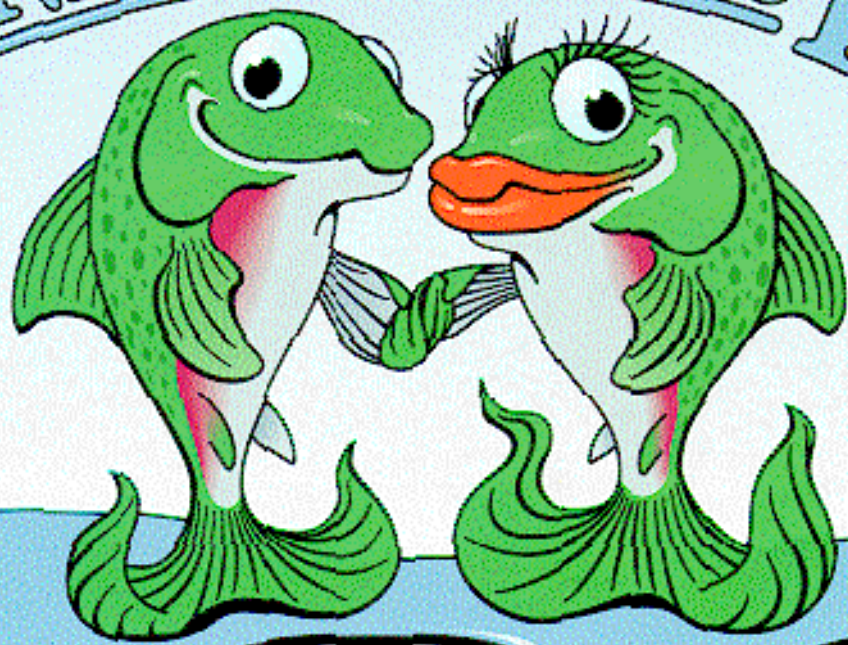
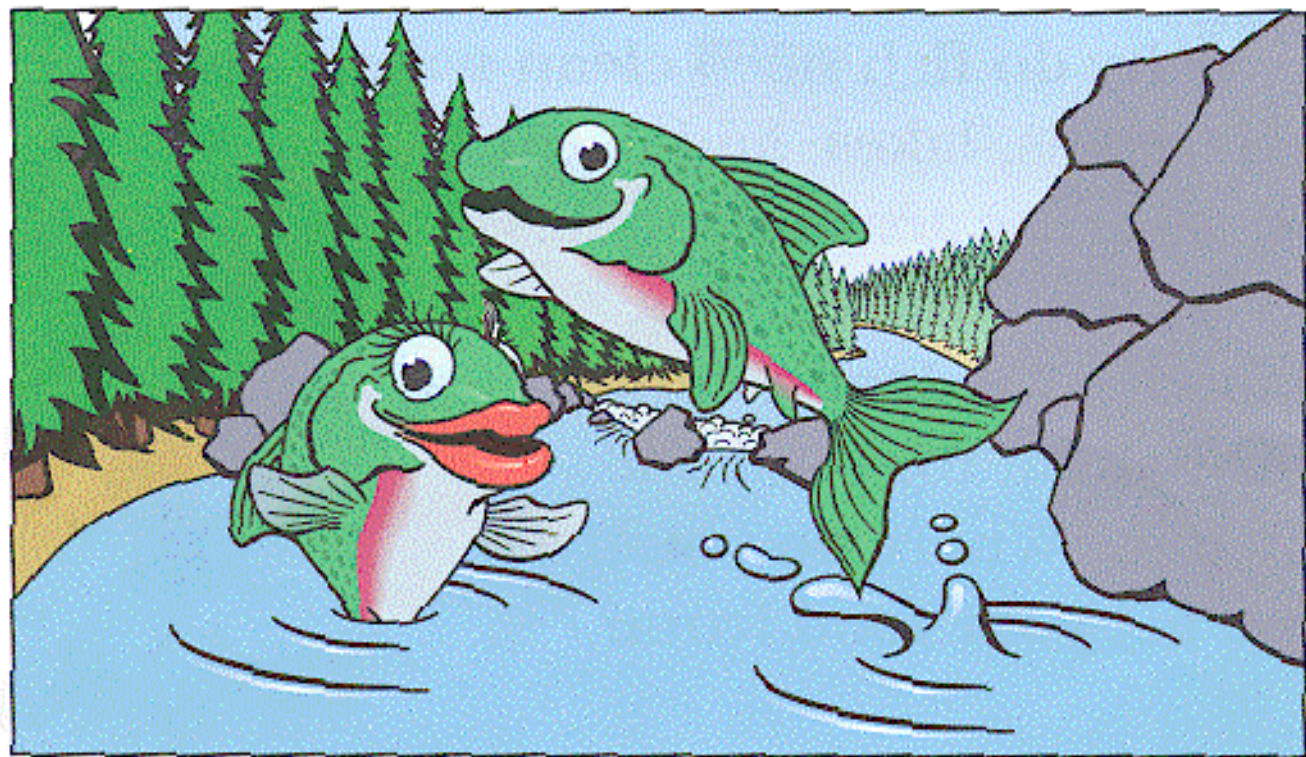


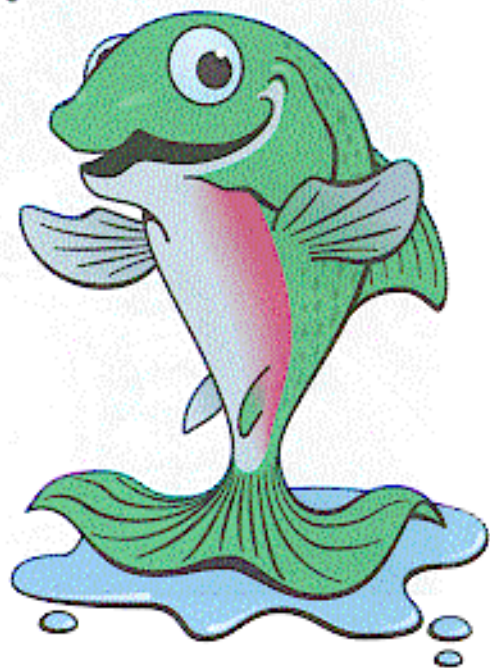
FRANK & FRANCES FISH

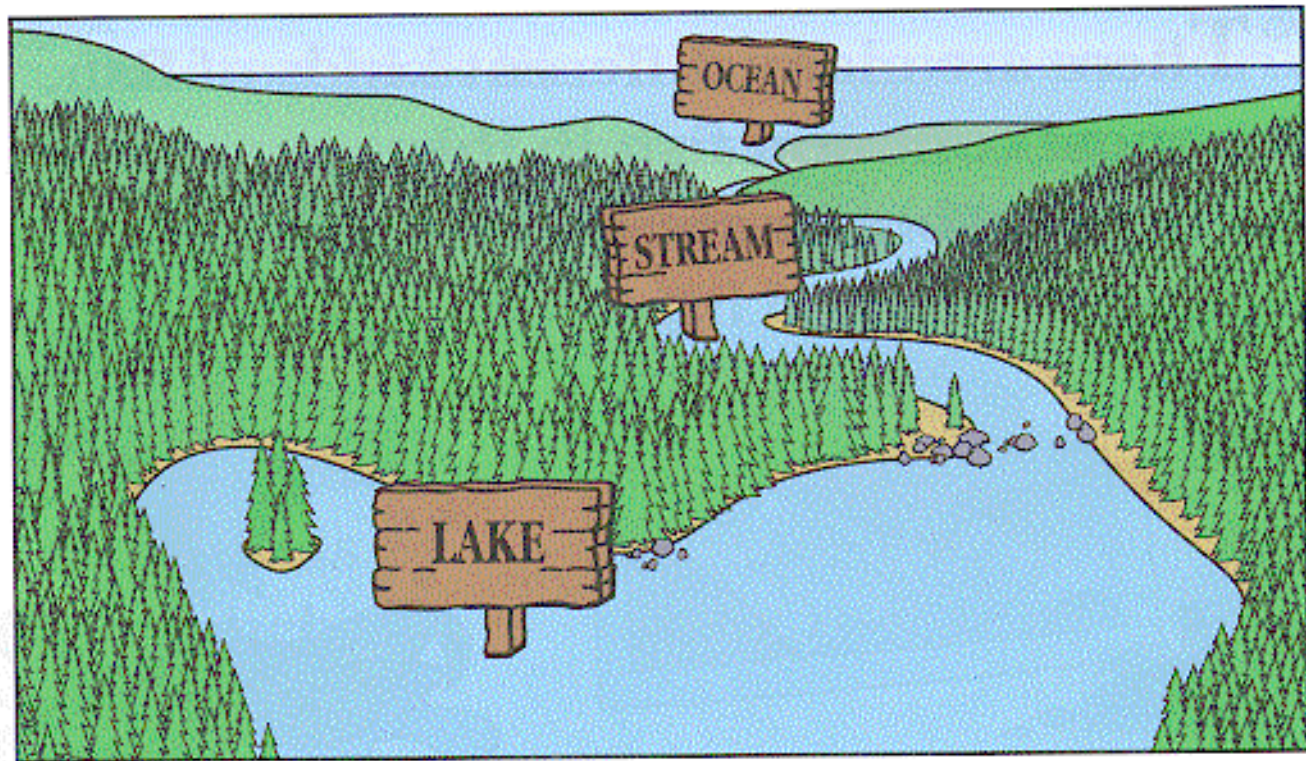

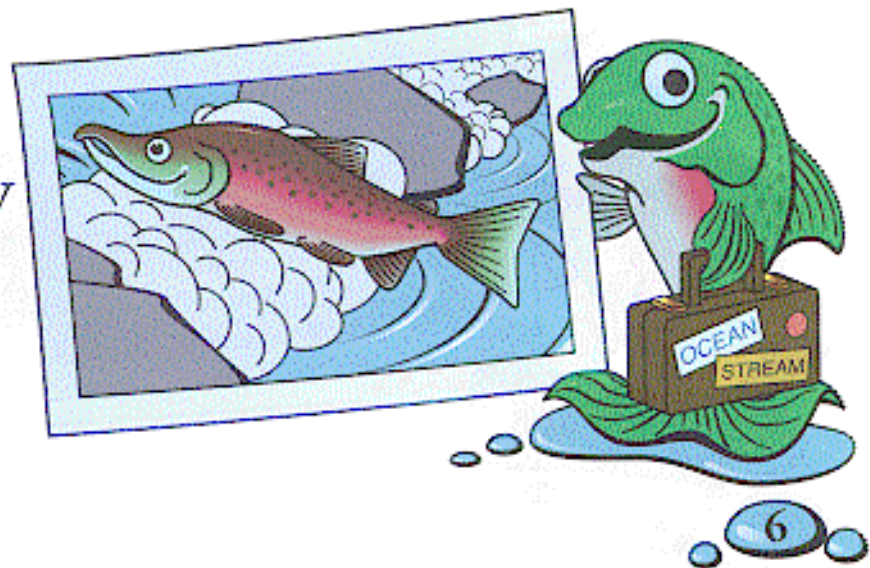


“There are many different kinds of fish. The most common fish in the Northwest Forests are salmon, trout, and bass.”



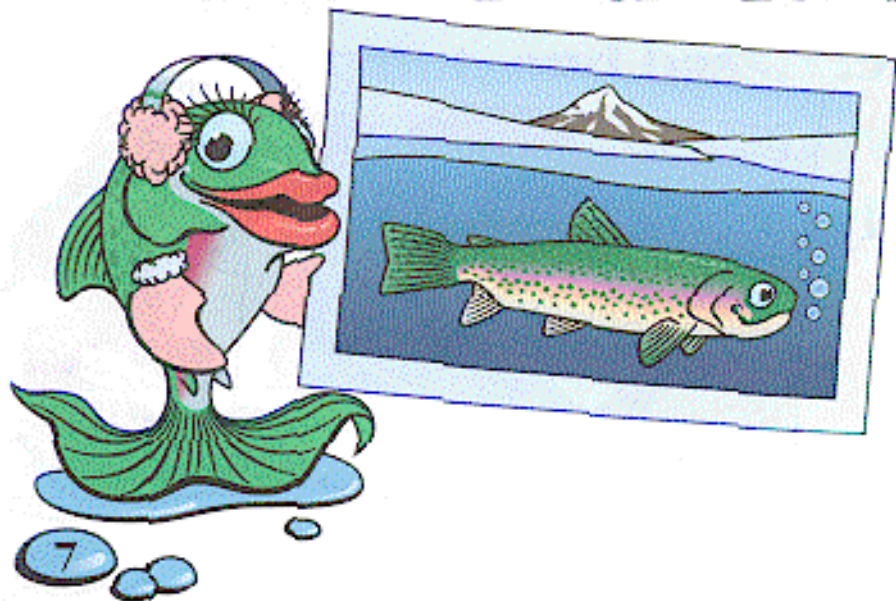
“ Salmon look like this. Salmon are born in streams, swim downstream to the ocean to grow up, swim upstream to lay eggs, and then they die.

Salmon can grow up to weigh nearly 100 pounds !!
How much do you weigh? ”



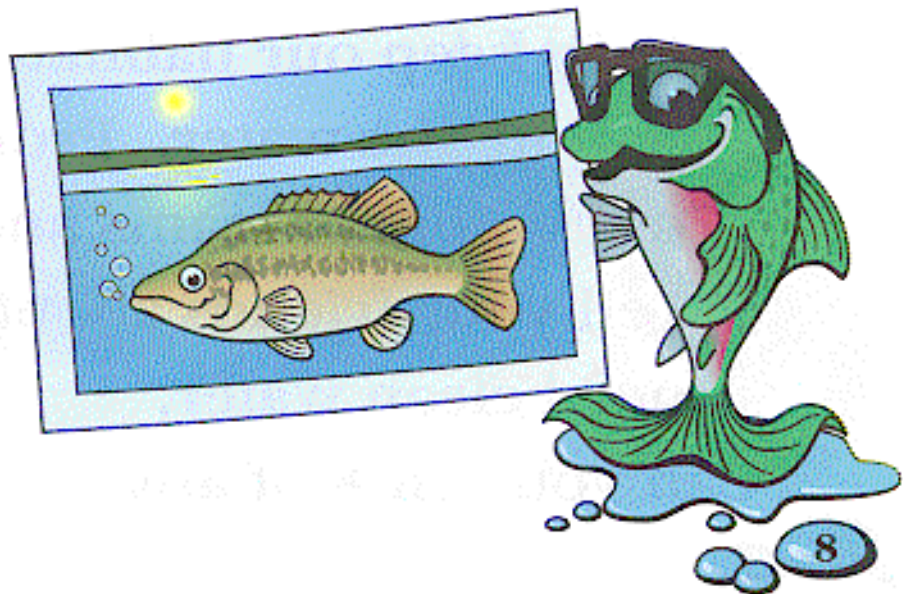
“Trout look like this. Trout live only in cold water lakes and streams. They look like small salmon and usually weigh 1-2 pounds.

Have you ever seen a trout?”



“Bass look like this. Bass often live in lakes, where the water is warmer than streams and the ocean.

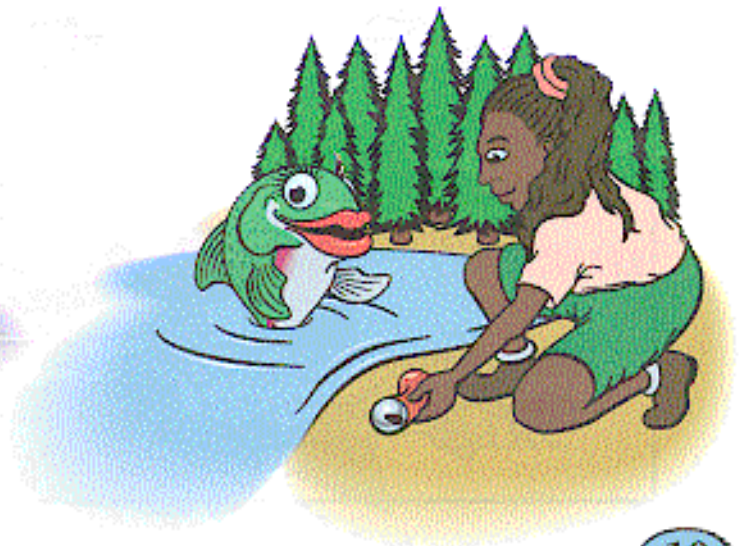
Bass can weigh up to 10 pounds.”



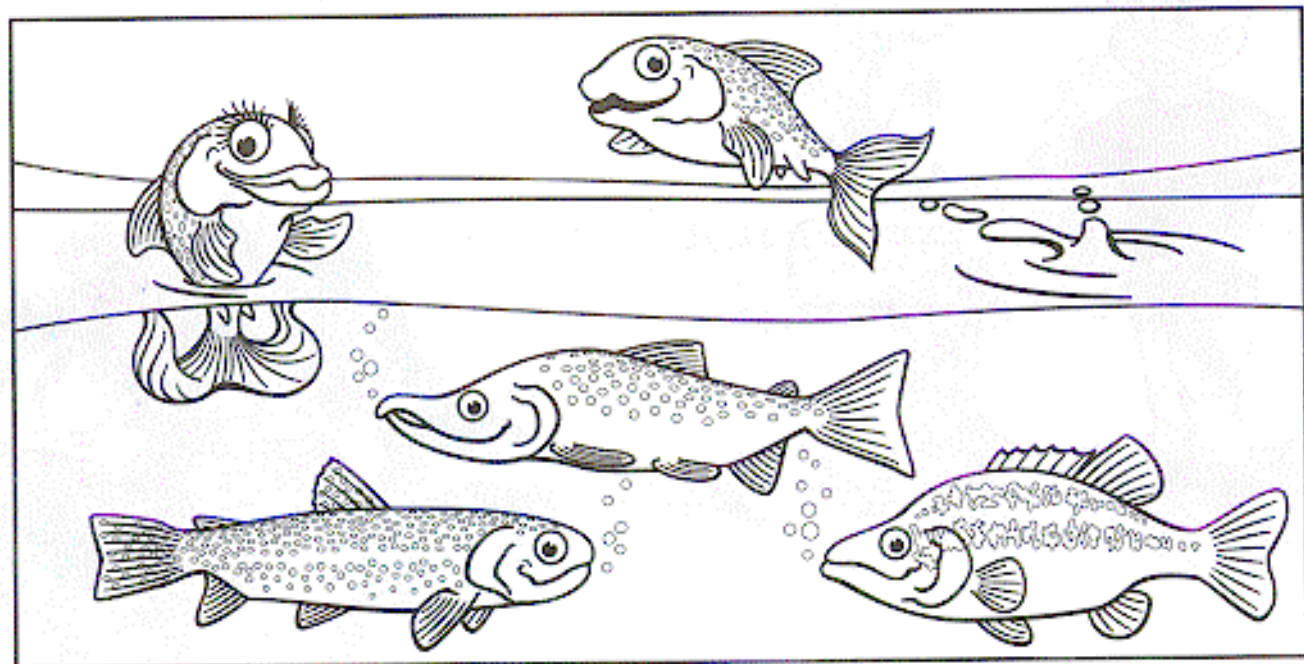
“We need your help. Here are three things you can do to help us.

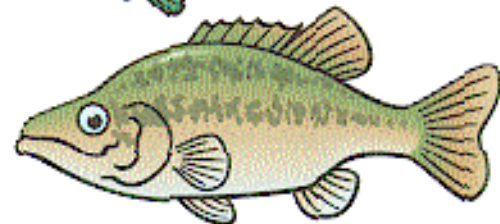

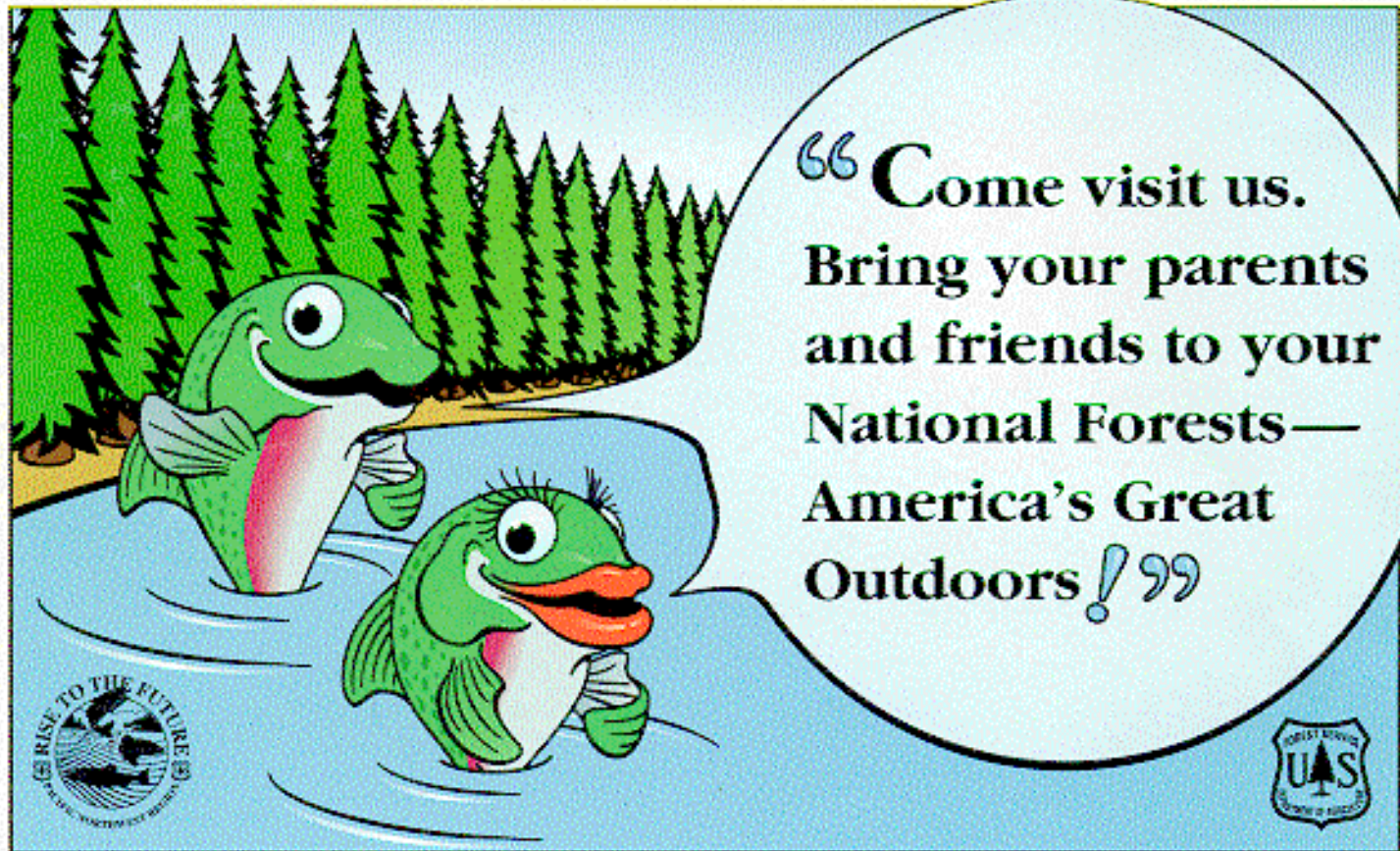
