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### 1.3 Configuration needed

You'll need at least Kickstart 2.0 and AmigaGuide to see the texts.

For the images, you will need at least kickstart 3.0 (or 2.1 I don't know), and FastJPEG installed on an assigned directory under the name FJPEG.

### 1.4 Last notes...

An important point to notice: all data concerning the year of 1996 have been added by me. That means several things:

- . It's possible that I forgot something in the titles or finalists. In the singles, I don't think, but it's very likely in the doubles.
- . I didn't change the career price money: it would be a work of hell, and anyway, I don't have the data for this.
- . I didn't change the highest singles/doubles ranking. For the doubles, it's simply impossible, and for the singles, I don't wanna look at every ATP ranking for every player. Anyway, I changed it for Muster because being number one is a major event. I can also tell you that Arnaud Boetsch have been ranked 12th this year, but I don't know when. Also changed is Michael Chang, ranked 2nd after the US Open 96 and Yevgeny Kafelnikov, 3rd after Paris-indoor.

If you find mistakes on these addings, do not hesitate to mail me them for corrections at fgoucem@samo.unice.fr.

If you count the number of titles for certain players, you'll see they don't match to the number. The number is the one to trust. I think this is due to the fact that Grand Slam Cup is not written in the lists except for Ivanisevic. For instance, you will see: Pete Sampras CAREER TITLES(44), and if you count, you will find only 43 titles. But he won the Grand Slam Cup in 1990, and it is not written in the list. Hence, here are the results of the Grand Slam Cup since its creation:

#### 1995 IN REVIEW

Finished in Top 5 for the ninth time in last 10 years, capping the year with his second ATP Tour World Championship title (d. Chang) in Frankfurt...The German ranked in the Top 5 every week during the year...Before breaking his nine-month title drought, his other title came in Marseille in February, defeating Daniel Vacek in three sets...The next week attempted to win in Milan for the third straight year, but lost the title match 7-6 in the third to Yevgeny Kafelnikov (after having one match point)...Reached his fifth career claycourt final in Monte Carlo and led Muster by two sets before the Austrian fought off two match points to win in five sets...Posted a 9-2 record on grass, reaching the SF at Queen's (l. to Forget) and final at Wimbledon (l. to Sampras), his first title match at the All England Club since 1991...En route to the final, defeated Cedric Pioline in the QF 9-7 in the fifth and No. 1 Agassi in SF after trailing 6-2, 4-1...The two met again in the U.S. Open SF with the American winning in four sets...In November, reached final at Paris-indoor (l. to Sampras)...During the year, advanced to QF or better in 13 of 19 tournaments...Played Davis Cup for the first time since 1992, helping Germany to SF with a 3-1 mark in singles in three ties...Lost to Paul Haarhuis in the opening rubber of the QF tie against the Netherlands after winning 22 consecutive Cup singles matches...Parted ways with coach Nick Bollettieri in August...The active titles leader (49) on Tour and ranks No. 8 in Open Era (at the end of 95)...Compiled 8-7 mark vs. Top 10...Led Tour with 29 indoor match wins (7 losses) and winner of 30 career indoor titles (19 outdoor)...Earned a career-high \$3,712,358.

## PERSONAL

Played tennis and soccer as a child, giving up soccer in favor of tennis at age 12...Father is an architect who is responsible for building a tennis center near the Becker home in Leimen...A three-time West German junior champion (82/83/84)...Named ATP Most Improved Player of the Year in 1985 and ATP Player of the Year in 1989...An outstanding member of the German Davis Cup team since 1985, leading the squad to Cup titles in 1988-89...Has career record of 33-2 in Davis Cup singles play, with only two losses to Spain's Sergio Casal...Also 12-6 in doubles...Has worked with a number of coaches

### 1995 IN REVIEW

Became only the fourth player (Lendl, McEnroe, Connors) to finish as No. 1 player three (or more) consecutive years, the first since Lendl from 85-87. Won five titles during year, including his third straight Wimbledon and third U.S. Open...Reached four other finals, including the Australian Open and Mercedes Super 9 stops in Key Biscayne and Montreal, losing to rival Agassi each time...Defeated Agassi in title matches at Indian Wells and the U.S. Open...Helped lead U.S. to Davis Cup title by accounting for all three points in 3-2 victory over Russia in Moscow...Compiled a 7-0 record (6-0 in singles) in Cup play during year and has a 14-5 career record (11-5 in singles)...Held No. 1 for 82 consecutive weeks (from Sept 13, 1993 to April 3, 1995) before Agassi took over for first time on April 10 and held it for 30 weeks until Nov. 5...Regained top spot on Nov. 6 after winning Paris-indoor (d. Becker)...Began the year with a runner-up showing at the Australian Open, winning back-to-back matches from two sets down against Larsson (4th RD) and Courier (QF)...Earned title in Indian Wells with consecutive wins over Martin (QF), Edberg (SF) and Agassi (F) and the next tournament at The Lipton, lost to Agassi in the final in a third-set tie-breaker...During the claycourt season, reached SF at Hamburg, but suffered four opening round losses, including a five-set defeat to Gilbert Schaller at the French Open.

Turned his season around on grass at the Queen's Club in London, saving three match points in a SF win over Goellner and going on to beat Forget in the final...Continued his strong play at Wimbledon where he beat Ivanisevic in a five-set SF and Becker in four sets in the final...Became the first American to win three straight Wimbledon titles and joined Fred Perry and Bjorn Borg as the only players in the past 80 years to capture at least three consecutive Wimbledons..Compiled consistent results on North American summer hardcourt circuit with a final in Montreal, SF in Indianapolis and QF in Cincinnati before winning the Open for the third time in six years...The first player since Borg (1978-80) to win two Grand Slam titles in three straight years...Led the U.S. into Davis Cup final with two wins against Sweden in SF...Returned to the Tour and reached the final in Lyon (l. to Ferreira)...The only player to qualify for ATP Tour World Championship all six years...Led the ATP Tour MatchFacts in aces (974), service games won (89%), 1st serve pts. won (83%) and break pts. saved (71%)...First player to surpass \$5 million in a season and the all-time leader in career earnings (\$21.8 million), previously held by Lendl.

- 1988 - First Tour SF at Schenectady, losing to eventual champion Tim Mayotte, but avenged his loss to the American in Detroit later in year, which was his first career Top 10 win..
- 1989 - Reached QF at Adelaide and Indianapolis, and defeated U.S. Open defending champion Mats Wilander en route to the RD 16...In doubles, teamed with Courier to win Rome, reach final at Forest Hills and qualify for the year-end doubles championship...

Began playing tennis at age seven...Changed from a two-handed to one-handed backhand in 1987...Grew up idolizing Rod Laver, and often watched tapes of him...Enjoys playing golf and fan of Los Angeles Lakers (NBA) and Dallas Cowboys (NFL)...Parents, Georgia and Sam do not watch Sampras play often because it makes them nervous...Older sister, Stella, won the 1988 NCAA doubles title at UCLA and is co-head coach there...Named ATP Tour Player of the Year in 1993-94 and Jim Thorpe Tennis Player of Year in 1993...Donated his Lyon Championship trophy in May 1994 to the Arthur Ashe Foundation for the Defeat of AIDS...Served as chairman of the ATP Tour Charities program in 1992 and was the first captain of the ATP Tour Smash Tennis weekend in Key Biscayne in March 1995...Selected as one of "The 25 Fittest People of the Year," by Fitness magazine in 1994...Fitness coach is former ATP Tour trainer Todd Snyder (since March 1995)...Coached by Tim Gullikson (since January 1992) and Paul Annacone, who began traveling with Sampras when Gullikson became ill in January 1995.

Finished in the Top 20 for the third straight year...Has ranked in the Top 20 every week since Apr. 5, 1993...Repeated his title effort at the Mercedes Super 9 stop in Hamburg (d. Ivanisevic) for his lone win of the season...En route to the championship, posted consecutive wins over Schaller, Gaudenzi and Sampras...Opened the year with a QF performance at the Australian Open (l. to Chang), but fractured his left wrist in the loss...Returned to action one month later and reached QF at Rotterdam...Continued strong play with QF at Key Biscayne (l. to Sampras) and Estoril, in first claycourt outing...Also a SF in Nice (l. to Kafelnikov) and RD 16 at French Open (l. to Muster) after posting consecutive five-set wins over Washington and Berasategui...Went 3-6 from mid-June to early August before advancing to QF at Indianapolis (l. to Sampras)...Also a QF at Ostrava, his best indoor result in the later part of the year...Had a 2-9 mark vs. Top 10 opponents, with both wins (Sampras, Ivanisevic) coming in Hamburg...Compiled a 19-10 mark on clay and 14-8 on hard.

#### CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

1991 - The 16-year-old enjoyed a successful rookie year on the Tour... Gained attention as a wildcard entrant at Geneva, defeating hard-serving Marc Rosset in straight sets before falling in the SF to eventual champion Thomas Muster...Qualified at Munich, Umag and Palermo, all on clay, his favorite surface...

1992 - Jumped 202 spots in the rankings by reaching the QF at Munich and RD 16 at the French Open (as a qualifier)...Earned his first Tour title at Genova (d. Perez-Roldan) and collected titles at the Stuttgart-outdoor (d. W.Ferreira) and Bordeaux (d. Bruguera)... ## 1995 IN REVIEW

The young Spaniard improved his ranking for the third consecutive year, highlighted by his first career ATP Tour title and first Grand Slam QF...Finished as the No. 2 Spaniard (behind No. 11 Bruguera)...All of his success came on clay, beginning in March when he reached the final in Casablanca (l. to Schaller)...Two weeks later in Estoril, rolled to the final without dropping a set, only to lose to another Austrian, Thomas
