Miss Sunshine Sunflower
Botanical name: Helianthus annuus.
Mature Size:10 to 16 inches high; 6 to 8 inches wide.

Question of the Month

Frostbit Bulbs

Q: Will my gladiolus bulbs bloom even though they sat outside over a few nights of early frost? -Donna McTague, Woburn, Massachusetts

Melinda: Frost damage won't impact blooms, but it can impact the survival of the plant. If the gladiolus bulbs, really called "corms," are firm, they should be fine.



RDA/GID

Gladiolus store best when cured (dried) for a week or two in a warm, dry location. Store only firm corms that are free of insect damage, disease and soft spots uncovered in a cool, dark location for winter. Label the corms so you know their color and height.
