FEATURES

Scuds are small crustaceans, reaching only one-fifth to four-fifths inch in length. In appearance they are somewhat like shrimp. There are seven pairs of legs on the thorax, the first two pairs with grasping claws. The head contains the eyes and two pairs of antennae. The body is flattened side-to-side.

BEHAVIORS

Scuds live along the bottom in the shallows of many types of water bodies, such as springs, streams, lakes and ponds. Scuds swim on their side along the bottom, accounting for the common name "sideswimmer." Scuds are omnivores and detritivores. Scuds are an important food source for many species of fishes. Although most species of amphipods are commonly found in Illinois, five species of them are listed as endangered in Illinois while another species is listed as threatened. These amphipods tend to be associated with cave habitats.
