SACRAMENTS OF THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH:

There are only two sacraments in the true Christian Church, the body of believers. One is the Lord's Supper which is also called the Communion of Believers or the Eucharist. The other sacrament is called Believers Baptism.

Believers Baptism:

Believers Baptism was instituted to follow Jesus' example set forth in Matthew 3:13-17. Today Christian churches practice baptism several different ways primarily aspersion (sprinkling of water) and immersion (dipping the believers body completely under water). Since John the Baptist's time immersion baptism has been practiced by those trying to adhere most rigorously to the teachings of Jesus Christ. It is more symbolic of the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus. True believers do not allow infant baptism since an infant cannot select Jesus ways as his own. A parent cannot repent on behalf of the child. Also true believers do not allow unregenerated people to be baptized in the Lord's name. A confession of faith precedes the actual baptism. Water baptism is not to be confused with baptism by fire (the second baptism or baptism of the Holy Spirit) which is doctrine in the Holiness movement such as the Pentecostal Holiness organization.

The Last Supper of Jesus with the Twelve Apostles and the Establishment of Communion of Believers or The Lord's Supper: (Also called 'The Eucharist')

Location: The Upper Room of a house in Jerusalem Teaching illustrated: Jesus' Foreknowledge of His Death and Suffering (See John 6:64, 13:1,11, 18:4, and 19:28)

Then came the day of Unleavened Bread on which the Passover lamb had to be sacrificed. Jesus sent Peter and John, saying, "Go and make preparations for us to eat the Passover."

"Where do you want us to prepare for it?" they asked.

He replied, "As you enter the city, a man carrying a jar of water will meet you. Follow him to the house that he enters, and say to the owner of the house, `The Teacher asks Where is the guest room, where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?' He will show you a large upper room, all furnished. Make preparations there." They left and found things just as Jesus had told them.

So they prepared the Passover. When the hour came, Jesus and his apostles reclined at the table. And he said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. For I tell you, I will not eat it again until it finds fulfillment in the kingdom of God."

After taking the cup, he gave thanks and said, "Take this and divide it among you. For I tell you I will not drink again of the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes."

And he took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same way, after the supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you."

The Lord Jesus, on the night he was betrayed, took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same way, after supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me." For whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

- 1 Corinthians 11:23b-26 (NIV)

After the Last Supper Jesus lead the apostles to the Garden of Gethsemane where he agonized in prayer over his coming betrayal and death on a Roman cross. Also see Matthew 26:36-56, Mark 14:32-42 and Luke 22:39-46.

Jesus Prays in the Garden of Gethsemane on the Mount of Olives:

Jesus went out as usual to the Mount of Olives, and his disciples followed him. On reaching the place, he said to them, "Pray that you will not fall into temptation." He withdrew about a stone's throw beyond them, knelt down and prayed, "Father, if you are willing, take this cup from me; yet not my will, but yours be done." An angel from heaven appeared to him and strengthened him. And being in anguish, he prayed more earnestly, and his sweat was like drops of blood falling to the ground. When he rose from prayer and went back to the disciples, he found them asleep, exhausted from sorrow. "Why are you sleeping?" he asked them. "Get up and pray so that you will not fall into temptation."

While he was in the Garden of Gethsemane Jesus was betrayed by Judas Iscariot as he had predicted earlier in the evening while at the Last Supper in the Upper Room. Peter cut off the ear of Malchus, one of the high priests' guards. Jesus told Peter that those who lived by the sword would die by the sword and healed the guards ear. He was then taken before Annas and then Caiaphas, the high priest and the Jewish religious leaders (called the Sanhedrin /SAN-HEED-RIN/ or the Council). Peter denied knowing Jesus three times as Jesus had predicted. Even the detail of the rooster crowing came true.

Jesus was then taken before the Roman prelate or governor

Pontius Pilate. Pilate attempted to release Jesus but the Jewish people would not hear of it. Pilate tried sending Jesus to the Jewish ruler Herod Antipas but Herod sent Jesus back to Pontius Pilate. They demanded Jesus' crucifixion and asked Pilate to release Barabbas, a common criminal charged with murder. Jesus was scourged (beaten with leather straps with imbedded pieces of wire or metal), mocked, crowned with a wreath of thorns and marched out to Golgotha, Aramaic for the Place of Skulls, or Calvary in Latin. There he was crucified and all Old Testament prophecies were fulfilled to the very minutest details of soldiers casting lots for his clothing, not a bone being broken and piercing his side with a spear.

After his death, burial and resurrection Jesus appeared to the women at the tomb and his apostles many time during the next forty days. Jesus told them they would be baptized with the Holy Spirit in a few days (on Pentecost.) Then Jesus was taken up to heaven in a cloud. This is known as the Ascension of Jesus Christ. Two angels told the apostles that Jesus would return as he had left. The apostles chose Matthias to replace Judas the traitor. See Acts 1:1-26.
