# <u>Registration Information</u> <u>Order Form</u> <u>Getting Custom Controls Written</u>

#### Description

IniCon is a custom control that makes <u>INI file</u> access simple. No Windows API calls required.

# File Name

INICON3.VBX

#### **Object Type**

IniCon

### Compatibility

VB 2.0 and above

### Remarks

IniCon should be placed on all forms where its functionality is required (including MDI forms and children). IniCon can be placed directly on an MDI form.

**Distribution Note** When you develop and distribute an application that uses IniCon, you should install the file INICON3.VBX into the users Windows SYSTEM directory. IniCon has version information built into it. So, during installation, you should ensure that you are not overwriting a newer version of IniCon.

# **INI File Layout**

If you look in an INI file (WIN.INI is a good example) you'll see many profile strings broken up into application sections. Section headers are formatted as follows:

[Application Name]

In each section there are profile (parameter) strings. Each profile string is identified by a name. These lines are formatted as follows:

<u>Parameter</u> = <u>Value</u>

## Properties

All of the properties that apply to this control are in this table. Properties that have special meaning for this control or that only apply to this control are marked with an asterisk (\*).

<u>Value</u> is the default value for the control.

# **Application Property**

### Description

Specifies what part of the INI file to use.

## Usage

[form.][control.]Application[ = stringexpression ]

#### Remarks

This property determines which application section of an <u>INI file</u> to use. This property must be non-blank.

When a new value is written to this property (and when <u>Parameter</u> is non-blank), a string is read in from the <u>INI file</u> and put into the <u>Value</u> property.

### WIN.INI and Private INI File Writing Example

In this example, the program will write parameters to the IniCon Example section of WIN.INI. The <u>parameter</u> and <u>value</u> properties are determined by two text boxes. To try this example, paste the code into the Declarations section of a form that contains two text boxes, a command button, and an IniCon control. Press F5. Then, type a string into each text box and press the button. You can examine the changes to WIN.INI using Notepad or any other text editor.

    If Edit1.Text = "" Then
        MsgBox "The first edit box must have text in it."
    Else
        IniCon1.Filename = ""
        IniCon1.Application = "IniCon Example"
        IniCon1.Parameter = Edit1.Text
        IniCon1.Value = Edit2.Text
        End If
End Sub
```

In this example, the program will write parameters to the IniCon Example section of a private INI file named INIEXAMP.INI. The <u>parameter</u> and <u>value</u> properties are determined by two text boxes. To try this example, paste the code into the Declarations section of a form that contains two text boxes, a command button, and an IniCon control. Press F5. Then, type a string into each text box and press the button. You can examine the changes to INIEXAMP.INI using Notepad or any other text editor.

        IniCon1.Filename = "INIEXAMP.INI"
        IniCon1.Application = "IniCon Example"

## WIN.INI and Private INI File Reading Example

In this example, the program will read parameters a user specified section of WIN.INI. The <u>application</u> and <u>parameter</u> properties are determined by two text boxes. To try this example, paste the code into the Declarations section of a form that contains two text boxes, a command button, a label, and an IniCon control. Press F5. Then, type the name of the application section you want to examine in the first text box, then type the name of the parameter in the second text box. Finally, press the button and the <u>value</u> will appear in the label.

        MsgBox "The first edit box must have text in it."
    ElseIf Edit2.Text = "" Then

## Remarks

This property, when set to True, deletes the specied application section from the <u>INI file</u>. The section deleted is determined by the <u>Filename</u> and <u>Application</u> properties.

This property, when set to True, deletes the specied parameter section from the <u>INI file</u>. The parameter deleted is determined by the <u>Filename</u>, <u>Application</u>, and <u>Parameter</u> properties.

### Description

Specifies which INI file to use.

#### Usage

[form.][control.]Filename[ = filename ]

#### Remarks

This property determines if IniCon uses a private <u>INI file</u> or WIN.INI. If this property is blank, profile strings are read from and written to WIN.INI. If this field is not blank, profile strings are written to and read from the file specified by this property.

When a new value is written to this property (and when <u>Application</u> and <u>Parameter</u> are non-blank), a string is read in from the <u>INI file</u> and put into the <u>Value</u> property.

Properties: Application Parameter Value

## **Parameter Property**

### Description

Specifies which entry in an application section to use.

### Usage

[form.][control.]**Parameter**[ = stringexpression ]

#### Remarks

This property determines which line in an <u>application section</u> of an <u>INI file</u> to use. This property must be non-blank.

When a new value is written to this property (and when <u>Application</u> is non-blank), a string is read in from the <u>INI file</u> and put into the <u>Value</u> property.

#### Data Type

String

Properties: <u>Application</u> <u>DeleteParm</u> <u>Filename</u> <u>Value</u>

## **Value Property**

#### Description

Value of the profile string identified by <u>Filename</u>, <u>Application</u>, and <u>Parameter</u> properties.

#### Usage

[form.][control.]Value[ = stringexpression ]

#### Remarks

This property serves two purposes: to read the value of a profile string from an <u>INI file</u>, and to write a profile string to an <u>INI file</u>. When a program reads this property, the profile string is read from the <u>INI file</u>. When a program writes to this property, the value is written to the <u>INI file</u>.
