

## Super Marble Solitaire™ Help Index

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## Rules

The rules of the game are simple:

- The game is played on a board containing a number of holes.
- Each hole can be empty or hold one marble.
- A legal move consists of one marble jumping over another.
- The jumped marble is removed from the board.

The object of the game (in the scope of this version of Super Marble Solitaire) is to eliminate all but one marble with the remaining marble being located in the goal. If the game includes a marked marble, the last remaining marble must be the marked marble.

**Goal**

The goal is a hole that is uniquely marked on the board.

**Marked Marble**

A marble that is a different color than all the other marbles on the board.

### **Take back command (Move menu)**

Use this command to take back the previous move. You can take back (undo) your moves all the way back to the beginning of the game.

### **Shortcuts**

Click with the left mouse button on any of the discarded marbles in the discarded marble tray.

## **New Game command (Game menu)**

Use this command to start a new game in Super Marble Solitaire. Select the type of new game you want to play in the Select Game dialog.

## Design Game command (Game Menu)

Use this command to remove or create your own games. The [Design Game dialog](#) will appear after selecting this command.

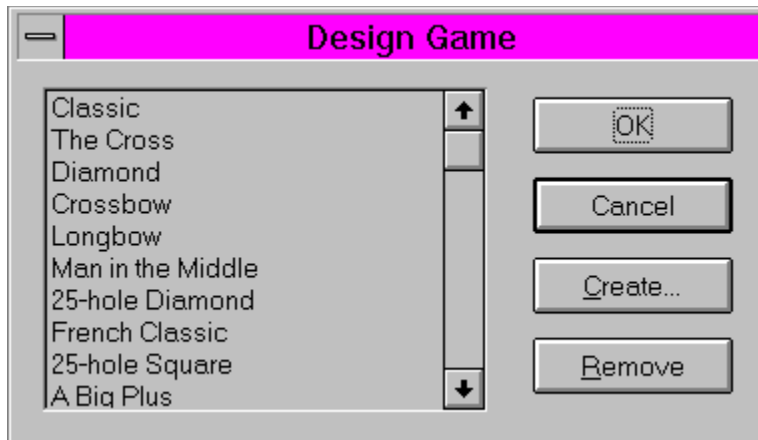
### **Colors command (View Menu)**

Use this command to change the color of the marbles and/or board.

### **Shortcuts**

To remove a game, click on the game to be removed from the list and then click on the Remove button.

To create your own game, press the Create button. The [Game Designer](#) window will appear.

Pressing the Cancel button will remove all the changes made to the list.

Pressing the OK button will accept all the changes. The file **slrtemp.gtp** (solitaire game template file) is created. This file contains all the games in the updated list as shown in the dialog box. This file is in binary format, therefore it cannot be edited with a text editor (such as notepad). If you design some cool games that you want to share, you can distribute this file to your friends.

If you want to start over with the original set of games, all you have to do is delete, or rename, the **slrtemp.gtp** file.

### **Exit command (Game menu)**

Use this command to end your Super Marble Solitaire session. You can also use the Close command on the application Control menu.

### **Shortcuts**

Mouse: Double-click the application's Control menu button.



Keys: ALT+F4

### **Toolbar command (View menu)**

Use this command to display and hide the Toolbar, which includes buttons for some of the most common commands in Super Marble Solitaire, such as New Game. A check mark appears next to the menu item when the Toolbar is displayed.

## Toolbar



The toolbar is displayed across the top of the application window, below the menu bar. The toolbar provides quick mouse access to many tools used in Super Marble Solitaire,

To hide or display the Toolbar, choose Toolbar from the View menu (ALT, V, T).

### **Status Bar command (View menu)**

Use this command to display and hide the Status Bar, which describes the action to be executed by the selected menu item or depressed toolbar button, and displays the number of marbles left on the board. A check mark appears next to the menu item when the Status Bar is displayed.

## Status Bar



The status bar is displayed at the bottom of the Super Marble Solitaire window. To display or hide the status bar, use the Status Bar command in the View menu.

The left area of the status bar describes actions of menu items as you use the arrow keys to navigate through menus. This area similarly shows messages that describe the actions of toolbar buttons as you depress them, before releasing them. If after viewing the description of the toolbar button command you wish not to execute the command, then release the mouse button while the pointer is off the toolbar button.

The right area of the status bar indicates the number of marbles remaining on the board.

**Help Topics command (Help menu)**

Use this command to display the opening screen of Help. From the opening screen, you can jump to step-by-step instructions for using Super Marble Solitaire and various types of reference information.

Once you open Help, you can click the Contents button whenever you want to return to the opening screen.

## **Using Help command (Help menu)**

Use this command for instructions about using Help.

## **About command (Help menu)**

Use this command to display the copyright notice and version number of your copy of Super Marble Solitaire.

## **Shortcuts**

## Context Help command

Use the Context Help command to obtain help on some portion of Super Marble Solitaire. When you choose the Toolbar's Context Help button, the mouse pointer will change to an arrow and question mark. Then click somewhere in the Super Marble Solitaire window, such as another Toolbar button. The Help topic will be shown for the item you clicked.

### Shortcut

Keys: SHIFT+F1

Toolbar: 

### **Move command (Control menu)**

Use this command to display a four-headed arrow so you can move the active window or dialog box with the arrow keys.



Note: This command is unavailable if you maximize the window.


### **Shortcut**

Keys: CTRL+F7

## **Minimize command (application Control menu)**

Use this command to reduce the Super Marble Solitaire window to an icon.

### **Shortcut**

Mouse: Click the minimize icon  on the title bar.  
Keys: ALT+F9

### **Close command (Control menus)**

Use this command to close the active window or dialog box.

Double-clicking a Control-menu box is the same as choosing the Close command.





**Restore command (Control menu)**

Use this command to return the active window to its size and position before you chose the Maximize or Minimize command.

## **Switch to command (application Control menu)**

Use this command to display a list of all open applications. Use this "Task List" to switch to or close an application on the list.

### **Shortcut**

Keys: CTRL+ESC

### **Dialog Box Options**

When you choose the Switch To command, you will be presented with a dialog box with the following options:

#### **Task List**

Select the application you want to switch to or close.

#### **Switch To**

Makes the selected application active.

#### **End Task**

Closes the selected application.

#### **Cancel**

Closes the Task List box.

#### **Cascade**

Arranges open applications so they overlap and you can see each title bar. This option does not affect applications reduced to icons.

#### **Tile**

Arranges open applications into windows that do not overlap. This option does not affect applications reduced to icons.

#### **Arrange Icons**

Arranges the icons of all minimized applications across the bottom of the screen.

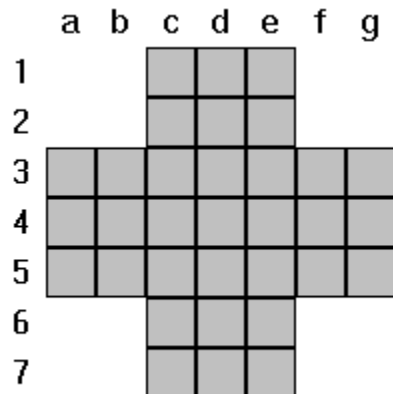

## Game Strategy Tips



The convention used for demonstration purposes is to letter the columns from left to right as 'a' through 'g'. The rows are numbered from top to bottom as '1' through '7'. Therefore the center position in the diagram to the right is 'position d4'.

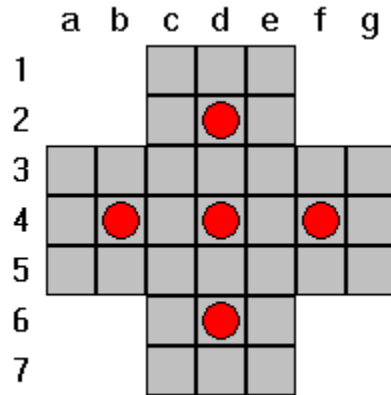

## The four marble classes

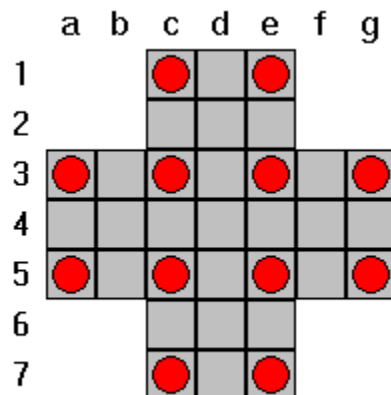
The marbles can be divided into four classes according to their position on the board. No matter where a marble is moved during play, it always remains in the same class as where it started.

### The middle marbles



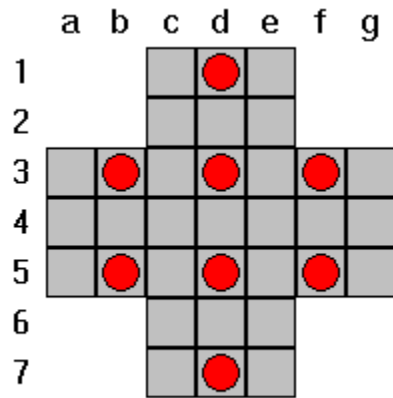
The positions shown on the left are the only positions where the middle marbles can go (in the Classic game). Note also that in the Classic game, you start out with only 4 middle marbles. The objective of the Classic game is to end with only 1 marble (a middle marble) in the center position. Therefore, if you have jumped over and removed all the middle marbles before the end of the game, it is impossible to win. The middle marbles are then only ones that can move to the center position.

### The corner marbles



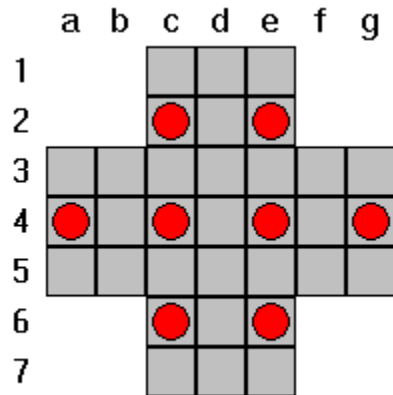
The positions shown on the left are the corner positions. Only corner marbles can move to these positions. In the Classic game, you start out with 12 corner marbles.

### The "S" edge marbles



The "S" marbles are important for clearing corner marbles from the side corners.

**The "T" edge marbles**



The "T" marbles are important for clearing corner marbles from the top and bottom corners.

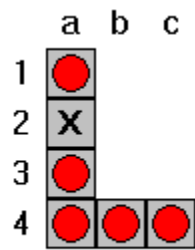

A block move is a defined series of moves that effectively replace a given set of marbles with a single marble in a specified position. All other marbles are left unchanged.

A block removal is a defined series of moves that effectively remove a given set of marbles from the board, while leaving the rest in their original position.

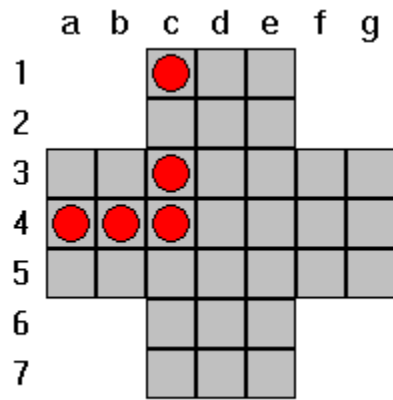

"Don't Care" (represented by a D) means that it doesn't matter whether there is a marble in that position or not. The move can still be performed. If there is a marble in that position, it may be involved in the move, but will be restored after the move is complete.

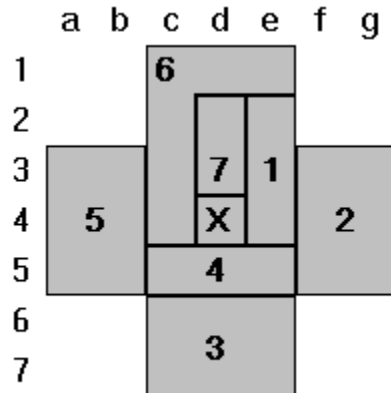
An unlike pair are two positions on the board that do not match. One of the positions must contain a marble. The positions cannot both be empty nor both contain marbles. The marble in the unlike pair may be involved in the move, but will be restored after the move is complete.

An unlike trio are three positions on the board that do not match. One or two of the positions must contain a marble. All three positions cannot be empty, nor can all three contain marbles. The marble (or marbles) in the unlike trio may be involved in the move, but will be restored after the move is complete.

An unlike sextet are six positions on the board that do not match. At least one of the positions must contain a marble. All six positions cannot be empty, nor can all six contain marbles. The marble (or marbles) in the unlike sextet may be involved in the move, but will be restored after the move is complete.

## Solution to the Classic Game

The following is the diagram for a solution for this game:



This solution consists of 6 pattern moves and 1 single move into the [goal](#).

1. [3-removal](#) (f4 to d4, e2 to e4, d4 to f4)
2. [6-removal](#) (e6 to e4, g5 to e5, g3 to g5, f3 to f5, e4 to e6, g5 to e5)
3. [6-removal](#) (d5 to f5, e7 to e5, c7 to e7, c6 to e6, f5 to d5, e7 to e5)
4. [3-removal](#) (c4 to c6, e5 to c5, c6 to c4)
5. [6-removal](#) (a5 to c5, a3 to a5, b3 to b5, c4 to c6, a5 to c5, c6 to c4)
6. [L-removal](#) (d3 to b3, c1 to c3, e1 to c1, c4 to c2, c1 to c3, b3 to d3)
7. Single move into [Goal](#) position (d2 to d4)

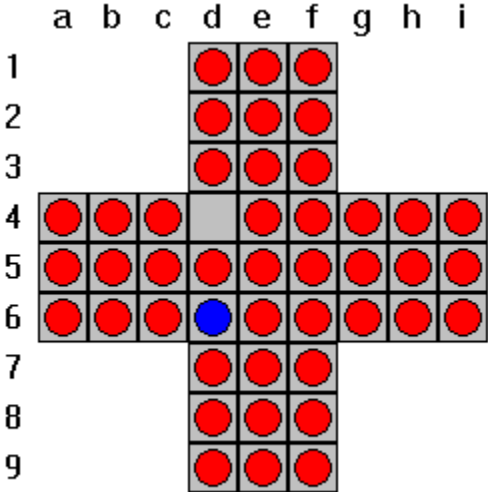

This solution consists of 6 pattern moves and 1 single move into the [goal](#).

1. [6-removal](#) (c1 to c3, a1 to c1, a2 to c2, d1 to b1, c3 to c1, b1 to d1)
2. [6-removal](#) (e1 to c1, d3 to d1, f2 to d2, c1 to e1, f1 to d1, d1 to d3)
3. [6-removal](#) (d4 to d2, f4 to d4, f3 to d3, c4 to e4, d2 to d4, e4 to c4)
4. [6-removal](#) (d6 to d4, f6 to d6, f5 to d5, c6 to e6, d4 to d6, e6 to c6)
5. [6-removal](#) (b6 to d6, c4 to c6, d6 to b6, a6 to c6, a5 to c5, c6 to c4)
6. [3-removal](#) (a3 to a5, c4 to a4, a5 to a3)
7. Single move into [Goal](#) position (a3 to c3)

Enter your name in the Designer box, and the name of your game in the Description box. If you change the dimensions of the game matrix by entering different values in the Width or Height boxes, press the Apply button. The Apply button will redraw the game matrix in the lower portion of the window using the new dimensions.

Press the OK button to accept the game design, or Cancel to abort the design.

Click on the cells in the game matrix with the left mouse button to change their state. The states are as follows:

Small black circle - This is a position that is not occupied by a marble.

Red circle - This is a position that is occupied by a marble.

Blue circle - This is a position that is occupied by a marked marble. (only one is allowed in a game)

Any of the above states, when combined with cross-hairs means that the position is the goal. This is the position that must contain the sole remaining marble (or marked marble) at the end of the game.
