Lyons seminar will focus on how to move forward with different pesticide bylaws starting with identifying challenges of both turfgrass establishment and ongoing maintenance.

Robert Bowers, the director of engineering for the Interlocking Concrete Pavement Institute, has approximately 20 years of experience in the hardscapes industry. During his Landscape Construction Workshop he'll be covering the construction of permeable pavements.

Jeff McMann will be speaking about the importance of attention to detail in outstanding landscapes. He'll be sharing the details and advanced techniques associated with this.
