FEATURES

The pale corydalis, or yellow corydalis, is related to the Dutchman's-breeches. This annual plant has branched stems that grow to 10 inches long. The green-gray leaves alternate along the stem and are finely divided, almost like a fern frond. The lipped, tubelike, yellow flowers are arranged on a stalk at the tip of the stem. Each tiny flower has four petals, and there is a crest on the upper petal and a short yellow spur at the base. The fruit is a capsule, which may be one and one-half inches long.

BEHAVIORS

Pale corydalis may be found statewide in Illinois but is more common in the southern one-half. It grows in rocky areas in moist woods. This plant flowers from April through May.
