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# West End Middle installs new outdoor classroom

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West End Middle School students and staff have begun installation of the school's new outdoor classroom.

After being named Burpee Home Gardens 2011 "I Can Grow" Youth Garden Award recipient, receiving 500 vegetable and herb plants and \$2,500 toward garden supplies, the school has expanded its garden with several raised vegetable beds.

West End teacher and environmental club sponsor Erick Olmstead, who is Metro's 2012 Middle School Teacher of the Year, was instrumental in the school being chosen amid more than 220 community and urban school gardens.

Plans for the space are to incorporate youth-centered educational programs emphasizing nutrition and food production, environmental awareness and social responsibility.

The school will integrate the space into its curriculum, using it in lessons taught in all subjects.

"The transformation that occurs when

students move from a confined indoor environment to an outdoor classroom, where they can see plants growing in a garden and taste fresh vegetables, is amazing," said Julie Prince, vice president of West End's Parent Teacher Student Organization.

"The outdoor classroom and garden will provide the perfect opportunity to teach students about environmental respect, sustainability and the importance of community involvement."

Students got their hands dirty on April 28, helping plant the herbs and vegetables. The students eventually will have a complete outdoor classroom with a greenhouse and composting area.

#### Harding Academy students win Latin awards

Daniel Mangum received magna cum laude recognition, and Will Johnston received cum laude recognition.

#### **UNC junior wins National History Bee**

Mark Arildsen, a University School of Nashville junior, is the national champion in the National History Bee held April 17 in Washington.

Mark won the Tennessee competition, which sent him to Washington, where he competed against 103 students from across the country.

The USN junior was one of four students nationwide to have a perfect score in the state bee preliminaries. Two of the other three such students were in the final four with Arildsen, and both of them are seniors.

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At the national contest, Mark aced questions in categories such as American history between 1492 and 1796 and world history between 1066 and 1815.

"The contest is, in the words of the website, buzzer-based, so the pressure is strong," said Connie Culpepper, communications director for USN. "Some contestants get flustered, but not Mark, who won the Tennessee Geography Bee when he was in middle school."

Culpepper said that David Madden, director of the National History Bee and Bowl, predicts that next year's competition will be televised on the History Channel.

"And we predict that Mark will be there, defending his title," she said.
