#### SOCJETIES

#### CENTRAL NEW YORK GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

The Central N.Y. Genealogical Society began about Jan. 1961 with approximately 22 persons organizing instructional meetings for beginners in genealogy. Dues were \$2.00 per year.

They began publishing a Quarterly "TREE TALKS" in March 1961. In December 1961 their membership exceeded 300 members.

The Society first concentrated their efforts on 5 Central N.Y. counties - Madison, Onondaga, Cayuga, Cortland and Oswego. Other counties were covered when contributors were found.

A query issue called "COUSIN HUNTIN" is published each December. These are 10¢ a line, minimum of \$1.00. A great way to find ancestors in this area.

An index is compiled each year at \$3.00 per volume. This quarterly is indexed in the GENEALOGICAL PERIOD. CAL ANNUAL INDEX, published by George Russell.

Along with the County Data pages are found separate data relating to Maps, Resources and Techniques. Tention Mutarets, Immigrations. Military Tracts and Historian's Pages.

The above is a condensation of a talk given at the February 3, 1971 Meeting by Eleanor Watson.

#### PREY TO A CONTRACTOR'S BULLDOZER:

The following monument is located on Brinkley Road, Temple Hills, MD at the site of Huntley Square Shopping Center (between Oxon Hill Lutheran Church and Brinkley House Apts.).

"This monument is erected to the Honor of Nicholas Dawson, of England, living in Maryland in 1688, d. 1727, m. Mary Dayne, dau of Robert Dayne, gent. and Mary Stone, his wife, dau of Gov. William Stone and Verlinka Cotton, his wife. They lived here at "Saturdays Work". Children: John, Thomas, William, Nicholas, George.

Descent: Gen. 2 - John Dawson, b. 1706, d. 1764, m. Martha Ann Marbury, b. Sept. 11, 1715, d. Jan. 28, 1795, dau of Francis Marbury and his wife Frances Heard of England and Maryland.

Gen. 3 - Nicholas Dawson, Deputy Sherrif of Fred. Co., MD, b. Jan. 14, 1750, d. Mar. 18, 1806, buried in Fred. MD., Patriot, m. Eliz. Baynes, b. Sept. 19, 1760, d. Jan. 21, 1852. Buried in Leesburg, Va., dau of Lieut. William Bayne and Mary Fenley, his wife.

Gen. 4 - Capt. Samuel Dawson, b. 1787, d. Dec. 11, 1845, Leesburg, Va., Patriot, in the War of 1812, m. Sarah Ann Bayne, b. on Deep Creek, Onancock, Va., Apr. 3, 1804, d. Oct. 18, 1867, dau, of Rev. Calmore Bayne and his wife, Elizabeth Smith Hack of Peter of Accomac Co., Va.

Gen. 5 - Elizabeth Hack Dawson, b. Aug. 26, 1839, d. March 16, 1893, buried at Loudon Park Cemetery, Balti, Md., m. Richard Johnson Ayres, of Accomack Co., Va., b. July 10, 1842, d. July 5, 1930. Under one sod they rest.

Gen. 6 - Henrietta Dawson Ayres, m. Harper Donelson Sheppard erected this monument"

#### TOPOGRAPHIC MAPS

If you are searching for a cemetery, especially small family plots, these maps are invaluable. They show almost 100% accuracy in the location of both large and small cemeteries. They can be obtained from:

- 1. East of the Mississippi River: Distribution Section, Geological Survey, 1200 South Eads St., Arlington, VA 22202.
- 2. West of the Mississippi River: Distribution Section, Geological Survey, Federal Center, Denver, Colo. 80225.

First write and ask for the index to your state and also for a map order form. The  $7\frac{1}{2}$  minute series is the most advantageous. Cost per map - \$.50.

#### OUR MEMBERS

#### DR. LAIRD C. TOWLE

Our President became interested in genealogy in the 8th grade, but it was the Fall of 1968 before active research commenced. Research has continued vigorously since.

He was born in Exeter, N.H. 13 September 1933 and raised there. Educated at Univ. of N.H. - B. Sc. - 1955, M. Sc. - 1958 and Univ. of Va. - PhD - 1962. All degrees are in Physics.

Ancestry and genealogical interest is largely contained in  $N_tH$ , with some Mass, and a very little in Maine and Canada.

In 1970 he began publishing a quarterly surname file called The Bosvell-Buzzell Genealogist. This quarterly is about 20 mimeographed pages of records pertaining to these families. The Boswells are primarily Southern, while the Buswells and Buzzells are New England families. Buzzell collection has indices to wives by maiden and married names; to daughters by maiden and married names; to unmarried ( or uncontinued) sons: locality index remains to be done. He has a growing collection on the Buzzell family and hopes to publish comprehensive genealogy beginning with the original immigrant, John Buzzell, who first appears in Dover, N.H. about 1690.

He has small collections on several other N.H. families - especially Holmes Gear, Felker, Cater, Towle.

Major project at present is genealogy of all descendants of Wm. & Isabella (Kennedy) Brown including all female lines down to present. This couple was born in Ireland c1820, sojourned in Scotland for about 25 years after fleeing Ireland during the potato famine, and migrated to the U.S. c1870 with all their children and grandchildren who were then living. Family settled in Hampton Falls. N.H. and is now spread all over the U.S. First draft of genealogy is 2/3rds done; hope to offset print.

He has a growing library of town and county histories (principally N.H.), which are indexed by surname in master card file. He also performs genealogical research for hire on an part-time basis.

Mr. George, Justice, Jr., Treasurer; reported a balance of \$312.83-in-the bank.

Mrs. Barbara Dash, Chairman of the Records Committee, gave a brief report on the proper method of abstracting deeds from court records. She also gave a report of the Committee meeting that was held in February. Help is needed to assist in the abstracting of deeds in Prince George's County.

# SOME SUGGESTIONS FOR THE KEEPING OF GENEALOGICAL RECORDS By George Ely Russell, C. G.

Too many amateur genealogists use faulty record-keeping methods. This inevitably results in confusion, the necessity for later re-typing (with chances of making typographical errors), and inability to easily compile materials for publication.

The most common error is failure to cite exact and complete sources for each fact or bit of information included in the genealogical record. Much of what has been written is not true. Failure to cite sources will result in worthless and unverifiable information. Having no space for source citations most commercially available record forms are worse than useless.

Here are some specific suggestions for better record-keeping.

INFORMATION and SOURCES

- 1. Assemble <u>all</u> pertinent information relating to one couple and their children on one (or more) pages. Records of wives should be on the same page as the husband's record.
- 2. Arrange the information in the same sequence as it would be presented if it were published:
  - a. Full name of man.
  - b. Birthplace and date, and full names of parents. (Be sure to include citation of the source of these data.) If you don't know the birthplace and date, but have some secondary evidence (e.g., census record) which is pertinent, describe it. Examples: "Born ca. 1697-1638 (Age at death, gravestone inscription)." or "Born New York State, ca. 1812-1813 (1850 Census). "Son of John and Mary Roe of Southampton, Long Island (father's will, 1732)."
  - c. Marriage place and date, and full aame of wife. (With citation of source.)
  - d. Wife's birthplace, date, and parentage.
  - e. All available biographical and other pertinent fact, arranged in chrocological order, and including exact descriptions of sources of data.
  - f. Abstract of will or other probate record.
  - g. Death place, date, and age. Gravestone inscription.
  - Summary data for each child, arranged in order of birth. If you establish a separate page for a child, place a plus sign to the left of his entry to indicate that more information is available. Cite source of birth record for each child. Provide additional details only if you do not set up a separate page for the child, and again be certain to give sources for each bit of information.

#### CITATIONS

- 3. Citing sources of information. See the back of any good dictionary for methods for describing bibliographical information. Here are a few tips.
  - a. Cite the source in parentheses right after the bit of information involved. (Do not gather all references together at the end of the record unless they are keyed by numbers to the data.)
  - b. Provide a full description of the source. Examples:
    - (1) Publication. Author's full name, full title of book, city of publication, name of publisher, year of publication, volume number, page number.
    - (2) Article. Full name of author, full title of article, title of periodical, volume number, year of publication, page number.
    - (3) Documentary record. Location, title of volume, volume number, years covered by volume, page number. For census records beginning 1850, give the dwelling and family numbers.

#### NUMBERING

- 4. If your interest is limited to compiling records of your ancestors and you do not intend to seek out records of other branches of each family, simply number each family group in accordance with the following system. You are #2, your wife is #2; your father is #4 (twoce your number), your mother is #5; your wife's father is #6 (double her number), and so on.
- If, on the other hand, you are interested in collecting 5。 and compiling records of all the descendants of a colonist or immigrant, number each family record in accordance with the following system. The progenitor (immigrant or colonist or first known ancestor) is #1. His first child is #11, his second child is #12, and so on. Then, in the account of his second child's family, number the first child #121, the second #122, and so on. If a couple had more than nine children, be sure to insert hyphens (e.g., #121-11-341) to prevent confusion. This system is fine for work papers in an expanding compilation, but MUST be discarded when the genealogy is published. In a published genealogy, simply number each person in sequence as he appears in the compilation, placing a plus sign before those individuals for whom a separate record is provided.

#### CHARTS

6. While diagrams - if small - may be useful illustrations in a publication (if necessary to demonstrate complicated interrelationships), they are of little use to the serious genealogist. They provide no space for citing sources of information. They tend to become larger and larger until they become ridiculously large and cumbersome. Usually they convey nothing but names and relationships. An ancestral fan chart is useful in a bound volume of your ancestry, especially if each box is numbered to conform to the system described in paragraph 4 (above), but most serious genealogists eventually discard them because of the limited space for information about the earliest generations. A set of eight fan charts is usually required to include all the American generations of ancestry.

#### FILING and INDEXING

7. If your interest includes collecting all available data pertaining to a particular surname, arrange all information in loose-leaf binders and arrange families (or individuals) in alphabetical order by given name, then in chronological order for men with the same given name. As new information is found and identified with a particular individual, enter it on his record page. If the data cannot be related to a known individual, set up a new record page for the time being. Later, as the bits and pieces begin to make more sense, it may be possible to consolidate these miscellaneous record items.

Several devices are necessary to facilitate use of information in extremely large surname collections. Some are:

- a. Type the given name and (approximate) year of birth in the upper right corner of each page. This will help to locate needed pages in a large colliction.
- b. At the top of each record, after the full name of the person, describe the places of residence. This will help to locate a specific record when several men of the same name lived at the same time, but in different places.
- c. After the birth data and parentage (item 2.b above) insert the father's birth year in parentheses. This will help to locate the father's record in a large collection. Example: "Born Southington, Conn., 4 Fcb. 1711/12, son of Theophilus (1673) and Mary (Boyd) Jones."

d. When a surname collection becomes large enough to fill several binders, you will probably find need for indexes. Example: you read an inquiry for the parentage of a woman known to have been born in a specified town. You know you have records of a family of this surname in that town, but can't find it. The first index you will set up will be a place index. This can best be done on 3 x 5 cards because it is an expanding index not suitable for typing of sheets of paper. For each place card you should list the families residing there or having any connection with the town or county. List only the given name, birth year, and dates of residence. Example of a place index entry:

Southington, Hartford County, Conn.

ALPHEUS (1712) 1712-1747 (to Berlin, Conn.)
BENJAMIN (1792) 1850

The next index that will be most useful is an index of all given names of women in the collection. This also should be placed on 3 x 5 cards, arranged by given name of female, and including birth year, state of residence, and father's name and birth year and specific residence, if known.

Indexes to other surnames mentioned, and to sons for whom no further record is known, are of marginal utility and should be established only if time is available. The place and female indexes will serve most needs.

#### RESEARCH CHECKLISTS

8. Research checklists may be a useful device to assure that all possible sources of information have been checked. These are, however, work papers, and should not be incorporated into the family record pages. A checklist would remind the researcher of all the sources to be considered. Examples: census (by year), marriage records (by county), land records, probate records, church records, gravesuche inscriptions, etc., etc. The list can be extended greatly. An alternative method is to prepare a "to do" list of specific searches to be made. Example: a list for the National Archives might include specific census records for a certain year to be searched for particular names, or it might include pension claims (by War) to be sought. Then as each search is made the item may be crossed out on the search list.

#### BY-LAW CHANGES

#### ARTICLE V - MEMBERSHIP AND DUES

Section 1. Any individual, married couple, organization, or institution interested in promoting the objectives of the Society shall be deemed eligible for membership, subject to such limitations as the Society shall impose.

Section 2. The Society shall be composed of Annual, Life, and Honorary Life Members.

Section 3. Annual members are those paying dues for each calendar year; Life Members are those who have paid at one time such sum as the Society shall set as the Life Membership fee; Honorary Life Members are those whom the Society has elected to such status.

Section 4. Annual dues, the amount to be determined by the Council, shall apply to the current calendar year and are pryable upon election to membership and thereafter no later than the January meeting each year.

Section 5. Dues for married couples shall be one and one-half the amount of individual ques,

Section 6. Those who are delinquent after the regular meeting in February, whether held or not, shall be suspended from membership.

Section 7. Membership applications shall be submitted in writing, accompanied by the first year's dues, and shall be voted upon by the members at the next regular meeting of the Society.

Section 8. Any member may be dropped from membership by the Society for just cause, after an opportunity to be heard.

- Section 1. The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Society, shall be the official spokesman of the Society, shall preside at all meetings of the Society and the Council, and shall be an ex officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee.
- Section 2. The Vice President, during the absence or disability of the President, shall perform the duties of President. Furthermore, the Vice President shall discharge such other duties as may be requested by the President or prescribed by the Council.
- Section 3. The Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Society and the Council, shall have custody of all papers and reports ordered placed on file and of all documents and letters relating to the official business of the Society, and shall conduct the correspondence of the Society not otherwise provided for.
- Section 4. The Treasurer shall keep a current record of all active and former members of the Society, shall have custody of the funds of the Society, shall deposit them in such F.D. I.C. bank as directed by the Council, and shall make disbursements under the provisions of the approved budget or as directed by the Council. He shall keep full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements and shall render an annual written report.

#### ARTICLE VIII- COUNCIL

- Section 1. The Council shall consist of: the officers of the Society and the chairmen of the standing committees.
- Section 2. The Council shall have the control and management of the affairs of the Society, and shall establish the annual budget for the Society; it is subject to the will of the Membership and none of its acts shall conflict with action taken by the Membership.
- Section 3. The Council shall meet at least semiannually during the period from September to June inclusive and at such other times as necessity may demand, on call of the President, or on the written request of five general members, or three Councilors, at least three days notice having been given to each Councilor as to the time and place of said meeting.

#### ARTICLE VIII

- Section 4. A summary of the minutes of proceedings of each Council meeting shall be reported at the next regular meeting of the Society.
- Section 5. A quorum shall consist of a simple majority of the Councilors.

#### ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

- Section 1. The standing committees shall be: Program, Education, Records, and Publications.
- Section 2. The President shall appoint the chairmen of the standing committees with the approval of a majority of the officers.
- Section 3. The President shall appoint the members of the standing committees with the advice and consent of the respective chairmen,
- Section 4. The President shall appoint such ad hoc committees as may be necessary.

#### ARTICLE X - NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

- Section 1. At the regular meeting of the Society in October of each year, a Nominating Committee consisting of a chairman and three other members shall be appointed by the President with the advice and approval of the Council.
- Section 2. The committee shall nominate at least one candidate for each position as officer to be filled at the next election. They shall also nominate at least one candidate to perform the annual audit of the Society's treasury. The report of the committee shall be presented at the first regular meeting in November.
- Section 3. The election shall be held at the regular Pecember meeting. Other nominations may be accepted from the floor prior to the election. The consent of each nominee must have been obtained prior to his nomination.
- Section 4. All officers and the Auditor shall be elected by a majority vote cast by ballot and/or voice vote.
- Section 5. Officers shall be elected to serve for one calendar year; no elected officer shall be eligible for more than two consecutive terms in the same office.
- Section 6. If the number of officers is reduced to less than three, a special election shall be held to fill the unexpired terms of the vacated offices.

#### ARTICLE XI - MEETINGS

- Section 1. The Society shall meet in Prince George's County, Maryland, at least once each month in the period September to June inclusive on a day and place determined by the Council.
- Section 2. A quorum at any meetings of the Society shall consist of ten members in good standing, but any member who files a written vote on any question shall be considered as attending and be conneed in the quotum.



#### ARTICLE XI - MEETINGS

Section 3. The business arising at the meetings of the Society shall be transacted only if a quorum is present.

Section 4. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall govern the Society in all cases in which they are not inconsistent with the By-laws of the Society.

Section 5. At all regular meetings, the suggested order of business shall be as follows: (1) Introduction of new members and guests, (2) Correction of the minutes of the preceding meeting, (3) Report of the Council, (4) Report of the Secretary, (5) Report of the Treasurer, (6) Reports from Committee Chairmen, (7) Unfinished Business, (8) Election of New Members, (9) New Business, and (10) such lectures, instruction, exnibits, or entertainment as has been arranged by the Program Committee.

Section 6. The Auditor's report on the preceding year is due at the regular February meeting.

#### ARTICLE XIII - PUBLICATIONS

Section 1. The Society shall publish a monthly Bulletin to promote the objectives of the Society.

Section 2. The minutes and corrections thereto, the annual Treasurer's report, the budget, and the annual audit shall appear in the Bulletin.

Section 3. The nominating committee report shall appear in the issue prior to the election.

Section 4. Other publications may be undertaken as approved by the Council.

ARTICLE XIV - BY-LAWS REVIEW. There shall be a review made of the by-laws at least every five years.

# BOWIE HERITAGE WEEKEND

Bowie celebrates Heritage Weekend on Saturday, May 22 at Belair Mansion and on Sunday, May 23 at the Belair Stables Museum. On display will be heirlooms and treasures, many loaned by present-day descendants of the Ogles and by the Maryland Historical Society.

The OGLE family genealogy includes a number of Maryland governors, who resided in Belair Mansion, now being used as Bowie City Hall. The Mansion was built by Governor Samuel Cole in the early 1700°s. Saturday°s exhibit will include 18th century furniture, silver, china and miniatures. There will also be a two-century OGLE family Bible loaned by a descendant in Pennsylvania and other documents.

The Belair Stables Museum has a permanent exhibit of racing items which will be supplemented by many articles on loan for the day including an antique surrey. There are items relating especially to winning horses from the Belair Estate from "Selima", celebrated mare of the 1700's and matriarch of many thoroughbreds prominent in American racing through two 20th century triple crown winners "Gallant Fox" and "Omaha".

Two members of the P.G. County Genealogical Society are members of the Research and Tour Program Committee, which helped prepare these exhibits. Pev. Welsh has researched the Ogle Family and drawn a family tree for the descendants of Governor Samuel and Anne (Tasker) Ogle, This will be on display at the Mansion. Catherine Mayhew has worked on this committee.

The exhibits will be open from two to five p.m. both days. There is no charge for admission.

# SOME SUGGESTIONS FOR COPYING TOMBSTONE INSCRIPTIONS ANN SCHREINER HERBERT

A genealogist sconer or later partakes of the adventure of locating an ancestor's tombstone. If one is lucky the ancestor is buried in a nice, well-kept cemetery; however, more than often the ancestor is buried in an overgrown, briar filled plot.

Through the use of topographic maps (as mentioned in Vol. 2 No. 1 of the Newsletter) one can locate cemeteries. It should be mentioned that not all cemeteries appear on topographic maps. Sometimes the cemetery is so evergrown that it does not show from the ground or the air. County road maps are also very helpful. Shenandoah County, VA., for instance, marks all churches with a cross on its county map.

Certain materials are needed when one goes to a cemetery. I use a spiral bound notebook; however, clipboards are also useful. I also have found that the Flair pens are very good writing implements. Pencils wear down and in the winter, ½ mile from my car in a field, my ball point pen ink froze.

The stones should be copied in rows, if possible. I copy ALL data on stone except stock phrases such as "In mem, of" etc. I also leave out "sentiment" in verse at the bottom of the stone, unless it is unusual. If a part of the inscription cannot be read be sure and note this. If you assume part of the inscription, insert it in brackets.

When you come to a stone that cannot be deciphered, in my own experience, I have found that ladies dusting powder, bought from a dime store, works extremely well. Many genealogists use chalk but I prefer this method. You just "dust" the powder over the stone and the inscription stands out. This works on dark and white stones alike. However, on very white stones rubbing a little dirt over the stone usually works. NEVER DEFACE THE STONE; Use only materials that rain will wash away. If there is lichen on the stone, use a scraper or a putty knife. A wire brush can easily scratch the letters and numbers and perhaps change them. A small sickle is helpful to cut away brush so that you can see the stones.

Anyone who wishes to make a permanent record of a tombstone should use a Polaroid camera. This way you can tell if a print is usable before leaving the cemecery. Many people make "rubbings" of the stone.

When transcribing the inscriptions, I type them in the order they were copied. PROOFREAD, from the original. If you are planning to publish the cemeteries, large cemeteries can be alphabetized, but I believe small family cemeteries should be kept in the order copied; i.e. in rows. Also be sure and note two names on a stone with a + sign or some notation.



#### Tombstones continued

In large cemeteries smaller family plots that are enclosed by rails or fencing, within the cemetery, should also be noted.

If you find your ancestor in a small family plot, record all the stones in the cemetery, especially if the cemetery is in bad shape. Make copies and send them to a genealogical quarterly for publication and perhaps others may share your results.

### PHOTOGRAPHY -- A GENEALOGICAL ATD

A camera can be a very useful instrument for the genealogist. It is possible to record data from wills, deeds, book pages and gravestones in such a manner that they later can be minutely examined at home.

Also, the recorded image becomes acceptable proof in genealogical transactions. The photographics can be as simple as a Brownie camera or as lavish as a \$400.00 Nikon. Some manufacturers, such as Eastman Kodak Co. and General Aniline Film, offer inexpensive photocopying kits for these purposes. These kits are portable enough that they can be carried into homes for copying those records too valuable or cherished to be allowed from their hands.

Color print, black and white, and/or slide film can be used with these kits to give a wide variety of recorded images. One such kit, the Eastman Kodak Co., EKTAGRAPHIC VISUALMAKER, comes with flash cubes, copying stands and an <u>Instamatic 304</u> camera in a convenient carrying case. The uses of this kit are limited only by the imagination of the user.

#### COPYING -

- 1. Photographs Use black and white film for copying these. You can take the negative, crop out your favorite subject and enlarge for framing.
- 2. Documents since these papers are usually large in size, you'll need to take at least two pictures. Use slide film and view the document on a screen as large as 40 x 40. This magnifies for you that sometimes difficult-to-read early handwriting.

### PHOTOGRAPHY - continued

3. Material items - Grandfather Abner had a favorite buttonhook which Aunt Mae won't relinquish. Use the copying stand and snap a picture. Group your newspaper clippings together to make an 8 x 10 page. These, later, can be included in the genealogy you're intending to print.

Keep your camera ready just as you keep sharpened pencils handy -- you never know what you might encounter and want a visual image of. Have plenty of fresh film and flash cubes on hand and have a "snapping" summer.

## MARLENE ANN (TOWNE) TOWLE

Having always been interested in family genealogy, the spark fully ignited, when one day she realized that the identity of her paternal and maternal great grandparents was virtually unknown. She earnestly set about piecing together her family tree about four years ago. Because her "tree" is a bit too lopsided and the branches quite sparse, she is presently seeking data on branches with the surnames MOULTON, MURPHY, GALLANT, PARKINSON, KEEFE and FREETOE, all in the New Hampshire and Massachusetts area.

Marlene was born 17 September 1936 in Exeter, N.H.; educated in the public schools there and graduated from Robinson Female Seminary.

Her most ambitious project consists of collecting, organizing and indexing all available information of the TOWN(E) family in America. This family is derived primarily from the William Towne, who settled in Salem, Mass. ca. 1640. Three of his daughters, Rebecca Nurse, Mary Esty, and Sarah Bridges were accused of witchcraft, Rebecca and Mary being executed. Marlene's Towne Family collection presently includes about 640 families and continues to grow. It is very completely indexed; all children are indexed (except those who are known to have died young), as well as all spouses who married into or out of the Towne Family. The married women are all indexed under both their married and maiden name. If you have a Towne branch on your family tree, Marlene would like to know about it.

A man enlisting on 19 April 1814 for 5 years for services in the War of 1812 from Fayette Co., PA. was issued the following: One Cap, cockade and eagle, one pompoon, one coat, one vest, one pr. good overalls. One pr. garters, one pr. stockings, one pr. socks, one pr. shoes, one stock, one frock, two shirts, one blanket and one knapsack.

Answer: Usually refers to hydrociphalus, a congenital (birth) problem in which spinal fluid cannot escape through normal drainage channels from the brain -- leading to death at an early age.

## BEGINNER HANDBOOK

(This series has been planned to help the armchair researcher and new beginner. The experiences are based on knowledge gained the "hard knocks" route.)

# THE INITIAL EFFORT

by ELEANOR L. WATSON, E.B.\*

WHERE DO I BEGIN? Let us consider first the materials. A notebook, paper, pencils, curiosity, bath powder, perseverance and patience will do for a start. Look around you. You have, possibly, family momentoes, pictures and members of the family. Read through the article, SOME SUGGESTIONS FOR THE KEEPING OF GENEALOGICAL RECORDS, by George Ely Russell, C.G., in the March 1971 issue of this BULLETIN. It's very important to begin keeping records clearly at the beginning. After a few weeks or months, you will have collected too many miscellaneous scraps of paper to recopy records. It will also minimize the chances of error.

Gather the data from your immediate area -- the home. Begin with yourself and trace back carefully. Question your parents, friends of theirs and all available relatives. If you're given conflicting dates and/or places, record each until you find the proof. PROOF, I can't stress this enough. For each name, date and location, try NOW to collect the proof to verify. It'll cost a few dollars, but while you're waiting, the small-town court-house or repository might burn down or become flooded. Don't delay on questioning relatives and keep them posted on your findings. It may jog their memories further. With each name, obtain exact date and exact location. Some people have a village post office address, but their vital records were recorded by the township (New England and N.Y. for instance).

Inquire about Family Bibles, newspaper clippings and old photo albums. When copying Bibles, be sure to copy the title page showing publisher and date. This will help to verify the authenticity of the record. A Bible published in 1886, containing names and dates beginning in 1700, would not be considered good evidence. It's way before the owner's personal knowledge of the persons named. (By owner, I mean the one purchasing it in 1886) Record the name and date of newspaper from which clippings have been kept. You might luck out and find photos with names and dates on the back. It's rare, I admit, but you may be lucky.

Attend a lecture series on genealogy or acquire a good basic book. Your local library may have some to read before making a purchase. Many books will advise what records are available and where to find them for a specific state. Not all states record their information in the same places or in a like manner. In the February 1971 issue of this BULLETIN an article by Mr. George E. Russell, on MASIC MISLIOGRAPHY FOR MAKING A GENEALOGICAL LITERATURE SEARCH can be consulted along with the Member's Book Lists found in the August and September issues of this BULLETIN. These will give you title ideas.





# BEGINNER HANDBOOK continued

A Genealogical Institute is held at the National Archives, Washington, D.C., through a cooperative effort of the American University and the National Archives. Dr. Jean Stephenson and Mr. William Lind are the Directors. This is held for three weeks in July. Other groups, such as the YMCA and genealogical societies offer classes on this subject.

PLACE your newfound information on your paper. Make notations about your question areas.

# STEP OUTSIDE HOME

Has your family resided in your home area or nearby for several generations?

If so, explore the types of record centers in your town. Libraries are apt to have back issues of newspapers. Armed with death dates and your questions, look for obituaries. Some may be extremely helpful; others just a minimum. Remember the data on these records depended upon the reliability and knowledge of the informant.

Visit the town, village and/or cityclerk's office for vital records. In your immediate area you'll find churches they attended, city or town directories, undertaker's records and the cemeteries. Here's the need for bath powder. See <u>SOME</u> <u>SUGGESTIONS FOR COPYING TOMBSTONE INSCRIPTIONS</u>, by Ann Schreiner Herbert in the April 1971 issue of this BULLETIN.

Don't rush into these offices and state I'd like everything you have on my ancestor. You'll receive a cold shoulder and the UN-WELCOME mat for future trips. Noisy, active children should remain at home.

Next month we'll venture into the County Offices to see what types of records may be available. I'm generalizing, I know, but you will find detailed lists in good books. I just want to put you into the various offices. From there, common sense and helpful people will guide your way further. If you have questions, don't hesitate to ASK.

# County Repositories

Records held in the counties will vary from state to state. You'll need to check your particular area for the exact record holdings. One point to remember is ---that your ancestor may seem to have moved a bit. Perhaps not, it may have been that the county lines changed and/or larger counties divided. Acquire background data on the county you are researching.

Ask for directions in using indices in the Deed offices, the location of the volumes and whether you may utilize them unassisted. With sincerity and politeness showing, the clerk's disposition brightens. They may offer to show a host of other records not commonly found there.

The deeds should not be overlooked. You may find the wife's maiden name, the area your ancestor moved from, names of children, etc. You can check the disposal of the property to see if the ancestor moved on to another area or died leaving it to members of the family.

You've searched indices, found your people, let's abstract. them properly for future use. Copy the book and page no. first. Then list date of deed, grantee and grantor with their residences, amount of land sold and for what amount, and its exact location. Note whether it's signed with a mark x or actual signature and copy witnesses' names and recording date.

It saves time later if you remember to copy the above information the first time. When working with the earlier records, remember the styles of handwriting are different and harder to read. The spelling of names differs from year to year. The recording date is important. You may note in some cases there is a gap of ten years between the actual date of the deed and its recording.

# LOCAL HISTORY

# HISTORY OF BELAIR ESTATE 1691-1971

The original estate, called "Catton", was patented from Lord Calvert by Robert Carvile in 1681. In 1719 the Rev. Jacob Henderson, who established Holy Trinity Espiscopal Chapel and who had married into wealth, purchased the land and named it "Bell Air". Throughout all of the old records, Belair is spelled many ways including Bell Air, Belle Air and Belair.

In March 1737 Rev. Henderson sold the land to two partners, Benjamin Tasker and Samuel Ogle. In August of 1737 Governor Ogle bought Tasker's half. Samuel Ogle was a bachelor when he came to the colonies in 1731 as the Royal Governor. At the time of his marriage in 1741 he was 47 years old and his wife Anne Tasker, daughter of Benjamin and Anne (Bladen) Tasker, was eighteen.

Benjamin Tasker, while Ogle was in England between terms of office, supervised the construction of Belair Mansion which was completed in 1743. The completed house was what is today the center section of the mansion, less the two hyphens a d wings. Later Samuel Ogle added an ell on the east side which held offices, servant quarters, and kitchens. (The ell was removed when the present wings were added around 1900 by James Woodward.)

Governor and Mrs. Ogle lived in the grand manner with liveried outriders to protect them as they rode in their coach emblazoned with the Ogle coat-of-arms. He acquired considerable surrounding land including Enfield Chase until Belair was 3600 acres. Six hundred of these were reserved as a deer park and there was also a private racetrack and kennels. Samuel Ogle served three terms as the Royal Governor, was fired once, but was back after a short absence to serve until his death in 1752. Benjamin Tasker served as interim governor from May 1752 until August 1753.

When Samuel Ogle died after a lingering illness, his will directed that certain articles and land parcels of the estate be sold with the proceeds used to give his only surviving son, three year old, Benjamin, a "good English education". Ogle appointed Benjamin Tasker, Sr., the boy's grandfather, and Benjamin Tasker, Jr., the boy's uncle, joint executors of the will and guardians of the boy.

The Taskers shipped young Ogle off to England when he was ten, but they did not dispose of the estate. Instead, Benjamin Tasker, Ir., (now become Colonel Tasker) moved in. He eliminated the deer park, built fences, developed orchards and vineyards, and planted the two rows of poplar tulip trees along the great avenue leading to the mansion. He continued the reputation of Belair in the horse wo 1d, importing, breeding, and racing thoroughbreds. As trustees, the Ta kers purchased more land (including the area known as "Larkin's Forrest", purchased from heirs of Nicholas Ridgely in 1756) and added it to the estate. In 1760 Colonel Tasker died and Benjamin, Sr., took control until June 1968 when he died. In 1769 the estate of the late "Honorable Benjamin Tasker" was advertised for sale; it was called "Bell-Air" and totalled some 2177 acres including the mansion.

Benjamin Ogle, at age 21, returned to Maryland in 1770 and found the estate in the hands of the Tasker daughters and their wealthy husbands. His mother, also a Tasker daughter, was living there. Benjamin Ogle sued for his inheritance, asking for the return of the estate or money; the courts awarded him the estate. Benjamin Ogle became a gentleman farmer, living at Belair and the townhouse in Annapolis. He was elected governor of the State in 1798, which position he held until 1801. He died in 1809 on his farm near Annapolis and was buried there.

His son, Penjamin Ogle II took over the estate at Belair. He had fourteen children and died in 1844. Two of his sons, Richard Lowndes Ogle and George Cooke Ogle divided the estate with one receiving the mansion and one another house located where Kenilworth Elementary School is now. (Richard's wife was Priscilla Machall Bowie, who died in 1859 leaving seven children under ten. She was the only Bowie to live in the mansion.) ((To be continued in next issue))

The Program Committee has done a fine job this year in presenting a mixture of educational and entertaining speakers from within and from outside our society. In January Dwight Cavanagh, one of our members, spoke on the facilities at the Hall of Records in Annapolis; he gave an excellent account of their holdings and how they are accessed. George Russell, our Immediate Past President, spoke in February on how to conduct a literature search in a systematic manner. In conjunction with this presentation he prepared a bibliography of basic reference works which was subsequently published in the BULLETIN. speaker in March was Mr. Robert Barnes of the Maryland Genealogical Society. Mr. Barnes had earlier given us a very informative description of the genealogical research facilities in Baltimore, and this year returned to present an illustrated talk on Heraldry, a subject of special interest to him. Mr. P. William Filby. Librarian of the Maryland Historical Society, described some of his experiences in compiling the annotated bibliography, "American & British Genealogy & Heraldry" at our April meeting. His book has quickly become one of the more porular basic reference works. At the May meeting Mary K. Meyer, Genealogist of the Maryland Historical Society, gave an entertaining and educational description of the problems faced by genealogical The June meeting featured two members of our librarians. scciety; Ann Herbert gave a fine account of the research facilities available for research in Virginia records, and Lleanor Watson presented a brief demonstration on how photography can be used as an aid to genealogical research. Following the summer vacation

the September meeting found Dwight Cavanagh speaking to us again, this time on his research into the life and times of Dr. Edward Gantt, an 18th century physician in Prince George's As part of his presentation Dr. Cavanagh gave some valuable insights into the special references to be considered when researching medical men. Milton Rubincam, a very prominent genealogist and a new member of our society, presented a fine talk in October in which he touched on many facets of American and European genealogy, especially noting some of the pitfalls to be avoided. The November meeting featured Raymond Clark, editor and publisher of the "Maryland and Delaware Genealogist", a quarterly source record journal, speaking on the trials and tribulations of that undertaking. He also spoke extensively on the availability of source records for Maryland and Delaware A workshop was held at the December meeting. Introductory remarks were presented by two of our members, Barbara Dash and Shirley Wilcox, after which the group broke up into separate tables, based on geographic area or length of experience, for consultation with some of our more experienced members.

The Publications Committee has done an excellent job this year in building the BULLETIN into a very useful periodical. In addition to performing some very necessary housekeeping chores, such as providing notices of our meetings and other activities, a number of informative articles have appeared in the BULLETIN this year; among them are George Russell's suggestions on record keeping, Ann Herbert's article on tombstone copying, and Eleanor. Watson's series on how to get started in genealogy. The publication of the ancestor tables of all our members will be of benefit to all of us, and we urge all of you to support that project.

The Education Committee has been busy this year on several projects. They collaborated with the Publications Committee to get out the June-July Query issue of the BULLETIN which will prove valuable to all of us for several years. A similar collaboration resulted in the publication of the bibliography of genealogical books our members have in their private libraries, and which they are willing to share with other members of the society. That should also prove to be of long term value. The Education Committee has also prepared free beginner's packets consisting of free genealogical material garnered from a variety of sources. The committee has also made available at each meeting, at cost, a number of very useful, inexpensive booklets. Both the beginner's packets and booklets have proved to be very popular with our members and their guests.

Other activities this year have included deed abstracting by the Records Committee, a review and revision of cur By-laws by an ad hoc committee, a field trip to the Library of Congress, and an Open House at the President's home in July.

Several of our members have received recognition or made noteworthy contributions to genealogy this year. George Russell was appointed Editor of the National Genealogical Society Quarterly; Ann Herbert has seen many of her tombstone inscriptions from Shenandoah County, Virginia published in the National Genealogical Society Quarterly; Eleanor Watson received her certification as a genealogist; Barbara Dash has taught an introductory course in genealogy at the Beltsville YMCA, and Shirley Wilcox and Jacqueline Klause attended the annual Genealogical Institute course offered by American University. The Bowie YMCA has tentatively scheduled a course in Beginning Genealogy to be held on Wednesday evanings beginning January 19. This course will last eight weeks. Look for news of this in the local newspapers.

Local History - Belair Estate - continued from November 1971 In 1857 George Ogle sold out his share to Maria Jackson.

In 1852 Richard Ogle took out a mortgage from his rich uncle William Henry Tayloe of Virginia, indicating the estate was running into financial difficulties. The Civil War depression and the loss of an extensive stable of slaves caused further problems. A second mortgage was taken out in 1870 from Mary B. Sprigg and a third in 1871 from John T. and Richard Hardisty. Also in 1871 Richard sold 550 acres to Thomas T. Mumford and H. A. Tayloe; in 1867 Richard had inherited the estate of Richard Belt Mullikin which he also sold in 1870. The rich uncle meanwhile died in 1871, and his heirs then proceeded to foreclose on all of his extensive outstanding loans. In 1873 Thomas T. Mumford purchased Richard's half of Belair from Walter T. Bowie and Charles H. Stanley, trustees. Thus Belair fell into the hands of the Tayloe heirs and tenant farmers occupied the mansion for the next half dozen years.

The voungest of the fourteen children of Benjamin Ogle II was a spinster, Rosalie Ogle. She had been promised a room for life in the mansion under the will of her father. In the mortgage sales the court upheld this testamentary order. But when the tenant farmers moved in, she petitioned the courts for relief, saying she could not live in a house with people so far below her station. She won a cash sattlement and moved to Baltimore, wich her brothers, George and Richard.

In 1977 the Rutter family bought the estate from the Tayloe heirs. They held it until 1892 when 403 acres were sold by Fannie C. Rutter, Wilbur F. Rutter, and John A. Cooper to Jasher C. Shriner at auction to settle the estate. In 1892 it was purchased by Christian Bachman Herr who in turn sold it at auction to Benjamin N. Hardesty in 1896.

The Woodward era began in 1898 when Bel Air, then 371-4/10 acres, was sold by Benjamin Hardesty and Sallie, his wife, to James T. Woodward, Jr. of Anne Arundel Co., Maryland, and New York. About 1900 he added the present hyphens and wings to the mansion. When James Woodward died in 1910 as a bachelor, his nephew William Woodward, Sr. inherited the estate. He purchaced many parcels of land which had been part of the original estate and continued to breed and race horses in the old custom. When he died in 1953, his son, William Woodward, Jr. inherited. After the tracic death of his son in 1955, the Belair estate with the mansion was put up for sale with the brochure describing the land as over 2000 acres.

Finally, in 1967, after a court battle, William Levitt bought the estate and donated the mansion to the City of Bowie, which it now uses as a city hall. Mr. Levitt also developed and sold over 7000 homes on this historic estate.

# INSTRUCTIONS FOR PREPARING YOUR ANCESTOR TABLE

- 1. See the sample first page of an ancestor table. This shows how to title, arrange, and type your ancestor table. (See page 116 of the October BULLETIN)
- 2. Your children (if any) are listed after #1, the oldest child first. If you have no children, omit this line entirely.
- 3. You and your spouse are numbers 2 (man) and 3 (woman).
- 4. Type the surname in all capital letters. Include birth and death years in parentheses following each name.
- 5. Include the primary place of residence(s) for each man, but limit to a single line.
- 6. Include places of residence for wives only if different from husband's.
- 7. Notice that you double the number for a person's father; add one to that for the mother.
- 8. Separate each reneration by a line.
- 9. If a year is estimated, insert a "c" (to denote circa, about).
- 10. Do not show any doubtful or questionable information. If you don't know, for example, a wife's maiden name, leave it blank.
- 11. Insert an asterisk after any entry if you don't know that person's parents.
- 12. Omit entries for ancestors not yet identified; but skip a line to show these gaps.
- 13. Continue, generation by generation, as far back as you can trace the ancestry. But remember not to list any but proven ancestors. Don't guess!
- 14. You can use these numbers for your family record sheets. This is a standardized numbering system in widespread use in the field. Many of the ancestor 'fan charts' follow the same scheme of numbering.
- 15. Keep a master ancestor table current by inserting newly found data, retyping pages when enough new information has been found.
- 16. If you duplicate a supply of these tables and send them to your genealogical correspondents, they may be able to help with a specific family.
- 17. Give one clear copy of your table to Eleanor Watson, Editor, for publication in the Society's periodical.
