

Help is available for each item in this group. Click  at the top of the dialog box, and then click the specific item you want information about.

Lists the available columns that can be added to your message list.

Lists the columns currently displayed in your message list and the order in which they appear.

Moves the selected column from the **Available columns** list to the **Displayed columns** list.

Moves the selected column from the **Displayed columns** list to the **Available columns** list.

Moves the selected column up one in the **Displayed columns** list.

Moves the selected column down one in the **Displayed columns** list.

Restores the columns to the settings originally displayed when Outlook Express was first installed.

Lists the available news servers. For information about how to add news servers to or remove news servers from your server list, look up "Adding news servers" in the Help Index.

Specifies that the list should display all newsgroups that contain the word you type here.

Lists the newsgroups available on the selected server. You can narrow this list to newsgroups that contain a specific word in the name or description. In addition, you can click the tabs to display all of the newsgroups available on the selected server or just the subscribed or new newsgroups available.

Specifies whether to limit the list of newsgroups to newsgroup names that contain the word you are searching for. If this box is checked, the list of newsgroups also includes newsgroups whose descriptions contain the word you are searching for.

Opens the newsgroup selected in the **Newsgroups** list.

Adds the selected newsgroup to your **Subscribed** list.

Removes the selected newsgroup from your **Subscribed** list.

Checks for new newsgroups on your server. If there are new newsgroups, Outlook Express downloads their names and descriptions, if descriptions are available.

Specifies whether to download the chosen number of messages when viewing a newsgroup or to download all messages in the newsgroup.

Specifies whether to display threads and all replies in the message list when you open a newsgroup. If you clear this check box, only the original message is displayed.

Specifies whether to mark a message as read after you have previewed it for the number of seconds indicated. If you clear this check box, you can still mark individual messages as read. For more information, look up "Marking messages as read" in the Help Index.

Specifies whether to check your news server for new messages and send messages from your Outbox at the interval of minutes indicated. If you clear this check box, you can still check for new messages and send messages from your Outbox by clicking the **View** menu and then clicking **Refresh**.

Specifies whether to check for new newsgroups and download their names and descriptions when you access a newsgroup server. If any are found, you can view the list of new newsgroups. If you clear this check box, you can still check for newsgroups by clicking the **Tools** menu and then clicking **Newsgroups**.

Specifies whether to mark all messages as read when you exit a newsgroup. If you clear this check box, you can still mark individual messages as read. For more information, look up "Marking messages as read" in the Help Index.

Specifies whether to display the body of a message in the preview pane whenever the header is selected in the message list. If you clear this check box, you can display the message body by selecting the header and then pressing the SPACEBAR.

Specifies whether to use Outlook Express whenever you click a link on a Web page to go to a newsgroup or choose the **News** command in your Web browser. If you clear this check box, then your browser does not use Outlook Express, and you must install another newsreader to view newsgroups from your browser.

Specifies whether when you want to save copies of the messages you post to newsgroups in the Posted Messages folder. If you clear this check box, you can still save a copy of a message by including yourself on the **Cc** line of the message.

Specifies whether to automatically select whole words when selecting text in the body of your message. If you clear this check box, you can select text one character at a time, and you can automatically select whole words by double-clicking a word and extending the selection word by word.

Specifies whether to include the text of the original message when you reply to a message. You can edit or cut any of this text. If you clear this check box, the body of your message contains only the text you type or paste.

Specifies whether to indent the beginning of each line of original text included in your reply, preceded by the character indicated. This distinguishes the text you type from the text in the original message. If you clear this check box, then the original text and the text you add appear the same.

Click this to select advanced settings for sending messages, specifying message format and line length, and sending messages immediately.

Specifies whether a copy of each message you send is saved in the Sent Items folder. If you clear this check box, you can still save a copy of an individual message by including yourself on the **To**, **Cc**, or **Bcc** line of the message.

Specifies whether to use Outlook Express whenever you send e-mail replies to the author of a newsgroup message. If you clear this check box, then your browser does not use Outlook Express, and you must install another e-mail program to send messages.

Click this to select advanced settings for sending messages, including specifying the character set, message format, and line length, and sending messages immediately.

Specifies whether to use a different international character set than the default character set associated with your **Regional Settings** in Control Panel. If you clear this check box, Outlook Express uses the default character set.

Specifies that Outlook Express should encode your messages using MIME. This is the common format used by most Internet mail programs.

Specifies that Outlook Express should encode your messages using Uuencode. This format is commonly used to send binary files as attachments in messages posted to newsgroups.

Specifies that Outlook Express should break up large messages, so that each part is smaller than the file size indicated. Some older servers on the Internet cannot handle messages larger than 64K. By breaking large messages into smaller messages, you ensure that the messages are transmitted and received correctly.

Specifies that Outlook Express should automatically wrap the text of outgoing messages so that each line is no more than the number of characters indicated. Some older servers on the Internet cannot properly display messages with lines over 80 characters long. If you clear this check box, your message might appear to have extra line breaks to recipients whose mail or newsreading program can display only 80 characters per line.

It is suggested that you set your limit to about 72 characters. Most mail and newsreading programs indent quoted text in replies or forwards. Setting the limit to 72 allows the message to be quoted several times without causing extra line breaks.

Specifies whether Outlook Express should immediately forward to your mail server any messages you send. If you clear this check box, messages you send are placed in your Outbox and are not sent until you click the **Tools** menu and then click **Send and Retrieve**.

Lists the available bit and binary formats for encoding your message.

Specifies the "friendly" name associated with your e-mail address. When you send e-mail or post messages to a newsgroup, this friendly name appears in the **From** field of your outgoing messages.

Specifies your group or organization.

Specifies the e-mail address that people should use when sending mail to you at this account. The e-mail address must be in the format name@company—for example, PatSmith@acme.com.

Specifies in outgoing messages a different return e-mail address for replies to your messages. Provides a space where you can type the return e-mail address.

For example, you might send messages through one e-mail account, JRS@company.com, and specify to send replies to JRSmith@MSN.COM. When a recipient replies to messages from JRS@company.com, the reply is sent to JRSmith@MSN.COM, not to the account you sent it from.

If you do not specify anything in this box, replies to your mail are sent to the e-mail account you send them from.

Lists the available news servers.

Click this to add a new news server.

Removes the selected news server from your news-server list.

Click this to change the properties for the news server selected in your news-server list.

Specifies the server, and provides a space where you can type the server name.

Specifies that this news server requires that you log on for access, and transmits your logon settings to this server.

Provides a space for you to type the password assigned to your account on this news server by your service provider. The actual characters are not displayed in this box—each character is represented by an asterisk (*) instead, for security purposes.

Sets this news server as your default news server. When you add, remove, or search for newsgroups, or check for new newsgroups, this is the news server Outlook Express selects by default. However, if you have more than one news server, you can choose a different one in the **Newsgroups** dialog box.

Specifies the port number you connect to on your news server. This port number is usually 119.

Specifies how long Outlook Express waits for a response from this server before it cancels downloading newsgroups or newsgroup messages.

If you have a fast connection to your server, move the slider toward **Short**.

If you have a slow connection or a busy server, move the slider toward **Long** to give the server enough time to respond.

Restores the server port numbers to their default settings.

Specifies that Outlook Express should include descriptions of newsgroups when downloading the newsgroup list or new newsgroup names from this server. If this news server carries a large number of newsgroups, clearing this check box reduces the time needed to download the newsgroup list or new newsgroup names. Not all newsgroups have descriptions.

Downloads the newsgroup descriptions from your server.

Specifies that you connect to this server by using a LAN connection.

Specifies that you manually connect to this server before you access mail messages or newsgroups.

Specifies that you connect to this server by using Dial-Up Networking.

Lists the Dial-Up Networking connections already set up on your computer.

Displays the settings for the selected Dial-Up Networking connection.

Click this to create a new Dial-Up Networking connection.

Displays how your text appears in outgoing messages. Recipients whose servers or e-mail programs do not support text formatting see the text displayed on their computers as plain text.

Displays how text appears in messages you receive as unformatted text.

Displays how text appears in the original text included in your reply. Recipients whose servers or e-mail programs do not support text formatting see the text displayed on their computers as plain text.

Changes the font characteristics, such as font, font style, size, and color.

Specifies whether to show suggested spellings for misspelled words found during a spelling check. If you clear this check box, Outlook Express displays misspelled words, but it does not suggest correct spellings. However, you can still type the correct spelling in the box.

Specifies that Outlook Express should check the spelling in messages you send and give you a chance to change, ignore, or correct any misspelled words.

Specifies whether to ignore words in uppercase letters. This is useful when the text you are sending contains computer programming code, which is often in uppercase letters and uses character combinations that do not form identifiable words. If you clear this check box, Outlook Express checks words in uppercase for misspelling.

Specifies whether to ignore words that contain numbers. If you clear this check box, Outlook Express checks words that contain numbers for misspelling.

Specifies whether to ignore misspelled words in the original text included in a reply or forward. If you clear this check box, Outlook Express checks the original text, in addition to your own, for misspelled words.

Specifies that no signature should be added to your messages.

Specifies that a text file should be used as a signature in your outgoing messages.

Specifies that you want to insert the contents of a text file as your signature. You can type the path and filename to the file you want to use, or you can click the **Browse** button and locate the file.

Specifies whether to add your signature to all outgoing messages. If you clear this check box, outgoing messages do not contain your signature unless you add it to an individual message.

Specifies whether to add your signature to all outgoing messages except replies or forwards. If you clear this check box, outgoing messages do not contain your signature.

Displays a possible error, such as a misspelled word, a duplicate word, or incorrect capitalization. The word is highlighted in the message, so you can see it in the context in which it is used.

Proposes a replacement for the word displayed in the **Not in dictionary** box.

To replace the word that is displayed in the **Not in dictionary** box, accept the word in the **Change to** box, type the correct word in the **Change to** box, or select a word in the **Suggestions** list.

To delete the word in the document, delete the text in the **Change to** box, and then click **Delete**. To delete all instances of the word in the document, click **Delete All**.

Lists suggested replacement words from your dictionary when you click **Suggest** or if you have selected the **Always suggest** check box on the **Spelling** tab.

Specifies the rules that Outlook Express uses to check spelling.

Reverses the most recent actions made during the spelling check. You can undo several changes by clicking **Undo Last** several times.

Leaves the word in the **Not in dictionary** text box unchanged.

Changes the word in the **Not in dictionary** text box to the word in the **Change to** text box.

If the **Change to** text box is empty, the button name changes to **Delete**. Click **Delete** to delete the selected word.

Adds the word in the **Not in dictionary** text box to the Outlook Express dictionary.

Closes this dialog box without saving any changes you've made.

Leaves all instances of the word in the **Not in dictionary** text box unchanged in your message.

Changes all instances in this message of the word in the **Not in dictionary** text box to the word in the **Change to** box.

Displays a list of proposed alternatives for a misspelled word.

Specifies whether you want your computer to play a sound when new messages arrive when you are running Outlook Express. If you clear this check box, you do not hear any sound when new messages arrive, but the Outlook Express status bar and message list indicate that you have unread messages.

Specifies whether a message should be marked as read after you have previewed it for the number of seconds indicated. If you clear this check box, messages are not marked as read unless you open the message in a message window, scroll the message in the preview pane, or select the message in the list, click the **Edit** menu, and then click **Mark as Read**.

Specifies whether to check your mail server for new messages at the interval of minutes indicated. It also sends any messages in the **Outbox** at the same time. If you clear this check box, you can check for new messages only by clicking the **Tools** menu and then clicking **Send and Retrieve**.

Specifies whether Outlook Express should permanently delete messages from the **Deleted Items** folder when you quit Outlook Express. If you clear this check box, deleted messages stay in the **Deleted Items** folder until you open that folder, select the messages, and then delete them.

Specifies whether you want to save copies of the messages you send in the **Sent Items** folder. If you clear this check box, you can still save a copy of a message by including yourself on the **To** or **Cc** line of the message.

Specifies whether to use Outlook Express whenever you click a link in a Web page to send an e-mail message, or choose the mail command in your Web browser.

Specifies your SMTP server for outgoing messages, or you can type a different server name.

Specifies your server for incoming messages, or you can type a different server name.

Specifies your account name. This is usually the same as the part of your e-mail address to the left of the at sign (@).

Provides a space for you to type the password assigned to you by your service provider. For security, the actual characters are not displayed in this space; each character is represented by an asterisk (*).

Click this to select advanced settings for your mail servers.

Specifies the port number you connect to on your outgoing mail (SMTP) server. This port number is usually 25.

Specifies the port number you connect to on your incoming mail (POP3) server. This port number is usually 110.

Specifies that messages over a certain size are not downloaded from your incoming mail (POP3) server. This can be useful if you want to avoid long connection times. When messages over the size limit are encountered, Outlook Express leaves them on the server and displays a warning that messages have been left on the server.

Specifies whether Outlook Express Mail should store on your server a copy of all sent and received messages. If your Internet service provider does not allow you to save messages on the server, Outlook Express Mail displays a message that you cannot store messages on the server.

If you clear this check box, incoming messages are deleted from your server after you receive them on your computer. Outgoing messages are not saved on your server, but they are saved on your computer if you have selected that option. To specify that all outgoing messages should be saved on your computer, click the **Tools** menu, click **Mail Options**, click the **Send** tab, and then select the following check box: **Save copy of sent messages in the 'Sent Items' folder**.

Specifies whether Outlook Express Mail should delete mail messages left on the server after the number of days indicated.

Some service providers limit the number of messages you can store on the server, or do not allow you to save messages on the server. If you clear this check box, your server might automatically remove messages after a certain period of time or when you exceed your limit.

Specifies that Outlook Express Mail should delete a message from the server when you delete the message from the Deleted Items folder on your computer. Some service providers limit the number of messages you can store on the server, or do not allow you to save messages on the server.

Specifies that you want replies to your outgoing messages sent to a different e-mail address, and provides a space for you to type the return e-mail address.

For example, you might send messages through one e-mail account, JRS@company.com, and specify that you want replies sent to JRSmith@MSN.COM. When a recipient replies to a message from JRS@company.com, the reply is sent to JRSmith@MSN.COM, not to the account the original message was sent from.

If you do not specify otherwise, replies to your e-mail messages are sent to the e-mail account you send them from.

Specifies how long Outlook Express Mail waits for a response from the server before it cancels sending or receiving mail messages.

If you have a fast connection to your server, move the slider toward **Short**.

If you have a slow connection or a busy server, move the slider toward **Long** to give the server enough time to respond.

Restores the server port numbers to their default settings.

Specifies that Outlook Express should send your messages with HTML format.

Specifies that Outlook Express should send your messages as plain text, with no formatting.

[Click this to specify format settings for message encoding.](#)

Click this to start Outlook Express in the newsgroup selected in the list. If this check box is cleared, Outlook Express starts in the newsgroup you were viewing when you last used Outlook Express.

Specifies that foreign character sets, high ASCII, or double-byte character sets (DBCS) are allowed in the header without encoding. If this check box is cleared, these characters will be encoded.

Specifies your account name. This is usually the same as the part of your e-mail address to the left of the at sign (@).

Specifies that this news server requires Microsoft Secure Authentication to verify your access with this server.

Specifies that Outlook Express should delete all newsgroup messages from local storage on your computer after they have been on your computer longer than the number of days indicated.

Specifies that Outlook Express should delete all read newsgroup messages from local storage on your computer when you exit Outlook Express.

Specifies that Outlook Express should compact local storage files on your computer when the amount of wasted space exceeds the percent indicated.

Click this to compact, delete, or remove messages from the local files for any or all of the newsgroup message files on your computer.

Specifies the name used to refer to this server in the **Internet Accounts** list, and when you point to **Retrieve** on the **Tools** menu.

Specifies whether to use this e-mail account as your default e-mail account when sending e-mail messages.

Specifies whether to check for new messages and send outgoing messages for this account when you choose the **Send and Retrieve** command.

Specifies that this mail server requires that you log on for access, and transmits your logon settings to this server.

Specifies that this server requires that you use Secure Password Authentication to logon.

Specifies whether to disconnect from your LAN or modem connection after you have completed sending and receiving messages.

Specifies whether to use Secure Sockets Layer when connecting to this server.

Specifies that Outlook Express should download messages from all newsgroups that you subscribe to, from all servers that contain newsgroups that you subscribe to.

Specifies that Outlook Express should download messages from only the subscribed newsgroups that you select, from all servers that contain newsgroups that you subscribe to.

You can select individual subscribed newsgroups on one or more servers, or all subscribed newsgroups on individual servers.

Lists your newsgroup servers, and the subscribed newsgroups on them, and provides a place to select servers or newsgroups to download.

Click the + next to a server to display the subscribed newsgroups on that server.

Specifies to only download the headers for the newsgroups you select to download. You can later view those headers and select which messages you want to download.

Specifies to download the headers and message bodies for the newsgroups you select to download.

Specifies whether to download any new messages which were posted more than the number of days you specify.
If you clear this check box, all new messages will be downloaded.

Click this to download messages now.

Mail features

Microsoft Outlook Express Mail is fast, friendly, and easy to use. Here are a few of the features that make sending and receiving mail messages easy and fun.

- Manage multiple mail accounts
- Use IMAP servers to organize and store your mail from anywhere
- Do everything from the main window
- Save e-mail addresses in your address book, and insert them into messages
- Browse your messages quickly and easily
- Create your own folders to organize your messages
- Sort the message list
- Add your personal signature to your messages
- Send and receive secure messages

Save e-mail addresses in your address book, and insert them into messages

You can save first names, last names, and Internet e-mail names in the address book. Type them in yourself, search for e-mail names on popular Internet white pages (LDAP) servers, or import names from other programs' address books. After they're entered, you can insert them into messages. You can also check e-mail names to make sure they are in your address book or are valid e-mail addresses.

Manage multiple mail accounts

If you have several accounts on one server or with several different service providers, you can access and manage them all through one window. Just set up each account with its own e-mail name, address, and connection method.

Do everything from the main window

You can view and respond to messages and switch folders all from the Outlook Express window. With just a click on the toolbar, you can reply to, forward, or create new messages. Or use the toolbar to navigate among messages and folders. All of these commands and more are also available from the menus.

Browse your messages quickly and easily

With the folder list, you can easily add to and navigate between your folders. You can quickly see which folders have new messages, and how many. The message list and preview pane enable you to view a list of messages and preview the messages at the same time in one window. Or, if you prefer, you can view a message in a separate window, and use its toolbar to go to the next or previous message.

Create your own folders to organize your messages

You can add folders to organize and sort your messages. After you receive messages, you can move them to any folder you want.

Sort the message list

You can sort messages by columns, such as by the subject, who sent it, or when it was received or sent. You can also add, remove, or rearrange these columns, and sort them in ascending or descending order.

Add your personal signature to your messages

You can insert text or a text or html file as your personal signature. And you can choose to insert your signature in all outgoing messages, in an individual message, or not at all.

Send and receive secure messages

You can digitally sign your messages, and encrypt and decrypt messages with certificates. Digitally signing your messages assures recipients that the message is really from you, and encryption ensures that only the intended recipients can read a message.

Use IMAP servers to organize and store your mail from anywhere

If your service provider uses an IMAP mail server for incoming mail, you can save and organize your messages on the server. With IMAP servers, you can read, store, and organize your messages in folders on the server, without downloading the messages to local folders on your computer. That way you can view only the messages you want to view, from any computer that can connect to that server.

Outlook Express Mail keyboard shortcuts

Getting started with Outlook Express Mail

With an Internet connection and Microsoft Outlook Express Mail, you can exchange e-mail messages with anyone on the Internet. Outlook Express Mail fully supports Internet standards, including IMAP, SMTP/POP3 and MIME.

If you are new to e-mail or Outlook Express Mail, here's a quick look at how to get from installing Outlook Express Mail to receiving, viewing, and sending e-mail. You might already have completed part of this process when you installed Outlook Express Mail. To see specific procedures for the steps below, see the Related Topics at the end of this topic.

Set up your Internet connections

Before you can send and receive e-mail you must have access to the Internet through an Internet service provider or through an Internet gateway in your organization. After you have an Internet connection, you can set up specific Outlook Express Mail settings. Usually, you connect to the Internet in one of the following ways:

- Over phone lines, using a modem. You can manually establish a connection, or you can use Dial-Up Networking to automatically connect when you start Outlook Express Mail. Your Internet service provider can provide you with the phone number, modem settings, and network protocols required to access the provider.
- Through a local area network (LAN). Your organization might provide external access to the Internet from your computer through a LAN. Your system administrator can provide you with account information and network protocols to access the mail servers.

Add mail servers

You will need the mail server names, your account name, and password. You must specify an incoming and an outgoing mail server. This information is provided to you by your Internet service provider, or by your system administrator if you are using Outlook Express on a LAN. There are two ways to specify this information:

- In the Internet Connection Wizard, the first time you start Outlook Express Mail after installing it.
- In Outlook Express, by using the **Mail Accounts** command on the **Tools** menu. Click the **Add** button to add mail servers or the **Properties** button to change the settings for existing servers.

Read messages

When you start Outlook Express Mail, it connects to your mail server, logs on to your e-mail account, and downloads any new messages into your Inbox folder. Besides your Inbox folder, Outlook Express Mail includes several other mail folders, and also enables you to create your own. You can organize your messages by moving them to other folders or deleting them. You can also set up Outlook Express Mail to automatically sort incoming messages to different folders, by using the Inbox Assistant.

Messages are stored on your computer; in addition, there is an option to store copies of your messages on your mail server. Note that some mail servers do not support this option; for more information, contact your Internet service provider or system administrator.

Send messages

You can create new messages, or forward or reply to messages you've received. Outlook Express includes the Windows Address Book, so that you can store and select from e-mail names of people you communicate with regularly. When you send a message, Outlook Express checks all of the names in the **To** and **Cc** boxes to make sure they match contacts in your address book or that they are properly formatted Internet e-mail names. Outlook Express can also check your spelling if you have Microsoft Office 95 or Word 95 installed on your computer.






Customize Outlook Express Mail

- Create shortcuts to start Outlook Express Mail from wherever you want—your desktop, the **Start** menu, a program group, or your StartUp folder.
- Arrange the window the way you want. Show or hide the toolbars, folders, or status bar. Customize the toolbar. Hide the preview pane, resize it, or split it vertically or horizontally.
- Sort messages by sender, date, or subject.

 - Does your Internet service provider require a logon account name and password?
If you are required to log on for this news server, check that the account name and password you have entered match those issued to you by your provider.
If you are not required to log on for this news server, clear the following check box: **This server requires me to logon**.
- 4 Click **OK** to close the dialog boxes.
- 5 On the **Tools** menu, click **Newsgroups**, and try connecting to this server.
- 6 Repeat this procedure for each news server that you cannot connect to.

- 5 On the **Tools** menu, click **Newsgroups**, and then try connecting to a news server.

Encoding enables you to send large messages and messages or files that are not plain text.

Most mail servers limit the size of individual messages that can be received and sent. Usually this limit is 1 MB per message, including all attached files. When you encode a large message, it is compressed, divided into several smaller messages, and sent. When the group of messages is received, the newsreader or mail program recombines and decodes them. When you set this option, large messages and messages that are not plain text are automatically broken up and encoded before being sent.

Messages and file attachments that are not plain text are encoded and converted to plain text before they are sent. When they are received, they are decoded to their original form.

To decode a message

- 1 In the message list, select the message(s) you want to decode. To select more than one message at a time, hold down the CTRL key while you click each message.
- 2 On the **Tools** menu, click **Combine and Decode**.
- 3 In the **Decode order** list, drag the messages into the correct order, and then click **OK**.

Note

- The order of the messages is usually specified in the subject line. For example, 1/x, 2/x, 3/x, and so on. The phrasing varies, depending on the program the author used to post the messages. Arrange the messages from first to last, starting with first at the top of the list.

To switch between mail and newsreading

- On the **Go** menu, click **Inbox** or **News**.

To delete a folder

- In the folder pane, right-click the folder, and then click **Delete**.

Note

- You cannot delete or rename the Deleted Items, Inbox, Outbox, or Sent Items folders.

To check the spelling in an outgoing message

Notes

- To check the spelling in all outgoing messages, click the **Tools** menu, click **Mail Options** or **News Options**, and then click the **Spelling** tab. Select the following check box: **Always check spelling before sending**.
- If you do not have any Microsoft Office 95 or Office 97 programs installed on your computer, the **Check Spelling** command will not be available. Microsoft Outlook Express uses the spelling checker provided with all Office 95 or Office 97 programs— Microsoft Word, Excel, and PowerPoint.

To add a contact or group to your address book

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Address Book**.
- 2 In the Address Book window, click **New Contact** or **New Group** on the toolbar, and then type the contact's first name, last name, and e-mail name.

Tips

- You can also add the author of an e-mail or newsgroup message to your address book. Open the message, right-click the name, and then click **Add to Address Book**.
- To display the properties for the sender or other recipients, open the message in a separate window, and then double-click the name.

To edit a contact in your address book

- 1 Click the **Tools** menu, and then click **Address Book**.
- 2 Locate the name you want in the address book list, and then double-click it to display information about the contact.
- 3 Modify the information as needed.

Tip

- To delete a contact, select the contact in the address book list, and then click **Delete**.

To send a message to a contact from your address book

- 1 In an outgoing message window, click the **Tools** menu, and then click **Choose Recipients**.
- 2 Select the name you want, and then click **To** or **Cc**.

Tip

- You can also insert a name in the **To** box by selecting it in the address book list and then double-clicking it.

To make sure e-mail names and address book contacts are valid

- In an outgoing message, click the **Tools** menu, and then click **Check Names**.
If a name matches an address book entry, or is in the correct format for an e-mail name (name@company), then it is a valid e-mail name and it is underlined. Note that this does not mean the e-mail name actually exists. You can type an e-mail name with the correct format, and it will be validated even if the name does not actually exist.
If a name is not a valid e-mail name, then the name and any possible matches are displayed. You can click **Show More Names** to search for other names or add new ones to your address book.
- **Tip**
▪ To add verified e-mail names to your address book, right-click the name, and then click **Add to Address Book**.

To print a message

- 1 Select the message in the message list.
- 2 On the **File** menu, click **Print**.

To prevent newsgroup messages from automatically downloading

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **News Options**.
- 2 Click the **Read** tab, and then clear the following check box: **Automatically show message in preview pane**.

Tip

- You can view a message in the preview pane by pressing the SPACEBAR after selecting a message from the list.

To increase disk space by deleting stored messages

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **News Options**.
- 2 Click the **Advanced** tab, and then select the options you want for maintaining the size of all local message files.

To compact, delete, or remove messages from all or specific message files now, click **Clean Up Now**, and then follow the instructions on your screen.

Notes

- Most news servers periodically remove old messages and headers. The next time you connect to a newsgroup you've cleaned up, your message file is rebuilt with just the current messages and headers from your news server.
- Each newsgroup has its own message file on your computer. Cleaning up unused, old, or large newsgroups can significantly increase free disk space on your computer.

To increase disk space by compacting mail message folders

- Click the **File** menu, point to **Folder**, and then click **Compact**.

Tips

- You can also delete folders to increase free disk space on your computer.
- If you are using a program other than Microsoft Outlook Express to send e-mail messages when reading newsgroups, check your e-mail program's documentation for information about compacting and deleting mail folders.

A header is the row of information about a message that is displayed in the message list and above the message in a message window. The header contains information about the item, such as the sender, the subject, the newsgroups it is posted to, and the time and date the message was received or sent.

To send a message

- 1 On the **Compose** menu, click **New Message**.
- 2 In the **To** box, type the e-mail name of each recipient, separating each name by a semicolon (;).
To send copies, type the e-mail name of each recipient in the **Cc** box, separating each name by a semicolon.
- 3 In the **Subject** box, type the subject of the message.
- 4 Type your message.
- 5 On the **File** menu, point to **Send Message Using**, and then click the mail account you want to send it with.
Your e-mail is delivered to your mail server the next time Outlook Express checks for new mail.

- To send a file with your message, click the **Insert** menu, click **File Attachment**, and then double-click the file you want to send.

HTML stands for Hypertext Markup Language, the industry-standard language for describing the contents and layout of a Web page. HTML is also a standard for marking and displaying rich text in Internet mail and news programs. In Microsoft Outlook Express, you can send messages with plain text or with HTML formatting.

To change a font type, style, and size

- 1 Select the text you want to format.
- 2 On the **Format** menu, click **Font**.
- 3 Click the options you want.

Tips

- To change the font for an entire message, click the **Edit** menu, click **Select All**, and then click the **Format** menu.
- When you use HTML formatting, your messages are saved in HTML format. If the recipient's mail or news program reads HTML formatting, the message appears as it is formatted. If the recipient's program does not read HTML formatting, the message appears as plain text with an HTML file attached. The recipient can view the attached file with all formatting by opening it in any Web browser.

To align or center a paragraph

- 1 Click anywhere in the paragraph you want to format.
- 2 On the **Format** menu, point to **Align**, and then click the setting you want.

Tips

- To change the indentation of a paragraph, click the increase or decrease indentation button on the formatting toolbar.
- You can also change the alignment by clicking the left, center, or right alignment buttons on the formatting toolbar.
- When you use HTML formatting, your messages are saved in HTML format. If the recipient's mail or news program reads HTML formatting, the message appears as it is formatted. If the recipient's program does not read HTML formatting, the message appears as plain text with an HTML file attached. The recipient can view the attached file with all formatting by opening it in any Web browser.

To download an individual message in a newsgroup

1 In the message list, click the message you want to download.

To select more than one message to download, hold down the CTRL key while clicking each message.

2 On the **Tools** menu, point to **Offline**, and then click **Mark for Retrieval**.

3 On the **Tools** menu, point to **Offline**, and then click **Connect**.

Tips

- You can mark threads or individual messages in a newsgroup for downloading, so that you can view them after disconnecting from your service provider.
- You can mark messages in several different newsgroups before choosing **Connect**, as long you are receiving the messages using the same connection method (the same service provider or LAN connection).
- You can also mark entire newsgroups for downloading. You can download just the headers, or the headers and the bodies of the messages. For more information, click Related Topics below.

To download all messages by subscribed newsgroup

- 1 In the list of newsgroup folders, click the newsgroup.
- 2 On the **Tools** menu, point to Synchronize, and then click **Synchronize All**.

Tip

- To mark and download individual messages, click Related Topics below.

To import mail messages from other mail programs

- 1 In Outlook Express Mail, click the **File** menu, point to **Import**, and then click **Messages**.
- 2 Select which e-mail client you want to import messages from.

To import all messages, click **All Folders**.

To import messages from individual folders, click **Selected Folders**. To select multiple folders, press and hold down the **CTRL** or **SHIFT** key while clicking folders.

To import address book entries from other address books

- 1 In Outlook Express Mail, click the **File** menu, point to **Import**, and then click **Address Book**.
- 2 Click the address book you want to import, and then click **Import**.

To export Outlook Express Mail messages to Microsoft Exchange folders

1 In Outlook Express Mail, click the **File** menu, point to **Export**, click **Messages**, and then click **OK**.

2 To export all messages, click **All Folders**.

To export messages from individual folders, click **Selected Folders**. To select multiple folders, press and hold down the CTRL or SHIFT key while clicking folders.

To customize the toolbar

1 On the **View** menu, make sure **Toolbar** is selected.

2 Right-click the toolbar, and then click **Customize**.

3 To add a button, click the button in the **Available buttons** list, and then click **Add**.

To remove a button, click the button name in the **Toolbar buttons** list, and then click **Remove**.

To change the order in which buttons appear, click the button in the **Toolbar buttons** list, and then click **Move Up** or **Move Down**.

Tip

- You can dock the toolbar to any side of the window. Right-click the toolbar, point to **Align**, and then click the side you want.

To filter incoming messages

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Inbox Assistant**.
- 2 Click **Add**.
- 3 Type the criteria you want the incoming messages to match.
- 4 Click the folder you want the matching incoming messages moved to.

Tips

- You can use a filter to send specified incoming messages directly to the Deleted Items folder.
- You can specify multiple rules for incoming messages.
- To change the priorities by which messages are sorted, click the up or down arrows next to the rules list to move the highest priority rules to the top and the lowest to the bottom.
- If an incoming message matches more than one rule, then it is sorted according to the first rule it matches.

To back up your mail message files

- 1 Review your mail message folders and delete any unneeded messages.
- 2 Select each folder, click the **File** menu, and then click **Compact**.
- 3 Find the files with the extension .mbx and .idx on your computer. These files are usually located in a folder under C:\Program Files\Outlook Express*username*\Mail, where *username* is your e-mail name. The files might be in a different folder if you did not accept the default folders during setup.
- 4 Copy the files to a backup folder on your computer, a floppy disk, or a network drive.

Notes

- Each message folder has one message file (*.mbx) and one index file (*.idx).
- Some message files might be too large to back up onto a floppy disk.

To find mail messages in your message folders

- 1 On the **Edit** menu, click **Find**.
- 2 Type as much information as possible in the search fields to narrow down the search results.

To post a reply to a newsgroup

- 1 In the message list, click the message you want to reply to.
- 2 On the **Compose** menu, click **Reply to Newsgroup**.
- 3 In the **Newsgroups** box, type the names of any other newsgroups on the same server you want to post the reply to, separating each name by a semicolon (;).
- 4 Type the subject of your message. Outlook Express News will not post a message that does not contain a subject.
- 5 Type your message.
- 6 On the **File** menu, click **Send Message**.

Tips

- You can reply with a single message to multiple newsgroups only if all newsgroups are on the same news server. To post a reply to newsgroups on other news servers, create a separate reply for each news server that contains newsgroups you want to post to.
- You can cancel a message after you've posted it. For more information, click Related Topics below.
- To select additional newsgroups to post to, click the **Tools** menu, and then click **Select Newsgroups**. Click a newsgroup in the list, and then click **Add**. You can choose from all newsgroups or only newsgroups you subscribe to.
- You can reply to the author of the message by e-mail and post a reply to the newsgroup at the same time. To do this, click the **Compose** menu, and then click **Reply to Newsgroup and Author**.
- To see more options for posting replies, click the **View** menu, click **Options**, and then click the **Send** tab.

To filter newsgroup messages

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Newsgroup Filters**.
- 2 Click **Add**.
- 3 Select the newsgroup(s) you want to apply this filter to.
- 4 Select or type the criteria you want the incoming messages to match.

Notes

- You can filter messages by sender, subject, length, or time of posting. Any messages matching your criteria will not be displayed in the message list or downloaded to your computer.

To find messages in a newsgroup

- 1 On the **Edit** menu, click **Find**.
- 2 Type as much information as possible in the search fields to narrow down the search results.

To send an encrypted message

- 1 Compose your message.
- 2 On the **Tools** menu, click **Encrypt**.
- 3 Send the message.

Notes

- You can also automatically encrypt all outgoing messages. For more information, click Related Topics below.
- Encrypting a message ensures that it cannot be read by anyone except the person(s) who own the certificate(s) you used to encrypt the message.
- Only you can use your certificate file to read messages encrypted for you. Others can use your certificate file only to encrypt the messages they send to you.
- You must have the certificate(s) of the person(s) you are sending the message to. Usually they send you a certificate file (.pub) as an e-mail message attachment, and you add the certificate file to the contact's properties in the Windows Address Book. When you send e-mail to the contact, the certificate is used to encrypt the message so that only the contact can decrypt it.
- To obtain a certificate so that others can send you encrypted messages, you must obtain certificate from a third party that issue certificates. After you have your own certificate, you can send the certificate file to anyone who might need to send you encrypted files.

To automatically encrypt all outgoing messages

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Mail Options**.
- 2 On the **Security** tab, select the following check box: **Encrypt contents and attachments for all outgoing messages**.

Note

- You can click **Advanced Settings** to specify an encryption algorithm.

To automatically digitally sign all outgoing messages

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Mail Options**.
- 2 On the **Security** tab, select the following check box: **Add digital signature to all outgoing messages**.

Note

- You can click **Advanced Settings** to specify which certificate to use and whether to include the digital signature with signed messages.

To receive encrypted messages

- 1 Obtain a certificate from a certificate-issuing authority.
- 2 Send your certificate file to anyone who might need to send you encrypted messages.
- 3 Open an encrypted message the same way you would open any other message you receive.

Notes

- Encrypting a message ensures that it cannot be read by anyone except the person(s) who own the certificate(s) you used to encrypt the message.
- Only you can use your certificate file to read messages encrypted for you. Others can use your certificate file only to encrypt the messages they send to you.
- You must have the certificate(s) of the person(s) you are sending the message to. Usually they send you a certificate file (.pub) as an e-mail message attachment, and you add the certificate file to the contact's properties in the Windows Address Book. To send your certificate so others can verify your digital signature

- 4 If you want to send your certificate with all messages, select the following check box: **Include my signature with outgoing messages**.

If you want to send your certificate separately, clear the following check box: **Include my signature with outgoing messages**, and then send your certificate file (.pub) as a file attachment to your mail message.

- You can also automatically digitally sign all outgoing messages. For more information, click [Related Topics](#) below.
- You must use your certificate to digitally sign your message, and the recipient must have that certificate to verify that the digital signature on your message is trustworthy. You can send your certificate (.pub) file as an attachment, if the recipient does not already have it.
- Others can use your certificate file to verify your digital signature, but they cannot use it to send messages with your digital signature.

To receive a digitally signed message

- 1 Obtain the sender's certificate, if it is not attached to the message.
- 2 Open the message the same way you would open any other message.

Notes

- You must have the sender's certificate to verify that the digital signature on the message is trustworthy. The sender can send the certificate (.pub) file as an attachment, if you do not already have it.
- You can only use another's certificate to verify their digital signature. You cannot use their certificate to digitally sign your outgoing messages.
- Others can use the same certificate for digitally signing their messages as you use to send encrypted messages to them. Or they can use separate certificates for each.

To insert an image in a message

- 1 Position the cursor where you want the image to appear in the message body.
- 2 On the **Insert** menu, click **Picture**.

To insert a link in a message

- 1 Select the text you want to link to a file or Web page.
- 2 On the **Insert** menu, click **Link**.
- 3 On the **URL** tab, click **Browse files** or **Browse WWW**, or type the **URL**, to specify the location of the document you want to link to.

Tip

- You can specify that you want to display the linked page in the same window or a new window when the recipient clicks the link in your message.

To insert your signature into all outgoing messages

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Mail Options** or **News Options**.
- 2 On the **Signature** tab, click **Text**, and then type the text you want to appear at the bottom of your message.
Or, click **File** and specify an HTML or text file.
- 3 Click **Add signature to the end of all outgoing messages**.

Tips

- When you change this setting in Outlook Express Mail, it affects new mail, forwarded mail, and replies to authors. When you change this setting in Outlook Express News, it affects only messages posted to newsgroups.
- If you choose not to insert your signature in all outgoing messages, you can still insert it in an individual message by clicking the **Insert** menu in an outgoing message and then clicking **Signature**.

To cancel a message after you've posted it to a newsgroup

- 1 Go to the newsgroup where you posted the message.
- 2 In the message list, click the message you want to cancel.
- 3 On the **Compose** menu, click **Cancel Message**.

Tips

- You can also right-click a message in the message list, and then click **Cancel** in the menu that appears.
- You can cancel only messages that you posted.
- After you cancel a message, it may take some time for the message to be removed from your server and other servers on the Internet. Canceling a message does not remove it from another newsgroup user's computer if the user downloaded the message before it was canceled.

To post a new message to a newsgroup

- 1 On the **Compose** menu, click **New Message**.
- 2 In the **Newsgroups** box, type the names of any other groups you want to post the message to, separating each name by a semicolon (;).
- 3 Type the subject of your message. Outlook Express News will not post a message that does not contain a subject.
- 4 Type your message.
- 5 On the **File** menu, click **Send Message**.

Tips

- You can post a single message to multiple newsgroups only if all newsgroups are on the same news server. To post a message to newsgroups on other news servers, create a separate message for each news server containing newsgroups you want to post to.
- You can cancel a message after you've posted it. For more information, click Related Topics below.
- To select additional newsgroups to post to, click the **Tools** menu, and then click **Select Newsgroups**. Click a newsgroup in the list, and then click **Add**. You can choose from all newsgroups or only newsgroups you subscribe to.
- To send a copy of the posted message by e-mail, type the recipient's e-mail name in the **Cc** box.
- To see more options for posting replies, click the **Tools** menu, click **News Options**, and then click the **Send** tab.

To send outgoing messages immediately

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Mail Options**.
- 2 Click the **Send** tab, and then select the **Send messages immediately** check box.

When you click the **File** menu and then click **Send Message**, Outlook Express Mail immediately sends any messages in your Outbox to your mail server, and checks for incoming messages.

Tip

- If you don't want messages sent immediately, clear this check box. That way, when you click the **File** menu and then click **Send Message**, Outlook Express Mail stores messages in your Outbox until you choose the **Send** command or **Send and Retrieve Messages** command, or quit Outlook Express Mail.

To create a numbered or bulleted list

- 1 Click the point in your message where you want the list to start.
- 2 On the **Format** menu, click **Numbers** or **Bullets**.
- 3 Type the first item in the list. When you press ENTER, another bullet is displayed on the next line.
- 4 To end the bulleted list, click **Numbers** or **Bullets** again.

Note

- When you use HTML formatting, your messages are saved in HTML format. If the recipient's mail or news program reads HTML formatting, the message appears as it is formatted. If the recipient's program does not read HTML formatting, the message appears as plain text with an HTML file attached. The recipient can view the attached file with all formatting by opening it in any Web browser.

To store mail messages on a POP3 mail server

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Mail Accounts**.
- 2 Click the mail account, and then click **Properties**.
- 3 On the **Advanced** tab, click **Leave copy of messages on your server**.

Note

- Each time you log on to this account from a different computer, Outlook Express Mail downloads all mail messages stored on the server, according to the options you have set for removing old or deleted messages.

To store mail messages on an IMAP mail server

- 1 On the **Tools** menu, click **Mail Accounts**.
- 2 Click the mail account, and then click **Properties**.
- 3 On the **Advanced** tab, type the path in the **Root Folder Path**. If you are not sure what to type here, leave this box blank.

Notes

- The root folder path identifies the mailbox that contains all of your folders on the server.
- If your IMAP server is a Cyrus server, your user folders must be contained in the Inbox folder.
- If your IMAP server is UNIX-based, your mail is usually stored in its own directory in your user home directory—for example:
~username/Mail
- Do not end the root folder path with a hierarchy character. For example, ~username/Mail is a valid root folder path, but ~username/Mail/ is not.

Getting started with Outlook Express News

With over 10,000 newsgroups, Usenet newsgroups offer something for everyone. From hobbies to politics to computers, newsgroups provide forums for exchanging ideas, information, and opinions.

With Microsoft Outlook Express, you can interact with newsgroups as much or as little as you want. You can go to a newsgroup just to read what other people have to say, or you can post your own questions, tips, opinions, or answers.

If you are new to newsreading or Microsoft Outlook Express News, here's a quick look at how to get from installing Outlook Express to viewing newsgroups. You might already have completed part of this process when you installed Outlook Express. Since Outlook Express enables you to set up multiple servers, you can use this list as a checklist for each time you add and use a different server. For specific instructions about each step of the process below, see the Related Topics at the end of this topic.

Set up your Internet connections

Before you can view newsgroups, you must have access to the Internet, either through an Internet service provider or through an Internet gateway in your organization. Connect to the Internet through one of the following:

- Phone lines, using a modem. You can establish a connection manually, or you can use Dial-Up Networking to connect automatically when you start Outlook Express. Your Internet service provider can provide you with the phone number, modem settings, and network protocols required to access the provider.
- A local area network (LAN). Your organization might provide external access to the Internet from your computer through a LAN. For account information and the network protocols needed to access the news server, contact your system administrator.

After you have a way to connect to the Internet, you can choose specific Outlook Express News settings.

Add a news server

You will need the news server name and, if required by the news server, your account name and password. You can get this information from your Internet service provider, or from your system administrator if you are using Outlook Express on a LAN. You can specify this information in two ways:

- In the Internet Connection Wizard, the first time you start Outlook Express after installing it. This wizard walks you through the steps necessary to add your first server.
- By using the **News Accounts** command on the **Tools** menu. Click the **Add** button to add news servers or the **Properties** button to change the settings for existing servers.

Subscribe to a newsgroup

You can subscribe to a newsgroup in several ways:

- When you add a news server. Outlook Express prompts you to subscribe to newsgroups on that server.
- From the **Newsgroups** dialog box. To do this, click the **Tools** menu, and then click **Newsgroups**. You can also use this dialog box to go to a newsgroup without subscribing to it.
- When you view a newsgroup that you don't subscribe to. To do this, click the **Tools** menu, and then click **Subscribe to this Group**. Or, when you exit the newsgroup or Outlook Express News, click **OK** when you are prompted to subscribe to the newsgroup.

View a newsgroup

You can download a newsgroup and display it on your screen in several ways. The following two methods are for newsgroups you already subscribe to:

- Click a newsgroup in the folder pane.

The following method is for any newsgroup on your news server(s), whether you subscribe to it or not:

- Click the **Tools** menu, and then click **Newsgroups**. Click a server (if you have more than one), and then click the **All**, **Subscribed**, or **New** tab.

The first time you view a newsgroup, it takes several minutes for Outlook Express to download the messages and headers and to store that information in a message file on your computer. The next time you go to that newsgroup, it downloads faster, because Outlook Express downloads only new messages and headers.

Customize Outlook Express News

- You can create shortcuts to start Outlook Express from anywhere you want: your desktop, the **Start** menu, a program group, or your StartUp folder.
- You can arrange the window the way you want. Show or hide the folders, toolbar, or status bar. Customize the toolbar. Hide the preview pane, resize it, or split it vertically or horizontally.

- Sort messages by sender, date, or subject. Group them by thread.

Outlook Express News features

Microsoft Outlook Express is fast, friendly, and easy to use. Here are a few features that make reading newsgroups easy and fun.

- Do everything from the main window
- Browse newsgroup messages quickly and easily
- View, expand, and collapse threads
- Sort the message list
- Keep track of what you've read
- Send messages
- Add your personal signature to your messages
- Find newsgroups that interest you
- Filter out newsgroup messages that don't interest you
- Subscribe to your favorite newsgroups
- Connect to multiple servers
- Download newsgroups now, view off-line later

Download newsgroup messages now, view offline later

You can mark individual messages or entire newsgroups for downloading, so you don't have to be connected to your service provider to read messages. You can also just download the headers, view them offline, and then mark just the messages you want to download the next time you are connected.

You can also compose messages offline, and reconnect later to send all of your messages at once.

Do everything from the main window

You can view threads, respond to them, switch newsgroups, and switch news servers — all from the Outlook Express News window. With just a click on the toolbar, you can respond to messages or add newsgroups to your list of Favorites. Or use the toolbar to navigate among messages, threads, or newsgroups. All of these commands and more are also available from the menus, and many also have keyboard shortcuts.

Browse newsgroup messages quickly and easily

You can view a list of news servers, newsgroups, and messages, and preview the messages, all in one window by using the folder list, message list, and preview pane. Or, if you prefer, you can view a message in a separate window, and use the toolbar to go to the next or previous message.

View, expand, and collapse topics

You can view a topic ("thread") and all of the responses posted to it without having to scroll through the entire list of messages. When you do view the list of messages, you can expand and collapse individual threads to make it easier to look for messages or threads of interest. Icons in the message list make it easy to identify threads and whether they are expanded or collapsed. And you can easily navigate through the message list, threads, and messages with the mouse or by using keyboard shortcuts.

Sort the message list

You can sort messages by columns, such as by the subject, who posted it, or when it was posted. You can also add, remove, or rearrange these columns, and sort them in ascending or descending order.

Keep track of what you've read

You can mark messages, threads, or entire newsgroups to show that you have read them. The next time you go to that newsgroup, you can see which messages you've already read, or you can set Outlook Express News to display only unread messages.

Send messages

With the clearly marked and easy-to-view toolbar, it's hard to accidentally post a message to a whole newsgroup when you meant to send e-mail only to the author of the message. The toolbar makes it easy to post a message, reply to a newsgroup, or reply by e-mail to the author. You can also customize the toolbar by adding, removing, and organizing toolbar buttons.

Add your personal signature to your messages

You can add text or insert a text or html file as part of your signature. And you can choose to append your signature to all outgoing messages, to an individual message, or not at all.

Find newsgroups that interest you

Looking for a newsgroup that matches your work, educational, or leisure interests? You can search for newsgroups that contain key words in the newsgroup name or description. Or you can browse a list of all of the newsgroups available from your Usenet provider. There are even newsgroups on Usenet with messages that list each newsgroup and describe its purpose.

Subscribe to your favorite newsgroups

When you find a newsgroup that you want to visit regularly, add it to your **Subscribed** list. If your interests change, or if you find you don't visit a newsgroup often, you can easily remove it from the list. And you can always go to any newsgroup available from your news servers without subscribing.

Connect to multiple servers

If your Usenet provider uses more than one news server, you can set up separate accounts and passwords for each service. This enables you to easily switch between newsgroups on different servers without having to reconfigure your newsreader each time.

Filter out newsgroup messages that don't interest you

You can filter messages by sender, subject, length, or how recently it was posted. Any messages matching your criteria will not be displayed in the message list or downloaded.

Outlook Express News keyboard shortcuts

You can use shortcut keys to choose commands and navigate through the preview pane and the message list.

News: main window, view message window, and send message window

Print the selected message	CTRL+P

Using Microsoft Outlook Express accessibility features

In addition to Microsoft Windows, Windows NT, and Windows 95 accessibility products and services, the following features make Microsoft Outlook Express more accessible for people with disabilities:

Sound notification of new messages you can choose to be notified by a sound when new mail messages arrive.

Resizable message and list panes In Outlook Express, you can customize how messages and message lists are displayed. You can display messages in a preview pane, and split the window horizontally or vertically between the message list and the message preview. Or you can display only the message list. In any view, you can open a message from the message list in a separate window.

Large and small toolbars You can display the regular toolbar buttons, or the larger Internet toolbar or icon bar, or a combination of both. You can easily rearrange the Internet toolbar and icon bar to display the information and commands you use most. You can choose to display or hide the toolbar, Internet toolbar, or icon bar by using commands on the **View** menu.

Keyboard access All features in Microsoft Outlook Express are accessible to you by using the keyboard or the mouse. Outlook Express supports Dvorak keyboard layouts, which make the most frequently typed characters more accessible.
