The Standard: Absent workers cost big bucks

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Replacement workers are up to 29 percent less efficient and can cost up to 44 percent more than regular workers who are absent from their jobs.

So says Portland-based Standard Insurance Co., which issued <u>a report on absence and disability</u> <u>management</u> programs on Wednesday. Employers' extra costs come from providing sick leave, salary continuation, short- and long-term disability and other leaves of absence.

The Standard published its report as part of a series on health-related lost productivity.

"Measuring the total cost associated with absence and disability has long been a challenge for employers, brokers and consultants," said <u>Michael Klachefsky</u>, a national workplace practices leader for The Standard, in a statement. "Recent research has shed light on the productivity and related profit loss that employers suffer when their experienced employees are absent."
