

water pepper

Polygonum hydropiperoides

FEATURES

Water pepper is a perennial herb with upright stems that are usually branched and may be one foot long. Arranged alternately along the stem, the lance-shaped leaves are about four inches long. Each leaf has a sheath bearing bristles at the base of the leaf stalk. The white to pink flowers are less than one-fourth inch long. Flowers are arranged in clusters along the stem. The black, triangular fruits are about one-eighth inch long.

BEHAVIORS

Water pepper grows in wet soil such as that found in roadside ditches, marshes and wet meadows. This plant flowers from July through October.
