ALSO CALLED: EVOLVULUS AND SLENDER DWARF MORNING GLORY

FLOWER COLOR: LAVENDER OR PALE BLUE

FLOWER ARRANGEMENT: ALONG SIDES OF BRANCHES

FLOWERING TIME: MARCH TO MAY

LEAVES: USUALLY STEMLESS AND NARROW ELONGATED WITH A POINT

NORMAL SIZE: VERY SHORT AND SO SMALL AS TO BE EASILY MISSED ABOUT 6" TO 12" TALL

NORMAL ELEVATION: 2500' TO 4500'

HABITATION: DRY WASHES ABUNDANCE: VERY RARE

NOTABLE DETAILS: HERBACEOUS PROSTRATE USUALLY SEMI-VINY WITH NARROW STEMLESS LEAVES WHICH ARE ABUNDANT ALONG ITS MANY BRANCHES. THE FLOWERS ARE UNUSUAL BECAUSE THE EDGES ARE TURNED DOWN WHICH ALLOWS THE MIDDLES TO PROTRUDE UPWARD.

SPECIAL INTEREST: THEY ARE VERY BEAUTIFUL CLOSEUP BUT ARE QUITE SMALL
