ONLINE OR FACE-TO-FACE TEACHING

All five core courses will be taught online via the Internet or on campus in River Falls, Wisconsin. The graduate-level credits will be issued from the University of Wisconsin-River Falls, a member of the prestigious University of Wisconsin system.



In 2001, 82 million U.S. residents participated in wildlife recreation activities.


Chart of Wildlife-Related Receptionists in 2001
