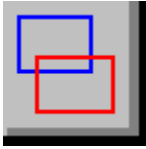



## Overview

Have you ever lost an application buried under a pile of other windows? Have you ever wanted to double-click the desktop to bring up the Task List, and realised that the current application is maximised? Do you ever forget about Switch-To...? Have you ever used an Apple Mac? If the answer to any of these questions is yes, then you need **Finder**.

Finder permanently displays a special icon on the title bar of the currently active window. It looks like this , and you'll find it on the left hand side of the title bar next to the system menu icon.

Place the mouse pointer over this icon and press and hold down the left mouse button. Finder displays a popup menu that contains a list of all your running windows (except the currently active window). Select the window you want and release the mouse button. Finder will activate the selected window. If this window is iconised then Finder will automatically restore it to normal size. That's the basics. It's as easy as that.

The Finder menu also displays a list of special options. Each of these is described in the [Help Index](#) section. Finder works very nicely indeed with [BackMenu](#) and some consider it an excellent replacement for BigDesk.

The [Run...](#) option is a major improvement over Program Manager's implementation.

Finder can also display some important additional information on the Title Bar of the currently active window. These data items include the current time, free memory and free resources. Selection of the display format is achieved through the [Config](#) menu option.

Holding down the Control key will cause the time display to change to a date display for as long as the Control key is depressed.

## **BackMenu**

If you use BackMenu (and I highly recommend it) then Finder will automatically recognise the fact. Selecting the BackMenu option will display the BackMenu menu which may be used in the normal manner. This is equivalent to BackMenu's Alt-F10 option.

## Run

Selecting this option starts an application or opens a document.

Type the application filename, including the path, if necessary.

If you want to open a document, type the application filename followed by a space and the name of the document.

If you don't know the name or location of the application or document file, use the Browse button to open the Browse dialog box.

Finder maintains a list of the ten most recently used command lines. These are automatically written to the Finder.ini file so that they are preserved between sessions.

## **Config**

The Config... option allows you to configure additional Title Bar information. You can select a Free Memory and Resources (or Resources only) display and/or a current time display. This information is automatically updated every second.

Note that Finder will only display this information when there is room on the active title bar. The display is automatically suppressed on small, crowded windows.

The Config... option also allows you to select between Left and Right Mouse button operation. When using the Left Mouse button, the Finder menu is displayed only while the mouse button is held down. When using the Right Mouse button, the Finder menu remains visible even after the mouse button is released.

Holding down the Control key will cause the time display to change to a date display for as long as the Control key is depressed.

## **Help**

The Help... option displays this Help information.

## **About**

The About... option displays the usual About screen.

## **Close Current Window**

The Close Current Window option closes the currently active application. Don't worry, the application will prompt you to save any changed data files.



## **Unload Finder**

The Unload Finder... option will unload Finder from Windows.

## **Exit Windows to DOS**

The Exit Windows to DOS option terminates Windows and returns to DOS (equivalent to Program Manager's Exit command).

## Installation

To install Finder simply copy Finder.exe and Finder.hlp to any convenient directory on your 'path'. You can start Finder by any one of the following four methods:

Select the Program Manager Run... option and type Finder ( or use your favourite application launcher).

Select the Program Manager New... option to create a Finder icon which you can double-click to start Finder.

Add Finder to the [Run] section of your Win.ini file to start Finder automatically each time you start Windows.

If you use MS Windows 3.1, add Finder to the "StartUp Group".

## Registration

Finder is Shareware. This means you can evaluate it for up to 30 days. After this period you must decide that it is a pile of junk and delete it from your hard disk or, that it is a useful tool in which case you should send me some cash to fund future development of the product.

For a perpetual licence to use Finder on a single machine please send a modest ten pounds (or twenty dollars) to the author at the address below.

For a perpetual licence to use Finder on up to twenty machines please send one hundred pounds (or two hundred dollars).
