

You may wish to send your child's letter to Santa on the Internet.

To save the letter as a file so that you can attach it to email, please follow these steps:

- 1. Open the program and help your child create a letter to Santa. Click on F2 to activate Word Pad.
- 2. When the letter is complete, click on FILE, SAVE AS:

3. Select TEXT:



Select TEXT

Select an appropriate name for the file.

Consult your Internet Mail program for directions on attaching files to Email to learn how to send your child's letter.

If your child has added a drawing, you may need to send it by regular mail, or, you may need to scan the letter to send it through the Internet.
