



CREDENTIALS

Requests for press box and photo credentials for all games at Autzen Stadium must be made as far in advance as possible to the Director of Media Services. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. Otherwise, credentials will be left at Will Call, located at the ticket booth near the South Gate. Defined priority for receiving credentials will be as follows: (1) Representatives of outlets requiring daily deadlines, commercial television stations, OSN affiliate radio stations, nationally circulated publications and outlets who regularly the visiting team; (2) Area weekly and periodical publications, radio stations not affiliated with the OSN and additional campus outlets. Outlets that regularly cover the Ducks will receive a higher priority possible. Visiting representatives also are encouraged to inform their local SID of pending coverage. Only outlets producing audited circulation or audience totals will be granted working credentials.

PARKING

A limited number of parking passes will be made available through the Oregon Media Services Office. Access to parking (Lots 8 and 9) may be obtained via Leo Harris Parkway directly south of the stadium press box.

TELEPHONES

Oregon will have telephones in the press box for use with third-party, collect or credit card calls only. Outlets are encouraged to order their own phones for transmitting stories or filing reports if covering Oregon on a regular basis or if tight deadlines become an issue. Contact University Telecommunications (541-346-1017) for all telephone service.

LOCKER ROOMS

Oregon's locker room is located in the Casanova Center, west of Autzen Stadium. The

visitor's locker room is located underneath the west end of Autzen Stadium.


PHOTOGRAPHERS

Credentialed personnel working the sidelines must obey the NCAA rules pertaining to sideline boundaries. Photographers are to be no closer than six feet to the playing field and must be outside the 25-yard lines at each end of the field. Photographers are not allowed inside the team boxes. Photo passes must be worn in an easily visible manner by all photographers in all weather conditions. A work area to send digital photos is located underneath the stands in the east end zone. Television videographers wishing to setup tripods in the Casanova Center Press Room prior to the game for the post-game press conference must do so two-and-a-half hours before kickoff.

DIRECTIONS

From Mahlon Sweet Field (Eugene Airport, about 20 minutes) - Turn left after leaving the airport to the first stop light (Airport Road), then turn right on Highway 99W. Proceed southbound (right) on Highway 99W to Beltline. Follow Beltline east to Delta Highway and turn right. Follow Delta Highway for several miles and bear to the left as it converts to I-105. Exit Country Club Road/ Autzen Stadium and go right at end of the ramp. Follow Country Club Road to the first intersection and turn right on MLK Blvd. Autzen Stadium is less than a half mile on the right, located behind the Casanova and Moshofsky buildings.

From Portland International Airport (about two hours north of Eugene) - From the terminal, take I-205 south to I-5 south to Eugene. Take Eugene exit 194B and follow I-105 approximately one mile to the first exit (Coburg Road). Go straight through the stop light (steering slightly to the left) and turn left at the first stop light (Country Club Road). Turn right at the second stop light (MLK Blvd.) and Autzen Stadium, the Casanova Center and the Moshofsky Sports Center are located less than a half mile on the right side of the road.

Since its inception in 1987, as a means to promote all activities within the athletic department, the Oregon Sports Network has been known as one of the nation's pioneer in-house

radio and television networks on the collegiate scene. This network airs over 90 radio and television broadcasts per year.

The cornerstones of the Oregon Sports Network are KUGN

590 in Eugene/Springfield and KXL 750 in Portland. KUGN has been the Eugene broadcast partner for the last nine years, while KXL has been part of the network since its inception.

Looking to Make Amends

Ducks determined to prove that 2004 was an aberration as 14 returning starters and 40 lettermen provide leadership for post-season return.

Followers of Oregon football never had it so good!

Ten straight winning seasons, seven consecutive bowl bids, the Rose Bowl, No. 2 in the country, Heisman hype, 23 home wins in a row, 12 post-season appearances in 15 years...some thought it would never end.

Yet to put it into perspective, one has to remember that it wasn't always that way. Sometimes you have to remember where you've come from before you can appreciate where you are -- and more importantly, what it took to get there.

History serves as a great reminder of how to avoid making the same mistakes twice. Some sentiments might suggest that past teams had forgotten about the hard work necessary to enjoy the fruits of the labor. Others would recommend forgetting about the accolades of the past and turn their attention toward creating their own legacy.

The Ducks have taken great pains since the conclusion of last year's 5-6 season to make sure the same thing doesn't happen again. Last year's season-ending 50-21 loss at Oregon State marked the first time Oregon ended its year with a regularseason loss since 1993.

History also can prove that good things can emerge through adversity. Following that previous 1993 disappointment, the Ducks regrouped to make it to the Rose Bowl in 1994.

Oregon should benefit from its 14 returning starters

amongst its 40 lettermen back. All have emphasized that last year's outcome has served as a catalyst to renew their dedication during the off-season to avoid a repeat of 2004.

A m o n g the favorable factors Oregon has going for it is the return of a veteran quarterback who already has amassed some unprec-



edented numbers, a 1,000yard rusher who doubles as an outstanding receiving threat out of the backfield, the potential for a dominating defensive line, an experienced defensive secondary and а stable of receivers that should allow the offense to keep fresh bodies on the field at all

times without diminishing the level of ability.

The focal point in the beginning is bound to be an offense that could be drastically different than in the past, look remarkably similar to what the Ducks have attempted in the previous 10 seasons under Mike Bellotti or a combination of the two.

Offensively, Oregon spent the entire spring experimenting with a revised look that incorporated concepts of a spread attack that were successful the last several years at Utah with some of the things that new offensive coordinator Gary Crowton brought with him from BYU and other ideas that Bellotti envisions will help his team score more points.

"I think it is important that we keep an open mind about everything, both the things we've done in the past and what we're looking towards with the future in mind," Bellotti stressed. "Part of it will depend on how much the incoming players can be counted upon to add or contribute to the offense. Obviously guys like Jonathan Stewart, I think we're going to find a place that he will feel comfortable.

"Some of the receivers and the offensive line need to step up. We'll welcome back a healthy Tim Day and a healthy Demetrius Williams. I truly believe that the offense will be a blend of what we did in the spring -- some new concepts and some new ideas -- with some tried and true things that we have done for many, many years."

Defensively, the Ducks would like to return to a style of play that pressures the opposition into making mistakes. Or-



egon has concentrated its recruiting efforts on providing more speed on defense with the hopes it can create more opportunities to get the football back for the offense.

"Last year, we gave up fewer big plays but we weren't as good on third-down conversions," Bellotti admitted. "We were less of a pressure team and more of a containment team. I think we'll try to get back to more pressure. But at the same time, I think it's utilizing opportunities for pressure while also not giving up the big play.

"We've done a nice job of evolving our defense to be less susceptible to the big play but at the same time, we have not been as explosive on defense in terms of creating turnovers. We want to create more fumbles. We have to play with a reckless abandon on defense. We have to play smart and we have to play fast"

Statistically, the Ducks demonstrated dramatic improve-



ment in pass defense and total defense in 2004 compared with previous years. They improved from seventh (259.9-yard avg.) to fourth in the Pac-10 (216.8 avg.) in pass defense, and from fifth (367.0 avg.) to fourth (338.9 avg.) in total defense. Yet that same improvement didn't translate much into fewer points allowed (26.8 avg. in 2003 and 25.6

in 2004).

In addition, Oregon ranked eighth in the Pac-10 in turnover margin and ninth in opponents' third-down conversions.

Perhaps the biggest question left unanswered in the spring dealt with special teams. Bellotti eliminated the coordinator position that relied on one individual in charge of all facets of the kicking game in favor of all coaches responsible for one aspect of special teams. But of greater concern is the replacement of both of last year's kickers -- including the school's alltime scoring leader -- and the lack of any individual separating himself from those contending to win the jobs.

Oregon suffered the bulk of its losses from a year ago in the offensive line and the linebacking corps. And while the coaches are optimistic they have the talent currently on hand to help offset those losses, they are anxious to get a better look at some of the newcomers who joined the squad in the spring as well as guage how quickly those who will be stepping onto campus for the first time in August may be of help.

No newcomer may be as carefully scrutinized as freshman tailback Jonathan Stewart, who was ranked by the recruiting experts as one of the top prep prospects in the country.

"He's an explosive athlete that we're certainly going to find a way for him to contribute," Bellotti said. "Our best years have been when we've had a great one-two punch at the tailback position. I'm excited about what he brings to the offense.

"Our three junior college linebackers -- Blair Phillips, Chris Mulvanny and Jason Turner -- we expect them to bring things to the table. We need immediate help there, we need experience and proven ability. I think they have that.

"We have a couple of kids at receiver that have really stepped up, including James Finley, and a couple of defensive backs, including Walter Thurmond, that possess the kind of speed and athleticism to compete for playing time immediately."

Offense

Since 2001 when the Ducks averaged 34.3 points per game en route to their Fiesta Bowl triumph, their scoring production has dropped to a 32.1 average in 2002, 27.4 in 2003 and 25.6 in 2004. That has prompted Bellotti to re-evaluate the best way to restore the explosiveness into the Oregon offense.


"Instead of a 'new offense,' I would refer to it as the 'evolving Oregon offense,'" Bellotti stated. "It is designed to do two things -- first, complement the talents of our players, and secondly, attack and put a lot of stress and pressure on the (opposing) defense. Over the years, defenses change and offense change, it's always that chess match of what is the latest revelation, the newest wrinkle that will create problems for one side of the ball or the other."

Kellen Clemens will be at the helm for his senior year for whatever offense the Ducks choose to run. Over the past two seasons as a starter, Clemens has completed 59.9 percent of his passes for 4,948 yards and 40 touchdowns. The honorable mention all-conference standout possesses the tools to direct an efficient passing game, forcing only 20 interceptions in 716 pass attempts throughout his collegiate career, while emerging as his team's second-leading rusher a year ago (190 yards, four touchdowns).

Only two quarterbacks in school history have accumulated more passing yards heading into their senior seasons than Clemens' 5,149 yards. Ranking 27th in total offense as a junior (249.9 avg.), he owns the single-game school record for completion percentage (.882) from his sophomore season and accounted for six touchdowns (3 passing/3 rushing) last year at Washington State.

Sophomore Dennis Dixon continues to improve his grasp of the offense and is viewed as a great threat with the football in his hands. He completed six of 15 passes for 73 yards in five games as a true freshman in 2004, and added 40 yards on 10 carries.

Sophomore Brady Leaf is generally thought to be the team's No. 3 quarterback but clearly enjoyed the best showing in the



Working to keep the pressure off the Oregon passing game will be senior tailback Terrence Whitehead. If the Ducks' 10th 1,000-yard rusher can dupicate his 1,144 yards from a year ago, he could challenge Derek Loville's (1986-89) standing as the school's all-time rushing leader.

In addition, Whitehead lacks 251 receiving yards from becoming only the third player in Oregon history to accumulate 1,000 yards rushing and receiving in his career.

Redshirt freshman Terrell Jackson is expected to battle newcomer Jonathan Stewart for playing time behind Whitehead, with Jackson leading all rushers with 56 yards on nine carries in last spring's final scrimmage.

Wide receiver Demetrius Williams hopes for a healthy senior campaign, which would be a contrast to 2004. He managed to lead the team with 47 catches for 593 yards and two touchdowns in 10 games a year ago after accumulating 935 receiving yards and eight scores in 2003. He and Clemens managed to hook up on two of Oregon's nine-longest touchdown pitch-and-catch combinations ever as sophomores, with Williams grabbing 12 passes at Washington State last year.

While the Ducks' are expected to employ a minimum of three wide recievers a good share of the time, there will be no shortage of hopefuls to vie for playing time. No fewer than six candidates are expected to be in the mix to complement Williams, with junior newcomer James Finley and sophomore Brian Paysinger emerging from the spring as the top contenders.

Finley ranked among the nation's top junior college standouts while averaging over 100 yards per game, while Paysinger turned a lot of heads in the spring despite catching only two passes for 27 yards a year ago.

Sophomore Cameron Colvin arrived last fall as Oregon's most heralded recruit and finished his freshman year third among the squad's wide receivers with 14 catches for 191 yards and two scores. Sophomore Garren Strong was right behind him with 12 receptions for 109 yards. Junior Kyle Weatherspoon has caught 10 passes for 141 yards over the last two years and led all receivers in the spring finale with 10 grabs for 129 yards and one touchdown.

One of the biggest surprises could be redshirt freshman Jaison Williams, with the untested 6-5, 247-pound hopeful turning in the play of the Spring Game with an over-the-shoulder 43-yard catch among his five receptions.

Tight end and H-back are flush with big-play potential, led by senior Tim Day. The 6-4, 265-pound second-team all-conference choice was slowed all year with a foot injury but still responded by catching 35 passes for 457 yards and eight touchdowns. A healthy Day provides the Ducks with an added dimension unlike almost any other player in the conference.

Former fullback Dante Rosario will be shifted to the new outpost when Oregon utilizes only one running back, converting six of his 25 catches into touchdowns while scoring a seventh marker on one of his 10 carries (29 yards). Junior Dan Kause provides experienced depth to the lineup and demonstrated tremendous improvement in the spring after accumulating four receptions for 37 yards in two years.

OREGOD

The line remains the biggest offensive uncertainty heading into fall camp, with junior center Enoka Lucas and senior guard Ian Reynoso looming as the lone returning starters.

Junior college transfer Palauni Ma Sun (6-5, 365) wasted little time making the transition in the spring and begins fall camp as the starter at left guard. Junior Shawn Flanagan is the only other returnee boasting of any starting experience (4 games) and could land a home at right guard. He could be pushed by incoming transfer Pat So'oalo (6-5, 340), who was a teammate of Ma Sun at Fresno City College.


Sophomore Geoff Schwartz and redshirt freshman Max Unger look to have the inside tracks at right and left tackle, respectively, with redshirt freshmen Jacob Hucko, Jeff Kendall, Aaron Klovis and Mark Lewis in line to answer the call when needed.

Defense

Oregon's defense quietly made some strides last year after yielding some big numbers in 2002 and '03. But with an expe-

rience line and secondary serving as the anchors, the Ducks would like to believe they again can position themselves to prevail in some low-scoring affairs if needed.

"We have veterans up front and in the secondary so I think that bodes well for our defense against the pass," Bellotti said.



"I think the linebacking corps is a huge question that will determine the fate of the defense. We've got to do some things there, get some kids some on-the-job training, and then competition will be the key."

A by-product of the offense's experimentation in the spring allowed the defense to get more practice tackling in space, which has been a problem in the past.

Arguably the Ducks' best player could be on defense, with junior tackle Haloti Ngata meriting inclusion on the Outland and Nagurski Trophy watch lists as the nation's top interior lineman and best defender, respectively. Constant double and triple teams will likely prevent the 6-5, 339-pound standout from acquiring a lot of big numbers, yet the second-team allconference choice tallied eight-and-a-half tackles for loss among

his 46 stops a year ago.

It took Ngata until mid season to return to form after recovering from a 2003 knee injury, with 28 of his tackles occurring in the final six games.

Senior end Devan Long packs the punch as the big-play specialist, with the honorable mention all-conference performer ranking fifth in the Pac-10 in tackles for loss (15) last season while tying for sixth in quarterback sacks (7.5). Long also forced two fumbles and finds himself within range of school records for sacks and tackles for lost yardage.

Junior Matt Toeaina will likely start at either a tackle or end slot depending on who else steps up to fill the other vacancy. Last year's top reserve posted 10 tackles in 2004 but should benefit from the attention paid toward Ngata and Long.


Junior Victor Filipe and seniors Nate LiaBraaten, Darius Sanders and converted linebacker Justin Andrews should generate the longest looks on the perimeter, along with redshirt freshman Michael Speed. Sophomore David Faaeteete, along with redshirt freshmen Cole Linehan, Ra'Shon Harris and Thor Pili will be in line to provide relief for the interior starters or fill a starting role should Toeaina shift to the outside.

Four of last year's starters return in the secondary, yet newcomers who were the focus of last year's recruiting efforts could make their way into the lineup before the season progresses too far along.

Senior Aaron Gipson paid the price for being forced into the starting lineup 11 times as a true freshman in 2002 but the Ducks should now reap the dividends. Oregon's best cover corner and honorable mention all-conference pick led the team with four interceptions as well as recorded 42 tackles.

Senior Justin Phinisee looms as the program's most versatile defensive back, starting the final seven games at rover after opening at cornerback, but is expected to return to the latter outpost on a regular basis for his final year. In addition to posting 44 tackles, he led the team with six deflected passes.

Junior free safety J.D. Nelson finished as last season's second-leading tackler (66) and is the top 2005 returnee. He posted



career-bests of tackles vs. Indiana and UCLA as well as returned an interception 49 yards at Oregon State.

Sophomore Jackie Bates fought his way into the opening lineup at cornerback on five occasions, ending with 29 tackles and four passes broken up.

R e d s h i r t freshmen Patrick Chung, Jerome Boyd and Sharrod Davis will all compete for opportunities to make their way into the rotation, as will true freshman Willie Glasper, sophomore walk-on Ryan DePalo, junior Parris Moore and senior Rodney Woods.

But the three linebacker positions are certain to draw the most attention from Bellotti in the early going as only senior Anthony Trucks possesses any significant playing time from the line of scrimmage.

Trucks was fourth on the team in tackles in 2004 (55) as a first-year starter at outside linebacker. He provides the athleticism the could fuel the contingent and benefits from the renewed desire to pressure the opposition.

Sophomore A.J. Tuitele provides the flexibility to play either the Sam or Will backer outposts and possesses the instincts to be successful at either. His 11 tackles are second only to Trucks' numbers among the linebacker returnees.

Junior Brent Haberly emerged as one of the surpises of the spring as the walk-on refused to relinquish the starting middle linebacker slot that was given to him at the start of off-season drills. What he may lack in natural skills he compensates for with anticipation and instincts that keep him from making mistakes.

While the returnees vying for playing time include converted tailback Chris Vincent, as well as sophomores Kwame Agyeman and Ryan Phipps, junior Jon Pope and redshirt freshman John Bacon, the junior college trio of Chris Mulvanny, Jason Turner and Blair Phillips are looked upon as important cogs to any potential defensive improvement.

Special Teams

Not since 2001 has Oregon had to replace both its punter and its placement specialist prior to the same season.

The departure of all-time scoring leader, Jared Siegel, leaves Oregon without a proven placekicker. Junior Paul Martinez held down the team's punting chores as a true freshman in 2003 but his prep forte was that of a placements specialist. Yet none of the contenders, which includes walk-ons Luke Bellotti and Matt Evensen, were able to separate themselves from the field in the spring.

Both Martinez and Bellotti converted their only PAT attempts last season but both struggled through parts of the spring.

Junior college transfer Matt Dragich brought some impressive punting credentials with him in time for spring drills and had some impressive moments, as did junior walk-on Aaron Knowles. But inconsistencies bothered both as the Ducks try to escape the bottom third of the league in net punting for the first time in three years.

Not making either chore any easier is the fact that Oregon also must find replacements for its long snappers.

Justin Phinisee finished second in the Pac-10 and 11th in the country in punt returns in his first year tackling the challenge, with his 15.4-yard average the school's best in 48 years. Included was a 73-yard return for a touchdown vs. UCLA.

Andiel Brown is the only returnee who ran back a kickoff last year (1-5 yards), although Phinisee returned 15 for a 23.7yard average in 2003.

DEAN OF THE PAC-10 ... Not only does 11th-year Oregon coach Mike Bellotti resume his role as the longesttenured football mentor in the conference, he stands as one of its most successful. Surpassed only by USC in overall wins in the Pacific-10 Conference during his Oregon tenure (80-40), he is close to joining an elite collection of former conference coaches who have won 50 or more league games during their illustrious careers in the Pac-10. Only 12 conference brethren have achieved that pinnacle as he is tied for 13th on the Pac-10's all-time list of league coaching victories (49-31) with Mike Price (Washington State, 1989-2002) and Lon Stiner (Oregon State, 1933-48). He is 15th on the league's career winning percentage list in Pac-10 games (.615).

FAST TRACK... While Mike Bellotti is only six Pac-10 wins shy of breaking into the top 10 in all-time conference victories, only four former mentors were able to post more triumphs than Bellotti's 49 league wins in their first 10 years in the Pac-10. USC's John Robinson (56, 1976-82, 1993-95), Washington's Don James (54, 1975-84), UCLA's Terry Donahue (52, 1976-85) and Larry Smith (51, 1980-89) of Arizona/USC are the only Pac-10 head coaches to ever enjoy more success during the same span.

CLIMBING THE LADDER... While only Hugo Bezdek (.727%—1906, 1913-17) has accumulated a better winning percentage than Mike Bellotti's .667 percent (80-40) among his peers who have coached the Ducks a minimum of three seasons, he is close to becoming the second-winningest football coach in the history of the University of Oregon. His 80 overall victories in Eugene trails Rich Brooks' 91 wins (1977-94) and Len Casanova's 82 triumphs (1951-66). Furthermore, Oregon's 11th-year head coach became the school's first to reach 80 wins in less than 16 seasons.

POST-SEASON RUN... Oregon's string of seven consecutive bowl appearances came to end in 2004. While the Ducks hope their post-season hiatus is brief, they accumulated only six bowl bids prior to the run that saw them play in 12 bowls in 15 years from 1989-2003.

ASSISTANT DEAN... No head coach or assistant has presided at his present institution as long as Oregon assistant head coach Neal Zoumboukos. The 38year collegiate veteran is in his 26th year with the Ducks and has tutored the offensive line for all but one season. This year will mark only the second time he has overseen a different position as he will supervise the tight ends. The only other time Zoumboukos tutored the tight ends was 1994 when the Ducks concluded the season in the Rose Bowl.

BE TRUE TO YOUR SCHOOL... The addition of defensive line coach Michael Gray to the Ducks' staff raises the number of former Oregon players serving as full-time coaches at their alma mater to three. Gray ('84) joins offensive line coach Steve Greatwood ('80) and linebackers coach Don Pellum ('85) as Oregon alums who have returned home. That doesn't include third-year graduate assistant Dietrich Moore ('00).

CONTINUITY . . . Oregon's 10 fulltime coaches have accumulated 119 years of experience coaching the Ducks for an average of 11.9 years per man. Six of the 10 possess ties to the school of 16 years or more.

ON THE REBOUND ... Oregon's 5-6 record in 2004 marked its first losing campaign in the 10 years under Mike Bellotti and the program's first since 1993 (5-6). During Bellotti's head coaching tenure with the Ducks (1995-2004), each of the other nine Pac-10 counterparts has experienced at least one losing season while seven of nine have encountered a minimum of three disappointing years.

1,000-YARD RUSHER . . . Not only did senior tailback Terrence Whitehead become Oregon's 10th 1,000-yard rusher (1,144), he finished second in the Pac-10 (104.0 avg.) and 20th in the country in running the football. Despite his efforts, he fared no better than honorable mention all-conference acclaim. Only three players in the conference (and 21 in the country) tallied more yards per carry than his 5.7-yard average. Whitehead now finds himself 1,143 yards shy of the Ducks' career school record (3,296 yards, Derek Loville, 1986-89).

WHITE HOT . . . Terrence Whitehead's road through Oregon hasn't been without its potholes. But a lot of things appear easier for a 1,000-yard rusher. Originally recruited by the Ducks to play defense, the Los Angeles native's journey to stardom was delayed a year to clarify some challenges to his entrance exams. The same thing occurred the following year (2002) before he finally silenced his critics and served as the team's top running back reserve the latter twothirds of the year. It wasn't until the fifth game of his sophomore season that he was able to nail down the Ducks' starting tailback role on a permanent basis, where he has since opened 19 of the last 20 games. Oregon's 2004 Most Outstanding Player recipient now finds himself in position to become the school's first player to lead the team in rushing for more than two consecutive seasons in more than 10 years. Sean Burwell paced Oregon's running game from 1990-1993.

OREGON

HIGHLIGHTING HALOTI ... Junior defensive tackle Haloti Ngata is one of 36 linemen from around the country who is receiving early consideration for the Outland Trophy as well as one of 50 defenders on the Bronko Nagurski Trophy watch list. The Outland Trophy is awarded to the nation's best interior offensive or defensive lineman while the Nagurski Trophy is given to the best defensive player in college football. He tied for fifth on the team in tackles a year ago (46) to become one of three defensive linemen in the Pac-10 to receive early mention for the Outland Trophy, and one of six defensive standouts in the conference to attract attention as the nation's top defensive player.

BLOCK THAT KICK... In addition to his ability to force the opposition to alter their course of a running attack in another direction, Haloti Ngata has changed the trajectory of more than one kick. In just two seasons, Ngata has played a role in knocking five kicks off target. He deflected a PAT against Washington State and a field goal vs. Idaho in 2004 after rejecting PATs vs. UCLA and Washington State in 2002, as well as a FG vs. USC. Keith Lewis was credited with a school-record six blocked kicks from 2000-03.

RETURNING QUARTERBACK ...

Beginning his senior year ranked sixth on Oregon's career passing list (5,149 vards), quarterback Kellen Clemens is poised to complete his collegiate career as one of the Ducks' top signal-callers of all time. Only former Rose Bowl co-MVP Danny O'Neil (1991-94) and Bill Musgrave (1987-90) threw for more yards in their first three seasons (6,089 and 5,732 yards, respectively) than the Burns, Ore., standout's 5,149 yards. In addition, Clemens' 59.7 completion percentage already is on pace to eclipse Musgrave's career school record (57.4%), he stands 20 TDs shy of O'Neil's schoolrecord 62 scoring strikes and he already set several school records, including 178 pass attempts without an interception. Among the five quarterbacks ahead of Clemens on Oregon's all-time list, only Chris Miller and Dan Fouts did not lead their teams into post-season play during their senior seasons.

THE RETURNEES . . . Among Oregon's 14 returning starters (7 offense, 7 defense) from last year's squad are a pair of second-team all-conference honorees as well as five honorable mention selections. Senior tight end Tim Day and junior defensive tackle Haloti Ngata both received second-team all-league accolades. Quarterback Kellen Clemens, cornerback Aaron Gipson, defensive end Devan Long, punt returner Justin Phinisee and tailback Terrence Whitehead all earned honorable mention allconference plaudits. Whitehead finished second in the Pac-10 and 20th in the country in rushing (104.0 avg.), Phinisee second in the league (11th nationally) in punt returns (15.4 avg.), Clemens fourth in the conference in passing (231.6) and total offense (248.9 avg.) and Long fifth in tackles for loss (15).

EVOLVING OFFENSE... Ever since Mike Bellotti assumed control of the Ducks in 1995, the Ducks haven't straved far from their offensive philosophy. Coordinators such as Al Borges (1995), Dirk Koetter (1996), Jeff Tedford (1998) and Andy Ludwig (2002) have all added their own touches but Oregon's primary set remained the same. But a decline in efficiency prompted the head coach to take a look at other options. What he came up with can best be described as a combination of some of the principles from Utah, Bowling Green and Northwestern, some of the things new coordinator Gary Crowton brought withi him from BYUas well as some of Bellotti's renovations. The result is likely to be a mix of what Oregon has done in the past as well as new wrinkles that feature a single running back and multiple wide receivers or tight ends/h-backs.

HAWAI'I FIVE-0... It's conceivable that four-fifths of the Ducks' offensive line could be manned by natives of Hawai'i. Junior Enoka Lucas (Honolulu) was a fixture at center a year ago before breaking a bone in his right hand, opening eight games as a first-year starter. Redshirt freshman Max Unger (Honaunau) broke spring camp as a starter at left tackle, as did junior college transfer Palauni Ma Sun (Laie) at left guard. Fresno City College teammate Pat So'oalo (Kaneohe) is anticipated to join Oregon in time to compete for playing time at right guard.

TALENTED BLOODLINES ... A trio of Oregon players may have a better idea of what it takes to play at the next level since their fathers can offer first-hand knowledge. Junior free safety J.D. Nelson, walk-on redshirt linebacker Erik Elshire and incoming freshman defensive back Jairus Byrd all can benefit from the experience handed down from their dads regarding what it takes to play at the next level. Darrin Nelson enjoyed an 11-year NFL career with Minnesota and San Diego. Neil Elshire lettered two years at Oregon prior to encountering a six-year NFL stit with Minnesota. Gill Byrd was a defensive back at San Jose State before completing a 10-year professional football career with San Diego.

SHARE THE WEALTH \dots It's safe to

say that Oregon's deepest position could be wide receiver. Senior Demetrius Williams led the way with 47 receptions for 593 yards. Five players caught at least 25 passes a year ago and two more managed to snag more than 10 catches. Among those seven players, six of them return. Adding to the mix is one junior college transfer (James Finley) as well as a 6-5, 237-pound redshirt freshman (Jaison Williams) who figures heavily into Oregon's future plans. There could be as many as 10 different receivers able to lead the Ducks at any one time.

DEFENSIVE IMPROVEMENT... Oregon has demonstrated gradual improvement in shoring up its defense the past two years, allowing 25.6 points per game in 2004 compared to 27.8 points in 2002. Yet the biggest strides were made in pass defense, with the Ducks' 216.8 yards allowed bettered only once in the last eight years (2000).

2005 SCHEDULE... The Ducks will make their second visit ever to the city of Houston (first since 1962) and their first to face the Cougars to open the 2005 season in front of an ESPN2 television audience. They will host Montana for the first time since 1993, will face two-time defending national champion USC for the first time in three years, and host both Oregon State and Washington in the same season for the first time ever. Among the 11 2005 opponents, six advanced to the post-season a year ago.

RECORD TICKET SALES ... Oregon has established a record for seasonticket sales for the eighth year in a row and has suspended season sales prior to the start of the year for the seventh straight time. The Ducks already have exceeded 40,900 tickets sold on a season basis, with the supply of seats for the four league games against USC, Washington, California and Oregon State also exhausted. The Ducks head into their 2005 home opener vs. Montana boasting a string of 36 consecutive home sellouts. Last season, Oregon averaged 58,059 fans in a stadium with a seating capacity of 54,000. The attendance average has exceeded the seating capacity in each of the past seven seasons.
