Tips and Hints

The following is a brief list of suggestions which can assist in shortening the Key Travel Map for Windows learning curve:

PRINT THE DRIVING INSTRUCTIONS

This cannot be stressed too strongly. If a second route is created before printing the driving instructions, the set of instructions are replaced by the new set of directions.

USING TEXT LABELS

Be careful with notes and labels. When placing any text be sure that it does not obscure neccessary city/street names or landmarks.

STREETS, NOT ADDRESSES OR CITIES

It is useful to recall that **Key Travel Map** *for Windows* reads streets and highways for routing, not specific cities. Hence the driving instructions are never of this form: "...arrive at Alta Vista...".

When going from city to city, the distance is measured in terms of the last block of highway chosen. In some instances this road may not even lead directly into the city. San Antonio, Texas in Tutorial #3 is a good example. The city has an arterial ring and a highway selected may only be measured to where it enters the ring.

THE OVERLAYS

The Overlays are a tool to be used for referance, either in the creation of the routing or as visual aids.

If hotel reservations are to be made in different cities, enter all of the relevant data into an overlay and Geocode labels and notes onto the map.

NOTE: Key Travel Map *for Windows* performs best when it does not share the systems with any other application.

TROUBLE SHOOTING AND TECHNICAL SUPPORT

Before calling Technical Support, try again, then if the problem persists, document and make a list of the hardware components being used.

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
