an FSC senior, suffered a torn aorta and passed away January 11, 2011, after attending just one day of his final semester of classes.

Florida Southern College held an on-campus memorial service in Annie Pfeiffer Chapel on January 21, 2011.

News spread across campus January 12 and it became apparent that James had seemed to form relationships with nearly everyone he met.

"What I loved about James was that he was so willing to lend a helping hand," junior Lexi Gardner said. "[He was] so selfless and always willing to go out of his way for others."

In the days after the news of his death, students shared stories of instances where he helped people fix cars in rain, helped with class work or lent an ear to people he perceived needed to talk—regardless of whether he knew them previously.

People who knew James said that anyone who knew him was well aware of his enthusiasm for hockey, NASCAR and the Beatles—three things that were commonly worked into conversation.

"He was so passionate about the things he cared about and excited to share them with other people," Gardner said.

James, 49, transferred to FSC from Valencia Community College in fall 2009 and would have graduated with a communication degree in April 2011.

Prior to his return to school, James lived a rich life of experiences including several years playing semi-pro hockey and working in the pits in NASCAR.

"The amazing thing about James is he somehow managed to pack three lifetimes into one. He did everything," said Christopher Fenner, chair of the Communication Department.

One of his proudest contributions was as a member of the U.S. Marine Corps from 1978 to 1986. While in the service he reached the rank of Sergeant and was a strong advocate for veteran's rights. While at FSC, James campaigned for a program that would potentially relocate the veteran's memorials on campus.

A celebration of life service was held January 16, 2011, in Windermere, Fla.

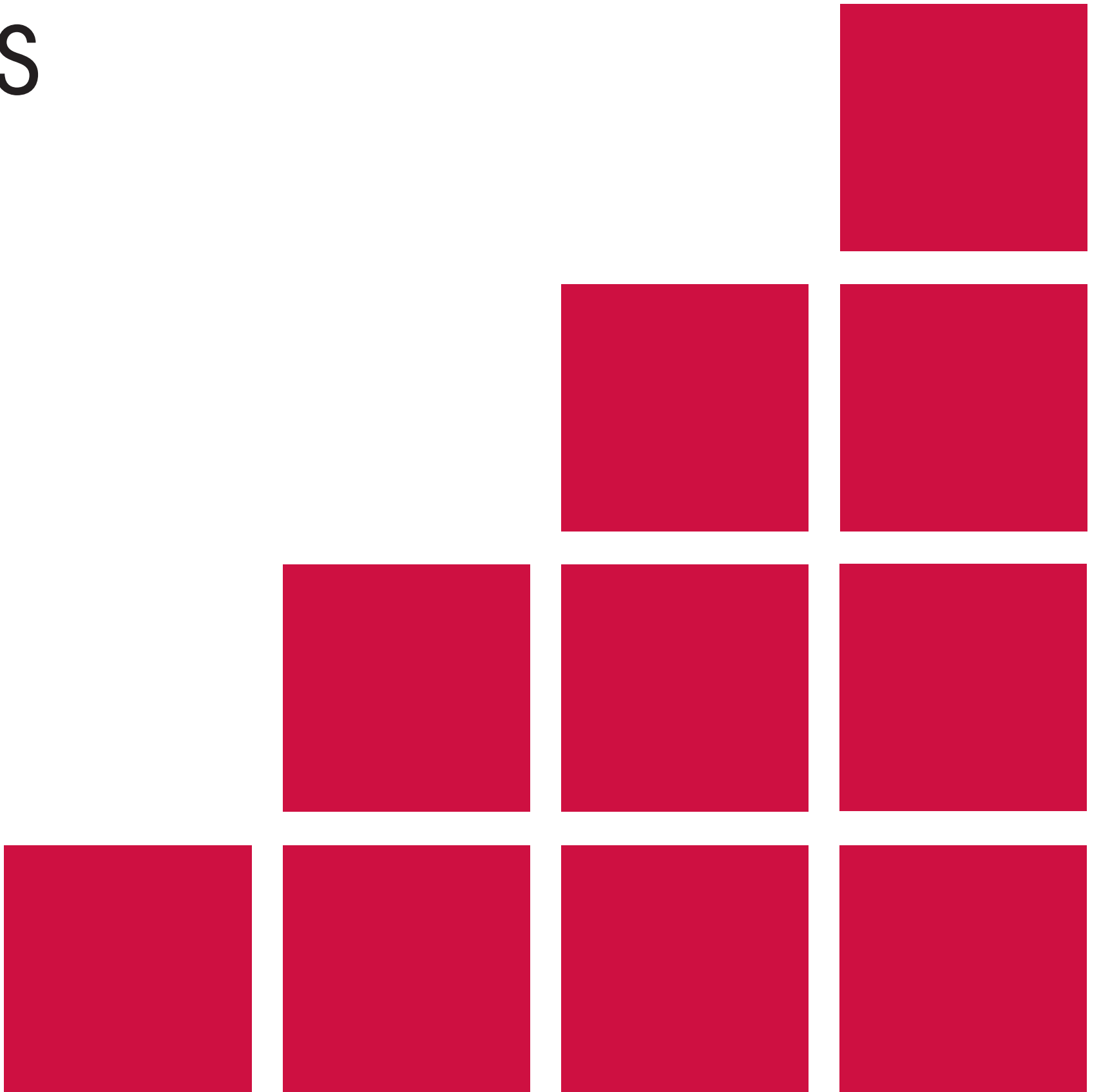

While the men's basketball team (23-9) did not claim the Sunshine State Conference title this year, they still made an appearance in the NCAA South Region Tournament. In the Region tournament, Dominic Lane's three-pointer with 1.9 seconds left in the game sent the Mocs to the semi-final round of the tournament. At the semi-final round, the Mocs played a great first half against Stillman but were overcome by Stillman's 13-point lead in the second half.

The Mocs did have a first-team All-SSC selection in senior Rion Rayfield who also claimed a spot in the Division II All-Star Game that will be played in conjunction with the Men's Elite Eight in Springfield, Mass. Rayfield also moved into second place on the FSC career scoring list with 1,870 points this season.

Senior brothers Brandon and Terry Jenkins also earned second-team and honorable mention selections.
