

## COMMENTS FROM OUR PRESIDENT . . . . . . . Ed Wright

We begin the new year with several new crewmen. Handling the BULLETIN and new publications will be Bill Cramer and Virginia Heyerdahl, respectively. Both come with full professional backgrounds in the field of publishing. Bill served for many years as the editor of one of the leading Navy scientific periodicals and Virginia is editor of a doll magazine of wide renown. Charlotte Couzantino assumes the chairmanship of the Records Committee, bringing with her a wide knowledge of Maryland records and an infectious interest in their preservation and dissemination.

Among the officers of our organization only one position fell vacant, that of 1st vice-president which includes the major task of program chairmanship. Karen Miles accepted our pleas to fill the position and immediately set about to schedule a diverse and interesting program. She has already nailed down most of her speakers whose talks will cover the fields of computer genealogy, genealogical research in Ireland, oral history and much more—from some of the best in their respective fields.

We leave a year of many accomplishments and enter another of equal comise. Reflecting back on last year's progress we note the following. Membership remained about the same as the previous year; the year ended with a membership of 404. Our library continued to grow at an increasing rate, reaching a total of 456 books and an amazing number of periodicals. Bible committee completed a successful year; we now have 62 Bible record files in the library (copies and transcriptions). We held two well-attended seminars for beginners, reaching about 120 persons. Our "Stones and Bones" cemeteries book broke new records in sales, fast approaching 500 copies at In addition our Records committee completed review of our last count. bibliography of published source material for P.G. County and are readying that for publication. The 1828 Tax List of P.G. County was added to our list of publications in March. Near the end of the year a review of our management of funds was made and steps taken to improve our rate of interest and the security of our funds, thanks to the efforts of our Treasurer. The BULLETIN continued to be a high quality periodical, reflecting the vitality of our Society.

But you ain't seen nothin' yet folks... We hope to continue in our winning ways but we need all hands to help pull the load. We have talented and new people on our staff but they need your suggestions and help. There have been a few suggestions as to future projects—we need more. And we have to add impetus to some of the old ones. Please help where and when you can.

## CEMETERY RECORDS OF PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY MARYLAND

Prince George's County has one State Cemetery for Maryland Veterans, and it is located at 11301 Crane Highway (Route 301) Cheltenham, MD, about 8 miles south of Upper Marlboro. It was opened in 1978, and as of March 22, 1985 had 2354 graves. The markers are all flat black granite on beautiful curving slopes. Because of its closeness to Washington military headquarters, there are many burials with full military honors. You will find it interesting to visit and very different from Arlington.

The records are all on master cards and on file both at the cemetery office and at the head office in Baltimore. They hope to eventually microfilm the records of all five Maryland Veterans cemeteries.

Our researcher Elaine Entwisle reports:

A Black cemetery in Upper Marlboro which was almost completely overgrown when we worked on research for "STONES AND BONES" was cleaned up for the past Memorial Day and many stones came to light. We could find only the Gantt stones (P. 607) in the deep bushes and trees in 1983. The Union United Methodist Church used to be located in the middle of this cemetery but is now located at 14418 Old Marlboro Pike in Upper Marlboro. The cemetery is on Valley Lane, two blocks off Church Street and behind Trinity Episcopal Church grounds. You can hear and see Route 4 from the end of the cemetery which sits about 10' above a stream. The original land was given by a Mr. George W. Wilson. On the other side of Valley Lane was land given by Fred Sasscer, and a black school had stood there, as well as part of the cemetery which had wooden crosses, long since deteriorated and disappeared. Mrs. Ada Hawkins age 84 provided the history and remembers her grandfather being buried there when she was 7 years old. There are many unmarked graves as indicated by mounded earth, and many of the 79 current markers have no identifying names. Some are rocks and some hand made and hand painted. The markers which can be read include:

Page 66. [MCW 3:240] Will of Mary BEAVEN of PG Co, sicke and weake in body. Date: 28 Aprill 1712. Item: "I will & bequeath my well beloved Richard MARSHAM executer of all my reall and personall estate as witness my hand and sealle." [MCW identifies Richard MARSHAM as executor and sole legatee.] Signed: Mary BEVAN. Wit: Tho: BLANFORD, Sarah (B) BLANFORD. Proved June 13, 1713 by oaths of Thomas BLANDFORD and Sarah BLANFORD, before Benja. BERRY, Depty Comiss'ry PG Co.

Page 67. [MCW 3:249] Will of Hugh ABRAHAMS of PC Co, planter, being very sick and weake in body. Date: 14 August 1712. Item: To my beloved wife Ester [called Easter in MCW] ABRAHAMS, whom I likewise constitute my only executor, that plantation I now live upon containing 60 acres called "part of Essenton" with one Negro man called Robin, together with all my household goods and moveables dureing her life and att the Expiracion thereof unto John BECKETT my son in law and to him and his haires for ever. Item: To my daughter in law Marey RODNEY [RODREY?, thus in MCW] one cow & calfe att the decease of my beloved wife. Item: To my daughter in law Elizabeth BECRAFT one cow & calfe at the decease of my beloved wife. Item: To Humphrey BECKETT son of Humphrey BECKETT one cow & calf at the decease of my beloved wife. Signed: Hugh ( ) ABRAHAM. Wit: Rich'd LANCASTER, Rob't TYLER, Pa: SMYPSON, George BIRCHE.

Proved 12 May 1713 by Mr. Richard LANCASTER & Mr. Rob't TYLER & Mr. Partrick SYMPSON, before Benj'a BERRY, Dept'y Commissary PG Co. At the same day abovesaid came the within named Hester ABRAHAMS, widdow or relickt of the deceased Hugh ABRAHAMS and renounced all her right unto the within will and desireth that the adminstration of her deceased husband's estate might be wholly given to her sonn John BECKETT wch accordingly is granted per me the day & yr. abovesaid. Signed: Benj'a BERRY, Depty Commiss'ry PG Co.

Pages 67-69. [MCW 3:253] Will of Henry BOTELER of PG Co, sick and weak in body. Date: "twentieth seven day of August" 1713. [MCW: 7th Aug. 1713] Impr: To my dear son Charles BOTELER and his heirs all that tract laying in PG County called "Renchers Adventure" containing 50 acres, also that tract called "London Derry" 250 acres, also all that tract called "HarrysLott" after the decease of my dear & loving wife. Item: To my dear son Henry BOTELER and his heirs all that part of a tract called "Buttington" given me with my wife by her father Mr. George LINGAN deceased by estimation 200 acres. Item: To my dear son Thomas BOTELER and his heirs all that tract called "Appledore" [Appledone?] which I purchased of John MIDDLETON containing 242 acres. Item: To my dear and [page 68] loving son Edward BOTELER and his heirs all that part of a tract laying in Baltemore County will to me by Mr. Goerge LINGAN deceased called "Lingans adventure" containing by estimation 500 acres. Item: To my dear and loving daughter Alsie BOTELER one negro girl called Dinah and her increase and one feather bed & furniture to be delivered at age 16. Item: To my dear daughter Catherine BOTELER one negro girl called Joyce and her increase as also one feather bed and furniture to be delivered after age 16 years. But provided and in case any of my sons should dye before they come to age 21 years, his or their parts of the estate left shall be equally devided amongst the survivors of my sons to them and theirs



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forever both reall and personall, but if all my sons should dye before they arrive of the age aforesd that then their parts shall be equally devided between my two daughters both reall and personall to htem and their heirs forever. And in case either of my daughters should dye before they shall arrive at the age of sixteen, she that survives shall have the deceaseds part, but in case both then my dear wife have their parts wholly to herself. Item: To my dear and loving wife Catherine BOTELER one Negro man called Dick as also my best bed and furniture and after my debts and legacys before mentioned be paid I give unto my dear and loving wife one third part of all the remaineder of my substance both reall and personall, also the tract "Harry's Lott" with the appurtenances thereunto belonging, to my wife during her life. The other two thirds of my estate to be equally devided amongst my six dear children before mentioned, my dear and loving wife to keep the whole estate in her hand to bring my dear children up in the nurture and fear of the Lord and give them as good learning as is reasonable to be had for which consideracon my dear and loving wife to have all the proffitt and advantages that is to be gained by rents, increase, interest or any other way or means during the time she shall remain a widdow, but if she should marry or dye before my dear children come to age to receive their parts of the estate that then my loving brother Edward BOTELER, Josiah WILLSON & Thomas LINGAN and either or any of them (all being equally concerned) doe take into their care and charge (att their descretion) all my children with what is their due both real and personall, and I beg that my friends aforesaid will take care to give my dear babies all necessary education and bring them up in the nurture and fear of the Lord. I hereby appoint my dear and loving wife Catherine BOTELER sole executrix. Signed: Henry (🕍) BOTELER. Wit: Ann HEAD, Roger BROOKE, William BEANES.

Sept. 5, 1713, proved by Ann HEAD and William BEANES; they did see the other evidence Roger BROOKE sign. Sworne before Benj'a BERRY, Depty Commissry PG Co. [Page 69] On the same day as abovesaid, on 5 Sept. 1713, came Mr. Roger BROOKE and also proved the will. "Said Roger BROOKE did declare that he questioned the said Henry BOTELER if he was in his perfect sences and the sd Henry BOTELER did answer him that he was at that time." Sworne before Benj'a BERRY, Depty Comissry PG Co.

## NOTES regarding the above wills:

Mary BEAVEN inherited land during her life from her husband Charles BEAVEN, whose will was proved in PG Co. 21 June 1699 [MCW 2:182]. He had several children, none of whom is named in her will. Is Richard MARSHAM her son by a former marriage? Doubtful: He died in PG Co, 1713, naming numerous grandchildren [MCW 3:240]. Thomas BLANFORD is listed as a taxable in Mount Calvert Hundred, PG Co, 1733, near a Charles BEVAN [Black Books, #269].

John BECKETT, son-in-law [stepson] of Hugh ABRAHAMS, and Humphrey BECKETT are listed in Patuxent Hundred in 1733 [ibid. #266]. Their families are recorded in the Queen Anne's Parish Register, 1722-29. John and Mary RODRY's children were also registered there 1712-21. John RODRY was a taxable in Collington Hundred 1719 [ibid. #163].

"Harry's Lott", owned by Henry BOTELER in 1713, was granted to Charles BOTELER in 1679 [Md. Land Grants 21:149]. Much of the land Henry owned was in St. Paul's Parish. Mrs. Boteler, apparently his widow, is a taxable in both Mount Calvert Hundred and Mattapeny Hundred in 1719 [Black Books, #159-160].

NAMES IN STONE, 75,000 CEMETERY INSCRIPTIONS FROM FREDERICK COUNTY, MARYLAND, by Jacob Mehrling Holdcraft. 1985. 2 vols. 1303pp. + 68pp. A gift of Thelma Dos-

The author estimates that only about a third of all the burials in Frederick County since settlement began have been marked by gravestones. Some of these stones have since crumbled, been plowed under, vandalized, or in one way or another been lost. The author did not include all cemeteries in the county, so it is well to read the introduction and scan the alphabetical listing of cemeteries. The names of persons are arranged alphabetically, followed by any other information given and the dates as they appear on the stone. Following this is the name of the cemetery and a code number. For the second printing in 1972 a second alphabetical listing of inscriptions from the peripheral areas of the county was added. This book is sure to be of assistance to those searching Frederick County and makes a nice addition to our growing collection of Maryland books.

HENRY HARFORD: LAST PROPRIETOR OF MARYLAND by Vera F. Rollo. 1976. 236pp. A gift of Nada Poole.

Harfold County, Maryland was names for Henry Harford, but few persons know much about him except for a few sparse facts. The author's purpose in writing this book was to fill in the gaps in Maryland history pertaining to the last proprietor, Henry Harford, and to correct errors regarding his life an proprietorship. Much of the details were found only by a trip to England. The book is well documented and is also easy to read.

A COMPILATION OF THE ORIGINAL LISTS OF PROTESTANT IMMIGRANTS TO SOUTH CAROLINA 1. 1763-1773 by Janie Revill. 1981. 163pp. Purchased by the Society.

The immigrants listed in this volume were protestant refugees from Europe who came to South Carolina following an Act passed by the General Assembly of the Colony on July 25, 1761, which broadened the earlier immigration laws for religious refugees. The lists of immigrants published in this book were taken from the Council Journal and usually list the number of acres bounty land in addition to the name of the immigrant. A few lists give the ages of the immigrants. The book is indexed to provide quick access to its contents.



MORMON LIBRARY RELOCATES



The Silver Spring Branch of the Mormon Genealogical Library, formerly on Randolph Road in Silver Spring, is now located at 10,000 Stoneybrook Drive, Kensington, close to (but not on the grounds of) the Mormon Temple. 

## ANDEREK DISCUSSES GENEALOGY AND COMPUTERS

The 4 June meeting of the Society heard a talk by Dr. Paul Anderek on the use of computers in genealogy. Anderek gave a very lucid Dr. non-technical various talk on potential and current uses computers for genealogy. He pointed out that future uses will include increased ability to search the large repositories for specific information increased large-scale compilations of data. (As an example of the latter he cited an ongoing compilation of all of the marriage records in the State of Illinois from the period prior to statehood to 1900.) For the individual researcher number of advantages were mentioned, e.g., conservation flexibility space, storage correcting or adding information to your records, use of computer short information, cuts in typing maintaining ones file at the "edge of readiness" publication for transmission to succeeding generations. Dr. Anderek pointed out soft-ware extensive genealogical work for all major now. Нe computers is available recommended acquiring typing of "user proficiency. formation groups" and extensive reading on the subject. Dr. Anderek and his wife Sara edit a periodical entitled "Genealogical Computing."

Jacob Gould Died March 8th 1849

The Gould Bible is currently owned by Ruth Evans Dungan (#554). Greenbelt. Maryland. The original owner of the Bible was probably Elizabeth Gould (Mrs. John) Rickard, 1807-1896. Ruth Dungan provided additional information with submission of the Bible record.

Hannah Gould's maiden name was Davenport. Hannah died in 1865.

Jacob Gould, son of Isaac Gould, served in the Revolutionary War in New Jersey.

1890 Maryland Census Index of Civil War Veterans or Their Widows, compiled by Bryan Lee Dilts. Index Publishing, PO Box 11476-P, Salt Lake City, UT 84147. 69pp hardcover book for \$34 or 48x diazo microfiche for \$5.00. A gift to the Society (in microfiche form).

Because most of the 1890 census was destroyed, the surviving veterans schedules take on added significance. There are 20,693 entries in this index of the Maryland Civil War Veterans or Widows at the time of the 1890 census. Each entry shows the name, state, county, locale, supervisor's district and enumerator's district. With this information the reader can quickly consult the original census records to find additional information which often includes rank, company, and regiment or vessel.

She advises you to do what you can at home first; don't travel 400 miles to research what is available 40 miles away. For a good Kentucky road map, write to Office of Tourism Development, Capital Plaza Tower, Frankfort, KY 40601 and ask for the "Oh! Kentucky!" packet. Write or phone places you will be visiting to learn their operating hours. Frankfort has the greatest concentration of material for genealogical research in Kentucky, but don't forget the Margaret I. King Library on the U of KY campus at Lexington and Filson Club Library in Louisville.

MID-MO GenSoc, Jefferson City, MO, Vol. 9, #2, 1985. Two Powers of Attorney were found in the deed records of Clay Co, MO from North Carolina (Orange, Chatham and Caswell Cos. mentioned) dated 1842. Excellent examples of unusual documents often found in deed records. Also, in this issue is 1850 census of Jefferson Barracks (Army Headquarters, Missouri.)

Socal GenSoc, Vol. XXII, #5, May 1985. Mary Wilkins tells of her success using the Family Registry of the new LDS Research Coordination Program. (We have had the forms at our PGGenSoc Meetings for use by our members, and hope to continue furnishing them in the future. Try your luck--you may also have fantastic results.)

## PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY WILL BOOK 1, 1698-1770

Abstracted by Donald L. Wilson

MCW = Maryland Calendar of Wills, by Jane Baldwin Cotton (8 v., 1906-1928)

Page 69. [MCW 3:240] Will of Richard MARSHAM of PG Co, being far stricken in years and considering my life on Earth cannot be long. Item: To my grandson Basill WARING two tracts, one called "strife" or "troublesome" containing 240 acres, and the other called "Childrens Loss" bought of Mr. Clement BROOKE containing 240 acres. Those tracts to Basill WARING during his life and after his decease to Thomas WARING son of the said Basill WARING and heirs, and for want of said heirs "to the in Bloud of said Basill WARINGs children and their heires forever," but in case Martha WARING wife to the said Basill WARING should outlive the said Basill that then she to have the said Lands during her widdowhood. Item: To my grandson Basill WARING one Negro man called Charles bought and payd for by mee and by mee delivered into the hands [of] my daughter Sarah WARING [she is not mentioned in MCW] when a widdow by her to be delivered to the said Basill, which said Negro is now in the possession of Mr. James HADDOCK and to be delivered to said Basill when ever required or demanded. Item: To Thomas WARING, son of said Basill WARING, one silver spoon. Item: To Thomas WARING son of said Basill WARRING one Negro man called young Dick SHORE to be delivered to him within seaven years after my decease. Item: To my grandson Leonard BROOKE three tracts, vizt: the one called "Blackwalnutt Thickett" [MCW: "Walnutt Thickett"] containing 300 acres, and one more called "Content" containing 300 acres, and one more called "St. Katherines" containing about 50 acres, said three tracts to Leonard BROOK and his heirs, for want of such to the heirs of Marsham WARING. Item: To my grandson Leonard BROOKE 5 Negroues named Pompy, Quassy, Prince, Great Pegg and her son Robin, and their increase: also 14 head of cattle (young and oald), 12 head of sheep and 12 head of hoggs, to be delivered to him at age 20. Item: To my said granson Leonard BROOKE the best feather bed and furniture in my House except that in my Porch Chamber, with two pair of sheets, two table cloaths, six napkins, four puter dishes that were his Fathers, one large Iron pot, one Iron kettle, one small table, two turky work chares [chairs], and six leather chares, to be delivered at age 20.

Item: Notwithstanding I have above given to my grandson Leonard BROOKE the several tracts of land &ca. my meaning is that they shall be and remain in the possession of my executor for five year after the said Leonard BROOK shall come to full age and not longer at which time I bequeath to Leonard BROOK half the stock of hoggs and cattle belonging to the plantation [page 70] whereon my Negro Pompy liveth as also the half of the Household goods belonging to said Quarter, & at the same time my executor to pay him one indeferent [indifferent] feather bed and furniture more. Item: To my said grandson Leonard BROOKE one negroue man called young Charles to be delivered him when the crop is finished, that is pickt at the time of my decease. Item: To my said grandson Leonard BROOKE two silver spoons.

Item: To my grandson Samuel QUEEN two Negrous named Sambo and his wife Dido. Item: To my grandson Marsham QUEENE two Negrous named Marke and the other Samuel. Item: To my grandson William QUEEN two Negrous named young Mingo and the other Herculous. Item: To my grand daughter Catherine QUEEN two young negrous named John and Jane. Item: To my grand daughter Margret QUEEN two Negrous named young James and Mary.



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Item: To my five grand children last mentioned named Samuel QUEEN, Marsham QUEEN, William QUEEN, Catherine QUEEN and Margret QUEEN, to each of them six head of cattle, young and oald, five head of sheep, two breeding sows, one iron pot to contain about six gallons, one frying pan, one iron pestle and two small puter [pewter] dishes. Item: To my said grandchildren (QUEEN) one tract of land called "Inclosure" which I lately bought of Coll. Ninion BEALL containing by pattent 1040 acres: To samuel QUEEN 240 acres, to Marsham QUEEN 200 acres, to William QUEEN 200 acres, to Catherine QUEEN 200 acres, and to Margret QUEEN 200 acres, but if any of the five should decease before age 21 or the two female maryed [married], then their parts to be equally divided amongst the survivers, and if said 1040 acres should contain more or less the division to be made p[ro] rata to them and their heirs. Item: To my granddaughter Ann BOURNMAN [called Mary BOURNMAN in MCW] one negrou called young Bess to be delivered to her at the same time when Leonard BROOKE hath Charles delivered to him.

Item: To my daughter Sarah HADDOCK one gold ring of 20 shillings prise [price]. Item: To the Reverend James HADDOCK five pounds sterling. Item: To my kindsman William MURDOCK the son of Mr. John MURDOCK one silver spoone. Item: To Basill WARING the son of Marsham WARING one Negrow man named Will. Item: To Sarah WARING the daughter of Marsham WARING one Molatto Woman Slave named Sarah and her increase for ever. Item: To John OSBOURN one tract called "Trundebed Cuckold" [MCW: "Trundle Bed Cuckold"] to him and his heirs, for want of such heirs to redound to the heires of Marsham WARING. Item: To said John OSBOURN two young heffers and two young breeding sows.

Item: To my grandson Marsham WARING four tracts called "Mount Pleasant" containing 400 acres, "the Exchange" and all the remaining part of a tract called "Marshams Rest" containing about 300 acres, together with one tract called "the Barron Poynts" containing about 50 acres [MCW: 150 acres], to Marsham WARING during his life, and then to redound to Richard Marsham WARING son of said Marsham WARING and his heirs, and for want of such to the next heir in bloud of Marsham WARINGs childred, but in case that Henereta the wife of Marsham WARING should outlive her husband that then during her widdowhood to live quietly upon the said land &ca. Item: My will is that my Negroe Woman Sarah and her two daughters Beck & Sarah be and remain upon my now dwelling plantation to take cair [care] and mend and make for so many of my grandchildren as shall dwell thereon, and I do hereby appoint that my executor do find and allow to my said Negro Woman Sarah good sufficient dyet and apparell and to pay her yearly and every year during her natural life the sum of two [page 71] pounds sterling provided she prove true and faithfull to my executor.

Item: To Richard Marsham WARING one feather bed and furniture. Item: I will that my slave named Robert (a Molatto) serve my executor untill he shall arrive to the age of 35 years, his age being now accounted 28 years [born 1684/5], and then the said Robert and his wife and childe which he now hath to be fully discharged and set free provided they be vigilant and faithfull to my executor during the time of their servitude, but in case they have other children that those other children continue slaves to my executor. Item: I will that my Molatto slave named James serve my executor untill he arrive unto the aege of 35 years and then to be set free, his age being now accounted 17 years [born 1695/6], provided he prove vigilant and faithfull to my executor during the time of his servitude. Item: My will is that if any one or more of my grand children shall hereafter indeavour to sue, trouble or molest my executor (hereafter mentioned) claiming any thing in law of their deceased fathers estate, that then such one or more of my said grandchildren to have no benefitt of this my last will and testament, but his or their parts to redound wholly to my said executor.



Item: All the remander part of my estate to continue as it now doth untill such time that my five grandchildren (to say the five children of Mr. Samuel QUEEN deceast) have soficient education, but the benefitt of their worke to be disbursted for the maintainance of my said five grandchildren at the discression of my executor and trustees and then to redound to my said executor and his heirs. To Mr. Clement BROOKE one gold ring of 20 shillings prise. Item: To Mr. William JOSEPH one gold ring of 20 shillings prise. Item: I appoint my well beloved Friends Mr. William JOSEPH, Col'l Thomas GREENFIELD and Mr. Clement BROOKE to be overseers in trust to see this will faithfully executed, and my said said executor shall do nothing as to paying of debts and legacies or ending any disputes amongst my said grand children without first consulting my said trustees or the major part of them, and my executor shall stand to and abide the Judgment and determination of my said trustees. Item: I ordain my well beloved grandson Marsham WARING whole and sole executor.

Item: To my grandson Richard BROOKE one negro named Charles (the son of Mingo) and I order that the said Negro be delivered him after the finishing of the crop sown or growing at the time of my decase, and in case Coll. GREENFIELD should decease that Capt'n Thomas Truman GREENFIELD I do appoint in his stead. Item: I will that when my grandson Leonard BROOKE shall arrive to the aige of 20 years that my slave Molatto Robert build him one twenty foot dwelling house and one fifty foot tobacco house cleare of carpenters wages together with one fifteen foot Quarter [= slave quarter]. Item: I will that my grandson Leonard BROOKE continew at my now dwelling plantation and have his maintenance of my executor untill he arive to 20 years and then be pay'd five pound sterl'g to purchase nails. Item: To my five grandchildren (the five children of Mr. Samuel QUEEN) to each of them a feather bed and furniture. Date: 14 Aprill 1713. Signed: Rich'd MARSHAM. Wit: Tho: GREENFIELD, T. Truman GREENFIELD, Kenelm CHESELDYNE, Henry Pereg JOWLES, Clarke SKINNER.

[Page 72] The Back of this will was endorsed, April 22, 1713 [sic, date does not appear in MCW]. May 7, 1713: Then came Coll. Thomas GREENFIELD and Mr. Clarke SKINNER and also came Capt'n Thomas Truman GREENFIELD and proved the will of Mr. Richard MARSHAM deceased. Sworne before Benj'a BERRY, Depty Comissary, PC Co.

Richard MARSHAM seems to have married ca.1700, Anne TASKER (1644-?) daughter of Gov. Leonard CALVERT (1606-1647) and widow of Baker BROOKE (1628-1679), of Henry BRENT (d. 1693) and of Judge Thomas TASKER (d. 1699). [Md. Genealogies, 1:144] For a history of the WARING family, see Bowie's Across the Years in Prince George's County, p. 597-620. Richard's daughter Sarah had been the wife of Basil WARING (d. 1688, Calvert Co.). Richard's daughter Katherine m.(1st) Baker BROOKE (d. 1698) and (2nd) Samuel QUEEN of St. Mary's Co. [Md. Gen's 1:99]



NOTES: Richard MARSHAM was transported to Maryland, as a servant, in 1658. His wife Katherine was eligible for a headright due to "service", 1670. [Skordas. Early Settlers of Maryland, p. 306] Parran's Register of Maryland's Heraldic Families, series II [p. 335] claims Richard MARSHAM "was a large land owner, and engaged in shipping and commerce, operating through the port of Blandenburg" [sic, Bladensburg was not established until 1742]. Also that "He m. Katherine BRENT, the dau. of Capt. Giles BRENT (1606-1671) and his wife Mary Kitomagund, Indian Princess." This latter statement seems to be disproved by Giles BRENT's will in which he mentions only a son Giles and daughter Mary FITZHERBERT. [Gen. of Va. Families: VMHB, 1:319] Giles' sister Margaret BRENT's will, 1663, mentions another son, Richard, who apparently died before 1671. [ibid. p.320]

# MINUTES OF THE PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, INC. 4 SEPTEMBER, 1985

Pres. Wright introduced Bill Cramer, the new *Bulletin* editor, and thanked Irene D'Amato for her work in completing the 1983-84 index.

The NGS conference will be held in Columbus, Ohio, 28-30 May, 1986.

Members expressed a great deal of interest in forming a Society computer interest group.

The President asked for corrections/changes to the minutes of the June meeting; they were approved as printed in the Bullatin.

The meeting adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

Editor's Note. This Johannes Schwalm Historical Association referred to above is a society devoted to researching, collecting and disseminating data related to descendants of German auxiliaries (usually referred to as "Hessians" although some came from other German states) to the British Crown who remained in America after the Revolution. It is estimated that 4,000 to 6.000 out of some 30.000 of these German auxiliaries remained in this (After six or seven generations there are a good descendants!) In this article the writer presents a case history of his 3-great grandfather who was born in the Landgravate of Hesse-Cassel (now in the state of Hesse in West Germany) in 1756, served with the Hessian Army during the Revolution, was captured at Yorktown, imprisoned in the barracks at Frederick, Md., deserted from the Hessian army in 1783 and settled in Frederick County where he died in 1830. The writer would be interested in hearing from persons who have or think they may have "Hessian" ancestry.

MARYLAND NATIONAL MEMORIAL PARK is located south of Laurel proper on Route 1, 13300 Washington Blvd. It was known as National Capital Memorial Park from the 1930's to 1953, and Carver Memorial Park from 1953-1969, and Maryland National Memorial Park from 1969 to present. It is the only cemetery in the County that we know of which has had three names. All of the graves are flat on the 80 acres, and there are numerous shrubs and trees behind the wrought iron fence along busy Route 1. There are now about 11,000 graves and the records are on card files and computer files. The cemetery is privately owned and is non-sectarian.

## Book Reviews

By Shirley Langdon Wilcox, C.G.

INGRAM FAMILY HISTORY, FROM ENGLAND TO AMERICA by Mary Ruth Stultz. 236 pp. 1985. A gift from the author.

This is a source book of genealogical data on the Ingram surname. The author has included primary, secondary and oral history records which are intended to be used by persons trying to search their own individual lines. The book is divided into twelve chapters and includes material on the origin of the name and its English background, seventeenth century colonists of the Ingram surname, Virginia land records, marriages from a number of states, military records, wills and census records. The author especially warns readers that the family charts which have been included are to be used as clues for further research and cannot be accepted as final documentation. There are names and addresses of current Ingram researchers and the book is completely indexed. For those working on the Ingram surname, particularly in the south, this book should save countless hours of research and give some good clues for further searching. It is always nice to see years of research put into a useable form so that others might benefit.

A VISIT WITH OUR CECIL ANCESTORS OVER TWO HUNDRED YEARS AGO by Walter V. Ball. 7pp. 1985. A gift of the author.

The author has researched and published material on several early Maryland families. In this small pamphlet he has gathered together material showing the relationship between the Cecil, Duvall, Pile, Sprigg and Belt families. He has made use of early court records which he has cited throughout the text. This paper should be helpful to those working on the early generations of the families in Prince George's County.

CUMULATIVE MEMBER ROSTER 1968-1985 (Surname Index Key). West-Central Kentucky Family Research Association. 64pp. + index. A gift from the Association. As the title suggests, this is a list of members of the Association for the fifteen-years of its existance. Each member has been assigned a number and they are listed in numerical order with an index to the surnames in the back. The November issue of their bulletin contains an annual surname index and this key is needed for the names and addresses of the submitters. This will be a useful addition to our periodical collection and we appreciate the donation.

THE QUEEN FAMILY OF COLONIAL MARYLAND, The Memoirs of Joseph Brooke, 1845-1930 edited by Henry Jerningham Queen. 48pp. A gift to the Society from the editor.

This is an edited copy of a typescript completed by Joseph Brooke about 1924. Factual errors have been corrected by the editor with the use of footnotes. Members of the Queen family are descendants of Richard Queen (1725-1794) who established Queen's Chapel. The narrative makes for very interesting reading and is good background material for those interested in Prince George's County and the area that became Washington, DC.

NOTES: Robert WADE was the son of Zachary WADE whose will was proved 1677 in Charles Co, Md [MCW 1:203]. By his father's will, Robert received "Market Overton", 'Forest Green", "Stony Harbour" and "Friendship". Zachary WADE was transported to Maryland as a servant, 1641 [Skordas, Early Settlers, p. 479]. Robert WADE's wife Elizabeth was a daughter of Thomas SPRIGG of PG Co. (1630-1704) [Md. Genealogies 2:388-9]. Zachariah WADE [Robert's son] was a taxable in Piscattaway Hundred, 1719. In 1733 we find Nehem., Robert Sen., Zacha., Richard, Robert Jr. and Zepha. there. [Black Books, 164,268,270] The decedent's daughter Eleanor was the wife of Samuel MAGRUDER (son of Samuel 1, 1654-1711). [Across the Years, p.538]

Mark WORNALL was taxed in Potowmack Hundred, PG Co, 1733 [Black Books, 273].

Elizabeth PERSON, probably Francis' widow, married Samuel WARNER, 1715, in Queen Anne's Parish; their two children baptised there 1717-19 [Par.Reg.]. Samuel died testate, PG Co, 1732 [MCW 6:213]. His widow, Elizabeth, m. 1733, David CONDAL, Queen Anne's Parish.

Edward FENIX (PHENIX) of PG Co, bought 150 ac. called "Cocholds Poynt", 1699. [PG Co. Land Records, vol.A, p.36/167] It was near Mount Calvert (Marlboro). He was involved in several court cases in PG Co, 1696-99 [Smith, Court Records of PG Co, Md, 1696-1699]. Edward PHENIX transported to Md. 1678 [Skordas, p.360].

Jonathan PRETHER, apparently Jane SMITH's first husband, immigrated to Md. in 1658 [Skordas, p.372]. Her second husband, John SMITH was maternal uncle of John BOWIE [Bowie, Across the Years, p.633ff.] Her apparent son George PRATER's will (1698) mentions his sister Jane MOLIKINE proving James MULLIKIN's children to be Jane SMITH's grandchildren. [MCW 2:150]

Thomas LAMARE and wife Mary were transported to Md. 1665 [Skordas, p.279]. Thomas LEMARR and wife Ann sold land in PG Co, 1701 [Deeds A:432]. Thomas LEMARR Jr. and John LEMARR are recorded in Queen Anne's Parish, 1713-14.

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Editor's Note: The following was contributed by Ruth E. Dungan taken from a notebook in her possession written by an ancestor Thomas R. Evans and dated November 11, 1913 at Plymouth, Pa.

I was born in a small farm house called Tan-y-graig, near Llanddarog, Carmarthenshire South Wales, G.B. on October 10th, 1842. Father and Mother moved from the farm when I was about 2 years old to Dowlais where he went to work in the coal mines. attended infant school between three and four years old. .... From seven until nine years old I worked in the Deep Pit as a Doorboy. On account of inflamed eyelids I left the mines and was sent to public school.

between 16 and When years old, Father moved his family to Cwm Bach near Aberdare, when I went into the mines a second time. 1865 I and a friend, Thomas Daniel to a preparatory school (in went Carmarthen). .... On March 13, 1866, we left Wales for Liverpooland on the 14th day of March we boarded the City of Baltimore of the Inman Line for the City of New York. We landed on the 29th day of March 1866. Afternoon of the same day we boarded a train in City for Reading Pottsville, Schuylkill Co. Pa.





# MINUTES OF THE PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, INC. 2 OCTOBER, 1985

The regular meeting of the Society was called to order 2 October, 1985, at 7:08 p.m. in the Greenbelt Library, Greenbelt, Maryland by the President, Cdr. Ed Wright.

First Vice-President Karen Miles introduced the evening's speaker, Mr. Frederick DeMarr. Mr. DeMarr is the Historian and past-president of the Prince George's County Historical Society Library. He discussed the history of the Historical Society, founded in 1954, and the holdings of their library, which currently consists of 4000 volumes, with emphasis on Maryland and Prince George's County. The library relocated in September of 1985 to the Marietta Mansion in Glen Dale, and expects to reopen near the end of October. The library is non-circulating, and decisions on their days and hours of operation as well as any "users-fees" have not been finalized.

Karen Miles suggested that using our Society library and the Historical Society Library in tandem could be extremely beneficial to researchers, considering their close proximity.

Education Chairperson Dorothy Rainwater announced the following:

- A workshop on Heraldry at the Peabody Library on 26 October. Robert Barnes will discuss the components of a coat-of-arms. The meeting begins at 10:00 a.m., with staff persons on hand to answer questions.
- Family History seminar on 16 November from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The topic will be "Salt Lake City Revisited", and is being held at the Quality Inn on York Road in Towson. Maryland.

Ivan Rainwater, the Society Archivist, noted that the library has purchased the 1983 supplement to the Filby indexes, and that members have contributed 63% toward the purchase price of the 1984 supplement. Both are in the Society library, which Ivan urged members to use on Wednesdays.

Bulletin editor Bill Cramer announced that 14 October is the deadline for materials for the November Bulletin.

Dorothy Haney, Second Vice-President, said that the Society has 29 new members year-to-date.

The list of members who expressed interest in forming a "Computer Interest Group" has been forwarded to Bill Cramer. The group will focus on general interest - it is not limited to specific hardware or software.

After a brief break and "show and tell", President Wright asked for corrections to the minutes of the September meeting. The minutes were approved as printed in the  $\mathit{Bulletin}$ . There were two corrections to an article on the front page of the October  $\mathit{Bulletin}$  - the meeting on computers was held 4 September, and the spelling of Dr. Andereck's name was corrected.

The speaker for the November meeting will be Donna Hotaling, speaking on Irish Research. The meeting adjourned at 8:45 p.m.



#### Profile of Our Membership

Of the approximate 400 (less libraries and exchange members) members of our Society about 230 live in the metropolitan area of Prince George's and Montgomery Counties, Northern Virginia and Washington, D. C. Most of these folks are researching families in other parts of the United States and in many cases in Europe and other parts of the globe. Less than 10% (more likely 3-5%) of these members have roots in Prince George's County. Thus, the "non-natives" account for over 50% of our roll and 90-95% of the attendance at meetings. Obviously our program chairperson has to consider the wide range of interests of our attending members and tailor a balanced schedule of speakers. This I believe we do especially well. Fortunately, being in a metropolitan area affords us the opportunity to call on a vast pool of persons well versed in specific methods and sources and scholars in related fields.

The other 45-50% of our membership live outside the area but have genealogical ties to Prince George's County. Their major, in most cases sole, link with the Society is through the monthly BULLETIN. In fact, their main purpose in joining was to receive the BULLETIN. Considering this, our editor concentrates on specific material on the County. To do this he relies chiefly on local persons to furnish P.G. material. This is especially difficult when you consider the relatively small per cent of P. G. genealogists who actually live here. Yet many persons in this area, many of whom have no Prince George's ties, do contribute to the BULLETIN and to our other publications. To them we owe much to our success in fulfilling many needs.

It is a peculiar arrangement, perhaps; yet it works remarkably well.

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
#### SEEKING HAGLUND DESCENDANTS

# PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY WILL BOOK 1, 1698-1770

Abstracted by Donald L. Wilson

(Continued from v. 17, no. 3 [November 1985], p. 39)

MCW = Maryland Calendar of Wills, by Jane Baldwin Cotton (8 v., 1906-1928)

Pages 76-77. [MCW 4:9] Will of Edward DIGGES of PG Co, being in perfect and sound health of mind and memory [no mention of body]. Date: 10 April 1714. To my B[rothe]r John DIGGES and to his heirs all that my plantation called "Barbadoes" also "Pangiah" [MCW: "Bangiah"] given me by my late deare mother Mrs. Eliz'a DIGGES. Item: To my sister Mary DIGGES the following Negroes vizt: Oaky and wife Betty and their sonn Billy, the Molatto wench Nelly, and Betty MASSEYs daughter, Sampson & wife, my watch and all the holland that I have now by me. Item: To my sister DARNALL the boy Michael. Item: To my B[rothe]r Notley ROZER and heirs my tract lying at the Eastern branch called "Elizabeths delight" cont'a 1000 acres more or less. Item: Whereas I have some time since sold my right to two tracts of land at the Easterne Shore unto Coll. William WHITTINGTON the one called "Ceaderneck" the other "Digges Point" w'ch I think are not yett suficiently made over I do hereby bequeath the sd two tracts to the sd. Wm. WHITTINGTON and heirs, and whereas allso I have very lately sold a tract in St. Marys County called "Denby" unto Mr. John SINNATT, that is to say my right & title into the sd land for wch I have received satisfaction but the land not being yet made over, I bequeath it to him. Whereas I have promised and agreed with Allexander HAMILTON for a tract in "Pangiah Manner" upon the head of Portabaco branch & received part in payment now the cert[ificate] of the survey being lost before it was return'd to the office I am oblig'd to have it runn out at my cost and pay for the pattent w'ch is to be made out in the sd HAMILTON's name w'ch upon his making paym[en]t of the remainder of the money I doe hereby impower my Execut'rs to procure at the charge of my estate and if the sd HAMILTON refuses or will not comply with the agreem[en]t then I empower my Execut'rs to sell sd tract & apply the produce towards the discharge of my debts &ca.

Item: To my nephews Henry NEALE & Charles NEALE my water mill at the head of Portobacco Creeke w'th the land and appurtenances, to them and heirs. Item: To every one of the Jesuite Priests that shall be in this province at the time of my death three pounds in money, allsoe to Mr. James HADDOCK Priest if in Maryland 20 shillings in money. Item: Whereas I've made purchase of a tract of land of Mr. Rich'd HARRISON lying in Prince George County upon Collington branch w'ch is to be paid for at three payments and being engaged unto Capt'n John HYDE Merch[an]t in London for the payment of some more, wherefore the better to enable my Execut'rs to comply w'th the sd Engagem[en]ts and make due payment of all my just debts & the legacys herein mentioned.

All the remaining part of my estateexcept what hereafter particularly excepted to be managed and order'd by my sd Ex'rs after the best manner for the raising of money to make the afores'd payments, and if all the sd just debts cannot be sooner complyd with that they keep the sd estate in their hands for that use for five years from my death, and at the end of said time to deliver sd. estate into the hands and possession and to the uses appointed by me. Item: I give power and authority to my execut'rs to sell a tract left me by Coll. Henry DARNALL lying in Cecil County cont'a. 1000 acres more or less with



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he had made over to him by the Ex'rs of Col'l Vincent LOWE. And half the produce I give to Mr. Thomas MANSELL priest, as soon as the same can be sold and the remainder to be for the discharge of my debt [page 77] and empower my sd Ex'rs to sell all that tract called "Brandford" cont'a about 1050 acres more or less lying upon Tuckahoe branch on the Eastern [Shore] and the produce to apply for the discharge of my debts. Item: My execut'r to pay off all the money that is due to the college at St. Omars for my B[rothe]r Dudleys schooling and accomodations. To Febry 1711, providing my sd B'r Dudley DIGGES, and his assignes doe not make any demands for any money, tobo, goods, cattle &ca as due to him for his part or share of my fathers estate or for any part of share or legacy due to him from my mothers estate, or makes any claims or demands due from me as ex'r of my sd Father or as Ex'r of my sd Mothers estate but does and will in all things and matters relating thereunto consent stand and abide by the setlem[en]t I have already made thereof. And upon that condition I doe hereby give unto my sd B'r if he returns into this province in three yeares and is not in holly [=holy] orders Negro George and his two sons, Sampson & his wife, and Kate Tom EYRES's daughter to be delivered him immediately upon his settling here and at the division of my estate. I give him upon the aflorelsd conditions an equal share with the rest of my B'rs.

Item: In consideration that I have desired my Br. Mr. Benjamin HALL to be one of my ex'rs. To gratifie him for his trouble therein I doe hereby give his sonn my cousin Francis HALL 50 acres of the land I lately bought of Mr. Richard HARRISON to be laid out for him next adjoining unto unto the land my sd B'r HALL now dwells upon, which I give unto my the said nephew Francis HALL when 21 years, and to his heirs. Item: If there now remains any right, title, claim or demand in me unto the lands, Negroes, stocks &ca bought by me of my Cosen Charles DYE I doe hereby transfer and give the same unto my B'r Wm. DIGGES and heirs, for whose use I bought them, he dischargeing those engagements I made with Cap. Jno. HYDE merch't in London upon that acct. Item: Remainder of personal estate to be equally divided by my ex'rs (by lott if it cant be otherwayes agreed) amongst my Brs. Charles DIGGES, Wm. DIGGES, John DIGGES and Dudley DIGGES (upon the conditions before mentioned), sister Mary DIGGES. And 1 share to be amongst my sister NEALEs children, that is to say one half of such share to my niece Mary and the other halfe amongst her brothers equally. Item: That tract which Coll. Henry DARNALL left me by will, one whereof he had of Nathan VEICH and the other of Peeter JOY & the remainder of that tract I bought of Mr. Richard HARRISON, he sold and the produce made into tenn equal parts, one part to my Br. Charles DIGGES, one to my Br. Willm DIGGES, to my Br. John DIGGES one part, one part to my sister Mary DIGGES, one part to my neice Mary WHARTON, one part to be equally divided amongst my sister NEALESs children, one part to my neice and god daughter Eliz'a ROZER. One part amongst the poore at the Discretion of my Executors, one part to Mr. Wm. HUNTER Priest and one part unto my Br. Robt. BROOKE Priest to be [by] them put to such pious uses as they shall think proper. Executor empowered to sell of sd. tracts for the aforesd intents and purposes. I appoint as executors my Br. Charles DIGGES, Wm. DIGGES, Henry DARNALL, Anthony NEALE & Benj'n HALL. Signed: Edward DIGGES. Wit: Clement BROOKE, Tho: BROOKE, Randall GARLAND (his mark: 0), Anthony HUDSON (his mark: 4W), John DeWITT (his mark: 4W).

April 19, 1714. Proved by oaths of Mr. Clement BROOKE & Anthony HUDSON & JOhn deWHITE. Before Benj; a BERRY Depty Comisy PG Co. Mr. Clement BROOKE one of the subscribing witnesses further deposes that testator declared this as his last will and testament. August 25, 1736 before D. DULANY, Comissry.

Well worth reading if you want your family history written to be used and enjoyed but do not wish to publish right away.

GENEALOGY TOMORROW, Vol. 2, #4, Apr. 1985. Wendy L. Elliott, C.G., has compiled a table of early U.S. migration patterns for the 13 original states plus Louisiana and Alabama.

ORANGE CO, CA GENSOC, Vol 22, #2, June 1985. "Tombstone Reading--Use a block of styrofoam to clean off lichen and soil on old tombstones. This will not damage the stone and leaves a certain amount of residue in the grooves, making the stone easier to read."

HOWARD CO, MD GENSOC, Issue #80, Apr. 1985. Patricia H. Rockwell advises that a certified courthouse record doesn't always mean that it is 100% correct. She points out that the clerks must deal with handwriting of many years ago; they often don't have time to spend on each request; and errors are often made in copying. Whenever possible, ask for a copy of the original record, or go to the courthouse when you can and ask to see the original. She also points out that often you are unable to see the original, even when available; it is at the discretion of the employees.

More warnings on Beatrice Bayley's and other family histories from our Exchanges. They sav, "Know what you are buying!" A new one is reported: Halbert's of Bath, OH, which is a chain letter type.



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# Book Reviews

THE ANCESTORS AND DESCENDANTS OF CHARLES JERNINGHAM QUEEN, PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY, MARYLAND, AND HIS WIFE, LILLIAN AGNES CLARK, SYRACUSE, NEW YORK, by Mary Elizabeth Jensen and Henry Jernigham Queen. 343pp. 1982. A gift of Henry Jerningham Queen.

The immigrant Queen ancestor appears to be Samuel Queen who married Katherine Marsham, a daughter of Richard Marsham and widow of Baker Brooke. The earliest record found for Samuel Queen was 3 August 1695 in the vestry minutes of All Faith's Church in Calvert County (now St. Mary's). The author has made use of original source documents which are footnoted and sometimes abstracted. This genealogy is a welcome addition to our material on early Prince George's County families.

THE ANCESTRY OF JAMES MARCH (1789-1859) by William D. Mountain. 213pp. 1985. A gift of the author.

Hugh March of "old" Newbury, Essex County, Massachusetts, the immigrant ancestor, was born about 1618 and came to New England in 1638 aboard the ship Confidence. When his service of indenture was over he moved to the Kittery-Old Eliot area of York County, Maine. His first wife, and the mother of his children, was Judith Knight. Material is also included for the families of Mountain, Stone, Brazee, Small and Libby. There are numerous maps showing places of residence and the book is indexed.

#### GENEALOGICAL COUNCIL OF MARYLAND

The Genealogical Council of Maryland was founded in 1976 to promote and coordinate genealogical activities in the state of Maryland. There are 21 member societies. The Council meets twice a year in a central location and the public is invited to attend. Bill Miller is the representative of our Society and is the Immediate Past Chairman of the Council.

The Council has undertaken several projects to promote the preservation and use of records of genealogical value in Maryland. One of these is to encourage and coordinate compilation of cemetery records. Working through local societies the information will be collected and eventually published as a guide to Maryland cemeteries and their records. The publication Stones and Bones and its continuing updating by Jean Sargent is our contribution to this effort. A second project is to gather the names and addresses of Maryland churches, temples and synagogues and survey their records. This information will eventually be published. Olive Jones is our representative in this effort and has been one of the most active contributors. A third project is the Maryland Bible Survey. This committee is working with local societies to locate and copy the genealogical records contained in old family Bibles. More information on these and other activities may be obtained from Bill Miller, our reprsentative.

#### HAPPY NEW YEAR!

Many of our genealogical societies are bee hives of activity. Unlike other societies, most of our members are actively involved, either in their own genealogical projects or society related projects. Many, many persons are engaged in compiling material for publication.

Unfortunately the quality varies greatly. Some folks are copying other secondary material without even a citation and sometimes without the least qualification as to the strength of the evidence in establishing relationships. Many of us take compiled lists as the absolute fact without checking the primary source. Frequently we fail to recognize that a document which may be very old can itself be a copy.

With the continual growth of published material comes a greater potential for knowledge and skill. This will come about as long as attention is given to maintaining high standards. However we must work to improve quality. Many of us are self-made scholars, having attained our skills through our own curiosity and perseverance and not through a certification procedure or formal instruction and examination. There are a few periodicals that exemplify many accepted standards of excellence and one would do well to emulate their many fine articles. In addition, societies such as ours, must accept some of the responsibility of recognizing and promoting specific standards.

The meeting of the computer group was well attended with everyone participating. I think we all learned a great deal. Next meeting on January 13th in the Greenbelt Library.

#### COMPUTER GROUP MEETS

The first meeting of the Computer Users Group from the PGCGS was held on 26 November at the Greenbelt Library. It was called to order by the Chairman, pro tem., Ed Wright, President of the Society. Eighteen persons attended.

Those attending were at all levels of computer knowledge from computer professionals through the moderately experienced to beginners. Each person had an opportunity to discuss the type of hardware and software used and his/her experiences with it. It was found that a wide variety of computers were represented and software included various commercial programs and a program specifically designed for the individual's use.

There were two main questions that concerned almost everyone, viz., "Is it worth the time and effort to put all of one's data on the computer? and, if so, "What is a good program? Some of the commercial programs discussed were Family Roots, Family Reunion, Family Roots M, and the Latter Day Saints Program. Discussions by participants of their experiences with various programs were particularly illuminating.

The next meeting of the group will be on Monday, 13 January, at 7 p.m. at the Greenbelt Library. Loren Buchanan, a professional computer scientist and a member of the group, will discuss "lap" computers. There will be a computer demonstration using  $\underline{Family}$  Roots and other topics will be discussed. Interested persons are urged to attend whether you own a computer or not. #### THE AGRICULTURAL SCHEDULES OF U.S.CENSUSES

Some genealogists may not be aware of the usefulness of the Agricultural Schedules of the U.S. Censuses for 1850 to 1880. The information in these schedules can be very helpful in filling gaps in your genealogy and giving some human interest to your ancestors

For the year ending 1 June of the above named census years, those farms having annual produce over a specified amount, and for some years, a specified minimum acreage were enumerated giving the name of the owner, agent or tenant and the kind and value of acreage, machinery, livestock, and produce. For the years 1850 and 1860 the minimum annual produce was \$100 and for 1870 and 1880 the minimum was \$500. For 1870 and 1880 three acres was the minimum.

Forty-six items are listed in the schedule. In items 2 through 5 information was requested on acres of land improved, unimproved, cash value of the farm, value of farming implements and machinery. Items 6 through 13 related to livestock requesting number of milch cows, working oxen, other cattle, horses, sheep, swine, and mules. Items 14 through 44 list almost every conceivable farm produce ranging from tobacco, the staple of the southern Maryland region at that time, to such exotic products as silk cocoons.

These schedules for the various states seem to be rather haphazardly distributed. A set of the Maryland schedules is available at the Maryland State Law Library, Court of Appeals Building, 361 Rowe Boulevard, Annapolis.

The Genealogical Periodical Annual Index, or GPAI, is a comprehensive index to articles in over 150 genealogical periodicals. It indexes surnames, locality information, topical information and book reviews that appeared in periodicals. To be included in this index, publishers must contribute copies of their periodical. Each year's guide provides a quick reference tool to much information that would be difficult to obtain otherwise. References in the GPAI can then be located at a library or back issues can be purchased from the periodical's publisher. This is a reference tool all libraries will want to obtain.

# Book Reviews

By Shirley Langdon Wilcox, C.G.

A New Index, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania Before the Federal Census, Vol. 4 by Gary T. Hawbaker and Clyde L. Groff. 1985. 76pp + 37pp. A gift of Karen Miles.

The contents of this book are explained in a subtitle which reads, "Index to the 1718-1726 Tax Records of Chester County Relating to Areas Later Part of Lancaster County". There are four sections to this book with the longest section being the first which is an alphabetical listing of taxpayers taken from tax lists at the Chester County Archives. This computer printout shows the name of the person, the date of the tax list and the place and sometimes comments. All original spellings were kept so it is important to check variant spellings. Section two contains notes on persons or places and section three has added information that would not fit on the computer format. The final section is an indexed version of tax lists that have already appeared in print. Taken together, these lists are a valuable tool for those searching early Lancaster County families.

Reep Family Bibliography for the Reep Family Association compiled by James W. Reep, C.G.R.S. and Reynold F. Reep. 1985. 186pp. A gift of James W. Reep.

This bibliography serves as an index to published material containing references to the Reep surname and its spelling variations. The book is divided into a number of sections with citations to the author, title, date of publication, Library of Congress call number, and other identifying data. Following this is a notation showing what Reep family members are shown. All names are indexed for easy use. This should be of great help for those searching the Reep surname.

Eldred E. Brown, His American Ancestors, Descendants and Siblings, And Thirty-Two Allied Families compiled by Edwin H. Brown. 1985. 168pp. A gift of the author.

As explained by the title, this book traces the ancestry of Eldred E. Brown. The Brown family is an old Maryland family with roots in Prince George's County. A number of the allied families covered in this book were also from Maryland. For the benefit of those with Maryland interests, we list the families of Maryland lineage: Boyd, Brashear, Briscoe, Calvert, Compton, Davenport, Dent, Goe, Grable/Crable, Higton, Hollingsworth, Howard, Jones, Semmes, Swann, Turner, Vaneman and Williamson. Although citations are not made to individual references, a list of those references used is found at the end of each surname section. All names have been indexed.



## EXTRACTS FROM GENEALOGICAL EXCHANGES...By Pricia Burk Paulkovich

HOWARD CO, MD GENSOC #83, Sept. 1985. Always take photos of important tombstones for future reference. Next time you want to check the cemetery, the memorial stone may have been destroyed or damaged. To improve the legibility and quality, have one person highlight the lettering by shining a flashlight on the stone from a side angle. Take the picture straight-on, without a flash.

PFA RIVER HISTORICAL and GENSOC, Enterprise, Al, Vol 11, #1, fall 1985. More on searching cemeteries. This issue also has article on wills in Colonial Virginia. Remember that in Oct. 1770, "entail" was abolished—the pre-determined line of descent through which succession of an estate followed. Jan. 1, 1786, the English system of "primo-geniture" of the land ceased—the eldest son was no longer THE heir-at-law. Under the old English law, a will did not have to name the wife or the eldest son as their inheritance was guaranteed. Under this law it was possible that a will may not have named someone whom you know to have been a widow or son of a deceased person.

SANTA MARIA VALLEY GENSOC, CA. Vol XVII, #1 & 2, 1985. Gives an account of some of the lectures at the National Genealogical Society Conference in Salt Lake City, Aug. 1985. One lecture on "Time Management in Genealogical Research" by James B. Carter advises us to keep a calendar and write down goals, long and short as well as to list priorities. Avoid time wasters such as those bad habits of losing items, preoccupation, procrastination, and yes, messy desks. William Hartley's lecture on "Researching, Writing and Publishing Family Histories" said to allow at least a year to write a book. Include some humor; include favorite stories that were told and retold. Do not manufacture stories.

INDIANA HISTORICAL SOCIETY publication Genealogy, #95, Aug. 1985. Indiana is transcribing their 1860 census. The family history section of the Historical Society plans to publish an every-name index but the project will not be completed before late 1987. Illinois started a state-wide index of all marriages in the state from statehood through 1900. When finished, the listing will include approximately 2 million names. The project, begun February 1985, will take at least five years to complete.

FEDERATION OF GENEALOGICAL SOCIETIES NWSLTR, Vol 9, \$3 1985. Wm. E. Miller, Assoc Editor, FGS Director, reports that the Genealogical Assn. of Sacramento, CA, has begun extracting vital records from the Sacramento Bee, 1857-1903. Publication is planned when enough material for a book has been compiled. Already finished: 1857, 1859, 1863, 1872, 1873, 1878, 1880-82, 1884, 1891, 1892, 1900. In the early years, California newspapers carried vital records not only from the local region, but for much of the nation. You may write for data already compiled by sending \$2 for each surname to the Genealogical Association, P. O. Box 28301, Sacramento, CA 95828.

MCW = Maryland Calendar of Wills, by Jane Baldwin Cotton (8 v., 1906-1928)

Page 78. [MCW 4:11] Will of James MUSSELBROOK [MCW: MUSSLEBROOK] of PG Co, being very sick and weak in body. Date: Thirtieth April 1714 [MCW: 13th Apr.]. Imprimis: To my beloved friend George NATLER Junier and his daughter Martha all my good[s], chattels and debts [sic], to be equally divided between them. I appoint said George NATLER my sole executor. Signed: James (mark: E) MUSSLEBROOK. Wit: John ADAMS, Peter (A) BRICHTWELL, Thomas (T) ELLET. Proved 29 May 1714 by oaths of the three witnesses, John ADAMS, Peter BRIGHTWELL, and Thomas ELLETT. [John ADAMS not mentioned in MCW.] Before Benja. BERRY, Depty Comisy PC Co.

Pages 78-79. [MCW 4:17] Will of Edward BROCK of PG Co, planter, weak and indisposed in body. Date: "five and day of March" in the tenth year of the reign of Oueen Anne. [MCW: 5 March  $\overline{1712}$ . If the "and" is not an error, 25 March was probably intended. Queen Anne's tenth year extended from 8 March  $17\overline{10}/11$  to 7 March 1711/12.] Item: To my grand daughter Mary NICHOLLS and heirs of her body all that parcell (being part of "Brock Hall") which lies on the east side of a branch called Collington in county aforesaid. Item: To my grandson Matthew MOGBEE and heirs of his body 100 acres (other part of "Brock Hall" afsd.) lying on west side of Collington, said 100 acres to begin at the white oak ye North Northwest [sic] corner tree of "Brock Hall", to run thence till it intercepts ye East NorthEast line of "Brock Hall" such a course as will containe ye sd. quantity of land and no more. Item: To my grandson Brock MOCKBEE and heirs forever my plantation I now live on and all the land thereto adjoyning lying in the south side of the back Branch and bounding eastward on the land before bequeathed to his brother Matthew. If my sd. grandaughter Mary NICHOLLS should dye without heirs of her body, her share shall go to her brother Matthew and his heirs, and if Mathew shall dye without hres. then his share (with what he may have inherited from his sister) to go to my grandson Brock and hres. forever. If all dye without issue, then all the land mentioned herein shall fall to my grandchildren by my daughter OFFET or to such of them as shall be then surviving and their heirs, to be divided equally between them.

Item: To my grandsons Edward William James & Thomas OFFET and my daughter Mary his wife [sic, some words have dropped out. MCW calls Edward, William, James and Thos. OFFETT sons of William OFFETT and daughter Mary his wife] and to their heirs forever all the remaining part of my said tract called "Brockhall" lying on the north side of the back branch afsd. to be equally divided among them & on the death of anyone or more of the sd. sons of my daughter [page 79] OFFET my will is that the portion shall go to my other grandson John OFFET and his heirs, and in case of his decease without hres. as afsd. to be divided equally among his surviving brethren herein before named. All my grandsons afsd. shall be capable to enter upon & hold the severall parcells at age 21 and not before.

Lastly, my Nigroes, stock of Cattle & Hoggs & all my personall estate to be continued & kept upon the plantation for the carrying on & improvement of the same (without waste of the land or timber) under the management of my Executors hereafter named for the benefit & education of my two grandsons Mathew & Brock MOCKBEE



till they arrive at their several ages of 21, and then to be equally divided between them. I appoynt Wm. OFFET my son-in-law to be my full and sole executor. I also appoynt my loveing friends Alexander BEALL & John GERARD to be overseers of this will, to see that it si performed. NICHOLLS & his wife being the next of kindred. Signed: Wm. OFFETT. 19 June 1714. Wit: Joseph (±) STORRY, Phill. GETTING Junr. Acknowledged same day before Benja. BERRY, Depty Commissy Prc Georges County. To the Honble Wm. BLADEN Esqr, Commissy Generall. [This relinquishment was omitted in MCW.]

Pages 79-80. [MCW 4:27] [Will of Richard BUTT. Lacks a preamble.] Date: 9 Jan. 1714/15. [MCW shows no date.] First and fourmost I committ my soule to almighty God ... Secondly I committ my bodie to the Earth ... and my world debts first be full satisfied and paid. Thirdly: To my eldest son Richard BUTT the half of my land which is abought [about] 103 acres, to him and heirs of his bodie. Fourthly to my son Thomas BUTT the other half of my land, to be eqolly deviad [divided] between them bouth. If either son should dev before tha [they] begat issue than the land shall fall to the nackest [next] ear [heir] and never to be sold nor changed nor Imbaselad [embezzled] away on any account, but to go from heire to heir during life after his deare and loveing Mothers decease. Fifth lyign [Fifthly I give? Clerk apparently had trouble making out the words.] the rast of my goods and Money and oll my parson [personal] isstaght [estate] to be devided betwen the other four children Dinah BUTT, Mary BUTT, Samuel BUTT, Nickolas BUTT. Seckestly [Sixthly] my will and plashar [pleasure] is that my dear and loveing wife sholl be the holle and chef eacksackettar [sic] of my holl parsonatal Isstaght [sic!]. Sind [signed] seld [sealed] and Deleuerd [delivered] in the prasants [presence] of us: Jno. BANKS, John CHILD, Samuell SWEARINGEN. Signed: Richard (R) BUTT. [Note: This will has some excellent clues for the origin of its writer, based on the dialect it records. Since the testator made his mark, it probably represents the writing of one of the witnesses, perhaps John BANKS.]

Page 80. April 28, 1715. Proved by oaths of John BANCKS, John CHILD & Samuell SWEARINGEN. Jurat Cor me: W. BLADEN Comissy Genl. Memor[andum]: the Exex sworn. Take Mr. Thomas SWERINGEN & Mr. Thos. BANCKS for Bondsmen, 300 & Sterl'g. appraisers Mr. Saml. DUVALL & Charles WALKER.

Page 80. [MCW 4:41] Will of Joseph GREEAR [MCW: GREAR] of PG Co, being very sick & weak. Date: 8 Aug. 1715. To be decently buried in Christian buriall after the Custom & rites of the Church of England. To my well beloved wife a third part of all my reall & personall estate, she to be my sole executrix. After my wife's decease my plantation and all my land to be equally divided between my six sons prohibiting them to sell their part to anybody whatsomever same only from one to the other. Item: the rest of my moveable estate to be equally divided between my five sons and my two daughters (viz.) between Josep,



Benjamin, James, Henry and Annanias, my son John having already rec'd and possed his part save only a sow & piggs I give him [daughters not named], and if any one of my children dyes before they possess their estate theire part to be equally devided between the next, and the land possess it or not if they dye without issue to bedivided between the rest desireing it may be fullfilled according to the trace intent & meaning herof [hereof]. In case either Moses or Aron should dye befroe age 21, the survivor to have the whole. In case both Moses and Aron dye before age 21, then son John ORME to have the whole 200 acres [This provision is not mentioned Item: When Moses ORME arrive to 21 years he shall have priviledge to take off of the western part of said land 5000 fence loggs provided he neither spoil or waste any timber on same.

Item: Moses and Aron shall live in the house & plantation whereon I now dwell until Aron shall arrive to age 21 years, and that their sister Sarah TANYHILL and her son John TANYHILL shall live along with them as long as she pleaseth, and they shall all be maintained reasonably in provision out of my stock of cattle & hoggs untill my executors shall make up an account with the Commissary and after my debts being paid my will is that my stock of cattle & hoggs shall be equally divided between my four children Robert, John, Moses, Aron & my daughters Sarah son [daughter Sarah's son] John TANYHILL, his mother looking after the same and to be maintained by the work of the hands that shall labour on the plantation, and if the child John TANYHILL should dye his mother to have his part at her owne disposall & all their encrease, to them and their heires.

#### NOTES:

Have not found any other reference to any MUSSLEBROOK in my cursory examination of published Maryland records. None listed among the taxables of PG Co. in 1719 or 1733 [Black Books]. Is not an immigrant recorded in Maryland patents 1633-80 [Skordas, Early Settlers of Maryland], so probably came after 1680. Not found in PG Co. court minutes 1696-99 nor in land records 1696-1702. George NAYLOR was taxed in Mattapeny Hundred 1719. That area's early church registers (St. Paul's Parish) are lost. George NAYLOR and Peter BRIGHTWELL are both in lower precinct of Mattapany Hundred, 1733.

Ed. BROCK patented "Brock Hall" (then in Calvert Co.) in 1672. He is not listed in Skordas, but a Richard BROCK is shown as arriving as a servant in the 1630s who may be his father. Some information about MOCKBY and NICHOLLS descendants of Edward BROCK can be found in Effie Bowie, Across the Years in PG Co., p. 640-641. Edward BROCK witnessed wills in Calvert Co. in 1676 and 1681 (see MCW 1:106,189). Brock MOCKBY's family is recorded in Queen Anne's Parish 1715-1732; he is in Collington Hundred 1719 and 1733. His brother Mathew is not found. A Matthew MACKBEE/MOCKEBOY/MACCUBY etc. lived in that region of PG Co. 1696-1700 and may be their father [PG Court records, Deeds A:345]. William OFFUTT was in West Branch Hundred 1719 and 1733; his will 1734, PG Co. William NICHOLLS was in Patuxent Hundred 1719, Collington Hundred 1733.

Richard BUTT of Anm Arundel Co, bought "Batchelors Delight" in PG, 1700 [Deeds A:349]. No earlier record found. His land was on Collington Branch. Children of Richard and Mary BUTT recorded in Queen Anne's Parish: Richard 1703, Thomas 1705, Diana 1708, Mary 1710, Samuel 1712, Nicholas 1714. Nicholas, Richard and Samuell BUTT taxed in Collin[gton] Hundred 1733. Thomas BUTT was in New Scotland Hundred that year.

In 1696, Joseph GREERE and Thomas PAGGETT divided lands they owned jointly in PG Co, with Sarah wife of Joseph acknowledging. [Deeds A:58] Joseph GREER was constable for Mattapony Hundred, 1696. He served as administrator for Benjamin GREER, deceased [his father?] in 1697 [Court records]. Joseph GREARE witnessed will of Ruth HIDE, Calvert Co, 1694. Not found in Skordas. Of his sons, Annias, James and William GRIER are in Mattapany Hundred, 1733. James and John GREER are in Baltimore Co, 1739 [Black Books].

Robert ORME of A.A. Co, planter, bought part of "Brooke fields", PG Co, 1694 [Deeds A:32]. He bought "Dumbar" in 1700. Robert ORME transported to Maryland in 1673 [Skordas, p.343]. Listed as a legatee of Richard JAMES, A.A.Co, 1684. Was executor of Deborrer Kennerson, PG Co, 1703. Lived in St. Paul's Parish.

The following submission by Mrs. McCall emphasizing her Dent line in Maryland and Missouri included a newspaper clipping dated September 5, 1957 from the The Salem News of Salem, Missouri on "The Dent Family Tree." The history of this family in America began in 1650 with the arrival of Thomas Dent from England. His great grandson, Walter Dent (No. 32), served in the Revolutionary War and both Walter's son, Mark (No. 16), and grandson, Lewis (No. 8), went West, Mark in 1803 and Lewis (who had remained with relatives in Virginia) in 1832. Lewis settled in what later became Dent County (named after him), Missouri. The newspaper clipping gives an interesting account of Lewis's activities in this frontier country and also a detailed genealogy of the descendants of Lewis and Eliza Sims Dent (up to the date of the article). #### Church Records

"The story is told of the old cowboy who visited the Grand Canyon for the first time. He is reported tying his horse to a tree then sauntering out to the ledge to look down into the canyon. 'Ah took one look,' he said, "and then ah wished ah'd tied m'self to the tree and let the horse look down into the Canyon." That is about the way American church records affect many researchers." - from The Researcher's Guide to American Genealogy by Val D. Greenwood.

As Mr. Greenwood later points out, there is also a major difference in the comparison of Grand Canyon and church records - many church records are difficult to locate. Hopefully the Church records project of the Maryland Genealogical Council, of which our society is a contributing member, is well underway in documenting the location of many Maryland church records. The Genealogical Council plans to publish soon the results of their search.

Some of us may presume that Maryland Archives (Hall of Records) has most of the early church records. This is true for many colonial church records. However I know that not all of the pre-1800 records are held by the State Archives. For example there are many Lutheran and Reformed Church records of Frederick and Washington Counties, held by the Maryland Historical Society that are not held by the State Archives. The later records of many denominations remain scattered throughout the state. There are many 19th century Methodist records in private hands, bank vaults, etc.

Fortunately transcriptions have been made by individuals and in some cases published. One should be very careful in using them. You will note many differences when comparing the transcripts done by different persons and with your interpretation of the original.

Church records are frequently copies of copies. First the minister may have recorded the event on a piece of paper. For example children were frequently baptised by ministers at home or locations other than the church and the name recorded on scraps of paper, recorded in the church register later, sometimes from the minister's notes and sometimes from memory. Because of deterioration, these registers were sometimes re-recorded, the fact of the re-recording not always evident.

Many persons assume that their ancestors remained in the same denomination over a long period of time. However I find that persons in early America sometimes attended one of the nearby churches of other denominations. Witness the English of Frederick County attending German churches and



vice-versa. There were many Quakers of Maryland who  $\,$  became Methodists and Baptists.

Good luck as you tour through the Grand Canyon of church records. But don't stand too near the edge.

In addition there family files containing some 125 Those who think they have Calvert County ancestors may write or call Mrs. Rose to see if she has a file on your family. The library will welcome genealogical material on early families of Calvert County.

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#### JANE McCAFFTERY HONORED

In November 1985 the Gallia County Genealogical Society of Gallipolis. Ohio (south central Ohio at the West Virginia border) published a 77-page book on REVOLUTIONARY WAR SOLDIERS WHO LIVED IN GALLIA COUNTY, OHIO, The book was dedicated to former PGCGS member Jane Roush McCafferty, C.G. and Maxine Northrup of the Gallia County Genealogical Society, both now deceased, who did most of research work for this publication. Jane did her research at the National and DAR Library Washington, D.C. and Maxine did her research in southern Ohio. After Jane's death on 28 October 1984 and Maxine's on 4 May 1985, there was some doubt that the book would be published. However, Henrietta C. Evans and Mary P. Wood undertook the editing and have produced a valuable resource document which is a fitting memorial to the work of Jane and Maxine.

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## Book Reviews

Maryland Militia, War of 1812, Volume 6, Prince George's County by F. Edward Wright. Family Line Publications. 1985. A gift of the author. Order copies from Family Line Publications, 13405 Collingwood Terrace, Silver Spring, MD 20904.

We are happy to see that the latest volume in Cdr. Wright's series of Maryland Militia Records is one on Prince George's County. Prince George's County men served in the Fourth Brigade in the 14th, 17th and 34th regiments and in the 2nd cavalry district. The abstracts in this volume are taken from muster, pay and receipt rolls and bounty land and pension files at the National Archives. All names have been indexed, making this a very easy publication to use. We are grateful to Cdr. Wright in making this material available in print.

Sedan (Union County) New Mexico by Regina Joyce Christerson Smith. Nortex Press. 1977. 247pp. A gift of Evelyn Dodd Conley.

Sedan is the author's home town and she has gathered records from various sources for use in this book. Among those included are notices from old newspapers, school records, records from the United Brethren Church (which was for many years the only church at Sedan), marriage records, cemetery records, tax lists and land records. The largest section contains biographical sketches of local families, including a number of photographs. The biographical sketces are in alphabetical order, but unfortunately there is no index to the valuable information found in this book.

The Lackor Family by Mary (McCall) Middleton. Shenandoah Publishing House, Inc. 1970. 205pp. A gift of the American Society of Genealogists.

This book won the first award in a contest sponsored by The American Society of Genealogists for excellence in genealogical arrangement, proper citation of sources, thoughtful evaluation of the evidence, and careful research. So in addition to being of interest to those searching the Lackor surname, it should be of interest to genealogists planning to publish their own family research. Careful study of the citations and format should help future researchers improve the quality of their manuscripts. The book is completely indexed and we are happy to add it to our collection.

Directory of Maryland State Society Daughters of the American Revolution and Their Revolutionary Ancestors, 1892-1965, compiled by Minnie Naugle Motsinger, State Registrar. 1966. 785pp. A gift of Belle Air Chapter, NSDAR.

This volume contains an alphabetical listing of all revolutionary soldiers from whom Maryland Daughters claimed descent between 1892 and 1965. When known dates and places of birth and death are given as well as name of spouse, type and place of service and a listing of children, their birthdate and spouse. This book can be a very valuable tool when working on ancestors who lived during this time period.

And to each of my sd two sons I give a chest. Item: My two sons Matthew & Richard shall be at age to work for themselves at Eigh[t]een years & to remain with my wife till yt age if they are willing. Lastly, all remaining part of my estate to be equally divided between my children, namely Matthew ROB[SON], Richard ROBSON, John ROBSON, & my Daughter Mary ROBSON, giving to my son John besides the calf of the cow May & to my Daughter Mary ye sealskin trunk. I leave my true & faithfull friend John TURNER Senr. my full whole & sole Executor. Signed: Richard (R) ROBSON. Wit: Richard DUCKETT, Ambrose (AB) BOURN, Grace (つつ) WHEELER.

Proved 15 Decr. 171[: hidden in book's gutter. MCW: 1716], by oaths of Richard DUCKETT and Ambrose BOURN. Before Patrick HEPBURN, Depty Comissry, PG Co.

NOTES: No earlier record found yet of this John WILLCOXEN. In 1719 John WILLCOXEN (his son) was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred, along with an unidentified Josua WILLCOXSON. Also there was a William GARVISE [Calendar of Md. State Papers: the Black Books, 164]. William JERVIS in his will 1719, PG Co, names wife Magdalen and her son William WILCOXON (MCW 5:5). In 1733, William WILLCOXON (probably b. 1712, after his father's will was written) and Thomas WILCOXON were in Upper Piscattaway Hundred [Black Books, 268], while John WILCOXON was in Potowmack Hundred [ibid., 273] and Lewis WILCOXON was in New Scotland Hundred [ibid., 275].

Court records of PG Co, June 1697, show that Abigall CLIFFORD bound her child, called Edward RISTON, age 3, to Peter SCAMPER until age 21 [A:170]. Peter SCAMPER bought 200 acres west of Patuxent River from Richard EDWARD, 1697 [PG Land Records A:133]. Edward RESTING m. Mary CHAFFEY, March 18, 1715/6 [Queen Anne's Par. Reg.]. In 1733, Edward RISTON was taxed in Western Branch Hundred [Black Books, 263].

John LANE has not been identified in other published PG records. He probably lived in Western Branch Hundred (Queen Anne's Parish).

Richard and Martha ROBSON's children: Mathew 1702, Ann 1704, Richard 1708. Richard and Elizabeth had: John 1712, Mary 1714. Also a William ROBINSON, son of Richard and Elizabeth, b. Jan. 27, 1716 [1717] [Queen Anne's Par.] Mathew, Richard, and William ROBINSON found in PG Co, 1733, but no ROBSON [Black Books, 271,274,269].

Story of historic cane owned by Mark E. Cheney - son of Seth and grandson of my greatgrandfather Ebenezer, hence second cousin of Stella M. Cheney Lincoln.

Cane is of jointless bamboo material, dark mahogany color with highly carved mahogany head. The cane accompanied its owner, William Cheney, (who was born in 1602) from Sheerness, Isle of Sheppy Eng.

Mr. Cheney, wife and four children, sailed in ship Defiance, Aug. 1, 1634. Besides William Cheney, wife Margaret and four children, was his brother John and family and a single brother, and the indian missionary, Joseph Elliott. After 10 weeks they landed in Boston, a place of 700 inhabitants, gov. Bradford being colonial gov. nearly all dwelling in log cabins.

The land being taken up, in and around Boston he crossed the river and staked out 60 acres in the woods of Roxbury. This farm was located at the junction of the present Dudley and Warren streets, now covered with magnificent business buildings. Their family consisted of two sons and two daughters, sons names William and Thomas. William was the ancester of Nelson of Poland and Ebenezer and Seth of Keantons (?) N.Y.



Ebenizer came to Jamestown N.Y. in \_\_\_\_\_ and purchased 160 acres of land. In 1650 William Cheney and wife Margaret removed to Boston located on Tremont St. having 3 acres in his own (?) yard, he also had 100 acres back in the country where Columbia ave. is at present in the heart of the city. He was a decon in the old South church and selectman of the town. He died in Oct. 1666, and was buried in Park St. church yard called granary graveyard, where he still lies, with his wife in the heart of the great city. The cane was handed down from this William the first to William the 2nd the 3rd and then to the William the 4th father of Ebenizer, my great great grandfather born July 10, 1741 - who fought in the French & Indian War - was at Ticonderoga and with gen. Wolf at the taking of Quebec - his son Ebenezer my great grandfather was a Rev. soldier.

In 1764 Ebenizer 1st moved from Mendon (?) Mass - where the family had been 100 ys to North Orange about 110 (could be 100) miles northwest in the wilderness, where he took 320 acres covered with dense forest. Here he reared his family of 12 sons and 10 daughters, all of whom grew to maturity and raised families. He had a large tub, pail and barrell factory employing besides his twelve sons, many other persons, using the white cedar, a very diesable (desirable) wood for that purpose. Linen was spun from flax, and a flock of sheep furnished the wool, with which the large family clothed themselves.



### SOME GENEALOGICAL NOTES ON THE HARPER FAMILY OF PG COUNTY

An article in a 1927 issue of a periodical called *The Researcher* [Vol. 2:102-4] contains hints as to the origins of Robert W. Harper of Prince George's Co., MD. He is shown as a nephew of James Harper, Lieut. and Brig. Quartermaster of the Revolutionary Army. James Harper was of Norfolk, VA and left a will dated 27 Feb. 1799 leaving bequests to his wife Ann Harper and his brother John Harper of Alexandria. James left no children. His brother John Harper of Alexandria, VA left children Robert W., James, and Elizabeth. Robert W. Harper m. Sarah and lived in Prince George's Co., MD., James Harper m. Ellen and lived in Ann Arundel Co., MD and Elizabeth m. Thomas K. Beall, lived in Alexandria and died ca. 1843 leaving seven children: Elizabeth McRea, wife of James McReas, William E. Beale, Julia Bassett, Mary A. Harris, Robert H. Beale, Ann C. Gibson and John H. Beale.

The father of James Harper, Revolutionary soldier, and John Harper of Alexandria, is not given, but one deposition given to support heirship to a bounty land claim, showed that James Harper was born and raised in the Town of Alexandria. Copies of this article have been given to our Registrar.

Irene D'Amato reported that the 28 January meeting of the computer interest group elected a president and secretary, and was attended by 13 people.

Jim Reep offered to make arrangements to copy pictures for anyone who missed the January meeting. Ed Wright mentioned that the 1860 Census of Sussex County is available through him.

After a short break, a panel consisting of Milton Rubincam, Freeman Morgan, Shirley Wilcox, and Donald Wilson answered questions from the members on general and specific genealogical topics.

The meeting adjourned at 9:00 p.m., and was attended by 64 people.

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
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### ROSS TALKS ON ORAL HISTORY

The 5 March meeting of the Society heard a talk by Professor Martha Ross on Oral History. Professor Ross, who teaches a course on Oral History at the University of Maryland, defines Ora1 History as follows: "ORAL HISTORY is a technique for generating and preserving original, historically interesting information from personal recollections bу means tape-recorded interviews." Although oral history is a broad term it has a application important genealogy. (For example, the beginner is usually directed to interview family members introduction to genealogy.)

The ability to achieve the maximum from these interviews requires an understanding and masterv techniques which the average genealogist usually does not have and perhaps is not even aware of this lack. Professor Ross points out that "The oral history interviewer should strive to create a situation in which the interviewee is able to reflect widely, to recall fully, and to associate freely on the subject of the interview, and to maintain an atmosphere in which the interviewee is willing to articulate fully those recollections.'

Information on the national organization concerned with oral history (OHA) may be obtained from The Oral History Association, P.O. Box 13734, N.T. Station, Denton, TX 76203. An organization for the Mid-Atlantic region (OHMAR) can be

contacted through its President at Box 266, College Park, MD 20740. These organizations sponsor workshops and colloquia, promote standards of quality among practitioners, and assist those interested in learning more about the field.



### PROGRAM ON SWEDES, FINNS, AND DUTCH

Our guest speaker at the April 2nd meeting will be Mr. Peter S. Craig of Washington, D.C. He will enlighten us on the Swedes, Finns, and Dutch that settled on the Delaware River prior to the arrival of the Quakers, 1638-1675. These early settlers of the greater Delaware River area eventually moved westward into Maryland.

### Lists of Names

An old axiom says that, you are known by the company you keep. - Sometimes that applies to lists of names found in public and church records. Lists of names such as found in petitions, oaths of allegiance, and militia rolls, imply a common bond or interest.

Other lists may only note the existence of a person and sometimes his family. That in itself can be important as well as the proximity of other names. For example in the 1776 Census of Prince George's County is the family of John Norton, Sr. Three families further down the list you find Rev. Thomas Sparks. When we pick up the Nortons again in Pittsylvania County, Virginia, a few years later, we find a Thomas Sparks and his wife in the land records of the same county, on an adjoining farm to the Nortons. research shows that a son of the Nortons has married a daughter of Rev. Thomas, who was also the officiating (The 1776 census of PG County is especially minister. helpful in that the ages of members of the household are given.) After reviewing the 1776 census several more times I found a second Sparks family which seems to have moved at the same time.

Other lists found in Maryland records:

- 1. Levy books show payments. Persons received money as bounty for killing squirrels, crows and wolves. Many names are listed in the early 18th century court records, receiving this bounty money. (In these same records you may find fines for felonies, such as swearing an oath or curse.)
- 2. Tax lists Prior to the Revolution, in PG County, we have the tax lists for 1719 and 1733. The 1733 indicates the owner of the property, the names of free males over 16 and the number of servants and slaves. Of course many of the males are sons of the landowner. The 1783 tax list for PG has not survived; the 1798 direct tax list is available.
- 3. Colonial Militia lists names and rank, little else.
- 4. Contributors to the sufferers of the 1760 Boston fire. Many persons in Maryland made donations through their church. Some lists of contributors have survived.
- 5. Pew holders found in Episcopal Vestry Proceedings, communicants, etc. found in church proceedings, sessionals, minutes, etc. Removals found in Quaker records.
- 6. Cattle marks, uses to identify the owner of the catttle, fowl, horses, etc.; these are found in county court records. Many persons also recorded gifts of cattle to their children, grandchildren and in-laws.
- 7. Overseers of roads.

And there are many other lists. In Queen Anne's County there is a list of persons paid to count tobacco plants in 1729.



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Here's to lists. They can be helpful.

## Book Reviews

By Shirley Langdon Wilcox, C.G.

The Head Family According to Vital Records of New Hampshire compiled by Julia E. Head. 1983. A gift of the author.

This is a sourcebook of records for the surname Head taken mainly from the birth, marriage and death records of New Hampshire. These records from the Vital Records Office in Concord have been hand abstracted onto forms and the forms have been reproduced for this volume. Some family group sheets, photographs, published articles and census records have also been included. There are no page numbers or index but the material in the vital records sections is in alphabetical order.

A Guide to Genealogical Resources in Virginia compiled by Elizabeth White Gregory, Registrar, The Colonial Dames in Virginia. 1982. Purchased by the Society.

This guide was made in response to a request from The National Society of Colonial Dames of America asking that each colonial state registrar prepare a guide to genealogical resources within that state. It is divided into chapters which outline sources that are available for genealogical researching. Of special interest are chapters showing a county guide and chapters outlining material available at the Virginia State Library. The county guide tells when and from what counties each county was formed and gives an address for mail inquiries and lists the fees for having documents copied. In addition it cites the volume and page number in The Virginia Genealogist where a more complete outline of the county records can be found. For researchers wanting to order microfilm from the Virginia State Archives, there are several sections that will be quite helpful. There is a list of land tax records that are on film, a list of newspapers (with film numbers cited), and a list of marriage records (with film numbers cited). The lists of county records and cemetery records that have been abstracted and printed is also helpful. Unfortunately the book is not indexed nor does it contain a table of contents, but it contains much very valuable data.

### PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY WILL BOOK 1, 1698-1770

### Abstracted by Donald L. Wilson

(Continued from v. 17, no. 7 [March 1986], p. 105)

MCW = Maryland Calendar of Wills, by Jane Baldwin Cotton (8 v., 1906-1928)

Page 84. [MCW 4:41] Will of Benjamin LONG of PG Co, being sick & weak in body. Date: 5 Dec. 1715 [MCW: 15 Dec. 1715]. Item: My son Thomas LONG to have my now dwealing plantation and other lands thereunto belonging, the whole being about fifty acres, to him and heirs, but in case my son Thomas should die without lawfull heirs of his body, then my son Benjamin LONG to have my sd plantation and lands aforesd. to him and his heirs lawfully begotten (or to begotten). In case Benjamin should die without heirs, then my lands should fall to my daughters by lawfull descent. Item: To my love-ing wife Elizabeth LONG one third. Item: To my loveing wife Elizabeth LONG one third of my personall estate after my just debts and funeral charges are paid [sic, repeat of former item]. The remainder part of my personall estate to be equally divided amongst my six children (vidilect): Thomas, Jane, Ann, Mary, Susannah and Benjamin LONG and the said severall parts of my sd. personall and reale estates belonging to aforesd six children remaine in the hands of my executor hereafter named untill each of my sd children shall arrive to the [Page 85] age as I shall hereafter mencon [mention]. To my daughter Jane LONG my sealskin Trunk, one [blank] Pettycoat and hood to be delivered to her at my death. Item: I request Benjamin BERRY, my executor hereafter named to take care of my son Tho. LONG till he shall arrive to the age of eighteen, he being but twelve years and upwards now, and my daughter Ann to his care and management till she she shall arrive to the age of sixteen years, she being now but ten years or upwards, to the sd. Benjamin BERRY and his heirs. Item: I request my friend Rich'd CANE [MCW: KEEN] to take care of my daughter Mary till she shall be att age of 16 she now being 8 years old or upwards. Item: I request my friend Robert ORUM to take care of my daughter Susana till she shall arrive to the age of 16 years she being now seven year next Aprill ["next Aprill" not mentioned in MCW], and I leave my son Benja. LONG to his mother my wife. Lastly: My friend Benja. BERRY to be my whole and sole executor. Signed: Benjamin (B) LONG. Wit: Richard KEENE, Charles BEAVEN, Loyd HARRIS 1715 [sic].

Proved 19 Jan. [year not given. MCW gives 1715 = 1715/16], by oaths of Charles BEVIN and Loyd HARRIS, before Richard KEENE, Dep[u]t[ize]d Dept'y Com'ry.

Pages 85-88. [MCW 4:39] Will of Thomas GREENFIELD of PG Co. [MCW calls him a planter], being well stricken in years, and having daily moments of mortality coming on me. Date: 17 Aug. 1715. Item: To my daughter Jone GREENFIELD all the remaining part of a tract called "Archers Pasture," having given the other part to my son in law Gabriel PARKER & his wife and their heirs forever. Also to my sd. daughter Jone a tract adjoining to the sd "Archers Pasture" called "Phesant Tree" and 73 acres adjoining to "Pheasant Tree" on the east thereof, being butted and bounded as in a certain deed of conveyance made by my son Tho. Trueman GREENFIELD to my use. Also to my sd. daughter Jone GREENFIELD 100 acres, part of "Retalliation" runing from the Cabbin Branches with the Divitionall [divisional] line between my land to a bounded tree in the sd. line it being the first bound tree of a tract I gave to my son in law Basil WARING and his wife and to her heirs, thence runing eastwardly to a small branch then



down it with Mr. WARING's land aforesd. to ye Mill road thence southwardly with a straight line into Cabbin Branch aforesd, thence up said branch to the Divitional line before mentioned, all which said four parcells with buildings and improvements to my daughter Jone and her heirs, and for want of such heirs then to my next heir.

Item: To my son James [MCW: James] GREENFIELD a tract called "Pheasant Hills" which contains 52 acres adjoining the tract of land whereon he now liveth, and to his heirs. Item: To my townsman John BREAT [MCW: BRENT] alias GERVASS [not mentioned in MCW] 50 acres being the southernmost part of a tract I have called "Juxsla Sladium Aurelorum" [MCW: 'Juxta Stadium Aureolum"] to him & his heirs. Item: To Benjamin GALL [MCW: GALE] the son of my kinsman John GALL deceased who is now under the guardianship of Mr. Richard GROOME [MCW: GROON] of this county, 50 acres part of 'Juxta Stadirm Aureolum" next adjoining to the land I have bequeathed to John BRENT (to the northward) to said Benjamin GALE and heirs, but for want of such heirs to the poor of the town of Gedling near Nottingham. Item: To William OLLIVER who was in his minority under my guardianship 50 acres adjoining to Benja. GALE's land [Page 86] to the northward thereof, to him and heirs. Item: The remaining part of "Juxta Stadium Aureolum" to my daughter Jone GREENFIELD and her heirs.

Item: To my loveing wife Martha GREENFIELD one tracted called "Golden Race" containing near 200 acres with plantation and improvements thereon, at her disposal, also one lott and dwelling house inMills Towne lying by the landing, where my tenant Evan JONES liveth, at her disposal. Also that lease of land which Mr. William MILLS of this county deceased made me as by the records of this county will appear with all the rents for two years, due for ye sd house & lott.

Item: To my son Thomas Truman GREENFIELD one tract lying in St. Marys County called "Stokebardolph" and his heirs. Item: To Tho. GREENFIELD and his youngest brother Micajah GREENFIELD now in their minority & under the guardianship of John HALL in Baltemore County the third part of a tract containing 500 acres called "Trueman's acquaintance" lying in Gunpowder Neck, one third part of which to eqally divided between the sd. Thomas & Micajah to them & their heirs, provided that the sd. John HALE Esqr. clear it from arrearages of rent due to his Lordship or any other person under him otherwise to be sold and disposed of to the be[st] advantage by my Executors towards payment of my debts & portions. [Note: MCW identifies son Thomas Truman GREENFIELD with Thomas GREENFIELD brother of Micajah. This is a mistake, as the testator had no son Micajah.]

Item: My executor to make sale and dispose of 200 acres part of "Billingslys Point" in ye forks of Potux't [Patuxent] River which I bought of Mr. Barnaby KEARNE of James River in Virginia ordering my exector hereafter named to give to Henry DYKE, who liveth on part thereof the first refusall of 50 acres or thereabouts [not mentioned in MCW], and to my couz: [cousin] James HOLLYDAY the first refusall of the remaining part of the said 200 acres abovesd. before any other person [not mentioned in MCW]. Item: My executor to sell part of the parcell called "Pascuum" which lyeth adjoining to Mr. Nath. MAGRUDERs land called "Anchovis Hill" they giving said MAGRUDER the first refusall as I promised him.

Item: My executor shall sell a third part of a tract called "Nutwells Adventure" where Edw'd THOMAS now dwells [not mentioned in MCW] to the westward of his Lo[rdshi]pp's Mannor in Charles County. Item: My executor shall sell a third part of a tract in Cecill County which was mortgaged and sould by Nich. SPONNE to Mr. Charles CARROLL, Mr. Josh CECELL and myself ordering that Mr. CARROLL have the first refusall, and the purchase money of it and the land



abovesd. to be apply'd towards payment of my just debts & legacys. Item: To my son James GREENFIELD and heirs my salt store house & half acre of land whereon the said store house standeth in Nottingham Towne. Item: My executors shall sell the southernmost part of a tract of mine called "Taylors Coast." I mean begining at a bounded hickory of "Buttington" now in possession of Major WILLSON, the[nce] runing east by south 80 perches then south to Bern'd JOHNSONs land called "ye Doves perch" & with the sd. land west by north to the land I sold Mr. Tho: TRUMAN & with the said land to the first bound tree, and my meaning is that Hugh WILLIAMS who was built thereon have the first refusall, & the purchase money to be apply'd towards payment of my just debts and legacys. Item: Whereas I have bargained and sold to Mr. Hen[ry] COX of Calvert County a tract called "Merry Creenwood" as by a certain writing will appear, and he failed last year in the payment which was then due, if he supplies that defect this year, together with this ye[ar's] payment and all other articles of the said writeing, then I order my executor to make a title (accordining to our agreement) to the said land.

Item: To my daughter Jone GREENFIELD and heirs, one Negro boy called Sam, one other called Prince (Hannah's boy) and a Negro girle called Betty, allso four cows & calves, and a feather bed, boulster & rugg and blanketts to be deliver[ed] out of my estate when shee arrive to the age of 21 or day of marriage. Item: To my daughter Martha WARING three cows and calves, to be delivered her within one twelve months af[ter] my decease as also one Negro girl called Babb. Item: My executors to sell 80 acres adjoining to Ann GRIME's land, to the south, on "Bull[ing]ton" to the west and Lingan WILLSONs land which I gave him by a certain deed as appears upon [Page 87] record in Prince Geo. County, also 30 acres adjoining to Lingan WILLSONs on the east thereof, provided that Mrs. Catherine BOTELER have the first refusal, otherwise to any other person willing to purchase, and the money to buy rings for each of my daughters and daughters in law, not forgetting one for my neece Mrs. Margery COVINGTON, and the overplus (if any) towards paying my debts.

Item: To my daughter Elizabeth PARKER and her heirs, one Negro girle called Bess being the daughter of my Negro Jack as allso one Mulatto girle call'd Pegg. Item: To my son Tho: Truman GREENFIELD and his heirs one Negro boy call'd Nero and his sister Diana being ye children of my Negro Wom[an] Doll. Item: To my son James GREENFIELD and heirs one Negro boy call'd Will, being a childe of ye abovesd. Negro Doll. Item: To my daughter Ann WIGHTT and her heirs one Negro girle call'd Pegg (being the daughter of my Negro Jack), now in her possession, as also one Mulatto girle call'd Beck. Item: To my son Truman GREENFIELD and heirs one Negro girle call'd Flora being the daughter of Negro Woman call'd Dido, now in the possession of my couz[in] Leonard HOLLADAY. Item: To my daughter Jone GREENFIELD and heirs one Negro boy call'd Peter. Item: My kinsman James HOLLYDAY (when he comes to age) shall have delivered to him by my executors one Negro Woman call'd Nell (in lieu of a Negro that is dead which was part of his share of his father's estate) with her increase, but in case ye said James HOLLYDAY (when he comes to age) shall refuse to accept of the said Negro Woman that in such case my executors to buy a Negro for him. [Note: As in all the MCW abstracts, none of the slaves nor their relationships are mentioned.]

Item: To my loveing wife Martha GREENFIELD all ye plantation I now dwell upon during her naturall life and after my death to my son Truman GREENFIELD, and his heirs males, but for want of such heirs to the heirs males of my son James GREENFIELD, but for want of such heirs, then to my son Tho: Truman GREENFIELD and his heirs males but for want of such heirs, then to the poor of the Towne of Gedling (in Great Brittaine) ye place of my nativity.



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Item: Whereas I have given to my daughter Jone GREENFIELD (when she comes to age) a parcell of land I bought of my son Tho: Truman GREENFIELD, it is nevertheless my intent and meaning that her Mother shall have liberty (if shee pleases) to dwell upon any part of the same which lies to the northward of the Cabbin branch dureing her Widdowhood, and the same to occupy dureing y't [that] time.

Item: My Negros Prince, Sampson, Juno, Leander, Jack, Pegg and Nell (if my Couz: James HOLLYDAY when at age shall refuse to accept of her in lieu of an old Bursten Negro which died in my possession) be imploy'd as my Executors shall think convenient, and the produce of their labour (besides what shall maintain them) to be apply'd towards paym[en]t of my just debts till sattisfied, after which so many of them as shall be liveing to be equally divided between my three sons and their heirs forever. Item: My Negro Women Fido [=Dido?], Doll, and Sarah with her son Benjamin be kept at work upon my plantation whereon I now dwell by & for the maintenance of my loveing wife Mrs. Martha GREENFIELD, dureing her naturall life, and that my Negro Woman Kate be kept to attend and wait on her said Mistress dureing her naturall life as aforesd. and after her decease the said five Negros to be equally divided between my executors, and what increase they shall have dureing my wife's life to be disposed of at her discretion amongst my children or grandchildren.

Item: To my daughter Eliz: PARKER and heirs all the stock of cattle & hoggs which now are upon the plantation where shee now dwells called "Gedling." Item: After the cattle, hoggs, horses, & sheep which I have upon my dwelling plantation "Billingslys Point" and "Trent Neck" are [=or] elsewhere are appraised, then I give to my loveing wife Martha GREENFIELD six cows & calves, and of stears and heifers tenn more. Towards her (and my daughter Jone's) support the stock of hoggs 'til shee be married or at age as beforesd. together with the stock of hoggs upon my said dwelling plantation and two feather beds and covering, with their curtaines & valence. Lastly: I ordaine and appoint my two sons Thomas Truman GREENFIELD and James GREENFIELD jointly my whole and sole executors, and in case of my son James's death then I appoint my son Truman GREENFIELD to be joint executor with his brother Tho: Truman GREENFIELD aforesd. Will contained in six sides and an half of paper. Signed: Tho: GREENFIELD. Wit: Joseph PERRY (mark: M), Nich's (H) DAVIS Junr., Willm. (+) BADGER.

[Page 88] Proved 7 Nov. 1715 by oaths of Mr. Joseph PERRY and Mr. Nicholas DAVIS and Mr. William BADGER, that they ware present at the time & place when the within <u>Coll</u>. Thomas GREENFIELD now deceased signed the will. Before Benja. BERRY, Dept'y Comiss'y PG Co.

NOTES: The witnesses to Benjamin LONG's will, Richard KEANE, Charles BEVAN and Loyde HARRIS are all found in Mount Calvert Hundred, 1719 [Calendar of Maryland State Papers: the Black Books, 159]. Benjamin LONG had been a juror for PG Co. in 1699 [Smith, Court Records of PG Co, Md, 1696-1699, p.444,554]. I have not identified what tracts he owned. In March 1716 his daughter Susannah was ordered to serve Joseph BELT until of age [Smith, Orphans and Infants of PG Co, Md, 1696-1750, p.68].

Thomas GREENFIELD (died 8 Sept. 1715) was appointed to the Maryland Provincial Council in 1708. He had married Martha TRUMAN, niece of Thomas TRUMAN a member of the Board of Deputy Governors 1684-1689. GREENFIELD was a vestryman for St. Paul's Parish, high sheriff of PG Co in 1696, a justice of the Provincial Court, and a delegate to the General Assembly 1699-1708. ### CRAIG DISCUSSES DELAWARE GENEALOGY

The 2 April meeting of the Society heard a talk by Mr. Peter S. Craig who spoke on the first European settlements on the Delaware River, 1638-1675. Mr. Craig, who is a Washington lawyer, "moonlights" as an historian and genealogist in the specializing history genealogy of this region. Mr. Craig pointed out that these early settlers were primarily of Swedish, Finnish and Dutch extraction. The territory discussed was called New Sweden and was purchased from the Delaware and Susquehanna Indians. Ιt included Delaware, parts οf southeast Pennsylvania, southern New Jersey and most of Cecil County, Maryland. Mr. Craig divided his talk into a history of the region, a description of its people and a discussion of the surnames of the inhabitants.

Mr. Craig kindly donated several monographs on this subject to our library. They include a list of 89 references on these settlers and two lists of members of Swedish churches in the area. The 350th anniversary of the founding of New Sweden will be held during 1988 and Mr. Craig is on the Kalmar Nyckel Commemorative Committee which is making plans for this celebration.

Mr. Craig is the author of an interesting article on the history and people of the region which appeared in the National Genealogical Quarterly, Vol. 71, No. 4 (December 1983), pp.243-279, entitled "The Yocums of Aronameck in Philadelphia, 1648-1702."



### TALK ON HALL OF RECORDS

Our guest speaker for the 7 May 1986 meeting will be Mr. Stephen Cooper, Archivist 3, from the Maryland State Archives in Annapolis. Mr. Cooper works with the State and Local Record Project. He will discuss Equity Records, Levy Records and little known sources in the Hall of Records.

Annapolis is perhaps at most a 45 minute drive for our local members and is a valuable resource center for those of us with Maryland roots. Familiarizing ourselves with some of the sources beforehand can expedite our research and make the trip more fruitful. Don't miss Mr. Stephen Cooper!





### Book Reviews

By Shirley Langdon Wilcox, C.G.

Revolutionary War Soldiers Who Lived in Gallia County, Ohio, edited by Henrietta C. Evans and Mary P. Wood. Gallia County Genealogical Society, O.G.S. Chapter. 1985. A gift of the Family of Jane Roush McCafferty, C.G.

This book is a compilation of Revolutionary War Veterans who either served from Gallia Co., OH or at one time lived there. The editors were very careful to search primary sources to make the records as accurate as possible. Jane McCafferty assisted by checking the records at the National Archives.

The soldiers are listed alphabetically and personal and military data is included. When the information was available, a list of the soldier's children, their birthdates and marriages are included. Then at the end of each sketch is a list of sources. Following the alphabetical listing of soldiers are three additional sections. The first includes soldiers who have been included for miscellaneous reasons, the second is a list of men whose service could not be established, and the last section showed men whose service might yet be proven. This work is indexed and should be very helpful for anyone researching families in Gallia County.

The Ledger/Diaries of Amos Jonas Beltz of Clark County, Illinois, compiled and edited by Betty Beltz Stevens. 1984. A gift of the author.

Amos Jonas Beltz lived his entire life in Clark Co., IL, having been born there 17 May 1858. He kept diaries that have been passed down to his descendants, and these have been abstracted by Betty Stevens. Diaries such as this enable us to put meat on the bones of our ancestors and I am sure many of the descendants of Amos Beltz will be glad of the efforts of Betty Stevens to see that his diaries were abstracted and published. In addition to the published diaries Ms. Stevens has included photographs, maps, and extracts of the 1900 census. The work has been carefully done and is completely indexed.



### KRUTAR PUBLISHES PAPER ON GENEALOGICAL COMPUTING

Society member Rudolph Krutar is the author of an article entitled "Rudolph Krutar Explores LOTUS 1-2-3 Capability," which appears in the Apr-Jun 1986 (pp. 17-18) issue of the journal Genealogical Computing. Using LOTUS 1-2-3 spreadsheet software Dr. Krutar builds a data base for tracking sources of genealogical data. A matrix is created with rows representing individual records and columns representing the data field of each record. His approach is to treat the collection of sources as a tree — or collection of trees — organized using the New Hampshire Convention for numbering tree nodes. By using the advanced capabilities of LOTUS 1-2-3 Dr. Krutar has demonstrated some interesting possibilities for simple but useful genealogical data bases.

Item: To my son Francis BROWN one shilling of English money, he nor his heirs never to inherit any other part of my Estate, he being undutifull to me and his Mother. Item: To my daughter Mary PHIPPARD one shilling of English money, she nor her heirs never to inherit any other part of my Estate any further than directed by this will. Item: To my well beloved son Jacob BROWN the plantation whereon I now dwell which I bought of John STANLEY, called "Stanley's Chance" and to his heires forever. Item: Likewise to my son Jacob BROWN all my whole estate both real and personall after my decease, and to heirs of his body lawfully begotten. But if Jacob should die without issue of his own body, all my land to be inherited by John PHIPPARD my grandson and his heires of his body, and in case of a non issue of John PHIPPARD, then to my grand daughter Ursilla PHIPPARD, and heirs, and in default of a non issue of her body to my grandson William PHIPPARD and heirs, and in default then to Ann ELLIS the daughter of Owen ELLIS and heirs, and in default of a non issue, then to the heires of the body of Owen ELLIS, and in a default I give it for a Gleabe for the Parish of St. Pauls, but lett it be possessed by any or whomsoever of these persons above named they repair and keep the graveyard up & allways Pailed [paled] in. Item: To my loving wife Mrs. Sarah TRUMAN the moiety of my p'sonall Estate remaining dureing her widdowhood together with the land I live on, but whenever she shall intermarry, then my desire is that she shall enjoy only her thirds or Right of Dower in this my Estate, and that my son Henry enjoy two thirds of the land I live on when he shall attaine to the age of 21 years. #### EMIGRATION FROM HAMBURG

The following information was excerpted from the May 1986 issue of the Recreation News, the official publication of the League of Federal Recreation Associations, which was brought to the Editor's attention by Jim McCafferty.

Between 1850 and 1914 some five million persons emigrated through the German port of Hamburg on their way to America, Canada and Australia. They were Scandinavians, Germans, Swiss, Poles and Russians. If you can trace your ancestry to someone who emigrated through Hamburg during this period, the record might exist in the ship manifests preserved at the Historic Emigration Office of the Museum for Hamburg History. Most of the manifests carry the country or German state the traveler came from, his occupation and age, and the first names and ages of his wife and children. The charge for the service is \$30 for researching one year's list with an additional charge of \$10 for each additional year searched.

Abstracted by Donald L. Wilson

MCW = Maryland Calendar of Wills, by Jane Baldwin Cotton (8 v., 1906-1928)

Pages 92-93. [MCW 4:135] Will of Ninian BEALL of PG Co, being indisposed in body. Date: 15 Jan. 1717 [1718]. Item: To my sonn George and heirs, my plantation and tract called "the Rock of Dumbarton" lying and being att Rock Creeke, containing 408 acres with all the stock thereon both cattle and hoggs. Item: Allso to said son George BEALL and heirs, his choyce of one of my Feather bedds, bolster & pillow & other furniture belonging with two cows & calves and half my sheepe from off this plantation I now live on. To my son in law Andrew HAMBLETON and heirs, my Negro woman Alce. Item: To my grandaughter Mary BEALL ye daughter of my sonn Ninian BEALL deceased one half part of all my movables or personall estate as cattle & hoggs, horses, household goods after my leagacies are paid, to her and heirs. Item: To said grandaughter Mary BEALL and heirs all yt [that] part of "Bacon Hall" that lyeth on ye south side of the road that goeth to Mount Calvert. Item: To my grandson Samuell BEALL all the remainder part of "Bacon Hall" together with the plantation & orchard & tobacco houses thereunto belonging (with this proviso) that when he comes to age 21 he make over by a firm conveyance all his right and title yt he hath unto a certaine tract called "Sams begining" on the south side of the sd road goeing to Mount Calvert unto the sd Mary & her heirs, but if he should happen to dye before he arrive at that age then I give to sd grandaughter Mary and Heirs ye whole trackt of "Bacon Hall" with the houses &orchard thereon. Item: To my said grandson Samuell BEALL and heirs my water mill lying upon Collington Branch with the stone, iron works, houses and all other materials thereunto belonging.

Item: To my son in law Joseph BELT and heirs, part of a tract called "good luck" containing 245 acres he allowing unto my heires ye sume of 4000 pounds of tobacco according to our former agreement he deducting what I doe owe him on his book for severall wares & merchandizes had of him. Item: Whereas I doe owe several debts I doe empower my trustees hereafter named to enable them to pay the same to sell a certaine tract called "the Recovery" lying & being in the freshes of Patuxent River near the head of the Western Branch. It conteins 400 acres, the aforesaid tract bequeathed to my sonn BELLT is adjoining thereunto. Item: To my sonn Charles BEALL a Booke of Bishop COOPER's works the Acts of the Church & the Chronacle of Kink [sic] Charles ye first and King Charles ye Second ye Second [sic, repeated] and I doe hereby request and oblicidge my sonn Charles my sonn BELT and my son George to send for a Dozen of Books intituled an advice to young & old & middle age sett forth by one Mr. Christopehr NESS ye books to be distributed amongst my grandchildren & godsone.

Item: To my sonn Charles and heirs 1000 acres of land called "Dunnback" lying on the south side of great Chaptank in a Creeke called Wattres Creek [MCW: Wattes Creek]. Lastly: I appoint my grandson Samuell BEALL to be my sole and whole execu'r, and I doe desier my loveing sonns Charles BELL, Joseph BELT, and George BELL [BEALL, of course, is pronounced "BELL"] to doe and performe my desier as above exprest and to act and doe for my executor untill he arrive to age 21. I desier my said sonns to use their best care and indevour that my two grandchildren the children of my beloved sonn Ninian BEALL deceased to be brought and have that education sutable to ther esteate and appoynt my said sonns trustees to this my



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will, to make their appearance every easter Tuesday or any other time as they shall think a more fitting time att my dwelling plantation yearly to inspect into all affaires thereof and of a yearly increase of all the creatures upon my plantation and att the mill, for and on the behalfe of my two grandchildren who are to be joynt sharers therin, my grandaughter [Page 93] to have hir part att ye day of marriage. Signed: Ninian (mark: [1/2]) BEALL. Wit: John BUSEY, Rebecca (+) GETWARD, Edw'd WILLETT. [BEALL's mark probably intended as "NB"] (9 3/4 sides)

ceil$  of my tract called "the Widdows Mite". Allso to my son Thomas FLETCHELL and heirs 300 acres being the other moiety of my aforesaid tract called "the Widdows Mite" to enter into the possession thereof so soone as he shall attaine age 21. He to receive the 300 acres given to my wife after her death. Allso: To my daughter FLETCHALL [sic] and heirs all the tract lying near Broad Creek in Prince Geo. County called "Lancaster" containing 150 acres. Allso to my said daughter Elizabeth FLETCHALL and heirs that tract to me belonging in Piscattaway in PG Co. called [blank] containing [blank]. All other my lands which are not before mention'd I hereby appoint my executrix to putt them to sayle to raese money for the paym't of my just debts, my will is that the same money be equally divided betwixt my wife and two children. I make my said wife Ann FLETCHALL my whole & sole executrix and I leve the care of my two children unto my loveing friend John BRADFORD [ ${\it He}$ not mentioned in MCW]. Signed: Tho: FLETCHALL. Wit: John BRADFORD, James RIGGS, Will'm RENSHAW.

Proved 2 Aug. 1717 by oaths of John BRADFORD, James RIGGS, and William RENSHAW. Before Patrick HEPBURN, Dept'y Comis'ry, PG Co.

Pages 94-95. [MCW 4:108-9] Will of Josiah WILSON of PG Co, Gent., being sick & weak in body. Date: 11 Nov. 1717. Item: To my loving brother William KID and heirs all that part of a tract called "Refuge" containing 24 acres as also all that parcell called "Kids Levells" adjoyning to the aforesaid land containing 84 acres as also a tracted called "Island plains" adjoyning to the aforesaid "Kids levells" 59 acres, with all appurtenances. Item: To my son Josiah WILLSON and heirs all that tract lying in Baltemore County on the east side of a river called Bush River and on the west side of a branch of said river called Binnans Branch which said land is called "Ozburns Lott" and containing 500 acres as alsoe the one moiety or half part of a tract called "Buttington" containing by pattent in the whole 380 acres, as alsoe a lott lying on the east side of Mr. William HEADs lott as alsoe a lott on the south side of the meating house lott.

Item: To my son Lingan WILSON and heirs all that tract called "Lingans Adventure" lying in Baltemore County on the south side of Gunn Powder [River] containing 500 acres, alsoe a tract called "Back Lingan" in the County aforesaid 450 acres. Item: To my son James WILSON all that tract lying in the head of Hunting Creek called "the Ridge" containing 200 acres acres [MCW calls him "Janus" WILSON], as alsoe a parcell of land called "the Angles" lying at the head of the said creek containing 90 acres, as alsoe a parcell called "Georges Desire" containing 20 acres, as also a parcell called "Addition" lying on the south side



of the aforesaid land called "the Ridge" containing 42 acres, as alsoe a slipe of land lying in the City of Annapolis being part of a lott sold to a certain Patrick OGILBY containing 21 foot in breadth and for length with the said lott running to the streete before the said Aglvile [sic] OGLVIEs door alsoe one lott of land and house lying in Mount Calvert in PG Co. formerly taken up and built on by Henry BOTELER; alsoe one other lott and house by Mount Calvert aforesaid which I formerly purchased of Christopher BEANE [MCW: BEAM] since deceased, as alsoe my warehouse downe by the water side of Mount Calvert as alsoe one tankard of silver to be sent for of the value of tenn pounds ster. with this Inscription: "the gift of IH". Item: To my loving sonn Joseph WILSON and heirs all that plantation lying on the south side of the west branch of Patuxent River and on the north side of a branch called Charles's branch with the appurtenances, called "Cockallds Point" containing by estimation 150 acres as also a parcell adjoining to the said plantation, containing about 20 acres, called "Beanes landing", as alsoe one tract with appurtenances, being part of the said land called "Beanes landing" containing 43 acres more or less, as alsoe 100 acres called "Brookehill" lying on the northside of Charles Branch in Prince Georges County with all appurtenances, together with one tract adjoyning to the aforesaid land called "Brookhill" with all appurtenances, called "Kingsale" containing 200 [acres] more or less. Item: To my loving sonn Joshua WILSON and heirs all my tract and houses lying in Mount Calvert in PG Co, which I formerly purchased of a certaine Thomas EMES containing 247 acres more or less, as alsoe one other plantation which I formerly purchased of a certain John DEAKINS being part of Mount Calvert Manor, containing 102 acres more or less. Together with a parcell I purchased of Christopher BEANE lying on the sou[th] side of Charles branch aforesaid containing 18 acres more or less.

[Page 95] Item: To my loving daughter Martha WILSON one tract lying in Charles County called "Indian Jayants Sepulchre" [MCW: "Indian Gyant's Sepulchre"] containing 206 acres more or less which I formerly purchased of Walter BEANES [MCW: BEAM]; as allsoe all my wives wearing apparel except one black furbelon scarfe which I gave to Mrs. Catherine BOTELER. Allsoe to my said daughter and heirs all my four gold rings and one silver tankard, one large silver salver. Allsoe to my three sons Josiah, Lingan and James WILLSON 18 silver spoons to be equally divided between them. Alsoe to my loveing son Joseph WILSON one silver cann[?] and one silver salt. Alsoe to my loveing sonn Joshua one silver cann & one silver salt, and to my sonn Josiah a large silver punch spoone. Item: To my six children Josiah, Lingan, James, Joseph, Jo[s]hua and Martha WILSON all my Negroes with their increase to be equally divided between them as they sev'all[y] attaine the age of 16 years my said son Josiah to have the first choyce after the devision made and then my sonn Lingan and soe successively.

I hereby desire the Justices of PG Co. Court to see an equall division made as aforesaid together with Mr. Edward BOTELER and Mr. Thomas LINGAN in Calvert County to assist at the division aforesaid. If either of my five sonns Josiah, Lingan, James, Joseph and Joshua dye before they severally attaine age 18, that then that part of the deceast sonns estate both real and personall to be equally devided amongst all the surviving children by the then Justices of PG Co. Court and Mr. Edward BOTELER and Mr. Thomas LINGAN [BOTELER and LINGAN not mentioned in MCW]. My daughter Martha to have the disposeing of her estate at age 16, and all my goods, wares and merchandize both wett and dry be appraised and applyd to the use of the estate as aforesaid; and also that my executors take care to maintaine my said children at schoole and provide a competent support for them till they severally come to age as aforesaid and that all and singular the severall Negros hereby bequeathed be kept on the severall plantations by me



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all ready settled there to worke and their severall cropps to be disposed of towards the support and maintainance of my children till they severally come to age as aforesaid and that my servants Walter THOMPSON, John MARTINE [MCW: HASTINS], John SMITH, Josiah BONNETT [MCW: Izia BONNELL] and George NOBLE be kept or dispos'd of by my executors for their own proper use and benefitt till the said servants shall come free from their time of servitude. Lastly: I appoint my loving sonns Josiah WILLSON and Lingan WILSON executors. Signed: Josiah WILSON. Wit: Jos. BELT, Rich'd PILE, Rob't HALL.

Proved 5 Dec. 1717 by oaths of Joseph BELT and Robert HALL. Before Patrick HEPBURN, Dept'y Comis'ry PG Co. Proved 7 Dec. 1717 by oath of Richard PILE, before Patrick HEPBURN, Depty Com'ry PG Co.

#### NOTES:

Col. Ninian BEALL (1625?-1718) is well known in Prince George's County history. See the numerous publications about him shown in Index of the Source Records of Maryland, by Eleanor Passano (1940). An article in Original Patentees of Land at Washington prior to 1700, by Bessie Gahn (1936), p.36-39, describes his offices and land holdings. BEALL is believed to have been captured by Cromwellians at the Battle of Dunbar, Scotland, in 1650, and been transported to  $\sim$ Maryland a short time later as a convict. He quickly rose to influence, becoming Colonel of Calvert County militia, and "served both the county and province in many delings with the Indians." [Prince George's Heritage, by Louise Hienton, 1972, p.10] He was a member of the General Assembly 1679-1701. In 1704 he donated land in Upper Marlboro on which a Presbyterian Church was to be built [Hienton, p.91]. In 1707 he gave the church a costly silver communion service set, now owned by the Hyattsville Presbyterian Church [Hienton, p.92]. He patented over 25,000 acres, mainly in western Calvert County, which became Prince George's in 1696. He died at "Bacon Hall" in 1717 [1718] at age 92 [Hienton, p.91]. By tradition he had 12 children, only 5 of whom are proved by his will. The list: John (1690-1711), Capt. Charles (1672-), Ninian (1674-1710), Sarah m. Samuel MAGRUDER, Hester m. Joseph BELT, Jane m. Archibald EDMUNSTON, Rachel [not traced], George (1695-1780), Mary m. Andrew HAMBLETON, Thomas (d. 1708), Margery m.(1) Thomas SPRIGG and (2) Joseph BELT, James [not traced]. [Gahn, p. 37]

"The Widow's Mite", where Thomas FLETCHALL lived in 1717, was owned 1664-1694 by John LANGWORTH. It was located in what is now the District of Columbia, just northeast of Georgetown. FLETCHALL is not found in PG court minutes 1696-1699 nor in deeds 1696-1704. He seems to have been rather young at his death. His son Thomas FLETCHELL (or FETCHELL) lived in Potowmack Hundred, 1733, along with a John FLETCHELL [Calendar of Maryland State Papers: the Black Books (BB), 273]. That same year a George FLETCHELL lived in Mattapany Hundred [BB, 267].

Josiah WILSON, gentleman, apparently originated in Calvert County. He m. Martha, a daughter of George LINGAN, gent., of Calvert Co. before 1699 [PG Deeds A:299]. The tract the newlyweds received was called "Buttington," on the west side of Patuxent River. George LINGAN had married Ann HARDESTY, daughter of an early settler George HARDESTY [History of Calvert Co, Md, by Charles Stein, 1976, p.290]. Major Josiah WILSON was the son of James WILSON (d. 1672) of Calvert Co. [Stein, p.335, has more on Josiah and his descendants in Calvert Co.] All of Josiah's children were minors at his death. Josiah chose a guardian in 1718, indicating he was born before 1704 (over age 14). Lingan chosen a guardian in 1719, Joseph in 1724, Joshua in 1727, Martha in 1728 (she called "about 15"). James' guardianship not found [Orphans and Infants of PG Co, by Dorothy Smith, 1976, p.114-115].

NATIONAL GENEALOGICAL SOC Newsltr, Vol 12, #1, 1986. Passenger arrival records, formerly in storage at the Washington Natl. Records Center have been turned over to the Natl. Archives. As they are processed, they will be made available to the public. They span 1891--1957 and are for ports of entry on the West, East, and Gulf coasts and the Mexican and Canadian borders.

RILEY CO, KS, GEN SOC, Manhattan, KS, Qtrly, Vol XXIV, #1, Feb. 1986. Veterans from War of 1812, Mexican War, and Union Army, Civil War, that are buried in Sunset Cemetery, Manhattan, KS.

SO SUBURBAN GEN and HIST SOC, South Holland, IL, Vol. XVI-1, Fall 1985. Features Washington and Will Townships, Cook Co. IL.

FT. WORTH, TX, GEN SOC, VOL 29-1, Feb. 1986. Continuation of Palo Pinto, TX, marriages, and Wise Co. Messenger, TX, excerpts. Also, Shiloh Cemetery, Marion Co., TN.

MID-MO GEN SOC, Jefferson City, Qtrly Vol. 10-1, Jan. 1986. Continuation of Osage Co., MO, deed records, 1841-1868, covering names Maasen-McQueen.

FLORIDA GEN SOC, JOURNAL, Tampa, VOL 22-1, March 1986. Continued list of Confederate soldiers buried in Woodlawn Cem., Elmira, NY. Elmira was the site of a Federal prisoner of war camp. ## MINUTES OF THE PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, INC. 7 May, 1986

The regular meeting of the Society was called to order 7 May, 1986, at 7:08 p.m. in the Greenbelt Library, Greenbelt, Maryland, by the President, Cdr. Ed Wright.

The President called for corrections or additions to the minutes of the April meeting. There were none, and the minutes were approved as printed in the *Bulletin*. Second Vice-President Dorothy Haney reported a total membership of 399, versus the 404 at the beginning of the year.

Virginia Heyerdahl announced that copies of the "Surname Index File" are now available, and copies could be purchased at the meeting. Relative to the surname file, Archivist Ivan Rainwater mentioned that cards are still being submitted to the Society library, and are inserted into the actual file, which is maintained there. He urged members to avail themselves of this valuable resource.

Jean Sargent reported the following slate of officers nominated for the coming year: Ruth Stultz, President; James Reep, First Vice-President; Orville Russell, Second Vice-President; Eugene Ernest, Treasurer; and Emerald Miner, Secretary.

President Wright reminded all Council members of the upcoming meeting - 12 May, at his home. On the agenda will be the budget for the coming year, and possible publication on marriage extracts for Prince George's County.

Education Chairperson Dorothy Rainwater commented on the success of the Society's spring seminar series, and thanked all those who participated as speakers. Dorothy said that attendance averaged 50 persons per session.

Bill Miller announced the Federation of Genealogical Societies conference will be held in Florida 25-27 September, 1986.

The computer interest group for the Society will meet 21 May at 7:00 p.m. in the Greenbelt Library. 9 persons attended the last meeting. The treasurer's report indicated \$1662 in checking, and \$8940 in savings.

After a short break, President Wright introduced the speaker for the meeting, Mr. Stephen Cooper, assistant director at the Maryland Hall of Records in Annapolis. Mr. Cooper spoke on "Research at the Maryland State Archives". His talk covered some of the under-utilized records, such as Equity/Chancery records, insolvency records, exhibits from the court, and county equity records. He also commented on the upcoming move of the Hall of Records, scheduled for July. The facility will be closed to researchers during that month, and Mr. Cooper urged "call-aheads" for the end of June and beginning of August, prior to making the trip to Annapolis for research purposes.

The meeting adjourned at 8:33 p.m.
