## Quick card

iPhoto Express comes with a wide range of easy to use templates that enable you to quickly create greeting and business cards using your own photos and text.

To create a specialty card:

1. Go to **Quick Task** and click the **Quick card** task.
2. Select the type of card that you want to create in the pop-up menu that appears.
3. iPhoto Express Explorer opens showing previews of several cards to choose from. Click the template that you want to use to create your own card.


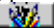

4. The template you selected opens in iPhoto Express showing several objects which may include a background photo, framed photo, photos and text. Click on the **background** and the  button appears at the bottom of the template.
5. Click  and choose one of the options to change the background photo.



**Note:** When the pointer is over the  button, the pointer changes to the **Click** pointer.

6. Choose a fit option in the **Replace Photo** window and click **Preview** to see the how the photo looks. Check out other fit options until you find the one you like best, and then click **OK**.

**Note:** You may have to move the **Replace Photo** window to see the fit preview.

7. Click the pointer over another photo in the template to display its  button.



**Note:** When the pointer is over a text, frame, or photo object, it changes to the Select pointer.

8. Click  to replace the photo with the one you want, just as you did for the background photo.

**Note:** Photos in templates have two parts - a photo and a mask. The mask works like a frame, covering the photo to give it a soft edge, rounded shape, and/or an actual frame appearance. Some masks even allow you to create special effects by selectively covering over or masking the photo with a specific pattern.

9. Position the new photo within its mask by clicking on the photo and dragging it until the part of the photo that you want appears.



**Note:** When you move the pointer over a photo, the pointer changes to the **Place** pointer.

10. Move the combined mask and photo object to the position you want by clicking on the mask and dragging it.



**Note:** When you move the pointer over a frame, the pointer changes to the **Move** pointer.

**Note:** When the pointer is over the  button, the pointer changes to the **Click** pointer.

### Quick card

13. Click  to open the Text Attribute window where you can change the text font, size, style, color, shape, add a shadow, and type in your own message. Click Attribute to modify or change the setting, and the sample text is displayed in the preview window below.
14. Type the message that you want in the **Message box** above the preview window.
15. Right-mouse click on the **Fill** square to choose a color, fill with a gradient of colors, or fill with a fractal texture.

16. Browse through **Shape** and choose one that stretches the text the way you want.
17. After modifying the text, click the **Preview** button to see how the new text looks in the template.

**Note:** You may have to move the **Text Attribute** window to see the preview.

## Screen art

iPhoto Express gives you several ways to display your photos on screen. Choose an option to find out how to add more personality to your PC:



**Wallpaper** - enables you to quickly add any photo to the desktop of your PC.



**Slide show** - shows your favorite photos and video clips along with sound bites and music.



**Screen saver** - entertains you with a slide show whenever your PC is idle.

## Wallpaper

iPhoto Express makes it easy to switch your current Windows wallpaper to any photo you have on your PC.

To change your wallpaper:

1. Switch to **Quick Task** and click the **Screen art** task.
2. Choose **Wallpaper** in the pop-up menu that appears.
3. If no photo is currently open, Photo Explorer starts up. Browse the folders on the left to find and then select the desired photo.

4. Select the desired **Desktop background color** in the **Wallpaper** option box by clicking the color cell and choosing a color.
5. Select either **Center** or **Tile** in the **Display** group by clicking the desired option.

7. Click **OK** to accept the options and display the new wallpaper.

iPhoto Express makes creating a slide show easy by letting you visually pick your favorite photos, sound, and video clips through iPhoto Express Explorer.

**Note:** To control the slide order in the slide show, you need to rename the slide source files alphanumerically.

To rename, select a slide's thumbnail, right click and select **Rename** in the pop-up menu. Type the new name and click **OK**. For example, the first slide in a slide show of your family could be named "Family1."

## Posters

iPhoto Express makes it easy for you to turn your favorite photos into large posters. iPhoto Express does this by printing out a photo on several pieces of paper which can then be taped together.

To print out a poster:

1. Go to **Quick Task** and click the **Poster** task.
2. If a photo is already open it will be used to make the poster and if none, iPhoto Express Explorer opens. In this case, navigate to the folder containing the desired photo and click on the thumbnail of the photo.

3. Type the number of copies you want to print in the **Copies** box at the top of the **Print Preview** window.
4. Click **Options** and select **Layout** in the pop-up menu to set the poster size.
5. Type in the Image size and Print information for the poster.
6. Click the **OK** button after choosing the poster size. The **Layout** window closes and you can see gridlines on the photo showing how many pages will print out for the poster.

## **Namecard**

iPhoto Express can help you print multiple copies of your business card or wallet-sized photo. Before printing, however, you must create a business card or photo, or scan one that you already have into iPhoto Express.

5. Make sure the **Fit as many as possible** option is checked in the pop-up menu that appears when you click the **Options** button.

## Calendar

With iPhoto Express, it is easy to create calendars using your favorite photos to decorate your wall and plan your activities.

5. In the **Year and Month** group, choose the desired year and month for your calendar.
6. To modify the size or position of the photo, year, month, weekday, and day, move the pointer over the calendar and select the object you want to change by clicking on it.
7. When you select an object, a border appears around it. Move the object by dragging the object to a new position.

## Calendar

10. You can choose either big numbers for each day or small ones by right-clicking over the days and choosing **Big day** in the pop-up menu. Small numbers are a good choice if you plan to write more detailed notes on your calendar. Large numbers are a good choice if you plan to use the calendar mainly for knowing what day it is.

## Copying

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## Faxing

If you have a scanner and modem, iPhoto Express enables you to quickly fax photos to others.

To use iPhoto Express to send a fax:

1. Turn on your scanner and place the photo you want faxed onto the scanner.

3. Select the proper service profile in the **Message box** that appears and click **OK**.

**Note:** Unless you have installed special fax software, you are probably using MS Exchange as your fax server.

## Video camera

It is a snap to get photos from a video camera into iPhoto Express.

1. Make sure your camera software and hardware are properly installed and the download cable connects your camera with your PC.
2. Click the **Import** task and browse through the photos to select the one you want to download.
3. Click **OK** to open the photo in iPhoto Express.

## New photos

With iPhoto Express, you can start from scratch with a clean canvas upon which you can add photos, paint, text, and fill with texture.

To create a new photo:

1. Click the **New** task.
2. Click one of the **Data Type** buttons to choose the number of colors the new photo contains.



3. Click the **Background** color square to select the color for the canvas.

**Black & White**

This mode allows the photo to contain only two colors - black and white. It is good for logos, line art, and drawings.

**Grayscale**

This mode is suitable for normal black and white photos as it contains 256 shades of gray.

**16 color**

This mode is suitable for color charts and diagrams as it contains 16 colors.

**256 color**

This mode is suitable for simple color photos and drawings as it contains 256 colors.

**Full color**

This mode is suitable for high-quality color photos as it contains 16.7 million colors.

4. In the **Width and Height** group, select **Standard** and click its size text box to choose from a list of standard sizes.  
or  
Click **User Defined** to type your own **Height** and **Width** for the photo.

**Note:** The larger the physical dimensions of the new photo, the larger its file size will be. You can see the file size listed in KB (kilobytes) after **Memory Size**.

**Note:** All changes made in the photo's dimensions are displayed in the preview window on the right.

## Hard disk

## Pasting

## Scanning

iPhoto Express makes it easy to scan your favorite photos into your PC.

9. Drag the pointer diagonally over the preview of the photo from one corner to the other to select the area of the photo to scan.

## Stitching photos

iPhoto Express can help you to scan large photos with a handy scanner through its stitch feature. Stitch allows you to scan strips of a photo and join, or stitch, them together to recreate the original.

To stitch a photo:

1. Scan the photo in overlapping strips.

**Note:** For **Stitch** to work, the photo must be scanned as either a grayscale or color image.

2. Choose **Stitch** in the **Edit** menu. One of the photo strips appears in the **Stitch** window.

3. Click **Stitch with** to select the photo strip to stitch with the active strip.

**Note:** If more than two photos are open in iPhoto Express and you select the wrong photo strip to stitch. Don't worry, just click **Stitch with** again to select the right strip.

4. Make sure that the photo strips are oriented properly.



Click the horizontal **Switch directions** button to swap the photo strips left to right.



Click the vertical **Switch directions** button to swap the photo strips top to bottom.

5. If one of the photos appears skewed relative to the other, you can use the **Deskew** buttons to reorient the skewed photo.

 Click the vertical deskew button if the photo has vertical features such as a building or door frame.

or

 Click the horizontal deskew button if the photo has horizontal features such as the horizon or a table top.

6. Drag the endpoints of the horizontal or vertical line that appears on the photo to be aligned with a horizontal or vertical feature.

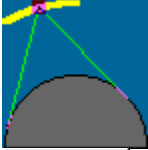

## Adding shadows

iPhoto Express can add a shadow to any selected area.

To add a shadow:

1. After selecting a part of a photo that you want with the **Selection** tool, right click to display a pop-up menu and choose **Make Floating**.
2. Click the **More** task and choose the **Add Shadow** option in the pop-up menu.
3. Select the shadow **Direction** in the **Add Shadow** window that appears.

**Note:** Only available if you have an active floating selection.

## Adding shadows

4. Type in the shadow length in pixels in the **X** and **Y offset** boxes.
5. Set the density of the shadow by changing the **Transparency**. Higher values make the shadow less dense.
6. Set the **Edge blending** to smoothly control the edges of the shadow with the background. Higher values make the shadow blend in more with the background.

6. Click the **Color** square to choose the color of the shadow.
7. Click **Preview** to see how the shadow looks and click **OK** when you like the result.

## Saving photos

After finishing a photo, or when you want to go off and do something else, it is easy to save your work.

To save a photo:

1. Go to **Finish** and click the **Save** task.
2. In the window that appears, click the **Save in** text box and choose the folder where you want to save the photo.
3. Type the name for the photo in the **File name** text box.
4. Click **OK** and the photo is saved for later use.

**Note:** You can quickly save a photo by pressing **Ctrl+S**.

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## Emailing photos

With iPhoto Express, you can email your photos to friends and family.

To email a photo:

1. With the photo you want to email open in iPhoto Express, go to **Finish** and click the **Send** task.
2. In the window that opens, type a title and simple message in the **Subject** and **Message** boxes.
3. Click **Profile Name** to select your email service and click **OK**.

**Note:** Unless you have a special email software, you are probably using MS Exchange.

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## Emailing photos

4. Your email software appears. Follow the instructions provided in your email user guide or on-line help.

**Note:** For MS Exchange -

1. Select the person you want to email from the address book, or click the New button to enter their name and email address.
2. Click the **To:** button to add their name to the address list.
3. Then click **OK** to accept the address list and send the email message along with the photo.

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## Exporting files

If you have any Adobe Photoshop compatible export modules installed in your system, the **Export** task allows you to save your photos using these modules. Please refer to the instructions that came with these modules for further guidance.

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
