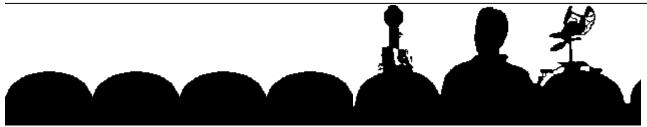

# **Getting started**

#### What is MST3K Animated Taskbar

The MST3K Animated Taskbar is based upon the popular Comedy Central show Mystery Science 3000 which places two wisecracking robots CROOOW T. ROBOT and TOM SERVO and their human friend (Joel Robison and later Mike Nelson) into a theater and forced to watch extremely cheesy movies.

The MST3K Taskbar places the boys on your Windows95 desktop. Adding to part of your working environment just like the start button. The Bots and Mike/Joel are their to wisecrack throughout your day. They are completely animated so you get the full effect of the popular show right on your windows95 desktop.

#### What's new

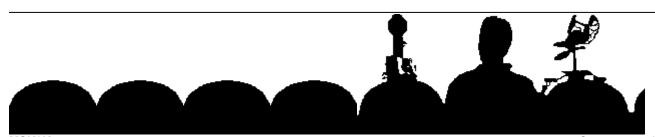
Well, first of all, the name is new. Because the way it works is new, we changed the name to MST3K Animated Taskbar.

The Animated Taskbar merges two previous products: The MST3K Animated Desktop and MST3K Sound Sucker. Which makes it easier than every to add your own sounds into to your setup.

Instead of drawing directly to the Windows95 desktop we placed the bots into their very own special taskbar. Drawing on the Windows Desktop just doesn't seem to be the way to do things in windows95. Having a taskbar is much more flexible in the new environment and shouldn't be effected by other programs like the Animated Desktop was.

Like the Windows95 taskbar (aka the start button) The MST3K Animated Taskbar sits at the bottom of the windows95 screen.

Right clicking on the taskbar brings up a properties menu, which allows you to change the way the taskbar works. It also allows you to bring up the MST3K Sound Sucker.



Sound Sucker is a configuration editor. It allows you the add new sounds and animate them. Sound Sucker also supports multiple configurations for the taskbar, which means you could have several different groups of sounds and switch between them. You could have a setup for each day of the week. To make the taskbar use a different sound configuration, you'll load that INI file into an make it your default.

You now have a choice to play the sounds randomly (which also will not play the same sound two times in a row) OR you can play them sequentially.

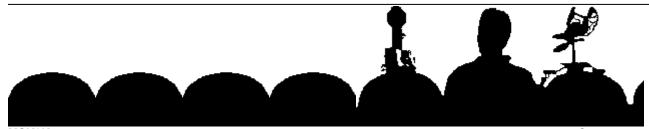
Combining the sequential order with multiple configuration will help develop your own separate sound file to share with others. Also, when you receive sounds from others just place them in a new directory

Also, there is new sounds. Out of Laziness I downloaded sounds off the internet and animated them. Also, I still don't get comedy central so no MST3K - no new sounds. I encourage everyone to visit the ftp site where I got the sounds: ftp://clover.cleaf.com/, and I hope I do not make anyone mad by "stealing" their sounds. I used them to help get recognition for the ftp site and (as I said) laziness.

An Icon is added to the Windows95 Taskbar. Pointing the mouse over the icon will display the next sound that will get played.

### Installation and running the program

Sorry no slick and easy install program here. What do you want for nothing? It should be pretty easy to set this program up yourself. Just simply unzip the program into its own folder/sub-directory. Run the SUCKER32.EXE Program. Or added a shortcut to it. That's it.



# Menus and dialogs

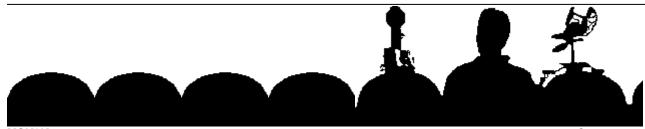
### The Taskbar context menu

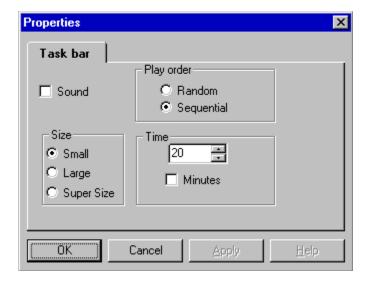
The Taskbar context menu comes up when you right click on the MST3K Aniamted Taskbar.

Menu Item	Action	
Sound Sucker	Displays / Hides the sounds sucker sound configuration editor,.	
Animated Task Bar	Displays / Hides the MST3K Animated Task Bar.	
Properties	Brings up the taskbar properties dialog box.	
E <u>x</u> it	Closes both Sound Sucker and the Animated Taskbar.	

### The properties dialog

The Taskbar Properties dialog allows you to change the way the Animated Taskbar works.





#### Sound

The sound checkbox turns sound on or off. You need a sound card to hear sound.

#### **Size**

Allows you to select the size of the Animated Taskbar..

Small - About the size of the windows taskbar.

Large - Twice the size of small.

Super Size - four times the size of small. About the same size as they appear on the show.

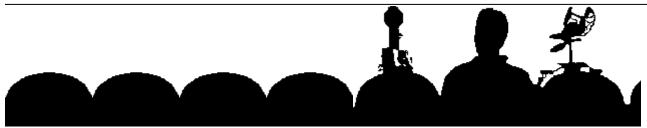
#### **Play Order**

Random - play sounds randomly.

Sequential - Start with the first sound and play them in order. Repeating after all sounds are played.

#### **Time**

Select the delay between sounds. Set the count and check the Minutes for the delay to be minutes. Uncheck the minutes to set the delay to be seconds.



### **Sound Sucker menus**

#### The File Menu

The file menu has commands to create, open and save files.

Menu Item	Action		
<u>N</u> ew	Create a new configuration file.		
<u>O</u> pen	Brings up the file open dialog box.		
Save	Save the current file.		
Save As	Save the current file as a different name.		
Make Current	Makes the current file the configuration for the MST3K Animated Taskbar. It will reset and use the sounds from this file now and in the future until another file is made current.		
E <u>x</u> it	Closes both Sound Sucker and the Animated Taskbar.		

#### The Edit Menu

The edit menu allows you to copy sounds from one file to another.

Menu Item	Action		
Cut	Copy the current selection to the clipboard and remove it.		
<u>C</u> opy_	Copy the current selection to the clipboard.		
<u>P</u> aste	Paste the sounds on the clipboard into this document.		
Properties	Brings up the properties dialog.		

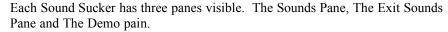
#### The View menu

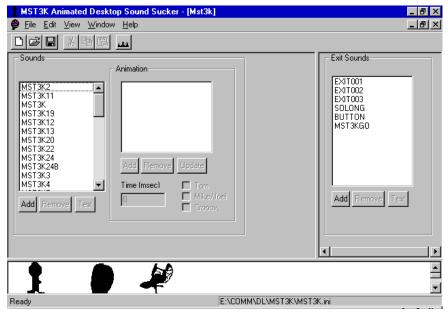
Allows you to display or hide items from view.

Menu Item	Action		
Toolbar	Display / Hides the Sound Sucker Toolbar		
Status Bar	Display / Hide the sound sucker takerbar.		
Sound Sucker	Displays / Hides the sounds sucker sound configuration editor,.		
Animated Task Bar	Displays / Hides the MST3K Animated Task Bar.

#### The Demo Pane

This displays the boys and animates them based on the animation specified when you hit the test button in the Sounds Pane.

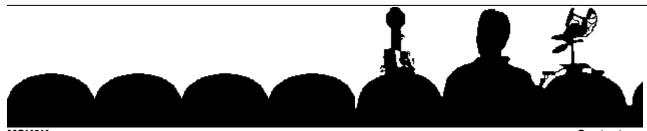
#### The Sounds Pane

The Sounds pane allows you to add new WAV files to the play list. The file sound be copied into the same directory as the configuration file then hit the Add button and select the file. All sound files for a give configuration file MUST BE in the same directory as the configuration file. Remove lets you remove a file from the play list. It does not delete the WAV file. Test will play the file and display the animation in the Demo window.

The sound pane also has an animation grouping. When you select a sound in the list of sounds the animation sequences for that sound are displayed in this grouping.

You can add new, remove or update animation sequences using the buttons. You can select the time and characters to animated using the other controls. Set the time in milliseconds and character and hit Add to add a new animation sequence. Select a Animation sequence, change its settings to update. Select an animation sequence and hit remove to delete it.

Hit thje test button to see your animation in the demo pane.



#### The Exit Sounds Pane

The Exit Sounds pane allows you to add sounds that get played when you reset or close the taskbar. This is a good place to put sound of "The Mads". Like Sounds, Add, Remove and Test work the same. Also, the WAV files need to be in the same directory.

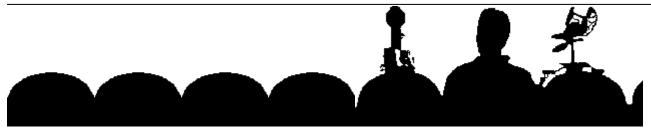


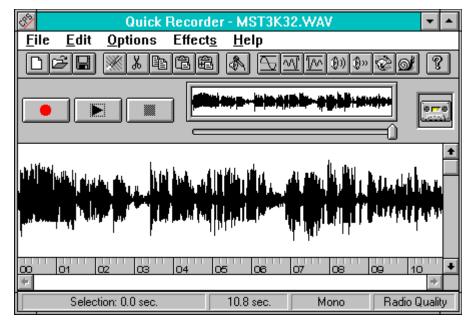
# **Keys to Animating Sounds**

## Adding sounds and animation

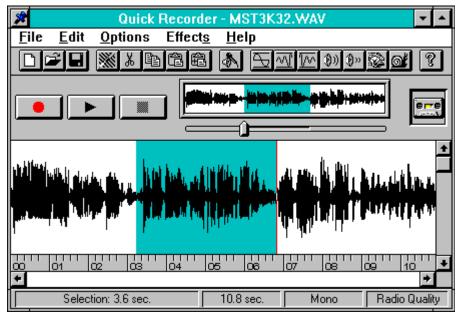
The hardest thing about adding sounds is animating them. This is because there is now good way to know who is talking, when. This is left up to the person adding the sound. A good sound editor allows you to select parts of a sound so you can select part of a sound to determine the length of time to animate.

You'll need to figure out who talks and when. You can do this by playing the sound over an over again taken notes on who to animate and for how long. You can use Sound Recorder using the scroll bar to pause an play the sound and certain points. Note what times sounds are occuring and for how long. Note who is talking or laughing.

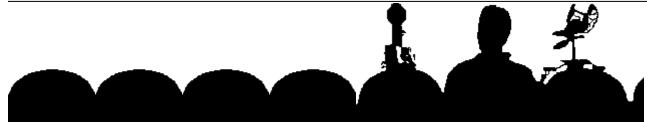




This task can be greatly reduced by using a program such as Microsoft's Quick Record (shown above) that come with MS-Sound System. Or Creative Labs Wave Studio that comes with most sound blasters. These programs allow you to select parts of a sound(see below). You can play just the selected portion until you've isolated the portion your interested in. And the tell you how long that selection is. For example you can select the part in the sound where only Crooow is talking.



You should break the sound up so you know who talks and for how long, from begining to end. Be sure to also keep track of silence or part were no one is talking. The table below is a example on how you might take note on this.

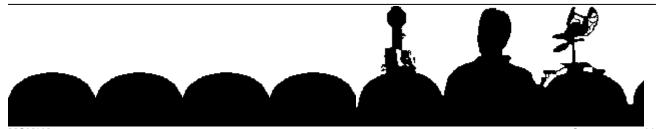


Animate	Time Sec	Time Millsecs	Cumulative time
Crooow	2.3	2300	2.3
Nobody	1.3	1300	3.6
Joel	3.6	3600	7.2
Tom	1.2	1200	8.4
Crooow, Tom (laughing)	1	1000	9.7
Joel	1.1	1100	10.8

I know this is a pain, but it takes human interaction to determine who is talking. And most sound bites are quick and only one character speaks, so those are easy.

Now take your table and use Sound Sucker to add the animation sequences.

Add the sound using the add button. Then add each of the Animation sequences. Select the Characters and put in the time in Milliseconds and hit the add button.

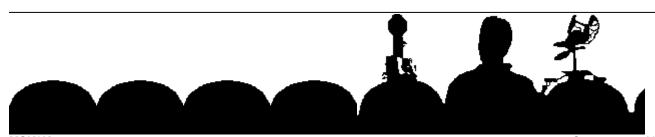
