Startup Manager Users Guide

Installation Requirements

Startup Manager requires the following hardware and software to function correctly.

- 1. An AT or better computer with an 80286/80386 or 80486
- 2. Windows version 3 or better running in either standard or 386 enhanced mode.

What does it do

Startup manager duplicates and enhances the function of the load = and run = lines of the win ini configuration file. For those who are new to windows these parameters specify the programs to be run automatically when windows starts. This program provides the following features in addition to those provided as standard.

1.	This program provides a point and click method of
	specifying the programs to be run at windows startup
	that is (hopefully) more readily useable than the
	standard mechanism provided.

- 2. In addition to the ability to run programs minimised and normal provided as standard you can specify that programs be run hidden or maximised.
- Provision is made for specifying a startup directory and 3. file to load. neither of these features are available as standard.

Installation

1.

To install the software on your computer follow these steps

	this file to your windows directory
2.	Copy the files 'suman.exe' and 'surun.exe' from the
	distribution diskette to some place convenient.
3.	Add the program 'suman.exe' to a group in your program
	manager. Consult the documentation that came with
	your copy of windows if you are unsure how to do this.
4.	edit the file 'win.ini' located in the windows directory.
	find the load= line and change it to read load=\
	yourpath\surun.exe. 'yourpath' is the location of the

executable file on your computer. (eg 'load=c:\usr\ windows\util\surun.exe'). Save the file when you have made this change.

If vbrun100.dll is not installed on your system then copy


Using The Program

This software is comprised of two programs. A user interface program is used to maintain the list of tasks to be loaded at windows startup. The other part of the software is the loader program. Provided that you have installed this program

correctly in the 'win.ini' file as discussed previously this program is of no interest. If you are having problems using this

software then the most likely cause is that you have made a mistake in modifying 'win.ini' check to ensure the filepath in the 'load=' line is valid and points to the surun.exe program.

To load the user interface program double click on its icon in the program manager. When the program has loaded it will display its main window as follows.



These controls function as follows.

- 1. The list of tasks is used to select which task the task menu items should act upon.
- 2. The "Task" menu provides facilities for adding new task definitions. modifying existing definitions and removing existing definitions.
- 3. The "Help" menu gives access to the "About" program information panel.

Defining the tasks to run at windows startup.

The "Task" menu contains the functions required to maintain the list of programs to be run at windows startup. I hope that making use of these functions will be fairly intuitive. The following is intended as a brief guide to get you started.

Define New

This will display the task definition window to allow you to enter a new task definition. the items in this window are as follows. "Task Description" - the description that will be used by the Startup Manager program to refer to this task. "Program to load" - the full path to the program you wish to load. "File to Load" - the name of a file you wish to be loaded by the program when it starts. This will only work properly if your program supports the entry of filenames on the program command line (most programs do). "Startup Directory" - This item is optional, if it is filled in then before starting your program the directory specified here is made the current working directory, the directory specification may include a drive specification but should not include a trailing '\'. Window Properties" - This allows you to specify the window properties of a

windows application. To control these properties when starting DOS applications you should use a PIF file. Some applications have fixed ideas about how they should appear. These applications will ignore the politely worded request to maximise - minimise or hide themselves passed to them by startup manager and appear in whatever state their programmer decided was suitable. For applications that do respond click on the button that corresponds to how you wish to programs window to initially appear (or not appear as the case may be).

The browse buttons in this window may be used to fill in the details in the adjacent text boxes. If you click on the browse button a file dialogue window will open. from this you can select the program or file to load and the directory to start in.

When you have finished defining your task click the OK button to store the task definition. Once you have done this your task will be started automatically as specified at windows startup by "Startup Manager".

Modify Existing This will display the task definition window discussed

above and allow you to modify the task definition of the task that is currently selected in the list of tasks.

Delete Existing This will remove the task that is currently selected in the

list of tasks . A warning dialogue is

displayed before the task is deleted.

Caveat's

Startup manager allows you to specify that tasks should be run hidden. This should not cause any problems but you will need access to a program that allows you to manipulate hidden windows if you wish to interact with a hidden task. My Task Manager Plus program offers this facility.

Distribution Policy

This program is not in the public domain. I retain the copyright to this work. On the other hand it is not shareware as you do not need to pay me anything if you like this program and decide to use it.

Please feel free to use this program. If you wish to distribute this program then please ensure that your distribution disk or archive contains the executable files "suman.exe" and "surun.exe", vbrun100.dll (unless you store this file separately) and this file (suman.wri).
