

**COMMON NAME:**  
ARIZONA BLUE EYES

**SCIENTIFIC NAME:**  
EVOLVULUS ARIZONICUS

**ALSO CALLED:** EVOLVULUS AND SLENDER DWARF MORNING GLORY

**FLOWER COLOR:** LAVENDER OR PALE BLUE

**FLOWER ARRANGEMENT:** ALONG SIDES OF BRANCHES

**FLOWERING TIME:** MARCH TO MAY

**LEAVES:** USUALLY STEMLESS AND NARROW ELONGATED WITH A POINT

**NORMAL SIZE:** VERY SHORT AND SO SMALL AS TO BE EASILY MISSED ABOUT 6" TO 12" TALL

**NORMAL ELEVATION:** 2500' TO 4500'

**HABITATION:** DRY WASHES

**ABUNDANCE:** VERY RARE

**NOTABLE DETAILS:** HERBACEOUS PROSTRATE USUALLY SEMI-VINY WITH NARROW STEMLESS LEAVES WHICH ARE ABUNDANT ALONG ITS MANY BRANCHES. THE FLOWERS ARE UNUSUAL BECAUSE THE EDGES ARE TURNED DOWN WHICH ALLOWS THE MIDDLES TO PROTRUDE UPWARD.

**SPECIAL INTEREST:** THEY ARE VERY BEAUTIFUL CLOSEUP BUT ARE QUITE SMALL
