NOTABLE DETAILS: HERBACEOUS TALL MULTI-STEMMED PLANT WITH MUCH BRANCHING AT THE UPPER THIRD, COVERED IN HAIRS AND MANY LARGE YELLOW FLOWERS

SPECIAL INTEREST: CRUSHING THE LEAVES PRODUCES A CAMPHOR SMELL, AND THE PLANTS TALL FEATURE EARNED THE NAME OF TELEGRAPH OF TELEPHONE POLE WEED, AND ALSO PERHAPS DISTURBING THE SOIL TO INSTALL POLES, CAUSED THESE PLANTS TO FLOURISH AROUND THE POLES. OTHERS SAY IT SMELLS LIKE CREOSOTE. IT LINES THE ROAD OF MUCH OF THE STATE AT THE PREFERRED ELEVATIONS.
