Mandevilla 'Vivian'

The mandevilla, a tropical vine, is beloved for its nonstop blooms and its ability to climb several feet of a trellis or arbor in the time it takes to drag out the sprinkler. What happens when you harness that flower power and put it in bush form? Enter the Vogue series of mandevillas from Athens Select. 'Sophia', with lipstick red blossoms, and 'Vivian', in bright pink, will bloom all summer in a tidy shrub that doesn't require so much as a single stake.

Mecardonia 'USMECA8205' GoldDust

Imagine rivers of gold flowing between flagstones in your garden path, or a carpet of dense yellow blossoms brightening the front of a border, and you have a pretty good idea of what a sprinkle of GoldDust will do for your garden. This petite ground cover blooms from May to October with tiny nemesia-like flowers that pack a powerful punch. It tolerates heat, too, and doesn't need deadheading.

Petunia 'Balpevac' Black Velvet/Black Cat

We don't typically think of petunias and evening gowns at the same time, but that might change with the introduction of the Black Velvet petunia from Ball Horticultural Co. The dark, soft petals have just a bit of shimmer, and their deep, mysterious color adds a bit of glamour to a container of annuals. This petunia, which is also being sold by Burpee under the name Black Cat, grows in a mounded habit and blooms summer through fall.
