Witch Hazel

(Hamamelis sp.)

Witch hazels are treasured for their very fragrant, unusually shaped flowers that appear in late fall or late winter. The flowers look like masses of thin ribbons or strings, in a golden yellow color. Under unseasonably cold conditions, the flowers protect themselves by closing into a tight ball.

Soil: Rich, moist, well drained

Light: Sun or light shade

Zone: 5 - 6

Comments

Common (H. virginiana)--the hardiest and largest (to 25 feet) fall-flowering variety--has medium-sized blooms that blend with yellow fall foliage. Vernal (H. vernalis)--smallest, most rounded shape (6 feet high and wide)--has the smallest (1/2-inch) flowers in late winter. Chinese (H. mollis)--largest plant with the largest spring flowers--is prone to cold damage. Arnold Promise (H. x intermedia) is showiest with red fall color.
