PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY WILL BOOK 1, 1698-1770

Abstracted by Donald L. Wilson

(Continued from v. 19, no. 9 [May 1988])

MCW = Maryland Calendar of Wills, by Jane Baldwin Cotton (8 v., 1906-1928)

Page 162. [MCW 6:26] Will of Richard PILES, being very sick and weake in body. Date: 10 Apr. 1727. Imprimis: To my brother Leonard PILES what was left me by my father in his last will and testament as allooe I bequeath unto Leonard all my household goods and moveables when my lawful debts and funerall charges are payd. Signed: Richard PILES. Wit: Robert ORAM, Jane (±) ORAM, Francis (FM) MEE[? MCW: MEO], John CARROLL.

Proved 24 Apr. 1727 by the oaths of Robert ORAM, Jno. CARROLL. Before Thos. BROOKE Jr., Depty Com[missa]ry of PG Co. (2-1/2 sides)

NOTES: This Richard PILES seems to have died young and unmarried. See the will of his father, Francis PILES Sr., below, for particulars about the family. Jane and Robert ORAM were his sister and brother-in-law.

Pages 162-163. [MCW 6:10] Will of Solomon STIMTON of PG Co, planter, being weak in body. Date: 9 Jan. 1726/7. Item: To my son Solomon STIMTON 30 pounds ster. bill of exchange to be paid after my deceas. Item: To my son Benjamin STINTON 50 acres lyeing at that and where he now dwelleth and to my sd. Benjamin STIMTON 30 pounds sterling soon after my deceas. Item: To my son in law Will'm ELDER one cow and calf. Item: to my son in law Thomas ELDER one cow and calf. [Page 163] To my son Jeremiah STINTON and my daughter STINTON [sic] and my daughter Sarah STINTON and my derely beloved wife Elizabeth STINTON all my goods catles chattles and movables to be equally divided between my wife and my daughters Mary [? scratch on film] STINTON and Sarah STINTON. Item: To my daughter Anne five pounds to be paid soon after my decease. Item: To my beloved wife Elizabeth STINTON my right of that track of land with Charles BEVINS to her and her heirs forever, in cas[e] any of my children dy before the[y] come of age, it [=each's share] shall be equally divided amongst all my children. I appoint my dearly beloved wife to be my exector. Signed: Solomon (SS) STINTON. Wit: Thomas CHARTUR, [Paul TALBART? thus MCW, scratch on film], Elizabeth (E) MORRIS.

Proved 26 Jany. 1726/7; Paul TALBART[?] and Eliza: MORRIS depose on the holy Evangelist that they saw Solomon STIMSON the testator sign. Before Thos. BROOKE Jr., Depty Comry of PG Co. (3-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Among possible immigrant ancestors for Solomon STIMTON/STIMSON are: George STINTON (transported 1677), Richard STINTON (1665), John STINSON (1659), John STINSON (1674), William STINSON (1667) [Skordas, Early Settlers of Maryland]. John STINSON's will in Anne Arundel Co, 1688, mentions wife Rachel, son John, daughters Rachel and Comfort [MCW 2:]. Solomon STIMPSON is found in various PG Co. court records from 1696. In 1699 he was sentenced to the stocks for drinking and fighting [Court Records of PG Co, Md, 1696-1699, p.460]. The testator as Solomon STIMTONE was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred, 1719 [Calendar of Maryland State Papers: the Black Books (BB):164]. It appears to be the son, Solomon STIMSON who was taxed in Mount Calvert Hundred that year [BB:159] and in 1733 [BB:270]. Thomas CHARTERS and Paul TALBOTT were taxed in Upper Piscattaway Hundred, 1733 [BB:268]. Thomas and William ELDER were in Mount Calvert Hundred, 1733 [BB: 269]. Benjamin STIMPSON was in Upper Piscattawy Hundred, 1733 [BB:268]. Jeremiah

(over)

was probably not of age by that date, but by ca. 1744 Jeremiah STIMSON was a petitioner in upper PG Co [BB:461].

Jer: STIMSON was a soldier from PG Co, 1748 [Clark, Colonial Soldiers of the South, p.24]. A Jeremiah STIMPSON, perhaps a later generation, with wife Rachel, had sons registered in Prince George's Parish [now Montgomery Co.]: Erasmus 1762, Solomon 1765. A Capt. Solomon STIMPSON, age 40 [b. ca. 1736] lived in Sugarland Hundred in 1776 [Brumbaugh, Maryland Records], is perhaps a grandson. A Benjamin STIMPSON was allowed to chose his guardian in Nov. 1744, indicating he was b. ca. 1730; he may be the son of Benjamin STIMTON (the son) whose will was probated in PG Co, 1734, witnessed by Solomon STIMTON [MCW 7:114]. [Smith, Orphans and Infants of PG Co.]

Of the possible candidates for the father of Solomon STIMPSON, the one I find most likely is William STIMPSON, carpenter, the only other person of that surname to appear in PG court minutes 1696-1699. He may be the William STINSON who was transported in 1667. Solomon, probably born in the 1670s, would be the right age to be his son. No probate for William has been sought, though it is known he left no will.

Pages 163-164. [MCW 6:26] Will of Francis PILES Senr., being sick and weak in body. Date: 23 May 1726. Item: To my son James tenn shillings. Item: To my son John five shillings. Item: To my son Francis five shillings. Item: To my dafter Elizabeth forty shillings. To my dafter Ann five shillings. Item: To my dafter Jane tenn shillings. Item: To my son Rich'd a parcel of land containing 77 akers more or less being part of "Cockolds pint" near the mouth of the western branch of Patoxen [=Patuxent] River and on the west side of sd. branch, to him and lawfully begotten Ears [=heirs] forever and if my son Rich'd dies without ears then I give the sd pasel [=parcel] to my son Leonard and his ears forever, and if my son Leonard dies without ears then to my daffers Elizabeth and her ears forever. Item: To my son Lenord the dwelling place where I live and all my land containing therto it being 150 akers more or less, itt being part of a track called "Crime" [?] unto him and his lawfall begotten ears forever. [MCW calls plantation "Come unto him"] and if my son Lenord died without ears then Item [sic] I give said land part of "the Crim" to my dafter Jane and her ears forever and if my dafter Jane should be left disalate [=desolate] of a home when her husband Rob't AROME [=ORAM] dies then I give her 40 akers of land to be set out at the upper[?] end of the sd land to my son Lenord during her life. Item: To my sons Lenord and Richard all my personal moveable catall to be eakqually devided when my legacies and debts are pade and what cattel and hogs and one flock bead [=bed] my son Rich'd has shall be praised [=appraised] with the rest of my personal estate and I make my son Lenord executer. Signed: Francis (P) PILES Senr. Wit: John (D) DEAKINS, Will'm RIDGLY, John BLACKWOOD.

[Page 164] Proved 24 Apr. 1727 by oaths of John DEACON and John BLACKWOOD. Before Thos. BROOKE Jr, Depty Comry PG Co. (6-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Francis PILES witnessed a deposition of Ninian BEALL, 1696, PG Co. [Court Records, p.6]; he served on juries 1697 [p.166+], and was rewarded for killing wolves, 1697 and 1698 [ibid.]. He does not appear among land records in PG Co, 1696-1702. Frank PILE witnessed the will of John SUMMERS, PG Co, 1703 [MCW 3:86]. Franses PILE was taxed in Mt. Calvert Hundred, 1719 [BB:159]. Richard PILES was in Collington Hundred that same year [BB:163].

John PILES was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred 1719 [BB:164] and in Upper Piscattaway Hundred in 1733 [BB:268]. John and Mary PILES had the following children registered in King George's Parish: Hunter 1721, Mary 1722, William 1724, John 1728, and Thomas Richard 1729. John PILES (the father) apparently died before 1735 when his son Hunter PILES "aged about 16" chose Leonard PILES his guardian [Smith, Orphans and Infants, p.84].

James, Leonard, and Francis PILES were taxed in Mt. Calvert Hundred in 1733 along with a Mrs. PILES [BB:269]. Another Mrs. PILES of uncertain identity lived in Collington Hundred in 1733 [BB:265]. That Mrs. PILES in Collington Hundred is likely the widow of a William PILE who m. Elizabeth HUTCHINSON, 1723 in Queen Anne Parish, and had children registered there: Richard 1726/7 and William 1729. Their connection with Francis is not clear, though the name Richard indicates a kinship.

The plantation in question is probably "Cream", a tract in Collington and Western Branch Hundred [1828 Tax List, PG Co, p.104-5].

William PILES died before 1743 when his sons Richard (age 16) and William (age 14) chose George PARKER their guardian [Smith, Orphans and Infants, p.85].

The earliest PILE family I identified in Maryland is that of John PILE, who emigrated with his family in 1642 [Skordas, p.363].

Page 164 [MCW 6:36] Will of John DEMALL of PG Co, sick of body. Date: 8 Apr. 1726. To be buried at the descretion of my well beloved wife Mary DEMALL whom I appoint sole executrix. Imprimis: All my just debts and funerall charges to be paid without suit of law or trouble by my well beloved wife Mary DEMALL whom I leave as above mentioned. Item: My now dwelling plantation with all the land thereunto belonging or any that belongs to me elsewhere to my well beloved wife Mary DEMALL to her and her disposing forever. Item: To my well beloved wife Mary DEMALL all my personall estate both heare and in great Brittaine upon the sea or elsewhere to her and her disposing forever. Item: I doe desire my cosen Robert POTTENGER to assist my well beloved wife Mary DEMALL in the performance of this my last will... Signed: John DEMALL. Wit: Brock MOCKBEE, Thomas (+) WOOD, Robt. POTTENGER.

Proved 28 June 1727 by oaths of Robert POTTENGER, Brock MOCKBEE and Thomas WOOD. Before Pet[er] DENT, D' Comry, PG Co. (3-1/2 sides)

NOTES: As early as 1696, John DEMALL (also DEMIALL and DOMALL) appears in PG Co. court records. He was subpoenaed along with John POTTINGER (also POR-RINGER) as witnesses in a case [Court Records of PG Co, Md, 1696-1699, p.12+]. He also served on juries 1696-1699. John DEMALL was appointed constable for Collington Hundred, 1697 [p.282]. John DEMALL and wife Mary sold 109 acres, "Greenfield", in 1700, part of "Something" formerly surveyed for 200 acres [PG Deeds A:211]. Jno. DEMALL witnessed the will of William SHILLITOES, PG Co. 1704 [MCW 3:48]. In 1705, John DEMALL and wife Mary donated land for a church in Queen Anne's Parish, part of their tract called "Something" [Hienton, PG's Heritage, p.76]. In 1706/7, Mary DEMALL was a deponent in the case of Her Majesty vs. Richard PILE for the barbarous treatment of his servant [BB:47. This is perhaps a different man than the testator shown above? A Doctor PILE(S) appears in the PG records about this time]. John DEMALL is not found in the published tax lists for 1719, but I think he has been misread as John DEVALL who was taxed in Collington Hundred 1719 [BB:163]. Mrs. DEMALL was taxed in Collin. Hundred 1733 [BB:265]. DEMALL apparently left no children.

Robert POTTINGER, the "cousin" (probably a nephew), was born 1694/5, son of John and Mary POTTINGER, and his birth was registered in Queen Anne's Parish. He was married there, 1718, to Ann EVANS. John POTTINGER was probably a brotherin-law to John DEMALL. Whether POTTINGER married DEMALL's sister or vice versa is not clear to me. I find a John DEVALL who was transported to Maryland in 1665, as well as a Peter DEMALL that same year [Skordas p.130,132].



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SEPTEMBER MEETING

At the September meeting, Certified Genealogist and FGCGS Past President Shirley Wilcox spoke on "Record Keeping." She said that the system one uses is personal but should be one that makes information easy to find, includes the source of each item, and is cross referenced wherever it is appropriate. She described her own record keeping system and brought several examples.

Mrs. Wilcox uses family group sheets, a chronology of events (time line) for each person, a surname research log with well documented sources for each group sheet notation (cross referenced), files of correspondence, and copies of maps, deeds and other legal papers. Records are kept in binders and file folders and subdivided as a file grows. A standard numbering system is a must for anyone planning to publish. She urged us to slow down and carefully document each discovery in detail so that we or anyone else can go to the same repository and find the same item. Finally, she said that she follows each research session with updating and cross referencing family group sheet information and then itemizes plans for her next foray.

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DUES CORRECTION

As you are well aware, the dues for the Society were recently increased. The Council approved a \$10.00 rate for individuals and \$14.00 for couples. However, our Bylaws require that dues for couples be one-and-one-half times the individual rate. Consequently, the correct rates are \$10.00 for individuals and \$15.00 for couples. OCTOBER PROGRAM

The Prince George's County Genealogical Society (PGCGS) will meet on Wednesday, October 5, 7 to 9 pm, in the Public Library at 11 Crescent Road. Greenbelt, Marviand. Our speaker will be Wynell Burroughs Schamel who will discuss "The Use of Personal Family Official Documents." Mrs. Schamel will focus on the ways teachers and individuals may use personal family official documents to 1) create an historical laboratory, 2) practice critical thinking skills, and 3) generate interest and appreciation for ones own personal and collective past. She will bring a sampling of documents and illustrate their teaching and learning potential. She has undergraduate and graduate degrees from the University of Alabama and taught for 22 years in the public schools in Tuscaloosa, Alabama where she served as chairperson of the Humanities Department at Tuscaloosa High School for 10 years and teacher/director of the American Studies Center for 3 1/2 years.

MCW = Maryland Calendar of Wills, by Jane Baldwin Cotton (8 v., 1906-1928)

Pages 164-165. [MCW 6:36] Will of William ELLIOT [ELLIT?, MCW: ELLIOT] of PG Co, being sick and weake in body. Date: 2 August 1727. First: My soul to Almighty God ... Secondly: All my just debts be paid and my body may be Christianly buried accord[in]g to the discretion of my Executrix. Thirdly: To my loving wife Mary ELLIOT all my estate both reall and personall (let it be what parts of the world soever) to her and her heirs forever, making her the said Mary ELLIOT the whole and sole executrix. Signed: William ({X}) ELLIOT. [Page 165] Wit: Walter BAYNES, Tho: PHILIPS, Richard BLEW.

Proved 29 August 1727 [MCW: 19 August] by oaths of Walter BAYNES, Thomas PHILLIPS and Richard BLUE, before Pet[er] DENT, Dep[u]ty Com[missa]ry, PG Co. (3-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Judging from her will, p.167 (see below), William ELLIOT's wife Mary was apparently the widow of Henry BRAWNER of Charles Co, Md. (d. 1698). Another William ELLIOTT d. 1713 in Charles Co. leaving a will mentioning wife Joane, son William, and a Susannah JUDD [MCW 3:239]. Among the many ELLIOTs who immigrated to Maryland were William ELLIOTTs in 1640, 1614 [sic], and 1650 [the latter of Isle of Kent where he left many descendants]; also William ELL<u>ITT</u>, 1676 [Skordas, *Early Settlers of Maryland*, 1633-1680, p.149]. A Walter ELL<u>OT</u> left a will in PG Co, 1703, but his wife was his sole legatee [MCW 3:30]. William ELLIOT of PG Co, planter, bought 220 acres called "St. John's" formerly in Charles Co, 1697 [PG Deeds A:60A]. William ELLIT was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred, 1719, along with Walter BAYNE [*Calendar of Maryland State Papers, the Black Books* (BB):164]. Richard BLUE was taxed in Lower Piscattaway Hundred, PG Co, 1733 [BB:270].

Page 165-6. [MCW 6:36] Will of Notley ROZER of PG Co, being indisposed in body. Date: 6 Apr. 1727. My whole estate both reall and personall be kept together in the hands and possession of my deare and loving wife Elizabeth ROZER, til all my just debts are paydperticulerly what I owe to Mes'rs John HYDE and Comp'a[ny] Merc[han]ts in London, and when these debts are complyed w'th It is my desire and I do hereby give & bequeath to my dear son Henry ROZER the tract I now live on called "Admirathorid" [MCW: Admirathoree/Admirathoria; "a" looks like "u" in this name] with all the improvements thereunto belonging to him and his heirs. Item: To my dear daughter Ann ROZER after my just debts are complyed with as afsd. all that tract called "Dunnington" to her and heir heirs. Item: The remainder of my estate reall and personall to be equally divided amongst all my children as well y't [=that] my wife is now big with as those now living, to them and their heirs forever. Item: My loving wife Elizabeth ROZER to be whole and sole executrix. Signed: Notley ROZER. Wit: Henry DARNALL, John "HETENHALL, Dan'll WATTS.

Codicil: Whereas I have lately sett up severall tracts or parcells of land, Negroes, and other goods in a lottery whereby I proposed to raise the sum of two thousand pounds sterll[in]g to discharge my debt due upon bond and mortgage to Mes'rs John HYDE & Comp'a merch'ts in London w'ch lottery is now allmost filled and compleated, but being apprehensive that my death may occasion some lett or

interruption in the prosecution of this design as there is no body impowered by my will of the same date with these presents to make a title to the Adventurers of such a part of the fores[ai]d estate as shall fall to their lott, upon the drawing of the sd lottery. I do therefore by this codicil confirm my sd will & further impower authorize will & request my good friends Mess'rs Tho's ADDISON and Charles DIGGES or either of them to convey and make over unto such the adventurers as aforesaid, who shall have any prises [=prizes] in the said lottery, an estate in fee to them & their heirs forever of such chance as shall fall to their lott in as good Authorities and ample a manner in law as I could or might have [Page 166] done if I had been living. And whatever sum or sums of money shall arrise by the drawing of the fores'd lottery I do thereby empower will and require my fores'd friends Mess'rs Tho's ADDISON and Charles DIGGES to remit to the sd. Mess'rs Jn'o HYE & Comp'y to be applied towards the dischare of the debts due from me to them upon my bond & mortgage as afores'd & no part of it to be applyed to any other use whatever. Date: 6 April 1727. Signed: Notley ROZER. Wit: Henry DARNALL, Henry WHETENHALL, John WHETENHALL.

Proved 5 August 1727 by oath of John WHETENHALL [only]. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry PG Co. (7-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Charles Co. court minutes show "Mr. Benjamin ROZER records the age of his sonne Notley ROZER who was borne the first day of July 1673." [Archives of Md. 60:510] Gov. Thomas NOTLEY of St. Mary's Co, Md, in his will, 1679, devised "Cerne Abbey" (called "Cerneabdy Manor" in MCW 1:211) to his godson Notley ROZER, son of Benjamin ROZER [See Bowie, Across the Years in PG Co, Md, p.571-574 for an article about the "Notley-Rozer families". Some of the information there about the ancestry of Notley ROZER seems confused or questionable]. Benjamin ROZER apparently had a dau. Mary b. 6 Apr. 1675 [Bowie, p.571]. He immigrated to Md. 1663, was transported 1668-9, and (as Col. Benjamin ROZER) "got rights" 1679 [Skordas, p.399]. Benjamin ROZER, Esqr., is identified as merchant, justice, and councillor [index to Arch. Md. v.69]. He d. 1681 [Arch. Md. 70:1,46,112], between 26 Apr. and 4 Oct. On 12 Oct. 1682, Edward PYE late of St. Mary's Co, and Ann his wife, administratrix of Benjamin ROZER of Charles Co, gent., who died intestate, were summoned to furnish a bond of 10,000 pounds for his estate [ibid. p.276]. Ann (ROZER) PYE is identified as next relative of Major Nicholas SEWALL of St. Mary's Co, 1686 [Fresco, Marriages and Death, St. Mary's Co, Md, 1634-1900, p.244]. Although it is clear that Benjamin ROZER m. Ann, dau. of Henry and Jane (LOWE) SEWALL, from the evidence I've seen Ann SEWALL was b. ca. 1660/3, and is therefore too young to be the mother of Notley ROZER. Benjamin ROZER apparently was married once before, perhaps to a relative of Gov. NOTLEY.

Nottly ROZIAR (or Notly ROZER) of Charles Co, gent., sold 130 acres, part of "Admirothona" in PG Co, at the head of Broad Creek, bounding on the Potomac River, in 1700 [PG Deeds A:289]. At the same time he gave neighboring "Roziar's Gift" (159 ac.), part of 2500 ac. "Admirothona" to William CLARKSON and wife Ruth [ibid A:290]. No wife releases her dower on those deeds. Notley ROZER is called brother in the will of Edward DIGGES, 1714, PG Co; Notley received 1000 ac. "Elizabeth's Delight"; DIGGES' niece and goddaughter Eliza: ROZER is also mentioned [MCW 4:9-10]. I conclude that Notley ROZER's first wife was Jane, daughter of William and Elizabeth (SEWALL) DIGGES, and sister of Edward DIGGES. In Col. William DIGGES' will, 1695, his daughter Jane in unmarried; by 1705, when the widow Elizabeth DICCES made her will, Charles Co, her daughter is called Jane ROZER [Bowie, p.249]. Elizabeth SEWALL) DIGGES was a sister of Anne (SEWALL) ROZER, adding to the unlikelihood that Anne was Notley's mother. In the 1719 tax lists, a Mr. RORER was taxed in Rock Creek Hundred, PG Co [BB:158], although no ROZER is found in the printed list. Col. Thomas ADDISON was taxed in New Scotland Hundred [BB:157],1719. Charles DIGGES in Upper Piscattaway Hundred, and Lower Piscattaway Hundred, 1733 [BB:268,270].

October 1988

In June 1727, Anne ROZER (dau. of Mr. Notley ROZER decd) about 16 years of age, chose her uncle Mr. William DIGGES, Gent., as her guardian [Smith, Orphans and Infants of PG Co, p.92]. She would have been born ca. 1711. An account of Notley ROZER's estate, 1728, names his [minor] heirs as Elizabeth, Catherine, Henry "the eldest about six years." Edward DIGGES' niece named Elizabeth apparently died before her father. These three children are the children of Notley's second wife Elizabeth, sister of Dr. John WHETENHALL of St. Mary's Co. whom she names as guardian to her three minor children, 1732 [MCW 7:18]. Ann dau. of Notley ROZER m.(1) Daniel CARROLL of "Duddington" and (2) Benjamin YOUNG, member of the Md. Council [Hienton, Prince George's Heritage, p.117]. Elizabeth ROZIER, niece of Dr. John WHETTENHALL m. by 1750, George SLYE [Fresco, p.256]. Henry ROZER [son of Notley ROZER] appears in the 1776 census of St. John's and Prince George's Parishes, PG Co, aged 51, with a large household [Brumbaugh, Md. Records 1:85].

The will of William CHANDLER of Charles Co, 1725, proved 1730, muddies the waters somewhat [MCW 6:167]. In it he mentions his goddaughter Kathrine ROZER and <u>niece</u> Mrs. Ann ROZER, whom I take to be the daughters of Notley ROZER. He was a son of Col. William CHANDLER (d. 1685) and of his wife Mary (d. 1694) dau. of Henry and Jane (LOWE) SEWALL. Mary (SEWALL) CHANDLER m.(2) 1687, George BRENT and had children Martha (d.unm.1715), Mary (m.Roswell NEALE), and several sons. [*Md. Genealogies* 2:259-260] I have been unable to determine how Ann ROZER could be his niece; perhaps cousin is meant.

Pages 166-167. [MCW 6:22] Will of Samuel CLOPLAND [MCW: COPELAND] of an unworthy member of the Church of England being thro' the abundant Mercy and Goodness of God tho weak in body yeat of a sound and perfect understanding and memory. [Here follows a long profession of faith.] Date: 27 Jan. 1726 [1727]. As for my burial I desire it may be desent without pomp or stait [=state] at the descretion of my dear wife and my executors hereafter named who I doubt not will manage it with all requesite proudence. All my debts which to my comfort are but small and few be paid out of hand if I dont live to pay them myself for as I never loved to keep people out of theair money in my life time as litel will I allow it after my death to my deare and loving wife with whom I have lived very happily and with mutual affection and fidelity for many years and by whom I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Barbary COPLAND one third parte my p[e]rsongall estate to her and after her death to my two onely children. To my onely daughter Catorn [=Catherine] COPLAND the third part of real and pasel [=personal] and the other the third part of all reall and pashel of [Page 167. Some text omitted here and in MCW; lacks name of his son who would receive the remaining third] all after theare mothers death then it shall all fall to them. I appoint my trusty and well beloved frinds Edward SWANN and Thomas SWANN to be overseers over my childrens estate. Signed: Sam'l COPELAND. Wit: Thomas SWANN, Edward SWANN, Thomas SWANN Jr.

Proved 23 Feb. 1726 [1727] by oaths of Thomas SWANN, Edward SWANN, and Thomas SWANN Jr. Before Tho's BROOKE Jr, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (6-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Samuel COPELAND left a will in PG Co, 1699, naming wife Margaret, son Samuel, dau. Hannah, and an unborn child. The children jointly inherited "Coxes Hays." [MCW 2:192] A Samuel COPELAND witnessed the will of David READ, Calvert Co, 1666 [MCW 1:38]. Samuel, Joseph and Hannah COPELAND received a 16 acre tract called "Dunbar" on N. side of Keverns Creek, for "a valuable consideration paid by Samuel COPELAND deceased, father of the said parties," 1701 [PG Deeds A:72]. Samuel COPELAND, the testator, is not found in PG Co. tax lists, 1719. In 1733, Edward SWAN was taxed in lower Mattapany Hundred [BB:267]; Thomas SWANN Jr. and Sr. were in Mattapany Hundred 1733 [BB:276].

The National Society Colonial Dames XVII Century 1915

(By Ruth Ingram Stultz)

ROGER M. TANEY, who came to Maryland with LORD BALTIMORE in 1632, probably never dreamed he would one day be partly responsible for the formation of a national society of ladies calling themselves "Colonial Dames."

TANEY'S descendant, MARY FLORENCE, talented daughter of JOHN PETER and ALPHONE ROGERS TANEY, Covington, Ky., wrote the State anthem, "Kentucky" and was the author of "Kentucky Pioneer Women." But Miss TANEY's greatest achievement was the organization of national patriotic societies.

Miss TANEY founded The National Society of The Colonial Daughters, National Society Colonial Dames XVII Century, and the National Society Dames of The Court of Honor.

The National Society Colonial Dames XVII Century was organized July 15, 1915, during a meeting of the International Genealogical Congress at the Panama Exposition.

The first certificate of incorporation was filed August 20, 1920, in the office of Recorder of Deeds, District of Columbia, by MARY FLORENCE TANEY, EFFIE W. CALLAHAN, ALMA HARDEMAN WALKING, ELLEN SCHUTT WALLIS, FLORENCE J. STODDARD, FLORENCE MAY WASHINGTON and BLANCHE SCHUTT TORREYSON.

Objectives of the society were to:

Aid in the preservation of records and historic sites of our country; foster interest in colonial research; aid in education of youth in our country; commemorate noble and heroic deeds of ancestors and founders of our great Republic; maintain high principles of virtue, courage and patriotism which led to the independence of the Colonies and the foundation and establishment of the U.S.A.; aid in establishment of a Library of Heraldry; and develop a library specializing in 17th century American colonial data.

Membership is open to any American woman of good moral character, eighteen years of age or over, provided she is acceptable to the Society and is the lineal descendant of an ancestor who lived in one of the eleven British Colonies in the Continental U.S.A. prior to 1701 as an immigrant colonist or a descendant of one.

The applicant agrees, if admitted into membership, she will endeavor to carry out the purposes for which the Society is organized, and that she will observe and comply with its Constitution and Bylaws.

Admission into the Society is by invitation and endorsement by two members and approval of lineage papers by the President General, Registrar General and Treasurer General.

Proof of any of the following services is acceptable: Historic Founders (1606-1616) of Jamestown and recognized Historic Founders of any of the original New England colonies. All officials in Virginia prior to 1619. Members of the London, Plymouth and Virginia Companies who came to the Colonies, and the descendants of all members of those companies who resided in the colonies. Incorporators of the Royal Charters for Virginia of 1608, 1609, 1612 and 1619. Colonial Governors, Lieutenant Governors, Deputy Governors and Colonial officers. Members of the House of Burgesses. Members or Delegates to Council or Assembly. Deputy or Representative to the General Court. Secretary, Magistrate, Selectman, Justice, Judge of any Court of Law or Equity. Attorney, Advocate, Solicitor. Founder or Trustee of any College in British North America established prior to 1701. Minister of the Gospel or commissary of the Bishops of London. Member of the Council of Safety of 1689. Signer of the Mayflower Compact. Speaker of The House of Deputies. Physician or Surgeon. In battle under Colonial authority. Under banner of Great Britain in any of the wars in which colonists participated. All military and naval service of the colonies. Furnished troops, funds or supplies. Member of Provincial Congress. Member of Provincial Congress. Original planters, Dutch, French, Swedish, English or German. Original landowners to towns. Freemen. Headrights before 1701. Transportees. The Edward Busey (Bucey) Family of Maryland

by Pamela Riccardi

Paul Busey, the progenitor of the Busey family, arrived in Maryland in 1651, conveyed by Henry Cox.¹ When he died in 1685, he left two sons: Paul, who married Sarah Whipps; and Charles, whose known wife was Diana Brown. I am descended from Paul and Sarah (Whipps) Busey through their eighth child, Edward Busey. It is Edward's line I would like to clarify.²

(1) Edward Busey, born ca 1709 in P.G. Co., died 1778 in Frederick Co, Md. That it was this Edward who died in 1778 is more firmly established by the fact that in her will. Sarah (Whipps) Busey left "one negro woman named Cate" to her son Edward.³ In the inventory of Edward Bucey, listed among his possessions was "negro Cate ag'd 62 years".⁴ The inventory was acknowledged by "kin" Edward Busey (by signature) and Paul Busey (by mark "PB"), with Chas. Bucey noted as administrator. In the list of all free male inhabitants of Montgomery Co, aged 16-50 years in 1777, Chas. Busey, Ben: Busey, Paul Busey, Edwd. Busey, and Henry Busey appeared on one list of 64 men comprising company 5.5 The 1778 Oaths of Fidelity from Montgomery County, returned by Joseph Wilson, included Edward Busey (by signature), Paul Busey (by mark "PB") and Charles Busey (by mark "X").⁶ It was the Montgomery Co. list of Charles Jones that included Edward's brother Joshua and Joshua's sons, John and Samuel.⁷ When Henry Busey married in 1778, the witnesses included Charles. Edward and Samuel Busey.⁸ Based upon these and other miscellaneous records, I believe Edward and his wife Sarah were the parents of Paul (2), Henry (3), Edward Jr. (4), Charles (5), Samuel (6) and Benjamin (7). I am not so sure about John B. Busey (8) and William Busey (9) mentioned by other researchers.

(2) Paul Busey, born ca 1740, was likely the eldest son of Edward and Sarah Busey. Paul Busey had acknowledged his father's inventory in 1778 by his mark "PB";⁹ in 1791, he recorded his brand "PB" in Allegany Co, Md.¹⁰ An 1815 deed establishes his wife's name as Jemima.¹¹ Paul died in 1830 in Allegany Co, Md., leaving 7 children;¹² his wife likely died by 1830 (she was referred to as his "beloved wife" in his will dated 1824). His children were Samuel, Nancy (m. Jeremiah Plummer), Edward, Paul Jr., Sarah (m. Rezin Beall), Lucy (m. William Street), and Mary (m. Amos Davis).

(3) Henry Busey, born Aug 1747, died 2 Feb 1836 in Jefferson Co., (West) Virginia.¹³ His wife, Ann, was born in 1760 and died 13 Spt 1836. Henry married Ann Truman in the Frederick German Reformed Church, 13 Oct 1778.¹⁴ Besides his established four sons, Benjamin, Washington, Edward and Henry Jr., Henry may have had daughthers Priscilla, Margaret (m. John C. Newman¹⁵), and Ann (m. Benjamin Ashby¹⁶), and son William (m. Jane Davis¹⁷).

(4) Edward Busey, born ca 1750, died between 1830 and 1843. 18 Edward married ca1775 to Mary Cash. 19 Edward, and his brothers Charles and Samuel Busey, were witnesses to the marriage of Ann Cash and Jacob Roads in

1780.²⁰ In the Federal Censuses of 1810, 1820, and 1830, Edward and his family were enumerated in Caswell Co., N. C.²¹ In 1798 and 1802, Edward Busey signed marriage bonds for two of his daughters in Pittsylvania Co., Virginia.²² Edward and Mary had eleven children: Severn, Casey (m. E. Everett), William, Mille (m. Jeremiah Hudson), Nancy (m. Willey Mason), Charles, Mary Ann (m. Thos. Ferguson), Elizabeth (m. Nathaniel Durham), Samuel M., John and Sarah (m. Wm. Trigg). Most of them settled in Kentucky and Tennessee.

(5) Charles Busey, born ca 1755, died after 1800. From the baptism of his son Joshua in 1785,²³ we know that Charles's wife's name was Martha. Charles and his family were enumerated in the 1800 Federal Census of both Frederick and Montgomery Counties, Md.²⁴ In the former, Charles' son Thomas was next door. Some time between 1800 and 1806, Charles' children migrated to Jefferson Co., Ohio (NOT West Virginia); it is not known if Charles went with them. In 1809, a Charles (X) Busey sold certain chattels to Michael Rine (husband of Elizabeth Busey) in Jefferson Co, Ohio;²⁵ this may have been Charles (5) or his son Charles Jr. From extensive research in Ohio, I believe the children of Charles Busey to be Sarah (m. Henry Gilchrist), Thomas, Elizabeth (m. Michael Rine), Rebecca (m. Daniel McDevitt), Charles Jr., Samuel, Joshua, John, and Edmund Bucey. There may also have been a daughter Mary who did not migrate with the other children to Ohio.

(6) Samuel Busey, born ca 1755-57 (not 1765), died by 1810. Samuel Busey was a private in Capt. P. Meroney's Company from Frederick Co. on the list of 5 Aug 1776.²⁶ In 1780, Samuel received a distribution as a creditor from his father's estate.²⁷ From 1788-1803, Samuel Busey appears in the Spartanburg Dist. of South Carolina, not far from Benjamin Busey.²⁸ While he appears in the 1800 census there,²⁹ aged 26-45, he does not appear in 1810. In 1820, a Samuel and John B. Bucey, aged 26-45, are enumerated in the Spartanburg Dist. in the census.³⁰

(7) Benjamin Busey, born ca1760, died 1825 in Carroll Co., Tenn.³¹ Benjamin married Lucy Morse who died in Weakley Co., Tenn., in 1841. From 1788-1805, Benjamin lived in the Spartanburg Dist. of South Carolina.³² He first appears in the land records of Livingston Co., Ky., in 1815.³³ Benjamin had seven children: Edward, Sarah (m. Levi Crow), Zillpha (m. Green Bethel), Nancy (m. Henry Wheeler), dau. (m. Lamberson), Lucy (m. John Kirkwood), and Fanny (m. Jonathan Gilbert).

(8) John Bean Bucey, married Helen McAtee 6 Jan 1800 in Frederick Co. 34 He was included in the list of Frederick Co. voters in the election of 1796. 35 He could also be the John B. Bucey in Spartanburg Dist. of S.C. in 1820. 30

(9) William Bucey was included in the list of Frederick Co. voters in the election of 1796.3^{6} He may be the William Bucey who was licensed to marry Jane Davis in Allegany Co. in 1816.1^{7}

BOOK REVIEWS

Directory of Maryland Church Records by Edna A. Kanely. Silver Spring, MD. Family Line Publications. 1987. 195pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

This directory is the result of project begun in 1983 by the Genealogical Council of Maryland to gather information on the location and availability of church records within the state. Member genealogical societies, including our PGCGS were asked to gather information on records of churches built before 1910. The first part of this directory is arranged by county with an alphabetical listing by the name of the church. Other information such as denomination, address, record dates, date of establishment etc. is shown. The second part is arranged first by denomination, then alphabetically by county and church name, followed by an address. This book should aid those trying to determine what records are available and where they can be found.

Record of Pennsylvania Marriages, Prior to 1810. Baltimore. Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc. 1987. 2 Vols. 790pp. 601pp. A gift of Jean A. Sargent.

The information in these volumes was excerpted and reprinted from the *Penn-sylvania Archives*, Series 2, Volumes VIII and IX. The marriages were taken from various church records, with the largest percentage being Philadelphia records. Most of the church records are in alphabetical order, but several lists in volume two are in chronlogical order and there is no index. It is unfortunate that the Genealogical Publishing Company did not take the time to either index or alphabetize these remaining lists before reprinting the publication. In addition to the church marriages there are four pages of Provincial marriage licenses dated 1685-1689. These two volumes will make a splendid addition to the Pennsylvania section in our library.

Maryland Eastern Shore Newspaper Abstracts, Northern Counties 1830-1837, Volume 7 by Harper & Wright. Silver Spring, MD. Family Line Publications. n.d. 178pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

Volume seven is the final volume of newspaper abstracts for the Northern counties of the Eastern shore. The series will conclude with Volume 8. Like the previous volumes, the entries show the name and date of the paper, followed by an abstract of important information. It is completely indexed.

1778 Census of Maryland by Bettie Stirling Carothers. 1972. 54pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

The purpose of the 1778 census of Maryland was to determine which persons had not signed the Oath of Fidelity. The census records that have survived are for the counties of Caroline, Charles and Queen Anne's. The compiler has kept the original spellings. A complete name index makes it easy to find if an ancestor has been included.

Signers of the Oath of Fidelity to Maryland During the Revolution, Volume II, by Bettie Stirling Carothers. n.d. 39pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

On 5 February 1777 the Maryland General Assembly passed a law requiring males to sign an Oath of Allegiance and Fidelity to the State of Maryland and the cause of freedom. These lists can therefore act as a substitute "census" for free males over eighteen. This volume includes the lists of Baltimore, Montgomery, Dorchester, Caroline and Calvert Counties. The list for Baltimore County contains both the signers and non-signers. There is no index but each county is listed in alphabetical order. (over) Marriage Licenses Montgomery County, Maryland, 1798-1898 by Janet Thompson Manuel. Silver Spring, MD. Family Line Publications. 1987. 355pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

Although Montgomery County was formed in 1776, the first marriage licenses still extant begin 9 February 1798. The names of the parties, both male and female, have been alphabetized into one list for the purposes of this publication. In addition to the date of the liscense, some of the entries show if the couple was colored or white.

Marylanders in the Confederacy by Daniel D. Hartzler. Silver Spring, MD. Family Line Publications. 1986. 416pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

The bulk of this volume is a roster of Confederate soldiers arranged in alphabetical order showing rank, command, residence and references. The second part of the volume consists of numbered references which correspond to the numbers shown in the roster. There are 1690 references so it is quite apparent that the author carefully combed numerous sources to compile this listing. The several introductory chapters have been indexed.

History of Harford County, Maryland, From 1608 (The Year of Smith's Expedition) to the Close of the War of 1812 by Walter W. Preston, A.M. Westminister, MD. Family Line Publications. 1988 (originally published 1901). 360+pp. \$15.00. A gift of F. Edward Wright of Family Line Publications.

Around the turn of the century, many county histories were written. Copies are often difficult to come by so it is always nice to see when one has been reprinted. As stated in the title, there are numerous chapters on various phases in the history of Harford County. Many genealogists will be interested in the biographical sketches, lists of persons who served in the Revolutionary War, persons who were "Non-Associators", and lists of persons who served in various public offices. Also inclued are minutes of the Harford County committees before and during the Revolution. The index is only partial so it is important to skim through the book for the names of interest.

Marriage Licenses of Washington, D.C. 1811 through 1830 by F. Edward Wright. Silver Spring, MD. Family Line Publications. 1988. 159pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

The compiler used three different sources, records from the Marriage Bureau, a copy made by Homer A. Walker, and copy copy made by the DAR Records Committee. For the purposes of this volume each entry appears twice, once under the groom's name and once under the female's name, all in one alphabetical list.

Maryland Eastern Shore Newspaper Abstracts, Northern Counties 1825-1829, Volume 5 by Harper & Wright. Silver Spring, MD. Family Line Publications. 1983. 189pp. A gift of Robert Stewart.

This volume is a continuation of a series of volumes of abstracts of newsworthy and genealogical interest items from Eastern shore newspapers. Five newspapers have been abstracted for this volume. Three were Talbot County papers, one was from Kent County and the other from Queen Anne's County. There is a complete name index to personal and geographical names.



Item: To my daughter Mary HOYE one Negro woman cauld Florah she the sd Negroe Florah being now with child. I give the sd child to my daughter Margarit HOY to them my said daughters the woman and child to them and theire heires forever the sd Mary is to deliver the sd child to my daughter Margaritt when she the sd Margarit shall arrive to the full ears [=years] or age of 16 or the day of marriage which shall first happen, if alive: but in case the sd Margarit should die before aage or marriage then the sd Mary has clame and property to the sd Negroe child and to them hur and their heirs forever. Item: To my daughter Anne HOYE : eigh cows to him and hur heirs forever. Item: All the remainding part of my estate to be equally devided between my children. Item: I constiture my well beloved wife and eldest son James to be exetors joyntly together. None of my children shall murst [=must?] nor will interrupt my well beloved wife upon any acc[oun]tt whatever interrupting touching or claimeing any part of my estate hearein mentioned: real or personall dureing the widowhood of sd wife but in case yt [=that] my well beloved wife should alter her condition on any acct. whatever that is to say marry or intermarry with any purson then I leave my two sons Dorsitt and Isacc at full age to receive theire estate hearein mentioned at the age of 18 then to demand and peorses [=possess?] to estates hearein mentioned of my exe[cu]tors. Item: To my well belvoed daughter Martha one Negroe called or so named Sarah to hur the sd Martha and hur heirs forever. Signed: Paull (P) HOY. Wit: Tho. DORSETT, John WIGHTE, Will'm (W) HARRIS.

NOTES: The Paul HOYE Society (Maryland pioneers 1700) in 1931 was located in Los Angeles, Calif. [Passano, op.cit., p.171] Paul HAYE was taxed in Mattapeny Hundred, PG Co, 1719 [BB:160]. James HOYE was taxed in Mattapeny Hundred, 1733 [BB:276]. John DOSSETT [DORSETT] of PG Co, in his will, probated in 1711, gave part of "Little Worth" and "Twiner [Twiver, Twifer]" to his daughter Frances HOY [MCW 3:204]. Paul HOY's wife, was alive but not named in his will. That she was Frances HOY [HAY] is proved by her own will, 1732, PG Co, in which she names her children (Dorset, Isaac, Margaret, Mary, and Ann), mentions her deceased husband Paul HOY, and also names her niece Ann BUCHANNAN and son-in-law Charles BEVAN [MCW 7:26].

Restoration Of Historic Farm Set

PGCGS member Clarence Gaylor has sent us a copyrighted feature article from the Washington Post of 21 April 1988: (parts reprinted with permission)

ODENTON, Md. -- A decade before the Civil War, William Anderson moved to Anne Arundel County and used his slaves to build his big brick farmhouse. The slaves ran away during the war and never came back, but a tiny run-down building where some of them lived still stands.

A nonprofit foundation wants to restore a small portion of the farm called Grassland and open it to the public.

According to Mark Edwards, acting director of the Maryland Historical Trust, the slave quarters on the farm would be only the third such site in the state open to the public. The others are Sotterly Manor in St. Mary's County and the Hampton Mansion in Baltimore County.

Edwards and other Maryland historians touring Grassland called it a remarkable find--a "total historical package" that includes William Anderson's diaries. "It's a time capsule for the period," Edwards said.

The diaries will serve as a fascinating account of life on the farm. They record case after case of cousins marrying cousins, a practice not uncommon in rural early America because of the scarce population. Records in the diaries of transactions involving slaves could also be of interest to ancestor hunters.

William Gaylor's paternal grandmother was Mary M. Anderson. Mr Gaylor also mentions a book, "The Andersons from the Great Fork of the Patuxent," by Cora Anderson, in which his father's family is listed.

BOOK REVIEWS

Seward and Related Families by George C. Seward. Boston, MA. R.S. Rowe & Co. 1987. 230pp. \$27.70. A gift of the author, 48 Greenacres Ave., Scarsdale, NY 10583.

This genealogy traces a number of families in the lineage of the author. Most of the information concerns his direct line of descent and it does not continue forward with all descendants. Several early generations were named Obediah Seward and the author presents an interesting case for the possibility that earlier genealogies on the family had left out a generation. Some of the related families covered were Sweger, Rugh, Kloenne, McKay, Eley, Day, Corbell and Phillips. The appendix contains a number of pictures and the text is indexed.

Chesapeake Fact, Fiction and Fun by Frederick Tilp. Bowie, MD. Heritage Books, Inc. 1988. 238pp. \$12.50. A gift of Heritage Books, Inc., 1540E Pointer Ridge Place. Bowie, MD 20716.

This book is aimed not at genealogists, but at persons interested in Chesapeake Bay. It is divided into two sections. The first contains vigettes on subjects such as canals, pilots and Dutch Pirates, some of it serious, some of it "fun". The second section is an alphabetical glossary of terms with a great bit of humor thrown in for good measure.

Roster of Soldiers From North Carolina in the American Revolution. Baltimore, MD. Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc. 1988. 709pp. A gift of Richard E. Wallace.

This listing of North Carolian Revolutionary War Soldiers was originally published by the North Carolina Daughters of the American Revolution in 1932 and has become a standard reference for those trying to prove Revolutionary Service from this state. A number of sources were combed to compile the listings in this book and the formats vary according to the source. All however are indexed so it is easy to determine what references might exist for a particular ancestor.

Marriages of Surry County, North Carolina 1779-1868 by Brent H. Holcomb. Baltimore, MD. Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc. 1982. 272pp. A gift of Richard E. Wallace.

Surry County was formed in 1771 from Rowan County, but the marriage bonds do not begin until 1779. The bonds are listed in alphabetical order by the surname of the groom. The names of the brides and the bondsmen have been indexed. In some cases the date of marriage and name of person performing the ceremony have also been included but these names are not in the index.

Missouri Miscellany, Volume V by Mrs. Howard W. Woodruff. 1978. 131pp. A gift of Marianne Gill.

This volume contains six different records of interest to genealogists. Those records are a list of persons attending an 1885 re-union of Confederate veterans, Daviess County marriages 1855-1865, Pike County Probate records 1834-1840, Newton County marriages 1870-1875, Worth County membership roll of the Oxford Christian Church and Cole County index to wills 1858-1880. All surnames have been indexed but first names are not shown in the index.

The Kidwell Ancestry in America From 1650 by William M. Kidwell, Ed. D. Twentynine Palms, CA. Desert Moon Press. 1988. 180pp. A gift of Art Kidwell.

Early generations of the Kidwell family were in Charles and Prince George's County Maryland. Chapter IV gives five generations of the family including a number of persons whose lineage is still uncertain. The bulk of the book however contains chapters on more general topics as they relate to the Kidwells. EXTRACTS FROM GENEALOGICAL EXCHANGES.....Pricia Burk Paulkovich

<u>NEW YORK CITY RESEARCH--OBITS AND DEATH NOTICES.</u> When researching individuals who lived and died in the vicinity of New York City, you may be able to locate a death date by looking in the "Index to Obituaries" of the New York Times, a standard reference found in most libraries. However, unless the person was newsworthy, a regular obituary with biographical background will seldom be found. The alternative is to use the Death Notices. These entries are arranged like classified ads--smaller than normal print--on the same page usually as the obits. These deaths are not indexed, so you will need a date of death or one close to it in order to limit your search time. Not only do you have confirmation of facts on the death certificate, but you will most likely gain added information about the family, etc. Howard Co, MD GenSoc, Issue #112, June 8, 1988.

The following is an audit report of the accounts and records of the Prince George's County Genealogical Society for the 13month period ending July 31, 1988.

The review included a verification of the receipts and disbursement vouchers and their postings to the appropriate General Ledger accounts. Amounts shown on the July 31, 1988, financial report were verified with the amount shown in the general ledger accounts. Spot checks of bank reconciliations and totals to the General Ledger accounts were also made. Random verification of membership records were made to cash receipts vouchers.

Based upon this review, the records and reports accurately reflect the financial condition of the Society for the 13-month period ending July 31, 1988.

General Comments

a. The General Ledger account posting procedures should provide to show total account balances at the end of each month.

b. Monthly financial reports should be prepared and provided to the President no later than the 10th day following the end of the month.

c. This report covers a 13-month period. This one-month longer than normal period was necessitated by the transactions conducted by the outgoing Treasurer. The new Treasurer assumed his responsibilities on 1 August 1988, which will result in the next fiscal period consisting of an eleven-month period, ending on June 30, 1989.



Page 169. [MCW 6:57] Will of Robert PEARSON of PG Co, being sicke and in a weake condition. Date: 5 Feb. 1727/8. It[em]: To William TAYLOR my gun. It: To Elizabeth TAYLOR <u>his</u> sist[er] my horse. It: As for the rest of my estate real and personal I give to my friend Henry MASSEY whom I hereby name to be my sole execut[or]. Signed: Robert PEARSON. Wit: Jo'n FRASOR, Lewin (L) JONES.

Proved 5 March 1727/8 by the oaths of the Rev'd John FRASER and Lewin JONES. Before Pet[er] DENT, Dept'y Com'ry of PG Co. (2-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Robert PEARSON was not found in the 1719 tax lists of PG Co. John FRASER was taxed in New Scotland Hundredin 1719 [BB:157]. Rev. John FRASER was minister of King George Parish, 1730 [BB:254]. William TAYLOR was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred in 1719 [BB:164]; Lewis JONES was taxed in Upper Piscattaway Hundred, 1733 [BB:268]. Henry MASSEY witnessed a will in PG Co, 1724/5 [MCW 5:184], and was taxed in Lower Piscattaway Hundred, 1733 [BB:270]. who died in 1864 in Charleston of yellow fever, and some of whose descendents disclaimed any knowledge of him; and 3) ancestors of his own named Gaddy, Bacon, Elliott, and Beam, Böhm, Boehm, or Baum. In closing, Mr. Gaddy noted that a publisher in Lynchburg (whose name he does not recall) is producing a series of Virginia Confederate unit histories. These units are mainly regiments, but do include other units as well.

BOOK REVIEWS

New Dictionary of American Family Names by Elsdon C. Smith. New York. Gramercy Publishing Company. 1988 edition. 570pp. A gift of Muriel Lewis.

Most people are somewhat curious about the meaning of their surname. Many surnames came from the place where a person resided, his occupation, or a physical characteristic. This volume contains an alphabetical listing of surnames followed by the country of origin and the meaning of the name. This book provides a quick and easy way to determine the origin of a surname.

Blacks in the Marriage Records of the District of Columbia, Dec. 23, 1811-Jun. 16, 1870 by Paul E. Sluby, Sr. and Stanton L. Wormley. Washington, DC. The Columbian Harmony Society. 2 Vols. 1988. 321pp & 275pp. A gift of The Columbian Harmony Society. [Copies are not for sale.]

The original marriage licenses for this period were recorded in two handwritten ledgers in chronological order by the date the license was issued. There was rarely any indication as to whether the marriage actually took place. There are some notations when the license was "returned not used." For the purposes of this book the authors have abstracted those names which were identified as "black", "colored", or "Negro". This book is an alphabetical listing of the couples and the date of the license. Each entry appears twice, once under the name of the groom, and once under the name of the female except in those cases where a surname was not shown. This volume should be of great help to those tracing their black ancestry.

Holmead's Cemetery (Western Burial Ground), Washington, DC by Paul E. Sluby, Sr., Stanton L. Wormley, editor. Washington, DC. The Columbian Harmony Society. 1985. 68pp. [Copies are not for sale.] A gift of The Columbian Harmony Society.

The first interment for which there are records was that of Robert Smith of Boston who was buried at Holmead's Cemetery 30 May 1794. The last recorded burial was on 6 March 1874. Holmead's, also known as the Western Burial Ground, fell into disrepair and eventually was sold in 1879 and the bodies were removed to other cemeteries. The cemetery records which were deposited with the City Engineer, have been lost. The author has tried to reconstruct a partial list of burials by using other sources. The names of persons are listed alphabetically followed by dates, when given, and references from which the material was obtained.

Selected Small Cemeteries of Washington, DC by Paul E. Sluby, Sr., Stanton L. Wormley, editor. Washington, DC. The Columbian Harmony Society. 1987. 84pp. [Copies are not for sale.] A gift of The Columbian Harmony Society

Although a Register of Deaths was begun in the District of Columbia in 1855, it was not until 1871 that such records began to be kept on a regular basis. Therefore it is often necessary to use other records to determine a death. This volume contains separate alphabetical listings for the following cemeteries: Eldbrooke Methodist, Franciscan Monastery, Georgetown Visitation Convent, Institutional Burying Ground, Jesuit Community, Queen Farm, Sheriff Farm, Sibley Farm, Union Baptist, and Veitch Farm. Several of these records of burials are reconstructed from interment records at Rock Creek Cemetery which note reinterments. In some cases the exact location of the original cemetery in unknown and some may originally have been in Maryland.

LOOKING FOR THAT RECORD WHERE??

Where is the strangest, or most unusual, place you've ever found a genealogical record?

We know curious researchers poke through dusty attics and damp cellars; traipse overgrown cemeteries, facing possibly poisonous snakes, insects, briars -- and maybe even a ghost or two; and know no boundaries or limitations when on the scent of a new source of information.

But, do they always know just the right place to look? Would any of you ever think of looking in a blacksmith shop for a marriage record? Of course not!

NO? Well, if you can't find an English ancestor's 1700s marriage record in the "normal" place, try The Old Blacksmith's Shop located at Gretna Green, Scotland, on highway A74 just over the English border near Carlisle.

It all began this way. In the 1700s non-church (or irregular) weddings were performed, including almost instant marriages by a parson near Fleet Prison in London. Then in 1753, Lord Hardwick banned non-church and irregular "Fleet" marriages, making them illegal.

So, the Fleet Parson, as he was known, up and moved to Gretna Green, where Scotland's laws permitted any citizen to perform a wedding ceremony as long as the betrothed declared themselves as single, and the rite was performed before two witnesses.

The nearest establishment to the border was a blacksmith shop, and there the Fleet Parson set up business.

Young couples eager to be married, sometimes with fathers in hot pursuit and dust a-flying, crossed the Scotish border and raced to the blacksmith's shop where they stated their intent of matrimony and were wed before anyone could object. The parson usually had two witnesses readily available for the speedy process.

Because the fee was quite low, some local folks even availed themselves of the parson's service. Business was good. The Fleet Parson was succeeded by an old soldier, and he was followed by Joseph Paisley who became known as the Black-smith (or anvil) Parson. Business was fine until 1830 when a new road was built, bypassing the blacksmith's shop.

Then an enterprising fellow, associated with the Toll Bar on the new road, decided here was a good spot for a hotel. He could house couples overnight; then the next morning he would take them to the Toll House and perform their marriage. The entrepreneur got double payments with his "package" deal.

The Blacksmith's Shop? It evolved into a tourist attraction. But it serves as a reminder to all researchers: Leave no stone unturned (or anvil unchecked), search EVERYWHERE for clues to records!



JANUARY PROGRAM

On Saturday, January 7, from 2 to 4 pm, the Prince George's County Genealogical Society will meet in the Public Library at 11 Crescent Road, Greenbelt, Maryland. Dr. Rudy Krutar, a Member of the PGCGS, will give a computer demonstration of the use of artificial intelligence (AI) techniques to solve genealogical research problems.

Dr. Krutar was born in Anaconda, Montana, earned the PhD degree in Computer Sciences at Carnegie-Mellon University, Pittsburg, PA, and is a Computer Scientist at the Naval Research Laboratory where he uses AI for such problems as the location of submarines based on information from a variety of sources of differing reliability. The presentation will be at a graphic level and, of course, UNCLASSIFIED.

DECEMBER PROGRAM REPORT

John A. Giannetti, President of the Prince George's County Historical Society, spoke at the PGCGS December meeting. Due to his son's sudden hospitalization, the program was a bit different than planned but still most interesting. Emphasis was on the second owner of the Giannettis' historic home, which was built in the early 1800's by a Robert Clark who came from Sheffield, England. Clark built this home on a 1,000 acre farm purchased from George Calvert of Riversdale. The land extended from the current Northwestern High School area west and north to the present Lewisdale and University duck pond area. About 1874, Clark sold his property to "General" Edward Fitzgerald Beale, son of naval officer George Beale and his wife, Emily. Edward Beale had attended the U.S. Naval Academy then in Philadelphia, and throughout his life served his country in many capacities. He was the country's first Superintendent

of Indian Affairs, a successful merchant, and the first Governor General of California. Tired of frontier life, Beale's wife persuaded the "General" to return to the city of Washington to live. There she bought Decatur House.

The Maryland farm was still maintained and used for stabling and training race horses, including two Arabian stallions belonging to their friend and neighbor, President Grant. The Smithsonian Institution also used the farm to study Buffalo Bill's buffalo in an effort to prevent the bison's extinction. When George Beale died in 1892, Admiral Chauncey Themas bought the farm.

When George Beale died in 1892, Admiral Chauncey Thomas bought the farm. Subsequent owners were the Clay, Sinclair, and Birch families. Jane Birch sold the home to the Giannettis. Today the home, known as Hitching Post Hill, sits on two acres of land off an unpaved road west of Northwestern Senior High School.

In conclusion, it was noted that a number of old homes in the county are decorated for Christmas and open to the public. These include Marietta, Montpelier, Surratt House, and Mt. Airy, which is now a restaurant. Belair and Riversdale were also mentioned as historic homes that are often open to the public.

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NOTES: King George Parish Register shows following children of James and Mary BRAMELL: Mary 1709, James 1711. James BRAMELL was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred, PG Co, 1719; and (the son) in Upper Piscattaway Hundred, 1733 [Calendar of Maryland State Papers: the Black Books (BB):164,268]. James BRAMELE witnessed will of Francis CLARVO, PG Co, 1721 [MCW 5:79]. Will of James BRAMEL (the son), 1735, PG Co, mentions only his mother Mary, she to get the lands "Golden Rod" and "the Refuse", suggesting that sister Rebecca had died [MCW 7:135].

Signed: Thomas (.T) PLUMMER. Wit: Tho STOCKETT Jun'r, Tho's STELL [?], Thomas WAITT.

Proved 26 June 1728 by the oaths of Tho's STOCKETT Jun'r and Tho's ST<u>I</u>LL. Before Charles CALVERT, Com'ry Gen'll. (6-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Skordas, op.cit., p. 365, shows a Thomas PLUMMER transported to Maryland in 1667. Will of Thomas PLOUMER of Anne Arundel Co, 1694, mentions wife Eliza: and children; Eldest son, Thomas PLUMMER, to receive 100 acres, "Seaman's Delight" in Calvert Co. [MCW 2:86]. Will of Joseph YATE of A.A. Co., 1691, mentions wife Mary, dau.Elizabeth PLUMMER, and other children. Daughter Elizabeth to receive "Rich Level" and "Level Addition" [MCW 2:48]. Will of Mary YATE of A.A. Co., proved 1699, mentions dau. Elizabeth, wife of Thomas PLUMMER [MCW 2:168]. In 1700 Thomas PLUMMER of PG Co. possessed "the Rich Levell" (800 acres) in Baltimore Co, surveyed 1679 for George YATES. By 1724 it had been transferred to Coll. Henry DARNALL of PG Co. In 1700 Thomas PLUMMER of PG Co. also owned "Levell Addition" in Baltimore Co, 118 acres on west side of Susquehanna River, surveyed 1686 for George YATES. Effie Bowie, Across the Years in Prince George's County, p.575-580, traces many descendants of Thomas PLUMMER through Quaker records of West River Monthly Meeting, A.A. Co. In 1719 the PLUMMERS are found in PG Co: Thomas in New Scotland Hundred [BB:157]; and another Thomas, Samuel, and George in Patuxent Hundred [BB:162]. Thomas PLUMMER Jr. was m. 1715, in Queen Anne's Parish, to Sarah WILSON. In the same parish are recorded children of Philemon and Eliz. PLUMMER: Kezia 1728/9 and Sarah 1730.

The tax lists for 1733 show the PLUMMERS: Elizabeth (the widow) in Patuxent Hundred along with Samuel, Yate, Macaja, John, and George [BB:266]. Thomas in Eastern Branch Hundred along with Samuel, Philip, and an unidentified Isaac [BB:271]. Thomas PLUMMER signed a petition in All Saints Parish, Frederick Co, 1756 along with a Jeremiah and John PLUMMER [BB:863]. The will of Thomas PLUMMER Sr. was probated in Frederick Co, 1774 [Magruder. Index of Maryland Colonial Wills].



The Society of Mareen Buvall Descendants

(Ruth Ingram Stultz)

Most lineal societies, it seems, result from momentous events like the Revolutionary War - but here we have one created for just one man.

MAREEN DUVALL, born about 1625 in France, migrated to Anne Arundel County, Province of Maryland, circa 1655. He received a land patent, called "Laval" in 1659 from LORD BALTIMORE.

DUVALL, a planter and merchant, and a public-minded man, had acquired several thousand acres of land before he died in 1694. His many descendants would nourish his memory.

On 9 Dec. 1926, Dr. WIRT ADAMS DUVALL of Baltimore founded the <u>Society of Mareen</u> <u>Duvall Descendants</u> which includes such notables as GABRIEL DUVALL (1752-1844), a close friend of THOMAS JEFFERSON; President HARRY S. TRUMAN; and Mrs. WALLIS WAR-FIELD SIMPSON who became the Duchess of Windsor.

The purpose of this organization is to unite in common bond the descendants of MAREEN DUVAL for the study of Duvall history and genealogy and to preserve and restore Duvall relics.

Anyone over 18 years of age, of good moral character and reputation, and lineally descended from MAREEN DUVALL, Huguenot refugee, is eligible for active membership.

Spouses of members are eligible for associate membership, and children under 18 for junior membership. Applicants who have paid dues and are waiting approval of lineage papers may become Sustaining members.

Annual dues are \$6.00 with an initial application fee of \$2.00. Junior membership is \$2.00 annually with no application fee. Life membership is available for \$75.00.

A genealogical history, *Mareen Duvall of Middle Plantation*, published in 1952 by HARRY WRIGHT NEWMAN is available from the society for \$32.50.



KRUTAR SPEAKS ON COMPUTERS

Speaker at the January 7 meeting of the PGCGS was Dr. Rudolph Krutar, who brought several Apple/ Macintosh computers to demonstrate the use of artificial intelligence (AI) techniques in solving genealogical research problems. In a private conversation with this editor after the meeting, Rudy defined AI as "a study of things we don't know how to do well on computers". The demonstration. which was intended to show how computerized maps could be used in making genealogical deductions, was cut short, due, in part, to the preliminary explanations needed by us computer illiterates.

Some basic statements that came

out of the meeting were: 1) Choose a computer that is user friendly. Apple/Macintosh computers are user friendly - and have a lot of type fonts. 2) For database management (DBM), get the most general software available, rather than software designed only for genealogy. 3) Spreadsheet software has a sorting capability and other useful functions often not available in specialized DBMs. LOTUS 1-2-3 is a spreadsheet program; HYPERCARD is another good general DBM system. 4) Color monitors have little use in genealogy. 5) Oral interviews, music, and photographs can be computerized, but require special equipment such as a scanner, an audio digitizer, and/or a speaker. 6) Maps can be stored (as Rudy demonstrated on the Macintosh II) in such a way that one can look at a given area at different periods of time, in differing degrees of detail, or at related information that has been stored in the same database. 7) There are simple techniques that can be applied manually, on paper, by people to keep track of the fuzziness of their facts!

Karen has had the help of a number of members who volunteered to type the hundreds of index cards which will provide better access to our Bible Records collection.

Also under consideration is an effort to create an all-name index to our collection of family group sheets. These group sheets are now used extensively by our Registrar and Queries Editor in answering written inquiries about people from Prince George's County. It is also possible that we may copy those group sheets in order to make them available in the Library. If you have any thoughts about such an effort, please let me know.



MARYLANDERS IN OHIO

J. W. Reep

As was reported in the April 1988 issue of the <u>Bulletin</u>, the <u>Ohio Records & Pioneer Families</u>, a publication of the Ohio Genealogical Society, has presented information about veterans of the Revolutionary War who applied for pensions from the State of Ohio. These extracts were recorded by Julie M. Overton. All information was obtained from the NARS Microfilm Series M804. In each of the following entries, some reference has been made to Maryland information.

HARPER, John W. (M804: 1193 S-2599)

Highland County, Ohio, October 31, 1833.

John W. HARPER, a resident of Liberty Twp., Highland Co., Ohio, aged 73 years, was born in <u>Montgomery Co., Md.</u>, May 18, 1760; when called into service he resided in Berkley (now Jefferson) Co., Va.

In Oct. 1781, drafted for Virginia militia at Charlestown, Berkley Co., Va., under Capt. Abram MORGAN; he was discharged May 1782.

He lived in Berkley Co. (now Jefferson) until 1820 when he moved to Highland Co., Ohio. (OR&PF, Vol. XXVIII, No. 4, 1987, p. 191)

<u>MILLER, Michael</u> (<u>Md.</u>) wife Margaret; BL Reg. of Wt? All papers in this jacket were found in MILLER, Michael (R-7183, widow Elizabeth, to which they do not pertain. Note dated 29 Dec 1938.

Coshocton County, Ohio, 16 September 1909:

John H. RICE, aged 38, a resident of Coshocton Co., O., says he is a son and heir-at-law of Irvin RICE and Caroline RICE, now deceased; that Caroline RICE was the daughter of Isaac MILLER and Mary MILLER, his wife, both now deceased. Isaac MILLER was the son of Charles MILLER and Nancy MILLER, both now deceased; Michael MILLER was a private in the <u>2nd</u> <u>Md. Regiment</u>, served as a soldier in the R.W.; Michael <u>MILLER had not claimed his bounty land allotted by 16 Jan</u> 1828. He died in 1839, his wife Margaret having previously died.

It has been traditionally carried down through the generations that he, Michael MILLER's residence was either in <u>Allegheny Co., Md</u>. or Hampshire Co., Va., when he emigrated to Ohio some time prior to 1840, and died in Coshocton Co. about 1838-9. His regiment should have been the <u>3rd</u> <u>Regiment</u>, not the <u>2nd Regiment</u>. (OR&PF, Vol. XXIX, No. 3, 1988, p. 131)

POTTERF, Casper (S17024; BLWt 49,468-160-55; Nancy Arrasmith, former widow).

Winter, 1777: drafted for 3 months in Capt. John Bannerd's Frederick Co., Md. militia.

February 1989

- Jan., 1781: drafted for 3 months in Capt. James Buckhannon's Co., militia of Rockbridge Co., Va., Col. John Boyer's Reg., Gen. Muhlenberg's brigade.
- Aug., 1781: drafted in Capt. Charles Campbell's Co., Rockbridge Co., Va. militia, Col. Samuel Lewis' Regiment, Gen. Stevens' brigade.
- Born Lancaster Co., Pa., Dec. 19, 1759, lived in Pennsylvania until aged 8 or 9 years old, then to Maryland, where he resided ten or eleven years, then to Virginia where he resided 22 years, then to Preble Co., Ohio where he now resides.
- Affidavit of Frederick MILLER of Preble Co., Ohio, who served with applicant on second tour of duty cited above.
- Married to Nancy LONGNECKER on Aug. 6, 1832, Preble Co., Ohio, by Isaac Stephens, J.P. Three children: Casper T. POTTERF, b Jun. 27, 1833 James S. POTTERF, b. Sep. 25, 1834 Nancy J. POTTERF, b. Jul. 22, 1836 (now Nancy BUTLER).
 - At time of bounty land application, Sep. 1, 1856, James S. POTTERF and Nancy BUTLER were only minor children.

William ARRASMITH, aged 63, of Washington Twp., Preble Co., Ohio, knew Nancy since 1816, also knew Casper POTTERF since 1825.

- Casper POTTERF died Oct. 4, 1836; new widow married, Dec. 1. 1850 to William ARRASMITH of Preble Co., Ohio.
- On affidavit dated Sep. 1, 1856, Nancy ARRASMITH was aged 56 years.

SNIDER, Frederick (M804:2241) (R-9918 wife Elizabeth)

Vinton County, Ohio, 13 August 1850: Elizabeth SNIDER, a resident of Vinton Co., Ohio, aged 82 years, says she is the widow of Frederick SNYDER, a private in the R.W. who enlisted at <u>Hagerstown, Md</u>. under Capt. LEWIS for 18 months. She was married to Frederick on 20 January 1785; he died 12 February 1840; she is still a widow.

Page 172. [MCW 6:65] Will of George COAPE of PG Co, planter. Date: 3 Aug. 1727. Imprimis: To my beloved daughter Sarah COOK my now dwelling plantation with the land and premisarys [sic] thereunto belonging during her natural life but at hir decease the said plantation land and premises I give to my granddaughter Rachel HILL and to hir heirs and assigns forever. It is my will that my duaghter Sarah COOK shall pay all my just debts or on default thereof then the said land and plantation to be rented out at the discretion of my greatest creditor untill such time my debts to complied with and then to be delivereed to my daughter or grandaughter which of them two shall be living. Its my desire my granddaughter Rachell HILL may dwell on the said plantation for the space of one year after my decease as also what I shall hereafter bequeath hir if she thinks fitt. Imp'rs: To my [daughter] Sarah COOK one small bed and what covering thereunto belonging & one pewter dish and ditto bason. Imp'rs: To my grandson in law William BARNSBY one Bible & all my other books, my great coat, iron wedges and Mall rings [sic?]. Imp'rs: To my grandson William COOK all my wareing apparel except what was before bequeathed. Imp'rs: To my grand daughter Rachel HILL my best feather bedd & furniture, all my stock of hoggs & cattle of kinde denomination soever with all the increase. Imp'rs: I appoint my daughter Sarah COOK to be my whole & sole ex[ecutri]x. Signed: George COAP. Wit: Benj. LAWRENCE, Richard HARRISON, William SMITH.

Prerogative Office, 12 July 1728: Proved by oaths of William SMITH and Richard HARRISON. Before Cha's CALVERT, Com[missa]ry Gen[era]l. Proved at the request of William BARNSBY, brother in law to Rachell HILL one of the legatees. (4-1/2 sides)

NOTES: George COPE was transported to Maryland in 1673 [Skordas, Early Settlers of Maryland, p.106]. In 1696, George COOPE of Anne Arundel Co. bought 500 acres in PG Co. from Hugh RILEY: part of "Rileys Folley" and "Hughs Labour" on east side of Collington Branch [PG Deeds A:38]. Sarah and Edward COOK had the following children registered in Queen Anne's Parish: George 1702, William 1706, Sarah 1710, Edward 1713, John 1717. George COOK m. 1727, Elizabeth REYNOLDS and had George 1728/9, Sarah 173-. William and Mary COOK had Sarah 1731, William 1734.

George COPE is not found in 1719 tax lists of PG Co, but Edward COOKE was taxed in Collington Hundred [*Calendar of Maryland STate Papers: the Black Books* (BB): 163]. COOKE was also taxed there in 1733 [BB:265]. William BARNSBIE was taxed in Patuxent Hundred, 1733 [BB:266]. For BARNSBY to be a brother-in-law to Rachel HILL as well as grandson-in-law to George COPE, BARNSBY must have married Rachel's sister. Have not determined whether HILL was RAchel's maiden name.

Pages 172-173. [MCW 6:66] Will of Thomas HARRIS Sen'r of PG Co, planter, being sick in body. Date: 26 April 1728. Imprimis: To Rachel HARRIS my dear beloved wife whome I make and constitute whole and sole executrix, two thirds parts of my personal estate and the other third part to be divided amongst my children, share and share alike. Item: To the said Rachell my wife my tract of land with all and singular the tenements [Page 173] or houses thereon erected and built or to be erected and built the same to be holden and enjoyed by my said wife for and dureing the term of her natural life and from and immediately after her decease I give the same unto my son Samuell his heirs and assigns forever, but if it shall happen that if my said son Samuel HARRIS shall die without issue or without having first conveyed or assigned the said tract of land to any other person or persons then from and immediately his decease my will is that the sd. tract of land shall be and remain the only proper use and behoof of my son Benjamin HARRIS his heirs and assigns for and to or for no other use intent or purpose whatever. Signed: Thomas HARRIS Sen'r. Wit: William BAYNES [?], James TANNEHILL, Thomas GOODMAN.

Proved by oaths of William BAYNES, James TANNEHILL and Thomas GOODMAN, before Pet[er] DENT, Dep[u]ty Com[missa]ry of PG Co. The executrix has declared her resolution to abide by the devise of the within will, before Pet. PENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co, the day and year above wirtten [sic, not dated]. [MCW shows this will as proved 25 June 1728.] (3-1/2 sides)

NOTES: The name Thomas HARRIS appears frequently in the records of early Maryland. Three are shown in Skordas, op.cit., p.211: One immigrated 1650 with wife and servant, others were transported in 1661 and 1674. Thomas HARRIS left a will 1684, in which he mentions wife Mary and son Thomas aged under 19 [MCW 2:4]. According to Fresco, Marriages and Deaths, St. Mary's Co, Md., p.395, that man was a resident of St.Mary's Co, and his widow m.(2nd) Richard LAND. A Thomas HARRIS witnessed a will, 1694/5, in St. Mary's Co. [MCW 2:85]; one witnessed a will in Charles Co, 1675 [MCW 1:172] and in 1718 [MCW 4:175]. A Thomas HARRIS resided in Anne Arundel Co, 1683/4, with a wife Sarah and five children [Archives of Md. 17:192].

There were probably two other Thomas HARRISes contemporary with Thomas Senior in PG Co. in the 1720s. One Thomas HARRIS left a will 1727 naming only his wife Mary and a John GREENUP as legatees [MCW 6:17, see *PGCGS Bulletin*, April 1988]. That Thomas HARRIS now appears to be the one who m. 1704, St. James Parish, Anne Arundel Co, to Mary MITLEY [Barnes, *Md. Marriages*]. About 1705 he owned 121 acres in A.A. Co. called "Mitley's Purchase" in the right of MITLEY's widow, apparently his wife [*Maryland Rent Rolls* p.136].

One of the Thomas HARRISes was taxed in New Scotland Hundred, PG Co, in 1719 [BB:157]. It could be Thomas Senior or another man of that name who appears in nearby Rock Creek Hundred in 1733 [BB:274]. Benjamin HARRIS, apparently the son, was taxed in New Scotland Hundred in 1733 [BB:275]. Samuel was not found.

The surviving Thomas HARRIS is probably the one who is shown in the Prince George's Parish register as Thomas HARRIS Jr, father of Thomas HARRIS b. 1726; and as Thomas HARRIS with wife Sarah, parents of Mary HARRIS, 1728. Since only one Thomas HARRIS was taxed in 1719, he is likely to be Thomas Senior. Thomas Jr. probably came of age after that date. Although Thomas Jr. is not named in this will, he might be the eldest son, entitled to inherit any land not mentioned in the will (however the will seems phrased in such a way to deliberately disinherit him). At any rate, Sr. and Jr. lived quite near each other.

Rachel HARRIS, possibly the widow, left a will in Frederick Co, Md, 1757 [Magruder, Index of Maryland Colonial Wills]. Men named Thomas HARRIS left wills there 1757 and 1760, also in Baltimore Co, 1740 and 1748 [*ibid.*]. Benjamin HARRIS is the name of testators in Calvert Co. 1725 and 1744. Sorting these families out would make a nice, complicated project for someone. EXTRACTS FROM GENEALOGICAL EXCHANGES.....by Pricia Burk Paulkovich

<u>CARE & CLEANING OF CEMETERY MONUMENTS</u>. If a monument shows signs of needing to be cleaned, use a mild soap powder and water with a stiff fiber brush--never use a <u>wire</u> brush. Remove dying flowers as soon as they begin to wilt if they are touching the stone; the acids from the dying flowers may stain. Artificial flowers should not be left in contact with stone since the dyes used in them can cause hard-toremove stains. Never use acids or sandblasting to clean the stone. *GenSoc of Greater Miami*, FL, Vol 15-2, April 1988.

<u>SCOTLAND FEMALE NAMES</u>. According to Volume 9, No. 3, of Ancestors Unlimited Edition (Jonesboro, GA,) when researching females in Scotland, look for their maiden name, as this is what appears in all legal documents, including the death record. The female's name at birth is her legal name throughout her life.

MASONIC LODGE IN ILLINOIS. The office of the Grand Secretary maintains all the Masonic records of its members. Records contain name, birthdate, place, occupation at the time of petitioning, and the dates degrees were conferred. The records of every Mason in Illinois since 1840 who received a degree is available. Write to: Office of the Grand Secretary, Box 4147, Springfield, IL, 62708. Enclose SASE. 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BOOK REVIEW

Virginia Northern Neck Land Grants 1694-1742 and Virginia Northern Neck Land Grants Volume II 1742-1775 by Gertrude E. Gray. Baltimore. Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc. 1987 and 1988. Purchased by the Society.

Until 1690 grants of land in the area lying between the Potomac and the Rappahannock Rivers, known as the Northern Neck of Virginia, were included in the Virginia Colony Grant Books. Book 1 of the Northern Neck grants from 1690-3 Sept. 1692 was issued by the Virginia State Library in 1980 as a Supplement to Nell Marion Nugent's *Cavaliers and Pioneers*. There is an unexplained two year gap, and Book 2 begins 1 Oct. 1694. Volume I of Gertrude E. Gray's books begins with Book 2 and ends with Book E. Volume II of the series covers Grant Books F through P, and includes grants for land in Hampshire and Berkeley counties which are now in West Virginia. The entries usually show the grantees name, current place of residence, number of acres, grant's location by watercourse, county, and adjacent land owners, the date issued, and the book and page number. In some cases the surveyor is also shown but his name is not included in the index. These two volumes are very helpful in locating early settlers of Virginia and are sure to get much use in our library.



Louise Ann Arnold, Historian, U. S. Army Military History Institute, Carlisle Barracks. Pennsylvania, will speak on "Source Materials of American Military Ilistory".

Original source materials are a vital part of the Military History Institute's holdings. Diaries, letters, photographs, art work, and personnel records provide intimate insights into the past. The Institute's extensive collection of materials includes the personal papers of numerous prominent Generals and the papers of thousands of junior officers and enlisted men and women whose services contributed to American Military History from the Colonial period to the present.

PGCGS President Jim Reep recommends Ms Arnold as a very dynamic speaker and the Institute as an interesting topic for genealogical researchers.

PGC LIBRARY GENEALOGICAL RESOURCES

John Krivak, an Adult Services Librarian for the Prince George's County (PGC) Memorial Library, spoke to the PGC Genealogical Society on February 1. Having addressed the Society previously on resources in the Library's Maryland Room, this time Mr. Krivak concentrated on other holdings of interest and of help to genealogists. He talked about instructional materials, directories, interlibrary loans, the microfilm rental program, and new indices and copies of Maryland records.

While Mr. Krivak normally responds to all written inquiries that he receives, some libraries do not. The speaker gave pointers for obtaining better response to correspondence: 1) Read and follow suggestions in the "Handbook for Genealogical Correspondence" (call #929.1C). 2) Use "Genealogical and Local Fistory Books in Print" (call #R929.1Y) to identify speci-

fic books that might benefit your research. 3) Have the librarian check OCLC, an online union catalog, to identify which libraries have the book. If it is available on interlibrary loan, ask for it. If it is not available, write to the library and ask that librarian to check the specific book for specific information. 4) If information that you want is in a periodical, ask for a photocopy, not the original publication. 5) Don't send money, but do ask for a bill, enclose a stamped self-addressed envelope, and pay your bill promptly (with a note of thanks - Ed.).

Help! Where is everybody? I've been keeping track of attendance for the past three years and we are seeing what could become a serious problem--or indicates that we have a problem now. WHAT TO DO WITH PRECIOUS PAPERS WHICH SHOULD GO TO AN UNKNOWN SOMEONE?

(Ruth Ingram Stultz)

You're browsing at a Flea Market; a faded picture of a sweet-faced, wistful looking child catches your eye. You pause, wondering and wanting to know more about that little girl with the long curls. In your mind the child begs for it's rightful family.

Over there, on another table, a family Bible seems to struggle for release under a pile of old *National Geographic* magazines. You grieve to see such family treasures relegated to this fate. But, what should you do? You have no family connection to either the picture or the Bible.

Other similar situations confront family researchers -- such as Diane Stultz, my sister-in-law, now faces. Diane's dilemma began with her grandmother, Mrs. Perry, befriending a childless couple in Bladensburg -- Mrs. Edythe Azalia Krammerer Berg, born 10 Dec. 1888, in Tampa, Fl., and George Orrton Berg born 14 Dec. 1895, Oak-brook, Pa.

As age and ill health incapacitated the Bergs, Mrs. Perry assumed more and more responsibility for them. Edythe died first, and eventually George entered a pursing home.

When George could no longer handle his affairs, Mrs. Perry began to take over. Her attempts to locate Berg relatives revealed distant cousins in Pennsylvania. But, no one came to visit George; nor did any relative come to either Edythe's or George's funeral.

In final settlement, the following personal documents were handed over to Mrs. Perry:

George's death certificate, World War I discharge papers, certificate for Knights of Pythias, marriage certificate, Intention of Citizenship for voting purposes, and some property deeds.

Also among the documents was an apprentice indenture to Mellert Foundry and Machine Co. of Reading, Pa. belonging to George's father, Irvin H. Berg.

A page from a family Bible showed the following information for Edythe:

Otto Krammerer b. Apr 29, 1837 (father) Emma Krammerer b. Dec 27, 1870 (mother Yorick Krammerer b. Sept 25, 1892

Other family names that appear on papers are: Emma Worley, mother of George O. Berg; and George F. Krammerer and Emma L. Pernay, nephew and niece of Edythe Berg.

These documents are available to anyone who can prove a family relationship, or lacking proof of family ownership, to any organization who will preserve them.

MARYLANDERS IN OHIO

BERRY, James (M804:226 R-796)

Hamilton County, Ohio, 2 April 1845:

James BERRY, a resident of Cincinnati, aged 85 yrs, says he entered service in the State of Delaware, in the 2nd Regiment, of Flying Camp under Thomas SCHILLINTON, in 1776; he served four months.

Next, he served in Charles NIXON's Co., in the latter part of October 1776, for four months. After 19 or 20 years ago, he gave some of his papers to one Samuel Freeman HUNT, Esq., who was going to help him get a pension; HUNT died shortly thereafter.

James BERRY was born on <u>Deer Creek</u>, in <u>Maryland</u>, on 14 Oct 1759; he was called into service while a resident at Smyrna, Del.; he also lived in <u>Chestertown</u>, <u>Md</u>.: he then moved to <u>Cecil Co</u>., then in <u>Baltimore</u>, and Cincinnati about 25 years.

He was also later in a company of minute men under Col. Charles POPE from 1780 to the end of the war.

ADAMS, John (R-38)

Ross Co., Ohio, Oct. 16, 1833

John ADAMS, resident of Twin Twp., aged 70 years; from information received from his uncle William ADAMS of <u>Summerset Co., Md</u>., with whom he was raised until the age of about 14 years (his parents having both died in his infancy), he was born in <u>Summerset Co., Md</u>., Mar. 5, 1763; about Sep., 1778 he left his uncle, went directly to Annapolis, Md.

Sep., 1778 he enlisted on board the U. S. Schooner (Plator?), comm. by Capt. STEWART; served on schooner at least 3 months; discharged, went to <u>Baltimore</u>, where about Christmas he went on board the brig Black Prince as a privateer, continued as such until Sep., 1781 when he returned home.

Nov., 1781 drafted as private in militia under Gen. GUNBY; discharged Apr. 1, 1782.

Ross Co., Ohio, Sep. 28, 1852.

Josiah ADAMS, Celia MOOMAW, and Elizabeth KERR, of Ross Co., Ohio, children of John ADAMS deceased, a Rev. War soldier, who entered service from Somersett Co., Delaware. John ADAMS died in Ross Co., Ohio about May 19, 1835; their mother (named Sophia SMITH before her marriage) died in Fayette Co., Ohio about Nov. 9, 1847; John and Sophia were married in Somerset Co., Delaware in 1805, came to Ross Co., Ohio in 1809. These deponents reside in Ross and Fayette Cos., Ohio.

Give power of attorney to James S. McLAIN of Chillicothe, to get any pension due them and the other children of John ADAMS, deceased.

Ross Co., Ohio, Sep., 1852.

Power of attorney agreed to by Josiah ADAMS, Peter MOOMAW, and Moses KERR. (OR&PF, Vol. XXVI, No. 3, 1985, p. 134-5)

ACKRIGHT, Isaac (R-22)

Wayne Co., Ohio, Mar. 26, 1824. Deposition of John ACKRIGHT. Isaac ACKRIGHT, father of John, whose papers

were burned at John's house on Mar. 15, 1824 at Perry Twp., Wayne Co. His father served under Capt. HARRIS.

Wooster, Wayne Co., Ohio, Mar. 26, 1824.

Isaac ACKRIGHT of Wayne Co., aged 86 years. Enlisted for 8 months in spring or summer of year in which York Island was taken, in <u>Baltimore, Md</u>., in Capt. Jesse Beers Co., Co. Hill's Reg. (termed the Flying Camp), <u>Md. Continental line</u>; discharged in 10 months at Philadelphia. Received wound in left hip at battle at the white plains when the Americans were beaten by the British; wound has disabled him.

3 or 4 months after discharge, he enlisted at <u>Capetown, Md</u>. in Capt. HARRIS' Co. for 3 years in <u>Maryland Continental line</u>; went to join regiment, but hip wound prevented it; he went into public hospital, went home after two weeks; arranged for a substitute, being one Peter SWANTON who was accepted by Capt. HARRIS and who was later killed in the field of battle.

This applicant has no family of his own, but resides with his children who are all poor and cannot keep him while sustaining their several families.

Rejected because service in the Flying Camp as that description of service is not provided for the by the Act of Mar. 18, 1818.

Muskegon, Mich., Apr. 8, 1890. Letter from Isaac EAKRIGHT. Grandfather was Isaac, wants to know surname spelling (akright, Arkright, Akeright, Eckright); he joined as a substitute for a Mr. Swanson or Swanton.

ACTON, Henry (S-2337)

Belmont Co., Ohio, Nov. 5, 1832.

Henry ACTON, aged 77 years old.

Enlisted early spring, 1776 with Horatio CLOCKET/DICKET, served in the Flying Camp regiment, Capt. John LOVE, Horatio CLICKET, Ensign, Wm DUVALL, Lt.; left Christmas following only served the one enlistment; entered service when he resided near <u>Piscataway, Prince George's Co., Md</u>., in battle of Ft. Washington and battle of white plains; served 9 months.

Letter from Arch WOODS, Pension Agent, Oct. 5, 1837, Wheeling, Va., to Washington, D.C. enclosing vouchers of Frederick (WATLENS) of Harrison Co., Ohio, pensioner, and for Henry ACTON, Belmont Co., Ohio pensioner.

Lettered from Hendreysburg, Ohio, May 31, 1843 from B. EATON which mentions application for pension for Lucy ACTON, widow of Henry ACTON.

Undated latter from Armstongsville, Belmont Co., Ohio from E. J. GILLETT, being a grandson of Henry ACTON; wants Henry's pension. Poor speller. May be marrying Mary A. (KNAUFF?); also mentions Samuel WHEELER who is very sick.

Kasemeyer and asked him to introduce a bill in Annapolis that would establish a procedure whereby old family graveyards would be protected until such time as heirs could be advertised for, and/or the inscriptions could be photographed and copied.

NEWSLETTER, Vol. XXI, No. 3, "You should question offers to send money to a post office box, since there is no way for personal contact." TIPS ON ADDRESSING LETTERS. In general, typed letters will reach the addressee in a large city one day earlier than hand-written envelopes. The optical scanner will read the address in the reverse order from bottom to top, starting with zip code, then state, then city, with street address or box number just above, on the next to last line. Ιf there is an "Attn" at the bottom left of the envelope, it will be kicked out by the scanner and wait until a human eye can sort it. Ιf the box number is where all mail should be sent, then put it AFTER the street address and just before city, state and zip. Use your zip + 4 whenever possible; mail may reach you a day sooner since it pinpoints your location within your city more precisely than just the five digit your zip. If you do not know what your zip + 4 is, look at telephone bill address.

WILL OF ROBERT FRANCIS OF MARYLAND

Mrs. Ellen A. Williams of Swan Quarter, NC has been researching deed books for Bath Co., NC, which included Beaufort, Hyde and Craven Precincts, and in Vol I (1695-1729) page 286 she found this interesting info:

"In the name of God Amen! I Robert Francis in the Province of Maryland being sick and weak of body, but of sound \mathcal{E} perfect mind and memory ... I give to my sister Wilcah Linsicum a gold ring, which was my Father's wedding ring, and now in the Possession of my Mother Mrs. Mary Young. I give ... to my sister Sarah Young the ring I now wear to be sent unto her immediately after my Decease. All the rest of my estate both real and personal I give to my loving Uncle Joseph Hill of Maryland and it is my desire that after my just Debts are paid, that what effects remain due to me may be immediately shipped off in my vessel to my said Uncle by my Executor hereafter named ... I appoint my loving friend John Tripp to be my Executor of this my last Will and Testament. Witness my hand and seal this 4th Day of March 1717/18.

/s/ Ro: Francis

Witnesses: Elizr Lillington Wm Barrow John Lillington Proved at April court 1718. Jno Hatton Clk Court"

On page 294 there is An Inventory of the Estate of Capt. Robert Francis, Decsd, Dated June 28th 1718. Signed by James Leigh, John Lillington, Will Sigley, John Brown. The inventory runs for $1\frac{1}{2}$ pages and includes clothing, fabbric, pewter items, glass bottles, books, etc.



DIARIES, LETTERS, ETC. AT MHI

At the March PGCGS meeting, Ms. Lousie Ann Arnold, Historian at the U.S. Army Military History Institute (MHI), Carlisle Barracks, PA, gave the members present an overview of the where, what, why,

and how of the MHI. It was started in 1967 with two employees and its founder, Col. George S. Pappas. The staff now numbers 38. MHI acquires, concentrates, preserves, organizes, and disposes of material relating to U.S. military history. It is a central depository for Army-related books, periodicals, letters, diaries, memoirs, veterans' surveys, unit histories - both published and unpublished, photographs, oral histories, and more. Most information concerns Army officers.

To do research at MHI, you need to know an officer's unit, or a battle in which he fought, a location in which he served, and/or a time period. It is best to go to MHI. Call ahead (717)245-3611. Also consult the bibliographies of MHI holdings that Ms. Arnold gave to the PGCGS library. Talk with Mr. David Keough or Dr. Richard Sommers about personal papers; talk to Mr. Michael Winey or Mr. Randy Hackenburg about photographs. See Ms. Arnold or another Historian when you arrive to get started with your research. (cont'd. on p. 133)

From the President's Den:

The first item of this month's message is to express my thanks and gratitude for the efforts that made it possible to complete our newest book, the <u>Index to the Probate Records of Prince George's</u> <u>County, 1696-1900</u>. The next step can best be aided by everyone's help...that is to help us sell "our new production." Thanks to our steady use of printed receipts from the sales of our previous books, we have developed an extensive mailing list to advertise the new book and conduct its pre-publication sale. The sale of this book <u>can be</u> as hot or hotter than <u>Stones and Bones</u> (and it has been a dandy).

The next major goal is to conduct, what could be called the biggest event we have ever attempted, a Bible Copy Day on May 20th. However, we're not sure that the magnitude of this effort has yet been truly understood. We will be trying to place two or three members in nine of the twenty-one P.G. County Branch Libraries. This operation could involve as many as 30-40 of our members being active in one event, at the same time, and on the same day. But, the results of a successful event could produce enormous benefits to us as members, as well as researchers from all over the country interested in the State of Maryland.

Here's a great chance for two or three friends to cover the same library together. Let Karen Miles know if you have a preference to work at a particular library. (More details in next month's Bulletin.)

<u>Maryland Fragments</u>, another publication to help celebrate our 20th anniversary, is coming along with some contributions from local members and our out-of-state members. If current trends continue or improve, we should be prepared to publish an informative, special booklet sometime in the last month of the program year or during the summer. (Obviously, the availability of funds to print will depend on the successful marketing of our probate records book.)

Twenty of our Society members, some old timers and some more recent regulars, were invited to a short, brainstorming conference at the Maryland Archives at Annapolis in the middle of March. This event was the beginning of a three step process to develop some positive direction to our future publishing efforts.

This Society has, for the most part, completed publishing in those areas identified by a group years ago. Consequently, this specially selected group is looking at the various possibilities for future book subjects.

A second meeting on April 12th will follow in which a smaller group will begin to select those subjects from the brainstorming session deemed to be of the most value, narrowing the list to a more manageable size. In May, an even smaller group will reduce the list and establish priorities to the subjects. At that point, a list will have emerged which can be recommended to the Society as having the most potential for researchers interested in Prince George's County, and hopefully, provide our Society with the best possible direction for our future efforts. The final list will be placed in the hands of the Records and Special Publications Chairpersons for their use in managing our efforts. We will publish that final list in the Bulletin.

The last thing for this month is to express my thanks in behalf of the entire membership to those folks who continue to provide refreshments for our hospitality period. There has always been some controversy over the value of this activity. However, there never seems to be a lack of interest in the eats, and more importantly, to the friendly conversation that takes place among members and guests. This social period is important. THANKS FOR YOUR CONTRIBUTIONS.

PROBATE INDEX GOES TO PRESS

Finally!! After ten long years, and a lot of frustration for a dedicated few and hard work for many, the <u>Index To The</u> <u>Probate Records of Prince George's County</u> <u>Maryland, 1696-1900</u>, has gone to press. An agreement has been signed with Braun-Brumfield, Inc., of Ann Arbor, Michigan, to produce seven hundred copies of the Society's seventh book. The books are scheduled for delivery no later than June 1, 1989...which is just in time to help us celebrate the Society's 20th anniversary.

This 258-page, $8\frac{1}{2}$ " X 11" work was completed due to the efforts of many of our members. They are identified, and thanked, within the preface of this maroon covered book, enhanced with gold colored lettering. The cover is also adorned with a drawing of P. G. County's first courthouse at Charles Town, Md.

Photographs of the 1881 and 1940 courthouses have been placed in the book with a brief history of these local, landmark buildings.

The book's early pages include an introduction by internationally known genealogist Milton Rubincam. Mr. Rubincam introduces you to his local, home society (the Prince George's County Genealogical Society) and its publishing efforts. He provides you with a glimpse of the Society's first twenty years and brings you to the point of publication of this book.

A "How To" section has been included which gives an explanation of how to get the maximum benefit from the book. This section describes the various columns, and their content, along with a description of the "keys" used in a reference column--used much like footnotes or explanatory notes.

An additional, but indispendable, section is included which provides background information for the researcher of probate records in Prince George's County. Described in this section is a brief history on county probate records. It presents, to you the reader, a snapshot picture of all the sources of origin for colonial and county probate records. It provides historical and genealogical hints that give you a road map for researching these important records.


The text of this research tool contains over 12,000 entries indexed by the name of the deceased. But, the book doesn't stop there. A second section presents an index of over 4,000 entries identifying the executors or administrators of the estates. The index of the deceased identifies whether: Will, Administration or Inventory. Information can include date, file books, page numbers, file numbers, and special keys to notes of explanation.

One of the true bonuses in this book is created by the unusual "find" by the original project leader, Phyllis Cox. While working on compiling and checking information for the book, she located seven file drawers of probate records which had never been absorbed nor recorded within the county probate record system. These records are from the approximate time period of 1788 to 1810.

Appendices have been added to provide the reader with a helpful glossary of frequently used probate terms; and a listing of Prince George's County Registers of Wills and their dates of service.

If you are researching the people of Prince George's County, Maryland; this book belongs on your bookshelf. (It also makes an excellent gift to someone else who has a similar interest.) Check for the pre-publication notice, complete with order blank, in the center of this issue of the <u>Bulletin</u>. Be sure to take advantage of the pre-publication sale price.

J. Holman & Co.; No. 930 Arch Street; 1880."

The Bible is presently owned by Mr. Robert C. GRUBB of Mt. Vernon, Ohio. Mr. GRUBB is a son of Roland D. and Rose Maud (McCLARNAN) GRUBB, and a grandson of Albert Curtis and Mary Catherine A. (HAWK) GRUBB.

The information is presented in the same four-page format appearing in the Bible except for page three, Marriages. For the sake of clarity, the three wives of Harry GRUBB and Roland GRUBB are each shown with their respective husbands in the order of their marriages rather than in the chronological order shown in the Bible.

PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY BULLETIN

MARYLANDERS IN CLERMONT COUNTY OHIO Submitted by Rose M. White

Excerpted from "Sketches of Revolutionary Service," written by R.J. Bancroft, published in The Clermont Sun Newspaper of Batavia, Ohio May-July 1901. This is available on microfilm through interlibrary loan from the Ohio Historical Society Archives Library, in Columbus; Microfilm Reel #24164 - fee \$8.50. Often many more details are noted in the article.

JAMES CARTER, Wayne Twp: He served in the Maryland line and was on the 1840 Government rolls. He owned land in Clermont by 1806 and lived near Edenton.

REECE CARTER, Wayne Twp: A brother to James, he died before 1835 in Wayne. He had first located at Geraul's Station in 1791, then moved to Edenton by 1806. In 1829 he removed to Indiana.

JOHN DAY, Franklin Twp: b 29 Jan 1755 near Baltimore, d 1817 Clermont, m 1 Aug 1776 to Abigail Poe b 1760, d 22 Apr 1845. He moved to Clermont in 1802. Matthew Day who died in Maryland was the father of John and John in turn sired Martha, Mathew, John, Edward, Mark, Thomas, Isaac, Jesse, Mary and Joseph B.

DANIEL DURHAM, Jackson Twp: He was born four miles from Baltimore. and settled on the Little Miami River in Clermont soon after 1791. In 1800 he bought land where the village of Tobasco now exists. He raised nine children: Sarah m Jonathan Frazier, Ellen m Joseph Martin, Elizabeth m Alexander Morrison, Samuel m Susan Ayer, Joshua m Elizabeth Woodruff.

GEORGE HUNTER, Wayne Twp: He left Maryland's eastern shore in 1806, settling at the mouth of what is known as Hunter's Run in Clermont. In 1830 he moved on to Indiana.

DARY MALOTT, Williamsburg Twp: He was one of six children raised near Baltimore. He and three brothers - Peter, William and John - removed to Clermont about 1800. Three were revolutionary veteran. An older brother, Daniel, had been out to Clermont earlier. The father of these brothers originally fled France because of revolutionary persecution there.

WILLIAM MALOTT, Jackson Twp: He lived at Reisterstown and enlisted in the Baltimore troops, as did John and Dorey, his brothers. He settled along the East Fork in 1800, later died and was buried there, in Clermont Co. His sons, William and Isaac, remained nearby but his sons, Thomas and Zedekiah went West. Several daughters married into the William L. Jones family.

ANDREW McGREW, Miami Township: He enlisted in Baltimore, moved from there to Milford in 1806, and died in 1823. He had nine children: Charles, William, Faul, Joseph, Andrew, Isaac, and two daughters who married Conduce Gatch and Jacob Gest. Charles removed to Indiana, but the others remained in the area of Clermont County. DANIEL MORGAN, Goshen Twp: He was born in Baltimore, then moved to Goshen in 1799, and on to Delaware Co in 1826, where he died. His oldest son Joseph m Ann Grundy in 1815 and fathered Silas, Daniel Jr., John, and Mary.

BENJAMIN FENN, Washington Twp: b 1740 Frederick Co, Md; d 1835 Clermont; m 1774 Mary Sargent of Montgomery Co, Md. He was called out as part of the local guard in Frederick. He removed to Clermont in 1808. Two sons accompanied him - Elijah T. and Benjamin, Jr. One son remained in Maryland. Seven of his nine daughters married respectively: Nathaniel Hines, George Richards, Richard Tucker, R.C. Lanham, Benjamin Thrasher, James Prather, and Joshua Pigman. Mary Sargent d 1815 Clermont.

DANIEL ROUDEBUSH, Goshen Twp: He was born 1749 in Frederick Co, Md. as one of four children. He married Christina Snively and in 1796 moved to Kentucky, then in 1799 settled in Clermont. He died 10 Oct 1804, Christina died 10 June 1833. His children were: Catherine m Andrew Frybarger, David m Eleanor Hall, Jacob m Elizabeth Hartman, George went to Indian, Daniel, and John.



PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGIES

One of the latest supplements edited by Marion J. Kaminkow is titled <u>Genealogies in the Library</u> of Congress, Second Supplement, <u>1976-1986</u>, published by the Magna Carta Book Company, Baltimore, Maryland, 1987. This latest supplement indicates that the Library of Congress has accessioned five genealogies which include Prince George's County families. The existence of these genealogies was mentioned at a regular Society meeting.

PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY WILL BOOK 1, 1698-1770

Abstracted by Donald L. Wilson

MCW = Maryland Calendar of Wills, by Jane Baldwin Cotton (8 v., 1906-1928)

Page 173. [MCW 6:86] Will of Thomas PAGGOTT of PG Co, planter, being sick and weak in body. Date: 17 July 1728. Item: To my well beloved wife the halfe of all my lands I shall die P[o]ssest with dureing her natural life and after her death to my grandarter [sic] Eliz'a PAGETT [PAGATT?]. Itm: The other part to my grandarter of my lands to be put in purseshun [possession] of at the age of sixteen years. Itm: One large gould ring to Bigger HEAD at the day of my death to be delivered to him or his heirs or asines [=assigns]. Itm: My wife shall have the half of my personall estate during her natural life and then to my grandarter. Itm: The other part of my estate to be d[e]live[r]d to her at the day of marig or at the year of sixteen. Item: My loving wife and Mr. Thomas COLMAN planter should be my hole [=whole] exect'rs and to bring up my grandarter and maintaine hear [=her] according to hear estate. Signed: Tho: PAGGOTT. Wit: Abraham WILLSON, Bigger HEAD, Joseph (\pm) WEAST.

Proved 26 Nov. 1728 by the oaths of Abraham WILLSON, Joseph WEST [WERT?], and Bigger HEAD, that they saw Thomas PAGGETT sign. Before Pet[er] DENT, Depty Com[missa]ry of PG Co. (3-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Thomas PAGET was transported to Maryland in 1652-8 [Skordas, Early Settlers of Maryland, p.346]; as Thomas PAGETT he is shown as immigrating 1654 [*ibid.*]. Thomas PAGET, probably the same one, left a will in Calvert Co, Md, 1677, mentioning his sons Thomas, William, and Henry, his wife and three daughters [MCW 1:194]. William PAGETT m. by 1679, Amy sister of James PASCALL [Archives of Maryland 51:263]. Thomas PADGETT witnessed a will, Calvert Co, 1687 [MCW 2:42].

Thomas PAGGETT, planter, of Calvert Co, now PG Co, and wife Sarah sold 50 acres near Indian Towne Creek, in possession of Thomas PAGGETT and Joseph GREERE, 1696 [PG Deeds A:16]. Thomas PAGGETT of Calvert/PG Co. and wife Sarah sold to Joseph GREERE the west half of an unnamed 400 acre tract, originally patented to them in 1695 [PG Deeds A:47, 1696]. Joseph GREER of Calvert/PG Co. sold to Thomas PAGGETT the eastern half of the tract [PG Deeds A:58, 1697].

Thomas PADGETT was involved in several court suits 1696-1699 in PG Co. In 1696 he was a defendent in a case of debt; he had promised to pay for Henry PAGETT, his brother, in Calvert Co. [Smith, *Court Records of PG Co, Md, 1696-1699*, p.332]. In 1716, William PAGGETT chose Thomas PAGGETT for his guardian [Smith, *Orphans and Infants of PG Co*, p.82]. Could this be a grandson or nephew?

Thomas PAGETT was taxed in 1719, Mattapeny Hundred, PG Co. [Calendar of Md. State Papers: the Black Books (BB): 160]. Benjamin PADGET was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred that same year [BB:160]. A Benjamin PADGETT left a will in Charles Co, Md, 1727 [Magruder, Index of Md. Colonial Wills]. No attempt has been made to track possible descendants.

Page 174. [MCW ²:67] Will of William <u>HNUTER</u> Senr. of PG Co, being sick of body. Date: 6 May 1728. Item: To my beloved wife Rebecca my muletto boy together with all & singular my goods chattels household stuff pewter bedding & all other my moveable substance whatsoever now in my possession to be by her enjoyed for her natural life or for and dureing the time that she shall remain a widdow & (over)

unmarryed but at her decease or if she should remarry I will that the Mulatto boy fall to my son William HUNTER for & dureing the remaining term that the said Muletto shall have to serve [boy's name not given] and all the above named goods & chattels to be equally divided between my sd. son William & Mary my daughter wife of John PILES to them & their heirs for ever. I will that my executors hereafter named shall from time to time inspect into the same that the produce of the stock be not left or squandered away or the other goods fraudently deminished but that they be assisting to my wife in the preservation of the same. I will that out of the sd. stock my wife shall allow for three years time such necessary provision as my sd. son William shall have need of. Item: To Hunter PILES, William PILES, John PILES and Mary PILES my grand children the children of John PILES and Mary PILES his wife my daughter all that tract of land called "Hunters field" to be divided among them in manner & form following: 150 acres to Hunter PILES and the residue to be equally divided and distributed among the other three William, John and Mary each one third part to them and their heirs forever. Item: One acre of ground of the above tract or land where my first wife and some of my children are buried and where my body shall be laid shall not be sold or disposed of forever. Item: To my grandson Thomas HUNTER the sum of one shilling. Lastly: I constitute William HUNTER my son & my good son [=godson?] Zachariah WADE to be executors. Signed: William (H) HUNTER. Wit: Philip (+) TENNELY, John (HB) BRAWNER, James KENDALL.

Proved 25 June 1728 by the oaths of John BRAWNER & Phill: TENNELY. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (7 sides)

NOTES: William HUNTER was transported to Maryland in 1676 [Skordas, op.cit.]. In 1689, "Hunterfields" was patented to William HUNTER in Charles Co, Md (land that would fall into PG Co. in 1696) [Land Grants BB#3:369, on map in Hienton, *Prince George's Heritage*]. William HUNTER received personalty from the will of Eliza: YOUNG, Charles Co, 1695 [MCW 2:100]; he was a legatee of Richard HOBART, Charles Co, 1698 [MCW 2:162], and a legatee of the will of Edward SAUNDERS, Charles Co, 1699 [MCW 2:176]. Some of these references pertain to a different man, Rev. William HUNTER who died testate in Charles Co, 1723 [MCW 5:148].

In PG Co, William HUNTER was appointed constable for Piscattaway Hundred, 1696. In 1698 a John NORRIS had been debtor to William HUNTER since 1695. A Mary HUNTER is mentioned in the court minutes in 1697 [Smith, Court Records of PG Co.].

William HUNTER was taxed in Piscattaway Hundred in 1719 along with John PILES [BB:164]. In 1733, John PILES and [the younger] William HUNTER appear in the tax list of Upper Piscattaway Hundred [BB:268]. William HUNTER became the master and guardian of Elizabeth SEYMOUR, 1714, until age 16 (she was 3) [Smith, Orphans and Infants of PG Co, p.95].

The children of John and Mary PILES were registered in King George Parish, PG Co: Hunter 1721, Mary 1722, William 1724, John 1728, Thomas Richard 1729. The will of John PILES, 1735, PG Co, mentions wife Mary, and children Hunter, Mary, William, John, Richard, Francis, Sarah and an unborn child [MCW 7:135]. William HUNTER, perhaps the son, left a will in PG Co, 1761 [Magruder, op.cit.].

Colonel (Ret.) Robert S. Drake, formerly of Hyattsville, Md., but now of 880 Meadow Lark Lane, Merritt Island, FL 32953, recently sent me some notes regarding his ancestor Thomas PLUMMER (d. 1728) whose will appeared in the January BULLETIN. Newman, Anne Arundel Gentry 2:377, in an article on the STOCKETT family claims that Elizabeth STOCKETT, dau. of Thomas, m. Thomas PLUMMER as his

second wife. Based on the evidence that Newman presents, I have trouble accepting the conclusion that is drawn.

Newman does show, rather convincingly, that Thomas STOCKETT, with his brothers, arrived in Maryland by 1661, first settling in Baltimore County, but by 1667/8 moving to Anne Arundel County. By 1667 ("about 1665") STOCKETT had married Mary, daughter of Richard WELLS Sr, as proved by the father-in-law's will. Thomas STOCKETT himself died in 1671, leaving a will mentioning only his son Thomas by name, but referring to daughters. Mary (WELLS) STOCKETT soon married Joseph YATE who died in A.A. Co. in 1691, mentioning <u>daughter</u> Elizabeth PLUMMER. Newman contends that YATE really meant that Elizabeth PLUMMER was his stepdaughter, and that she was too old to have been born after Thomas STOCKETT's death, so therefore must be STOCKETT's daughter.

My experience has been that people of that time generally used the term "daughter in law" if they were referring to a stepdaughter. If YATE named this particular stepdaughter, who received considerable land from him, why didn't he also provide for the two other (presumed) stepdaughters, Frances DUVALL and Mary RICHARDSON? Furthermore, it does not make sense for the PLUMMERs to begin calling sons <u>Yate</u> PLUMMER if he was not a blood relation.

Col. Drake's ancestor chart identifies Elizabeth (STOCKETT) PLUMMER as the wife of the emigrant, Thomas PLUMMER who died in 1694. This is a chronological impossibility: The immigrant Thomas, came to Maryland in 1667, probably as a young man. I estimate his birth to ca. 1645. His son (Thomas PLUMMER who d. in 1728) was probably b. ca. 1670/5. <u>His</u> eldest son, Thomas PLUMMER who m. 1715 Sarah WILSON, was apparently b. in the early 1690s. The wife of the first Thomas PLUMMER (who was named Elizabeth) could not have been born 1665/71, a requirement if she is the daughter of Thomas STOCKETT. The daughter of Mary (WELLS) STOCKETT YATE would be the right age to marry the second Thomas PLUMMER. If she were born ca. 1671/75 she could certainly be the natural daughter (not stepdaughter) of Joseph YATE. In 1691 she and Thomas PLUMMER (2nd) would have been married just a short time. Elizabeth would be in her late teens.

On Col. Drake's chart, the wife of the second Thomas PLUMMER is identified as Elizabeth SMITH, sister of John SMITH. John SMITH's will in Calvert Co, 1698, does indeed refer to his sister Elizabeth PLUMMER, although her husband is not identified. I don't have enough evidence to pinpoint her place in the family. The only clue that suggests she might be tied to Thomas PLUMMER of PG Co. is the fact that she had a brother named Philemon SMITH, who might be the namesake of Philemon PLUMMER. That evidence by itself is not convincing to me. I apologize to Col. Drake for giving him back a conundrum.

THE NATIONAL SOCIETY OF DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION (NSDAR)

On April 17 a multitude of women will gather in Constitution Hall to attend opening night of the NSDAR 98th Continental Congress, and in 1990, the organization celebrates it's 100th birthday. WHAT would Hannah Arnett think?!?

The NSDAR, sometimes referred to as "Something Hannah Arnett started," really had it's beginnings with a letter in the Hashington Post on July 13, 1890, written by Mary Smith Lockwood.

Mrs. Lockwood, questioning the judgement of the newly-formed "Sons of the American Revolution" in denying membership to women, asked in her letter, "Were there no mothers of the Revolution? Were these sires without dams?"

Mary Lockwood wrote the story of a Council of men meeting, during some bleak, discouraging days of the war, in the Arnett home to discuss surrender to England. When Hannah, dutifully sitting in another room, overheard "surrender," she charged into the meeting; assaulting the astonished men with a rousing, patriotic speech. Hannah even threatened to divorce her husband if he turned into a "coward."

Shamed by **Hannah**'s oùtburst, the men reconsidered their decision to surrender; and of course, saw America win the war. Without **Hannah**, a decision to surrender could have rewritten our history.

Mrs. Mary Smith Lockwood, along with Miss Mary Desha, Miss Eugenia Washington, and Mrs. Ellen Hardin Walworth would subsequently organize the DAR and be recognized as it's "Four Founders."

Mrs. Gary Meeds, D.C. DAR State Regent, is publishing a book on the Four Founders. It will be available for sale in 1990. For further information on the book, contact: Ruth Stultz, 5800 Swarthmore Dr., College Park, Md. 20740

To be accepted as a member of DAR, a woman must document her legitimate direct lineage back to an ancestor who served in or rendered aid to the Revolution. This is best done by beginning with one's self and working backward.

A potential member should visit a DAR Chapter. After two visits, the applicant can be recommended for membership. Two copies of application papers, countersigned by two members, along with the application fee, must be submitted.

<u>RESEARCHING FAUQUIER CO, WARRENTON, VA</u>. By Dr. Carolyn A. Tyson. Records since the county's formation in 1759 can be found in the clerk's office on Ashby Street in Warrenton. Public parking is located nearby. This area was formerly a part of Prince William after its separation in 1731 from Stafford Co. Fairfax Co, VA GenSoc, Vol. 4-3, Jan. 1989.

LAND RECORDS. When using family land records, check both the grantor and grantee deeds. When found, take the deed to the assessor's office to get a plat map which often gives family information. This might include homestead claims; it could provide information on citizenship; and it could possibly give information about neighbors who may have a background similar in origin or migration to your ancestors. Santa Maria Valley GenSoc, Vol 20-1 and 2, 1988.

PROBATE PROCEEDINGS. If you have found a family that lists the surviving children, do you know how to locate those children in order families? Take a look at the index of probate to research their proceedings. You should find records listed (with book and page given) of 1) Letters of Administration; 2) Audit Reports; 3) Inventory; and 4) Accounting Reports. Check the final audit report to see if the survivors signed for the receipt of their inheritance. Usually this record will list the current address of the surviving children. <u>MISCELLANEOUS RECORDS--A SURPRISE SOURCE</u>. In addition to land and probate records, ask if the county has Miscellaneous Records. Be sure to read all the indexes for surnames. Sometimes they are indexed by the person making the affidavit, and may list the subject on the same line. Johnson Co, KS GenSoc, Vol 16-4, Dec. 1988.

If you lend your photo of a Civil War veteran for copying, the Department of the Army will send you a free 8x10 copy of each one you send. Their goal is to have a likeness of every Civil War soldier. Include information such as name, rank, unit and dates of birth and death. If you write first, they will send a franked label, so you can mail photos without paying postage, or you may use certified mail. Write to: Michael J. PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY MINUTES MONTHLY SOCIETY MEETING Greenbelt Library, 11 Crescent Road, Greenbelt, Maryland 4 March 1989

The President called the meeting to order at 2:05 P.M., with 70 people attending. Five visitors introduced themselves.

Jim Reep recognized the momentous contributions made to our Society by Laird Towle and gave him an <u>Honorary Life Membership</u>. Mr. Towle is a Charter Member and one of the five founding members, 2-term president, 1-term vicepresident, a past guest-speaker many times and he donates many periodicals to our Library. Thank you, Mr. Towle, for your continued support.

The Minutes for the February 4, 1989, meeting were approved as published.

In the absence of our <u>Treasurer</u>, Jim Reep indicated that we had \$7,764,90 in our savings account and \$1,643.85 in our checking account. Jim then asked that he be authorized to spend up to \$6300 to print 700 copies of our book, <u>Index to the Probate Records of Prince George's County</u>, <u>Maryland</u>, <u>1696-1900</u>. Amid the cheers and applause for the near-end of a ten-year project, one could hear Phyllis Cox motion that we approve the expenditure of \$6300 to print the book. Charlotte Couzantino seconded the motion. All were in favor.

Maxie Phillips, <u>Programs</u>, announced the speakers for the next three months. Charlotte Couzantino, <u>Records</u>, described some of the bonus features of the Probate Book, such as the history and explanation of the county court system and a glossary of probate terms. The pre-publication price, which runs through May 15, 1989, will be \$16.00. Regular price will be \$18.00. Postage is included in the price. Flyers will be sent out with the next Bulletin.

Virginia Heyerdahl, <u>Special Publications</u>, indicated that we are now taking checks for the book. We expect to receive the books around the first of June.

Walt Silvester, <u>Regular Publications</u>, gave the deadlines for the Bulletin: March 4 for the April issue; April 5 for the May issue.

Dorothy Rainwater, <u>Education</u>, reminded us of <u>our Seminar</u> this month. Karen Miles, <u>Bible Records</u>, called for more volunteers to staff libraries on May 20th for <u>Bible Records Copying Day</u>. There are nine libraries and we need at least two or three people per library.

Ivan Rainwater, <u>Archivist</u>, is looking for temporary space for the Library while Belair Mansion undergoes renovation. He also mentioned that the estate of Mrs. James Rogers donated a large number of genealogical journals.

Jim Reep said that we have embarked upon a media blitz for both the Bible Records Copying Day and the Marketing of the book, printing 1300 flyers. He also summarized the controversy over the <u>Copyright Law</u>, and Laird Towle delved further into the problem. Bill Miller announced the <u>Maryland Genealogical</u> <u>Society seminar</u> on April 1St. Ruth Dungan alerted <u>Welch researchers</u> to the St. David's Society of Washington, D.C. Barbara O'Neill mentioned a genealogical course offered by the <u>Smithsonian Institution</u>, and Charlotte told us the hours of the <u>new LDS Annapolis Branch Library</u> (MTuWSa 10-2). Pat Paulkovich could not find the <u>double postcards</u> mentioned in her genealogical exchange extracts and Jim Reep found the <u>Boy Scouts' genealogical merit badge booklet</u> a good place even for adults to begin.

Louise Ann Arnold spoke on the Military History Institute in Carlisle, PA. The meeting was adjourned at 4:55 P.M.



FAMILY BURIAL LOT IN WOODVILLE

Ruth E. Morris of Rockville has provided us with the following report:

My Father, John Barker Adams Morris, and his brother James Somervell Morris, on different occasions, pointed out to my sister and to me the place where their parents were buried. Located in Woodville, Aquasco District, Prince George's County, this burial site is in a grove of trees on the east side of Aquasco Road (MD Route 231) north of St. Mary's Church Road, on property now privately owned. The area is wooded but cleared of shrubs, and there are no markers. Listed below are our relatives that we were told are buried there:

Francis Patrick Morris (son of James A. and Martha L		Feb 1901
Mary Elizabeth Adams Morris (wife of above)	b. 4 Jan 1861 d. 16	5 Apr 1905
Frances Rosalie Morris Strong (dau of above)	b. 6 Nov 1885 d. 8	Jul 1938

Ellen Rosalie Morris Adams b. Dec 1832 d. 8 Jan 1904 (mother of Mary Elizabeth Morris; b. Pomonkey, Charles Co.) (widow of John B. Adams)

In addition, my cousin Sophie Strong was told this was the location of the burial of her mother, Rosalie Morris Strong. Anna Lee Craycroft wrote to Sophie on 4 Apr 1979 confirming location of burial plot.

Ms Craycroft also wrote that Mrs. Claude Thomas had willed the land to St. Dominic's Catholic Church. Claude Thomas was son of Washington Thomas, who was married to Sarah Barkley, sister of Ellen Rosalie Barkley Adams. Washington Thomas was brother of George T. C. Thomas. The latter in his will of 28 Mar 1878 wrote in part: "... land joining Beans and the land joining Wrights and Naylors I wish to be sold to pay debts and expenses, and if it is not all consumed that way I wish the graveyard to be enclosed and a tombstone put at graves of Ma and Papa."

If any tombstone was erected, it is no longer in the burial lot. We have been told that the last person to be buried there was a Morton Thomas.

For the record, Ms Ruth Morris would be interested in learning of any other burials in this lot. Please write to PGCG5.

SOCIETY MEMBER VIVIAN EDELEN DONATES HARRIS MANUSCRIPT TO PGCGS LIBRARY

(Ruth Ingram Stultz)

Thomas Harris emigrated from England to Maryland in 1650, bringing with him his wife and a manservant, **John Hamilton**.

Harris had been granted three hundred acres in the William and Mary Parish, in the neighborhood of Picewaxen, then St. Mary's County but now Charles County. The land, described as lying "east of Perres Creek" (Perry's Branch) near unto the head, was granted under "Consideration of Plantation" in London, dated July 2, 1649. The tract of land, first called "Harris's land," is known today as "Mount Tirzah."

Through the years Harris land and Mount Tirzah were occupied by succeeding generations of the family, though some descendants moved into Prince George's County and other parts of Maryland.

Some of the homes in which members of this prominent **Harris** family lived in Charles and St. Mary's Counties stand today as gems of Georgian architecture: Hard Bargain, Waverly, La Grange, and Mount Republican. But Mount Tirzah, where some early family members are buried, stands empty and neglected.

A few allied surnames included in a typed manuscript of the Harris family, donated by society member, Mrs. Vivian Bounds Edelen, are:



Mrs. Edelen, Bryantown, Md., whose husband is a Harris descendant, has thoughtfully included a list of sources for data in her manuscript. A list of **Harris** wills in Charles County spanning the period 1750 - 1936 is also included.

Historians, as well as descendants of the **Harris** family, will find this manuscript of interest because of the many distinguished public figures and their historical homes.

POLICE SLEUTH UNCOVERS PRINCE GEORGE'S INFORMATION SOURCES

The speaker at the April meeting was Lt. Dennis Campbell of the Prince George's County (PGC) Police Department who described the sleuthing that he did to reconstruct and write the history of that law enforcement agency. The resulting book, soon to be published, contains about 350 photographs, many names - 90 percent of the people have been identified, descriptions, personal anecdotes, and a brief (segmented) 50-year history of the County.

Lt. Campbell found his information in a variety of places beginning with the Maryland Rooms at the public library in Hyattsville, the University of Maryland, and the Pratt Library in Baltimore. In fact, he noted that a surprising number of libraries have Maryland Rooms and that it pays to ask. He also did research at the PGC Historical Society Library, the Law and History Libraries in the Court of Appeals building in Annapolis, and the Law Library in the Court House in Upper Marlboro. Community organizations that were helpful include the Odd Fellows, the Lions Club, various volunteer fire companies, and in Clinton, the Surratt Society at Surratts' House. The Martin Luther King Library in the District of Columbia was a particularly good source of local newspapers. Lt. Campbell discovered that Baltimore papers also included Prince George's news. He said that other gold mines of information were personal interviews that he had with descendents and with history buffs, scrapbooks, and for his project, records of the Sheriff's Department.

Paul T. Lanham (#40), formerly of Prince George's County, now residing in Huntingtown, Calvert County, Maryland has provided excerpts and fragments from a BARRON and several LANHAM family bibles. Additional genealogical information from Mr. Lanham will be found in brackets.

[Bible #1] Holy Bible, containing the Old and New Testaments: translated out of the Original Tongues, and with the former translations diligently compared and revised. Stereotyped for the American Bible Society by D. & G. Bruce. Printed by D. Fanshaw, No. 20 St?te-lane, New-York, 1820. The statement below was written on the front of this page. An entry on the reverse of the page is illegible.

Bought Bay horse from Woo ? for 50 Dollars 12 March 1833 at 5 or 6 years old & no more

Written on the reverse of the New Testament page is the following:

A Regester of Deaths & Marriages

- Benjamin Lanham was married April 23rd 1820 [Benjamin's marriage to Harriet White in Washington, D.C. (his first of three marriages)]
- Martha Lanham the wife of Lewis Lanham died the 10th of Sept 1820 [Martha Mitchell, second wife of Lewis Lannum, married in Baltimore on March 29, 1786]
- William Lanham died the 31st of December 1820 [Postmaster at Vansville (Beltsville) married (1) Mary Ann Clarke and (2) Tabitha Beall]
- Lewis Lanham died October 12th 1822 [possibly named Lewis Truman Lanham, possibly born May 1760, great great grandfather of Paul T. Lanham]
- Harriet Lanham died the 12th of march 1826 [see note above on Benjamin Lanham]
- Benj^m Lanham was married to Ann Hardister [?] June 1st 1826 [this was Benjamin's second marriage, Ann's name was probably Hardesty]

Another New Testament page identical to the one above has the following statement written on the front:

Old William Tucker Deceased on Thursday 17 January 1850 [buried in Anne Arundel County; father of Trueman Lanham's second wife, Mary Elen Tucker]

and on the reverse:

Trueman Lanham was Married to Mary Beall On Thursday [?] Nov. 1825 Which [Trueman] was 27 years of Age the 7th Day of Last August

And same Mary Beall was 21 years of Age Last July - 10 Day [she died March 17, 1837, buried in plot on Powhatan Street, New Carrollton. Mary Ann Beall possibly the daughter of Horatio Beall and Harriet Barron]

Martha Anne Lanham was born Thursday Evening on the 31st August 1826 Hariet E. Lanham was Born Friday 22nd August 1828 May 1989

John Lewis Lanham was Born Friday 31 Decb^r 1830 [Bible #2 I suspect this bible originally belonged to Oliver and Eleanor Barron. It was probably carried into the Lanham family by Mary Ann Beall, Trueman Lanham's first wife, and I believe, the daughter of Horatio Beall and Harriet Barron. Accordingly, the Negro entries could relate to Barron slaves as the names are not familiar to me as Lanham slaves (White and West). Lanham entries were subsequently added to this bible.]

5 April 1989

The President called the meeting to order at 7:05 P.M., with 55 people attending. Two visitors introduced themselves.

Jim Reep mentioned two birthdays recently celebrated, Emerald O. Miner and Charles Dunnington. He then introduced the Nominating Committee: Orville Russell, chairman, Eugene Ernest, Karen Miles and Barbara O'Neill. Orville asked for volunteers to fill the jobs of President, 1st Vice-President and Recording Secretary.

The Minutes for the 4 March 1989 meeting were approved as published.



Karen has served as First Vice President and Program Chairperson (1985-86) and has been nominated to fill that position again for 1989-90. NATIONAL ARCHIVES GENEALOGY SPECIALIST SPEAKS AT MAY MEETING

Ms. Constance Potter, a Genealogy Specialist who is employed in Room 400 at the National Archives, told May meeting attendees what they might expect when they visit her area and others in the building. As many members know, resources in Room 400 include microfilm copies of the United States Census records, dating from 1790 to 1910, and ship passenger arrival lists from 1820. Before 1820, passengers were not recorded as they were considered like cargo. Also, existing records may not be complete because some were lost in fires.

Patrons may make copies of many of the records. Some that are fragile must be copied by hand. Photocopies cost 30ϕ each and are paid for by means of a debit card. Debit cards are sold in \$1.00 and \$5.00 denominations and unused amounts on cards may be kept for a later visit or may be turned in for a refund. If you are making copies from microfilm or microfiche, you are reminded to set the copier on POSITIVE in order to make readable prints. (over) Room 203 contains additional records of interest to genealogists: compiled military and pension records, which are kept in the East Research Room. To use the resources in Room 203, all personal items other than a pencil, paper, and essential notes, must be stowed in a locker. You will need 25ϕ in change to operate the locker, but this is returned to you when you push the red button when you have emptied your locker at the end of your visit.

The National Archives also houses some Indian records, dating from 1830 to 1940. Land records are stored in Suitland, as are records relating to District of Columbia residents, including naturalization papers, copies of wills, estate administration papers, and guardianship papers - the latter three for 1801 or 1802 to 1878 (wills to 88). Other naturalization papers are stored at the Regional Archives. Several helpful publications are available from the Archives; they provide lists of calendar items, addresses of the Regional Archives, and the publication called PROLOGUE contains, as a new service to genealogists, a monthly article on genealogy.

Hours of operation begin at 8:45 a.m. Monday through Saturday. The National Archives closes at 9:45 p.m. except on Saturday, when they close at 4:45 p.m. Two levels of assistance are available from the librarians: regular and busy-day. If you need much help, the best time to visit is in the evening. Ms. Potter says her desk is way in the back of the room and genealogists are welcome to seek he out.

Page 175. [MCW 6:85] Will of James MOOR [MCW: MOORE (MOORLE)] of PG Co. and St. Georges Parish, carpenter, sick in body. Date: 29 Oct. 1728. To be buried in such place & with such charges as my dear wife Barbara MOORE [not named in MCW] shall think good. "the Gleanings" Impr: All my freehold estate called in the county and parish aforesaid with all the appurtenances thereof to my said dear wife for & during the term of her natural life and after her decease I give the same to my son Archibald MOORE and the heirs of his body lawfully begotten. Item: To my sd. son Archibald my free hold estate named "Archibalds Lott" in the county and parish aforesaid and to the heirs of his body lawfully begotten. Item: To my sons James & Robert MOOR my freehold of "Allisons Park" in the county and parish aforesaid and to the heirs of their bodys lawfully between [sic, =begotten] to be equally divided betwixt them the one halfe to the said James, the other half to the said Robert & in caice [=case] it shall please God any of my aforesaid sons shall die without heirs of theire bodys lawfully begotten I give the freehold of him so dying to my daughters Euphem [MCW: Euphen] & Barbara to be equally divided betwixt them and to the heirs of their bodys lawfully begotten & in caice one of them should die without heirs as aforesaid then to come to the surviver and for defaualt of heirs her share lawfully begotten of the bodys aforesaid of my daughter to come said dear wife. Provided always it shall be in the power to my of each of my aforesaid sons to settle a joynture on any woman they ishall be lawfully maried to during theire naturall life. Item: I give all my moveable goods for the paying of my just debts. Item: I ordain James HOLMOND & George BEALL, planters, overseers [of] this my last will and testament and guardians to my children requiring them to see my will performed accordingly. Signed: James MOORE. Wit: John ALLISON, Wm (WH) HARBEN [MCW: Wm. HASBON], John JOHNSTON.

Proved 27 Nov. 1728 by oaths of John ALLISON and Wm. HARBEN, before Pet. DENT, Dep[u]ty Com'[issa]ry of PG Co. (5-1/2 sides)

"Glenings" was granted to John ADDISON in 1695. NOTES: Α James MOORE owned an ordinary (inn) in Charles Town (Mount Calvert) ca. 1700 [Hienton, Prince George's Heritage, map and James MORE and George BEALL were taxed in Rock Creek p.13]. Hundred, 1719 [Calendar of Maryland State Papers: the Black Books (BB):1581. Archibald MOORE was taxed in Rock Creek Hundred, PG Co. 1733 [BB:274]. James HOLMEARD was taxed in Collington 1719 [BB:163]. James MOORE Junr. had the following Hundred, children registered in Prince George's Parish: James 1715, Alice

1715 [1716], Ruth 1720, Priscilla 1725, Elizabeth 1727. Prince George's Parish included Rock Creek Hundred. James MOORE Jr. apparently was b. ca. 1690/5. If, as seems likely, he was the son of the testator, James Sr. may have been born ca. 1660/70. Item: To my daughter Sarah HILLARY one Negro girl called Item: To my daughter Ellizabeth Hannah with her increase. HILLARY one negro girl called Mary with her increase to her and her heirs forever. Item: To my daughter Eleanor one Negro girl called Grace with her increase to her and her heirs forever. To my son Henry HILLARY one Negro boy called Samuell to Item: him and his heirs forever. Item: To my son Thomas HILLARY my own rideing saddle. Item: If any of my sons shoud dye before they arrive to the age of 21 years, then what I bequeathed to them to be eqally divided amongst the rest of 'em and if any my daughters shou'd die then their part to be divided amo<u>ns</u>t their suriviving sisters and do hereby impower my dear and loving wife Eleanor HILLARY to keep each childs part four years after they age if she be so minded. Item: To my six children John come of HILLARY, Sarah, William, Elizabeth, Elianor, and Henry HILLARY all the rest of my estate to be equally divided between them. Item: I do hereby leave my sons of age at 18 years old. Lastly: I make my dear and loving wife Elianor HILLARY my whole and sole executrix. Signed: Thomas HILLEARY. Wit: Jan PARETT[?, MCW: Jane PAVETT (PACETT)], I NORTON, A DEMELION [MCW: Anne DEMELION (DEMILION)].

Proved 14 Feb. 1728/9 by the oaths of Anne DEMELION and Jane PAVETT [PARETT?] that they saw Thomas HILLERAY deceased sign the will. Before Pet. DENT, Depty Com'ry of PG Co. (5-1/2 sides)

NOTES: A genealogy of the HILLEARY family can be found in Effie Bowie, <u>Across the Years in Prince George's County</u>, p.465-473. It shows the testator as Thomas HILLEARY Jr (1686-1728/9), a son of Thomas HILLEARY (d. 1697/8) and his second wife Eleanor SPRIGG. All my other personall estate I give and bequeath unto my dearly beloved wife Elizabeth and my loving son Levin to be equally devided between them and I likewise make [and] constitute my said loving wife my only sole Capell KING, Hast executrix. Signed: Benj'a WAILES. Wit: DASHIELL, James MAKMORIE.

Annapolis, 17 April 1729 [MCW: 7 April 1729], proved by the oaths of Capell KING and James MAKMORIE. They and the other evidence Hast DASHIELL subscribed the said will. Before Edw'd Henry CALVERT [not identified, Commissary General?] (5-1/2 sides)

NOTES: Magruder, Index of Maryland Colonial Wills [p.493], identifies Benjamin WAILES as of P.G. and Somerset counties. He is not found in the tax lists of PG Co, 1719 and 1733. Joseph WAILES died testate in Somerset Co, 1737 [ibid.]. Eliza[beth] WAILS is named as a daughter in the will of Nehemiah COVINGTON, Somerset Co, Md, 1710/11; she inherited 420 acres called "Collins Adventure"; she had a brother named Levin COVINGTON [MCW 3:245].

BOOK REVIEWS

Marriages and Deaths From the Calvert Journal, 1876-1879 by Gloria V. Gatewood. c1988. 19pp. + appendix and index. A gift of the author, Gloria V. Gatewood, 3571 Deep Landing Rd., Huntingtown, MD 20639. Price not stated.

Calvert County, Maryland had two fires in 1882. The first destroyed the courthouse and the second destroyed the temporary courthouse and records that had survived the previous fire. For this reason, compilations such as this one of marriages and deaths, are extremely valuable to researchers. The entries are arranged alphabetically by the name of the deceased and the name of the groom. An index to brides and others mentioned, is at the back of the book. Twelve pages of an appendix list estate records mentioned in the newspaper. These are arranged chronologically and unfortunately are not included in the index.

Genealogy and History of the Watson Family From Irish Emigrants to Mayflower Descendants by Samuel E. Watson, Jr., assisted by Ann W. Lively. Santa Rosa, CA. 1988. 195pp. A gift of the author. Copies are available at \$21 from S. E. Watson, Jr., 5507 Inverness Ave., Santa Rose, CA 95404.

Matthew Watson and wife Mary Orr arrived in Boston in 1718. Part one of this genealogy is a genealogy of the descendants of this couple. Part two contains genealogies of seventeen female lines which have been arranged alphabetically. Two of these lines, Allibone and Confer contain information on families that resided at one time in Maryland. Each of the two parts has its own bibliography and index. References are often given, mostly to published sources, and sometimes the citation is incomplete. Author Frederick Virkus is incorrectly listed as Virgus. Some photographs have been included which will make the book more interesting to descendants.

The author has taken genealogical situations and frustrations and woven them into a series of short sketches which are meant to be funny. Numerous drawings illustrate the text. This is a sequel to the author's previous book, *Collecting Dead Relatives*.

The Ancestry of William Neal Hurley, III by W. N. Hurley, Jr. Chelsea, MI. Book-Crafters. 1985. 496pp. indexed. A gift of the author.

The author has divided the volume into five "books", each of which details a surname found in the family's ancestry. The surnames covered are Hurley, Pratt, Hines,, Neikirk and Lowder. The author's Hurley family were early residents of Prince George's Co., MD. The early generations appear to be carefully researched and referenced within the text. Sources for later generations are not often stated, which is a shame since the author seems to have dilligently gathered the facts. MARRIAGE BONDS. Marriage bonds were found extensively in the South and in New England. They were posted prior to the required marriage license and in some states were the sole document. These bonds were posted by the groom alone or with a second person, usually the father or the brother of the bride. It was like an insurance agreement, or a penalty in which the couple to be married would pay the state if there was cause for their marriage to be nullified.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR RECORDS. Because soldiers in state militias did not serve in the Continental Line (federal service,) their records are not held in the National Archives. They can be found, instead, in the Archives of the state of enlistment. The Genealogical Society of Pennsylvania, 1300 Locust St., Philadelphia, PA 19107 has many military records for the Mid-Atlantic region, including Maryland. They are for the Revolutionary and the Civil War. Maryland GenSoc Nwsltr, Vol. 18-1, Feb. 1989.

****NOTE: Maryland militia records (copies and originals) of the Revolutionary War are held by the Maryland State Archives and the Maryland Historical Society. These are distinct from the Continental Service (Regular Army.) The latter are contained in volume 18 of the published series, Archives of Maryland. The militia records were recently published in Maryland Militia in the Revolutionary War, which is available from Family Line Publications, Rear 63 E. Main St., Westminister, MD 21157, \$20.00, postpaid. This book is co-authored by 5. Eugene Clements and by F. Edward Wright, past president of Prince Georges Genealogy Society.

EAPLY MARRIAGES IN THE UPPER OHIO VALLEY. Both Ohio and Virginia men (in the Upper Ohio Valley) tended to marry the young lady on the opposite side of the river, thereby registering their marriage in a county and state in which they did not reside. It seems it was quite fashionable to marry in Washington Co., PA, and Brook Co., WV. Families, or members of families, and individuals constantly slipped back and forth across the river and across political boundaries, depositing their vital records wherever they happened to be.
