

cardinal flower

Lobelia cardinalis

Kingdom: Plantae

FEATURES

The cardinal flower has bright red, two-lipped flowers which may be up to two inches long. The upper lip has two lobes while the lower lip has three lobes. This plant is a perennial herb whose stems may grow to six feet tall. Stems are usually hairy and have milky sap. The leaves are arranged alternately on the stem. Leaves are lance-shaped, usually toothed and hairy. Leaves may be eight inches long and up to two and one-half inches wide. Fruits are spherical capsules that may be one-half inch wide. The tiny, warty seeds are yellow-brown.

BEHAVIORS

The cardinal flower grows in marshes, wet meadows, wet prairies and along streams, ponds and lakes. It blooms from July through October.
