1.3 A Tour...

Well, I'm sure you're all wondering what the hell this $\ \ \hookrightarrow$ is! I shall

explain....

I' ve been using

AmIRC

for sometime now, but only recently been introduced to the wonders of

Kuang Eleven

. I revelled in the

simplicity of all the features but it was the sounds that interested me most.

In order to play sounds at people, you have to type into the console the command and then the name of the sound. Not having a very good memory, I decided this was a little too much like hard work, and so AmSound was born.

AmSound will keep track of all your sound files and display them in a list. You can pick a sound at will by clicking it's name, and the command and name will be entered into AmIRC's window for you. This makes using sounds extremely easy and saves you remembering all those file names.

AmSound has many redeeming qualities wich are listed in the Features $\$

section.

1.4 The good points....

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AmSound is extremely easy to use, but there are a few things you ought \leftrightarrow
   to know.
The menus:
  'About' - Doh! I wonder...
  'Quit' - Another hard one.
  The 'Settings' menu is split into:
    'Dirs' - This sets the path to your AmIRC/Sounds drawer. Please make
              sure that is right, otherwise you could be sending all \leftrightarrow
                  kinds
              of rubbish to AmIRC's ARexx port ;)
    'Port' - This is the name of AmIRC's ARexx port. One point to note
              here is that the port name is case sensitive.
    'Auto Save' - This option is ghosted currently as it's not \leftrightarrow
        implememnted.
The Gadgets:
  'The Sound List' - All the sound files in the specified directory are
                       shown in this list. Simply highlite the sound or \ \hookleftarrow
                           double
                       click it.
  'Play' - This will active the playing of the highlighted sound file.
  'Quit' - Do I really need to explain this one? ;)
The Theory...
In essence, Amsound will take the name of your selected sound file and \,\hookleftarrow\,
it to the ARexx port of AmIRC. This is why the port name must be correct \leftrightarrow
It pre-pends the command '/sound'. This command is actually an alias set \hookleftarrow
by the installation procedure of Kuang Eleven. Basically it is the same
principal as you typing /sound fart.wav into the console.
Something that came to mind while thinking about the theory of operation \leftrightarrow
was the fact that sounds can be requested from anyone on the channel, \leftrightarrow
   and
these are consequently moved into the sound drawer. In order to save a \,\,\leftrightarrow\,\,
of hassle, I have implemented a mechanism to monitor the 'sound' drawer
and if the contents are added to, the list in AmSound will update itself \leftrightarrow

1.5 Putting it all in place...

Well, I have nt got around to writing an installer script as yet, but \leftarrow
              there
          isn't much to it.
          Firstly, move the amsound.amirx file into AmIRC/Rexx.
          Next, place AmSound into any directory you like.
          That's it! When you first run AmSound, it will appear in a default place
          with a default size. Size and position the window wherever you want it
              and
          quit the program. These settings will be saved into a preferences file \,\,\leftrightarrow\,
          that it will always appear in the last place you left it. The path to \,\,\hookleftarrow\,
          sound files and the name of AmIRC's port will also be saved.
          Now you can run AmIRC and select the amsound.amirx script to run AmSound
          for you, or alternatively you could have it start when AmIRC starts.

There are lots of improvements I'd like to make, but the most important is here:

o Give AmSound the ability to sense the ARexx port of the current focus. This way, it eliminates the need to specify the port name, plus if you have 2 or more channels open, with different ARexx ports, AmSound will send the data to the currently active window. I might need some help \hookleftarrow on

this, so any ARexx guru's out there, could you contact me? ;)

o More font sensivity. Currently it'll use the screens font, but wont adapt it's size at all. This is OK for size 8 fonts, but will look $\,\,\hookrightarrow\,\,$ wierd

with bigger sizes :/

o general code clean up's. Why not, after all it's rushed!
