LEAVES: LARGE DARK GREEN DROOPING LEAVES DEEPLY LOBED AND SERRATED AND PROTRUDING OUT

FROM THE PLANT AT INTERVALS ALL THE WAY ROUND THE STALK.

POISONOUS: EXTREMELY NORMAL SIZE: 4' TO 8'

NORMAL ELEVATION: 6000' TO 8000'

HABITATION: ALONG BANKS OF SPRING FED STREAMS.

ABUNDANCE: RARE

NOTABLE DETAILS: TALL HERBACEOUS PLANT WITH LARGE LEAVES AND BLUE FLOWERS.

SPECIAL INTEREST: EXTREMELY BEAUTIFUL AND EXTREMELY POISONOUS, SO MUCH SO, THAT ITS LEAVES SHOULD NOT BE TOUCHED BY SMALL CHILDREN.
