System menu commands



The System menu offers the following commands:

<u>Restore</u> Return the active window to its size and position

before you chose the Maximize or Minimize

command.

Move the active window or dialog box with the

arrow keys.

<u>Size</u> Size the active window with the arrow keys.

Minimiz Reduce the active window to an icon.

<u>e</u>

Maximiz Enlarge the active window to fill the available

space

Close the active window or dialog box.

<u>Switch</u> Display a list of all open applications. Use this <u>To</u> "Task List" to switch to or close an application on

the list.

Open command (File menu)

Use this command to open an <u>initialization file</u> with the Windows **Notepad** application. To use a text file editor other than Notepad, use the <u>Options Editor command</u>.

To edit initialization files indirectly, use the File Edit command. (Recommended)

Shortcuts

Keys: CTRL+0

Step-By-Step Tutorial

This command is useful when you need to add, change or delete an initialization file entry directly. For example, an application's manual tells you to change the <u>MouseInDOSBox</u> entry in the **NonWindowsApp** section in the **SYSTEM.INI** file to **1**.

To change the setting, invoke the Open command. An <u>Open dialog box</u> appears. Find and highlight **SYSTEM.INI** (it's in your Windows directory) and choose the **OK** button. The Windows Notepad application will start and load **SYSTEM.INI**. Now all you have to do is find the **NonWindowsApp** section (or, if it doesn't exist, add it yourself) and either change the value of the existing **MouseInDOSBox** entry or add the entry and value yourself. It would look something like this:

[NonWindowsApp] MouseInDOSBox=1

Save the file using Notepad's File Save command and close Notepad. (You have to restart Windows for this particular change to take effect. But don't worry, the application's manual would tell you.)

Browse/Open dialog box

The following options allow you to specify a file:

File Name

Type or select the filename. This box lists files with the extension you select in the List Files of Type box.

List Files of Type

Select the type of file to list in the File Name box.

Drives

Select the drive on which the file is stored.

Directories

Select the directory in which the file is stored.

Network...

Choose this button to connect to a network location, assigning it a new drive letter.

Exit command (File menu)

Use this command to end your Configure! session. You can also use the $\underline{\text{Close command}}$ on the application System menu.

Shortcuts

Mouse: Double-click the application's System menu button.



Keys: ALT+F4

Status Bar

Configure the screen colors

The status bar is displayed at the bottom of the $\underline{\text{Configure! window}}$. It describes actions of menu items as you navigate through menus. Similarly, it shows messages that describe the actions of $\underline{\text{icons}}$ as you select them.

Contents command (Help menu)

Use this command to display the opening screen of Help (Configure! Help Contents). From the opening screen, you can jump to step-by-step instructions for using Configure! and various types of reference information.

Once you open Help, you can choose the **Contents** button whenever you want to return to the opening screen.

Context Help command (Help menu)

Use the Context Help command to obtain help on some portion of Configure!. The mouse pointer will change to an arrow and question mark. Then click somewhere in the <u>Configure!</u> <u>window</u>, such as a menu item. The Help topic will be shown for the item you clicked.

Shortcut

Keys: SHIFT+F1

Using Help command (Help menu)

Use this command for instructions about using Help.

Once you open Help, you can press F1 at any time for instructions about using Help.

About command (Help menu)

Use this command to display program information, the version number and the $\underline{\text{copyright}}$ of your copy of Configure!.

Title Bar



The title bar is located along the top of a window. It contains the name of the application.

To move the window, drag the title bar. (You can also move dialog boxes by dragging their title bars.) To maximize the window or restore the window if it is already maximized, double-click the title bar.

A title bar may contain the following elements:

- Application System menu button
- Maximize button
- Minimize button
- Name of the application
- Restore button

Scroll Bar

Displayed at the right edge of the <u>main window</u> when not all of the <u>icons</u> are visible. The scroll box inside the scroll bar indicates your vertical location. You can use the mouse to scroll hidden icons into view.

Both clicking on the arrows and on the scroll bar itself scrolls one row of icons in the given direction. You can also drag the scroll box to reveal hidden icons.

Size command (System menu)

Use this command to display a four-headed arrow so you can size the active window with the arrow keys.



After the pointer changes to the four-headed arrow:

- 1. Press one of the DIRECTION keys (left, right, up, or down arrow key) to move the pointer to the border you want to move.
- 2. Press a DIRECTION key to move the border.
- 3. Press ENTER when the window is the size you want.

Note: This command is unavailable if you maximize the window.

Shortcut

Mouse: Drag the size bars at the corners or edges of the window.

Note: This command is unavailable if you maximize the window.

Shortcut

Mouse: Drag the <u>title bar</u>.

Use this command to reduce the active window to an icon.

Shortcut

Mouse: Click the minimize icon on the <u>title bar</u>.

Maximize command (System menu)

Use this command to enlarge the active window to fill the available space.

Shortcut

Mouse: Click the maximize icon on the <u>title bar</u>, or double-click the title bar.

Close command (System menu)

Use this command to close the active window or dialog box.

Double-clicking a $\underline{\text{System menu}}$ box is the same as choosing the Close command.

Shortcuts

Keys: ALT+F4

File Exit command

Restore command (System menu)

Use this command to return the active window to its size and position before you chose the $\underline{\text{Maximize}}$ or $\underline{\text{Minimize}}$ command.

Shortcut

Mouse: Double-click the <u>title bar</u> if the window is maximized.

Switch To command (System menu)

Use this command to display a list of all open applications. Use this "Task List" to switch to or close an application on the list.

Shortcut

Keys: CTRL+ESC

Dialog Box Options

When you choose the Switch To command, you will be presented with a dialog box with the following options:

Task List

Select the application you want to switch to or close.

Switch To

Makes the selected application active.

End Task

Closes the selected application.

Cancel

Closes the Task List box.

Cascade

Arranges open applications so they overlap and you can see each title bar. This option does not affect applications reduced to icons.

Tile

Arranges open applications into windows that do not overlap. This option does not affect applications reduced to icons.

Arrange Icons

Arranges the icons of all minimized applications across the bottom of the screen.

Font dialog box

The following options allow you to specify a font:

Font

Type or select the name of the font. TrueType(R) fonts are preceded by a double-T (TT) symbol.

Font Style

Type or select the style of the font.

Size

Type or select the size of the font.

Color dialog box

Use the controls to choose a basic color or define a custom color.

What Is Configure!?

Configure! is a Windows(R) application that provides you with a visual way of modifying your system while working with Windows. Each group of settings that you can change is represented by an <u>icon</u> in the <u>Configure! window</u>. When you change a setting, it is stored in an <u>initialization file</u> so that it will be in effect the next time you run Windows.

Also, by using Configure!'s <u>File menu</u>, you can edit the initialization files that Windows uses to store system and application settings. You can edit these files directly, using the <u>Open command</u>, or indirectly, using the <u>Edit command</u>.

Note: Configure! is a Microsoft(R) Windows(R)/Windows for Workgroups(TM) 3.1x program only. Although it may run on other versions of Windows, it is specifically designed for Windows versions 3.1 and 3.1x (e.g. 3.11), and Windows for Workgroups versions 3.1 and 3.1x (e.g. 3.11).

Configure! Versus Control Panel

Configure! looks and acts just like the Windows **Control Panel** application, but it lets you modify system settings that Control Panel doesn't! Also, unlike Control Panel, Configure! lets you edit the initialization files that Windows uses to store system and application settings (see the <u>File menu</u>).

Step-By-Step Tutorial

Configure! lets you modify system settings that Control Panel doesn't. For example, run Control Panel. (It's in your **Main** program group in **Program Manager**.) Double-click on the icon labeled **Desktop**. A dialog box will appear, filled with controls that let you modify system settings. These settings include the spacing between icons in Program Manager, the wallpaper used to decorate your desktop and the amount of time that should pass before your screen saver starts.

Now, run Configure!. It looks and acts just like Control Panel, but if you double-click on the <u>Desktop icon</u> in Configure!, the dialog box that appears contains controls not found in Control Panel's Desktop dialog box. These controls, for example, let you change the VERTICAL spacing between icons in Program Manager and change the font of the text that labels those icons.

Configure! Main Window

Each icon in the window corresponds to the like-titled command in the <u>Settings menu</u>. Choosing an icon (or a Settings command) opens the configuration dialog box for that group of settings. The configuration dialog box lets you change these settings.

For a description of each of the icons (and their corresponding Settings commands), see <u>Configuration dialog boxes</u>.

Navigating The Icons

Keys:

- 1. Press the DIRECTION keys (left, right, up, or down arrow key) to move the highlight to an icon.
- 2. Press ENTER to open the icon's configuration dialog box.

Mouse:

- 1. Use the scroll bar, if it's visible, to scroll the icon into view.
- 2. Double-click the icon to open its configuration dialog box.

Settings menu commands

Each command in the Settings menu corresponds to the like-titled icon in <u>Configure!'s main window</u>. Choosing a command (or an icon) opens the configuration dialog box for that group of settings. The configuration dialog box lets you change these settings.

For a description of each of the commands (and their corresponding icons), see <u>Configuration dialog boxes</u>.

Options menu commands

The Options menu offers the following commands:

Sets the <u>initialization file</u> editor. (See <u>File Open command</u>.)
Shows or hides the Restart Windows **Editor**

Prompt To Restart Windows dialog box.

Edit command (File menu)

Use this command to edit initialization files indirectly by displaying the Edit dialog box.

To edit initialization files directly, use the File Open command.

Shortcuts

Keys: CTRL+E

Step-By-Step Tutorial

This command is useful when you need to add, change or delete an initialization file entry. For example, an application's manual tells you to change the <u>MouseInDOSBox</u> entry in the **NonWindowsApp** section in the **SYSTEM.INI** file to **1**. To change the setting, invoke the Edit command. The Edit dialog box appears.

Changing a Setting

Choose the **Browse** button. The <u>Browse dialog box</u> appears. Find and highlight **SYSTEM.INI** (it's in your Windows directory) and choose the **OK** button. The Browse dialog box disappears and the name of the file, e.g. c:\windows\system.ini, appears under **File** in the Edit dialog box.

Next, click on the down arrow to the right of the **Section** combo box. A list of all of the sections in the **SYSTEM.INI** file appears. Select **NonWindowsApp** if it is in the list. If it is not in the list, type it in the **Section** box yourself.

Next, click on the down arrow to the right of the **Entry** combo box. A list of all of the entries in the **NonWindowsApp** section appears. Select **MouseInDOSBox** if it is in the list. If it is not in the list, type it in the **Entry** box yourself.

The value of the **MouseInDOSBox** entry, if any, appears in the **Value** edit box. (Don't worry if nothing appears in the **Value** edit box; it means that the **MouseInDOSBox** entry doesn't exist or doesn't have a value yet.) Type in the new value, **1**, replacing any existing text in the **Value** edit box.

Finally, choose the **Write** button. A dialog box will appear asking if you're sure you want to make the change. Choose the **Yes** button. If the **MouseInDOSBox** entry already exists and has a value, a dialog box will appear asking if you want to replace its current value with the new value. Choose the **Yes** button. The new value is written to the file. (You have to restart Windows for this particular change to take effect. But don't worry, the application's manual would tell you.)

Removing an Entry

You can also remove entries, or even entire sections (and all of the entries in those sections), with the **Remove** button. For example, if you choose the **Remove** button now, a dialog box will appear asking if you are sure you want to remove the **MouseInDOSBox** entry. If you were to choose the **Yes** button, the entry (and its value) would be removed. For now, choose the **No** button.

Removing a Section

To remove the entire **NonWindowsApp** section (and all of the entries in the section), click

on the down arrow to the right of the **Entry** combo box. Next, find and select **-None-** from the list of entries; it should be the first item in the list.

Next, choose the **Remove** button. A dialog box will appear asking if you are sure you want to remove the **NonWindowsApp** section and all of the entries in the section. Choose the **Yes** button. Another dialog box appears asking you to confirm the removal of the section. If you were to choose the **Yes** button, the section and all of the entries in the section would be removed. For now, choose the **No** button.

Closing the Edit Dialog Box

Choosing the **Close** button closes the Edit dialog box. However, unlike other dialog boxes, you can continue to work with Configure! without closing the Edit dialog box.

For example, leave the Edit dialog box open and double-click on Configure!'s **Desktop** icon. (You may have to move the Edit dialog box to reveal the **Desktop** icon. See <u>Title Bar</u> or <u>System Move command</u>.) The <u>Desktop dialog box</u> appears. Next, click on the Edit dialog box. It becomes active and you can continue working with it. Finally, click on the Desktop dialog box and then chose its **Cancel** button. The Desktop dialog box disappears. The Edit dialog box is still open and you can continue working with it without having invoked the Edit command a second time.

The Edit dialog box remains open even if Configure! has been minimized and then restored. For example, leave the Edit dialog box open and minimize Configure!. Configure!'s main window is minimized and the Edit dialog box disappears. Next, restore Configure! by double-clicking its icon at the bottom of the screen or by single-clicking its icon and choosing **Restore** from its System menu. Both the main window and the Edit dialog box are restored to their original positions.

Lastly, when the Edit dialog box is closed and reopened, its settings are NOT lost. For example, choose the Edit dialog box's **Close** button. The dialog box disappears. Next, choose the File Edit command (or press CTRL+E). The dialog box reappears and its **File**, **Section**, **Entry** and **Value** settings are the same.

Edit dialog box

The following options allow you to edit an initialization file indirectly:

File

The name of the initialization file you are editing. Use the **Browse** button to select the initialization file.

Browse...

Choose this button to select an initialization file to edit. The file must exist.

Section

Select or type the name of the section.

Entry

Select or type the name of the entry.

Value

Enter the entry's new value.

Close

Choose this button to close the dialog box.

Unlike other dialog boxes, you can continue to work with Configure! without closing the Edit dialog box. It remains open even if another dialog box is opened or if Configure! has been <u>minimized</u> and then <u>restored</u>.

When the Edit dialog box is closed and reopened, its settings are NOT lost.

Write

Choose this button to write the value to the initialization file. If the section and/or the entry do not already exist, they will be created.

Remove

Choose this button to remove the specified entry or section from the initialization file.

If an entry other than **-None-** is displayed in the **Entry** box, the entry will be removed. If

-None- is displayed in the **Entry** box, the section displayed in the **Section** box (and all of its entries) will be removed.

Note: As soon as a **File**, **Section** or **Entry** other than **-None-** is selected or typed, the next box is filled with the appropriate item(s).

For a step-by-step tutorial on how to use the Edit dialog box, see the File Edit command.

Editor command (Options menu)

Use this command to open the Editor dialog box. This dialog box lets you choose the text editor that will run and open the specified $\underline{\text{initialization file}}$ when you use the $\underline{\text{File Open}}$ command.

By default, Configure! uses the Windows **Notepad** application to edit initialization files. To use a different text editor, type its filename (including its drive and path) in the **Other** edit box or use the **Browse** button to select it graphically. The **Other** radio button will be selected automatically. To switch back to using Notepad, choose the **Notepad** radio button.

Step-By-Step Tutorial

For example, to use the text editor supplied with MS-DOS(R), choose the **Browse** button. Find and highlight the **EDIT.COM** file (it's in your **DOS** directory) and choose the **OK** button. The editor's complete filename will appear in the **Other** edit box and the **Other** radio button will be selected.

Alternatively, you can type the editor's complete filename in the **Other** edit box yourself.

To switch back to using Notepad, choose the **Notepad** radio button. Even though the **Other** edit box is still filled with the filename of the other text editor, Configure! will use Notepad because its radio button is selected.

Choose the **OK** button.

Prompt To Restart Windows command (Options menu)

Use this command to show or hide the Restart Windows dialog box.

Occasionally, you will modify a setting using the <u>configuration dialog boxes</u> that requires Windows be restarted for the new setting to take effect. Normally (when the Prompt To Restart Windows command is checked), Configure! will display a dialog box that asks if you want to restart Windows now. If the Prompt To Restart Windows command is not checked, this dialog box will not appear and you will not be notified that Windows needs to be restarted.

Note: The Restart Windows dialog box will never appear when you change <u>initialization file</u> settings with the <u>File menu</u> commands <u>Open</u> and <u>Edit</u>. You will never be notified that Windows needs to be restarted when using these commands.

Search For Help On command (Help menu)

Displays the Help Search dialog box. To use the dialog box, type a keyword or select it from the list. Next, choose the **Show Topics** button to see a list of related topics. Finally, select a topic from the list and choose the **Go To** button.

Once Help is open, you can choose the **Search** button whenever you want to use the Search dialog box. You can choose the **Contents** button to display the <u>Configure! Help Contents</u>.

Configuration dialog boxes



386 Enhanced

Optimizes Windows for 386 enhanced mode.



Clipboard

Configures Windows' timing when pasting from the Clipboard.



Color

Configures the screen colors.



Date/Time

Sets the date and time, and configures the timer ports.



Desktop

Configures the look and feel of your desktop.



Disk Drives

Configures how Windows interacts with your disk drives.



Display

Configures a CGA display and the display of non-Windows applications.



Drivers

Installs, removes and configures drivers.



Files

Specifies program and non-associated document filename extensions.



Fonts

Adds and removes fonts, and sets TrueType(R) options.





Specifies international settings.



Keyboard

Configures your keyboard and keystrokes.





Specifies communications settings for serial ports.

Initialization Files

Initialization, or INI [in'-ee], files are files that Windows and Windows applications use to save settings. For example, **WIN.INI** is one of the initialization files that Windows uses to save system settings such as the spacing between icons in **Program Manager** and the wallpaper used to decorate your desktop. It is just one of the files that Configure! (and the Windows **Control Panel** application) uses to configure your system.

Note: Initialization files are sometimes called INI files because they almost always have an INI filename extension.

Initialization files contain **sections**, **entries** and **values**. Each file contains zero (if the file is empty) or more **sections**. Each **section** contains zero or more **entries**. Each **entry** has a **value**. Initialization files take the following form:

[Section] Entry=Value Entry=Value Entry=Value [Section] Entry=Value Entry=Value

Initialization files are case-INSensitive, i.e. their **sections**, **entries** and **values** can be any combination of lower- and upper-case letters. For example, the following two **sections** are identical:

[Desktop]
Wallpaper=C:\WINDOWS\WINLOGO.BMP

[DESKTOP]
WallPaper=c:\windows\winlogo.bmp

To look at an initialization file first-hand, choose the File Open command.

The above <u>configuration dialog boxes</u> are part of the Windows **Control Panel** application. They were included in <u>Configure!'s main window</u> and the <u>Settings menu</u> so you wouldn't have to run Control Panel to access them.

To get help, open the dialog box by choosing its corresponding icon in Configure!'s main window or its corresponding Settings menu command. Once the dialog box is open, choose its **Help** button.

Restart Windows: Yes

Specifies how many seconds Windows waits before pasting any characters after the ALT key has been pasted. Some applications may require more time for recognition of the ALT keystroke.

SYSTEM.INI [386enh] KeyBufferDelay

Default: .2

Restart Windows: Yes

Specifies how many seconds to delay pasting keyboard input after the keyboard buffer is full. Some applications might require more than **.2** seconds.

SYSTEM.INI [386enh] KeyPasteCRSkipCount

Default: 10

Restart Windows: Yes

Specifies the number of times that a read-status INT 16 call should return a status of "empty" for the keyboard buffer after pasting a carriage return and before pasting another character.

When Windows pastes data from the Clipboard to a non-Windows application, it must first paste the data to the BIOS keyboard buffer before pasting it into the application. This setting is used to slow down fast pasting from the Clipboard to the keyboard buffer so that the application can handle all incoming characters from the buffer. If you seem to lose characters, or if the screen does not update often enough while pasting information from the Clipboard, increase this value.

This setting is related to <u>KeyPasteSkipCount</u>.

SYSTEM.INI [386enh] KeyPasteDelay

Default: .003

3.e-003 (scientific notation)

Restart Windows: Yes

Specifies how many seconds to wait before pasting any characters after a key has been pasted. Some applications might require more time than **.003** seconds for recognition of a keystroke.

SYSTEM.INI [386enh] KeyPasteSkipCount

Default: 2

Restart Windows: Yes

Specifies the number of times that a read-status INT 16 call should return a status of "empty" for the keyboard buffer before pasting another character.

When Windows pastes data from the Clipboard to a non-Windows application, it must first paste the data to the BIOS keyboard buffer before pasting it into the application. This setting is used to slow down fast pasting from the Clipboard to the keyboard buffer so that the application can handle all incoming characters from the buffer. If you seem to lose characters, or if the screen does not update often enough while pasting information from the Clipboard, increase this value.

This setting is related to KeyPasteCRSkipCount.

SYSTEM.INI [386enh] KeyPasteTimeout

Default: 1

Restart Windows: Yes

Specifies how many seconds to allow an application to make the necessary BIOS calls for reading keyboard input before Windows will change from the fast paste (INT 16h) to the slow paste (INT 9h) mechanism.

To get more help, open the dialog box by choosing the **Windows Screen Colors** button. Once the dialog box is open, choose its **Help** button.

Date/Time

Restart Windows: No

Specifies that the <u>desktop wallpaper</u> is tiled across the screen if this setting is $\bf 1$ (checked). The wallpaper is centered if this setting is $\bf 0$ (cleared).

Specifies whether menus open so that they are right aligned or left aligned with the menu title. If this setting is $\mathbf{0}$ (cleared), menus open so that they are left aligned. If it is $\mathbf{1}$ (checked), menus open so that they are right aligned.
