Cheftested tips

DUCK FAT Lenny Russo, Heartland Restaurant, Saint
Paul It's healthier than butter,
and it enriches any number of
dishes. Try it! You can buy duck
fat in jars at specialty grocery
stores. Saute cubed potatoes in
it for a restaurant-style starch.

MALDON SEA SALT

Tory Miller, L'Etoile, Madison, Wisconsin We use it on everything from salads, to steaks, to fish and dessert. It adds texture and brings out the seasoning in a dish.

Try it! Chefs like the shape and flavor of this British import, available at specialty stores, but you can experiment with other brands. Sprinkle a few flakes on dark chocolate lava cake.

ACID Justin Aprahamian, Sanford, Milwaukee It's the one thing that makes any dish better. We strive for balanced flavors, and in a lot of cases, acids make that happen. Try it! Next time you reach for the salt shaker, choose vinegar or citrus juice instead. (Think of what lemon does for seafood.) A splash of balsamic or OJ wakes up simple oven-roasted carrots; a squeeze of lime brightens a bowl of chili.

Civil Disobedience ...
